Radio's Booming

Back in the '50s when television swept across the country like a gigantic wildfire, a lot of "experts" predicted it would be the end of radio.

These were people with the same mind-set who predicted the end of movie theaters when radio first came into being— and the end of network TV when cable first began to flourish.

Fuest Comment

Radio — the pioneer of broadcast information and entertainment — didn't die at all. Instead, it transformed itself and became bigger and better than ever.

Today, there are more U.S. radio stations than ever before: about 11,000. And they've been rediscovered only recently by advertisers who are investing more in radio than ever before. As a matter of fact, radio ad revenues nearly tripled between 1980 and 1992.

This year, radio will see a record \$9 billion in advertising. Major companies selling cars, credit cards, food and beverages, etc. are putting all this money into radio for a simple rea-

son: It's really working well for them. Here are a few simple reasons why: Radio is everywhere. The average home has more than five. Almost all cars have them. More than six out of every 10 workplaces have them. People jog with them, take them to their favorite recreation spots and even shower with their radios.

People listen. Better than 97 percent of everybody listens to the radio; and, on the average day, we spend a little more than three hours tuned in to music, talk shows or news. We can listen to stations programming English, Spanish, Asian and a wide variety of European languages. And, as quite a few studies affirm, the more income and education we have, the more we

> listen to radio. If you're typical, you prefer to listen to three to four favorite stations, and you tune them in according to your mood. You've got quite a variety of formats to choose from in talk and news, and you can select any one of 18 music formats.

Radio plans to go along for the ride as the "information highway" develops into reality. New formats will be invented as public tastes change.

"Radio is like an alley cat with nine lives," said Larry Rosin, vice president of Bolton Research in Philadelphia. "It's a survivor. You can't ever kill it."

The station carried TALK NET programs; and I especially miss Bruce Williams, who can be be herard in every major U.S. city except L.A.! KGIL also carried Bob Brinker's MoneyTalk, an ABC Radio Network show, for a total of three hours on Saturdays and three on Sundays. KABC Radio began carrying MoneyTalk for one hour per week; and even that hour is usually preempted by any local programming, not just sports. It is unbelievable that these two highly entertaining and informed radio hosts cannot be heard in a city as large as L.A.

I appreciate your logging "Don't Touch That Dial!" on KCSN-FM 88.5 on Sundays from 12:05 to 3 p.m. However, you should be aware that, on the second and fourth Sundays of the month the show ends at 2:30 p.m. to make room for "Thirty Minutes to Curtain," the only regularly-scheduled new radio drama program in the L.A. area. now in its 11th year of broadcasting, thanks to KCSN-FM.

Soon-Teck Oh reads Junichiro Tanizaki's "The Thief," and Emily Kuroda reads "The Dream Soldier" by Kobo Abe, Sunday, Aug. 28, from 7 p.m. to 8 p.m. as KCRW's month-long tribute to contemporary Japanese short stories concludes.

PERSONALITIES & PROGRAMMING Comings and Goings

Nicole Sandler, who produced the Mark and Brian show for KLOS, left the station to become the midday disc jockey at KLIT 101.9 FM. KCRW's Chris Douridas, who hosts "Morning Becomes Eclectic," was favored to take over the morning show at the new KLIT, but he's staying put. Former KLSXer Terry Gladstone recently joined the new albumalternative station as the weekend DJ, filling the 6 a.m. to 10 a.m. slot.

Don Allen left his early-morning weekday spot at country station KIKF 94.3 FM to host the Saturday afternoon show. Billy the Kid (Billy Schust) replaced Allen.

The new age/jazz stations at 103.1 gave themselves new call letters. KAJZ (Santa Monica)/KBJZ (Newport Beach) is now known as KACD/KBCD. The format was adjusted too.


XTRA Sports 690 starts the day with a new team of drive-time hosts. Steve Mason, who moved up from XTRA's p.m. slot, joins John Ireland, formerly of San Diego's KUSI-TV's sports desk, for the 5 a.m. to 9 a.m. sports/talk program.

Stations Set for Kickoff

Altough it's hard to believe the football season is almost here, listeners have plenty of audio options to catch their game of choice. Here's a look at who carries what: L.A. Raiders: KFI 640 AM; Los Angeles Rams: KMPC 710 AM: Monday Night Football starting Sept. 12: KNX 1070 AM with Jack Buck and Hank Stram; college football: USC, KNX; UCLA, XTRA Sports 690.

More than a New Format

Besides offering listeners a new and unique format, KLIT 101.9 booked a couple of Sunday-night specials: Dr.

Demento on KLIT from 9 p.m. to midnight and "Life and Liberty," a Western Drama hosted by Dawn Comer at 8 p.m. (for more information on FM 101.9, see story on page 18).

Global Radio

Two local stations recently orientalized. KMAX 107.1 FM and KWIZ 96.7, both owned by Douglas Broadcasting, joined the Asia One Network. A Japanese language show airs from 7 a.m. to 9 a.m. weekdays.

Israeli radio is now available to Angelenos, but they'll have to pay for it. Blazer Communications launched a new station called FM 100 that features the latest news and music from Israel. The catch is that to hear it, listeners must buy a decoder box and pay a monthly fee.

For other Mideast programming, Radio Teheran offers Iranian news and public affairs. Tuning in to the 1-year-old station requires a special radio with chips, which is only available from Radio Teheran.

DJ Death at The Beat


KKBT DJ Greg Beasley died July 1. Known as Captain G to his listeners, Beasley hosted the afternoon show, which had garnered an enthusiastic following, according to The Beat's spokesperson, Sharon Klein.

"He was great to his listeners," she said. "They were really loyal. He made them feel part of the show. It is a tragic loss for his audience and for us."

Beasley's association with The Beat began in 1990, when the station featured the syndicated "Urban Mix" show, which he produced for the St. Louis station KMJM. He began at KKBT in 1993 as a late-night DJ and was promoted to the coveted afternoon slot in April of this year, a move motivated by Captain G's rising popularity.

A native of Chicago, Beasley was the youngest of 13 children. He died at 33. According to Los Angeles County Coroner spokesperson Scott Carrier, Beasley's death is being investigated as an accident, and it appears that drugs are involved. However, the cause of death has not been finalized as of press time.

KKBT is dedicating its Aug. 14 Summer Jam concert to Captain G. The memorial concert will benefit anti-vio-

lence and drug-prevention programs in Southern California. General Sales Manager Blake Mendenhall added that this event is the largest concert sponsored by an urban station to be staged in a major venue.

Kinison Debuts

The Wild Man, the late Sam Kinison, has a brother, and he's loose on the Inland Empire's airwaves. Yes, as of Aug. 1, Bill Kinison, one-time Midwestern preacher and former manager of his late brother, made his talk radio debut on KCKC AM 1350. Filling the 10 a.m. to 11 a.m. slot with what he terms "a not necessarily politically correct" viewpoint, Kinison will invite many of his show business comrades as guests in addition to fielding calls from listeners.

"I'm still pretty Midwestern in my thinking, but there are an awful lot of transplants here," Kinison said, referring to his diverse Southland audience. "Hey, if Howard [Stern] can fly in this town, I see no problem. I plan on having a lot of fun. You can get away with a lot on radio!"



BIZ BRIEFS

KACE Buyout

All Pro Broadcasting has entered into a yet-to-be-finalized agreement with Cox Broadcasting Company to sell one of its FM stations, KACE 103.9. According to All Pro president Willie Davis, the agreement now stands at the L.M.A. stage (local market agreement), which allows Cox to lease all KACE inventory and programming until the FCC approves the sale.

NOTABLES Man of Steele Gets A Star

Having talked, cheered, wailed and roared his way into L.A.'s hearts, memories and airwaves, Don Steele has finally secured his star on Hollywood's Walk of Fame. The Real Don Steele attributes his stellar success to "discipline and endurance." But Angelenos weaned on KHJ Boss Radio may cite the man of Steele's frenetic energy and groovy DJ style as the real reasons the K-EARTH 101 DJ

(since 1992) will be inducted onto the boulevard in a ceremony April 6, 1995.

"I am just perfectly thrilled to death!" he wailed in inimitable Real Don Steele fashion.

In the '60s and '70s, Steele perfected the hyperenthusiastic style that became inextricably linked to Top 40 radio. His steadfast charm and engaging zeal also made his "Real Don Steele Dance Show" a No. 1 hit for KHJ TV Channel 9.

The Walk of Fame Committee picked the finalists from about 200 nominees, and Steele was its sole choice in the radio category.

"Which Way, L.A.?" Honors

For the second year in a row, KCRW's "Which Way, L.A?" collected prestigious awards from two groups, the American Bar Association and Women in Communications, Inc. The latest spate brings the total heap of prizes to 16 for the daily one-hour public affairs show hosted by Warren Olney.

Citing the program's thorough, objective coverage of the Rodney King and Reginald Denny trials, the ABA bestowed its highest award, the Silver Gavel. The group annually awards media efforts that promote public understanding of the American system of law and justice. For its four-hour, live broadcast of King's civil rights trial verdict, Women in Communication selected "Which Way, L.A. ?" as the 1994 recipient of the Clarion Award in the Radio Spot News category. The public radio production was selected from more than 1,000 international entries, which are judged on objectivity, creativity and content.

The 1992 riot gave rise to "Which Way, L.A.?" which has evolved into an ongoing series covering the city's evolution. Hosted by multiple-award-winning broadcast journalist Warren Olney, the show airs weekdays from 1 p.m. to 2 p.m. on KCRW 89.9 and is rebroadcast at 7 p.m.

Westwood One Chair's Largess

The radio industry has Norman Pattiz to thank for a lot.

Not only did the father of Westwood One Companies raise his business from a one-room, rented office to its present, multi-million-dollar status, he is now helping radio continue its education. Pattiz recently donated \$50,000 to the Broadcast Education Association (BEA), a national organization comprised primarily of professors who teach broadcast media.

Following a stint as a guest lecturer for a Media Management class at

Pepperdine University, Pattiz was inspired by the enthusiasm of the students to contribute to media education. Known for his dynamic management approach, Pattiz' lecture on "Radio in the Age of the Information Superhighway" was so engaging that students trailed after him to the parking lot, asking questions and continuing the discussion.

In addition to his financial contribution, Pattiz will serve as a member of the BEA and make presentations in classes taught by BEA members.

"Inside Track" on Pop Biz

Chart-topping pop stars and movie personalities are some of the people that fans can hear about when they pop in the new audio fanzine, "Inside Track." Mike Kasem, son of legendary radio personality Casey Kasem, narrates the Westwood One-produced monthly cassette magazine. August's edition includes interviews with Snoop Doggy Dogg, Babyface, alternative-rock group Collective Soul and chart newcomer Aaliyah. The cassette magazine is available at Los Angeles-area Tower Records and Wherehouse outlets.

I Am Joe's Brain

KMPC's loe Crummey has found a new way to let his listeners know what's on his mind — literally. The midday 710



talk show host hired a cameraman to videotape his recent brain surgery, thinking he would sell it to a few curious listeners.

"I mentioned it on the air and just thought I'd see if anyone gives a s—," Crummey said. "I told people it would be a great way to experience brain surgery without all the muss and fuss. I figured on sending out about 30, tops."

What the talk jock did not bargain on was his listeners' vast curiosity about just what goes on when a brain goes

under the knife. He reported that even before he had completed the video package, listeners were calling in and sending checks. Crummey returned to his radio show within two weeks of his surgery and found himself with more than 500 orders.

The tape, titled "Joe's Crummey Video," chronicles his experience with a benign brain tumor. It consists of interviews with his surgeon and fellow on-air personalities who express their awe and concern about their colleague's delicate procedure.

In the meantime, KCAL Channel 9 TV got wind of the runaway video hit and invited Crummey to the newscast to discuss his original marketing approach as well as the intriguing subject matter.

"Channel 9's angle was the human interest idea," he said. "I don't think the video offends anyone. It's definitely more of a curiosity factor."


Whichever way his listeners look at it, the bottom line is that they are looking at it.

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Coming Soon: On the Stones Voodoo Radio Network

IT COULD ONLY COME FROM WESTWOOD ONE.

Question: What's 5-foot, 3-inches, talks faster than a car salesman at year-end, is armed with knitting needles and a martial-arts black belt?

Need more clues?

OK. She carries a Screen Actors Guild card, wields a hefty resume of academic degrees, packs a wit as sharp as a Ginsu knife and an intellect as biting as an alpine wind. And she's always right.

She's your grade-school principal, your high school track coach and your parish priest. She's Jiminy Cricket with an attitude. She's your mother; and she's on the phone, waiting to tell you how to straighten out your sad, sorry self.

She's Dr. Laura Schlessinger, and she's your wake-up call to reality. On the air she takes on the lamentable lack of moral integrity and personal responsibility

that runs rampant through the populace.

"My values are an oasis in the middle of a moral nothingness," she said. "I'm single-handedly trying to change this lack of values and ethics."

And, indeed, if ratings are any indicator of her brass-tacks philosophy's far reach, Dr. Laura just may succeed. Rated No. 1 in Los Angeles in her time slot among adults 25 to 54, her radio call-in talk show was recently syndicated nationally. The rest of the country is about to get an earful from the former human sexuality instructor from Brooklyn.

Her callers bring a long list of problems to her show. Mothers with leeching grown children, men with vacillating girlfriends, women with troubled marriages



and even kids dealing with playground alienation are among the many people willing to wait up to an hour on hold until Dr. Laura can diagnose their private ills on the very public airways.

But caller beware: This therapist is no Dr. Feelgood. There is no hand-holding. And laying the blame on society, alcoholic parents or deprived youth is not allowed. No excuses.

"To feel good, you must be in charge of the situation," she said. "Most people don't want to go to the trouble to change a behavior or a bad situation. They just want to feel good."

By example, she cited a caller whose live-in boyfriend was still dating his ex-wife on the side.

"This woman saw that her only choices were to make him stop what he was doing or just to accept it and feel good about it," she said with an incredulous look on her

face. "You can't just feel good! First you have to do what's right; then you'll feel good! But that's not always easy or comfortable for people."

"Doing what's right" is what Dr. Laura is all about. She is a sort of 'Everymom,' telling callers and listeners alike what they probably already knew, but that they didn't want to hear.

"I am philosophizing, teaching, nagging, clarifying, advising and directing," she said, ticking off the verbs on her fingers. "I'm here to hold up a light and point a way."

One of those lights she holds up for the befuddled, value-deprived masses is her popular book, "Ten Stupid Things Women Do to Mess Up Their Lives." The work draws upon Dr. Laura's experiences in broadcasting and in private practice as a certified marriage and family therapist. The new author stresses that women are not stupid, but many of their behaviors appear to be.

"This book wrote itself," she said. "It was written from passion. It is clear to me that so much of what is wrong in women's lives is self-induced. Women are not taking responsibility. They are not doing the best things for themselves and for their babies."

While Schlessinger admits that her book's title could have included many more than 10 stupid things, she is uncharacteristically and surprisingly irresolute when asked about a similar list for men.

"I don't know what it is to be a man; I don't feel passionate the same way," Schlessinger said, tentatively. "Probably, it [the list] would end up sounding like a textbook."

Among the obvious attributes she would include is men's reticence about discussing their emotions. And Schlessinger asserts that they seem to have their priorities out of whack.

"They define success by things other than their family relationships," she said sadly.

In her book, as well as on her show, Dr. Laura lambastes those who will not look the truth squarely in the face and make the effort to change it. She takes to task those who blame their upbringing, their spouse, "the system," their job or their traumatic pasts for the misfortunes of their present lives.

Schlessinger nimbly leaps from soapbox to soapbox, regularly admonishing her radio callers for: not using birth control, cohabitating before marriage. staying in abusive relationships and mistaking passion and sex for intimacy and love. Her demeanor is at times brusque, almost harsh, and her remarks are frequently sarcastic and impatient. She interrupts and talks over her callers. and brooks no arguments contrary to her point of view.

> But as with the obese caller who wept as she related her brave confrontation with a shockingly cruel boy and his boorish, contemptible father, Dr. Laura can be startlingly empathetic, supportive and abundantly kind.

> > "You can lose weight and correct that problem," she said gently to the caller. "But for them, there is no such

thing as a character transplant." Despite the litany of

Despite the litany of misfortunes and complaints that she addresses daily, Schlessinger claims never to be disheartened by the repetitious nature of people's mistakes and problems.

"Oh!" she said. "On the contrary, I feel energized every day. There is too much positive happening."

She admits that she used to "fret and worry and get very tense" wondering if she was really helping her callers, until she realized that her real clients were the listeners. With radio as her facilitator, **Dr. Laura** is able to reach out and help thousands of people, a task that she says has made her a better therapist.

"I do the call for the listener," she said. "I have given up feeling compelled to change the caller. I can help so many, many more people that way. There are listeners out there identifying with each call, going, 'Oh. That's me.' If the caller gets it, that's icing."

Lest her listeners think that Dr. Laura, radio therapist, is a media creation, she would most emphatically tell them that what they see (and hear) is what they get.

"I practice what I preach, and I follow my own advice," she said with a touch of self-satisfaction. Schlessinger unabashedly toots her own horn, reminding callers and listeners that she herself is a success thanks to her own strength of character and determination. With an impressive list of degrees and certificates under her black belt (in Hapkido, a Korean martial art), she is a walking, talking (and talking, and talking...) example to her radio audience.

This is a person who has, in her words, taken on the day. Having opted out of an unwise marriage early on, she later married Dr. Lewis Bishop. ("the greatest guy in the world") who is her manager.

While working as a marriage and family therapist and a teacher, she called in to the Bill Ballance show and sufficiently impressed her host that he called her back afterward. The famous talk show host launched Schlessinger's broadcasting career. She took a hiatus to be a stay-athome mom for son Deryk (now 8), something Dr. Laura recommends to all prospec-

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tive parents. She and her husband now share all child-rearing responsibilities. ("And he does the grocery shopping.")

Pride in her myriad accomplishments is evident in her relatively tidy studio office. One wall is dominated by a mammoth, framed print of her book's cover. a souvenir from one of her many. well-attended book signings. A still from her guest appearance on "Star Trek, The Next Generation" hangs on another. Photos of herself with her son and Gov. Pete Wilson are displayed behind her desk.

The confident radio therapist admits to few faults. She owns up to driving too fast in her 5liter Mustang while blaring oldies rock and to nagging occasionally.

"Generally, I want my way, and I want it now," she said. "Aside from that, I don't have any bad habits."

While most mere mortals might be seduced by the lure of a trashy novel, a bag of Oreos or a neat brandy when struck by a bout of the blues, radio's Dr. Know-It-All gets busy.

"I knit," she said. "I go to karate. I ride my bike. I talk to Lew."

If she sounds a mite compulsive, perhaps it harkens back to her student years when she kept her day schedules on 3by-5 cards, including mealtimes and study sessions.

"I was not a frivolous child," she said, stating the obvious. "I was very serious. I worked on science experiments in the basement. I did not fit in. I was too busy being a brain. To fit in, you had to sort of loosen up,

and I refused. But I was not a nerd."

Since those days, she may have loosened up — slightly. Personal anecdotes wend their way through the text of her show, and, occasionally, her own on-air homilies will provoke her to explosive laughter.

But Dr. Laura embraces discipline in her personal life and preaches its virtues to her listeners. She frequently reminds callers that life is difficult and that sacrifices need to be made to earn and to keep self-respect, to attain goals and to merit happiness.

"My job is to be a kick in the pants to people who have a million reasons why 'they can't," she said solemnly. "They can. They know they can. They took the first step by picking up the phone."

AAA. That's the organization we call when our cars quit on the freeway.

What could those letters possibly have to do with radio?

Actually, as far as 101.9 FM (K-LITE) is concerned, everything. In the radio biz. AAA stands for adult album alternative — the station's new music format.

This format includes current releases as well as lesser known "deep cuts" from favorite rock, pop, folk and blues artists.

Last month, 101.9 dropped its call letters, KLIT, and soft adult contemporary format for AAA. New disc jockeys signed on, and new studios were built. And new call letters are on the way. (For now, in attempt to distance itself from the old format, the station calls itself FM 101.9 "Southern California's album alternative.")

The changes came after KLIT's parent company, Golden West Broadcasters. sold KMPC AM 710 to ABC/Capital Cities.

"We didn't have any ratings," promotions director Robert Lyles said of the old format. "We couldn't sell anything."

The new format feels like a breath of fresh air to the station staff.

"It's so positive in here now," Lyles said. "[Media buyers] are placing orders. The record companies are bending over backwards for us. What we have here is exclusive."


The station hopes the new format is as big a hit with L.A. listeners as it has been in places like Phoenix, Boulder, Austin and Albuquerque where stations rode AAA's growing popularity to the top of the ratings charts.

So far, the early returns are positive for the station. "Judging by the telephone calls and faxes, we're exploding," said Morrison, who serves as morning DJ and program director. "But that's no way to judge a radio station." Both Morrison and Merilee Kelly, the station's music director and afternoon personality, came from AAA stations on the East Coast "We sort of came up with

it on our own," said Morrison, who was program director at WXPN in Philadelphia. "Once we got the format going, it went well. It got up in the high twos [audience share]."

Mike

Kelly reported similar results at her former station.





"It was pretty successful," Kelly said of the format. "We had good ratings at [WBOS in Boston]. Every AAA station's a little different. People who grew up with Jalbum-oriented rock] like it. They're people who have good CD collections. They're people who are really into music. Maybe they don't want to schlep out and buy a CD so they say let's have [AAA stations| entertain us."

The station plays a mix of both established

and new artists like Counting Crows, Wild Colonials, the Grateful Dead, Jackson Browne, Ziggy Marley, Michelle Shocked and Sheryl Crow. Live in-studio performances are also in the works. David Byrne, Peter Himmelman and Emmylou Harris have already given mini-concerts on the air.

At AAA stations, the music takes precendence over would-be comedians and pontificators. With this in mind, Mike Morrison, program director for 101.9, will host the weekday morning show from 6 a.m. to 10 a.m.

Former KLSX DJ, Terry Gladstone has also come on board, filling the 5 a.m. to 10 a.m. weekend slot. She is a veteran of this type of radio, having paved the way with her popular "Classic Rock Coffeehouse" show, which aired on KLSX and featured predominantly acoustic music.

Some people in the radio business describe AAA as a throwback to earlier FM formats.

"It uses as a model early FM as the spirit of what it is," Morrison said.

DJs are given more freedom in this

format compared to, say, Top 40. There isn't some numbers guy in a three-piece suit looking over their shoulders ordering them what to play.

"I love the diversity," midday DJ Nicole Sandler said. "This is stuff I've been dying to play. We're playing a lot of artists who are so good but never make it on radio."

Management encourages Triple A DJs to go that extra mile and reach deeper into albums for eclectic cuts, often surprising listeners.

"We've been getting a lot of calls from people who say, 'You've been going through my record collection,' or 'You're reading my mind,' " the music director said. "It's sort of play-it-by-ear. In a way, it's almost like college radio around here, sort of fly-by-the-seat-of-your-pants. It's not very corporate."

That was a big reason Sandler, who produced KLOS's Mark and Brian Show for four years, moved up the dial to 101.9.

"This is the opportunity of a lifetime: to be on the start-up of a radio station," Sandler said."I'm on the ground floor of something I really believe in.

"The timing was perfect. I wanted to go back on the air. This is my love: my music. I was ready to leave L.A. and work at a Triple A station anywhere."

Radio Joins Media Frenzy in O.J. Case

America's obsession with the O.J. Simpson murder case forced national and local media outlets, including L.A. radio stations, into overdrive, if not overkill.

A virtual media feeding frenzy descended upon Los Angeles shortly after the third largest national TV audience in history watched as Simpson, the highest profile murder suspect in U.S. history, concealed in the backseat of his white Blazer, led CHP on a bizarre, low-speed chase along Southland freeways.

Ever since, everyone from network news big shots to FM radio morning pranksters, to German tourists armed with camcorders have scrambled about the county courthouse. Simpson's mansion and the murder site looking for the latest angle.

"It's been a nine-ring circus there," said KFWB AM 980's courtroom reporter Steve Kindred of the preliminary hearings.

Kindred figures he did more than a hundred live reports from the hearing. The radio journalist put in numerous hours on the story.

"I don't want to count; it would be too

depressing," Kindred said.

But he wasn't the only one putting in overtime. Turn on the radio, and all the O. J. Simpson coverage anyone needed was available. Topping all broadcasters, KNX AM 1070 provided listeners with "gavel-to-gavel" coverage of the preliminary hearings. Competing news station KFWB News 98 gave six hearing updates an hour. Naturally, the murder case was the dominant topic on talk stations. Even the FM music stations offer the latest.

"It's monumental, a tremendous event," said KNX AM 1070 general manager George Nicholaw. "We've had to bump commercial sponsors to provide coverage. The only thing we've done to interrupt the proceedings is World Cup [soccer] updates."

Nicholaw, a veteran newsman, can't remember a bigger story.

"It reminds me of the JFK assassination," he said. "Of course, nothing is as big as a presidential assassination. What I mean is that it parallels the interest factor — even more so because of the live action. This has really captured people's imagination. He's been a part of so many people's lives in a strange way."

Scott Gorbitz, news director of competing 980, agreed, but doesn't think KNX's gavel-to-gavel coverage is "good radio."

"It's huge," he said. "But you have to be careful with radio because you don't have the visual point of view. A listener can't tell what's really going on in court just by hearing. And not everyone is miked well [has a microphone] in court.

"We're not going to criticize the competition. But my feeling is: Do you want to know about other things? We're trying to serve the listeners as best we can. There isn't a lot of choice. You have to cover it. But one story is not going to make or break a station." However, Gorbitz' station offered listeners six updates an hour.

"'Just the facts' is our promo," Gorbitz said. "There's been a lot of speculation in this story, and we're not going to relay that information — just the facts."

How to cover the event was a difficult decision for the 15-year KFWB newsman.

"It's a classic story," Gorbitz said. "It has all the elements of success: failure, sex, maybe drugs. It's a great mystery story, no matter how you slice it. O.J. is the most known person in history ever to be accused of murder.

"Riots, huge wildfires, earthquakes: those are stories of great impact. This story has to be viewed in a totally different vein. It doesn't impact people's lives, but it affects people emotionally. When the mighty have fallen, it gives people a psychological yardstick to measure themselves in a way. And the whole issue of domestic violence has given people pause to think about how they'd handle it if they were O. L."

When it was first learned that Nicole Brown Simpson and her friend Ron Goldman had been brutally stabbed to death, the story was already huge. It wasn't until the surreal freeway chase that it became, in Nicholaw's words, "monumental."

Thousands of Angelenos rushed to the freeway to watch the chase as though it were the Rose Bowl parade. Motorists pulled aside in disbelief. But L.A. traffic reporters may have had the best view of the action.

No strangers to the news fray, the veteran news radio helicopter team of Marika and Bob Tur hovered and swooped over the freeways, reporting the play-by-play for the KNX AM audience.

"It's exciting, being in the middle of the news as it happens — being the information link," Marika Tur said. "This [assignment] had a combination of everything: the celebrity angle, the pursuit and the on-the-scene suspense."

Tur and her husband were in the air reporting from 5 p.m. to about 10:30 p.m., when Simpson was taken into custody.

To Michael James, a Metro Networks traffic reporter, it was just another day at the office. ABC's "World News Tonight" and KABC broadcasted James' reports from a fixed-wing aircraft.

"I covered him from Disneyland to Cerritos; then we had to go down and refuel," James said. "We went back up; but by that time, they were already up in Brentwood. By the time we got up there, it was really crazy. Helicopters were driving over each other.

"It was basically a dull chase. We've covered chases before, and those are a little bit more exciting. They weren't going very fast."

The freeway crowds and masses who rushed toward Brentwood were what most amazed James.

"We caught all the people who were lining up along the freeway," he said. "And people were still sitting in their cars talking about it after he went by.

"It didn't surprise me that much. The fact of who he was — the whole thing was exciting. A lot of people were concerned; they didn't want to see O. J. kill himself."

Tur said that the KNX AM ringside broadcasts probably drew the flocks of spectators in their cars.

"To know where he was, people had to have been listening to their radios," she said. "They could have heard on TV and jumped in their cars; but to

keep track, they were tuning in to KNX helicopter reports."

Many critics disapproved of the coverage, calling it overblown and out of control. Others accuse broadcasters and reporters of exploitation. For its part, KNX claims it is simply giving the people what they want.

"You tell me what's more important at this time," Nicholaw said. "I've had people call and say, 'You're exploiting this [so you can sell more commercials.]' To the contrary, we're not exploiting this at all. We've had to bump commercials. We're providing audience with what they want.

"I think you can put it in proper perspective on the night the Bronco was driving through L.A. at 35 mph. It was the third most viewed television story in history."

KFWB's Kindred agreed while protesting one newspaper critic's bashing of his station.

"I think it's really ludicrous that the media critics are aiming at us," he said. "People want to hear this stuff. We're getting criticized for giving them a large amount of information. [Los Angeles Times media critic Howard Rosenberg] doesn't get the joke. He underestimates the audience's intelligence. He needs to walk a mile in my shoes."

XTRA Host Recalls O.J.

XTRA Sports 690 talk show host Chet Forte had heard reports that his friend O.J. Simpson had allegedly beaten his wife. He broached the subject on one occasion.

"I brought it up, and he said, 'Don't believe everything you read,'" Forte said.

And just like that, Simpson sidestepped the topic as if he were avoiding tacklers. But, apparently, if current allegations prove true, Simpson, now accused of murdering his ex-wife Nicole Brown Simpson and her friend Ron Goldman, had a severe problem that he was able to conceal from outsiders.

"I've never seen a violent side of O. J. Simpson as long as I've known him," said Forte, the director of ABC's Monday Night Football during Simpson's two years (1984-85) as part of the broadcast crew. "I've seen him turn his back to arguments.

"I'm as amazed as anybody else. It makes it tougher being a friend of O. J.'s."

His friendship with the pro Football Hall of Famer has posed conflicts for Forte. Some callers to his "Loose Cannons" show he co-hosts with Steve Hartman have accused him of sticking up for Simpson.

"People think I'm rooting for O. J.," Forte said. "I'm rooting for justice to be done here.

"This was a brutal murder. This is the act of a psycho, in my opinion.

"The evidence that has come out seems to be overwhelming. Even if you believe half of what is written, even that seems overwhelming."

Forte wonders if any of Simpson's closest friends knew about the alleged violencen and, if so, why nobody stepped in to offer help.

"Where were his friends?" said Forte, who battled a gambling addiction during

the mid-to-late 1980s. "Everybody can be helped. I don't know where I'd be if I didn't go into a [Gamblers Anonymous] program."

Another thing that bothered Forte was a report that police had responded to numerous domestic disputes involving Simpson and his ex-wife before finally arresting him on the ninth alleged occasion in 1989.

"Whether he was a superstar or not, that's ridiculous," Forte said. "That's covering up for a superstar. That's bad in itself right there."

Forte, who last had Simpson on his show "about four to five months ago," prefers to remember the other O. J. Simpson.

"O. J. Simpson loved life," Forte said. "He loved being the role model and signing autographs. He wanted to be bothered. He wanted to be a superstar. He loved to be loved.

"We've never seen this [new] side of O. J. Simpson."

And now an entire country struggles with the image that one of its most successful athletes ever may have been involved in a double-homicide. While Forte holds out hope that Simpson didn't commit the crimes, he's also aware of societal pressures.

"I'm shocked by the situation," Forte said. "Nowadays, I believe anything can happen."



Wink & the King

When he was a boy growing up in Jackson, Tenn. Winston Conrad Martindale had a younger friend who lived across the street.

"He couldn't say my name. Winston," Martindale said. "It came out Winky."

It's not hard to imagine the two of them spooling out a string to connect two Dixie cups or building a little crystal radio. "Wink" Martindale has always had some kind of broadcasting project in the works.

"I pestered my Sunday School teacher who was also the manager of the local 250-watt radio station: "When are you going to give me a job?' He finally did!" said Martindale, who was just 17 at the time. He was fresh out of high school and wide-eyed in the knowledge that he now had something in common with his idols, Arthur Godfrey, Art Linkletter and Peter Potter of "Jukebox Jury" fame.

There's still a lot of little kid in Martindale's voice. You pick it up the minute the conversation turns to radio. At 59, he's a television veteran with network video credits, including everything from "High Rollers" to "Tic Tac Dough." But there's something about radio that rekindles all the thrill and

Winston Conrad Martindale wonder that attracted him to broadcasting in the first place.

"It's my favorite thing to do," he said. "It's my roots. It supersedes money and fame."

When he came to L.A. in 1959 to be the new morning "jock" at KHJ, music radio had "personalities" on the air. KFWB and KRLA, KHJ and KMPC each offered a stable of stars who brought something unique to their broadcasts.



"There was a warmth," Martindale said. "You took pride in your ability to ad-lib and to do a commercial from a fact sheet."

In the years that followed, Martindale became one of the best known of the "personality DJs" in L.A.

At KMPC during the '70s and '80s, he was the station's morning man, ushering in the new day for thousands upon thousands of Angelenos. Such a person is not easily forgotten by the listeners.

"A year after I left, the station went all sports," Martindale said. "They invited some of us back for a last day of KMPC music radio. It was sort of sad. KMPC had been one of the premiere stations."

You have to give Martindale credit though; he doesn't dwell in the past.

"I'm just like everybody else; I've become more of a talk show listener," he said. "Maybe I've caved in or whatever, but everybody's talkin.' Nobody's

playing music."

He remains loyal to the AM band, feeling the sound warmer than the forced sibilants and thundering base of so much of the music on FM.

"I don't knock rap." he said. "I just don't understand it."

With the exception of KJQI (540 and 1260 AM), where Martindale did a oneyear stint up until a few months ago, local personality radio on the AM dial in L.A. has all but disappeared. Music programs are now mostly syndicated and distributed by satellite. The same song you hear on KLAC is simultaneously transmitted in a hundred other cities. There are very few Wink Martindales left on local radio to play the "perfect" song if it's raining outside or the home team has lost a big game.

"When you grew up in the era I did, you kind of miss it." Martindale said.

You can tell he means it.

His voice absent from L.A. today, Martindale lives in Calabassas where he keeps tapes of his most memorable interviews with everybody from Neil Diamond to Tony Bennett (he met Elvis in 1954). He heads his own production company that has begun specializing in a new generation of interactive television game shows with viewer participation. Between trips to Europe, commercials for ESPN, hosting three game shows and a half-dozen other projects pending, if the situation arose, could he find the time to be on the radio again in L.A.? Sure! That's a thrill this kid from Jackson. Tenn. will never outgrow!

The Beat and Peace Group Gangs Up on Violence

Gang violence, once limited to the inner city, is spreading across previously untouched areas of Los Angeles and Orange counties. Recent attacks in suburban enclaves of the San Fernando Valley and Anaheim have driven one Southern California radio station to action.

Several organizations are heeding the call to arms, promoting education and peaceful co-existence in the city, most notably the Inglewood-based "Stop The Violence-Increase The Peace" Foundation. Now radio has aligned itself with this urban cause. Local outlets KKBT 92.3 and KPWR 105.9 have taken an on-the-air stand, promoting peace and the rebuilding of LA.

KKBT 92.3 joined Stop The Violence Foundation in co-sponsoring a peace conference and concert to send a message of hope to fellow Angelenos weary of the violence and bloodshed.

Held at the Westin Bonaventure Hotel in downtown L.A. June 4, the event was attended by a varied crowd of young people, community leaders, social service



representatives, media representatives and entertainers. The goal of the conference was threefold: to create an open forum for addressing alternatives to violence, to enlist the help of community leaders and rap artists and to outline solutions to gangs, violence in our schools and domestic violence.

Dominique DiPrima, KKBT community action director and host of the radio show "The Street Scene," concluded the conference was a success on at least one of these fronts.

"I believe this was a good first step." she said. "We've received letters of thanks from many people and civic leaders for getting listeners to be aware that there are solutions to complex problems that face our city, if we work as one."

The conference consisted of five different panel discussions: "How Can We Stop the Violence and Increase the Peace?" "Violence in the Media: Genocidal Imagery," "The Real Role Models," "Censorship" and "The Respect Panel" (multiculturalism & knowledge of self). Despite its solemn subject matter, the occasion was festive, involving an exchange of positive ideas.

During the panel discussion on "Violence in the Media," several of the panelists clashed on the negative images of African-Americans portrayed by the media.

Keith O'Derrick. a black film director, defended his role as a filmmaker.

"Through being a film director, we're trying to show a real image, an image that is hard to ignore," O'Derrick said. "I'm not sugarcoating; I'm telling it like it is."

However, Charles Rachael, an activist and member of Stop the Violence, argued that most black males didn't become gang members.

"You've got be fair," he said. "We're getting a negative image of us as gangbangers. We are black, yes. But you are

unfairly treating us as thugs. Only God can judge us."

Sharon Klein, KKBT promotions director, believes that dialogues in this vein lead to longrange solutions to the problems facing the city.

"What we did accomplish is getting a line of peaceful communication going, trying to solve problems between everyone, each on their level, putting their opinions forward and making their feelings known," she said.

But not everyone shared the *al ma* belief that peaceful talk solves all problems. During one segment of a panel group, Coolio, a rap artist, proclaimed that violence solves certain things.

"In order to achieve peace, we need to shed blood," he said. "We can talk all we want, but something has to go."

That inflammatory comment didn't sit well with many in the crowd. However, DiPrima announced that Coolio had a right to speak his mind.

"Each participant, no matter if one's a disk jockey, politician, journalist, community activist or pop artist will have a different opinion," she said.

Community and local civil rights leaders also served as panelists and speakers, most notably Compton Mayor Omar Bradley, Urban League president John Mack and L.A. County Assemblywoman Gwen Moore.

"It's nice to see them rubbing elbows with gang members, rap artists such as Eazy E and Coolio, among other participants," DiPrima said. "It makes for an exciting time."

During the final panel discussion on building positive role models for children, panelists agreed that parents should strive to provide the ultimate good example for their children. The discussion covered the importance of the father as a guiding force in raising children.

"Parents need to take the role of responsibility." Coolio said. "Kids should not look up to movie or sports celebrities. They

should look up to the ones who brought them into this world."

Overall, 92.3 The Beat received high marks from those involved in the event, including Stop the Violence spokesperson Tanya Humphrey.

"The media is a power to be reckoned with," she said. "While many in the inner city agree that our community is being wrongly portrayed to the mainstream, KKBT is trying to help us by achieving something that hasn't been done before: combining our energies to develop something positive."

Verona Edwards, an attorney for Stop the Violence, described the conference as a declaration of war on inner-city violence.

"For a change, we are simply trying to feed inspiration," she said.



DiPrima and Coolio

Under the concrete and steel of the Pasadena Presbyterian Church may lie several liquor stills. Years ago, engineers at the church radio station thought the place needed a better electrical ground. They got hold of some liquor distilling equipment confiscated during prohibition. They crushed it and buried it. It worked almost miraculously.

"So far as I know, they are still there," broadcasting director James Mason said.

Mason is the unofficial historian of KPPC (1240 AM), perhaps the most unusual radio outlet in the country.

"Do you know of another station anywhere in the United States that is licensed to operate the way this one is?" he asked.

Indeed, PCC (an acronym for the church) is permitted to be on the air six days per week, but only in the overnight hours from dusk to dawn and all day Sunday. These curious restrictions apparently stem from the fact that for years KPPC was fired up for the "soul" purpose of disseminating the Holy Word and presenting a modest and civilized musical fare exclusively on Sundays and Wednesday nights.

When regulators began searching for ways to accommodate a rash of ambitious new stations coming on the air in Southern California in the 1930s, KPPC had to be content to jog along pretty much as it was.

Decades later, an FM station would be added, but tiny KPPC AM stopped growing right there. Until just a few years ago, its output power was still limited to a mere 100 watts, radiating from a wire suspended between towers on top of the "Star-News" building.

A combination radio rig and public address system was hooked up in time to

go on the air Christmas Eve. Up until then, if you couldn't make it in person to Sunday service, the phone company would "connect" you through two telephone lines in the pulpit wired directly to the downtown switchboard. The weekly gathering has been "broadcast" in one form or another ever since.

"We're coming up on our 70th anniversary," said Mason, who also serves as the church's director of broadcasting. "That makes our Sunday service of worship one of the oldest continuing radio programs in the world."


Apart from its religious shows, over the years KPPC's programming has been eclectic and sometimes downright groundbreaking. In the 1960s, despite a signal that barely escaped the city limits, the station became one of the first outlets to air underground rock. The church's FM sister station, which had been unremarkable and largely unnoticed began playing what was for the time some truly unusual rock 'n' roll, and tiny KPPC simulcast the signal. Mason believes that decision helped establish underground radio in Los Angeles.

"People were picking up this interesting new music on the AM dial and switching to FM to hear it better," he said.

By the 1970s, Pasadena Presbyterian had divested itself of its broadcast licenses. AM and FM signals were split. The FM station was located elsewhere and went on to find fabulous success as KROQ, but her older sister on the AM side was sold to a company called Universal Broadcasting.

Finally granted a modest increase in power to 250 watts, KPPC AM retains some ties to the church. Its transmitter still resides in the basement, hooked to a wire up on the roof and allegedly to a bed of crushed copper hardware beneath.

Still legally limited to operating overnights and Sundays, it now offers greater Pasadena gospel music, a smattering of Spanish-language shows and, of course, weekly worship service.

in image-conscious Los Angeles, successful media projects usually require a lot of glamour: actors with great looks and costumes, in addition to special visual effects. Surprisingly, radio drama, which has no pictures, is in fashion.

Since the middle '80s, famous actors and key talent from the entertainment industry have been creating a new type of radio drama, and people are coming in droves to watch it being taped. They are producing well-known plays, plays specially commissioned for the radio and dramatizations of books. These "theaters of the mind" use new audio technology, language and sound effects to tell a story.



Many people associate radio theater with a special magic they experienced during its Golden Age, the catch-all term for American radio plays recorded in the '30s and '40s. Although its audience declined when TV arrived in American living rooms, it is still heard on L.A. radio stations (KNX-AM. KCSN-FM, KPCC-FM).

"Listening to radio drama influenced me to become an actor," award-winning actor Edward Asner said. "I grew up with radio and was inspired by programs like 'Lights Out,' 'Spellbound,' 'NBC University Theater of the Air' and 'Lux Radio Theater.' "

However, in contemporay radio drama the acting is different, explained radio drama producer Marjorie Van Halternan, in *Dramatics Magazine*.

"The stylized acting and melodrama of the Golden Age stuff doesn't work for an audience today,"Van Halternan said. "We've been exposed to so much naturalistic acting in movies and daily TV

of radio:

"In L.A., the cradle of the television and movie industries and therefore a place where one would least expect to find an outpouring of sentiment for the low-glamour, low-income landscape of radio, a virtual radio theater renaissance is in effect."

Several production facilities in Los Angeles record their dramas before a live audience, and they draw record crowds. The audiences love to watch the actors' performances and antics as they read their scripts while sitting on a platform "stage" with tables, chairs and microphones. Usually, there are no sets, costumes, theatrical lighting or stage movement. Actors' voices set the stage, aided by live sound effects created by the "foley" (sound effects) artist.

L.A. Theatre Works' collaboration with KCRW-FM (89.9), "The Play's the Thing," has been a leader in the resurgence of radio drama. Since the marathon broadcast of Sinclair Lewis' "Babbitt" in 1987, producer Susan Albert

Loewenberg and her L.A. Theatre Works have presented a variety of plays, ranging from the comedy of Neil Simon to lovce Carol Oates and Arthur Miller to Mame Hunt's "Unquestioned Integrity: The Hill-Thomas Hearings."

Most have been broadcast on KCRW; many have aired nationally on NPR and internationally over BBC and BBC World Service.

"The Play's the Thing" consists of a series of performances taped for radio before an audience of 350 at Guest Ouarters Suite Hotel in Santa Monica. Shows include all-star casts. The upcoming season is no exception: "Star Trek" actors Leonard Nimoy, Brent Spiner and Jonathan Frakes in a remake of "War of the Worlds" (recording Oct. 12- Oct. 15); "The Devil's Disciple" (recording Oct 26- Oct. 29) with Edward Asner, Kaitlin Hopkins, Judge Reinhold, JoBeth Williams and Michael York; and Harry Shearer ("This is Spinal Tap") in "It's Not a Fair World" by Harry Shearer and Tom Leopold (recording Jan. 25-Jan. 28, 1995).

Loewenberg began producing radio dramas in response to the prohibitive expense of producing traditional theater. Her solution? Keep standards high with quality work; but do it on the radio, as the BBC has done in England for years (where 1,800 dramatic productions are aired annually).

Another advantage of radio productions is they do not have to attract large

pace, and my voice has to be distinctive from theirs."

Asner becomes enraptured by listening to voices.

"There's something fascinating about appearance; but I like resonance, timbre, the distinct quality of people's voices. [Israel's Prime Minister] Rabin has a great voice, so do [actresses] Helen Mirren, Glenn Close and Nancy Merchant, who I worked with. I cannot tolerate listening to ugly. voices: a screecher, a monotone, a nasally piercing voice."

Another group bringing radio drama to the airwaves, now being heard on KLIT-FM (101.9), is Wells Fargo Radio

audiences, unlike television, which depends on audiences for its lifeline high ratings. This freedom allows for more complex and subtle subjects to be explored. For example, L.A. Theatre Works joined with NPR to broadcast "Top Secret: The Battle for the Pentagon Papers" with Edward Asner, Harry Shearer, Marsha Mason and Robert Foxworth.

Busy actors like Edward Asner ("Lou Grant." "The Mary Tyler Moore Show," "Thunder Alley") are happy to perform in LATW productions.

"I love getting everything into the nuance of the voice," Asner said. "When I do a book-on-tape, I create 30 to 40 voices. It's a wonderful exercise to attempt to give the qualities indicating age and sex of each person and maintain the voice of the leading character. With radio drama, we are doing the play together. I'm subject to other people's Theater from the Gene Autry Western Heritage Museum, formerly KMPC Radio Theater.

Rosemary and Newell Alexander, founding producers, described the genesis of the productions.

"It began when we were performing country-western songs at a party where Gene Autry and Bill Ward, president of Golden West Broadcasters, were present," Rosemary Alexander said. "Autry was so impressed with our performance he asked Ward. a big fan of radio drama, if we could perform at the Gene Autry Museum. The museum staff were looking for suitable events for their theater.

"In December 1989, we created 'Christmas in El Paso.' We performed and broadcast it live, with live music and sound effects. The museum asked if we could produce more shows to create a 'living' exhibit of radio drama production, done in the tradition of the medium

in the 1940s. We produced four shows a year for two years as 'KMPC Radio Theater.' Then KMPC changed its format, so we were off the air for a year, but our audience kept requesting more."

Now you can hear "Well Fargo Radio Theater" from the Gene Autry Museum on KLIT-FM (101.9). Every year, the Alexanders produce and write three original shows, which are funded by Wells Fargo Bank. These presentations give people a chance to see traditional

radio drama produced, and the art form excites them.

Many of the museum dramas offer a view of history that is not well known: that the American West was settled and developed by many cultures besides Anglo-European, including Native American, Hispanic, African-American and Asian.

In their production "Tascosa Slim, Oldest Deputy of the Mississippi," Pat

Butram starred as the colorful, aging deputy sheriff who aids a woman photographer threatened by two German spies on a mission to destroy a local copper mine.

Their most recent broadcast, "Life and Liberty," is based on the true story of Robbin and Polly Holmes, slaves in the 1840s who were promised their freedom in exchange for helping their master travel to the West on the difficult and dan-

> gerous Oregon Trail. The next production, the multicultural women's story "The Quilt," will air Dec. 3.

> California Artists Radio Theatre (CART) is also creating radio drama, which is carried by Pasadena station KPCC-FM (89.3).

"CART is a group of experienced writers, directors, actors, musicians, sound effects technicians and engineers," CART founderdirector Peggy Webber said. "We have worked together for over four decades in television, film and theater, and especially



in radio drama during that medium's most successful years."

CART has an impressive roster of actors: Roddy McDowell ("Lassie"), Marvin Kaplan ("Wild at Heart"), Samantha Eggar ("Dr. Doolittle"), Norman Lloyd (co-founder of Mercury Theatre with Orson Welles), Jeanette Nolan (leading lady on many major radio series), Kathleen Freeman ("Singin' in the Rain"). Les Tremavne ("The Thin Man"), Parley Baer (Chester on radio's "Gunsmoke"), and Stan Freberg ("The Stan Freberg"). Webber was leading lady and featured performer in network radio programs such as "Sherlock Holmes" and "Lux Radio Theater" and worked with directors Orson Welles, Alfred Hitchcock and lack Webb.

CART members are recording a series of radio dramas the second Wednesday and the following Saturday of every month at the Hollywood Roosevelt Hotel. The series includes "Alice in Wonderland," which aired in June; a new play by radio's most respected writerdirector, Norman Corwin, "A Strange Affliction," along with his classic, "My Client Curly," which aired in July; a series titled "Three Actors," which includes John Astin playing Edgar Allen Poe, Dan O'Herlihy playing George Bernard Shaw and William Windom playing James Thurber, which aired in August; and George Bernard Shaw's "Major Barbara" will be performed Sept. 14 and Sept. 17.

CART's plays produced for KPCC range from "The Passing of the Third Floor Back" by Jerome K. Jerome and Ivan Turgenev's "First Love" to "The Orangeburg Massacre," written by Jack Bass and L.A. Times writer Jack Anderson and "Lotusland," a musical comedy adapted by Ian Whitcomb from his novel.

Webber, who formed the nucleus of the group in 1948, gave her take on radio's renaissance.

"Radio drama is the closest thing to reading a book, as far as internalization of a story," she said. "It becomes a personal experience. Talk radio has discovered how involved listeners become, much more than any other medium. Especially in city a like L.A. where people are scattered both physically and emotionally, good radio drama can give them something to cling to and it can nourish the soul."

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
