THE descriptive part of the by-line for this article was inspired by, or at least plagiarized from FM Guide's Associate Editor, Molly McDevitt (FM Guide, January 1968). I telephoned to explain that although I was recently hospitalized with pneumonia (double dip variety) that I still existed. That phone call resulted in why right now you're thinking, why in hell is Murray the K writing an article for FM Guide?

Recently I wrote an article for the editorial page of the Wall Street Journal and some of the reaction to my comments about the lyrics of Bob Dylan. Janis Ian, Simon and Garfunkel and Phil Ochs was about the same as if

the main speaker at a D.A.R. luncheon turned out to be a colored strip-tease dancer who converted from the High Episcopalian Church and decided to become Jewish. I've come to the conclusion that I'm a very controversial person. People either like me a lot or get uptight just at the mention of my name. Or, like Mr. Wollheim of this magazine said, "Murray the K is not my idea of a groovy person. But WOR is going to be an awfully un-groovy place without him." There are those who think I'm too hip, others think I'm a nice square, failing miserably to be hip, some just regurgitate. I've overcome my sensitivity to those whose preconceived ideas prompt them to think poorly of

me, and I do this by either throwing myself on the floor and flailing it with my legs and fists or employing the more mature way of facing these critiques . . . I cry a lot.

Now, about the late, lamented WOR-FM, I do cry a lot, the crying being more like the pangs one may get when thinking of a lost love or a very dear and close person who has died. WOR-FM became a very personal possession to each of its more than one million liseners. The latest Arbitron ratings now have them at the bottom of the heap. These listeners, the then amazing ratings, and the even more amazing demographic breakdown showed, for ex-

ample, my audience to be composed mostly of the 18-to-34 age group. The show reached a majority of college students, teachers and other professional people, particularly in the arts, some small hippie elements and a majority of the music business, paricularly the artists and writers, were tuned in. To further prove how important the best of contemporary music and musicianship had advanced and how locked into the attitudes of today it had become, this station was then the pet of the avant-garde advertising agencies, the hip and pseudo-hip of Madison Avenue. Because my show amplified what was new and gave voice to the writerperformers, listeners found themselves being stimulated and involved themselves in what was being said, and, in turn, the program. It may have been the music, the ideas from these guests, the unpredictability of what tomorrow's show might feature, or a combination of all these things that made it successful. When the station, after committing themselves to me, personally, that the format and freedom of choice of material would remain the same, and after repeating this commitment to the press and, in turn, our listeners-then had the effrontery to do just the opposite, they made people mad. The press, are still raking them over the coals and the average listener actually felt betrayed. This was, incidentally, the late Brian Epstein's favorite radio station

On the management's side of the ledger, financially and rating wise, the station was doing far and above its highest expectations. In December, just two months after I left, the total billing for the *entire station* was only a quarter of what my own show had previously brought in. So why in heaven's name the change?


Well, to go into the inner workings and politics of the case serves no useful purpose. The consultants, namely the Bill Drake/Chenault outfit, were from California. Flushed with successes in the old teenybopper radio format on the West Coast, they had to earn their big fees by implementing their system here in New York. They were given carte blanche and rode over General Manager and Vice President Robert Smith and Station Manager Bert Lambert as if they did not exist. Since that time Mr. Lambert has been asked to resign, which he did, and Mr. Smith has been removed from any connection with FM and is now just the General Manager of WOR - AM. The Drake/Chenault outfit, as I understand it, is now acting as weekend consultant for radio programming on WOR-AM as well. This was a sad blow to both Smith and Lambert, but practically speaking, Bob Smith had no musically knowledgeable high RKO-General executive to appeal to and therefore could not speak to them about the music. And personally, he still had the WOR-AM setup to protect, which incidentally is the most financially successful operation in radio. Burt Lambert never even had a chance to meet the people Drake brought in, or have knowledge of the firing of the rest of the staff after Rosko and I had left.

Now all the above, as senseless as it seems, is part of the privilege of the free enterprise system, except in one very important area. That area is public commitment. Under the FCC regulations a station which is committed to a type of programming must live up to all of the commitments made. For example, if a station runs a contest on the air, it must provide the prizes for that contest - it must, in short, fulfill the obligations it made to the public on the airwaves. When a station does not commit itself on the air as to what it is going to do as far as programming is concerned, it has every right to change the programming as it sees fit. However, when a particular community is being served with a programming service which turns out to be unique and the station commits itself publicly to continue with this kind of programming service (such as the old WOR-FM format) it is a case in point for the FCC to consider whether this is not, in fact, the same kind of commitment as a commitment for a contest or a commitment to fulfill the number of public service broadcasts the station must carry. This is a point which I hope to carry further, not only with the FCC, but with the new committee set up by President Johnson which is known as the President's Committee on

Public Broadcasting and is headed by Mr. Frank Pace.

As far as my own future is concerned, it does not include radio. I feel that FM had really invaded the large audience that AM had previously monopolized, with the advent of the old WOR-FM format. However, looking over the radio station as it stands now, there is nothing new going on, there is nothing exciting going on, and quite frankly, although I have been offered many opportunities to return to radio. it was always within an existing restricted format structure. I felt that to accept that sort of job in a station after leaving one because my freedom was being curtailed would be a cop-out. Therefore I have decided that until the opportunity arises where I can freely involve myself and the audience with all the music, I will stay in television. I'm currently involved in a TV project, a 26-week one-hour series which will be the visital interpretation of my old format at WOR-FM. There are a lot of unique things about this new show. We'll feature the young writer-performers like Janis Ian, Phil Ochs, Bob Dylan, and so on. Along with what I like to call antagonists - people of the Establishment like William F. Buckley, Jr. and Al Capp. I'm looking forward to this series because it represents a whole new outlook for television, but at the same time I'm not ready to give up on the concept of radio programming introduced by the late, lamented WOR-FM.

I look at WOR-FM as the James Dean of radio — killed at the height of its career and not fully appreciated until it was dead.





AN INTERVIEW WITH THE LATE LAMENTED by Molly McDevitt

I hadn't realized how many preconceptions I'd formed about Murray the K until I actually met him. Somehow, What's Happening, Baby, didn't seem to extend to him. He was too big, for one thing, too national, too accepted to be quite real, more like a very good Hollywood version of Hip. Then too, there were those flashbacks-Murray as the Fifth Beatle, Murray as the teenybopper's idol, and, more recently, Murray, the savant of the Swingin' Soiree on the old WOR-FM. It didn't quite add up. On one hand there is the screaming DJ from WINS-AM who urged a hysterical herd of teenagers on the Beatles when they first arrived at the airport. On the other hand there is the urbane prime mover of the old WOR-FM (Murray always pronounced it as written, WORFM), the man who introduced the wildly controversial record "Society's Child" to indignant New York audiences and included Alabama Governor George Wallace and New York conservative William F. Buckley, Jr. in a series of pungent interviews that also took in such luminaries of the pop scene as Phil Ochs, Simon and Garfunkel, Joan Baez, Tom Paxton, Beatle George Harrison and Beatle Manager Brian Epstein. And so, when WOR-FM was in the vanguard of progressive rock, reaping huzzahs from critics and listeners alike, Murray was still a little

suspect. There seemed to be a suggestion of a credibility gap here; how could this man, the one-time epitome of screaming DJ-ism, turn so quickly into the first adult rock personality? Writing about the demise of WOR in this magazine last November, Bill Wollheim remarked uneasily, "To me, Murray the K has always seemed like a nice square who was failing miserably to be hip. Square that he is, though, he did set the tone of the station with his wide-ranging programming."

It wasn't until I met Murray that I realized how inappropriate this judgment was. A man who could "set the tone" of an admittedly hip station couldn't be entirely out of things himself. But what put off most of the old WOR habitues (and I include myself in this category) was his prior career in the noisy battleground of AM rock and the fact that the man is a phenomenal success. He has made a number of television appearances—the most famous was sponsored by the Federal Government to promote the Job Corps-and is in the process of putting together a series which will run weekly on nationwide TV. Consequently the residents of Tulsa and Tacoma are as familiar with Murray the K as New Yorkers, who traditionally resent sharing their regional folk-heroes with the rest of the country. Murray was already famous when he introduced adult attitudes into pop programming at WOR-FM. For this reason he was automatically suspect. It is hard to reconcile the idea of sincerity with the image of a genuine

Big Deal. And so, when I went to talk to Murray the K (K as in Kaufman) I was ready, even eager, to be put on.

Needless to say, Murray in the flesh was nothing like I'd expected. For one thing he wasn't wearing any image at all. He loped abruptly into the drawing room of his West End Avenue apartment where I was waiting, swatted at the three poodles who were nibbling at my ankles and flopped onto the sofa. "I'm pretty well into the article," he reported, fishing out a cigarette for me. "I'm going to call it 'The late, Lamented WOR-FM.' I think the epitaph fits them better than it does me."

And as we sat among the bric-a-brac, guilelessly scattering ashes over the pink carpet, I began to realize that what was lost when WOR-FM became a part of the Drake empire was Murray's own attitude towards the music. Surprisingly enough, he is a very serious man. When he talks about Simon and Garfunkel or Phil Ochs he makes it clear that he is talking not only about popular songwriters but about social critics as well. There has been a lot of talk lately about the seriousness of this new music, but Murray was the first disc-jockey to treat it seriously, not out of some sort of commercial sixth sense (although the station enjoyed a huge financial success) but because pop music had finally come of age. It was beginning to relate to all the ambiguities and contradictions of reality, rather than just to the growing pains of adolescent awareness,

and Murray caught this and took it as the signal to abandon his pose as chief post-teenybopper. A lot of people were right behind him, but it was Murray who recognized that the new rock audience lay in the 18-to-35 age bracket. And it was Murray who created the image of WOR-FM as the first adult rock station by letting the sound relate to him as an adult.

"It's a strange thing, what happened to WOR-FM" he muses. "This is the first time that a success story ended in the death of a radio station. But it was a great experience and one that I'll never regret because it helped me change my own image as somebody who could only reach teenagers. Of course, that Fifth Beatle tag didn't help either, except that as the Beatles matured, I matured. I was able to move with the music, and I no longer felt uncomfortable the way I had in my last year as a teenybopper king at WINS. I mean, I knew that kind of hysterical adulation had to end sometime. I was getting into a very bad psychological thing, too. It distressed me because I was looking for a new direction and

my position was getting unbearably false."

The new direction emerged in the late summer of 1966. The executives of RKO-General were looking for a popular format for their FM outlet which would complement but not compete with their fantastically successful WOR-AM. Their decision finally was to siphon some of the current rock talent off the AM scene and to build an identifiable station personality on these names. Murray the K headed the list, which also included Johnny Michaels in the morning, Scott Muni in the afternoon, and Bill Mercer, known to a sizable cult as Rosko, for the late-night slot. For the first two months of operation in this format WOR-FM was embroiled in contract disputes and the personalities were only heard on taped segments interspersed between the selections. But Murray's influence was already permeating the programming and world was getting around that here was a station that was not afraid to experiment. Hard-core rock enthusiasts who had already outgrown the condescension of the teen-oriented AM stations seized upon WOR-FM as a welcome alternative to the middle-of-the-road syrup that had formerly been offered by the industry as "adult pop." Among the songs which WOR-FM aired were Bob Dylan cuts like "Desolation Row," and "Maggie's Farm," "Sad-Eyed Lady of the Low Lands," which had always been judged too long for commercial radio, although many fans suspected that their subject matter had a lot more to do with their conspicuous absence from the airwaves. A fifteen-year-old girl named Janis Ian wrote a song dealing with the sticky subject of a white girl who dates a Negro boy. Murray introduced that number and continued playing it in the face of a hostility that was a little surprising from sophisticated New Yorkers. Simon and Garfunkel added a skeptical note to the Christmas season by doing "Silent Night" over a real news broadcast. As the announcer dispassionately noted the Viet Nam casualties, riots, and demonstrations for the day the duo sang optimistically, " . . . sleep in heavenly peace." Murray played the record, decided it was a point well taken, and went on playing it.

"What most people still don't realize about the new music is that it's terribly serious," he observes, patting one of the poodles absently. "I mean, more serious than popular music has ever been. What my show did was to give an opportunity to those writers and performers who don't protest but rather question the ambiguities of the moral and social codes, of religion, who have a new attitude towards love and marriage. And since they have this immediate rapport with a mass audience, we can conclude that what they're saying is not so much a new idea as much as it is reflecting the attitudes that already exist today.

"I began to get hip to where rock was going in my last years on WINS. As early as 1965 I'd thought of buying a station of my own because of my ideas about the programming service today's community should have. At that time there didn't seem to be much hope for any treatment of rock other

than the screaming, adolescent WMCA variety. I don't think a broadcasting license should be a license to steal. And I knew there was a crying need for some sort of format that could handle all sorts of diverse sounds-like Joan Baez and the Beatles and Buffy Saint-Marie and even Ravi Shankar. They're all part of what's happening now. I'd even thought of setting up a pirate radio station." He smiles engagingly. "I'm not all that adventurous any more, or anyway it's all channeled into other things, but in case anybody's interested . . . " He lights a cigarette and settles back. It is obviously a subject he has researched carefully. "First you get a ship and fit it out with all your broadcasting equipment. Then you make a deal with a country that doesn't have a communication treaty with the United States, to fly their flag. Then you just lie twelve miles off the coast of New York and beam in fifty or a hundred thousand watts, just as long as you're not interfering with any other signal. Not," he assures me, "that I'd be the one to do it. But I might be interested in broadcasting over a station like that.

"I feel very deeply about radio," he adds. " I could go back to radio if I had the kind of setup that allowed for freedom and involvement, but I think that FM lost its impetus in the popular, contemporary music field when WOR-FM copped out on its public commitment and its commitment to me. When I talked with Bill Drake he assured me that there would be no major changes in programming policy. I had intended to leave in August but instead I decided to stay on and my contract was extended. And then came this, 'well, you shouldn't play this Bob Dylan and you shouldn't play this Richie Havens and this cut is too long . . . ' and all the rest of that insane, moronic kind of thinking. And since our audience was comprised mainly of over-18-year-olds who have the mentality to know better, I felt I'd be doing myself a disservice if I went along with this sort of crap. So I left. I have to admit, it kind of shook me up. I was mad but I was also very depressed. It was such a phony, hypocritical thing, the way Drake was saying one thing and doing another." He stubs out a cigarette fiercely. "So, I don't know, right now I'm looking into television."

He cheers up as he begins to talk about his upcoming series. He sees it as an arena where the composers and performers of today's popular music will confront the Establishment—represented on the first program by veteran radio personality Tex McCrary and comedian Henry Morgan. To keep things moving he has brought in a truly formidable gimmick, the Cop-Out Button. "Any time somebody contradicts himself on the air I press this button and a light flashes 'Cop-Out! Cop-Out! Cop-Out! Cop-Out! Then, if they deny they said it I have a Cop-Out Instant Reply where a tape plays back exactly what was said at that moment. It should keep things from getting dull."

If the show succeeds it will be something entirely new for television. I asked Murray if he anticipates any trouble from the network. He is hesitant; the series already has a sponsor and will be sold as a package, but he is still not sure about TV's ultimate flexibility.

"Radio is really my bag," he admits. "But having been as ill as I was, I've changed my attitude a little. I've got to do the things that matter to me. And now that radio has gone back to being a screaming, adolescent kind of thing it's so far removed that it's like going back to the days of the Zoot Suit. It's so old-timey, false, superficial, shallow that any person doing it has either become immune or has developed deep psychological problems. As a performer maybe I could do it, but not as myself."

He sighs wistfully. "I've had a number of offers, of course. You don't just drop out of the picture when you leave a place where you've been successful. But nothing I'd really feel comfortable doing.

"I'm going to be patient and wait until such time as some new programming manager has the guts to apply the old, successful WOR-FM's principles."
