Baukhage of Washington, and women's topics will be treated by Nola Luxford. This fills a gap in a Sunday afternoon program that needed filling. With Europe sizzling like a bomb fuse,

with a "lost" war raging on the edge of Mongolia, and with all-important sports events at home, Sunday paper readers want to know "what goes on." They'll learn if they listen to Mac and his expert associates on the new "Four Star News," broadcast over an NBC network at 5:15 p.m. EDT.

Desperation was in the voice of Mrs. Silverman when she spoke recently into a "We, the People" microphone, saying: "Tonight my husband is lying ill in a Brooklyn hospital. Doctors have done everything they know how but they say it is hopeless..." Mrs. Silverman then told that her husband had a rare disease. He needed a blood transfusion but doctors knew of no one who had survived that type of disease. "But there must be somebody," she begged. "Please get in touch with me immediately."

After the broadcast Mrs. Silverman received hundreds of telephone calls, telegrams, and letters. Four volunteers drove directly to the hospital. Only two had the right sort of blood. One was Patrick Mahon of Washington, D. C., veteran of the Lafayette Escadrille. The other was Col. L. B. Von Spach. Just before we went to press Colonel Von Spach gave his blood to the dying Silverman. If the latter lives it will be because radio and "We, the People" proved again their service to man.

Broken-hearted Bandleaders is what we called a recent RADIO GUIDE spread. Among our reasons for broken hearts was a fickle, forgetful public. To that should be added forgetful editors. We mentioned Will Osborne as a gent whose star had dipped into obscurity. We learn it simply isn't so. Mr. Osborne, after

weathering the Rudy Vallee feud, really went to work. 1935 found him at the Lexington Hotel, New York; 1936, Chicago's Blackhawk Cafe; 1938, Glen Island Casino in New York; 1939, the Strand Theater, N. Y., for three weeks, then the Park Central Hotel, and now he plays at the Palomar in Los Angeles. Besides that, he has made Decca records for four years, played college proms at almost every university in the land. Indeed, about the only person who has forgotten Will Osborne is RADIO GUIDE's caption writer. But we cite the above dates for another reason, namely, to illustrate that bandleaders do have good reason for unhappiness if their careers turn them into such musical grasshoppers that they can never settle down and live in one place more than a few weeks at a time.

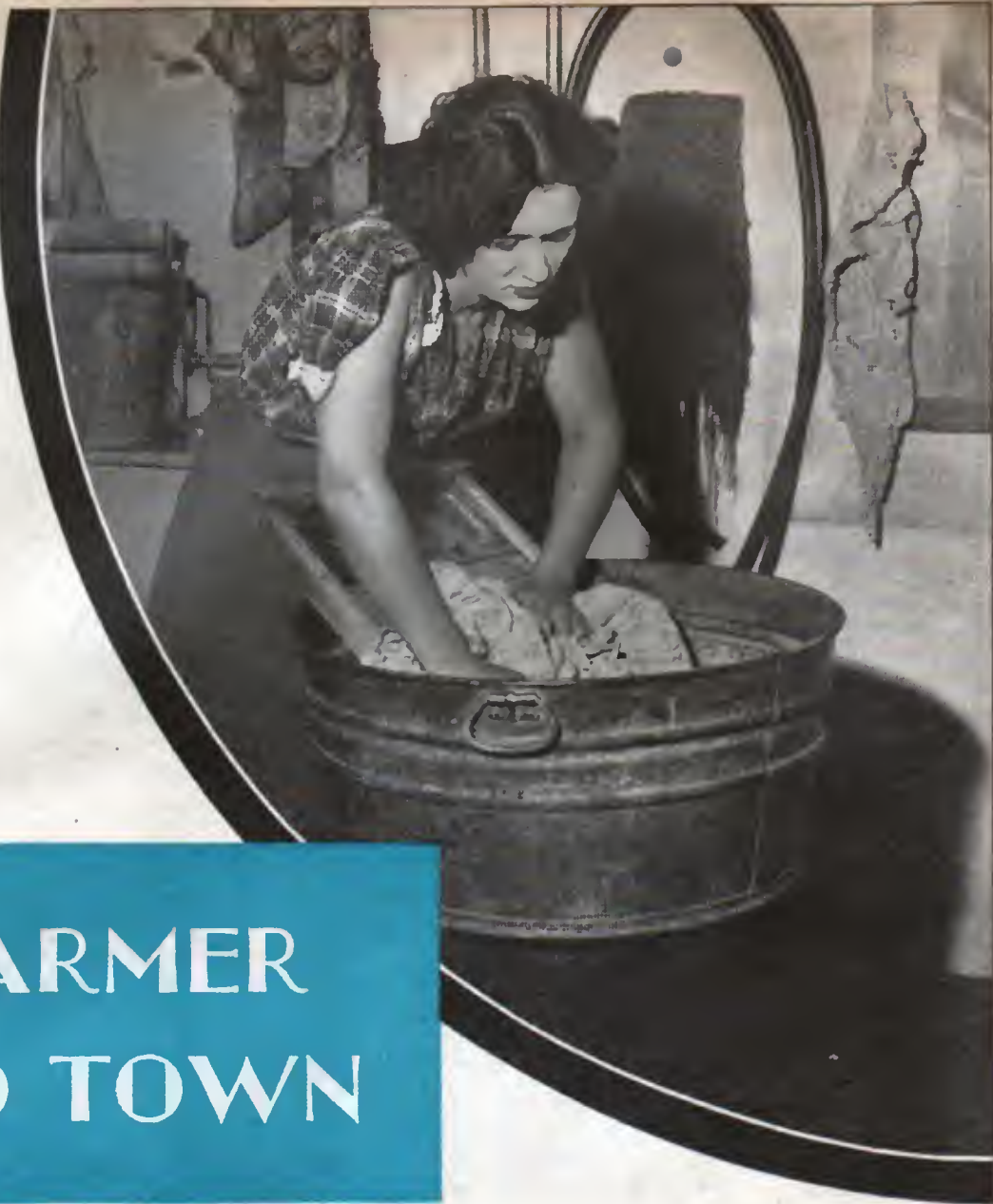
Remember the farmer's wife of a generation ago? Symbol of drudgery among women, she washed with tub and board (right), had two or three dresses, said nothing because she had nothing to say

THE woman of the moment is the farmer's wife. What she likes determines the output of half the factories of America. The buying-power of agriculture is in her hands—and her spending is the difference between good times and bad times. Economically, she is the most important individual in the land.

But she is important in other ways. Her willingness to bear large families makes possible the continued increase in the country's population. City women won't raise many children. And when they want to, they can't because the cost of living is too high.

Today we are on the eve of a presidential election. Ask any political wiseacre and he will tell you that the farm vote will elect the next occupant of the White House. In the final analysis, it is the farmer's wife who will determine and deliver this vote. She will decide whether or not the New Deal has done a good job, and she will help her husband and grown children decide.

So you have, in every way that means anything, a woman of the hour, a person of exceptional significance. And she is brand-new on the American

scene. A few years ago, what was she? Ask yourself the question, what sort of a person was the farmer's wife ten, twenty years ago?

I remember her as a bustling dear who was an expert on cookies, jams, truck-gardening, butter-making, quilting and egg-hunting. She had two, maybe three dresses, and they were built to be handed down even unto the fourth generation. When her husband and his men friends talked of the affairs of the world, she sat in a corner knitting, listening, with bugged-out eyes, saying nothing. She kept silent because she had nothing to say.

That kind of woman still exists. But so do buggy-whips and high-wheeled bicycles. Something happened to her—something as magical in its way as the thing that happened to Cinderella—and that something is radio. Something as wonderful as the change of caterpillar into butterfly.

The old preradio farm was a fastness, with walls around it. The world could not enter. But no walls, no isolation, is proof against the catapults and battering-rams of the million and one radio programs that have been spun into the ether since broadcasting captured the country. The country woman is out of her hayseed cocoon for all time—and she is on her way to town and vast accomplishments.

Look at her today, slamming the door of her car, stepping smartly up the walk, her high heels clicking. Her flared, shortish skirt whips against her silk-

stockinged legs. The accessories are correct. The lady knows her clothes.

Listen to her talk. Quick, shrewd and well-expressed comment on Steinbeck and Strachey, Hemingway and Stuart Chase. She gives vent to her outrage over high-school immorality, Hitler, war—and demands action. She gets action. She organizes committees to petition the Government. Horrified over death on the highways, she puts on safety campaigns. Disturbed by Hallowe'en pranks, she leads the spirit of mischief that prevails on that day into healthy channels. In a thousand rural towns and villages the holiday is now safe and sane.

THE automobile and the movies helped—but radio gave her the vision of a broader world and nagged her into doing something about it.

From the air she picked bits of advice and practical information, out of which she reconstructed her home and her personality. She bought factory-made bread partly because it was good bread but largely because she wanted time off from baking to do some of the things she had been inspired to do by broadcasts she had listened to. For the same reason she bought a washing-machine, an electric iron and other work-savers. They gave her leisure, time to talk and think. And she used it. In the family car she whipped off to town to take part in community activities, national conventions.

Something of this sort has happened, is happening to some ten million women. And they're marching, for the first time lending to the larger affairs of the continent their gifts, their intelligence, their great reserves of energy. It was to help them that most of the larger universities established correspondence schools. It is to meet their demand that half the book presses in the country roll. The largest sales of books are not through the city shops, but by mail, and door to door, to rural buyers, eighty percent of whom are women.

The other day some 1,500 farm "homemakers" spent a week in camp, ten miles outside of Little Rock, Ark. They came without their husbands or babies. They sang, they put on plays, they did square dances. They debated the third term, they discussed an embargo on Japan. In no way could you have distinguished these "girls" from their city sisters except for a greater robustness.

This sort of camp-meeting has become a yearly event in most of the forty-eight states, an annual convention of farm wives. By itself, it is significant. It is also important as indicating the growth in these women of a solidarity, of a feeling that they are growing up together, thinking along the same lines.

Radio's great lesson is, of course, music. And this the farm women have clutched hungrily. Mississippi alone boasts over three hundred community choruses. And in the country as a whole there are not

which both cure and prevent. The same is true of typhoid, which can be prevented by watching the source of milk and water supply; of malaria, which comes of living in unscreened houses.

Down in Elk City, Okla., Dr. Michael Shadid told his dust-belt neighbors of his plan to build a cooperative hospital. He told it to them dramatically over the radio. A family had only to pay \$25 a year and the hospital would care for every member, no matter what happened. The women pitchforked their husbands into supporting it, got the Farmers Union to take it over, and it came into being—America's first cooperative hospital, an institution that has been praised and pointed to by the highest medical authorities.

Over the radio one day the women in a township in Woods County, Ohio, heard of a group of Texas farmers who were making money by permitting city dwellers to hunt on their farms for the payment of a small fee. The women knew the township needed a new church building. They went out, signed up all the farmers, and in two years earned enough from renting hunting-privileges to construct a fine church

Meet Today's Farm Wife—A Cinderella released from the drab and the dull and the lonely by magic which rides the airwaves

less than one hundred thousand organized since the advent of broadcasting. At Springfield, Ill., I was one of ten thousand who gathered to hear 561 rural songbirds—most of them women—render a home-written cantata, "Joan of Arc." In Iowa, another group produced an opera and won praise from New York music critics. The opera was rehearsed and produced by radio.

Not long ago I sat in at a banquet in Memphis, Tenn. Gathered in the room were five hundred men and women, all of them sharecroppers and their wives. A cropper, if you don't know, is a tenant farmer who works his land for a share of the crop—and his average income is about \$250 a year, the lowest in the country. There they were—the poorest, lowliest farm women in America. And they were a sight to make your eyes glow and burn with tears of pride. No Parisian models. But they were all neat and tastefully clothed, fit to pass in any crowd. A short time ago they were wearing dresses made out of sugar- and fertilizer-sacks.

They were attending the banquet to celebrate the conclusion of a contest for farmers—and four out of five had learned about it from radio. Four out of five listened in on the radio for their daily mead of instruction. They gave a year's work to the contest. It meant a revolution in their way of farming—growing vegetables, keeping a cow, when they had only grown cotton before. It meant beautifying their

homes and grounds. They had come through. And not one among them had failed to increase his income from \$500 to \$2,000 above that of the year before.

Here is a story told me by Prof. O. R. Johnson of the University of Missouri. In the part of the state known as the Irish Wilderness, the women wanted a doctor. The men were indifferent. But the women, listening daily over wind-charger radios, were resolute. The least they could do with was a telephone—for emergencies.

THESE farm women got together, made their plans.

First, they sold some hens—good layers, many of them—and laid up a store of cash for supplies. Then they mustered the whole town, men, women and children, and set them to work. They dug holes and set poles. Eighteen miles along a wagon trail. Now in the Irish Wilderness there is a telephone, and a call brings a doctor in time to ease pain and save lives.

Sickness in the family has always been the woman's job. Now she knows what to do about it in a preventive as well as curative way. This is especially important in the cotton belt, where pellagra, a disease which is the direct result of improper diet, weakens and kills thousands yearly. Radio has taught the women to supplement their sowbelly, meal and sorghum diet with green-leafed vegetables,

and pay for an annual banquet and ball besides.

The farm woman is not only interested in purely local matters. Ask the secretary of any national organization about his rural membership and he will tell you that the number of farm-woman members has grown prodigiously during the past ten years. I know this is true of all the large peace organizations. I know it is true of the League of Women Voters. It is a growth which runs exactly parallel to the growth of radio. The next time a national convention comes to town, drop in and make the inquiry at the registration desk and you will find out for yourself how large a proportion hail from farms. Only in this way would you know. A look at the audience or the crowd in the lobby would tell you naught. Outwardly, these ladies of the fields and pastures are precisely as smart and as sophisticated as their urban sisters.

In purely agricultural matters, the merits of the new farm woman has also been recognized. A few years ago the county and state planning committees were all male. Today thirty-three states have opened membership to women. The number of members varies from one to twenty-six. About twenty percent of the total membership of these committees which plot the nation's farm programs is women.

On individual farms, the men are consulting their wives to an increasing degree. More women are studying agriculture at the state colleges. At Farm-

ers' Institutes, the proportion of women to men is almost fifty percent. The owner-operator of the largest farm in Ohio is a woman. A woman is also the head of the Turkey Growers Association of the same state. In New York I met recently a Mrs. Mabel White, typical of the new strain of farm wives. She owned and still owns an orange grove in Florida. It was paying her nothing. She jumped into her car, drove to New York, and investigated the way her oranges were being sold. She turned the management of the farm over to her sister. She stayed in New York to become the city's first woman commission merchant, selling not only her own crop but that of thousands of other farmers.

A woman in New Jersey was left with a blueberry bog. She was destitute. Inspired by a broadcast on plant-breeding, she set to crossing the big ones with the big ones. Now she produces for market those giant blueberries you find in any city fruit market.

The stories of women who are making a success of farming, with or independent of their husbands, can go on endlessly. The self-starting, rubber-tired tractors have helped a great deal by taking the muscle out of agriculture. But principally it was the radio which started them off by teaching them they were human beings with a right to independent lives.

The broadcasting companies are aware of the thirst of their women listeners for programs that help as well as entertain. And they have been generous of their time. Ohio, for example, reports that fifty-six county agents, men and women, are broadcasting regularly

scheduled programs over nine commercial stations. Sixteen out of the state's twenty-two commercial outlets are co-operating.

This is pretty much the story in every state of the Union. I have yet to hear of a commercial station that hesitated to give time to a program aimed at the farm home. In Colorado, Oregon, Oklahoma and Illinois, to mention a few I know of personally, the farm women run the programs themselves. They put on skits, news dramatizations, song-fests and novelties prepared and acted by themselves and 4-H Club youngsters.

These local broadcasts supplement the National Farm and Home Hour, which, as you know, is a week-day mid-day feature of the National Broadcasting Company. The value in dollars and cents of this program's steadfast listening public was recently recognized by a tire manufacturer who paid heavily for fifteen minutes of it in which to chronicle the exploits of typically successful farmers.

THE number of farm-women listeners is formidable. We are told that the number of radio sets on farms is today seven million, or seven times as many as in 1926. But does that tell the story? In Maine a check-up revealed that ninety-two percent of the farmers heard every broadcast. In South Dakota the percentage was only a trifle smaller. It is safe to say that where there are no radio listeners there is no electricity. And soon, if rural electrification proceeds at its present pace, there will be no farm without power. With universal power must come universal radio.

Right now it is safe to say that close to seventy percent of American farm women listen to the radio daily.

In fact, the noon hour around the radio has become a ritual in the farm home—among all members of the farm family. Of paramount interest, of course, is the broadcast of prices of corn and wheat and hogs and steers. Now it is not the man but man and wife together who decide whether it is propitious to buy or sell or keep.

SECOND in interest is weather news—and with it news of insect enemies. I was in New York State visiting a farmer friend of mine some years ago when the radio flashed a bulletin—a veritable Paul Revere of a bulletin. That country around Rochester is tomato country and that was the season the growers were getting ready to set out their plants. "Frost is coming," said the radio. Back into the barns the farmers rushed their plants. Tomatoes are tender things. That broadcast must have saved farmers thousands of dollars.

In the plains country, grasshopper bulletins are equally important. In Illinois, it might be chinch-bugs. And after the spot news is finished come the larger problems of agriculture—the merits of subsidies, crop curtailment, and so on. To these, the women listen as well as to the programs reserved for their special attention—recipes, fashion news, child-rearing, tips on make-up, reducing, flower gardening. Their dials do not rest on the agricultural broadcasts but run the gamut of radio entertainment. It was their protests that kept classic music on the air in one notable instance.

It may be that the relatively complete physical isolation of the farm woman and her family has contributed to the completeness with which they have embraced radio as an instrument of education, of entertainment, and of economic betterment. City folk, who need only ring a doorbell a few feet away to pass their spare moments in friendly, if idle, gossip, are not likely to use radio in the same way as farm folk who must travel miles for occasional visits, but who may turn their dials with no effort, thus opening a new world with myriad opportunities for spending leisure time. Yes, pity the poor farm woman, if you wish, but the seeming handicaps for which you pity her are actually working to give her an edge over her city sister.

Perhaps radio has performed no greater service to our land than this—the bringing of a broader knowledge of national and world affairs, as well as a greater technical knowledge and facility in their own particular work, to these women who live close to the soil.

Add to these qualities the wide range of information which pours from our loudspeakers daily—the knowledge of people and events and places, the happenings of the world—and we have as an integral section of our population a new and important group which can—and does—make its sound thinking felt in the throbbing pulse of America's life.

Too much of today's thinking has been done in the feverish heat of the mob—in crowded cities where self-interests and cross-interests have made themselves unduly felt. But on the quiet sweep of the prairie, in gentle southern clearings where a farmstead stands, thinking is unhurried and clear and sound and—most important—untouched by mob thought. It is no accident that so many of America's truly great have come from the farm.

Now, more than ever before, this will be true. For the farm offers—in addition to its healthy and wholesome way of life—all of the advantages that the city can offer by way of informative sources and sound entertainment. It gives to the farm mother the same advantages in the rearing of her children that city mothers have hitherto enjoyed. And the youthful product of today's farmstead—thanks to radio—can hold its own with any other group anywhere.

In virtually every subject of cultural and constructive interest, these newly awakened women participate attentively. It is not enough for them that they dress and talk and act like their city sisters, not enough that they sit beside them in committees and great national gatherings. They feel that they are individuals in their own right, peculiarly well-rounded women who have a definite contribution to make to the building of a greater America, in raising healthier, more intelligent children. To the achievement of this objective, they need all the facts, all the knowledge they can gather.

And in their homes, always miles from contact with other homes, the radio is their source of information. It is the world. Now that the walls about the farms are down and the little brown moth of a farm wife is out of the cocoon, she cannot do without it. Next time you drive by a farmhouse and hear the radio blaring, make up your mind that the sound is the roar of civilization in process of taking over a new wilderness.

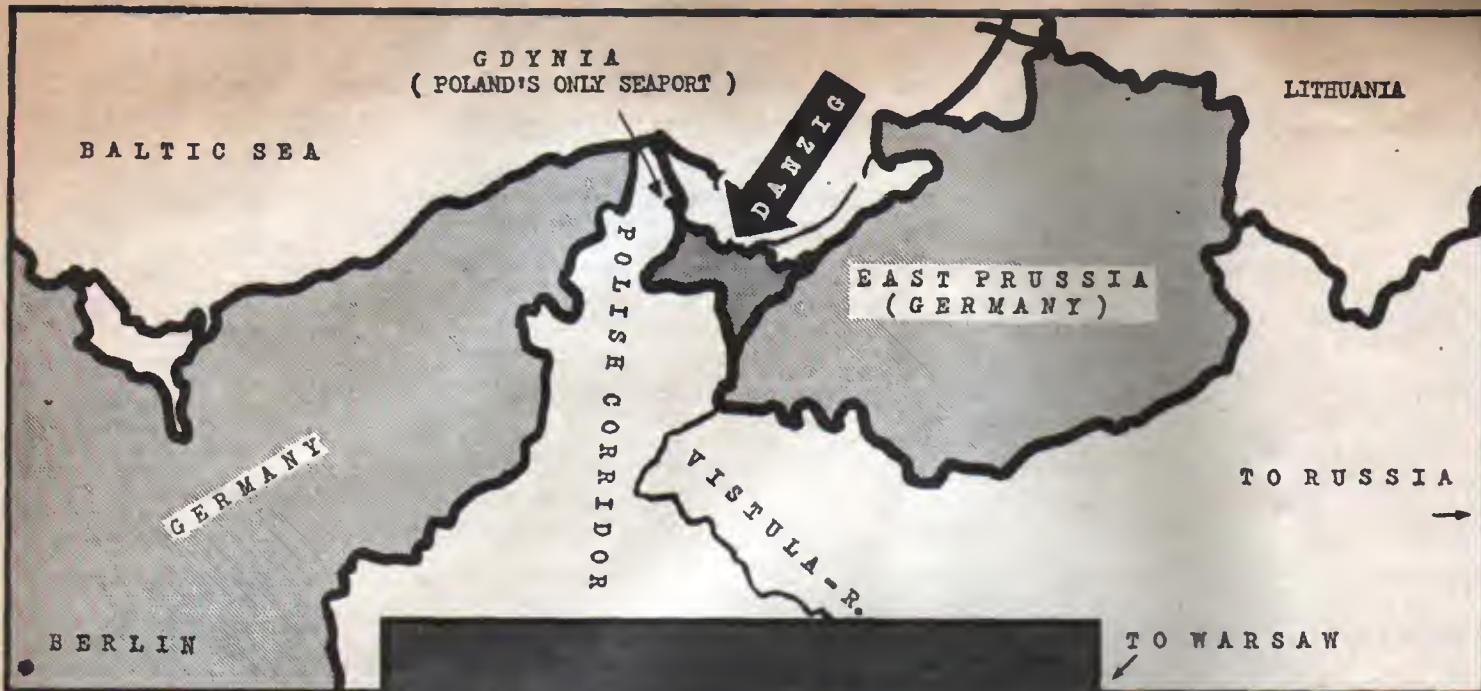

—DANZIG— THE DANGEROUS

By H. V. Kaltenborn

H. V. Kaltenborn, veteran CBS news analyst and commentator, is currently in Europe observing at first hand the many danger-laden situations from which sudden world war may arise. The following picture essay on Danzig, Europe's tinder-box-of-the-moment, is a result of these observations.—The Editor.

"POLAND will never relinquish her rights in Danzig!" Thus spoke Poland's diplomatic representative in Danzig when I visited him in 1936. "We regard our interests in Danzig as absolutely vital and cannot permit them to be interfered with."

At the same time, I spoke with Dr. Arthur Graiser, a Nazi and president of the Danzig Senate then and now. He said: "For the time being, we

want no change in the status of Danzig. Our economic relations with Poland are close and friendly, while our economic relations with East Prussia are unimportant."

Adolf Hitler, as late as February 20, 1938, said: "The Polish State recognizes the national status of Danzig while the Free City and the Germans respect Polish rights. Thus, despite Polish trouble-makers, the relations between Germany and Poland have become

a sincere and friendly collaboration." Then, suddenly, these peaceful protestations were forgotten, and across Danzig—where all had been accord

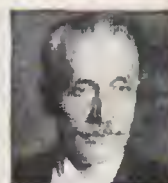
—flew threats and counter-threats between Germany and Poland. Danzig had become, overnight, Europe's powder-house. Relations could have remained friendly had Germany's Fuehrer not provoked a crisis. On March 21, 1939, Germany demanded from Poland not only incorpora-

tion of the Free City into the Reich but cession of a strip of Polish territory running through the Corridor. Poland's reply to these demands was conciliatory. Hitler did not answer. Instead, he announced Poland had refused to negotiate and denounced a ten-year friendship treaty between the two states.

What will come of these cross-interests? Poland's president, Ignatz Moscicki, has just said: "Danzig is as important to Poland as is the sun and the air." From Germany, silence accompanied by the secret infiltration of men and supplies to the Free City. To the hidden workings of Hitler's mind we must look for the answer to the question of the day: Peace or War?

NO PHONIES WANTED!

"Hollywood Showdown" introduces a substitute columnist for the vacationing Evans Plummer

HOLLYWOOD.—The day Evans Plummer, your favorite glamourland reporter, left for the High Sierras to pan for gold, he put me behind the eight-ball, a quartz eight-ball.

"Bock," said Plummer, "you're going to write a guest column for RADIO GUIDE while I'm looking for tooth-fillings.

"You're going to write me a guest column," he went on, ignoring the six-shooter gleam in my eye as if it weren't there, "about the gold-panning game you guys in the NBC Press Department in Hollywood have to play day in and day out with vacation visitors from Peoria and Manhattan."

"Well, Evans," I said, dropping the map into my desk until 1940, "you win. You've talked me into going to work. You mean how we pan out the genuine twenty-four-karat press representatives from the alleged and phony reporters and editors who try to 'One-Eye' Connolly their way into the NBC audience broadcasts in Hollywood?"

"That," said Plummer, tossing a typewriter into my lap and putting his mule-pack runabout in gear, "hits the nugget right on the noggin."

Long before Plummer had his first flat tire and ran out of gas crossing the Tehachapi mountains, I was glad to be behind the eight-ball. Here is my chance, I decided, to really give our out-of-town quest-lans a few pointers about broadcast tickets.

Demand vs. Supply

First of all, let's get chummy and comparative. One hundred thousand people would fill every hotel, apartment and house in South Bend or Gary, Ind.

If you're visiting Hollywood this week, you're just one of a hundred thousand people! That's how many are coming into Hollywood every week this summer.

Now, there are two things 99.4 percent of all the Hollywood visitors want to do when they arrive in these sun-drenched and burn-blistered parts. They want (1) to get inside a movie studio and (2) watch a broadcast. To emulate George Washington after he chopped down the cherry tree, either one is, honestly, as easy to accomplish as getting a guaranteed admission through the Pearly Gates.

Now let me point out that we're not ungrateful for all the interest. We are more than grateful. If the motion-picture and radio fans for one moment lost their appreciation of, or their consuming interest in, the two great industries of Hollywood, all of us here would have to start peddling soap or find us a plunger mine, like the one Plummer is looking for.

Radio Elected Chump

There are two reasons why we buy aspirin in bulk instead of dozen tins. One is the fact that radio and its stars are tremendously popular. The other is the equally well-grounded fact that motion pictures and its stars are tremendously popular. What's the connection? Lend me your shoulder, while I sob the story.

Every summer, the high-g geared motion-picture plants that dot the Hollywood landscape put on special shifts of watch-dogs to keep the visitors out.

Letting a few thousand visitors tumble and jostle through the sets each day slows down production, sometimes even ruins "takes." This costs money, a lot of money. The studios can't afford it, any more than the Peoria storekeeper or the Manhattan tycoon could afford it, if the visitors delayed THEIR business. That's where the screen gives a headache to radio. For every one of the visitors turned down by a movie studio, there is one knocking on the gates of Hollywood Radio City. I can hear the bulk of that 100,000 a week knocking right now, on the inside of my skull!

The Easy Way . . .

Do you really want to see the inner workings of radio in Hollywood? Then spend forty cents and take a studio tour of Hollywood Radio City (my colleague, Hal Rorke of CBS, will be phoning me a protest as soon as this RADIO GUIDE hits the stand, and asking me why his network didn't get a plug). Of all the hours you will spend in Hollywood, few will be more profitable than the sixty minutes you follow the courteous, well-informed and neatly uniformed NBC guide, who will show you what makes the kilocycles go around and take you through every inch of the sanctums of broadcasting. On that tour you will see not only the countless gadgets that make a

radio tick, but the chances are ten to one that you'll get a good look at one or all of such stars as Don Ameche, Edgar Bergen and Charlie McCarthy, Dorothy Lamour, Gale Page, Bob Burns, Irene Rich, Alec Templeton, Kay Kyser, Artie Shaw and others.

And the Hard Way

If it's an actual broadcast you want to see—ouch! there's that headache again—well, that's a horse of another color. Generally, all ticket requests for commercial programs with an audience should be made directly to the sponsor, and not to NBC. But don't forget you're not the only one making the request. There are thousands like you, and each of the NBC Hollywood studios holds only 340 people at a time. Some shows are all booked up for months (and years—honest!) in advance. Others may provide you with the priceless pasteboards six to eight weeks in advance. You may be disappointed even if you do write for tickets months in advance.

Enter—the Villains

With the blossoms came the thorns. But we call them phonies. Whatever you do to get broadcast tickets, don't be a phony. Even autograph hunters look down on them.

The NBC press department in Hollywood is a natural contact point for newspapermen. We do our level best to accommodate any representative of the working press whenever it's humanly possible.

If the newspaperman is unknown to us, we never fill a request for tickets by telephone. We ask him to come in and present working press credentials. It's a funny thing, but the real McCoy, a working reporter, doesn't mind showing credentials. The fellows who kick up the fuss are the fellows who are posing as something they aren't.

The Phonies

The phonies, as we call them, aren't always a pain in the cranium. Sometimes they give us a laugh that breaks through the clouds of delicate responsibility like a spring ray of sunshine warming through the gray sky to melt the snows of spring. (That's almost poetry!)

Take the fellow who has been coming in to the office every week for more than a year. Does he have credentials? Brother, you said it. A million of

FAITH HOPE CHARITY HARDING of Trucksville, Pa., is either the greatest oracle of all times or, at the age of four, the cutest hoax this side of Delphi, for, according to her mother, Faith predicts floods, fires and other unpleasant doings, then warns the folks to look out.

However, little Hope was among the many who are not allowed to speak for radio's "We, the People." A multitude calls to be heard as we the people on "We, the People," but only a few are chosen. "We, the People" are sort of scared of us, the people, because we can get "We, the People" in all kinds of jams.

Take little Faith, for example. She's a sweet little girl but she might be TNT for "We, the People." Mrs. Harry Harding, the mother, says that when Charity was three months old she began talking. Before she was eighteen months old (all of this is the mother's story) she was predicting disasters. The child said one day that a school at Trucksville would burn, and gave the details. Mrs. Harding notified the editor of a Wilkes-Barre paper and, a month later, the thing happened, just as the child said it would. The child predicted the tragedy of the British flying boat, Cavalier, and Mrs. Harding tried to warn the British ambassador, but he wouldn't talk to her. Faith, when she's in a predicting mood, will wake up at night and scream her prophecy. Mrs. Harding often wires or telephones a warning. There are many sworn records that events have come to pass as Hope predicted. Medical authorities

have examined the girl and will make no effort to explain her gift, if any.

She looked like a natural for "We, the People." The program heard about her through Transradio News and Mrs. Harding was contacted. Then she was sent a questionnaire and Faith's availability was submitted to the Listeners' Radio Committee, the supreme court of "We, the People." She was rejected. There was no announced reason for the rejection, but studying the files we found what we believe kept Faith from us, the people. Hope may be edging into world-power politics and, her mother said, the child is ready to help stir the German people against their rulers and save civilization.

That's dynamite. It is amazing how many persons believe in prophecies, and if a child had predicted a change in German politics thousands believed it and stampeded millions. A child's simple words over such a powerful medium as radio might rupture the economic and social status of millions. Don't scoff. Remember Welles and Mars.

Selecting the people who are "We, the People" is a tough assignment. It's a competitive business, too, and Believe It Or Not Ripley often gets to the people before "We, the People." Even after a person is spotted for the program, there are many possible slips before he is presented from New York's CBS studio.

There are the interesting Beanes of Little Beanes Road, N. C., which is so far from town that it costs \$3 to get a

WE, THE FORGOTTEN PEOPLE

The "Hermit of Tolstoy Park," eighty-two, of Montrose, Ala., wrote: "One day of that foul air (New York) might cause my death." His story of the simple life at a dime a day, the Committee decided, wouldn't be worth that

telegram delivered. Elvin Beane and his wife are only four feet tall. Many years ago they showed up in Randolph County, N. C., and opened a crossroads store. The folks called it the midget store because its furnishings were so small. At first the mountaineers were a mite curious about the Beanes, but the Beanes just kept selling beans and didn't tell much about themselves. The natives took them as neighbors, quit asking questions and named the crossroads Little Beanes Road. After weeks of correspondence, "We, the People" got to the Beanes and asked them to come to New York. But the Beanes didn't want to come. The sponsor of the program offered to reimburse them for business they might lose in taking the trip. But the Beanes said nothing shaking. They didn't offer any explanation, but wrote, "We can not appear on your program." The Beanes apparently do not care to discuss their private lives. It's enough to sharpen the appetite of any reporter.

The "Hermit of Tolstoy Park" might have been persuaded to appear on the program but for one little line he wrote. "A trip to New York has no charms for me," he wrote. "One day in that city of foul air might cause my death." If "We, the People" could be blamed for a man's death, then "We, the People" would be in a mess. The hermit is Henry James Stewart of Montrose, Ala. He is eighty-two, and for fifteen years has lived in a house he built in Tolstoy Park. He named his park in honor of the man whose philosophy he follows. He eats only vegetables and lives for ten cents a day. Mr. Stewart never wears shoes or hats.

Many people want too much money to tell us about themselves. The program pays expenses to send from New York and, in many cases, will pay a person for his time, if his time doesn't come too high. Most persons do not expect to be paid any more than expenses.

I do not know what was behind the

rejection of one of the most interesting applications I found in the rejection file. It concerns William D. Clark of Bethesda, Maryland, who has made more money than any man in history, a trifling \$7,200,000,000. Mr. Clark has made \$600,000 a day, and got paid for doing it. He was a note-plate printer until his recent retirement after forty-eight years' service in the United States Bureau of Engraving and Printing. His job was to print money, stamps, bonds and other securities. There are not more than one thousand of his craftsmen in North and South America, and five hundred of those are employed in Washington.

In making money, there are twelve notes to a sheet and 2,500 sheets are turned out daily. The denominations vary, of course. Mr. Clark frequently has handled \$120,000,000 in one little bale of \$10,000 notes. Once he printed a million-dollar bond, the highest denomination ever produced. Often visitors to the plant ask seriously for

Mrs. Brandel called the sheriff and her son killed himself. They found this note in his pocket:

"My death-warrant. Mother, you can forget you ever had but three boys. Tell the others to go straight and join the church. I'll meet you all again somewhere. I'm leaving \$20 for you to buy some clothes. Don't give it away. Please do this for me. Bury me in my blue suit."

"We, the People" almost burned up the wires to get Mrs. Brandel to New York. However, in a faltering hand she wrote this refusal:

"I will answer your letter received yesterday. But I can not come out to talk on the radio program. I have 2 little girls to take care of. One is 8 and the other is 12. I have my home to take care of. My husband works on the WPA work. The crime that my boy done gave me a nervous breakdown. I am not able to come out there. I got such a shock over the trouble I am sick."

The Light Within

A LEADING radio conductor told me the other day that when television becomes universal in the homes he intends to give some Haydn and Mozart performances, with the studio orchestra wearing powdered wigs and period costumes and the music-racks lighted by candles.

I reminded him that a hundred years ago Charles Lamb (who was not overfond of music), in one of his essays, invoked blessings on the man who had invented wax candles, which he considered the great comforter on the long nights of study and writing. At that time Chopin was composing all of his works by candle-light. In his book "Lutece," Helme describes one of Liszt's recitals in Paris in 1844 and speaks about the heat of the flaming candles. No doubt the brilliant early concert pieces of Liszt were written by the light of candles. Bach and Handel knew nothing better. In Haydn's diary for November 5, 1701, we find that the London fog was so dense "I had to light a candle as early as eleven o'clock in the morning."

The ancient Greeks and Romans wrote by candle-light, but later adapted a primitive form of lamp consisting of one or two wicks projecting from a vessel containing some kind of oil. Cicero, writing to his friend Atticus, about 40 B.C., said that he burnt the Atticus letter with the same lamp by which he had written the answer.

We write by electric light, but thus far nothing much superior to the works of Cicero, Shakespeare, Bach, Beethoven, Chopin has appeared. Perhaps the outside illumination is not as important as the light of genius.

Speaking Up

WITH all the moaning about the decline of the Salzburg Festival since Hitler's advent, and the excitement over the broadcasts of the Lucerne Festival, what, I wondered, about music festivals in America? I had, of course, heard of the Bethlehem, Worcester and Berkshire Festivals. But I had never been to any of them. So I decided to look into the situation and spent part of my vacation on a busman's holiday in the beautiful Berkshire Mountains—listening to music.

I found the country around Stockbridge, Lenox and Pittsfield, Mass., simply reeking with history and tradition. Hawthorne, Longfellow, the Beechers, the Fields, Holmes, Melville, Bryant, Edith Wharton are only a few of the names associated with it. The white houses with their velvet lawns and enormous trees look, as though they have been there for centuries, as, in fact, some of them have. Authentic picturesqueness, so much a part of

the Salzburg charm, is there in abundance. I found, too, a community passionately interested in its music festival, from the hotel bell-boys to the Boston blue bloods. All of them have worked to keep snob appeal away, to make the Festival a community enterprise of purely artistic interest. Tickets are relatively inexpensive. One can live cheaply and well at any one of the guest houses scattered around the towns. And the plumbing is all that could be desired, which was more than one could say for Salzburg!

Originally the idea of the late Henry Hadley, American composer and conductor, the Berkshire Festival was first held in 1934 in the horse-show ring of an old estate near Stockbridge. In 1936 the Boston Symphony under Serge Koussevitzky was chosen as permanent orchestra, and finally in 1937 the Festival was presented with the marvelous estate of "Tanglewood," where Hawthorne wrote his "Wonder Book" and "Tanglewood Tales." A music shell, and later an open-roofed shed as a protection against rain were built on the grounds. Next year, a six weeks' music course for musicians and laymen will be held at "Tanglewood" as a preliminary to the Festival.

Already "Tanglewood" attracts an international audience. I heard a dozen languages spoken. The grounds are thrown open early, and many people come and have supper or lunch under the trees. They then drift into the shed and listen to great music played superbly by a magnificent orchestra under a conductor who ranks almost equally with Toscanini. The smooth lawns dip down to a silver lake and the rolling Berkshire hills. At night the moon gleams through the tall old trees. True, sometimes it rains, fierce, brief storms. The rain pelts down on the shed roof. Dr. Koussevitzky, with a wry grimace at the sky, lays down his baton until the elements subside. The audience laughs and takes everything with good humor and patience. The fading thunder has a trick of blending impressively with the kettledrums. I found "Scherzade" considerably improved with thunder and lightning accompaniment.

Last year the concerts were broadcast. This year they were not. The March of Music would like to know why radio goes to the trouble and expense of airing foreign festivals and neglects our own. If America is to build up a Salzburg tradition the first to foster it should be the networks. Conceived in the American tradition, carried through by democratic means, supported by the eager, untiring and active interest of the cultural hub of our country, the Berkshire Festivals deserve to become a national event, and something for every American to be proud of.

Let radio be in the vanguard of any effort to spread the music festival idea in the United States!

Strange how nearly all the great symphonic composers were fascinated with opera. Some tried their hand at it like Handel, Haydn, Schubert, Beethoven, Liszt and Mozart, but only the last named remains popular on the lyric stage. Beethoven's single attempt, "Fidelio," still is regarded by many experts as more symphonic than operatic. Brahms long regretted that he could not find a suitable libretto to set to music. After he heard "Melstersinger," he definitely gave up and said, "Why try to write an opera after such a perfect one?"

Schubert finished "Alfonso and Estrella" in 1822, one year after the first performance of his song masterpiece "The Erlking." The latter still registers strongly, while the opera is practically forgotten. Barlow's revival of the overture has historical interest, reminding of Schubert's melodic wealth, which more than makes up for his lack of theatrical skill. The same composer's second symphony came to life when he was only eighteen, the same year that saw the creation of "The Erlking."

Bach's concerto for two violins has a slow movement that possibly is one of the finest pieces of music ever conceived in the sense of purity, loftiness of

thought and depth of feeling. However, the whole composition shows sustained inspiration, and is the first concerto to foreshadow the later style so long in vogue, to feature the solo element and make the orchestra supply chiefly the harmonies and rhythmic pulse. The two violins are employed not to emphasize contrast but rather, as Parry, the eminent Bach biographer says, "to engage in sisterly discourse."

Schumann's fourth symphony has the charm of all his works in that form, which are tunefully engaging and gentle in sentiment, rather than ever stormily dramatic or truly tragic.

The rest of the music on this program is not familiar hereabouts, and therefore the more welcome as demonstrating the symphonic voice from South of Panama. Williams (pupil of Cesar Franck), now seventy-seven-years old, has three symphonies to his credit. He directs the Buenos Aires Conservatory, with its 92 branches scattered over Argentina. Jose Castaneda is the head of the Guatemalan Conservatory of Music and the inventor of a new system of musical notation.

When Operatic Bent Goes Gaily Tuneful

COMPOSERS of grand opera have here and there unbent and catered to the merry muse. Mozart, Verdi, Richard Strauss and even Wagner ("The Marriage of Figaro," "Falstaff," "Rosenkavaller," "Meistersinger") fished for laughs and got them with their words and music. So did Smetana ("The Bartered Bride"), Nicolai ("The Merry Wives of Windsor") and Rossini ("The Barber of Seville"). However, none of the foregoing wrote what is termed operetta, which literally means a short opera but which in ordinary acceptance is considered a comic opera with spoken dialog, catchy music, and usually some dance interludes.

In a previous article there was mention of the Opera Buffa of Italy and the Opera Bouffe of France. Out of those forms grew the modern light-some stage pieces which found their highest flowering in the creations of Gilbert and Sullivan and Johann Strauss, and ultimately led to the sophisticated, speedy, foot-stirring, ear-tickling productions typical of the America of today. Let us not be snobbish about this thing; quite a few operettas and their offspring rank worthily with many a grand opera. The proof is that "The Mikado" and "Fledermaus" have had numerous hearings on the grand-opera stages of Europe, and the last-named was done also at the Metropolitan in New York. That Johann Strauss masterpiece is certainly first cousin to such "highbrow" works as Flotow's "Martha," Donizetti's "Elixir of Love," "Don Pasquale," and Mozart's "Così fan Tutte," all of them in the regular repertoire of the leading lyric theaters.

Light opera originated with Italy's early sixteenth-century intermezzi, pieces crude in comic dialog interspersed with thin music, but that country's composers never became proficient in that realm of operetta. France did better. Already in 1825 and 1830, respectively, Boieldieu's "La Dame Blanche" and Auber's "Fra Diavolo" came to hearing and their tunes were sung and whistled everywhere. Born in Cologne in 1819, Jacques Offenbach went to Paris as a very young man, and became to France what Sullivan was to England. Over one hundred operettas poured from Offenbach's pen, at least a dozen of them establishing themselves as world favorites. Leocq, Audran, Planquette (ask your grandparents about them) reigned next.

Vienna always has outstripped Berlin as a home for the merry musical muse. The Danube capital cradled Suppe's "Boccaccio," "The Beautiful Galathea," "Fatinitza"; Genee's "Nanon"; Milloecker's "The Beggar Student," "Poor Jonathan"; Fall's "Dollar Princess"; Kalman's "Sari"; and the delectable material by Lehar (modern successor to the waltz throne of Johann Strauss), notably his sensational "Merry Widow."

England climbed to the top with the incomparable lyrics of Gilbert and the imperishable music of Sullivan. Other delightful stuff from the Thames region has been Jakobovsk's (right name, Ed. Belleville) "Erminie," Caryll's "The Pink Lady," Leslie Stuart's "Floradora."

Of late years America undeniably leads the universe in light music, with both detached songs and stage works. Lifting melodies, humor, and irresistible rhythms characterize the contributions of our composing lads. The first comic operas recognized as indigenous to our soil were Willard Spenser's "The Little Tycoon," Woolson Morse's "Wang" (with De Wolf Hopper and Della Fox) and Gustave Kerker's "The Belle of New York." In rapid succession followed Sousa's "El Capitan" and "The Bride Elect"; De Koven's ever lovely "Robin Hood"; Luder's "Prince of Pilsen," "King Dodo" (with the unforgettable Raymond Hitchcock), "Sultan of Sulu"; Harl Hoschna's "Madame Sherry"—Are you old enough to recall his "Every Little Movement Has a Meaning of Its Own"?

Even the less aged can still summon tunes from the fascinating, fertile Victor Herbert's "Wizard of the Nile," "Babes in Toyland," "Red Mill," "Naughty Marietta"; gifted Rudolf Friml's "Firefly," "Rose Marie"; clever Sigmund Romberg's "Blossom Time" (Schubert's Unfinished Symphony, please write), "Maytime," "Student Prince," "Desert Song."

Jerome Kern is above all other American musical-comedy composers, some of his fancies reaching the dignity of operettas—"Sally," "Show Boat" (whose "Ol' Man River" has become an American classic), "The Cat and the Fiddle," "Roberta."

Irving Berlin is a tunesmith of the Tin Pan Alley type (the real "one finger" kind), but some of his songs have found lasting place in the affections of our public. Lamented George Gershwin—does one have to list his haunting output for our present generation? "Of Thee I Sing," "Let 'Em Eat Cake," "Strike Up the Band" linger on the tips of our ears. He remains the king of jazz. Prince royals are Vincent Youmans ("No, No, Nanette," "Hit the Deck"), Richard Rodgers ("Connecticut Yankee," "I Married an Angel"), Cole Porter ("Gay Divorcee," "Leave It to Me"). A word or two should go also to George Cohan, whose music is perhaps not subtle or distinctive but jinglyly expresses the spirit of the Broadway of a past day. All in all, America can be proud of its place in the history of stage music that strives to please and stimulate surface sentiment rather than to make profound appeal to the emotions. Somewhat commercial, perhaps our facile melodists function under the slogan "Give us the royalties and let grand-opera composers have the immortality."

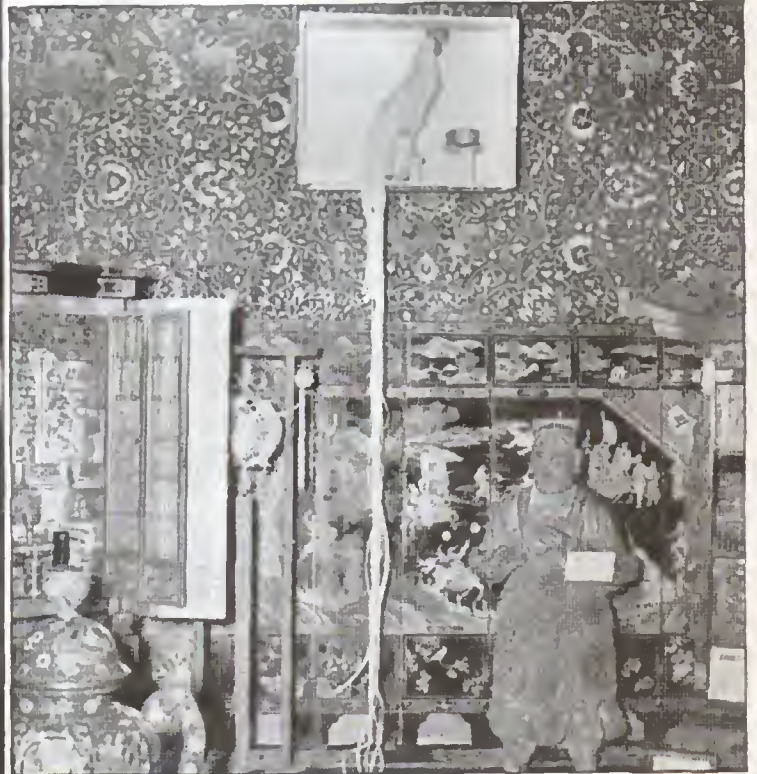

THE polyglot island of Manhattan presents some passing strange sights, but by all accounts the strangest of them are to be seen in Bob Ripley's new Odditorium. You've tsk-tsked over his "Believe It Or Not" cartoons; you've thrilled to his weird radio dramatizations. Now you can see Ripley's oddities with your own eyes! The "Believe It Or Not" man had an Odditorium at the 1933 World's Fair in Chicago and he has another at the San Francisco Fair this summer. But at 48th and Broadway, housed in the famous old Hollywood Restaurant, is the largest and most pleasantly horrifying of them all. Playing to capacity houses thirteen hours daily, Ripley offers his visitors freakish examples of human oddities, of nature gone berserk—not in cartoons or dramatizations, but in cold, spine-chilling reality. It is from his Broadway curiosity shop, exhibits from which are pictured here, that Bob Ripley now brings you his "Believe It Or Not" show over CBS, Friday nights.

LISTENING TO LEARN

Person-to-Person

● Radio will play a major part in Chicago summer school graduation exercises on August 17, when Superintendent William H. Johnson uses station WJJD's facilities to send his address into thirteen elementary schools and eleven high-school auditoriums. In addition to the address by Superintendent Johnson, the program will include music by school choruses and speeches by students. At the conclusion of the broadcast the individual schools will hold their own private programs and award diplomas. Here is another novel use of radio in school-administration work. Chicago followed a similar plan last spring.

● **TIP OF THE WEEK:** A dramatization of "The Outcasts of Poker Flat" in honor of the one hundredth anniversary of the birth of Bret Harte. The special musical score, composed by Wells Hively for a previous dramatization of this work, will be used in the anniversary performance on Friday, August 25. For further details refer to the Friday "Good Listening Guide."

● The atmosphere in the radio office of the University of Chicago is tingling these days over the chain of incidents that arose from Washington gossip-columnist Drew Pearson's statement, with reference to the next Republican national convention, that ex-President Hoover "has had men down in Louisiana and Mississippi buying up the delegations down there." Following this statement on the July 30 University of Chicago Round Table broadcast, Mr. Hoover demanded an apology and retraction. The University obligingly responded on the following Sunday's broadcast with the statement: "We have ample assurance it is absolutely untrue." A few days later Drew Pearson announced from Washington that he had instructed his attorney to bring legal proceedings against Frederic C. Woodward, vice-president of the University of Chicago, for a "damaging statement" made during a Round Table broadcast Sunday, August 5.

Little can be said in defense of the University in this incident because it is a clear-cut case of poor management. The program director cannot claim he was not prepared for what happened because on the Tuesday preceding the broadcast in which Pearson participated he got in dutch with Senator Tydings in a similar way. Usual round-table procedure is to have another participant accentuate the fact that the statement is the personal opinion of the man who made it, and may or may not be true. That leaves the program itself out in the clear. The regrettable aspect of this incident is the possibility that it may place the privilege of ad-lib broadcasting on trial.

This is the first major incident to occur since Allen Miller, the man who originated and developed the technique of round-table broadcasting, was released from the responsibility for the University of Chicago program. Those who know Allen find it hard to picture such a thing happening under his nose.

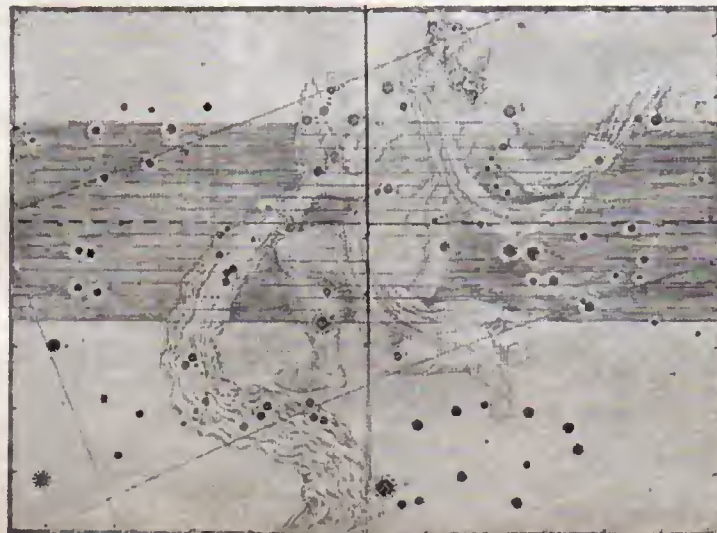

T. V. Smith gives philosopher's viewpoint as well as politician's on books on history and biography

That Man Smith

One of the most dynamic characters in radio today is a college professor. And, although a professorship in itself is enough to keep an average man well occupied, it forms but a part of this man's noteworthy activities. The man (T. V. Smith is his name, incidentally) is also a politician, and this unusual combination of capacities has succeeded in making him, via radio, a national figure. At times exhibiting capabilities that have distinguished him in one field, at times showing mastery of the other, T. V. Smith has arrived in five crowded years to positions of national prominence both as an educator and as a politician. Statements he has made over the air illustrate the working of a keen mind.

On Lincoln: "How prudently we proud men compete for nameless graves while now and then some starveling of fate forgets himself into immortality."

On tariff war between states: "... the only way for forty-eight states to carry on as neighbors is to build a forty-ninth state; namely, 'a state of mind' to respect each other's rights in furthering a greater nation of finer states."

These are but a few gems plucked from a record of Smith's quotations over the air. His philosophical meanderings, expressed before a microphone with a natural elegance of speech and a keen understanding of the possibilities and limitations of broadcasting made Smith a "natural" from the start of his career in radio.

Smith is a graduate of the University of Texas. He taught literature and philosophy at Texas Christian University before coming to the University of Chicago, and has written a number of books on political philosophy. After serving a full term as state senator in Illinois, Smith was sent to Washington as Democratic congressman-at-large from that state. Although he was one of the first round-tables back in 1931 and has appeared on a countless number of broadcasts since then in defense of his viewpoints, he attracted the greatest amount of attention last spring in a debate series with Ohio Senator Robert H. Taft. Smith's most unusual radio assignment is his current stint pinch-hitting for Professor John T. Frederick on the "Of Men and Books" series. He's a fellow who has been doing unexpected things all his life; so when it was announced that he would debate with himself over the air those who knew him were not surprised. Reviewing books, particularly those devoted to history and biography, Smith debates on one side from the viewpoint of a philosopher, then gives a politician's outlook. Interesting things well done by interesting people—that's good formula for success in radio.

The Rabbit Ticket System
 Some people actually send in a request for eight or ten tickets to a single broadcast. They're not half as bad, though, as the ones who ask for two, get them, and then bring along six or eight friends. Believe it or not, they're

highly indignant because we can't accommodate them!

A few weeks ago the radio editor of a small-town paper wrote a request for just one ticket to ANY show. We met him when he arrived—in a bus. Out of the bus with him tumbled a whole troop of local Boy Scouts!

The most unique experience of the lot, however, befall our gold-panning columnist, Plummer, and myself recently. A fellow who said he was Evans Plummer, and even sounded like him, telephoned me one afternoon asking for tickets to a show that evening. He was turned down (yes, even Plummer finds it tough). Ten minutes later I called Plummer back to offer him tickets to another show and to my amazement, and his too. It was the first he

had heard of the request.

We felt the phony would call again, and sure enough he did, one week later. This time, however, the setting was perfect because in my office at the time was the real Plummer, at the moment the voice on the phone was identifying himself as Evans Plummer.

THE new type "frequency modulated" radio broadcasts will be filling the air in this country within the next year, Dr. W. R. G. Baker, head of General Electric's radio and television division, predicts.

Frequency modulation, one of the latest developments in the field of radio, makes possible for the first time practically static-free and man-made interference-free reception with a high fidelity that has hitherto been unattainable with the currently used "amplitude modulated" radio systems.

Present receivers will not be able to pick up frequency modulated broadcasts, and it will not be possible to change them so they can. The public need not fear that present-day radios will be obsoleted immediately, since "amplitude modulated" programs will continue to be broadcast for some time to come. Frequency modulation will be sold to the public at the outset as another band on a new receiver which will pick up both type broadcasts.

The frequency modulated system employs the use of ultra-short radio waves, and the signals broadcast travel only slightly beyond the distance of the horizon, according to Dr. Baker's explanation. This characteristic is said to be the open sesame for an almost unlimited number of broadcasting channels with plenty of room for nationwide chains and local stations galore.

Frequency modulated transmitters can be built for approximately one-fourth the cost of the usual station, and with the possibility of overcrowding the airwaves removed, many new broadcasters should crop up.

The Ebor Handicap, the national summer racing festival of the north of England, run on the attractive Knavesmire race course, just outside York, will be broadcast on Wednesday, August 23, at 9:55 a.m. EDT, over Daventry stations GSF, GSG and GSJ.

Effective since July 1, the revised schedule of overseas transmissions of the Broadcasting Corporation of Japan has been broadcast as follows: Daily, for China and the South Seas, from 8 to 10:30 a.m. over JZJ (11.8) and JZK (15.16); for Europe, from 3 to 5 p.m., over JZJ and JZK; for South America, from 5:30 to 6:30 p.m., over JZJ (9.535) and JZL (17.785); for the Eastern Districts of North America, from 9 to 10 p.m., over JZL, and for the Pacific Coast of North America, from 1 to 2:30 a.m. EDT, over JZK.

The following additional calls and frequencies have been assigned to the German short-wave stations: DXH (6.175), DXI (6.195), DXJ (7.24), DXK (21.67), DXL (21.73), DXM (7.27) and DXN (21.74).

According to Roger Legge of Binghamton, N. Y., the following frequencies and calls have already been assigned for use in the new 41-meter broadcast band (7.2 to 7.3 megas) which will be officially inaugurated on September 1: 2RO (7.24 and 7.27), Rome, Italy; CSW6 (7.26), Lisbon, Portugal; DJJ (7.29), DXM (7.27) and DXJ (7.24), Zeesem, Germany; GSU (7.26) and GSW (7.23), Daventry, England; JIE (7.295), Hsingking, Manchukuo; JLG (7.285) and JWV (7.257), Tokyo, Japan; LLR (7.24), Oslo, Norway; OZU (7.26), Copenhagen, Denmark; TPB11 (7.28), Paris, France; 7.24 megas, for Belgrade, Yugoslavia; 7.21, 7.24, 7.27 and 7.29 megas, for India.

Alfred Tuff of London, England, writes that a new station at Leopoldville in the Belgian Congo is operating on optional frequencies of 13.17 or 9.525 megas, from 6:25 to 8 a.m. EDT,

with a power of 250 watts. The call is believed to be OQ2AA. . . . A new transmitter at Damascus, Syria, is being heard by listeners in England, operating on a frequency of 12.295 megas, daily from 2 to 3 p.m. EDT.

With new technical features that make them the most modern of television relay stations, the NBC mobile units are now in service again, providing New York televiewers with outdoor programs on Wednesdays, Fridays and Saturdays at 4 p.m. EDT. A second iconoscope camera was installed in the telemobiles. Evening studio programs will again be resumed on Tuesday, August 29, over W2XBS. 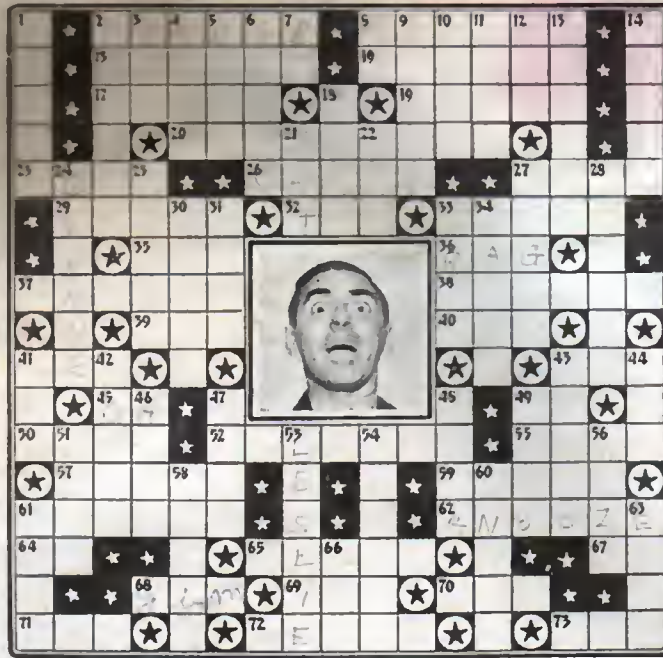

GOOD RECORDS

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Ernst Dohnanyi, modern Hungarian composer, gets all too few recordings made of his works. But now his String Quartet is available, played well by the Roth Quartet. It is in strict, classic style, and his individuality is less evident than in other of his works. (Columbia set 367. \$5.)

Franz Schubert wrote his Fourth Symphony when he was nineteen. When I think of the slaphappy kid I was at that age, it seems beyond belief that such a thing could happen. Schubert's Fourth is called the "Tragic" symphony . . . but despite a certain gravity, his melodic nature shines through it in a excellently portrayed by the New York Philharmonic-Symphony, with distinguished John Barbitroll conducting. (Victor 562. \$8.)

Ludwig van Beethoven interpreted by Walter Gieseking makes as likely a combination as could be wished by the serious and discerning student of piano music. Both the Appassionata and the Waldstein sonatas have just been issued with Gieseking at the piano. There is little more to say. The Appassionata is on Columbia set 365, the Waldstein on Columbia set 360, both \$5.

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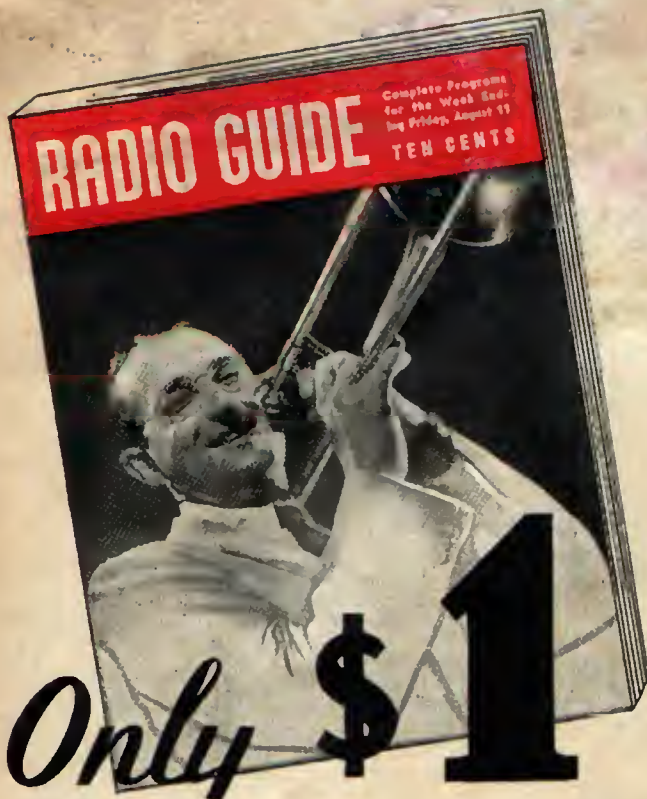
