THERE was Edison and his electric light.

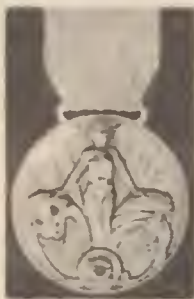
Bell and his telephone.

The Wrights and their flying machine.

Marconi and his wireless.

There may be more. There may be a mysterious power in man's mind which today is hardly more than suspected. At least, so believe certain scientists. They believe that the little-understood power of telepathy will one day be released and made to work for mankind. To that end, one of the year's most astonishing radio programs is dedicated.

Commander E. F. McDonald, builder of Zenith radios and head of the Zenith Foundation, is responsible for this unusual series of broadcasts. Immediately, no startling results are expected, of that we are certain. Possibly these tests may result in no great increase of our knowledge of how telepathy may be harnessed or developed. But they do represent the scientific method of trial and error. They do represent an attack on a stubborn problem in the grand and limitless fashion that could be made possible only by radio.

Because this series of broadcasts brings us a new kind of enjoyment, because it prods our senses, and permits us to share in the exploration of an alluring, provocative scientific mystery, we give to the Zenith Foundation and its radio programs Radio Guide's Medal of Merit. To the millions whose listening hours are filled usually with music and jest, we suggest that you pause at ten p.m. EST this Sunday night, to tune to one of the NBC-Red stations. Your reward will be great.

SUNDAY

Lucrezia Bori . . . rarity

Retired Spanish Soprano Lucrezia Bori returns to the new series of the Ford Sunday Evening Hour for a guest appearance. CBS, Sunday, 9 p.m. EST.

Fifty years old and at last away from the hustle of her career, Bori spends much of her time helping young singers. Her work is limited to such rare concert or radio appearances as she makes this evening.

Sunday Night Party . . . finis

James Melton, Tom Howard, George Shelton, Robert Dolan's orchestra and the New Yorker's chorus close the Sunday Night Party. NBC, Sunday, 10 p.m. EST.

Melton's first season as a big-time singer, talker, all-around master of ceremonies winds up in a blaze of glory. He promises to sing the songs he has wanted to sing all season. It certainly should be a rough and rollicking evening's entertainment.

MONDAY

Court of Heirs . . . cash

The "Court of Missing Heirs" will attempt to find rightful claimants to estates tied up in banks. A new series, on CBS, Monday, 7 p.m. EST.

Dramatizing the lives of persons who died without apparent heirs. Writers Al Shebel, James Waters hope to help locate relatives to take some of the dead-men's treasure.

Bob Burns . . . pinch-hitter

Bob joins Tony Martin, Ray Noble's orchestra on the Grape Nuts show as George Burns, Gracie Allen go vacationing. NBC, Monday, 8 p.m. EST. For the West, 8:30 p.m. MST, 7:30 p.m. PST.

"Names made news." This week Bob Burns is the name. There's no relationship between Bob and George, but Gracie decided there's nothing like a familiar name to keep things going. Accordingly, Friend Bob has been drafted to head a stellar parade of guest pinch-hitters during the four-week vacationing period.

"Stella Dallas" . . . sobs

The cinema cast, headed by Barbara Stanwyck, John Boles, Ann Shirley, brings an old tear-jerker to the Lux Radio Theater. CBS, Monday, 9 p.m. EST.

With three inches of padding under her clothes, wadding in her cheeks, Barbara was unrecognized by friends during filming of last scenes of "Stella Dallas." On the air, listeners will recognize, not Stanwyck, but unmatched melodrama.

TUESDAY

"Dear Teacher" . . . kid quiz

A children's program, "Dear Teacher," with unannounced talent, applies the "Prof. Quiz" technique to juveniles. CBS, Tues., Thurs., Sat., 5:45 p.m. EST.

Hardest problem confronting "Prof. Quiz" (Craig Earl) is "cold feet," or mike fright, in his contestants for \$25 prizes. "Dear Teacher" backers hope—although they can hardly believe—their young charges may be less self-conscious than their elders.

Erno Rapee . . . little man

The conductor of the General Motors Symphony will be interviewed by Nellie Revel on her program. NBC, Tuesday, 5:15 p.m. EST.

Rapee is called "the little man with the big orchestras" because of his size and his background. He helped bring great music to the movies, theaters and networks. He has been musical director of NBC and of the Radio City Music Hall.

Frank Fay . . . comeback?

Frank Fay, "Elf of the Ether," returns to the air as guest of Al Jolson, with Martha Raye and

Parkyakarkus. Tuesday, CBS, 8:30 p.m. EST. For the West, 9:30 p.m. MST, 8:30 PST.

Fay left Broadway to become a hit as a long-run guest of Rudy Vallee, but flopped on his own show for the same sponsor. He has since been on the air only on occasional guest spots.

Amos 'n' Andy . . . on Mardi Gras

The blackface boys, who tried another type of comedy on the Hollywood Mardi Gras premiere, return by request of listeners for more of the same. Tuesday, NBC, 9:30 p.m. EST.

Listeners were amazed to hear Amos and Andy out of character on the first Lanny Ross-Charlie Butterworth show, will be delighted to hear the boys again as themselves.

WEDNESDAY

Curtis Institute . . . pupils

Philadelphia's famed Curtis Institute of Music takes the air for the eighth consecutive year, broadcasting music by its pupils. CBS, Wednesday, 4 p.m. EST.

Among the student-artists to be heard on the series are pupils of Estelle Liebling, violoncello; Efrem Zimbalist, violin; Josef Hoffman, piano. At least five concerts by a 75-piece symphony orchestra will be included.

Nino Martini . . . return

Formerly featured soloist on the Chesterfield programs with Andre Kostelanetz' orchestra, Martini returns to the new series as guest. CBS, Wednesday, 9 p.m. EST.

Martini's tenor voice covers more than two and a half octaves; he sings F above high C in full voice. He was the first singer to receive the Columbia Medal for Distinguished Contribution to Radio.

Hildegard . . . secret songs

Hildegard, who left Milwaukee to find fame abroad, guests on "Your Hit Parade" with Mark Warnow's orchestra. Stuart Allen, Freddie Gibson. NBC, Wednesday, 10 p.m. EST.

In her second radio appearance since a summer at London's Ritz Hotel (first was with Vallee, Sept. 30), America's Cinderella girl will introduce two songs never heard before in this country. Until then she's hiding the songs' titles, melodies.

THURSDAY

Charlie McCarthy . . . and godfather

Charlie McCarthy, chaperoned by Edgar Bergen, of course, returns to be interviewed by Rudy Vallee, who discovered the dummy-and-mouthpiece pair. NBC, Thursday, 9 p.m. EST.

Bergen hesitated to sign a radio contract after appearing on Vallee's show once because he didn't want to use up his few routines on the radio. Tonight Vallee and Bergen will recall that incident and others in ventriloquism's comeback under Edgar Bergen.

FRIDAY

Dr. Damrosch . . . appreciation

Dr. Walter Damrosch inaugurates the tenth season of his Music Appreciation Hour, an educational and cultural feature. NBC, Friday, 2 p.m. EST.

The premiere program finds Dr. Damrosch in his seventy-fifth year, but still able to interest well over six million people a week in what he is doing. Uncounted adults join in listening to a program chiefly designed to help children appreciate fine music.

Singin' Sam . . . songseller

Singin' Sam, who is Harry Frankel in real life, guests for Kitty Carlisle, Frank Crumit, Reed Kennedy and Alice Cornett on the Song Shop. CBS, Friday, 10 p.m. EST.

Frankel received 25,000 letters for one week's broadcasting in Cleveland in radio's early days. His intimate, home-like songs remain as popular today. On this appearance he will delve into his repertoire of old favorites, adding them to the stock-in-trade of the Shop.

HOLLYWOOD BLESSING OR MENACE?

RADIO MOVES WEST? WHY?
WHAT IS HOLLYWOOD'S BIG
ALLURE? IS IT NECESSARY?

TODAY nine out of ten of radio's big-time personality programs come to you from Hollywood. Not two out of ten, not six out of ten, but nine out of ten!

The change came about slowly. First one, then another radio star quietly drifted out to the West Coast. Hardly anyone noticed it. But it has gone on steadily and surely. Hollywood today is the center of broadcasting in America.

Is it a good thing or is it bad? Do not pass over the question lightly. On the answer to it depends the pleasure and satisfaction you get out of your radio during this next year and perhaps the year after.

How did the incredible, unnoticed modern Gold Rush to Hollywood start? A few years back the radio sponsors discovered something that you and I have always known. They discovered that all of us Americans are hero-worshippers. Just as every schoolboy worships his favorite baseball players, so the rest of us are fascinated by the outstanding personalities in any field. Hence the sponsors developed the typical "guest star" program. Jack Benny made his radio bow as a guest on a Broadway columnist's program. Burns and Allen guested for Eddie Cantor. Rudy Vallee launched Joe Penner, Allee Faye and a dozen others as guests—more recently, Edgar Bergen and Charlie McCarthy. (It is worth noting that every one of those names is now in Hollywood or signed to a Hollywood contract.)

THEN somebody had the really bright idea. People gladly dialed to programs studded with personalities, did they? Well, why not exploit the most powerfully attractive group of personality names in the world, the Hollywood movie stars?

NBC's first Hollywood pick-up broadcast was a truly memorable affair. The date was January 4, 1928. On that night the Dodge Motors Victory Hour picked up Will Rogers in Hollywood. Will, acting as master of ceremonies, introduced Paul Whiteman, whose orchestra played from

New York. Then, with switch-backs to Will, the program moved to New Orleans for Al Jolson and to Chicago for Fred Stone and his daughter Paula. Fred was just off crutches and appearing in a musical show there, after doctors had told him he would never walk again. Rogers, Stone, Jolson, Whiteman—that was a historic broadcast. But it has proved to be historic in more than one sense.

For a while, testing out the idea, they merely switched five or ten minutes of Hollywood into a regular program now and then. Clark Gable or Ginger Rogers came on the air with a "Hello, everybody" and a few minutes of chit-chat. Outside of paying Clark or Ginger, the extra attraction cost nothing. The broadcasting companies cheerily furnished the service free, the only objectionable feature being a fifteen-second span of silence while the technicians threw their switch-keys all along the cross-country long-distance telephone line.

BUT as the next step we got some programs originating in Hollywood itself. "Hollywood Hotel" was one, following on the heels of CBS' pioneer "California Melodies," on which film stars were interviewed. "California Melodies" had never been able to secure a sponsor to foot the bills; "Hollywood Hotel" found one at once. That in itself showed the new trend. Another sign of the times was the Lux "Radio Theater." Only so-so in New York, it moved to Hollywood and became a smash hit. And "Parties at Pickfair" and half a dozen other programs sprang into existence.

And today what began as a trickle has become a deluge! During the coming months only two major radio personalities will launch their programs from New York—Kate Smith and Major Bowes. Fred Allen, Amos 'n' Andy, Jack Benny, Burns and Allen, Ben Bernie, Bing Crosby and Bob Burns, the Chase and Sanborn program, Eddie Cantor, Allee Faye and Hal Kemp's orchestra, Jimmy Fidler, Jack Haley, Hollywood Hotel, Jeanette MacDonald, Al Jolson, Lanny Ross and

Charles Butterworth, the Lux Radio Theater, Ken Murray, the Maxwell House program, Joe Penner, One Man's Family, Jack Oakie, Tyrone Power, Irene Rich, the Silver Theater, Ozzie Nelson and Rudy Vallee—all will reach you from California.

In addition, Walt Disney may soon come to the air with a fantasy on the order of his Silly Symphonies. Myrna Loy and William Powell are considering a series of broadcasts, and Lucky Strike and Pepsodent are planning big Hollywood shows. That leaves only Shirley Temple and Greta Garbo as the two Hollywood "names" who have not spoken a few words into the microphones endorsing soap or sugar.

NOW, the question in which RADIO GUIDE is interested—and it is a serious one—is this! What does this epoch-making change, which nobody would have believed could happen a short while ago, mean to you as a radio listener?

Will the quality of programs suffer technically? Will the shows fail to be put together so well on the Coast? The answer here, it seems, is No. The flood of performers to the West has been matched by an equal flood of technical experts. Scores of the broadcasting companies' very best production chiefs are now in Hollywood.

How about the shows' material? A favorite mode of putting a movie star on the air is the dramatic sketch. If the sketch is a scene from a movie it sounds dull on the air and ends up as nothing more than an ad for the film—and not such a good ad. On the other hand, it is the height of foolishness to pay a movie star \$3,000 to act in a skit written for \$50 by an ambitious off-lee-boy. A good actress in a bad playlet simply makes the bad playlet terrible. Gradually, realizing this, Hollywood is drafting its best writers to prepare radio scripts. Arthur Caesar is writing for Al Jolson. George Marion is writing for Jack Oakie. Here Hollywood is forward-looking and constructive. Better writers mean better radio.

THE danger of Hollywood dominance seems to lie not in technique or material divisions but in another direction. It is this:

Fred Allen in New York draws his jokes from the columns of the newspapers. As a result they are national in scope. They are as funny in Astoria, Oregon, as they are in Fostoria, Ohio. But Hollywood is a clannish little world unto itself. Inevitably Fred draws his material there from the studio sets, the Trocadero, the Boulevard. Hollywood is not Fostoria, it is not Astoria, it is not—by any means—America. And often it is not funny. Listen to Fred, to Burns and Allen, to Jack Benny, to W. C. Fields. They are all talking Hollywood. More and more

they are confining their pleasant gabble to producers, stars, retakes, cutting-rooms, cameras. But even if Hollywood has succeeded, there are still 48 states in the Union.

Consider now what must happen if this Hollywood fad passes. CBS is actually afraid to put up its new building in New York, despite the fact that it has paid for the land. Both CBS and NBC are considering erecting super-skyscrapers in Hollywood. But the guest-star programs were put on because the public was growing tired of the standard hours. The movie programs were put on because the public was growing tired of guest stars. What, now, if we tire of movies? Where can radio turn for bigger and better personalities? Nowhere!

Will the Hollywood craze eventually spell the death, once and for all, of personality programs—the very things that started it, and radio's strongest drawing-card? Is radio's coming "big show" the vaudeville or variety type of hour built around a permanent cast—a development of the "Show Boat" or Kraft "Music Hall" idea, a Packard "Hollywood Mardi Gras" with the Hollywood subtracted? There are already a few signs pointing that way.

HOLLYWOOD murdered vaudeville. It is coming within an inch of killing the legitimate theater by draining off all its talent. By draining away radio talent will it also kill radio? Or will radio, simply through filling the air with movies, movies, movies until we all are sick of them, kill Hollywood? The studios are already refusing to let their stars go on the air more than three or four times a year. They are afraid.

And if Hollywood steals all of radio's people away, and we grow tired of Hollywood, then where will radio find new talent? On the other hand, there are prominent men in the radio world who say that all this is the best thing that could have happened. "When people grow tired of movie stars on the air," they say, "we will be forced to develop new talent of our own. The day of radio stars in pictures and picture stars in radio will be over. We will need to educate and develop fresh, young performers for radio alone—and that is what radio needs more than anything else."

Make no mistake. This gigantic change which has come about affects you and your personal enjoyment keenly. The fact must be faced, and the fact is that Hollywood today dominates radio, completely. During the coming months, perhaps throughout the coming year, you will hear little but Hollywood, Hollywood, Hollywood over your radio set.

AFTER all, this is a situation in which you should, in which you must express your feelings, if it is to be settled in your best interests. Bombard your magazines, your newspapers, your local network outlets, even the major broadcasting companies with your letters. It's the one sure way in which radio officials will learn the true preferences of their listeners.

A shot in the arm capable of pepping up a weak program—maybe a future benefactor of radio through forcing it to find new talent—maybe a disease carrying its own final and tragic cure—but at present a dangerous eraze which may start us all to tuning for Alaska and the Fiji Islands just to get away from it: that is what Hollywood means to radio, in the opinion of those who have given the matter thought. And those are all things which most vitally affect you and me, radio's listeners!



HAVING WONDERFUL TIME

BELOVED LUCREZIA BORI BOWS
TO THUNDEROUS APPLAUSE ON
THE FORD HOUR SUNDAY NIGHT

LUCREZIA BORI will sing this Sunday night as guest of the Ford Hour. Her singing there answers many a question; such questions as might be asked, for instance, regarding the voice which once faded to a whisper and was finally brought back by surgery and prayer.

For Miss Bori has said, "When my voice starts going back, I shall quit." For this Sunday night, at least, she has not quit. For opera, for the night-after-night strain of acting and singing, well . . .

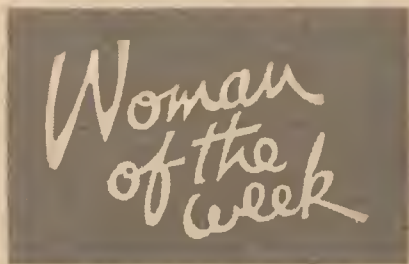
Whenever the giant gold curtain swings apart at the Metropolitan Opera House, orchestra seat number 112, third row center on the right aisle, is invariably occupied these days by a dark, slender and warmly beautiful woman, who sits, rapt with interest, until the last note of the last encore has been sung. For two years she has sat there, never missing a single performance. When the thunderous volleys of applause crash from the tiers of balconies, she eagerly joins in the clapping; and sometimes, slipping into her wraps and moving toward the crowded exits, she causes strangers to stare as she forgetfully hums an aria from "Manon" or "Carmen."

MANY of the "regulars" in the audience, recognizing the familiar figure in seat 112, are moved to pity for her. They whisper behind their programs, strain to glimpse her expression whenever a soprano voice is lifted in some familiar operatic score. Because once it was she who for twenty-five brilliant seasons sang most sensationally those very soprano roles; it was she who bowed and bowed again to the thunderous applause that would not be quieted until she had given as many, often, as a dozen encores. Most beloved—and by Caruso called most beautiful—of all the stars ever to tread the hallowed stage of the Metropolitan, she sits now watching from the sidelines. Onlookers thus are inclined to feel very sorry for her.

Exactly to the contrary, the last

thing on earth that glamorous Lucrezia Bori could possibly do these days is feel sorry for herself. Since she retired from the opera in 1935 she has had more fun, more freedom, more real living than she has ever had in all the rest of her life put together. She can travel where she pleases, eat what she pleases, stay up as late as she wants to. She can spend her mornings gardening instead of rehearsing, her afternoons playing golf instead of rehearsing, her evenings entertaining instead of rehearsing. She can sit in her favorite location at the opera and in complete relaxation enjoy her fill of the music she loves. She can actually walk over the windy red-brown hills of her Adirondack country place in the gloriously casual state of being hatless and scarfless; and if this chance to give her a slight sniffle it isn't going to result in a twelve-thousand-dollar calamity at the Metropolitan box-office nor a major disappointment to a packed house.

No wistful-faced has-been is La



Bori. Feted darling of New York's musical and social circles, her bob is a sleekly sophisticated black cap, her stride vigorous, her skin remarkably fresh and youthful. She wears a size-fourteen dress, gives Nino Martini some pretty fierce competition on a tennis court. To look at her you would not think she could possibly be more than thirty-five. As a matter of fact, Lucrezia Bori will be fifty years old—and proud of it—on Christmas Eve.

And Lucrezia Bori, at practically fifty, is having the time of her life for the first time in her life.

Of course it isn't "done" at the Met for a prima donna to stay in actual retirement after her farewell performance, or for her to find real retirement as happy and full a life as a career. But Bori is famous for blissfully having broken and made more opera tradition than any other star. She unknowingly began this process when she arrived in America in 1912 to make her debut at the age of twenty-three. Opera-goers, accustomed to buxom, billowing prima donnas, couldn't believe their eyes—the new Spanish soprano was slim, petite, a mere ninety-eight pounds!

They instantly loved her. Alas, for some of her heftier competition, Lucrezia Bori had started the fad of slender prima donnas.

Besieged in her dressing-room after her triumphant debut in "Manon Lescaut," she was extremely embarrassed because she spoke no English.

"What do I reply when I meet someone?" she whispered anxiously in French to Andres de Seguro, then a Metropolitan Opera star, now Deanna Durbin's voice teacher.

"It is the custom in America to

lower your eyes and say 'Kiss me' when you are introduced to a man," he answered jokingly.

She didn't know what "Kiss me" meant, but as the long line of newspapermen, celebrities and socialites filed past her Lucrezia lowered her eyes in genuine shyness to every male in the lot and murmured it.

AND most of them did kiss her!—well, her hand, anyway.

With the not-unexpected result that the next day all America, via the newspapers, knew the story of Lucrezia Bori.

That was the story of a girl born of aristocratic parents in Valencia, schooled in a convent until she was eighteen. Bori was "discovered" by Puccini while she was studying voice in Italy. When she came to this country she was accompanied and strictly chaperoned by her father. Colonel Vincente Bori, retired officer from the armies of King Alphonso. In accordance with Spanish custom for ladies of high birth, the young Lucrezia was never allowed to even walk down Park Avenue in broad daylight without her father beside her, much less have an unchaperoned date or

ON THE OPERATIC FRONT

SCRAMBLING OF GRAND OPERA TEMPERAMENTS GIVES PUBLIC RINGSIDE SEAT OF A LIFETIME!

RADIO'S Milky Way of stars—General Motors' winter constellation—is most certain to produce a celestial combustion.

For to match the tempestuous Grace Moore and Maria Jeritza on the same program, with Erno Rapee waving the wand, is like tossing Mussolini and Stalin into the same ring, with Haile Selassie as the referee.

And to complete the experiment of scrambling temperaments, General Motors, always interested in scientific processes, has added Helen Jepson, Erna Saek, Richard Tauber, Jussi Bjoerling, Joseph Schmidt and Donald Dickson to the omelette.

That's like throwing TNT into a smeltery! And it can mean only three things—GM's pocketbook is going to take a lot of punishment, the keenest temperaments in the world are going to clash, and the public is going to get a whale of a lot of great music, with the grandest of grand opera coming right into its living-rooms.

THE program, probably the costliest on the air, began October 3. Nothing like it has been attempted before. The sponsors have organized an opera company of the air—the General Motors Concert Company. And only

on radio is such a program possible, for no opera company could present so many stars on the same program. To hire that many hands and voices is more like talking in terms of national debts.

And that's only the beginning. General Motors Symphony Orchestra will do its chores, John B. Kennedy will have the "center spot" and in two-syllable words will tell adventures in science, and Milton Cross will do the announcing. General Motors will pick up the tab.

It's a prestige program, and there'll be no plugging.

Members of the company will sing exclusively on the radio during the coming season. They have thirteen-week contracts and are out of circulation for other work.

The sponsors, believing radio has come of age, are doing away with the guest-artist type of program. They have organized along the lines of the Metropolitan Opera Company, and will have time and talent, repertory and voice quality of a permanent group, so that a full season of programs can be planned in advance. No longer will they have guest stars from opera companies, but opera companies may have guest stars from radio.

The members will appear on the varying Sunday night programs in solos, duets, and three or four of them at a time.

Which means that eventually the two most temperamental divas—Grace Moore and Maria Jeritza—will meet on the same program. And there is bound to be combustion.

JERITZA—pronounce the J like a G—is Austrian-born. Her temper is as sharp as an Alpine peak. There are Jeritza legends galore. She is the singer who did the famous aria "Vissi d'arte" from Tosca flat on her back. She discovered by accident that she could do it that way.

In rehearsal one day the baritone playing "Searpia," opposite her, hurled her to a sofa. She was supposed to leap back to her feet and go into that "Vissi d'arte" aria. But she was thrown so violently to the sofa that she couldn't get up, so she rolled from the sofa, flat onto her back, and began singing. Thereafter, she always sang the aria from her back! The critics went mad

delinite temperament—a book-throwing temperament.

As this was happening, Erno Rapee—the mighty atom—was beating a path for himself with a baton. Up from the pit—the movie orchestra pit—this Hungarian came. A diminutive fellow, with long black hair and a vocabulary of profanity that would make a marine jealous—he fought his way up, and in the scramble developed a temperament which is declared to be as spicy as paprika in his native land.

So what's going to happen when a hillbilly, a Hungarian and an Austrian meet on the same program? The public never knows what goes on behind the mike, but it's an odds-on bet that the Moore-Jeritza feud will make history. Rapee will have to be the referee—the second for each duelist.

Even great singers are not above mike dueling. The code of honor does not call for coffee and pistols at dawn, but there are ways of fighting duels over the radio. It's called "mike-hogging" on the air and it's the same thing as rabbit-punching in the prize ring. A singer can very easily subdue a rival by hugging the microphone and making the opponent's voice sound very weak and rather flabby.

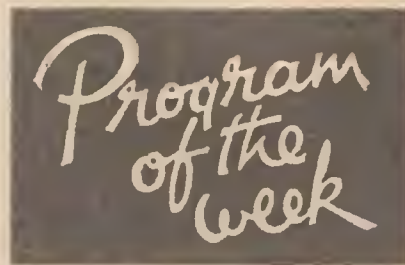
OPERA companies long have avoided feuds simply by not playing two divas on the same program. But General Motors is going to do it.

Most shows call for one prima donna—one star—because showmen know that when two stars meet an explosion is inevitable. But besides Moore, Jeritza and Rapee, General Motors is mixing Swedes, Englishmen and Americans. It's going to be a League of Nations program.

Here are thumb-nail sketches of the other stars:

Erna Saek chips her notes from the rainbow. She can sing C above high C, which is as high as any voice ever has reached. Only one other person ever sang such a note. She was Jenny Lind. Miss Saek discovered she could

BELOVED DEAN OF MUSIC, DR. WALTER DAMROSCH, CELEBRATES HIS 10TH ANNIVERSARY FRIDAY

THE elevator stopped at two and then five. Out stepped a man with sparkling eyes set deep under bushy eyebrows, clothed in frocked tunic and striped breeches, broad-shouldered, medium in height, hardly showing his seventy-five years. With unassumed dignity, he looked to the right and to the left. Then he walked toward the smartly uniformed page stationed behind a stream-lined desk with telephones and buttons and papers.

"Can you tell me where Mr. Black's office is, please? I always forget." His smile was kindly.

"Who shall I say is calling?" the page inquired as he faced the man with the grayed bushy hair.

"Mr. Damrosch," came the quiet answer.



Millions of Americans know, or know of, the man one National Broadcasting Company page failed to recognize from his place behind the desk where executives pass to doors where broadcasting history is made. Paul Whiteman may be called the dean of modern music, Wayne King the dean of the waltz, and Benny Goodman the dean of swing, but Dr. Walter Damrosch is the uncontested dean of all of radio that is musical.

That is not his title; he has no parchment on his office wall that proclaims him for his worth. But radio authorities say, and listeners everywhere agree, that Dr. Damrosch has done more than any other one individual to make a nation conscious of good music.

On this Friday this grand old man will celebrate his tenth anniversary as conductor of the NBC Music Appreciation Hour. Unfortunately, radio has no measuring-stick, but from surveys made in some seventy widely separated cities and towns it has been estimated that Dr. Damrosch is reaching more than six millions of listeners in schools alone, not to mention the adults who hear his programs in their homes. Little children are learning to define the overtones which mark the difference between a clarinet and a flute, an oboe and a trumpet, a French horn and an English horn, almost as soon as they learn that not all apples are red. Educators have taken Dr. Damrosch to their hearts.

This teacher of millions came to America in 1870, inspired by a sight of the great Richard Wagner conducting at Bayreuth. He had been trained thoroughly in the fundamentals of notes by his father, Dr. Leopold Damrosch, who was a well-known conductor in Breslau, where Walter was born. In New York's melting-pot, Walter found a different life; found himself back in grade one because of his ignorance of English. As the boy climbed back up the grades, he climbed, too, in music, sang in the New York Oratorio Society at eleven, conducted the Newark Harmonic Society, and at eighteen was sort of unofficial assistant at the Metropolitan Opera. His father's death left the Metropolitan without a man versed in German opera, and Walter was shoved into the breach, taking the company on tour while not yet 23 years old.

His radio debut was made October 29, 1923, when his lecture recital on Beethoven was broadcast from Carnegie Hall by NBC, following in 1925 with the first symphonic concert ever given exclusively for radio broadcasting.

A fact which few people know is that Dr. Damrosch brought about the amalgamation of the New York Symphony Society and the Philharmonic Society under the name of the Philharmonic-Symphony Society of New York, the great organization which this year will broadcast by radio on a rival network.

Dr. Damrosch will continue to climb, for, as he says, "I'm as young as I feel, and that's very, very youthful."

"LET'S TALK IT OVER" BRINGS MEMORABLE STRUGGLES OF 4 CO-ED REBELS—MONDAY

HIGHER education isn't meant for women. A woman's place is in the home, and she has no business being anywhere else."

That was the opinion of many educators once upon a time, back in the days when the talk was still about the pros and cons of the War of 1812.

So the best people of the so-called upper classes were shocked no end when a little college, just four years old, took the momentous step of admitting four women students. And what was more shocking and disgusting, these four women had to work for their tuition—had to do, of all unearthy things, the laundry for the men students.

But the world soon gets over its biased ways of thinking. Oberlin College, in Oberlin, Ohio, the pioneering school, came to be honored as it graduated such noted alumnae as Lucy Stone, women's rights leader; Adena Miller Rich, head of Hull House, Chicago; and Helen Shafer, former president of Wellesley College.

It has been a long climb, not always on smooth ground, since that day in 1837, when the four rebels did the laundry and received pennies and "book learning" in exchange. That will be the story the "Let's Talk It Over" program will tell this Monday afternoon over the NBC-Blue network when it helps Oberlin celebrate its centennial.

THOSE first four women students maintained their connections with the college for the rest of their lives, and their influence will be noted on the program when Miss Janice Rudd, now a sophomore at Oberlin and a descendant of one of the quartet, steps before the microphone to tell what Oberlin in 1937 is like. There is real school loyalty in a family when its daughters and daughters' daughters go back to the same classrooms for one hundred years.

The program, most of which will originate from the campus of the college, will be opened by Miss Marguerite Woodworth, new dean of women, and formerly dean of women at Lawrence College. Miss Woodworth will discuss the subject, "College Education for Women in 1837 and 1937." Miss Alice Little, member of the class of '88, whose mother was the second woman graduate of Oberlin who was permitted to deliver her essay at commencement, will also speak.

Following the portion of the program coming from Oberlin, Muriel Draper, distinguished author and lecturer, will make her first appearance in a fortnightly series on the "Let's Talk It Over" program. Mrs. Draper is the author of "Music at Midnight," and also a number of articles on such cultural subjects as art, literature, the opera, ballet and decoration.

Alma Kitchell, contralto soloist and mistress of ceremonies, and Josef Honti's concert orchestra will be heard in their usual weekly capacities.

"COURT OF MISSING HEIRS" OFFERS DRAMA, SUGAR-COATED WITH DOLLARS—ON MONDAY

THERE was Uncle Shelby, who died the year before Great-Aunt Carrie had her operation for a carbuncle . . . And Cousin Martha remembers that uncle on her father's side who went west to Oklahoma and was never heard of again . . . And that scandal. Remember—somebody's first wife ran away to Chicago, and years later wrote one letter on Palmer House stationery? And wasn't there some money tied up some way?

Didn't Uncle Shelby say years ago that no Confederate raiders would ever find *his*? Wasn't there a railroad man who came in town once and said he'd seen a rich old man in Oklahoma who said he had relatives here? And that Palmer House letter . . . she must have had money!

Perhaps there *was* money. Every year the hoard of wealth in the country's banks grows—because somebody died without naming an heir. Because lawyers could find no relatives. Because somebody didn't know his rich uncle had died. The amount of money in banks today for these reasons totals millions. And it is steadily growing.

Radio's first attempt to do something about it will take the air this Monday night. The "Court of Missing Heirs," on CBS, will attempt to locate the heirs to estates which have been tied up in banks because the rightful claimants' identities were not known. If the program is successful, millions of dollars of hoarded wealth will be released to its owners!

THE program is the result of years of investigation by two young Chicago writers, Al Shebel and James Waters. Together they have dug into musty old records, into "family trees," court reports and newspaper files, collecting data for their radio program.

The show will be heard as a dramatic series—but it will be drama with a new kind of value. "Bank Night" never offered prizes in theaters such as radio's offering on the "Court of Missing Heirs"! This is entertainment sugar-coated—with dollars!

On each program the life of some person who died with money hidden away in a bank will be dramatized.

The facts which will make up the dramatizations have all been authenticated by Shebel and Waters through court records. No wild-goose chases will be started by their scripts. But in addition to factual reporting of the lives of their subjects, they have made their drama fast-moving and thrilling.

The casts of the individual dramatizations will change to fit the requirements of the lives being reported. Tom Shirley, prominent Chicago character actor, will act on each program as the judge of the mythical court. Musical interludes and backgrounds will be directed by Peter Cavallo, Jr.

Thus, on this Monday night a treasure-hunt of drama takes the air—tragedy, love, hope, success, all intermingled in real-life stories. Each story will be, as well, the means by which somebody may see his ship come in.

ERNO RAPEE INAUGURATES COMPLETE CYCLE OF GREATEST LIVING COMPOSER, SIBELIUS, SUNDAY

EVERYBODY knows the tunes of his "Finlandia" and "Valse Triste," but to America's vast and ever-increasing number of music fans the name of Jan Sibelius recalls far more exciting thrills. Hence, here is a signal for much rejoicing among those who have acquired the habit of enjoying symphonic music (via radio and the phonograph as well as in the concert hall), because for the first time in history their loudspeakers this week will bring them a complete cycle of the great Finnish master's seven symphonies.

Long since revered as one of the truly great masters of all time, Sibelius is still alive—very much alive in his seventy-second year and hard at work on his Eighth Symphony. Though still a contemporary, the works of Sibelius enjoy such staunch popularity throughout the length and breadth of this land that Conductor Erno Rapee is convinced that the day has arrived when the Sunday morning audience which listens to the Radio City Music Hall of the Air can and will enjoy the Sibelius cycle that he will inaugurate this Sunday over the NBC-Blue network, continuing on alternate Sundays.

Just why has the music of Sibelius become popular? Why do his works ensnare the hearts of listeners, both trained and untrained, at first hearing and arouse the desire for repeated hearings?

First of all, they are pleasing and exciting to hear. There is plenty of recognizable melody for the ear to follow—that spontaneous kind of melody that seems to spring from the soil. Though Sibelius has never used folk-tunes, his themes frequently have that elemental familiar flavor.

Something is constantly happening in the Sibelius symphonies, something comprehensible and interesting, with plenty of action motivated by great forces. Sibelius is the teller of mighty tales, in the abstract musical sense, for none of his symphonies tells a programmatic story. The irresistible forces of nature seem to breathe through his measures. The spirits of the great Norse gods stride across his canvasses, haunting rugged crags that jut above pine-covered slopes and valleys of pastoral calm. But even in the more complicated passages that require repeated hearing for more intimate gratification, there is always the feeling of magnificent fitness—those tunes, which are sometimes battling each other with stunning force, those conflicting harmonies, yanking rhythms and seething climaxes, all fit together in epic grandeur and in such a stirring, most satisfying way.

The first two symphonies, written while Finland was battling for her freedom from Russia, are permeated with the spirit of revolt which Sibelius breathed while writing. The latter, especially commencing with the Fourth, are more subtle in character. Shorter melodies are used, frequently shattering these into fragments and piecing them together into the most entertaining tonal mosaics. The latter symphonies also show greater economy of means—for instance, in the Fourth Symphony there are only three spots where Sibelius employs the full orchestra, and then it is only for a very few of the shortest measures.

Quite appropriately Rapee has selected the Second Symphony for his inaugural program on October 10, for this was the first Sibelius symphony heard in this country—introduced by Theodore Thomas and the Chicago Symphony on January 2, 1904. The First was not heard in the United States until Karl Muck did it in Boston, January 5, 1907. The next five were given their American premieres January 16, 1908; March 2, 1913; October 21, 1921; October 23, 1926; and April 3, 1926. Modest Altschuler launched the Third, Walter Damrosch the Fourth, and Leopold Stokowski the last three.

IT ALL began over a little table in the Pennsylvania Hotel Manhattan Room just about a year ago. Joe Reichman had just finished a season's engagement there, and he was throwing a farewell party the evening before he was leaving with his band for a long road tour. A group of us were sitting there—Richard Himer, Ben Grauer and several others—when Joe started to tell us about the time a doctor had given him two years to live. As he told it in the blue-smoked, blarey atmosphere of the fashionable room, the tale took on a dramatic, grim undertone.

When he finished, there was silence. Then we all fell to thinking, aloud, just what we would do if someone were to tell any one of us that we had two years left on earth—or say, a single week!

It got us, that question! Some tried to be flip about it. Tried to dodge it. But they couldn't. In the dim light I could see the expressions on the faces of our little group, and it was *fear!* It's a question that digs deep. And brings up with it the secret emotions of a person, his innermost philosophy and hidden self.

Ben Grauer looked grave, and his eyes became deep and brooding. "Seven days to live! I'd spend those seven days trying to cram all I could into each twenty-four-hour period. And up to the last minute of the seventh day I would be fighting and kicking against that terrifying edict with my very last gasp."

There is the reply of a young man

with a zest for life who wouldn't relinquish it without a struggle.

Contrast his answer with that of Richard Himer's. "I'd get a plane—the fastest one I could buy—and I'd fly all over the world. I'd take all the un navigated, dangerous airplanes and figure, if I go down, what the devil. This is adventure."

You will never know Dick better than you do through that answer. Impulsive, curious and exuberant, he feels confined, although he lives the hectic life of a New York band-leader. This "seven days to live" edict would be an opportunity for the great adventure he's sought all of his restless life.

From Benay Venuta: "I would rush

back to Chicago and spend my last days with my husband. My radio career in New York and his medical career in Chicago have kept us apart altogether too long."

REMEMBER once asking Benay what she considered more important, a career or marriage. At the time, she deliberated and wasn't sure of her answer. But, when she would be forced to face the issue—there is her honest reply.

Frances Stevens, beautiful singer, had a reply somewhat similar to Benay Venuta's, but it reveals a note of frustration. "I would get married. There is a young man with whom I'm in love, and we haven't been married

yet because I have been told it would be 'bad policy' for a girl getting started on a singing career to have a husband. But, if I knew I had but seven days to live, I'd get married the first day and during the other six try to make up for all the happiness I've lost in life!"

In the answers of Fred Waring and Mark Warnow you learn that these men who have money and fame are really missing the only joys that really count. Said Fred when I caught him during a breathing spell of a vigorous rehearsal: "I would put my baton aside and spend the entire seven days with my wife and two children. I would play piggy-back with the kids, Dixie and Fred, Jr., help them run their toy train, put them to bed and romp with them like any proud poppa would want to do. As it is, I never get a chance to be with them."

FROM Mark Warnow came the same answer. "I would take my wife and three children wherever they wanted to go. When I think of the times my children have asked me to take them to the Music Hall, to see the Empire State Building or the Statue of Liberty and the pressure of work didn't allow me to—"

I next asked Jessica Dragonette this intriguing question and she answered slowly: "I would want to sing before a microphone during the entire seven days, even if I had to go around and beg the broadcasting officials of stations, large and small, to allow me the airtime in which to do it."

Here speaks a truly happy woman. Singing on the radio means so much to Jessica that she would ask for nothing better during her last seven days on earth than to continue with her life work.

Shep Fields, the creator of "rippling rhythm," gave a very honest answer, albeit not a particularly glamorous one. "I'd worry so that I would probably pass out of the picture be-

fore the seven days were even up!"

Kelvin Keech, the announcer, was just stepping into the studio with five minutes to broadcast time when I stopped him with the question. But his answer needed no long deliberation. It came quickly, as though he had been dreaming of it all his life. "I'd fly back to Hawaii, where I was born. Haven't been there for twenty years. Not Honolulu—that's too civilized—but the island of Kauai. Ah, that's life. I'd live with the natives as they do. Believe me, no one has the fundamentals of happiness down so pat as these Hawaiians. I'd ride the surf with them, I'd dive down and spear for fish with them, I'd live in a native grass hut with them. And I'd

eat some Hawaiian poi. You can take your caviar and champagne, but there's a native dish made of the roots of the water-lily, with a taste that can't be described. Only thing is, I'd raise an awful kick about the thought of dying, for I'd just want to begin to live then!"

Jane Piekens' answer reveals the two things that are most important in her life; her family and the trio. "I would stay as close to my family as possible and try to provide for their well-being. Then I would coach Patti to carry on as soloist and possibly try to break in another singer who could

To Kate Smith, I discovered, fame and glamor mean nothing. She was earnest and her answer simple. "I would spend the last seven days doing the things I love best in this world—singing, cooking and indulging in the various sports. On my seventh and last day I would sing all day long, bid good-bye to my friends, cook and eat my last meal—and bow myself out of the picture."

Frances Langford was surprised at the question, and in a "there's only one answer" sort of voice, replied: "If I had seven days? Why, I'd go HOME, of course!" (P. S. Home is Lakeland, Florida.)

a true daughter of the theater. For what she would do is: "First, make certain that Mary, our daughter, and Charlie MacArthur, my husband, were made completely happy that week. Then I would revive my favorite play, 'What Every Woman Knows,' and play that on the stage for seven nights and two matinees."

Ted Hammerstein, grandson of the redoubtable Oscar Hammerstein, realizes the responsibility of carrying the famous theatrical Hammerstein mantle, as witness his answer: "I would spend my last few days—and every cent I had—trying to produce a play that would live after me. I would work like blazes to put it through in a week, for if I could witness the tri-

umphant opening night of this play that I had selected and produced myself, I would be willing to take my last curtain call gracefully."

Oscar Shaw would divide his last seven days between the golf links and his beloved 60-acre farm, which he and Mrs. Shaw call "The Dream." He explained, "I've spent a hectic life traveling and trouping, and my aim all those hard years has been for the quiet and comfort of a real home."

THEN I went back to the person whose real-life drama prompted the question in the first place, Joe Reichman. Probably because he had more time to turn over such a possibility in his mind more than the others, his answer was most complete. "My first thought would be for the person who means the most to me—my mother. After arranging my financial accounts to take care of her, I would spend my last remaining days with her. Since she is very old, the truth might be disastrous, so I'd concoct an elaborate plan to keep the news from her. I'd tell her that I had just been given a marvelous offer to play in some far-off country for about five or six years. Then I would confide in my best friend, Ross Barbour, and leave a stack of letters written by me to my mother, and have him mail them to her at weekly intervals. If, after the letters ran out, she were still alive, I could trust my friend to break the news to her gently or perhaps to invent another story—whichever he saw fit to do."

And last, but not least, I turn the question over to you.

"What would you do if you had seven days to live?"

Try to answer it as bravely and frankly as these radio stars did—and you'll find your soul bared, just as we found the innermost fears, the innermost longings and the innermost frustrations revealed in the answers of radio's great along Radio Row.

Allen Prescott clowned out of his spot with a flippancy that ought to strike a responsive chord in your own make-up. "I love to telephone. But those bills—! Now I'm going to phone See-moan See-moan. Shall I send your regards?'"

IN CARMELA PONSELLE I found a different sort of person. She was not at all inclined to jest with the idea. A deeply religious person from childhood, her answer held the keynote to her life. "I would spend my last seven days in the seclusion of my rustic lodge in the woods, reflecting on the two greatest influences in my life—religion and music. Away from all worldly and artificial surroundings, I would meditate, pray and sing the songs I love best. My worldly possessions would be left in the form of scholarships to some needy and talented pupils, and I would set aside a special trust fund for my young nephew, Tony, to whom I am deeply devoted, and for my first music teach-

old favorite songs, take one last visit to the country and read the Bible. There stands the answer of a handsome but serious young man who has not been touched by the hullabaloo that surrounds his profession.

PHIL BAKER, from whom I expected a humorous reply, was more serious than anyone else. "I would make an honest and determined effort to convince the world powers that they should lay down their arms and strive for peace. How I would go about it, I don't know."

But Eddie Cantor knows how. He told me: "I would spend the first few days preparing for the future happiness of Ida and the girls, of course. SEVERAL months ago Maestro Richard Himber sent out reams of publicity raving about his new vocal find, "The Gibson Girl." The gal signed a contract with Himber and sang with the orchestra on his radio shows. Himber's press agents continued to give the gal a build-up in a grand manner, and then the Maestro used his influence and succeeded in selling her to the "Hit Parade" sponsors. You have been hearing her on this show as Freddie Gibson, which resulted in the vocalist earning more than she ever made before. Complications have set in over financial matters, which means that you will not hear "The Gibson Girl" sing with the Himber orchestra again. The Maestro is extremely disturbed over the situation. He shrieked, "After all I've done for her . . . I'm through with gal singers from now on." He really had me believing it . . . that is until a few seconds later when he went into ecstasies over the new femme vocalist he discovered the day before. "Her name is Peg Newton, she's gorgeous, she's lovely, she's beautiful" . . . he raved, but I didn't stay to hear more. She must be everything Dick claims as far as looks are concerned, because Miss Newton and Frank Parker have been seen together several nights in one week. Knowing Frank as I do, I know he prefers them attractive. Apparently this discounts Parker's reported engagement to Alice Lorraine, a New York model to whom Frank presented a beautiful diamond wrist-watch on which two hearts were engraved with the letters "F. P. to A. L."

Although you hear a great many dialects on the O'Keefe program, most of the female parts are taken by Alice Frost, who goes from one character into another without blinking an eye. Teddy Bergman portrays most of the male parts, and when you hear a German, Irish, Italian or any other foreign character on this show, you can be sure it's all done by Teddy, who is a past master at the art.

Your reporter visited Walter O'Keefe's "Town Hall To-Night" program the other Wednesday night, as some of you may have heard if you were listening in. I was sitting in the studio having a lot of laughs while Walter was going down the aisle selecting his dramatists. Without exception it seemed everyone got a bad case of mike fright, much to the amusement of the studio audience. Then the comic picked on me, and I realize now what is meant by "he who laughs last, laughs best."

Incidentally, I just learned that the child actors who broadcast over CBS attend a special school which permits them to play hooky without having to bring a note to teacher. If any of their programs prohibit them from attending class, they get their studies by correspondence.

More dramaceounts: Before long the leading man in the CBS Kitty Kelly program won't be heard on the air Wednesdays. Clayton Collyer, the fellow who holds down that pleasant position, is to be in the George Abbot Broadway production "Angel Island." There is a conflict with his broadcasts on Wednesdays, for on that day the play will give a matinee performance. So, in order for him to fulfill both jobs, he'll be written out of the Kitty Kelly script that day.

An executive of Radio Station KCMO in Kansas City writes to tell me his station really accomplished something. During Rubino's stay in town for his Jubilesta concert they got him up in front of a microphone

and made him talk. It was one of the few times Rubino has ever been interviewed over the air. In most of his previous interviews the fiddler let his violin speak for him. The program included a fifteen-minute dramatization of Fiddletown, of which Rubino was recently made mayor.

The most amazing thing to me was the fact that every autograph seeker came from a different state, which is evidence of Hall's widespread popularity.

Ork Pilot Tommy Dorsey hasn't travelled as far as Al Pearce, but his journey kept him busy for seven days in a row. On September 22, he appeared as guest star on Mary Small's program, which required time for rehearsal. The following day he opened a vaudeville engagement in Boston, playing four shows a day. On Friday night, in addition to his four shows, he had to rehearse and do his regular radio program. Wednesday, September 29, he closed his vaudeville engagement, arriving in New York early the next morning. Then he immediately began rehearsals for his opening that night at the Hotel Commodore. Early the following morning he had to begin rehearsals for his Friday night cigarette program. Oh, for the life of a musician!

Friday is Frank Crumit's busy day. In the a.m. he appears with his wife, Julia Sanderson, on the "Magazine of the Air" program. In the afternoon, they have to do the program all over again for the benefit of the listeners on the West Coast. After that is over he has to start rehearsing for the Friday night CBS musical variety show, "The Song Shop," and stay in the studio until the program is over.

Then came the last laugh, after a couple of weeks without the Sanderson chuckle, when letters started to pour in asking the reason why. So, the laugh is back on the program again, whether you like it or not.

SODAHL SWINGS IT!

WHEN Earl Sodahl was a little toddler he had a happy faculty of winning friends. If he stubbed his toe and fell, he came up smiling. He was not only a favorite with "Mom" and "Pop," but with all his playmates as well. Even dogs took a fancy to him when he started carrying a newspaper route.

He gathered so many stray pooches that his mother had to close the door on them. They overran the house and ate more than little Earl could earn. In addition to his ability to make friends, he was credited with having a secret luck-charm.

He made every stumbling-block a stepping-stone to success. His smile and good luck were overshadowed by his amazing musical gifts, which he inherited and developed.

Now, still in his 30's, he is one of the leading night-club and radio entertainers in the Northwest.

Sodahl is filling a long engagement conducting his own orchestra at Radisson Hotel in Minneapolis and broadcasting over WTCN.

Earl was born and reared in an atmosphere of excellent music. His father, I. N. Sodahl, an early settler of Duluth, was a violinist in the Temple Theater, the first legitimate playhouse in that city. And in Earl, the elder Sodahl saw the inheritance of his love for music.

Not that I. N. Sodahl's love for music has waned with the passing of the years. Now, at the age of seventy odd years, he is a violinist in the Duluth Symphony orchestra and the founder and leader of the Normanna Male Chorus, which has sung over the entire country at national gatherings.

As soon as he could sit on a stool and reach the keyboard with his chubby fingers, Earl began studying piano. When he could easily run his fingers over the keyboard, he added the violin to his list of musical achievements. Now he might be called a one-man band, for he ably plays eight instruments.

Unlike Ben Bernie, Guy Lombardo and some other orchestra leaders, Earl actually plays the violin while he leads the orchestra.

Both Minneapolis and Duluth claim him as their own, but as he was born and grew to manhood in Duluth, he may be justly called a Duluthian. In Duluth he is known as Earling. To be American and democratic, he shortened his Christian name to Earl.

During the World War he turned his first big stumbling-block to a stepping-stone. Not yet old enough to enlist, he was so persistent that his father at last gave his consent.

He joined the naval militia and was stationed on the battleship "Massachusetts" off Philadelphia. Its commander was Captain Clyde Kelly, another Duluthian.

Kelly wanted a band on the ship. Earl was asked to form one. The band was complete except for a saxophonist. No sailor on board could play the saxophone. But Earl didn't go on without a saxophone. He bought one and was soon tooting with the best.

THE extent of his wartime fights was all seen on the "Massachusetts," lying off Philadelphia. Until the War was over, he played the sax and directed the band on the ship.

After the War, he joined Bachman's Million Dollar Military Band. After touring the country with this unit, he and some of his fellow musicians joined Sousa's famed band and toured with the March King two years.

Then a radical change came about. All his playing of the past had been in aggregations with the classical leaning. But the night clubs lured him. He was just at that age when young fellows have grand ideas about "giving out" on a bandstand and hav-

ing young people dance fast, or on the other hand, romantically slow, as their music governed. Besides, there was better pay with a dance band.

One-night stands and associations with numerous orchestras in the Northwest gave him the incentive to organize his own orchestra. Not feeling that he was properly fitted to the task, Earl stayed on, playing under someone else's direction.

When the grand Minnesota Theater opened in the Mill City, he became assistant to Lou Breese and remained there until the playhouse closed during the depression.

And of all the stumbling-blocks that ever loomed before young Earl Sodahl, the depression seemed the one that was unsurmountable. Theaters used "canned music." Musicians took to picketing showplaces, but for the main, without much good fortune.

If he couldn't get work with someone else, he would organize his own orchestra. He auditioned music after musician; heard hard-luck stories one after the other, but he was determined to select only the twelve best musicians.

EVIDENTLY Earl's appreciation of music and musicians was that of a master. In the midst of a nation's financial panic he not only got a job for himself but for twelve other men. He had been successful in getting the orchestral engagement at the Radisson Hotel with a long-term contract.

Radio broadcasting soon became another medium for people to hear his twelve good men, who together had the makings of an outstanding orchestra. In this way he reached more people and his popularity increased.

What does his father say about the musical road Earl has taken? Well, if Earl can satisfy anyone with music, the elder Sodahl is in favor of his methods, and Earl is certainly satisfying lovers of popular music.

Earl was brought up in an atmosphere of classical and folk music and prefers these types. Yet he's in business, and therefore must be "money wise" where it is necessary.

Some day, though, he hopes to be doing the things in music that his father, now past seventy, is doing.

accept an invitation to an after-the-opera champagne supper. Despite the omnipresent Colonel, however, she consistently had strings of American beaux. Men were unable to resist the vivacious charm of the pocket-sized prima donna. Caruso, in praising her beauty, once said that it was a crime for any photographer to take a picture of her that did not include her dainty little feet.

In 1915 the exquisite Bori soprano was stilled for five years by a surgeon's scalpel that endeavored to remove a growth from her vocal cords. She paid \$25,000 for the unsuccessful operation in Paris. While Italian doctors worked over her afterward, she regularly visited the shrine of St. Francis, making vows of charity. She has kept these vows ever since, singing in hospitals and institutions for the poor, graciously donating her services to charity benefits.

For the five-year period when she could not speak above a whisper, it seemed that her career was finished in its beginning.

By 1919 Nature and the foremost specialists of two continents had restored the Bori voice to a weak soprano. A year later the crystal fountain of melody inside her was flowing as though it had never been stopped. Critics agreeing that she had lost nothing of her ability, Bori went on to greater triumphs in America, Europe and South America. With John McCormack she was the first big opera star to sing over the radio in 1925.

THE twenty-five-year limit that she had set for her career was to have ended in 1933, but at that time the survival of opera in this country seemed perilously unlikely. For years the Metropolitan had faced bankruptcy and waning public interest. At the insistence of her colleagues, Bori renewed her contract, headed the great Save-the-Opera campaign. Much to her credit the Metropolitan today is surviving more lustily than it has in years.

December before last, Bori announced her operatic retirement, which was not, she explained, to exclude occasional radio and concert appearances.

At her glittering farewell performance, Lawrence Tibbett, Helen Jepson, Lily Pans, Grace Moore, Gladys Swarthout, Rosa Ponselle and scores of others sang in the chorus as a tribute to her while she enacted the leading roles of "Manon" and "La Traviata."

Her first post-retirement moves were to buy a country place near Eagle Rock, New York, plunge into activity as a member of the Metropolitan Board of Directors, take up the study of sculpture. In Manhattan she lives at a midtown hotel with her brother, her Italian maid and her schnauzer, Rowdy II.

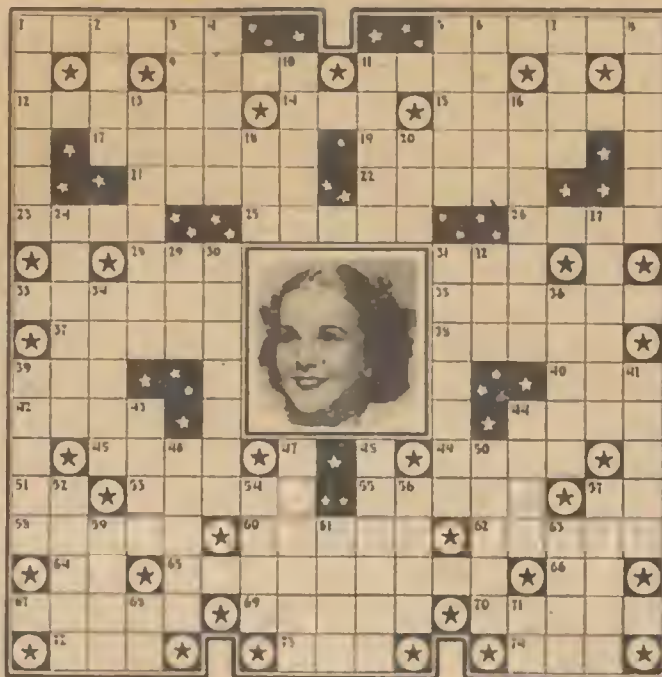
Concerning her retirement she comments enthusiastically, "I am having these busy days such a wonderful, wonderful time! I have always prayed that everyone will say, 'Bori, at fifty you are terrific!'"

And there's not a bit of doubt they'll be saying it.

reach such a note quite by accident. As a beginner in opera she had been engaged at the Municipal Theater in Bielefeld, Germany. She was studying her first coloratura role and was working over a difficult endenza when she suddenly was aware that she could sing G over high C. That's tall singing, so she took a deep breath and reached for the moon. She got up to C over high C. The critics went into spasms of delight.

Helen Jepson—literally the million-dollar baby from a five-and-ten-cent store—is a stream-lined soprano. Out in Ohio, where she was born, she earned her first money—\$15 a week—as a salesgirl in a five-and-dime store.

Jussi Bjoerling—(call me You-si Bay-or-ling and go heavy on the ling)—is 26 and the leading tenor of the Royal Opera at Stockholm.

Richard Tauber is the well-known tenor star of opera and operetta stages throughout Europe.

Joseph Schmidt is a diminutive fellow—a tenor who came to the

United States last year and made two radio engagements and became famous.

Donald Dickson is a young baritone, American-born, who recently joined the Metropolitan Opera. Some critics say he is the most promising young American singer.

John Kennedy's spot on the show—about eight minutes of it—will be devoted to dramatic stories of science.

IN DISCUSSING the program, Kennedy put the questions:

"Did you know that scientists have discovered that X-ray treatments might help prevent childless marriages?"

"Did you know that in the past few weeks the price of radium has hit a new low of \$30,000 an ounce from the quite recent \$70,000 an ounce? Why? That the price of iron lungs has dropped from \$1,400 to \$200? Why?"

MUSIC of the MASTERS

BY CARLETON SMITH

DURING the past weeks I have heard operas in a half-dozen European countries. A glance into the faces of my fellow listeners convinced me they were absorbed in what was happening on the stage to a degree that our Metropolitan Opera audience seldom is. Not fashionably dressed, the people were obviously in the theater to be entertained, to see and not to be seen. There is a difference and it is as great as the difference between night and day.

"Why," I wondered, "should opera be a real, living drama for all these people, touching their heart-strings and making them cry, when to most Americans the same experience is strange, artificial, and even boring?"

It cannot simply be that opera was born in Europe and, being transplanted, will not grow on American soil. After all, most Americans descend from some European stock. Why should we, in moving across a body of water, lose the musical inheritance of our ancestors? We have not lost contact with their literary culture. A play of Shakespeare (our editor notwithstanding) attracts as many people to the theater as one of Eugene O'Neill.

And, come to think of it, the symphonies of Beethoven draw more listeners than those of Howard Hanson. America has more symphony orchestras per capita than any country on the continent of Europe. It is only opera that doesn't flourish amongst us. We have one permanent company, whereas one city in Europe has three opera houses, all open ten months a year. Italy, with one-third our population, has fifty operas and Germany with over half as many people has over a hundred companies.

Primarily, it seems to me, it is a question of language. Every nationality, except those who speak English, insist on having operas sung in their own language. When "Lakme" is given in Moscow, is it in French? Assuredly not. If it were, it probably would be sung to an empty house. When "Das Rheingold" and "Die Gotterdammerung" are sung in France, are they heard in German? No! They will be billed as "L'Or du Rhin" and "Le Crepuscule des Dieux," and sung in French. And the audience will insist on hearing every word clearly enunciated in perfect French.

No self-respecting Frenchman would sit for five minutes through an opera in a language he didn't understand. He is not content to hear beautiful tones bleated at him. He wants to know precisely what it is all about . . . and why. And he doesn't expect to spend his intervals rooting through a translation.

He is right. Any opera which is worth its salt is not merely a collection of solos, duets and choruses strung together. It tells a story. Its music is a commentary on this story and, in most cases, illuminates, clarifies, and paints in sounds the meaning of the words. Is it any wonder, then, that the intelligent music-lover insists on comprehending each word as it is sung? If the meaning registers instantly he can at the same time grasp what the composer is saying. What chance has he to obtain the full meaning from the music if he isn't sure whether the singers are making love, discussing the weather, or telling each other to go to thunder?

OUR audiences can't be blamed for snoring through evening after evening of opera. They wait patiently three hours to hear two melodies they know, and all the time they have to puzzle out what it is about. They may have been through Siegfried five times and not yet have grasped the reason for the Wanderer's entrance, let alone

the significance of his words. It is absolutely impossible to obtain a complete understanding of such a music-drama without knowing the words that are sung. Explicit as Wagner is, using and coloring each leit-motif to describe the action or thought of the character on the stage, there are numerous passages where only the words themselves give a hint to the meaning carried in the music.

Why, then, in our country, are operas not sung in English? Will we forever tolerate, with the dumbness of jackasses, a famous tenor broadcasting to us Canio's Lament from "Pagliacci" (originally in Italian) in Danish? Must we always act like nit-wits, content to sit back and gape knowingly so long as the music is sung in any language save one we can understand? I hope not.

I AM aware that were they in England a half-dozen operas now performed at the Metropolitan would have to be censored. The Federal Communications Commission would never allow them to be heard over the air as they now are, if people could understand their words. I know, also, that now and then opera characters take half an hour to say a plain "Good-by!" and nearly an hour to die. Listeners might as well know the truth and have a few laughs out of it.

Certainly, hearing these ridiculous passages in English can be no worse than hearing one of our famous baritones floundering through whole pages of "Rigoletto" with "La! La!—La! La!" Or to know of a tenor forgetting the French words of his farewell duet and substituting his own, which might be freely translated: "What sort of a lemon am I singing to? Dumb-bell! She is not only sour, but bow-legged. Look at her, panting and heaving! She must weigh two hundred fifty and she's supposed to be dying. Fat chance!" And then, to see members of the audience, not understanding a word of what was sung, moved to tears by such an apostrophe!

THAT there are few singers who can project English over the footlights is little excuse. English is, by and large, as singable as French or German. Foreign artists might as well learn to sing English as to have our singers taught their languages.

That there are no plausible English translations of the greater operas is also not a valid excuse. Let them be made: they will be no worse than some of the translations from German into Italian or from French into the Russian language.

All translations are, at best, a compromise. The meaning is seldom identical in two languages and, moreover, a composer sometimes intended to convey a certain effect by the color of a vowel or the formation of a consonant. This is lost or vitiated in translation. The original is always to be preferred, providing it can be understood by the listening audience.

Translation is merely the lesser of two evils. Better suffer the loss of the ideal, if it is necessary, than to sacrifice an understanding of the meaning and substance of what is taking place.

It is obvious that if operas are to reach a large public in America, expert English translations must be made and singers bred who can enunciate them clearly. Unhappily, the prospects are not very bright.

In Paris, I queried Mr. Edward Johnson about this. He agreed we should have operas in English, but "not at the Metropolitan! The subscribers to our opera in New York," he said, "want to hear productions in the original language with the best international casts available. That is

what they pay to hear and that is what we must give them."

Mr. Johnson is undoubtedly correct so far as the majority of the Met audience is concerned. Among them are those who speak foreign languages and connoisseurs who have memorized their scores. The rest are snobs.

But if opera is ever to be anything vital in our lives, we must have opera companies across the country just as we have symphony orchestras. And they must give nightly performances of all the great master-works in English. Perhaps there is no demand for such projects. Then it must be created, exactly as the demand for symphonic music has been created. All operas should eventually be broadcast in English as well as in their original language. The stories and the words of each passage should be familiar to every schoolchild. It is simply because they are not that opera remains with us an exotic, hothouse plant, understood and enjoyed by precious few.

It is also true that we should produce our own operas about matters that concern and affect our daily thoughts. We should have our own opera music as we have our own dance music. But, in time, that will come. There must first be a demand, and the demand will arise only when we have a large public in America vitally concerned and thoroughly familiar with the conventions and the beauties of the lyric drama.

Until then, audiences will not sit on the edge of their chairs at the opera, hanging on every phrase as they do in Europe. Music-lovers in Vienna may have heard "The Magic Flute" fifty times, but each time they discover something new. A deep, hidden meaning is suddenly clear. And this is the real joy in hearing music; the discovering of new beauties in old favorites.

THE Pelletiers—Wilfred and Rose—have had a long honeymoon in Europe, interrupted only by some outdoor concerts in Holland. Sunday Mr. Pelletier begins his weekly broadcasts presenting and accompanying the young auditioners for the Metropolitan. If you want to try out, send a record of your training and accomplishments to Mr. Pelletier, Metropolitan Opera Auditions, NBC, New York.

Saw Morton Downey, hale and heartier than ever, at the Carlton Bar on the Riviera last week. He is quite content with Europe and is enjoying a big success in London. Another American who is tops in Europe is Larry Adler, harmonica expert. Social registerites in four countries rate him as sure-fire entertainment for their swankiest parties. When he broadcasts for the BBC, he hires his own accompanying orchestra.

Sailing for America this month is one of the world's ranking basses, an American citizen of Russian birth, Alexander Kipnis. Formerly Kipnis was with the Chicago Opera company, and now he is scheduled to tour with a group of Wagnerian singers. No visitor of the season will be more welcome to radio waves than Mr. Kipnis.

The Wagnerian group we mentioned has another member who possesses one of the world's most beautiful lyric soprano voices. She is Hilde Konetzni, a sister of Anni who made her ill-fated Metropolitan appearance the same season as did Kirsten Flagstad. She is not of the American variety of dieted prima donnas, but her voice, as revealed in the trying roles she sang at Salzburg, entitles her to a place among the Queens of Song.

By and large, our radio programs for this season are not dangerously experimental. We need to hear new voices, and those of Kipnis and Konetzni are guaranteed knockouts.

WHEN the doctor finally allowed Virginia to get out of bed, she was frail, unable to walk. Her rehabilitation program, planned by the physician, included supervised exercises: swimming first; later, when her limbs and chest strengthened, massages; and finally, dancing-lessons finished the work of building up her body. It took lots of time and patience, but how well it was done is attested by Virginia as she is today. The exercises that helped her regain her health can be used by others to keep theirs. Virginia's career began when her mother (who had been in vaudeville) coached her in singing, and, at the age of 2 1/2, she was billed as Taffy Tain, could sing many songs, crack hundreds of jokes. When she was 3, Paul Whiteman lifted her to the bandstand to sing and she loved it! At the age of 6 Virginia had mastered the violin, was a member of the Michel Toreno School orchestra. Before her accident, she was playing the violin on the Pantages circuit. "Vee" (as she is called) started to sing the blues over local stations at 13; at 15, she was singing for commercials and recordings. Her debut in pictures was doubling for Barbara Stanwyck and Jean Harlow. Now she will be seen instead of just being heard—in "Vogues of 1938" and "The Goldwyn Follies."

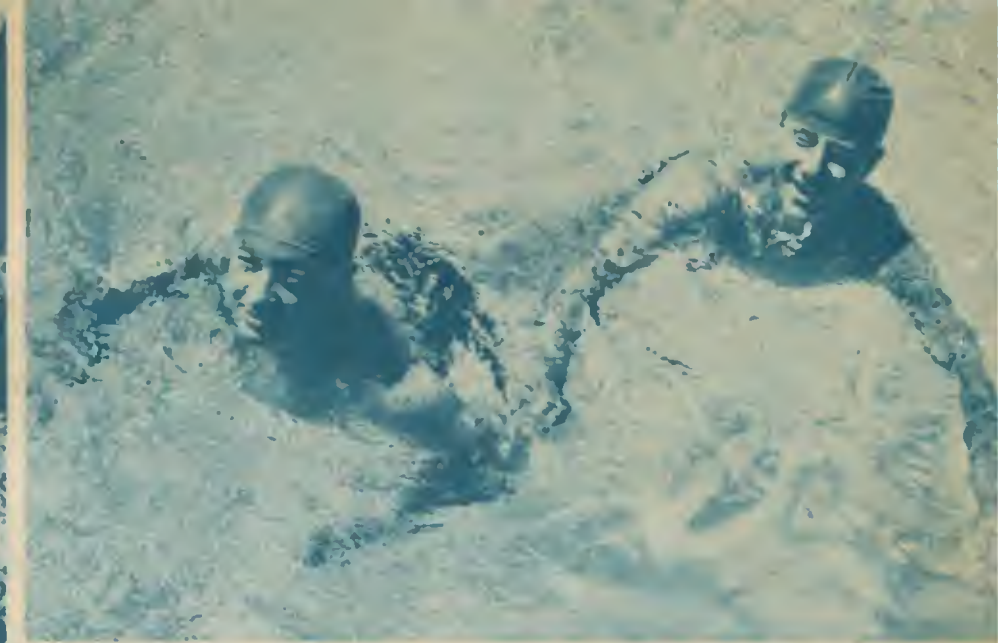

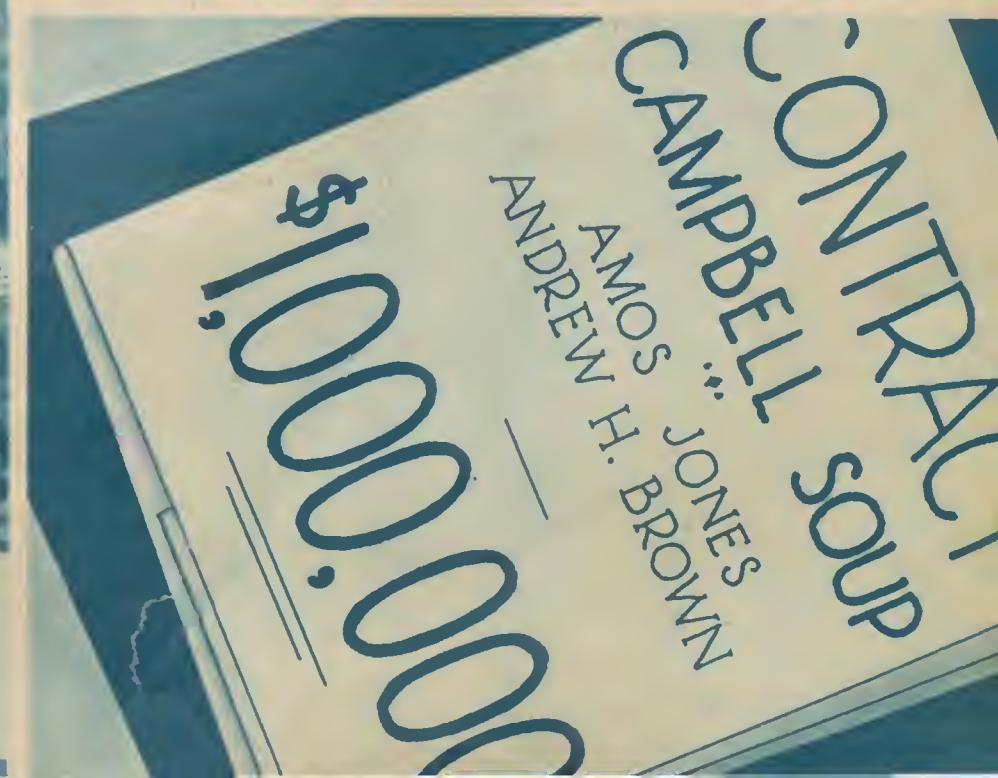


NBC's celebrated blackface pair, "Amos 'n' Andy"—Freeman F. Gosden and Charles J. Correll—have known luck since the first day they met, back in 1920 in Durham, N. C., while staging amateur theatricals. Together they formed a partnership, and together they've prospered. Today—after nine years of continuous five-times-a-week broadcasting of the same comic-dramatic serial—they've become a radio institution!

The entire credit for unrivaled popularity of their program goes to themselves. Theirs was the idea of the show, theirs was the creation of the characters, and theirs, unaided, the important task of writing the script. Gosden, who's Amos, comes from Richmond, Virginia, and Correll, who's Andy, is from Peoria, Illinois. Both are married—Andy, only recently. Amos has two children—Freeman, Jr., and Virginia Marie. In the time they've been on the air, they've amassed a fortune—are now living in sunny California. Amos owns one of the state's most beautiful mansions, and Andy is building one.

Lady luck is still smiling favorably upon them, for they've just been signed by the Campbell Soup Company for three years. When the famous two part company with their old sponsor, Pepsodent, December 31—to go on the air for Campbell Soup January 3, 1938—it will mark the culmination of supposedly the longest continuous network association between an act and a sponsor. Although their last 5-year contract with Pepsodent was rumored to have brought them a cool million—they're still going up! Campbell Soup is giving them an increase in salary.

VISIT Tom Howard's Seagoing Cellar



IT WAS when "The Face on the Barroom Floor" actually was a grocery clerk's face on the parlor floor that a star was born—and Tom Howard was the star.

At the time, Tom was still a boy—and not a very popular one, either, because of his entire crowd he alone was unable to entertain at a party. Tom wondered desperately—if rather vaguely—what could be done about it. And while he was wondering, the answer came to him, appropriately enough, in a market basket. One of his customers had come into the store carrying a copy of "The Face on the Barroom Floor." Tom bought it from her.

He memorized it immediately, and when there was another party, Tom was prepared for it. Gesturing wildly, frantically, he wrung every bit of melodrama out of the poem that he could—and it was a success. A few nights later he was asked to give it at a smoker. His pay was \$2. Other engagements followed; not many, but enough to keep him up so late that he overslept and lost his job as a consequence.

It was then that Tom decided upon a dramatic career. Getting a cutaway coat and a set of false whiskers, he had several postcard pictures made, then presented himself to a booking-agent as a monologist. Many jobs followed, most of them in poor places with poorer pay. When he could afford it, he hired a pretty young assistant for \$15 a week. Later they were married, and with a combined income of \$33 a week, they saved their first \$500. But Tom rose steadily, and when he went to Broadway, his wife returned to their modest New Jersey home.

Now an important star, Tom still thinks of the show business as an uncertain kind of life not to be depended upon too seriously. In fact, he doesn't depend on his. On the side, he is a realtor, and he saves most of what he earns.

The Howards live simply, indulge in few luxuries. Tom's only hobbies are collecting pipes and fixing up his basement—two things he has gone into whole-heartedly, as the accompanying pictures show.

SHORT WAVES

BY CHAS. A. MORRISON, president, INTERNATIONAL DX-ER'S ALLIANCE

(Figures in Parentheses Are Megacycles)

THE day of erratic and unsatisfactory short-wave reception has largely passed. Today all-wave receivers are sensitive and easy to tune, transmitters more powerful and aeriels more efficient. Because of these factors we are now able to enjoy daily programs from the leading stations of the world. In fact, there are only a few days during the course of an entire year in which foreign reception is not only possible but of excellent program value. Daily news comments and entertainment features from England, Germany, Japan, Spain and many other countries, are now accepted as a matter of fact by thousands of listeners. In the future as more and more powerful short-wave stations are built, as programs are made available in more variety and schedules extended, short-wave reception is bound to play an increasingly important part in providing the international side of the daily education and entertainment fare from our receivers.

During the present important session of the League of Nations, the short-wave transmitters at Prangins, Switzerland, are being used daily except Saturdays and Sundays to radiate reports of its activities as follows: Over HBO (11.402), from 2 to 2:15 p.m. EST (1 to 1:15 p.m. CST) and over HBL (9.345), from 7:30 to 7:45 p.m. and from 8 to 8:15 p.m. EST (6:30 to 6:45 p.m. and from 7 to 7:15 p.m. CST).

August Balbi of Los Angeles, Calif., writes that XGOX of Nanking, China, is not off the air, as recently reported but still going strong daily from 7 to 11 a.m. EST (6 to 10 a.m. CST) on a new frequency of 9.8 megas. A woman announcer gives a news bulletin in English, concerning the Chinese factor of the Sino-Japanese conflict, at 7:30 a.m. EST (6:30 a.m. CST). The call-letters are given in English at 7:45 a.m. EST (6:45 a.m. CST). The broadcaster relays 75,000-watt Broadcast Station XGOA... OLR4A (11.84) of Prague, Czechoslovakia, is now being heard daily from 12 noon to 2 p.m. EST (11 a.m. to 1 p.m. CST) and from 11 p.m. to 1:15 a.m. EST (10 p.m. to 12:15 a.m. CST)... XEBR of Hermosillo, Mexico, may be heard on either 11.82 or 10.65 megas irregularly from 4 to 7 p.m. EST (3 to 6 p.m. CST).

An interesting program will be the broadcast over CN8AJ (7.045-14.09) of Casablanca, Morocco, at 2 a.m. EST (1 a.m. CST), on Monday, October 11. Send reports to R. Crettien of 29 Rue des Villas, Casablanca.

"Radio Nacional" in Salamanca, Spain, at General Franco's headquarters in that city, may be heard daily up to 8:30 or 8:45 p.m. EST (7:30 or 7:45 p.m. CST) on a frequency of approximately 10.37 megas (the same frequency as that used by EAJ43 of the Canary Islands). War news in English is given at 8:15 a.m. EST (7:15 a.m. CST), which is usually followed by a short musical program. Reports should be sent to Radio Nacional, Salamanca, Spain... Carl Eder of Willmar, Minn., reports hearing a French communist station, announced as "Radio Liberte" (9.53), signing off at 6:33 p.m. EST (5:33 p.m. CST). Announcements in French, German and Italian gave the address as Radio Liberte, 10 Ave. de la Liberte, Becon Courbevoie, France.

John DeMyer of Lansing, Mich., believes that the recent tuning-in of UPOL, the short-wave station of the

Soviet air base at the North Pole, afforded him one of the greatest thrills he has yet experienced in dialing the higher frequencies. A letter to him from the authorities in Moscow, states that UPOL operates on a frequency of 14.409 megas, daily from 2 to 4 p.m. EST (1 to 3 p.m. CST).

The series of broadcasts sponsored by the International DX-ers Alliance, from St. Denis, on the lonely and remote "Ile de Reunion," in the Indian Ocean, will be transmitted over FR8VX (14.34), at 3 p.m. EST (2 p.m. CST), on October 15, 16 and 17. These three broadcasts will constitute the first programs ever to be heard from this island. The novelty of the programs will be further enhanced by the fact that they will be radiated over the transmitter owned by Prince Vinh San, exiled King of Annam, who will preside at the mike.

WIXAL, the "University of the Air" at Boston, Mass., will operate according to the following schedule this season: On 15.25 megas, daily from 2:30 to 4:30 p.m. EST (1:30 to 3:30 p.m. CST) and Sundays from 10:15 a.m. to 12 noon EST (9:15 to 11 a.m. CST); on 11.79 megas, daily from 5 to 6:30 p.m. EST (4 to 5:30 p.m. CST), and 6.04 megas, Sundays only, from 5 to 7 p.m. EST (4 to 6 p.m. CST).

Manuel Barbera of Buenos Aires sends me the following news concerning South American short-wavers: CXA8, Montevideo, Uruguay, relay station of LR3 of Buenos Aires, Argentina, now broadcasting on a frequency of 9.64 megas, is operating daily from 7 a.m. to 12 mid. EST (6 a.m. to 11 p.m. CST). Announcements thus far have been in Spanish only, but at the invitation of the station, Mr. Barbera is preparing a record with the station identification in Portuguese, Italian, French, English, German and Russian. Send reports to Belgrano 1841, Buenos Aires... "La Voz de Pereira" (6.145), Pereira, Colombia, formerly known as HJ4ABU, has changed its call to HJ6ABA... OAX4G, "Radio Grellaud," Lima, Peru, is now operating on a frequency of 6.26 megas... The new address of CXA2 is Camino Carraseo 5151, Montevideo, Uruguay. This station has been off the air for some time but will soon resume operations with a new 5,000-watt transmitter on a frequency of 6 megas... CB1190, "La Voz de Valdivia, Radio Sur Aliviol," Valdivia, Chile, relays Broadcast Station CB69, on a frequency of 12.007 megas, daily from 7 to 10 p.m. EST (6 to 9 p.m. CST). The address is Casilla 731... CB1170 (11.76) relays the programs of CB89, Radio Otto Becker, Ahumada 113, Santiago, Chile, daily from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. and from 3:30 to 11 p.m. EST (9 a.m. to 1 p.m. and from 2:30 to 10 p.m. CST).

Listen to the Zenith Radio Foundation program on Sundays at 10 p.m. EST (9 p.m. CST) over the NBC-Blue network, and you will be engrossed in a new and startling theory of mental-wave propagation. According to Elizabeth-Ann Tucker, program director for W2XE, New York City, South American listeners have presented a new problem to the Columbia Broadcasting System by their almost unanimous insistence on programs devoted to descriptions of the latest New York and Hollywood fash-

ions. Plans to keep them in touch with the latest Fifth Avenue and motion-picture creations are now being worked out. DX-ers in England show a decided preference for American dance bands and singers of popular melodies, but reports from Latin America, South Africa and other distant lands indicate that classical programs, such as the Sunday Evening Hour, the Philharmonic concerts and Howard Barlow's "Everybody's Music" also have a large following.

E. Reinhard, of Red Bank, N. J., reports hearing CSW, Lisbon, Portugal, on a new frequency of 11.84 megas, on Sunday, September 30, from 2 to 2:30 p.m. EST (1 to 1:30 p.m. CST). This frequency may be used on a daily basis if the tests are successful.

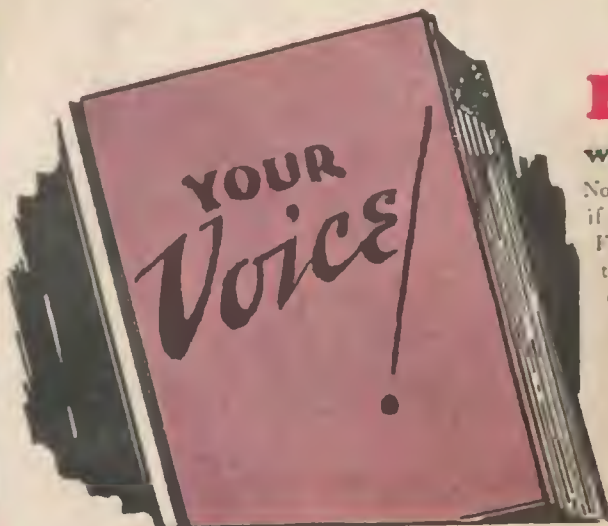
