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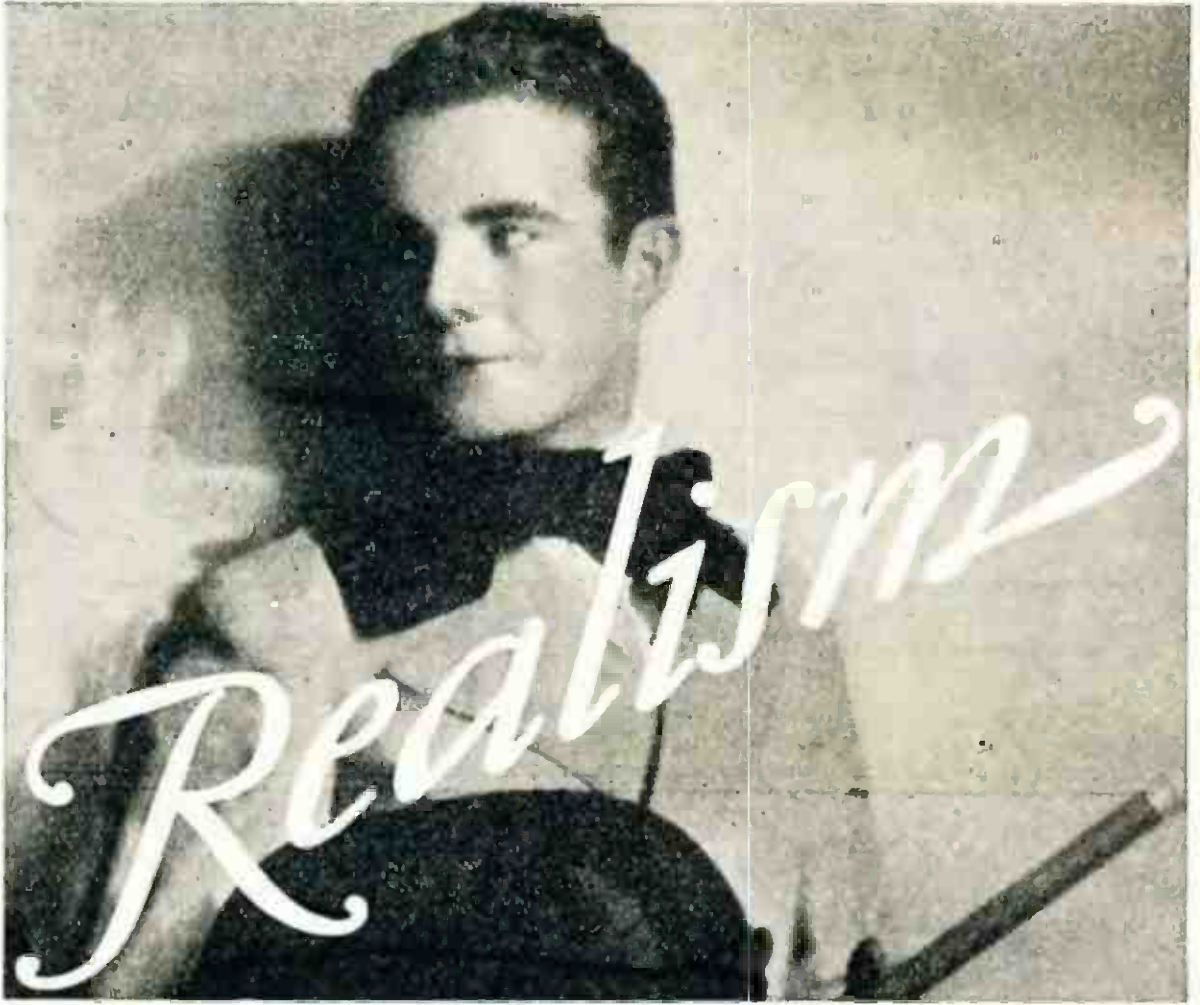

Radio Topics of the Day

CHICAGO STATION BATTLE TAXES COMMISSION

Unquestionably the most interesting and the hardest-fought battle any radio stations have yet made for their rights on the air was staged last week at the Capital in a three-cornered fight between WENR of Chicago, owned by the Insull interests; WLS, of Chicago, whose ownership was recently reported to have passed from Sears Roebuck & Company to the Prairie Farmer, and WCRD of Zion, Ill., with Wilbur Glenn Voliva, general overseer of the Zion, himself on the job.

The case broke all records for the number of witnesses brought to Washington to testify in a radio case, and for the number of counsel which have ever participated in a radio hearing. So many lawyers tried to make themselves heard, that Judge E. O. Sykes, Acting Chairman of the Radio Commission, announced that when there was more than one lawyer representing an interest, he would only recognize the chief counsel.

Also this Chicago family controversy was the lengthiest the Radio Commission has had to listen to. It began Wednesday morning, lasting until midnight, Thursday the same, Friday ditto, and didn't wind up until Saturday noon.

Finding the regular hearing room entirely too small, the sessions were moved into the auditorium of the Interior Department building. By the night of the second day those participating began to look more like spectators at an eight-day bicycle race than government commissioners et al, threshing out a radio controversy.

Briefly, WENR, which now has two-sevenths time on the same wave with WLS, was asking for an equal division. Also WENR, having been granted a permit to construct a 50,000-watt station and having spent about three-quarters of a million dollars doing it, asked to be allowed to use this increased power. WCRD, through Overseer Voliva, whose station was formerly on the wave length

now occupied by WENR, asked that the wave be given back to him.

John F. Gilchrist, president of the Great Lakes Broadcasting Company, operating WENR, and vice president of the Commonwealth Edison Company, testified that the latter owned 60 per cent of the station's stock. William R. Dawes, representing the Chicago Association of Commerce, when asked if he came there "as a friend of Sam Insull," reminded listeners of his brother, Vice President Dawes, when he snapped back, "No. I came here as a friend of Chicago."

COMMISSION REPORTS NEW TROUBLE CENTERS

According to Radio Commissioner O. H. Caldwell, of the Eastern Zone, reports regarding the new assignments reaching the Radio Commission from all over the country, show a "gratifying improvement."

"This seems to be the unanimous report from all regions with one or two exceptions," the Commissioner continued. "One is in Baltimore, where a 60kilocycle separation between two local stations is causing cross-talk in old-fashioned receivers. This separation should be ample, because two of the most powerful stations in the country—WEAF and WJZ are only separated by 50 kilocycles, and no trouble has been reported here.

"In the same way, I believe many complaints in Washington, D. C., are coming from persons having improperly arranged antenna or crystal sets or earlier models of receivers."

Mr. Caldwell announced that a rearrangement of the antenna at Station WNAC, in Boston, promised to bring an improvement. A delegation from Boston, headed by the Attorney General of the State went to Washington last week to further consult Commissioner Caldwell with regard to the station.

Commissioners Lafount and Sykes of the western and southern zones, respectively, said they had had few complaints.

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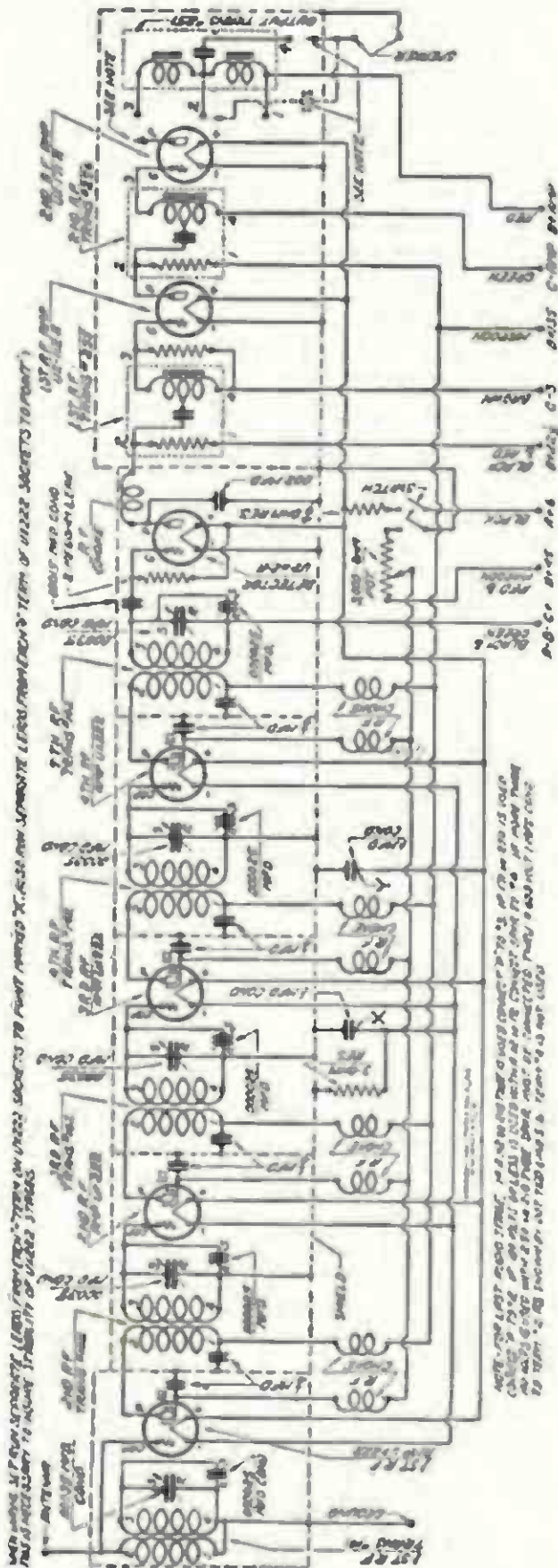

Questions and Answers

A Weekly Department Conducted by K. G. Ormiston, I.R.E.

QUESTION.—I have a Silver-Marshall shielded six, built a year ago, using screen grid tubes. Have been using B batteries, and would like to change to an eliminator. Do not want to bother with assembling an outfit. What standard eliminator can you recommend for my set?

F. H. KERNS, Los Angeles.

ANSWER.—Would suggest the Silver-Marshall 670B, which may be purchased completely wired and assembled. This new type incorporates the Clough combination selective and brute-force filter, has a total output of 60 milliamperes, and taps for 22, 90, 135 and 180 volts. An additional variable voltage of 22 to 90 is provided. It has sufficiently accurate voltage for use with screen grid tubes.

QUESTION.—I have a Grebe five-tube set using four 201A and one 112 tubes. Are there other tubes which I could use to better advantage in getting distant reception? Or what about a booster?

C. W. R., Los Angeles.

ANSWER.—Would not suggest changing the type of tubes, as the set was designed to function with particular types. But be sure that your present tubes are in good shape. It might be worth while to have them tested for emission and grid performance by a service man. Now the question of a booster. Would suggest the Campbell screen-grid AC booster, which is a tuned stage of RF amplification with screen grid tube and self-contained filament supply, readily attached ahead of your set. It will materially increase your range.

QUESTION.—In this neighborhood we are troubled with such tremendous electrical interference as to almost blanket our locals. I thought it might be in my set, but the dealer tells me that

they also get it at their store. Incidentally, all in the vicinity complain. What steps can I take to obtain relief?
H. M. K., Hollywood.

ANSWER.—The Interference Committee of the Radio Trades Association now has their expert working on Hollywood exclusively. You have taken the proper step by reporting the matter to your dealer, and your dealer, if he has not already done so, should immediately get in touch with Mr. George Walters through the office of the Radio Trades Association, Commercial Exchange Bldg., Los Angeles. Several sources of electrical interference in the Hollywood district have already been eliminated, and it is hoped that the whole area will be cleaned up in short order. One thing that is needed is the utmost cooperation on the part of the radio dealer. Under the plan now in force for handling interference, the listener-in should in no case complain to the public utility corporations, but should report his difficulties to the dealer from whom he purchased his radio.

QUESTION.—Could you tell me why it is that there is almost always a very active background of code signals when playing WGN? I have always understood that code was restricted to the short waves.

ANSWER.—The code signals which ride in with WGN are from NPL, the Naval station at San Diego. What you hear at WGN's wavelength is one of NPL's harmonics, as the station is transmitting at long wavelength considerably above the broadcast band, but an even multiple of the frequency falls at 720 kilocycles. This can only be remedied by making enough noise about it so that the Navy Department will take steps to eliminate the harmonic. It practically ruins reception from WGN all over Southern California.

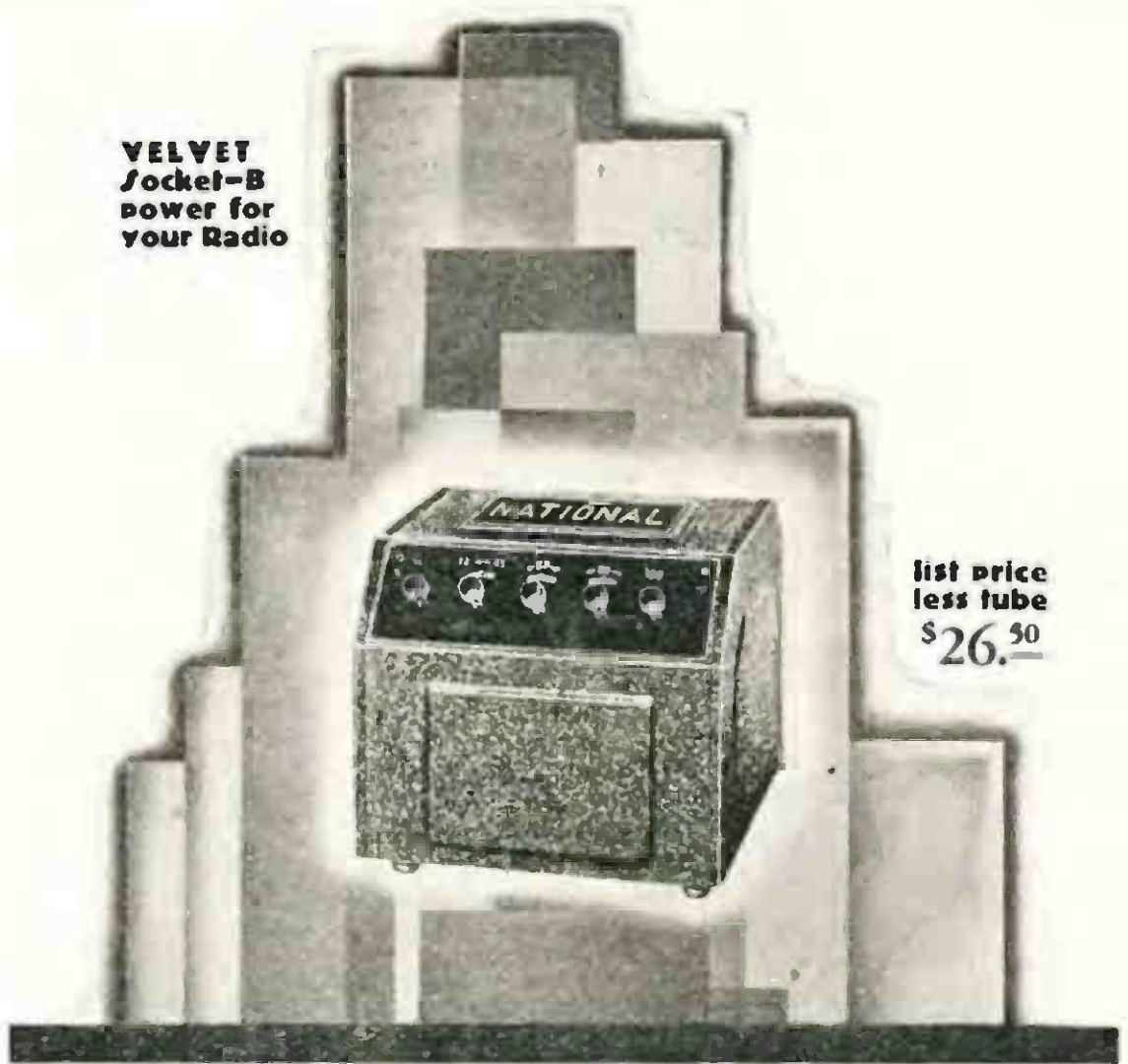

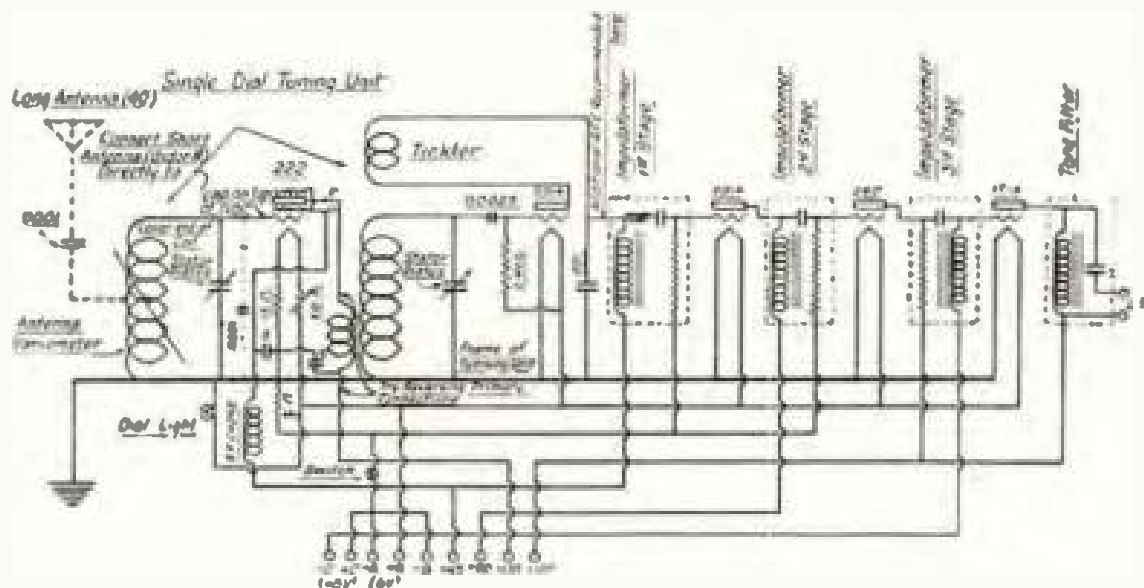
When one of the new UX-222 tubes is used with an R. F. transformer, in connection with the Browning-Drake circuit, not only is the sensitivity or distance-getting ability of the receiver improved to a marked degree, but also the necessity for neutralization, and any tendency toward undesired oscillation of the Radio-frequency stage completely eliminated. This condition results in better tone quality, as the regeneration in the detector circuit may readily be controlled without affecting the stability of the radio-frequency stage.

Moreover, by the use of the special National Browning-Drake Transformer with a high impedance slot-wound pri-

Receiver is very simple and straight forward.

There is only one long lead carrying R. F.—that from the plate of the UX-222 to the primary of the R. F. Transformer. This should be run below the sub-panel in as straight a line as possible. Other parts are located so that there will be no need of any other long R. F. leads. The heavy line in the diagram indicates the frame of the tuning unit, which is at ground potential. By connecting to this frame at convenient points as shown, the wiring is much simplified.

When first putting the receiver into operation, set the inductive trimmer (the



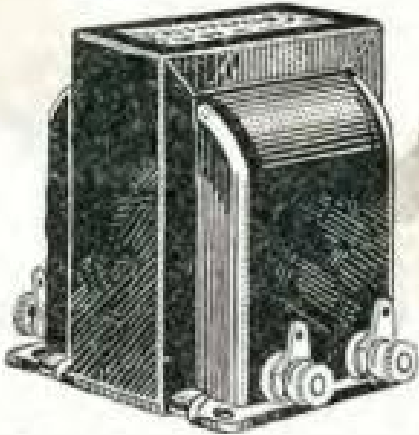
mary, the necessity for shielding is eliminated when proper care is given to the placing of the coils and condensers. This is fully covered in the National type 222 B-D Tuning-Unit, specified in the National Shield-Grid Five.

In performance, the National Shield-Grid Five, although so simple to build and operate, is capable of remarkable results. It is so sensitive that only a very few feet of antenna are sufficient for full volume D. X. operation. Three to five feet of antenna indoors should be sufficient in most cases for loud speaker reception from stations 1,000 miles away under good receiving conditions, and with such short antenna the selectivity leaves very little to be desired.

The actual assembly and wiring of the

knob on the left) in mid position, loosen the set screws on the tuning condensers and then carefully tune in a local station by moving the two tuning condensers separately. Thus the condensers may be brought into step. The screws can then be tightened and thereafter any slight variation may be compensated for by the trimmer. If the two condensers are not lined up, there will be broadness of tuning and lack of sensitivity. In tuning for distance stations, the use of regeneration in the detector circuit will be of great assistance, and it is possible because of the blocking action of the UX-222 to oscillate the detector and pick up stations by their carriers without radiating the squeals from the antenna and annoying the neighbors.

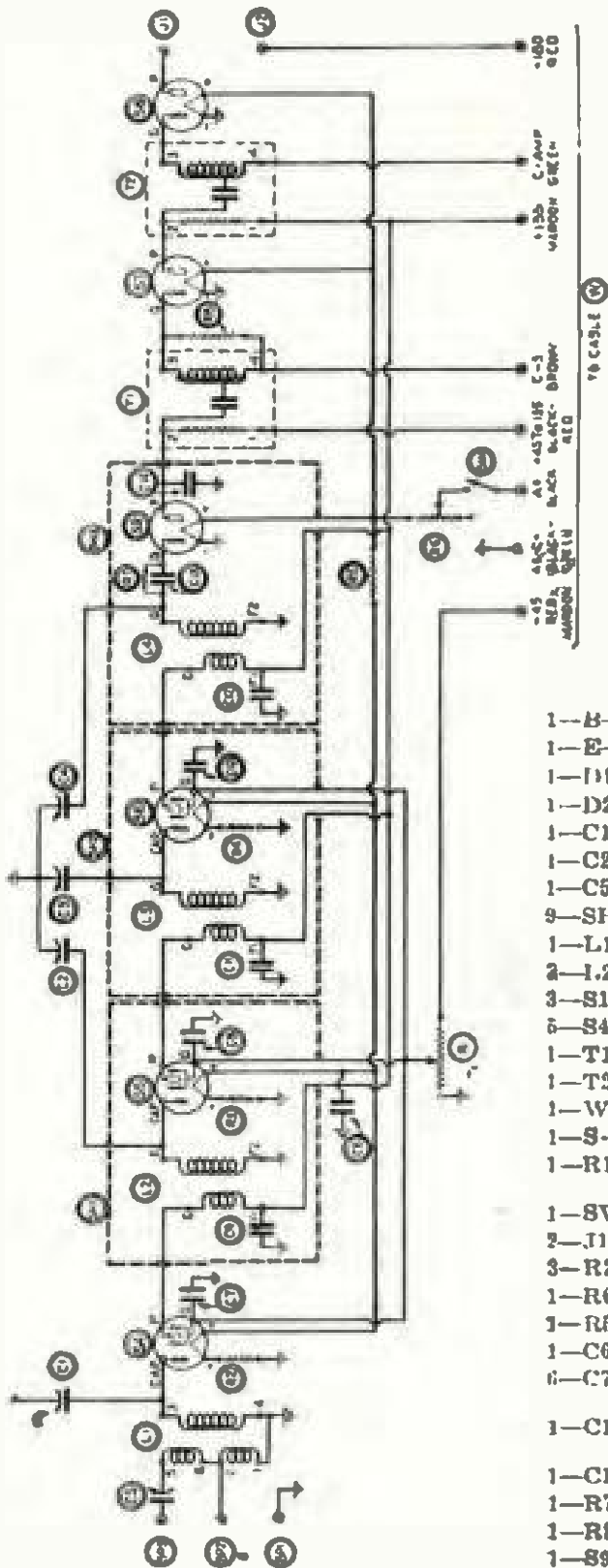

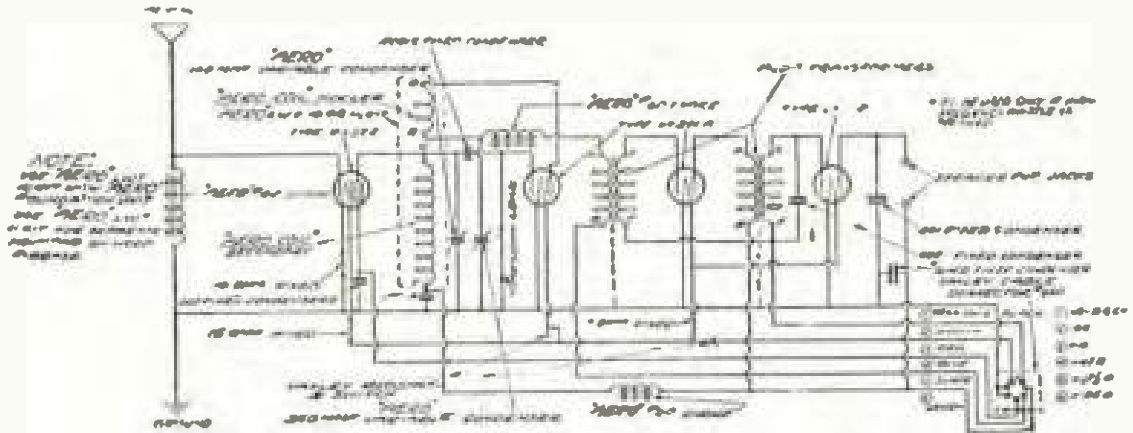
The Aero International Four

The Aero International short-wave receiver employs a shielded grid tube as an R. F. amplifier ahead of the regenerative detector. The R. F. stage is untuned, being blocked in with an impedance between antenna and ground. Impedance coupling is used between the R. F. tube and the detector to take advantage of the high gain of the shielded grid tube.

As is standard practice with Aero, regeneration is by fixed tickler and controlled by a variable condenser. Three R. F. choke coils are vital units in the circuit, two of the regular No. 60 chokes and a new one especially designed for

amplification of signal before it reaches the detector, but it performs two other functions. It prevents the regenerative detector from radiating when in the oscillating condition, and it eliminates the "holes" in the tuning range usually experienced. These "holes" are due to the antenna at the natural period, or multiples thereof, subtracting enough energy from the tuned circuit to cause the detector tube to cease oscillating in narrow bands.

Oscillation control is smooth and noiseless in this set. This feature and the general stability of operation is due to the efficiency of the chokes and placing of by-pass condensers to isolate the various circuits.



the grid circuit of the shielded grid tube.

All battery wires are twisted into a cable, while wires carrying R. F. current are very short and well separated from each other and all other battery leads. Set builders should follow this arrangement closely.

The complete wiring is indicated in the diagram. All battery connections are made through a Yaxley cable. The parts are mounted on a metal sub-panel and Micarta panel supplied with the foundation unit. The new Aero audio transformers are used, giving the set very fine tone quality.

The use of the shielded grid R. F. stage not only affords considerable am-

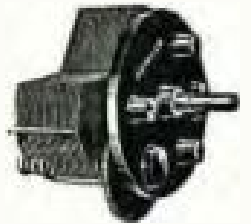
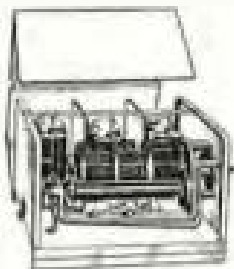

"DX—huh! You ain't heard nothin' yet—you ought to hear the Japs and Ausies tear in on my new Radiola 60 Superhet—not just getting 'em—but real quality reception. Just like local!"

Thus Captain of Detectives A. J. Staten addressed the writer the day after we had sold him a new A. C. set.

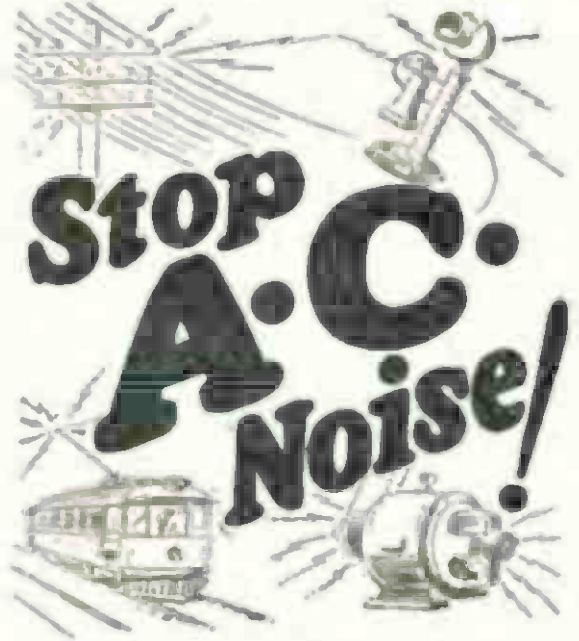
Now, we had heard the Japs and Ausies many times before on divers neotrodynes, superhets and custom-built sets, and had been none-too-well pleased with the results. For this reason we had never tried out the 60 on them, thinking the reception would be about the same.

However, Captain Staten's lady interested us again and a party at the skipper's house was speedily arranged. The early evening was passed, tuning in Eastern stations, and some DX reception!—WHAS, Louisville; KDKA, Pittsburg; WLW, Cincinnati; WGN, WGNB and several other Chicago stations; CNRV in Canada; WTMJ, Milwaukee; WOR, Newark; KMOX, St. Louis; WJZ, New York; KMA, Shenandoah, Iowa; WBT, Charlottesville, N. C.; and many other Easterners all were brought in—loud and clear as local.

At 12:45 a. m. the Japs started coming, and JOAK first boomed in. Captain Staten had invited four local Japanese people to hear their native land and, incidentally, act as interpreters. During the morning, JOAK, JOBK, JOCK, JOIK and JOFK were logged. The material broadcast was mostly talking, interspersed, at long intervals, with a little music.

One station, JOAK, had on a children's hour similar to the old KJZ Uncle John's broadcast. Children's stories were told, including one about hiding horses, and small children sang.

Another station told historical stories called, in Japanese, Kodan. There were exercises celebrating the coronation of the new Emperor, musical selections, played on three tree instruments in trio, accompanied with woman's singing. These weird sounding instruments are called Gimmisan, Koto and Chikuhaski. Several Japanese selections were recorded on an aluminum phonograph disc, so loud did the signals come in.

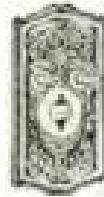

The Find-All A.C. Band Pass Receiver

It is a simple matter to design a highly selective radio receiver. It is also easy to construct a set having splendid tone quality. However, it has been extremely difficult, in the past, to combine both selectivity and true tone reproduction in the one receiver. The Find-All A.C. Band Pass Receiver accomplishes this feat.

The Band Pass Selector consists of a system of reactances (inductance coils and variable condensers), arranged so that they are mutually balanced, not merely at a single frequency, but at a group or band of frequencies. (Definition: Reactance is that property of an electric circuit, aside from its ohmic resistance, which tends to oppose the flow of an electric current.) While the reactances are balanced within any particular band, they are unbalanced outside this band, thus being non-responsive to all frequencies outside the band in question.

The Band Pass Selector in the Find-All Band Pass Receiver consists of the parts shown within the shields in the top view illustration. There are two resonant circuits, one of which consists of the secondary of the Aero coil (4) and a Hammarlund .0005 mfd. variable condenser (6). The other resonant circuit consists of the secondary of Aero coil (9), and another Hammarlund .0005 mfd. variable condenser (8). These circuits are carefully matched and resonate to the same frequency. They are coupled to each other by a small mutual inductance coil (7). When the two resonant circuits are exactly balanced at any frequency, by adjusting the variable condensers to the same capacity, the total reactance of the entire circuit is highest at that particular frequency, due to the presence of the mutual inductance (7). At values of frequency immediately above and immediately below the particular frequency under consideration, the total reactance of the band selector circuit is zero. After passing these two zero points, the reactance again becomes very high. Stated in a few words, the effect of the band pass selector is to give two points of zero reactance immediately above and below any particular frequency to which the circuit is tuned.

The circuits of the Find-All Band

Pass Receiver are shown in two separate diagrams. It is recommended that the set be built in two separate parts, with the band pass selector, the three R.F. stages, the detector and the first audio stage in one portion and the Thordarson push-pull power amplifier and "A," "B" and "C" power supply in the other portion.

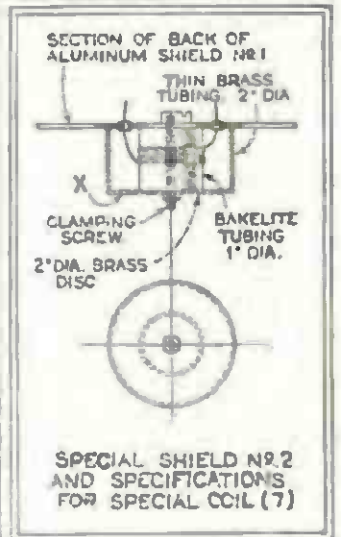
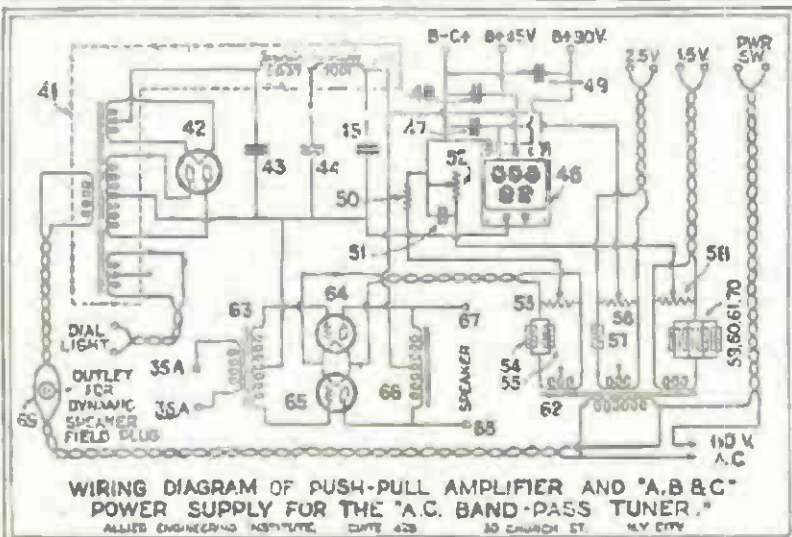
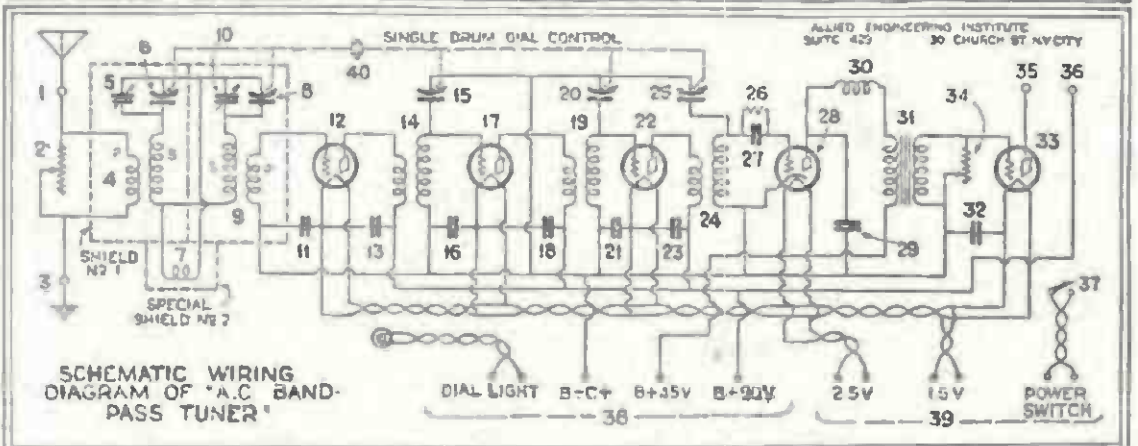
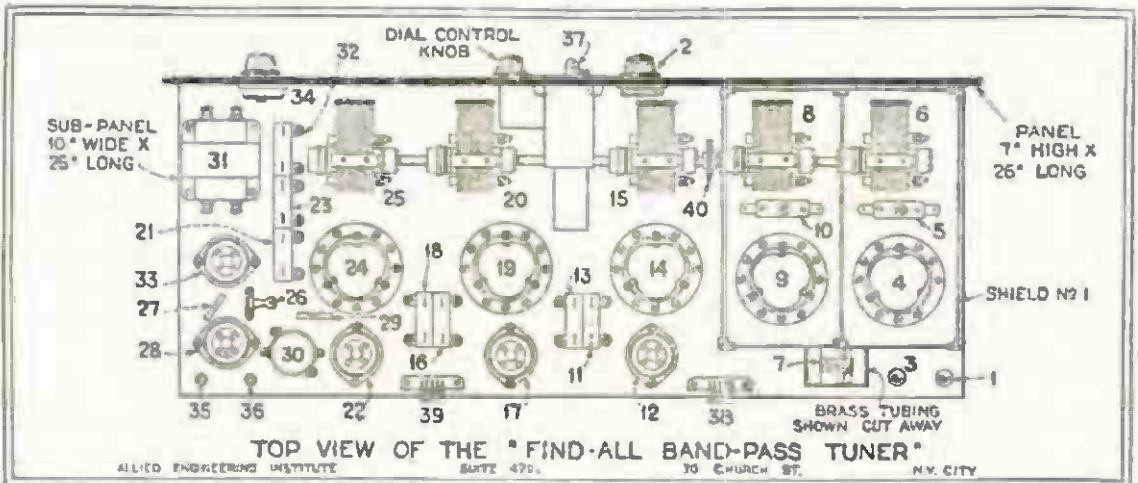
The only special part is the coil (7), which can be wound readily in accordance with the following directions:

Procure a piece of 1" diameter bakelite tubing, 1 1/4" long. On this form, wind 5 turns of No. 26 double cotton covered Corwico magnet wire. The winding should be in the center of the tubing, in order to minimize absorption as much as possible. The special shield, No. 2, for this coil, can be made out of a piece of thin brass tubing, 2" in diameter and 1 1/4" long. One end of the brass tubing rests against the Hammarlund shield, as shown in the illustrations. The other end is closed by a flat brass disc. A 6/32 machine screw, about 1 1/2" long, is used to fasten special shield No. 2 to the large aluminum shield No. 1. The accompanying diagram gives structural details. The tubing on which the coil (7) is wound is filed so that it is held rigidly in position between the aluminum shield and the brass disc, when the nut on the 6/32 machine screw is tightened. Leads for the coil are passed through holes drilled in the aluminum shield.

The transformers used in the amplifier and power supply portion of the receiver are all of Thordarson manufacture. Correct "B" and "C" voltages are obtained through the use of an Electrad Truvolt Divider and Electrad fixed and variable Truvolts. A Polymet condenser block is specified. The ever-necessary amperites are mounted on the amplifier baseboard. Complete List of Parts Required for the 10 K. C. Band Pass Tuner

- 1—Aero Universal Tuned R. F. Kit, containing 3 matched R.F. Transformers, type U-12 (4, 9, 14).

- 5—.0005 mfd. Hammarlund "Mid-Line" Variable Condensers (6, 8, 15, 20, 25).

Here is the first layout for the set-builder incorporating a band-pass filter system ahead of the first amplifier tube. A selector and R.F. amplifier which passes a 10 K.C. band with a comparatively flat top instead of the usual "peak" with its cut side-bands and loss in quality. This type of circuit is the answer to the problem of "selectivity with quality."

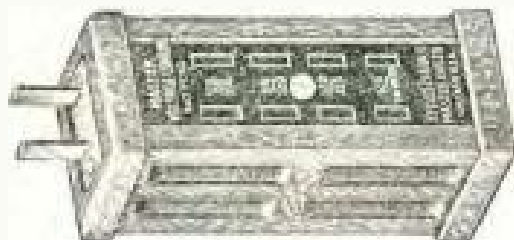

Master Voltage Control Now in Heavy Duty Type

The Master Voltage Control unit, which has so successfully met the line voltage variation problems, is now made in a heavy duty type with a capacity of 100 watts. This type is especially designed for sets with built-in dynamic speakers such as Majestics, Sparton, Radiola 62, Zenith, Kolster, Day-Fan, Amrad, etc.

There are no moving parts and nothing to get out of adjustment and the unit is easily and quickly installed by



anyone. It is air-cooled and does not heat excessively.

The little Master unit plugs into the wall socket and then the radio set plugs into one of four outlets in the unit, marked 110-115, 115-120, 120-125, and 125-over. These figures represent the value of the line voltage, and when properly connected the Master unit serves to regulate the voltage so that just the right value is applied to the filaments of the tubes in the radio set.

The Standard type, with a capacity of 60 watts, is now universally used in connection with such sets as the Radiola 18, Atwater Kent, Stewart-Warner, etc., which do not draw more than 40-60 watts.

Tube Checkers

Set owners, who know little of the dealers' problems, often fail to appreciate the precaution which dealers have taken to insure radio satisfaction in the home.

Thousands of dealers must carry testing devices for sets and tubes, must

make sure of the efficiency of radio equipment before it is sold, and must continue to give service during the life of the receivers.

One of the most popular devices on the market for testing tubes is The Sterling Manufacturing Company's tube checker, designed to assure service.

This little device shows whether the tube has proper emission to insure lasting performance, and it also shows just where the short circuit occurs in shorted tubes, indicating whether the trouble lies between the filament and grid, plate and grid, or plate and filament.

Set owners should get one spare tube for every different type in their set as the best insurance against possible annoyance. Remember that a radio tube wears out only through use, and a spare tube will always be as good as a new one for an indefinite period. In purchasing a new set, it is always well to have the dealer supply the spare tubes necessary. In case the set owner already has his equipment, the dealer will be able to tell him what types of tubes to provide for.

Normally your receiver will tune in the local broadcasting band of 200 to 550 meters, but when the Flewelling adaptor is plugged in, your receiver is able to tune in the short wave broadcasting band of 17 to 85 meters.

The Flewelling Short Wave Adaptor is not an experiment. It thoroughly proved its value before being offered to the public by picking up 5SW of Chelmsford, England, so satisfactorily that the English station was rebroadcast through station WSAI (Cincinnati) every day for a week. At this time the adaptor was able to bring in 5SW for 61 consecutive days (Saturdays and Sundays excepted as 5SW does not operate on these days).

That radio reception is always better at night is not true of short wave reception, which is often better during the day. Hence the fact that at a distant station, it might be midnight, while at your receiver it is mid-day will not have much bearing on your reception.

Selectivity takes on a new meaning, for if you now have 20 broadcasting stations operating in and around your city, you can with the Flewelling Adaptor tune right through them.

There is some static in the short wave band, but as a conservative estimate places it as only about one-tenth as much as on the regular band one becomes delighted with the quietness of reception even during the summer months. The wonderful manner in which WGY and KDKA often comes in is a delight to the listener.

West Now Faring Better Than East

Letters and telegrams which are being received in piles and bundles by the Radio Commission regarding the reallocation plan are beginning to show a definite trend. This indicates that while there are many complaints, there are also many satisfied customers. Also that the wide open spaces of the west are receiving better radio service while the eastern states are not as good as before the reallocation.

This very fact, that reception in the west is apparently better while in the east it is not so good, puts the matter right at the door of the Congress of the United States.

Listeners of the country, in commenting on the plan, and particularly in their uncomplimentary remarks about the work of the Commission, are entirely losing track of the fact that the reallocation has been worked out, not for the pleasure of the Commission, but at the direct request of Congress, and in accordance with the law passed at the last session.

This law was instigated, in great measure, by the fact that the farmers of the west were not getting the radio reception that they thought they were entitled to. In working out the reallocation plan, the Commission had to take cognizance of the fact that the north, south and west were entitled to more radio facilities, and the east to less. That is just what the Commission has done, and it is from those sections of the country that the complaints are coming from primarily.

Taking some of the thousands of letters that are being received as a cross section, there is every indication that the plan is a success. There are, of course, certain "bad spots," and it is just as certain that the Commission will see that these places are smoothed out. Among them can be mentioned St. Louis, Boston, Baltimore and Washington. In all of these localities, however, the situation is purely a local one, and one in which there will be no very great difficulty in reaching an adjustment.
