### Pope to Broadcast From Vatican City For United States

His Holiness Pope Pius XI will speak from St. Peter Cathedral, Vatican City (Rome), over WSAI (NBC-WEAF) Sunday (April 3) for 20 minutes beginning at 12 noon—weather permitting. An English translation will follow his Italian address.

A microphone in the cathedral will pick up the voices, and HVJ, Vatican City station, will short-wave the program to the United States for re-broadcast.

### Next Stokowski Concert Will Be "All-American"

Leopold Stokowski will close his historical survey of the world's great music with composers born or naturalized in America, in the Philadelphia Orchestra program he will conduct Saturday (April 2) from 8:15 until 10 p. m. over WKRC (CBS).

Headliners include Phil Davis, who has just finished a run at New York City's Paramount Theater, and his dance orchestra; Pat Harrington, tenor and master of ceremonies, late

"Cockaigne" or "In London Town," a musical picture of London by Sir Edward Elgar, will open the New York Philharmonic-Symphony Orchestra, to be conducted by Sir Thomas Beecham through WKRC (CBS) Sunday (April 3) from 3 until 5 p. m. Sir Edward holds the ancient office of Master of King's Music.

## "YOU SCRATCH MY BACK AND -"

Proving that it is not just something connected with the tariff, the reciprocity idea bobs up as the new spring fashion in air sales technique. Doubtless you've noticed.

Several of the program sponsors are suggesting more or less subtly that, in return for loudspeaker entertainment duly provided, listeners ought to buy the products therein advertised. Some go so far as to imply that the continuance of their programs is contingent on increased listener patronage; and a few even throw out the hint that those who listen without buying are no better than common gate-crashers.

As far as the "cold facts" are concerned, there is, of course, considerable to be said for this reciprocity idea. Obviously, no manufacturer can go on paying broadcasting bills unless quite a few listeners buy his wares. But reducing the sales appeal to a "you scratch my back and I'll scratch yours" basis is something else again.

Frankly, we have a notion that it will prove to be a boomerang, for the good reason that it is pretty certain to smother the very gratitude the sponsor is seeking to foster. Gratitude, unfortunately, cannot be turned out on request. In fact, it is pretty likely to dry up the moment it is asked for.

Or, to put the case another way, the sponsor's only means of stimulating sales through radio advertising is by putting on a program that will cause listeners to think favorably of him and his product. That method has worked successfully so far, and there is no reason to believe that this spring epidemic of "back-scratching" represents any improvement.

Also, the "you ought to buy if you listen" movement threatens considerable embarrassment to the contention that programs are free. Advertising men maintain, and with justification, that advertising adds nothing to the cost of a product because the increased volume obtained permits lower prices. However, if listeners continue to be told that programs are contingent on their support, there will be grounds for the suspicion that they pay for their radio entertainment indirectly when they buy air-advertised products.

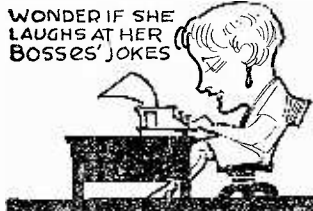
That would scarcely react to the benefit of radio or advertising.

Leslie Howard is doing mighty well as the new monologist on that Yardley program (NBC over WLW, Sunday at 2 p.m.). Mischa Levitsky also has been turning in some splendid performances.

March 23 goes down in radio history as the first time J. P. Morgan confided in a microphone. NBC tucked that choice feather in its cap and not without considerable "pointing with pride." But this dialer couldn't quite repress an irreverent titter at the atmosphere of breathless awe which engulfed the ceremonies. There isn't half as much verbal bowing and scraping when a mere president goes on the air.

March 23 also got itself inscribed on radio's historical scroll as marking the first time Amos and Andy used crowd noise effects, the occasion being Andy's flyer in the wrestling industry. The departure is doubly noteworthy because the famous pair usually will not even allow visitors in the studio while they are doing their act.

That General Electric program (NBC over WSAI, Sunday at 5:30 p.m.) is setting a fast pace in the quality division of the vocal music department. For instance, there was Reinald Werrenrath's recent program. Any time he sings "Duna" it's a high moment in this listener's life.

Lee Sims eats only one meal a day, and that between 7 and 7:30 p.m. He prefers substantial things and hates desserts.

Ray Knight's latest burlesque, "Making the Movies" (NBC over

WLW, Sunday at 9:45 p.m.), is another amusing specimen. Still, he shouldn't have to stray from the facts to be funny here.

Arthur Allen, otherwise "Esley Stebbins," collects old clocks as a hobby. Colonial types are his favorites. But we have a notion there are certain studio timepieces he has yearned to take elsewhere.

The Kellogg Singing Lady (NBC over WLW, Monday to Friday at 5:30 p.m.) is in the forefront of children's entertainers. Besides a charming microphone personality, she has the spirit of make-believe that is indispensable in such work. We'd like to be able to tell you who she is. But her identity is one of radio's secrets the NBC simply won't reveal. Sponsor's orders.

Graham McNamee's record of 10 years without a radio tardy mark was spoiled recently. While he was going to Philadelphia to air a Fleischmann Hour, his train was derailed. He turned up 45 minutes late.

Erno Rapee is doing splendid things in the General Motors program (NBC over WSAI, Monday at 9:30 p.m.). Besides a fine orchestra he presents a vocal ensemble that is something quite unusual on the air.

Bob Newhall, who galls around the sport world for dear old Mail Pouch (WLW, daily except Sun-



day, at 6:30 p.m.), broadcasts with his hat on. But anyway, he doesn't talk through it. That ought to be an extenuating circumstance.

If you crave yet more night-club fare, dial the Eugene International Revue (CBS over WKRC, Sunday at 10:30 p.m.). It's a series of imaginary visits to the world's most famous "hot spots." And please note that they're labeled plainly as imaginary. Some of the broadcasters aren't so careful about playing fair on that score.

Mike Pingitore, who plays plenty of banjo for Paul Whiteman, has been with the jazz king 14 years.

COLUMBIA STUDIOS, NEW YORK CITY.—There is no place quite so forsaken, I think, as a night club in the afternoon. I went over to the Montmartre (off Broadway at 50th Street) yesterday to see Mrs. George Olsen, who sings over WABC-Columbia Tuesday and Friday nights with her husband's orchestra.

Climbing up what seems to be miles of carpeted stairs, you are guided by the sound of music to the ballroom where the band is rehearsing. Sitting around motionless and apparently lifeless, are a group of men with their elbows on the table. Occasionally one leans over to whisper to another.

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other. These, a newspaperman told me, were song-pluggers from musical publishing houses. Early spring sunshine sifted in on the red and blue velvet drapes, dusty in the daylight . . . and there were miles of deserted tables. I sat down at one and listened to the music. Faultless as the band is, they repeat the same selection over and over again. That's why the players reach perfection.

Mrs. Olsen finally appeared in a becoming blue and tan outfit and an especially intriguing hat cocked way over one eye (George likes them that way). He says hats straight off the forehead make all species of women look surprised.

A little over six years ago, Ethel Shuita was playing in a Ziegfeld production with Leon Errol. So was George Olsen with his band. At that time, Ethel was burning her candle at both ends, playing at the Cosmopolitan and rushing down during intermission to do a number at the New Amsterdam! (Such is the life of an actress!) She had no idea for some time that she was admired by George Olsen, but pretty soon she noticed that whenever her car drew up to the curb by the stage door, George was standing there.

Every matinee afternoon George would ask Ethel if she'd like to hear the band rehearse, and offer a few suggestions. "I certainly admired him for his conscientious efforts to make something of himself," Ethel said. "And let me tell you this. My opinion of him has never changed. George was always the kind to forge ahead."

Six years ago this coming April they were married. They have two children now, George and Charles aged 4½ and 2½, respectively.

"We've tried to keep them away from anything theatrical," said Ethel. "They don't show off like a lot of kids do. We want them to grow up and decide for themselves."

Ethel has wanted to work with her husband for years. In fact, ever since she first worked with him in Ziegfeld's production. But he would never allow her to do so.

"Finally, he realized I was happiest doing something connected with the theater," says Ethel. "So here I am." She looked brightly around the Montmartre ball-room, which transforms itself at night-time.
