

HARRY E. MAYNARD, Host CLAUDE HALL, Radio and TV Editor of Billboard Magazine;

JACK MAHER, Advertising Manager for RCA Records;

NAT ASCH, Formerly Program Director of WNEW-FM and is now Vice President and General Manager of KMET-FM (Los Angeles, California)

MAYNARD: This will be an historic broadcast. For the first half of our program we're going to talk about the impact of stereo FM on the record industry. In the second half, the last 25 minutes of the program, we're going to broadcast for the first time in the history of radio the first 4 channel stereo compatible records. You, the listener, will hear these records in normal stereo. The point of this demonstration is to let you know that if you did buy a 4 channel stereo record with 4 channel information encoded on it, you could hear perfectly good two channel sound which can be played on your regular record system with your regular cartridge. Of course, to hear it in 4 channel you would need another amplifier plus the Scheiber decoder which will go between your preamplifier and another stereo amplifier plus two more speakers in the rear of the room. 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to emphasize this point: The virtue of a system such as Peter Scheiber's is that it does not obsolete any current record playing or FM stereo equipment that is already in the consumer homes (EDITOR'S NOTE: This amounts to two billion dollars). If and when you wanted to have 4 channel stereo, (if this system is commercially adopted) you could just add to this device. Well, gentlemen, to go on, "What is the impact of stereo FM on the record industry?'

Before you answer my question, let me read you something from the April issue of FM Guide. It may set the stage for our discussion this evening. "The record industry declares that stereo FM radio is the single biggest influence on stereo boomed up record sales. Twothirds of American homes now have record players. Once the listener discovered the superior virtues of stereo sound on records he then wanted it on his radio receiver. Only stereo FM radio can give the listener high quality stereo on radio. Listeners to stereo records now audition their records first on stereo FM radio, then make a commitment to buy them. Very few record companies now make monaural records and very few retail outlets now have listening booths. Stereo FM radio now serves the same role as the many listening booths of the old time record shops. Stereo FM radio presells the record buyer so now the record buyer shops for price after having decided what to buy. This explains the success of the discount record stores, the record and tape clubs."

Nat Asch, as a very successful FM radio programmer, do you agree with that statement?

ASCH: There is just no question about it. And further, I think Claude can back me up. Let me quote from BILLBOARD Magazine. "FM radio has in fact influenced the record industry fundamentally and changed its direction." I predicate my statement on these figures. In 1967-3 years ago when we startedprogressive rock on WNEW-FM, less than 5% of the top 100 albums in BILL-BOARD Magazine was product that we were able to play. That included such overwhelming favorites, even at that time, as The Stones and The Beatles. They comprised the less than 5%. Today, right now-or I should say a few months agomore than 65% of the records in BILL-BOARD's top 100 albums are records that we play. It is my contention that the record industry, having recognized what an impact stereo FM radio had on the buying public, changed its direction. The record industry has enlarged its recording perspective and embraced progressive

HALL: There are probably a lot of reasons for this besides the great impact of FM itself. One is that AM in playing the top 40 hits began going after demo-

graphics. They wanted the 18 year to 35 year person, adult. During the mid-day part, they wanted to get the housewife. MAYNARD: With talk shows you mean? HALL: With talk shows and with playing Frank Sinatra and other mass programming.

MAYNARD: But the number one AM station in New York is WOR-AM, correct?

HALL: No. WABC. WABC-AM is number one. It is listened to by more people than any other radio station in the nation. (EDITOR'S NOTE: According to ARB, October/November '69-1/4 hour, adults at any given time Monday through Sunday between 6:00 AM and midnight-the ratings are: WOR-AM-306,200; WABC-AM -198,400; WNEW-AM-155,100; followed by WIN's 124,600 and WCBS-AM.) HALL: The scene is that the AM stations are playing the "top 40's"; they began going after demographics which doesn't sell records. They don't care about selling records, they began softening their sound. So that the young people who wanted a more interesting record had to go to FM radio. They had no other alternative.

MAYNARD: I agree with them. Who wants to listen to a record at 5,000 cps cycles and monaural at that. AM's sound is inadequate in frequency response as well as offering no directional information which is even more important than frequency range to the average person-according to the Psvcho-Acousticians.

MAHER: I believe the person who listens to AM is looking for a particular tune. He is looking for a particular song or a particular artist. He is what we in the industry call a "singles" buyer. I think what has happened to AM radio is that "in the top 40 programming the age of the listener has gone down." In other words pre-high school to the sophomore year in high school-this person buys basically singles not albums. What FM has done is to open for record manufacturers-such as RCA where I work, new avenues to expose products. The FM listener, particularly the young FM listener, is an album buyer. The AM listener is a youngster and he is basically a singles buyer.

ASCH: I disagree with that, Jack. This is a traditional viewpoint that has always been held by record companies and I refute it...by actual experience that we have had at WNEW-FM. In April 1968 (I have brought the evidence with me because I use this evidence as a sales tool) Elektra Records released The Doors on a single called "The Unknown Soldier." Our station was the only station in the entire New York market, AM or FM, that played this record.

MAHER: Because of the type of product?

ASCH: In ten days we received a letter from Jack Holtzman which was printed incidentally in BILLBOARD Magazine.

Want me to read it?

HALL: I think I wrote the story.

ASCH: The gist of the letter is-because of the play on WNEW-FM the only station that would play it-they moved 35,000 copies of that single in ten days. HALL: This happened when AM began backing off of exciting music in order to appeal to certain demographic age groups and go for total numbers. The record artists began turning out softer records and this included a lot of supposedly rock stars, right? Like The Supremes, who are now an easy listening adult group, not a teen age group. And so, the stereo FM stations stepped into this gap and began playing the more exciting groups, like The Iron Butterfly and The Beatles. There is a lot of Beatles stuff that has never been played on an AM station.

MAYNARD: You told me about a record that FM helped boomed up to 2 million sales, Claude—that certainly indicates the impact of FM on the record business.

HALL: Another example, one station here in New York, an FM station played one record. It was by the Thirteenth Floor Elevator and it was never played anywhere else except on FM.

MAHER: Now that is what I'm talking about. In New York Elektra had to program on FM; it had no place except on your station to play that record. The AM station, WABC and what is left of WMCA's musical programming have such tight play lists—they won't even play new records.

HALL: The Doors for example, to use the same example, are now being played on many stations everywhere as well.

MAHER: Of course. What I'm saying is this—The Doors are basically an album act. I mean in terms of overall sales. Do you agree?

HALL: These AM stations had to do this—they were forced into it because they began losing the teenagers. These teenagers and young adults were not watching television at night and their...

ASCH: Their ratings were dropping, dramatically.

HALL: Their ratings were dropping, so they began adding the Iron Butterfly and these harder rock records and they began coming back up. This has been proven in other markets.

MAHER: I understand there is one station in New York, maybe Nat Asch can be even more illuminating on this. There is one station in New York which is considering going progressive AM—have you heard that?

ASCH: "Drake" is a program consultant—so far as I know, he did not devise any of these programming techniques. He just polished and refined them. One is a heavy use of "oldies" records. These are supposedly all million record sellers. They've got a proven popularity value. He started playing these—he eliminated anything that was of doubtful popularity and this

includes new records. He seldom plays new records. They play the top 5, top 10, top 15 out of the charts. His automatic success is a factor in the records and music sales. He eliminated the talk among the disc jockeys. A disc jockey had 10 seconds to say everything he is going to say and he has got to say that over the music. All programming is very, very tight production. The disc jockeys, incidentally, all sound alike. It is not the personality of the disc jockey that comes out as much as the total sound. The concept is the personality of the station. Drake creates a whole concept of programming. This approach is his success factor.

MAYNARD: It has turned WOR-FM into the number one rated FM station in total audience in the nation. (EDITOR'S NOTE: WRFM is now the top FM station in the nation.)

HALL: Personally, I find WOR-FM tedious after a while (I'm not saying this because Nat Asch is here), to listen to that kind of station. I've heard all those records before, but the young people of today haven't heard some of these groups and so they find them interesting and the station continues to build and build... MAHER: That's my basic point. WOR-FM is an FM version of what I described as an AM station. In other words the station plays the same "forty hits" as you'll find on AM.

ASCH: It is not my purpose to demean or to diminish WOR-FM because I agree with all of you; WOR-FM is an extremely "good sounding" radio station. It is however, not for me. This is an intensely personal response to WOR-FM. I find it is not an extremely creative sounding station. They play a very tight play list.

HALL: WNEW-FM is an exciting station. You never know what is going to happen next in music or in anything else. There is no limitation on the length of the cut. They let things happen; the disc jockeys are allowed to be creative. If they decide to blast against Vietnam—boy they go right into it.

MAHER: The record industry wants sales impact. I don't think any other station in New York has the impact of WNEW-FM on album sales. It also has an influence in single sales. It starts a record and I guess that WABC-AM then picks it up as the sales reach maybe 30,000 or so on. WOR-FM keeps building its audience. I would think that where Nat is building his ratings is by gathering audiences from AM stations.

HALL: I would too. I don't think WOR-FM has one of the sharpest program directors I ever met in my life. His name is Sebastian Stone. He is a brain. He works 24 hours a day. He wakes up at 3:00 a.m. to listen to a station and if his jock makes a mistake or misplaces one work in front of another, he knows about it the next day. That station is for a total broad base audience. They are trying to get every-

body they can. Whereas I think a progressive rock station appeals to a more intelligent type of listener, if you're talking I.O.'s.

MAHER: Claude mentioned sales impact on the record industry. I'm in advertising. I don't mean to demean any FM station. I'm trying to point out that the AM audience listens to the same record over and over again. We like stereo FM because we want to sell records.

MAYNARD: You want to sell new records.

MAHER: Right. Exactly. Now we're getting to the point.

HALL: That is a good point.

MAHER: We know that WNEW-FM audience's like new records. We know that if we can devise some kind of a different spot and we can buy time on WNEW-FM and get the audience to listen because it is a listening audience.

HALL: And FM listeners are buyers of records—they're loyal. The people who listen to WNEW-FM do not tune from one station to another. For one thing they don't have any other place to go. They can find only their kind of music on this one station.

MAYNARD: How would you describe WCBS-FM's current format?

HALL: Right now I would say it is still in the building stage.

MAYNARD: What would you say their programming aim was?

HALL: Well, it is to take album cuts and play them as if they were single records. And these are not necessarily progressive rock. But they take good album cuts and these—don't necessarily have to have any record sales factor involved.

MAYNARD: What would you say WABC-FM's programming is?

HALL: Well, they're changing. They're in a state of revampment right now. They just hired a BILLBOARD man—but they're trying to program harder rock. In the past they were very soft-thinking, trying not to upset anybody's ideas on music. And as a result they hurt themselves. You can't be all things to all people. Not in this day and age.

HALL: Not in this town.

ASCH: A town with more distractions than any other town in the world.

HALL: And you simply cannot attempt to please everyone. The one thing that impresses me most about WNEW-FM to be truthful, is this loyalty that listeners have. I get letters from fans and telephone calls from hit-fans about this station.

MAYNARD: The hi-fi dealers tell me that the young adults—the younger generation—represent the fastest growing market for hi-fi in the world and that they're far more knowledgeable about hi-fi equipment than their parents were. How big a market is the young adult market?

ASCH: Well, I don't know the exact figures. But I know that either 50% or

more of the entire population in this country is 25 or under. That is an extraordinary figure. I presume by 1980 it will be 60%—I don't know the projection. But I do know that with a group as large as that—and its vast majority having rejected a great many of the traditional aspects of living. They have rejected out-of-hand anything they construe as establishment sources. There is just no question that the new music plays a very important role in dictating their course of action and their tastes.

MAYNARD: And selling FM radios.

ASCH: The radio industry has responded by advertising radios—no longer as AM-FM radios, but FM-AM radios. The FM now takes precedence in their advertising. HALL: Down in Alabama one little FM station went on the air and they got all the dealers in town to agree not to handle just AM radios. Any radio they stock in their stores in that town must be FM-AM radios.

MAYNARD: If we get the all channel bill passed, that type of action won't be necessary. Jack, you work for RCA records—very few record companies now make a monaural record. I would think this would be a handicap for AM radio. If a person wants to hear how the record, as it will sound in his home, before he buys it, he has got to hear it on stereo FM. He can't hear it on AM in stereo as AM radio is not capable of playing it in stereo. He can't hear the record on AM radio as it is going to sound when he gets it home.

MAHER: I'll elaborate even more on this. Most AM stations don't even have stereo equipment to play the records to begin with. There was a compatible disc that came out about 2 years ago. Some record companies are using it. Some people aren't using it. Some companies make special monaural singles just for the AM station. We just ship the regular stereo singles to them and let them worry about it.

HALL: On some mono records today, they cut off the highs and lows. These records have a sound which is especially created just for a monaural record. And so, you don't even get all the sound that was originally recorded even if you wanted to.


ASCH: Ideally, of course, everyone who has an FM set should therefore have a fine system setup—a two speaker setup—one that is capable of reproducing in stereo what was produced in stereo.

ASCH: But the fact of the matter is that the vast majority of people that listen to radios today have radios that are quite inferior to the product played on radio. Perhaps this is why the young represent such a huge and growing market for hi-fi products.


HALL: Of course, a small transistor radio doesn't reproduce any better-FM stereo any better than they do AM mono.

MAYNARD: That leads to an interesting



From all listener phone and mail response, it seems we've bridged the gap between pop and the hard rock style of music.

As Program Director of WCBS/FM, all I've tried to do is compile the best music available for the young adult. This means finding the best written, arranged, and produced recordings which personifies mature quality rock.

What has happened within the past two years, however, is that many different styles of music have come under the rock classification. Jazz infusions, soft melodies, country twangs, and uptempo guitar and drum kickers all come under the title of rock. Basically, WCBS/FM is playing the best of all these areas for the people who grew up with rock and roll, but who can't stand the way it is being presented in other radio formats.

I asked my staff to give me a short resume of their personal tastes in music. The following will give you some insight as to their personal tastes.

BOB "WIZARD" WAYNE. 5:30 am-9:30 am.

"Webster says that music is the science of combining tones into a composition having structure and continuity." The right combination is the perfect music to start the day. One must only listen for it. A splash of B.J. Thomas, Glenn Campbell, and Dionne Warwick; a drop or two of Chicago, Blood Sweat & Tears; a portion of Harpers Bizarre and the Association; for seasoning, some Judy Collins and Jose Feliciano—even a hint of Johnny Cash. Mix gently with an aware rap, and—lo and behold, it's there! The perfect radio music for the contemporary early-rising typical young New Yorker.

Yes, Mr. Webster, music is the art of combining tones into a composition having structure and continuity—and I love doing it. It's my life. It's just too bad I have to get up so damned early."

BILL BROWN. 9:30 am-1:30 pm.

I hate "acid rock" or so-called "music" that amounts to nothing more than over-amplified sound designed to muddle the senses. I enjoy good, uncom-

plicated, purposeful music; i.e., the Fifth Dimension, Crosby, Stills, Nash & Young, Jose Feliciano, and one of my favorite groups, 10 Years After. They just don't make a bad song. Another of the best "get-togethers" in the business is the Chicago Transit Authority—not only are they good singers, they are excellent musicians.

Lyrics have become just as, if not more, important, than the music; but I just don't like to listen to a song and then wonder what it was all about.

STEVE O'SHEA. 1:30 pm-5:30 pm.

While I was appearing as a guest on a college radio station recently, I was asked which three songs best typified what I wanted to say with my afternoon radio show on WCBS/FM. I chose a Bob Dylan, a Crosby, Stills, Nash & Young, and a Beatle cut.

Dylan and many other serious songpoets are laying down lyrics that help the listener through his changes. That is, the lyrics help the listener understand himself. Crosby, Stills, Nash & Young do the same thing, packaged in the softest, most musically perfect songs. I must include the Beatles for their great ability to create new musical concepts with each song.

I try to plan my show with music that will reflect man's universal experiences. And I hope to provide additional comments that will help my listener through "them changes."

My favorites would have to include Buffalo Springfield, Eric Anderson, Judy Collins, the Lovin' Spoonful, the Bee Gees, and the Stones.


BOB "BOBALOO" LEWIS. 5:30 pm-9:30 pm.

I consider myself an intellectual. The thing that has brought me closer than ever before to pop music is Lennon's and Dylan's lyrics. For the first time, I found music saying something meaningful about the world. There are all kinds of ways to say it—I just think they say it best. I like very heavy hard rock, like King Crimson, the James Gang, and Hendrix. The Supremes even have something to say.

This synthesis of gut and head music that makes you move and think at the same time is the ultimate music, as far as I'm concerned. The perfect example is the record by Hendrix, "If Six Was Nine."

STEVE CLARK. 9:30 pm-1:30 am.

Like the song, "I Dig Rock n' Roll Music"—I freak for all popular music which has been produced within the past fifteen years. From the Alan Freed days to the 1970's...country...soul...electric rock...rock rock...country rock...soul rock...soul country...electric soul...call it what you will, it's all good, it's all rock n' roll. And to me, it all sounds great!

SOUNDINGS THE MAYNARD REPORT

A newsletter devoted to FM, HI-FI and the sound business

CBS has a new study, The Bruskin Study which reports, "more than three-quarters of all adults in the United States earning \$10,000 or more per year are FM listeners. While the majority of listeners are between the ages of 18 and 54, the 18-24 group accounts for more frequent FM listening: 28.4% more than any other. The 25-34 and 45-54 age groups each account for 27.7% of frequent FM listening."

Youth has made Stereo FM their medium. This accounts for the fantastic ratings of such stations in the greater New York area, as WOR-FM and WNEW-FM. And other stations such as WCBS-FM and WABC-FM catering to the youth with various formats of contemporary music.

AUDIO TIMES, a leading trade paper reports, "The NOW generation has arrived on the component scene." That's the word from two of the nation's most important audio buyers, David Rothfeld of E.J. Korvette and Lafavette Radio's Harold Weinberg. "They have the money and they buy-they're not after just bargains or a portable phonograph to play music on. They know what's good in equipment and they have the money to afford it. As a result, the packaged systems zoomed, while those on compacts dropped." Rothfeld feels that the under 25's don't settle for anything less than their main goal; they extend themselves to buy the unit they want, rather than buying something a little cheaper. "They'll save up for it, or earn extra money, or ask their parents for a little more." The merchandising experts note that the younger customers don't have the same overhead as more traditional customers. Most don't pay rent, or cover the cost of living (although some pay board and buy at least some of their own clothes). The result is more discretionary dollars to spend on luxuries like high fidelity components.

Both Rothfeld and Weinberg find these new shoppers more sophisticated than their parents: "You don't have to spend a lot of time explaining what components are or how they operate. So you can use that time selling." Rothfeld finds the younger customers are presold when they come into the store. "They know exactly what they want. They discuss equipment among themselves, and they know exactly what the critics (consensus) have had to say about a particular receiver or compact."

Both agree that the exact percentage of the under 25 is hard to estimate but both agree that it's an important growing segment of the audio market. "It's where tomorrow's customers are coming from, the area most likely to expand."

Here is how AUDIO TIMES breaks down the audio sales for 1969. "The biggest percentage gain was made by stereo headphones in 1969."

Electronics World points out, "many FM stations, when car-radio FM got so popular, added vertical polarization. This was at some expense because it required a change in transmitting antenna, it helped reception distance in automobiles making a great improvement for car-bound listeners to Stereo FM. But vertical polarization can soon end. What should have been done long ago has been done this year. Auto antennas are at last horizontally polarized. New General Motors cars have a tiny wire dipole embedded in the windshield class. The dipole watches the FM input better than any whip antenna of the past. It does an okay job for FM.—Although a few owners report they can't hear AM stations quite as far away. Insurance companies approve this denial of one more temptation to walk-by vandals: there's nothing about this new antenna they can break off!"

THE HALSTEAD-FELDMAN SYSTEM will probably be next to be demonstrated. This system will require extra transmitter equipment and an adapter for current FM receivers, and of course, another two-channel stereo amplifier and two rear speakers. Extensive tests on adapters by Leonard Feldman and laboratory simulations of actual broadcasts by Gates and Feldman, are now going on to meet FCC's requirements before FCC will approve experimental broadcasts. Tests look good. If FCC approves these experimental broadcasts, they could take place in late spring.

As our readers may remember, the first true quadraphonic broadcast was done on my program, MEN OF HI-FI, WNYC-FM (93.9) together with WKCR-FM (89.1) last October and November.

In Boston, the first dual-cast (two stations collaborating) was done, but only the front half of the orchestra hall was recorded and transmitted which was a good first step. These are the first steps to give the public a look-"hear" at what I know will be a myriad of four-channel systems proposed and tested.

The race is on-let the best system win!

question. What percentage of the FM radio audience is listening monophonically? And what percent are listening stereophonically?

ASCH: God, I have no idea.

MAYNARD: I saw a figure about 50% of the total FM listening is currently monophonic.

ASCH: I can only respond in terms of feeling. Knowing or trying as desperately as we do to know our audience, I have the feeling that your figure is extremely high. It is my feeling that more people—by an overwhelming majority currently listen to FM radio either on small transistor radios or on little kitchen radios for want of something else.

HALL: I know that there were more FM transistor radios sold in this town in a shorter period of time when WOR-FM had Murray the K on in the early days before WNEW went progressive rock. Murray the K sold a lot of those small FM transistor radios.

MAYNARD: Recently the Electrical Musical Industry put out a study stating that for the first time in the history of radio that radio sales are currently the highest they have ever been, and for the first time in history FM radios outsold AM radios.

HALL: It doesn't surprise me. I think FM is the future of radio. You know why? There are some factors involved that don't have a thing to do with the sound of the station. One is that in many markets they have only daytime AM radio stations. Well, this hurts a radio station's audience. When AM stations go off the air people go someplace else to listen to radio. With FM you don't have to go off the air at night.

MAYNARD: You want to explain that to our audience?

HALL: Well, an FM signal travels in a straight line and after it reaches the curve of the earth it just falls off into outer space—somewhere towards Mars. Maybe they're listening in on Mars. A typical FM station has about 50 miles radius. Unless it is up on the Empire State Building.

MAYNARD: Jack Maher, how about summing up what you think: In the light of what we've said this evening, "What is the impact of stereo FM on the record industry?"

MAHER: FM as a medium of broadcasting has opened up promotion possibilities for record sales not available three years ago. The new programming concepts in FM, the better sound of FM have both contributed enormously to the type of product that we're now producing and the type that we will produce in the future. In other words we can now make almost any kind of record—by almost any kind of an artist and have the hope of getting it played or at least having someplace where we can explore it's potential sales through advertising and playing the records on FM radio.

HALL: This is because advertising rates on FM are still lower than AM. That is not always going to be the case.

ASCH: You bet!

MAYNARD: You mean FM audiences are exploding? WRFM is a typical example of a middle-of-the-roader station which has just knocked WNBC-AM out of the top ten radio stations in the New York area; out of a total of 79 AM/FM stations. HALL: I agree.

ASCH: Well, Harry to further butress your point, I'm advised by our research people that on the weekends, Saturday and Sundays, WNEW-FM has a 14 share which is higher than ABC-AM.

MAYNARD: Well, I have heard that WNEW-FM has a bigger audience on weekends than WNEW-AM. Is that true? ASCH: Well, that goes without saying. They are now competitors.

HALL: Since you're going to KMET-FM

anyway, it doesn't matter.

You've got to take into consideration nearly all records are stereo today and to play these and to listen to them on a mono AM station is going to be done less and less in days to come. You have all kinds of formats developing on FM. From country music to soul. In the south and southwest, country music stereo FM stations are coming on like Gangbusters. Same in Indianapolis. An FM stereo soul station knocked off an AM soul station out there.

ASCH: Well, of course, it's necessary development—the record companies simply must recognize this change and accept it. When we started three years ago much more product was still being produced monaurally than stereophonically... MAHER: Not anymore!

ASCH: Our license precludes our playing anything monaural for more than five minutes. So that even if our choice was between monaural record or stereo record, by necessity we have had to drop the playing of the monaural records.

MAYNARD: Gentlemen, I want to thank you very much for telling us about the impact of stereo FM on the record industry. Stay around ladies and gentlemen for the second half of this program because what I consider—at least sonically—will make the comparison between AM and FM even more envidious is about to happen. Shortly we will play 4 channel stereo compatible records. In the second half of this program, the last 25 minutes we're going to broadcast the first 4 channel stereo record in the history of broadcasting.

EDITORS NOTE: The broadcast was a success; many listeners reported that the stereo signal they received was good or even better than they regularly receive on stereo FM stations.

The program was received and decoded in New York at Fisher Radio and the report is that it was excellent four channel sound. The program was also tape recorded off the air with conventional stereo tape recorder and stereo FM receiver; this was decoded into excellent 4 channel stereo. WNYC-FM played records that were cut with a conventional cutter and were played on a conventional record player with typical stereo cartridge.

Here is an explanation of the Scheiber Method by Peter Scheiber, the inventor.

The Scheiber system is the first compatible four channel stereo system that has been practically demonstrated with all forms of recorded material as well as receiving 4 channel stereo broadcasts off a conventional FM transmitter. WNYC-FM followed this broadcast done on March 15th with another broadcast done on March 16th 2:30 to 3:30 P.M. with approval of the F.C.C.

Four channel records and four channel prerecorded tapes have been made that can be played with current stereo record players and cartridges and tapes have been made that can be played on any currently manufactured stereo tape players.

How does the Scheiber system work? The system uses a single decoder to recover the original four channels from tape, disc, or FM stereo receiver.

The consumer can buy when commercially available, Scheiber incoded records or tapes and hear conventional high quality stereo before he buys the Scheiber decoder.

With the addition of the Scheiber decoder, an added Stereo Amplifier and two more speakers he will then hear four channel stereo, in their four channel form.

Currently, American consumers who have bought several billion dollars worth of stereo hi fi equipment can adopt the Scheiber compatible system and will not have to worry about their systems becoming obsolete. This includes millions of dollars worth—manufacturer and distribution, dealer inventory.

Up until the Scheiber system the traditional method of achieving the added realisms of multi-channel stereo was to use more space in the recording medium, i.e. putting four separate tracks of recorded material on a ¼ inch tape thereby cutting playing time in half, or by using ultra-sonic which made the multi-stereo materially impossible to play conventional equipment.

The Scheiber system in contrast with most methods, maximizes the efficiency in using the space already available within the two currently used stereo channels and thus makes the Scheiber system compatible with any existing equipment.
