## London's Old Stage Will Live Again in Broadcast on WKRC

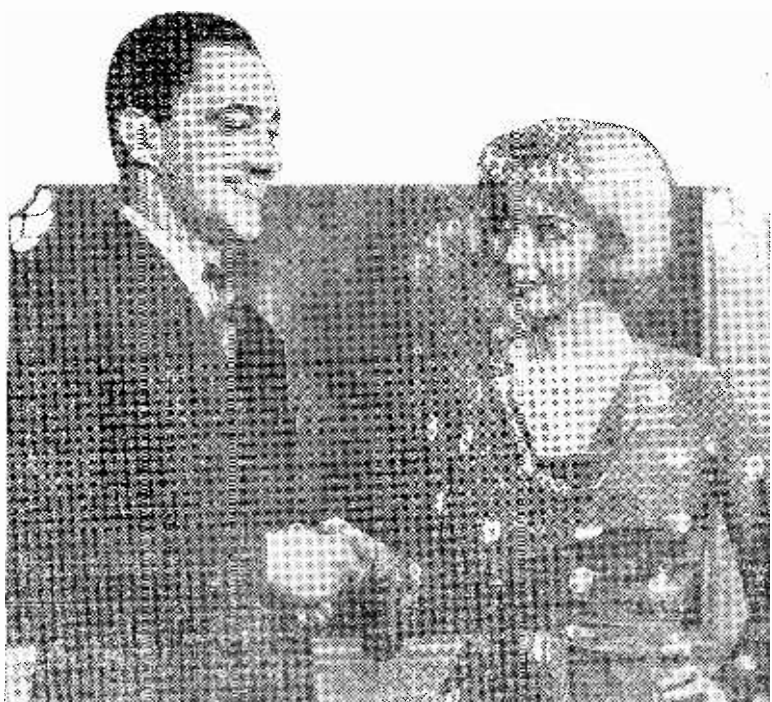
London will broadcast a half-hour of "Leicester Square", musical comedy and vaudeville, Friday (May 20) at 5 p. m. over WKRC (CBS).

In the first half, music will be played from Offenbach's "La Belle Helene", produced at the Alhambra in 1873; from "The Country Girl", produced at Daly's in 1922; and from "Hullo, Ragtime", Hippodrome success of 1912. The Alhambra, Hippodrome and Hippodrome are Leicester Square theaters.

The second half of the program will include selections from hits, including "The Bing Boys Are Here", World War revue produced in 1916 at the Alhambra with George Robey and Vi Lorraine; "Live for Today" from "The Mount of the Moon", which had the longest run of any musical comedy in the London theater.

The program includes George Baker, Arthur Dooly, Olive Groves, Ray Wall and other favorites. Billy Scott, conductor of the Leicester Square Orchestra, will conduct the orchestra.

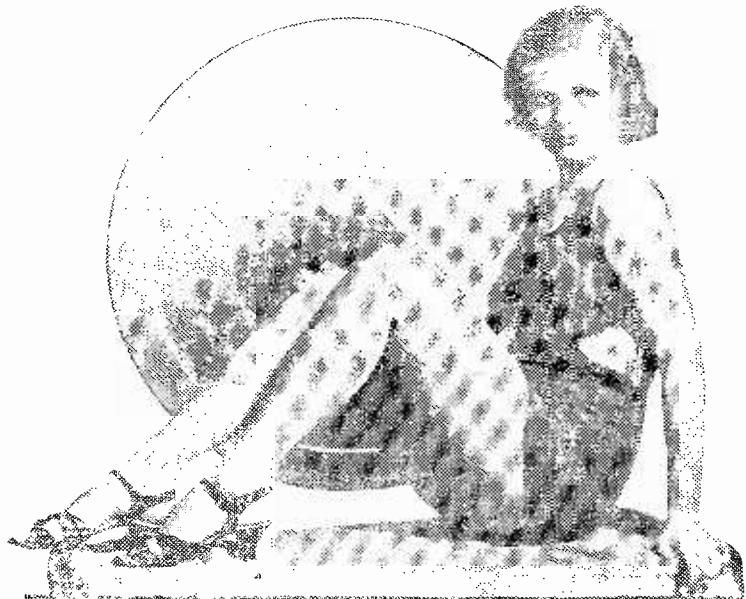
JEAN SARGENT

## WILL THE POLITICIANS LEARN?

This is a presidential year. Already that fact has been thrust on the attention of most citizens. And next month it will be brought home still more forcefully by the two National Conventions.

Between then and November the air will be increasingly crowded with political material. But will the politicians make more effective use of broadcasting in 1932 than they have heretofore? Here is a question of equal moment to radio and those who employ it for vote-getting purposes.

It is violating no confidence to say that, up to now, the politicians have pretty much fumbled the possibilities offered them by radio. Looking back, the 1928 campaign stands out as a "horrible example." In that struggle hundreds of hours of air time were used by the two major parties. But thoughtful listeners agree that an astonishing proportion of it was wasted as far as swaying votes was concerned, merely because candidates and their supporters failed to take account of the peculiar demands of the microphone and the loudspeaker.

If that story is repeated in 1932 it will be a dismal commentary on progress. Worse, it may prove a definite setback to radio. Yet, at the moment, there are few indications that politicians have profited much from their broadcasting experience of 1928.

This is scarcely the place for a detailed discussion of the several problems involved. But, to anyone with an ear to the ground, it is plain enough that 1932 threatens to be a particularly hard year for the broadcasting office-seeker.

Not that there is scant interest in politics. On the contrary, it is because interest is far keener and more critical than usual. Voters are in no mood to be beguiled by the "hokey" and glib generalities which loom like the proverbial sore thumb in the usual campaign speech when heard via the loudspeaker. They are going to be quicker than ever to dial out everything insincere and irrelevant. We pass along that hint, not so much for the benefit of politicians as for the protection of radio.

During the next five months political talks are certain to occupy a large part of station schedules. So it will be unfortunate indeed for radio if much of this material is passed up by intelligent listeners.

## This Business of Broadcasting

In a short period of time broadcasting has spread its blessings in many million homes. Its operation is familiar almost to everybody—even to the babe in arms. The bedtime lullaby, once crooned by a mother, now comes out of Nowhere into the baby's ear.

The broadcasting industry, rated one of the real enterprises in America, is naturally proud of its achievement. It has not by any means attained its peak. At this very moment, scientific men in their laboratories are at work testing and trying out infinite improvements, all of which will be given to the public in the future.

That is the glorious beneficence of American broadcasting. It gives to every man, woman, and child an opportunity to hear the very best contributions of all the arts.

While the mechanical means of transmission is a constant source of study in the laboratories, this is only one phase of radio broadcasting—and a phase, too, that is of little or no moment to those not vitally interested in mechanics. Naturally, everybody wonders about this mystery of the 20th century—but after the first wonderment, few stop save to listen, few look to the beginning of this century when broadcasting was unknown.

The proof that broadcasting is an actual part of life, almost as familiar as breath itself, is evidenced by the unconscious concern with which children accept it. The boy or girl in the home goes to the radio the first thing in the morning, after getting out of bed, and turns on the radio. This alone, an act familiar in almost every home where there are children, is proof, too, of the popularity of a great scientific medium. It has an appeal to every heart, to every intellect. It knows no boundaries, has no limitations, save the limitations of space and, some say, economics—but even that is a moot question. Its boundaries are, to all intents and purposes, limitless. Broadcasting brings with it all the joys to which the human heart and ear could subscribe—from the highest forms of drama to the comedy of the clown.

It would seem, even from a cursory study of this magnetic medium, that broadcasting is a godly gift. It is almost, if not, the only medium that touches all alike, the rich man in his mansion, the beggar in the street, the babe in his cradle, children toddling round the floor, boys and girls in school, the father and mother, grandparents, watching over the welfare of their broods, the professor in academic halls, the bachelor in his club. All that is needed here to enjoy these blessings is the one faculty without which man is imperfect—hearing.

A universal benefit to mankind, broadcasting descended upon the globe almost overnight. In all history there has never been anything else to equal its amazing growth. That the peoples of all nations in the world should take broadcasting for granted is the next startling phase of its existence.

Broadcasting is universal as nothing else is universal—save the stars in the heavens and the firmament itself. It is universal because it can be understood by all ages, and all itself. It is universal because it speaks a universal language, constructed with the mosaics of music—a language that can be heard and appreciated even by those who cannot read or write.

This is the outstanding point in the broadcast—and because of its vast possibilities, all the genius of the world has rallied to its cause.

Broadcasting is the American infant. It is only now learning to crawl in its cradle. All this achievement we have seen, and heard, is—after all—the gurglings at the very beginning

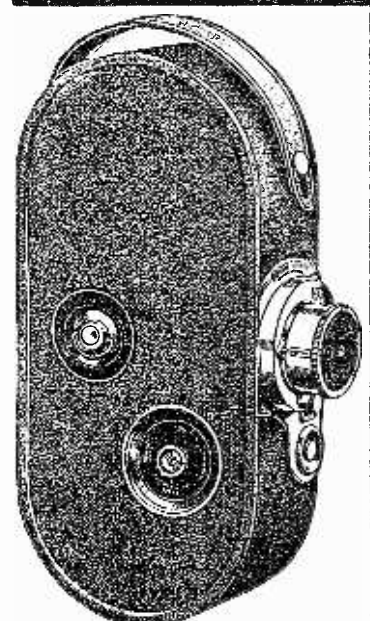

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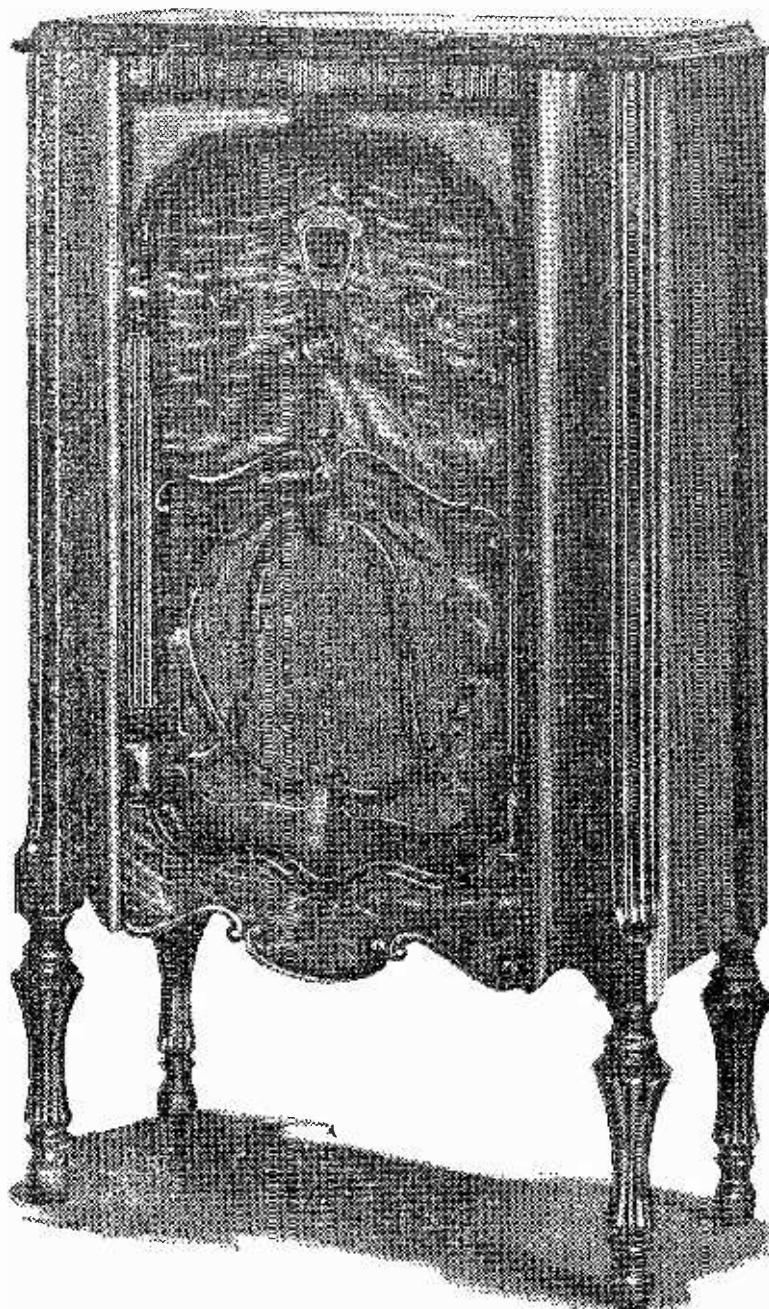
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## WALTER WINCHELL— On BROADWAY

Portrait of Another Young Man Talking to Himself!

I think they're wrong about Broadway. . . . Especially that clear-faced, business-like lass who sidled up to me at Murray's last night. . . . Her straightforward eyes and the pleasing crispness of her Southern accents belied the fact that she had come to drink. . . . You're a Broadway columnist, aren't you?" she started. . . . "You fill a lot of space every day about the wonders of this wonderful street?" . . . And then came the usual bromidic invective one always hears. . . . "You love it, I guess, but to me it's just a lane of phonies. . . . It promises you the world, collects C. O. D., and when you open the package, you find bright-ribboned garbage packed in cellophane. . . . All I've ever seen are pop-corn hutches and fake orange drinks. . . . Paradox. . . . Crawling beggars who change their masks by night and live in Brooklyn pent-houses. . . . Spenders spending other people's money. . . . Play-boys, screeching brakes, and headlines. . . . That's your Broadway, your copy. . . . The street that's making you famous writing about failures. . . . That's the street that brought me to New York and tore me apart. . . . The street that promised me a future as an advertising writer and lured me down a blind alley. . . . That's Broadway? Uhhh!"

I think they're wrong about Broadway! . . . It's not a street of electric bonfires and sky-stretching architecture. . . . Broadway is a tempo; you can find it in mid-Atlantic or on the Arctic ice. . . . The lads and lasses who come here to effect a sudden, complete change in their lives are defeated by their own ignorance. . . . Times Square and the Paramount clock are not mile posts to a grand future. . . . The

glamours of the side-streets and the razzle-dazzle of night-life are not rest rooms on the road to success here any more than they are in a thousand and one hamlets and cities throughout the nation. . . . What you find along Broadway you find in every town in the country. . . . The quantity may be greater, and that's all. . . . But Broadway differs from the rest of the world. . . . Because Broadway has the tempo of the superiority complex. . . . You're not afraid to do what you want to do here. . . . You can express yourself as you wish. . . . Even the girl at Murray's failed to realize that the very fact that she was standing at a bar, addressing a total stranger and not feeling the prongs of small-town convention was a new station in her life. . . . She was talking from her heart. . . . And she had a sympathetic, though not agreeing, listener.

I wonder about that chap who came to Broadway from the Middle West several years ago and got off on the wrong track. . . . He had allotted himself two years to storm the doors of editors and make good as a writer. . . . But he met a dancer in his boarding house and married her four months after his arrival. . . . Then the trouble started. . . . It was hard to get ahead in a strange city, especially when you're not attuned to it. . . . The days became leaner, and the girl he married succumbed to the back-stage temptations of Rolls-Royces and deep-cushioned apartment parties. . . . By the time the baby came, their separation was definite. . . . Then Broadway began to crush him. . . . Every room in the Big City in which he had

spent a happy hour haunted him. . . . Every building that held the memory of a minute of ecstasy loomed exaggeratedly against his narrowing horizon and leaned way over to smash him. . . . Every pathway of Central Park where he had walked in his early romance zig-zagged before his eyes like a dying snake. . . . And wound itself tightly around his throat. . . . The poor wretched fellow was as far from the real Broadway as he was the day he decided to leave his home town. . . . So he thought of suicide. . . . That was natural. . . . And with one of his last dollars he purchased a ticket to the Empire State towers. . . . The leap would mean certain death and it would be all over in a minute.

It takes almost two full minutes for the elevator to carry you to the top, and those two minutes were his worst. . . . When he reached the last landing, he handed the guard his ticket and stepped out to the parapeted balcony. . . . The sun was brilliant and cast a wide panorama below him. . . . He could see for miles up the Hudson, out across the Atlantic, over into the deepest Jersey. . . . Below him the tall buildings were mashed with the rest of the tiny objects of the city. . . . The crooked streets were straight streaks of white that enlivened the fantastic design. . . . No one could be seen on the sidewalks, but he was certain that there were millions of them there. . . . The same men and women who had formed part of his tangled life, his misery. . . .
