We Call It Viewpoint

A GUEST EDITORIAL

VIEWPOINT is a position where we mentally drape brilliant robes around a mediocre subject and place it among the choice possessions of life; fasten demoniacal garments on a well-intentioned act; or, more rarely, see a thing as it really is. So, too, is the listener's reaction to radio.

"Men from Mars" was a good test of this reaction. People thought the world was coming to an end or worse because they were not adept at listening. Most of us wish to be entertained by radio and it is a sad commentary that masterful production of drama cannot be accepted as such instead of driving people to frenzy. This program proved the necessity for further presentations of the kind to strengthen our morale, steady our nerves, and increase our bravery.

Some of us are not entertained by much of the prevailing brands of "humor" on the air. However, the studio audiences seem to be. This again is viewpoint. Southerners resent inaccurate attempts at presentation of their speech. That, too, is viewpoint. How can one who has not heard real Southerners speak understand that their speech medium is, in truth, English?

As musicians and music-lovers our first concern or interest is the musical program. We, too, have a point of view from which we sometimes harshly criticize. It is lamentable that some of our great concert singers have one repertoire for radio and another, we hope, for the concert stage. When questioned about the frequent use of trivial songs and limited radio repertoire, singers often say their programs are chosen for them. Why is a singer on a commercial program submitted to this injustice? Does the sponsor really believe that the American audience is moronic or just plain simple-minded? Can he not be shown that the Metropolitan Opera, the New York Philharmonic, the NBC, Ford, and Columbia Orchestras do not play down to the below-average listener?

We are grateful for the system which makes possible the presentation of the world's greatest music at the turn of a dial. Some of us are happy about our radio offerings, realizing that no other country in the world can match them. We do beg the commercial sponsors to believe their cause stronger, however, when shorter announcements extolling their wares are made. It is such an easy thing to turn the dial for a while. We will even take a small dose of the hoarse or coarse voiced blues or torch singing, or whatever the strange sounds are called. We will accept a little swinging of the classics because that is one way to introduce a good



thought even at the price of mutilation and plagiarism. Too much perfection would dim our appreciation for rare gems.

All in all, we are rather proud of this musical prodigy who, in his twelfth year, leads the world. At least, that is our viewpoint about radio.

THOSE BLESSED LETTERS

IT IS the same with letters as with the telephone: one scolds and one groans over the time lost with superfluous telephone conversations, one wishes ardently to be rid of this modern instrument of torture, at least for a short time . . . but, well, how can one live without a telephone? And it is the same with the mail. At least it is for me. I stand on an absolute war footing with it.

Alas! The big portfolio, on which is written "Unanswered Mail" like a warning *mene tekel*, swells alarmingly. I pass by the writing-tables of my ever-changing hotel suites with the feeling of a debtor who, with a feigned innocence, tries to avoid his creditors

. . . The writing-tables look strange and cold—distressingly orderly and inviting order. My maid moves busily round the room, a pattern of traveling routine. Family photographs, which accompany me everywhere, are set out, flowers arranged in vases with a bundle of letters already forwarded from my New York centers. And alongside, the portfolio, "Unanswered Mail" . . . Sometimes it brings me to tears! I have, unfortunately, a fixed idea that I must conscientiously read and answer

every letter, either by dictation or by writing personally. I have a sweet little typewriter, which once half in jest I bought in Salzburg. I learned to "tap" on it with fanatical abandon and can produce quite imposing speed records, although I am bound to confess that in the ardor of writing I, alas, sometimes hit a wrong key. Occasionally, I get a sudden urge. I hurl myself on my mail and for hours on end I dictate letters and write autographs well into the night until I am quite dizzy. I work my

way through this avalanche and sink into bed very late, an exhausted conqueror. This all sounds exaggerated, but it is the truth. Perhaps by a little wiser arrangement this orgy of writing might be somewhat avoided. But I am so unwillingly "wise" . . .

I have often been asked whether the numerous letters received by an artist are not very similar. Oh no—on the contrary. Every aspect of life in all its motley colors is reflected in them, and it would read like a novel if a collection of such letters were published in book form. From childish raptures of quite young students of music to those of the mature connoisseur, giving wonderful happiness; from professional begging

letters to the veiled call for help of the homeless and impoverished; from the vicious anonymous to the genuine censoring letter; it is a kaleidoscopic melody which resounds from those lines, a melody which often moves me deeply and often amuses me but which is never tedious. For I always look forward to my mail with excitement. I receive the bundle of letters which habitually awaits my arrival in each hotel and say, "Good heavens, what a lot!" . . . and heave a sigh and imagine that I am very annoyed and bored . . . But the letters never have to wait long before I open them and I even begin reading them in my bath . . . and my

Radio facilities for prison inmates have been one of the chief grounds for the complaint by disciplinarian penalists that prisoners are pampered and coddled. Here is a story by a prison inmate which defends radio as a powerful morale-building force—an important aid in rehabilitating convicts!—Editor.

THOUSANDS of convicts escape from Michigan prisons every day. Suave-voiced radio announcers standing before broadcasting studio microphones are unwitting accomplices as they introduce programs that afford inmates temporary release from the nerve-straining monotony of prison existence.

Radio in prison—a far cry from the ball-and-chain, lash, and iron-hat era of penology! Today approximately five thousand inmates of the State Prison of Southern Michigan enjoy the educational and rehabilitative benefits of America's finest air programs. The soft rhythms of orchestras have replaced the rattle of leg-chains in cells as lighted dials of radio sets glow behind the bars of the world's largest and most modern penitentiary.

Prior to 1935, the only radio sets within the walls of this prison were a limited number in the offices of the administration's more important officials. With the exception of a small minority of the prison's population, who received "outside" newspapers, the inmate body remained virtually ignorant

of world events. Isolated in a small universe of their own, they accepted with childish credence every whisper of information about "outside" activities.

In January, 1935, a radio firm agreed to manufacture special five-tube receiving sets designed to operate satisfactorily despite adverse reception conditions resulting from the prison's industries. Approximately five hundred such sets were manufactured and sold to inmates. Equipped with headphone connections instead of speakers, the metal cabinets of the sets were sealed to prevent experimental tampering by inmate owners. At the same time, inmates able to obtain sets from other outside sources were given permission to have them in their cells, providing headphones were substituted for the speakers. This was to prevent bedlam in the twelve huge cell-blocks, each of which houses from 350 to 516 men.

INMATES with an eye for business quickly saw an opportunity to reap a harvest of "packs," with the result that within a few months radio "lines" were in operation. Prison currency is packages of cigarettes, and inmates discuss business transactions in terms of "packs" and "cartons."

Probably the most successful line operator was a former motion-picture sound-technician who had made the mistake of signing the wrong name to a check. He built a "booster" for his

eight-tube set, strung wires behind the cells, and operated his private system to the complete satisfaction of ninety men, each of whom paid one pack a week and supplied his own earphone. The enterprising operator was released before the large centralized system came into being.

In a small room in the basement of the chapel building, a life-terminer studied radio and repaired sets for his friends. In his mind was born the plan for this prison's present "hook-up" system. He discussed his ideas with Warden Harry H. Jackson, "Michigan's reform warden," who okayed the project and ordered that work be started immediately.

The radio division borrowed \$10,000 from the institution, equipment was ordered from outside firms, and upon its arrival inmate workmen began the task of installing "the system that couldn't possibly operate."

THE inmate body viewed the undertaking with a jaundiced eye. Five thousand men listening to one radio at the same time? Impossible! Only a "screwball" could have conceived such a plan!

On Christmas day, 1936, the "inside hook-up" was completed when the inmate technician threw switches which sent programs from the Columbia, National, and Mutual broadcasting networks to approximately three thousand dubious, waiting inmates.

In the control-room, situated in the administration offices just outside the front gates, three huge, twelve-tube receiving sets bring the nation's finest air programs to the man in the cell. An auxiliary set is always ready for use in the event that one of the three others cuts out. The three receivers in operation relay an average of fifty-five pro-

grams daily over approximately seventy-five miles of wire to more than thirty-six hundred individual headphones.

Each cell is equipped with a wall panel having three color-tagged outlets—CBS, white; NBC, red; MBS, blue. Inmates subscribing to the "state hook-up" pay twenty-five cents a month, for which they receive a headphone with eight feet of cord to permit freedom of movement in their cells. Controlled by an automatic time switch, the system is in operation from 7:00 a.m. until 11:15 p.m. An inmate can switch from one network to another by simply pulling and replugging his phone connection. All cells in the hospital building are equipped with hook-ups, free to patients.

Approximately \$17,000 has been invested in the centralized system, including original installation cost, headphones, broadcasting studio equipment, and subsequent maintenance. The initial \$10,000 borrowed from the institution has been repaid and the radio division is now self-sustaining.

Thirteen inmates under the supervision of Harry L. Sairs operate and maintain the system. Eight are employed inside the walls, three in the front-house control-room, and two in the probation cell-block outside the walls. Since inmates working outside the walls are never permitted to enter the prison except on urgent excuse, a talk-back system connects the inside department with the control-room. All business between the two branches is conducted over this line.

Twice each week the prison orchestra broadcasts from the prison studio by remote control over station WIBM, Jackson. Every evening the "blue channel" of the system is used by inmates to present a thirty-minute news program

and a thirty-minute musical program to the men in the cells.

The newscast, called "the Radio Gazette," is one of the inmate body's most popular programs. Conducted by a rapid-fire commentator who employs three inmate assistants, "the Radio Gazette" presents a daily word portrayal of prison and prisoners, featuring tidbits of "stir" gossip, "classified advertisements," official notices, and miscellaneous news items with a prison slant, clipped from outside newspapers.

THE inmate body's preference in radio entertainment is comparable to that of any community of five thousand persons. However, three types of programs are unquestionably more popular with inmates than with any "outside" audience.

The first of these is the news broadcast. Convicts have come to regard the daily newscast as indispensable. It is their current-history text-book; the foundation of their discussions about "the outside world." The ancient pastime of rumor-spreading in prison is burning low. Too many men get their information "straight from the feed-box" and are always at hand to answer a would-be rumor-starter with: "Aw, you're nuts! Jack King's broadcast didn't carry anything about Hitler being shot. Take a mope!"

The second type of program is the theater of the air. When such programs are presented, rival offerings have no appeal for a great majority of the inmate body. The next day, conversations invariably begin with a question like, (Continued on Page 37)

Gang Busters will go off for the summer on June 26 . . . The "Mighty Show" departs very soon . . . A show featuring Jane Froman, Jan Peerce and an orchestra conducted by Erno Rapee has been auditioned, and the names mentioned means that it should make for grand radio entertainment . . . The character of "Archle" heard on the late "This Is New York" series has been transformed into a dramatic show and the auditions give it good reports . . . Edythe Wright and Tommy Dorsey apparently have agreed to disagree again, because the songstress is leaving the band for the second time in a few months . . . Bob Crosby was in New York for a short visit to talk business with a prospective sponsor, who, I'm still inclined to believe, is the cigarette-maker who pays Benny Goodman his radio salary . . . Mark Warnow was given a renewal for another thirteen weeks on the Lucky Strike "Ill Parade," which makes it twenty-six straight weeks for this bandsman. No other ork-pilot has been on this show for even as long as thirteen consecutive weeks since the program hit the air . . . The Phil Baker show has added a swell Hawaiian string ensemble to the program . . . The band Ray Noble is conducting on the Burns and Allen program from New York is not the same one he used on the Coast. In most cases, whenever a bandleader goes from one coast to the other a new band has to be organized because it's much cheaper than transporting an entire crew across the country.

In case you don't know it, Harry Horlick is back on the air on Friday nights. Horlick and his grand music have been missed by many dialers, including your reporter . . . And I hope that Chesterfield ciggies uses announcer David Ross on their new Fred Waring series. It's a combination that goes well together . . . Last week I told you that "Information, Please" was going to be made into a series of movie shorts. Now comes word that you can get an "Information, Please" book containing questions and answers of thirty-five quiz sessions . . . The popular CBS quiz show, "March of Games," which is handled by some smart youngsters, has a book of questions and answers under the program's title and it is grand to have when you have guests over . . . A new song soon to be published is, "That I Did, That I Did," which will be introduced by the Andrews Sisters. The idea for the title was taken from the very funny "Man in the Box" skits on the Phil Baker show, which is written by Dave Schwarz, a newcomer to radio-writing who has made good . . . All's fair at the World's Fair and it wouldn't surprise me if Grover Whalen asked Dick Himber to get a new theme song. His current signature number is "It Isn't Fair" . . . While on the subject of the Fair, the Vox Pop show may continue through the summer with the program coming direct from the World's Fair grounds . . . That's where the new Ray Perkins show originates and it has a new and novel twist. The program awards prizes of \$150 in cash to the writers and recipients of the winning letter. All you do is visit the Westinghouse exhibit at the Fair and write a letter home. The letter is mailed free



of charge and a copy is retained for the contest. A board of judges selects the four most interesting and witty and these winners will also be invited to appear on the Ray Perkins program. Oh yes, the addressees back home also receive cash awards. I almost forgot that.

Behind the Scenes

Spring has finally hit the radio actors. I went to a rehearsal of "Cavalcade of America" Monday and got there before things had started. One of the actors, Frank Readick, had won his first golf tournament of the season the week-end before and the entire cast was talking about nothing but golf. When it was time for dress rehearsal to start, Homer Fickett, director of the program, stepped to the loudspeaker mike. "Ladies and gentlemen," he announced, "the Cavalcade of America Golf Tournament is about to begin. May we have quiet, please, while Thomas Chalmers tees off?" And the rehearsal was under way . . . While listening to a rehearsal of Columbia's "Aunt Jenny" program, actor Kenneth Delmar sat down beside me. I noticed that his watch was twenty minutes fast, and knowing how important time is to radio actors, I mentioned it to him—but I needn't have bothered. Kenneth, it seems, always keeps his watch twenty minutes fast. When it's only five minutes ahead it has no effect on him, but when it is twenty minutes ahead he looks at it and it scares him so he rushes as fast as he can and always gets where he's going just about on time . . . Preliminary rehearsals of the "Gang Busters" program are very dignified affairs. The actors sit in a row of chairs on one side of the studio, and the production man, engineer, sound-men and script-girl sit at a table on the other side of the room. The actors read through their parts sitting down, the sound-men note down their sound-effects, the script-girl checks the changes as they are made in the script and the engineer notes his problems as well as timing the first read-through with his stop-watch. The production-man, of course, does the directing, and later, when everyone knows what his own special problems are, they go through the whole thing "on mike."

The last time I heard Bob Ripley's "Believe It Or Not" program I wondered how they got that deep-throated, eerie sound when they announced, "Believe It Or Not" at the beginning of the show. Well, believe it or not, but I made a special trip to CBS Radio Theater No. 1 last Friday to find out. In case you're interested, that hollow-voiced effect is created by putting a long seven-foot tube about twelve inches in diameter into a grand piano. A mike is placed at the end of the tube inside the piano and then the piano is covered with a large blanket to keep the sound in. When the announcer shouts, "Believe it or not" into the end of the tube it's exactly like hollering down a rainbarrel . . . Caught a rehearsal of Columbia's "Tune-Up Time" this week, too. Andre Kostelanetz, "Tune-Up Time" maestro, is still unearthing new oddities like tin whistles, rubber hose, cuckoo clocks, bottles and what have you for use in his orchestral arrangements. When he played the Kostelanetz version of "The Mikado" he used one of those glass-prism affairs that can be hung from the bottom of a chandelier and which tinkles whenever there's a breeze. One of his musicians stood with it at a mike and jingled it at the beginning and the end of the number to create an oriental atmosphere. Wonder what Andre will think of next?

one room. Grandma Esther was only sixty then and she had to work hard to feed that little runny-nose brat.

Izzy was a brat, bawling one minute and singing the next. Grandma Esther sent him to school here and there, but every time he got a chance to make a few pennies he quit school. Pennies were more important than history. You can't eat history. However, a lot of folks are eatng it today and it doesn't rest well on the stomach.

Izzy Iskowit of New York's Ghetto got shoved around by people and circumstances when he was a kid, so Izzy grew up to be Eddie Cantor of the radio and the movies and the stage, a champion of underdogs

EDDIE CANTOR was born in a dump by the side of the road—Tobacco Road. And he became a friend to many men and all kids.

Forty-five years ago Izzy Iskowit slept on a bare floor with unwashed immigrants. Ten years ago he was worth a million, earned honestly, despite the times. Eight years ago he was broke again. Last year, in London, a spotlight reserved for kings was turned on the jester and a big man said, "Eddie Cantor, a Jew, is the best Christian I know."

God bless America! A gentleman at Monticello takes up the cudgel for the poor. A roughneck in Tennessee, tough as old hickory, hauls out his horsestols to defend the downtrodden. An ugly man with a wart emancipates millions and keeps a surging, squalling family of brat states under the same roof. A pop-eyed kid is spewed from the stinking gutters and lives to be called beloved. God bless America!

Although there is a Tobacco Road in

Georgia, the gummy road has come to mean a sordid thoroughfare from Maine to California along which struggles one-third of a nation. The road runs past Eldridge Street in Manhattan's Ghetto, where there is nothing much except hope, and precious little of that.

Izzy Iskowit was born with egg eyes and spider legs over a Russian teashop in the Ghetto on January 31, 1893. Grandma Esther lived down there, too. Grandma Esther had a tongue like parted lightning and a love as huge as the sky whence lightning comes. She would box a fellow's left cheek and kiss his right, and feed him and put him to bed.

IZZY'S mother died before he was dry behind the ears, and his father soon after. The meanest team of the Apocalypse, disease and poverty, loped around the Ghetto day and night and they ran over Izzy's parents. But not Grandma Esther!

She took Izzy to her home. It was

The boy's favorite stunt was to imitate the Polish girls who flopped in Grandma Esther's one room. He was a figgly, springy boy, smart-alecky.

Not far away on Henry Street lived Ida Tobias, and Izzy would roll his popped eyes at her and she would giggle. Sometimes they would walk along Henry Street holding hands. And one night Ida was sitting at home in the dark and her mother said, "What are you doing, Ida? Dreaming about that pop-eyed, skinny little loafer with the bum jokes?" Mrs. Toblaa didn't know Izzy was with Ida.

He was a good impersonator. He could take off Grandma Esther to who laid a chunk. He'd take off anybody, even the Tammany bosses, who were taking off of everybody. He got two-bit jobs here and yonder and got fired for kidding and clowning.

But down on the Bowery at Minor's Theater the big-hearted management conducted an amateur night. He'd give a kid a dollar if he made the grade. If he didn't make the grade the boss would yank him off the stage with an iron hook. Izzy took a chance. He mimicked a ward politician and won the \$5 top award.

Out at Coney Island he got a job as entertainer in a saloon.

"It was Carey Walsh's Cabaret," Cantor said. "I was only a singer at first, but when I discovered that waiters made more, I became a singing waiter. Jimmy Durante played the piano, and I acted before the most critical audience in the country—one that wouldn't hesitate to throw anything from a lamp-post on down if they thought the song was rotten."

His first real break came when the juggling team of Bedini and Arthur gave him a spot. They played at Hammerstein's Victoria. And we might as well tell this story right now. Bedini and Arthur were good to Eddie. Years and years later, Bedini died, and so did

vaudeville, and Roy Arthur was on his uppers. Cantor heard about it and gave Arthur, known as Bunky, a job on his radio staff for life. He's Eddie aide-de-camp.

Gus Edwards saw Cantor work, and in 1912 Grandma Esther's boy joined Edwards' "Kid Kabaret," the cradle of many of the theater's great. Other kids in the "Kabaret" were Georgie Jessel, Georgie Price, Lila Lee, Eddie Buzzell, Gregory Kelly and a hooper now known as Walter Winchell.

The kids barnstormed, and on a tour Eddie met Will Rogers and idolized him. He still idolizes Rogers' memory almost to a maudlin degree. He owns a priceless collection of Rogerana, the largest in the world.

In 1913, the "Kabaret" was acclaimed in New York and Cantor was made. Ida had done all right. She had a job and her folks had moved from Henry Street out to Brooklyn. The wedding was at her folks' flat. The friends asked her father to suggest a wedding present and Mr. Tobias said, "I think Eddie can use the cash." They took up a collection of \$60, and on June 9, 1914, Eddie sailed for England with a bride, \$2,500 and a good dose of seasickness.

THEY took in London and London took them, and soon the \$2,500 was gone and Ida suggested Eddie get a job. He placed in a thing called "Charlotte's Revue." It did all right until the caissons began rolling. Oh, Lord, will they ever stop?

Back home, he teamed up with Al Lee and toured the vaudeville circuits. Ida toured with him. There was a dog act in the show and one of the Mexican bull pups was named Punillo. Mrs. Cantor said the pup looked like Eddie, or vice versa. They bought the dog and Ida began calling Eddie Punillo. She still does.

Earl Carroll spotted Cantor on the West Coast in 1916 and persuaded

Oliver Morosco to hire him for "Cannary Cottage," a musical comedy. In it, Eddie played with Charlie Rugglea and Trixie Friganza.

Ziegfeld, God's gift to A. T. & T. stockholders, was the head man of New York's musical show empire. Cantor was plugging along out West. Ida was busy, too. Marjorie was a baby.

One day, like a bolt from the blue, Cantor got a telegram from his agent that Ziegfeld had booked him for twenty weeks in the Midnight Frolic, on the New Amsterdam Roof.

Eddie almost collapsed. He didn't know that his agent was pulling a fast one. In New York Eddie discovered the Great One not only hadn't promised him a spot but didn't even know him. However, he didn't know all that when he went up to Ziegfeld and Gene Buck and said, "I'm Eddie Cantor."

Ziegfeld stared at him. "What do you do?"

"I'm marvelous," Cantor said.

"How do you know?"

Cantor said, "I wouldn't lie to you."

The Great One said, "I'd better go to lunch." But Buck stayed. Cantor lifted his heart out of his boots.

Buck let him sing "Oh, How She Could Yack! Hicky Wicki Wacki Wool!"

He even let Cantor tell this joke: "My father is a nice fellow. He ought to be back soon. After all, no matter how nice you are, you can't work in a bank and bring home samples."

That was 1916, not 1929!

Buck talked a bit with him and said, "You're in the show."

From the Frolic, he was in the Follies with Will Rogers, W. C. Fields, Fannie Brice and Bert Williams.

Cantor started crusading when he was a kid. He always hated bullies. He was a little fellow and got kicked around a lot, and as he grew older he formed a contempt for big men who picked on little men. And he always had a feeling for the underdog. It was

natural for him to take an active interest in Actors' Equity (snooty name for a union) back in 1920. Actors took a lot of punishment from producers and their stooges back in those days. So the actors got together and unionized art. It was a terrible thing to do! The producers said so, and that made it true.

Today, Cantor is the crusader with a cudgel, the militant missionary. He was the first president of the American Federation of Radio Artists. He's been head man of just about every organization in the actors' world. There is no telling how many children he has helped.

The fat 20's wallowed by, and Cantor made a fortune. You remember such shows as "Make It Snappy" and "Kid (Continued on Page 41)

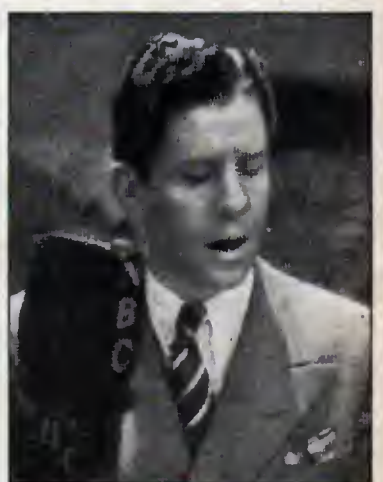

CHICAGO.—"Knickerbocker Playhouse," a new half-hour dramatic show, bowed locally over WBBM Sunday, April 30. It's scheduled to go CBS May 21. The first show was "House Forsaken," with a cast headed by Elliott Lewis, sensational young star imported from the West Coast; Betty Lou Gerson, popular Chicago actress; and as guest, Ian Keith, stage and screen veteran. Keith also received the first of a series of "Knickerbocker Awards" for dramatic distinction. "House Forsaken" was a swell starter. The plot seemed to have been inspired by an actual situation in Evanston, Illinois, where a lover died just before the wedding, many years ago, and his fiancée left the car that was to have been their wedding coach standing beside the house, where curious passers-by peek at it through the weeds.

Hey, Rube!

Something rather unique has come to my attention. It's about a newspaper compositor who heard the call of radio. He came back to his home state of Illinois from Florida, landed a local spot on WHIP, Hammond, Indiana, and proceeded to put on a rube sketch that is wowing listeners and interesting radio higher-ups. I. W. Dunning takes the part of a couple dozen characters besides the title role of Rube Limpkins and does them well. Drawing fifty letters a day on a small local station illustrates how a Rube Limpkins or anybody with that certain spark can set the radio ether on fire—sometimes. Often a real spark smolders to ashes because broadcasting officials get smoke in their eyes, like other humans.

Head or Television?

You can flip a coin as to just when television will become a widespread popular reality in the United States, but you can bet on one sure thing—if you think of television images as a series of blurred lines, you'll be very pleasantly surprised. On April 24 television came to Chicago for several days, came lock, stock and iconoscope in the shape of a special portable televising outfit which Philco Radio & Television Corporation is taking on a Coast-to-Coast tour. You know, perhaps, that the range of television is about forty or fifty miles. The range of this particular set-up was much shorter—confined to the space inside an auditorium—but the principle was the same. Those who had heard about but had not seen a television demonstration were enthusiastically impressed by the vividness and three-dimensional effect of the images on the eight-by-ten-inch screen. The fidelity of the sound reproduction, too, was very high, as a group of local radio stars went through their paces for the demonstration.

June Marches On in May

Now it can be told for your benefit and mine that NBC's former screen actress, June Travis, has been on the air for three months incognito. It was a commendable gesture, typical of June's earnestness about the radio business, that she agreed readily with NBC to their letting her act for a while without a "name," in order to give her full opportunity to learn all there was to learn about the radio technique. So she did several "Story of the Month" roles as an unknown. She made her "name" debut in "Lights Out" April 26 (did a bang-up job). June now has a starring role with Karl Weber in "Shadows of the West," May's "Story of the Month." So NBC and June fooled us—yes, us—they scooped me, too. Ah, well, it's all for the best.



From Les to Moore to You

Many readers continually inquire about the background, the appearance and other characteristics of Les Tremayne, one of the most popular radio actors—not only of Chicago but of the country. The star of "First Nighter" and "Betty and Bob" hereby gives the lowdown on himself. There would be more to tell if space allowed, for Les' dramatic background is tremendous,

even if it does just go back to 1917, when Les was four years old. Take the mike, Les.

"First, let's get the facts about my appearance out of the way, for I'd rather talk about acting. I'm five feet ten and one-half inches tall, weigh 155 pounds, have fair complexion, auburn hair, blue-gray eyes, a mustache and a baritone voice. I'm single.

"I was born in London, England, April 16, 1913, of a theatrical family on my mother's side. My first professional appearance was in a motion picture with my mother, Dolly Tremayne, when I was four. My educational background includes New York, Chicago, Iowa, Oklahoma, Kansas City, and private tutoring while in pictures in England. I've had special work in commercial art, drama, sculpture, dancing and vocal.

"My dramatic career includes everything from school and church plays in Oklahoma and tent-shows around the middle West to heavy drama. Some highlights are: Played the lead, Nicodemus, in the religious drama, 'The Messiah,' with a thousand in the cast, when it was dramatized for the first time in 1933; played Septimius in the American premiere and first performance in 300 years of Handel's 'Theodora'; made radio and personal appearances as special impersonator of the voice of President Franklin Roosevelt.

"Have been director, instructor in make-up, stage-manager, stage-hand, scenic artist, writer, hooper, vaudeville comedian, vocal soloist, dramatic reader, barker at fairs, stooge for magielan, boy soprano in church choir, and jockey.

"I have no strong likes or dislikes, and try to enjoy everything, for life is short. We're all escapist and speed is my method—plus beautiful women, nature and fun. Those beat drink or a shot in the arm. Incidentally, they call me Speed."—Signed: Les Tremayne.

The March of Music

To the Ladies!

WHAT the Red Cross is to the world in general, the National Federation of Music Clubs is to the world of music in America. Both are humanitarian upbuilders, spread a spiritual message and give practical succor and sustenance.

The special domain of the N. F. M. C. (as that organization is universally called) is to foster the public love of good music, to encourage its practice among the members, to sponsor concerts and stimulate patronage in every community, and to hold prize contests for composers and native young artists.

Before 1893, there were many women's music clubs in our country, but they operated individually until that year, when at the Chicago world's fair their representatives assembled and formed the N. F. M. C.—with twenty clubs—under the honorary presidency of Mrs. Theodore Thomas, wife of the famous conductor of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. The first biennial convention was held in 1899. Now the Federation has grown to embrace 4,800 music clubs in forty-seven states, Alaska, Canada and the Panama Canal Zone, with a membership of some 500,000. The current president is Mrs. Vincent Hilles Ober, of Virginia.

In addition, the Federation has a junior division of 2,500 clubs, with about 6,000 members, having their own Junior Bulletin, courses of study and contests.

Through programs and concerts, the Federation clubs spend annually about \$3,000,000 and are the backbone of the recital patronage; indeed, they developed it, and without them it would be difficult for touring artists to make their appearances financially successful.

On their own, the Federation clubs hold national Young Artists', student musicians' and Junior contests (established since 1913), and give awards of from \$500 to \$1,000. An affiliation with the Schubert Memorial, Inc. (New York) assures piano or violin winners engagements with the Philadelphia Orchestra and vocal winners an audition with the Metropolitan Opera.

In competitions for American composers, since 1907 the Federation has presented \$50,000 in prizes, premiered their works (including four operas) at the biennials and given about 100,000 annual presentations of music by our native creators. Since 1931, the Federation commissions compositions from them.

Among other activities of the N. F. M. C. are a college-music survey, promotion of standards for music supervisors in public schools, radio broadcasts and recommendations, exchange programs with Europe and close cooperation with the Federal Music Project.

This week (May 16-23) the N. F.

M. C. is holding its twenty-first biennial in Baltimore, Md., with concerts, dance recitals, conferences, lectures, broadcasts, and social get-togethers.

There has been no force more helpful or constructive in American musical life than the N. F. M. C., and as at previous biennials, the Baltimore occasion is certain to bring forward more new and wider fields for its usefulness.

Speaking Up

A few months ago, station WQXR in New York, in search of novelty for their recorded symphonic programs, hit on the idea of broadcasting Edward MacDowell's second piano concerto. It used to be a favorite with pianists, but now is rarely heard. Eddy Brown, program director of WQXR, started on a hunt for a recording of the concerto. He found nothing in New York City, and only after a thorough search was he able to locate a recording by an obsolete company up-state.

He had the concerto played on the air. In less than a week, the station received almost two hundred letters praising the piece. Then five symphony orchestras decided to program it for next season. And finally, the World's Fair (N. Y.) chose it as the official American concerto for their festival of American music. It all happened on the strength of that one broadcast.

It was no surprise to Eddy Brown, however. He has always felt that the more American music is heard, the better it'll be liked. So he scheduled an American symphonic series to begin May 7 and run indefinitely every Sunday night at eight. He planned to include recordings of the best American modern music. But when he began to round up recordings for the series, he made the astounding and disgraceful discovery that practically no recordings of modern American music exist. Outside of a few outstanding examples, Brown was able to obtain only private recordings and some made at various music festivals, such as Yaddo. It took patience and long weeks of research to gather together a representative collection of recorded American works.

WQXR's experience should be a valuable eye-opener for the rest of the small stations around the country that broadcast recorded music. There is a demand for American music. The more it's played, the more people want to hear it. But if there are no recordings, it can't be played. And it's up to the smaller stations to see that such a situation is remedied, by creating a demand for more recorded American compositions. At a time when phonograph sales have reached a new high, it is inexcusable that some of our best native music should remain practically unknown.

FORECAST

SUMMER is officially on the way when Howard Barlow opens his annual Sunday symphonic series. This year it will not be known as "Everybody's Music" but merely as the Columbia Symphony Orchestra Hour. The time, however, will be the same, every Sunday at 3 p.m. EDT.

The National Federation of Music Clubs sponsors a large number of programs on both CBS and NBC this week. They afford a good opportunity to keep up with what is being done by various amateur groups around the country.

Gluck's two operas dealing with Iphigenia and happenings in Aulis and Tauris are practically unperformed these days, but their chastely classical overtures survive enduringly.

The composer, with his disdain of coloratura arias and other merely display music, had difficulty in getting "Iphigenia in Aulis" premiered in Vienna, where operatic traditions were Italian; like-

wise in Paris, but Queen Marie Antoinette (Gluck had been her childhood teacher) intervened, and in 1778 the work came to successful first hearing there. The libretto, based on the Racine play, is the story of how Diana saved Iphigenia from becoming a sacrifice to the god of winds when Agamemnon's fleet is becalmed in the harbor of Aulis.

Felix Mottl (1856-1911), one-time assistant to Wagner at Bayreuth, served as conductor at the Metropolitan in 1903. His skillfully orchestrated suite consists of excerpts from works by Rameau, early French composer of operas and ballets and author of a celebrated treatise on harmony.

MacDowell and Griffes offer interestingly contrasted styles, with the former more "American" than his younger countryman. Griffes, trained principally in Paris, fell strongly under the influence of the impressionism which found its peak in the music of Debussy and Ravel.

The ballet "Pulcinella" (a sort of Punch) was premiered at the Paris Opera in 1920, and concerns itself with that hero's comical and amorous adventures. Stravinsky's score is made up of melodic fragments from the music of Pergolesi (early eighteenth century). Modern touches of harmony are added, but without losing the contours or charm of the original tunes. Reproached for that "sacrilege," the composer retorted, "Better to hear neglected Pergolesi this way than not at all."

Of his familiar "Scheherazade" (1881) Rimsky-Korsakoff himself said: "All I desired was that the hearer, if he liked my piece as symphonic music, should carry away the impression that it is beyond doubt an oriental narrative of some numerous and varied fairy-tale wonders."

If your tastes are like mine, you will at all times shut off everything else on the radio to listen to the tender and poetical "Siegfried Idyll" whenever it is on the air.

Have you ever met the homey and forthright type of individual who declares "You can have all your symphonies and sonatas and fugues and I'll take 'Annie Laurie' and 'The Last Rose of Summer'?" Well, here's his carnival feast and he'll have many companions in his enjoyment.

Not that simple folktonish music is beneath the rest of us, but without being snobbish, we still feel that it does not belong with the masterpieces. Some of this program is as an Edgar Guest poem to Shelley; "Shore Acres" to a Shakespeare drama; and the old chromo-lithograph "The Empty Cradle" to Rembrandt's "The Night Watch." Our homey friend who chokes up when he hears his favorite type of music is moved chiefly by association and not by the prompting of high art.

It would seem, too, that the Lord's Prayer and the Ten Commandments carry a sufficiently potent message without being transcribed into music or verse.

Max Bruch (1838-1920), one of the most popular composers of his day, is now best known through his G Minor Violin Concerto, whose sentiment and brilliancy still ensure occasional performances from outstanding players. The work, written in 1865, has lost nothing of its romantic appeal, with a dramatic first movement, a truly lyrical second part and a rollicking and tempestuous finale. Bruch's other generally familiar opus is his "Kol Nidrel," for cello and orchestra, a beautiful setting of the famous old ritual Hebrew air of lament.

Bruch also shone as a choral composer, and many of his vocal examples remain in the repertoire of singing societies. In 1883 he visited the United States and conducted his "Arminius" with a local chorus in Boston.

Something About Violin Concertos

FOR such a young art as music, history is astonishingly obscure about the origin of some of the most important forms of composition. For instance, violin concertos. Giuseppe Torelli (1660-1708) is believed to have written the first violin concerto, but the jury is still out on the question.

However, there is no doubt that, like the piano concerto, those for the violin developed from the sonata, copied its form and tendency, and added orchestration at first sparse and then with all the later enrichments. Tartini and Corelli had carried the sonata to its highest expression, and it was inevitable that its next step should be collaboration with orchestra. Both masters then essayed the concerto and achieved some notable classical examples which embraced the technical innovations of those virtuoso composers. Nardini, pupil of Tartini, left six violin concertos. Vivaldi improved the form so extensively that it served as a model for Bach's harpsichord concertos. Locatelli (1693-1764) was another early fashioner of violin concertos in the style of his period. Pugnani (1731-1798) came next, with his nine violin concertos.

All those men were not only expert performers but also eminent teachers, and they and their pupils built the foundation upon which rests the present perfected art of violin-playing.

It was Viotti (1753-1824), pupil of Pugnani, who is unquestionably the creator of the kind of violin concertos (twenty-nine) that bridged over the ancient orthodox type to the modern style practised by his leading successors. He made the solo passages an integral part of the whole and derived from the themes themselves. The Viotti music has fire and feeling, much of the simple charm of his famous contemporaries, Haydn and Mozart, and also their fullness of orchestration. Of the concertos prior to Mozart, only Bach's grandiose ones now have frequent performance.

Viotti's pupil, Rode, brought pure poetry to his concertos, while Kreutzer reverted to some of the dry scholasticism of his predecessors. Spohr, the German, gave broad melody and nobility of design to his nineteen concertos, of which No. 8 ("in the style of a song scene") has an honored place in the repertoire. Beethoven left only a single concerto, but it is one of the greatest two of all time, Brahms' being the other. The first movement of the Beethoven is a veritable symphony, and the same may be said of that of Brahms. The pair of works, together with Bach's (especially the E Major), several of Mozart's, and the imperishable Mendelssohn masterpiece are the concertos most revered by violinists as well as the rest of the musical world.

Now we come to the two virtuoso concertos of Paganini, chiefly featuring technical brilliancy but also containing much intrinsic beauty and expert

craftsmanship. The D Minor still is often heard. Ernst's F Sharp Minor tried to outshine Paganini in difficulty but lacked his invention and virility. De Beriot's concertos had vogue in their period, but at present find utterance chiefly in the classroom. His celebrated pupil Vieuxtemps carried on with distinction, his E Major concerto emphasizing all the glitter of the violin and most of the resources of the orchestra. His contemporary, Wieniawski, had greater melodic wealth and more sincerity of feeling. His D Minor concerto, active in the present repertoire, offers a truly romantic and lovely slow movement. Wieniawski's pages are the last of the real virtuoso concertos.

Beethoven set the standard which became general toward the end of the nineteenth century and dominates the twentieth. His D Major work has aptly been described as his "No. 10 symphony with violin obbligato." Bruch's G Minor, moved by the same spirit, has never lost its appeal and, for a while, rivaled Mendelssohn's E Minor in popularity. Saint-Saens (B Minor), Lalo (his "Symphonic Espagnole" is in reality a concerto), Godard ("Romantique"), Goldmark, Joachim ("Hungarian"), Glazounow, Dvorak, Tschalkowsky, each won acclaim with a concerto, the ranking one being by the last named. Elman once told me that he considers it only a whit behind Beethoven and Brahms in beauty, depth of feeling and mastery of workmanship.

Closest to our own time are the concertos by Elgar and Sibelius (recently come into use by many outstanding fiddlers) and some radical examples by Milhaud, Prokofieff, Szymanowski, Schoenberg and Americans Achron, Roy Harris, Roger Sessions. Less daring concertos by musical nephews of Uncle Sam have come from the pens of Carpenter, Jacobi, Schelling, Powell, Spalding, Stock. It is only natural these days to expect a concerto in jazz, and it has been furnished by Robert Braine.

Concertos for two violins were essayed by several composers, Bach's lone specimen being mightiest in that category. Brahms wrote one for violin and cello, but it does not touch his usual celestial heights. Nor does the triple concerto (piano, violin and cello) by Beethoven. Maurer (1789-1878) went them all one better with his concerto for four violins. Vladimir Dubensky (present member of the New York Philharmonic) has achieved no concerto so far, but hit a numerical high with his "Fugue for Eighteen Violins."

It seems reasonable that violinists should be best qualified to feature concertos for their instrument, but the undeniable fact remains that the acknowledged finest ones are by Bach, Mozart, Beethoven, Mendelssohn, Brahms, and Tschalkowsky—all of them pianists!

"Say, did you hear 'Silver Dollar' last night? That guy Edward Arnold knows his stuff!"

The third type is the educational program. The average convict is anxious to learn, realizing that the date of his release will depend to a great degree upon his self-improvement. Instructors in the prison school, which has served as a pattern for other prisons throughout the world, constantly recommend that their pupils listen to educational features of the air as an aid in their school work.

The rehabilitative and educational benefits of radio in prison cannot be too greatly stressed. Penologists now recognize the fact that the maladjustments of character which result in criminal tendencies cannot be beaten into submission. Rather, they must be corrected.

However, despite statistics which clearly prove that medieval forms of penal punishment have unquestionably failed to stem this nation's ever-rising criminal population, there are those adherents of the old school of straight-laced penology who censure authorities for "coddling convicted criminals."

When these advocates of ball-and-chain penal methods learned that inmates of this prison were to have the privilege of radio in their cells, a condemning chant of "sugar-coated prison modes" arose on all sides. Scathing letters were written to newspapers and state officials. Charges were made that the taxpayers were supporting a "country club for convicted felons." Through it all, Warden Jackson stuck to his guns, firm in his belief that his was the right course.

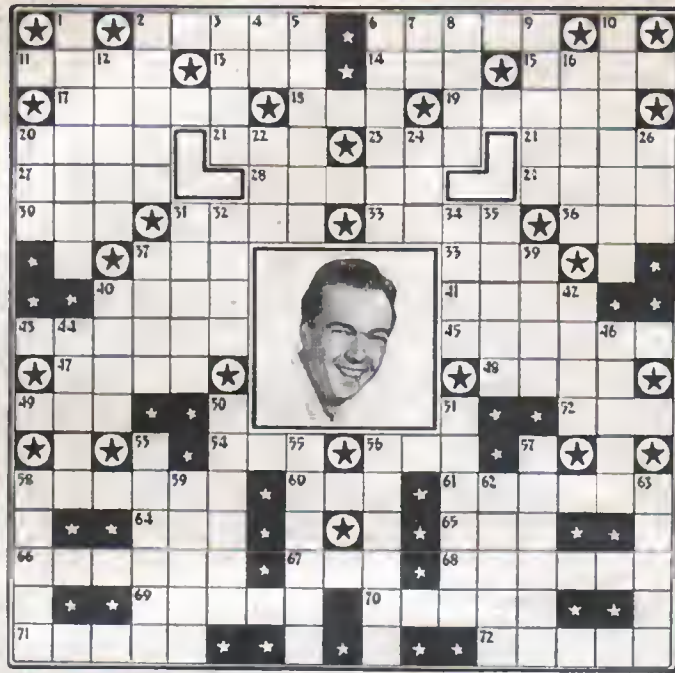
Today, the results of his judgment are apparent. Inmates are no longer isolated, virtually ignorant of what is happening in the world they once knew—hope to know again. Instead of marking time on the sidelines while humanity marches by, as they once did, inmates are now able to keep step—out of formation, it is true, but abreast of the column nevertheless.

Probably the most important result of radio in prison is the amazing degree to which the morale of the inmate body has risen. Inmates no longer talk solely of crime, prisons, other convicts, and officials. Rather, they discuss politics, the European situation, music and orchestras, sports and the common little every-day activities of people all over the country as relayed over the walls to them by the magic of radio.

To lie in bed at night, wide-eyed and studying the shadows of cell-bars cast upon the wall by dim night lights, is one of prison's most nerve-racking periods. In spite of thoughts and good intentions during the day, bitterness grips the mind with dark fingers when cell lights are turned off and men lie down to lose in sleepless misery. It is in such hours that persecution complexes are born and nurtured. In bygone years, one adage held true: "When convicts can't sleep, they plot."

The past tense is used in mentioning that adage simply because it no longer holds water. Inmates now retire when

THOSE BLESSED LETTERS

breakfast is flavored by a shriek of indignation from a particularly ardent member of the top gallery, who, much grieved, accuses me of not having used enough "make-up" in my last Sieglinde at the Metropolitan, and entreating me to put more gray on my eyelids in order to improve my appearance. And surely next time I shall put on "more gray" and wonder half smilingly whether my unknown critical friend is more satisfied.

I shall try to mention some letters which have been fixed in my memory.

There are those often very funny requests for assistance of a quite unusual sort. I remember one letter received in Vienna from two youths longing for adventure. They had seen me as Eva in the "Meistersinger" and were delighted at the readiness with which the well-bred little daughter of the goldsmith agreed to her knight's proposal to elope with him. Now they assumed that I would have a worthy understanding for absconding! Incited by my Evchen, they had decided to leave school, which bored them stiff, and to set out on a trip round the world. With due modesty they begged me to finance their ambitious and wild plan. I squared the unintentional demoralizing effect which, amazingly, my Eva had on the boys, and wrote them a letter which would have done honor to any manager of a reformatory for misguided children. Probably it brought them the first great disappointment of their lives!

Another young man from an Austrian provincial town bombarded me with voluminous letters. He merely wanted me to adopt him and at the same time to arrange that a certain conductor whom he admired as ardently as he admired me should become his adopted father. He could not conceive anything more beautiful than to be the adopted child of us both. Now, it happened that this very conductor was especially uncongenial to me; in fact, we were known to be antagonistic, and therefore this whole question assumed a very comical, and perhaps also a satirical, flavor. I finally wrote the boy—as considerately as to a poor idiot—that he was a big child to assume that I, etc., etc. That was a dangerous word . . . Henceforth I received passionate letters in which he only signed himself "Your big child"! He unfolded world-crashing musical ideas to me; with my help he wanted to place himself at the top of the musical tree, and I was courageously to fight all intrigues which might stand in the way of his goal! I actually received these letters for years; the youth never tired of assuring me of his filial devotion and of asking me for fantastic sums of money for all sorts of exalted purposes.

Only the other day a young man wrote me from a provincial town in the U. S. A. that he felt he was an immortal artist. He composed eternal works and would like to be the interpreter of his fictitious characters. But a great genius belonged in New York. He was sure that I would understand this and give him the means to live there carefree and to come in contact with "high life"! Apart from his living-

expenses, he asked me for \$370, as he absolutely must have a new trunk and other trifles.

A young girl asked me for dresses, hats, coats and underwear, as she was quite sure I never wore anything more than once and threw it away in any case!

Once when an interviewer in Vienna only had the sense to report that my dogs are named Mohrle and Jimmy, that they howl protestingly when I dare to sling and that I consider galoshes for dogs unpractical, I received an anonymous letter in which the angry writer asked whether all prima donnas stood on such a high intellectual plane and whether I was not ashamed to have talked such nonsense. Heavens, how right the person was who treated me so unkindly! I should have liked to reply so much and asked that the angry outburst should be slung in the face of the interviewer . . . But unfortunately this letter bore no name or address. A great pity.

An old man from a home for the aged in New York sent me a childishly painted bouquet of roses—with red, shaky pencil strokes—and a touching little note: he had no money to buy real flowers, but would I accept these from a radio listener?

In Australia a blind woman begged me for my photograph—she wished to hold it in her hands, even though she could not see it, but it sufficed her to know that it was my head that rested in her hands. How exquisite! That letter made me cry.

I once wrote a novel full of love adventures, and a young man, studying psychoanalysis, made me the bewildering proposal to experience these adventures—all wild figments of my imagination—with him! My husband and I laughed till we cried over this epistle.

THERE are often touching letters of closely written pages, wherein some very lonely soul seeks refuge with me, sometimes without an address—just to speak, to tell me things. Quite personal statements and simple every-day experiences . . . At first I thought, But why do they write me this? I do not know them, I cannot even reply, for neither names nor addresses are given . . . Why do they confide in me, a complete stranger? But I learned to understand it; they are people living alone without any "red-letter days," and a concert, a radio hour came perhaps as an ecstatic, deeply felt uplift in their monotonous existence. And they want to unburden themselves and make it clear to me how much it meant to them. In this way they come to tell me their story, and soon their whole life is laid before me, a movingly simple, barren life with neither heights nor depths . . . And once again I feel, with overflowing thankfulness, the great blessing which was bestowed upon me in my art. For by means of it I live a hundred-fold. And the more I begin to transform myself into another personality, the more truly I can make someone else's experiences my own, by sympathetic re-creation. In the words of Goethe, "Plunge yourself deep into the whole of humanity, and when you grasp it, then it will be absorbing . . ."

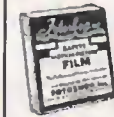

Boots" and "Whoopie." Eddie was cleaning up. In 1927, in his autobiography, "My Life Is In Your Hands," he said he had amassed a million dollars in ten years. He went into the movies in 1925 with "Kid Boots."

The years rolled by and the Cantors had five daughters—Marjorie, Natalie, Edna, Marilyn and Janet. Eddie hadn't capitalized on his family in those days. He didn't need to.

Brother Cantor sort of held his nose at radio in the early days. He had a million dollars in the Wall Street sock and the sock had a hole in it.

Now, here's a good one. It was Rudy Vallee again! Great stars, Vallee, how many more did you get started—Alice Faye, Bergen—and Cantor! It was in Miami and Eddie was on the program with Rudy. Rudy said, "Eddie, I think you've made a hit. You should make radio your business."

Eddie said, "I would, Rudy, but radio won't last."

That was in 1930, the year Brother Cantor went broke. He lost all he had,

that is, money, in twenty days! It had taken him ten years to make a million and twenty days to lose it.

Crazily enough, Cantor's great show just before the fall-down was "Whoopie." Everybody was making it. And then the hangover.

So radio wouldn't last, Mister Cantor?

Well, it was radio that saved him. It was radio that gave him the opportunity to become the crusading jester, the militant missionary. Grandma Esther's little boy Izzy no longer sang for Mr. Hearst and Diamond Jim Brady.

He started singing for the cross-roads' folks, and they re-made him. Grandma Esther would have liked that. She never saw the cross-roads' folks, but they would have got along swell.

So radio was a fad, Brother Izzy. Well, mister, there are three things you can't do—play the market and win, predict tomorrow, and have a son.
