## LEARNS TO DANCE

TO THE average American movie-goer, Anna Neagle is a middle-aged English actress. They remember her as the doughty, empire-building Queen of Destiny—Victoria—to whom English eyes turn with lasting pride. They remember her, too, as the dour, almost straight-laced but heroic nurse in her portrayal of Edith Cavell, in which she wore one prim costume from start to finish. The most shocking sight in Hollywood today for most people would be to visit the set at RKO where Anna Neagle is making her next picture. They would never recognize her from past performances. Twenty years ago Edith Day—in the title role of the musical comedy "Irene"—became the toast of New York. It was a play concerned with a sparkling and vivacious little mannequin from a poor section

of the city who became a Manhattan Cinderella overnight. Engaged to one man, she marries another in a dancing, singing, happy sort of part at the opposite end of the earth from parts like that of Nurse Edith Cavell. Yet, on the RKO lot, where they are remaking "Irene," Anna Neagle is in the title part. Here is no doughty, world-conquering female of the late forties, but a lovely and vivacious star who is really very close to the Anna Neagle who lives out her life away from the grease-paint and kleig lights. For those who may find the spectacle of Queen Victoria or Nurse Edith Cavell whirling about a brightly polished dance-floor in graceful pirouettes incongruous, MOVIE AND RADIO GUIDE offers this picture preview to serve warning that Anna Neagle is a charmer to be watched!

"TWO Girls on Broadway," MOVIE AND RADIO GUIDE's Picture of the Week, has several intriguing little sidelights which will make it of interest to movie-goers. First, it gives George Murphy, who virtually stole the dancing honors from Fred Astaire in "Broadway Melody of 1940," an opportunity to show that his performance there was no flash in the pan but a very real and lasting talent. Second, it gives movie-goers the opportunity to see Lana Turner for the first time as Mrs. Artie Shaw . . . and incidentally in the most meaty part she has yet had. Underlying the musical motif of this picture is a dramatic story of an eternal triangle involving two sisters and a hooper. George Murphy is the hooper, who also writes songs, and Joan Blondell is his partner in a dancing-school in an Indiana town. Ambition coupled with real talent drives the pair until they finally get their big opportunity to show what they can do on a national radio amateur hour. They take Joan's younger sister, Lana Turner, along to New York with them. In New York complications develop when Lana and George, despite their every effort to resist it, fall in love with each other. In order not to hurt Joan, they try to hide their love. Lana even goes so far as to accept an engagement ring from an influential—but worthless—night-club operator. By marrying him she feels she will eliminate the strained situation. Fast-moving events staged against catchy dances and tunes bring about a solution as nearly happy as possible in this highly emotional story.

**W**HEN Mr. James Cagney pushed a grapefruit into Mae Clark's face, he did a number of things. He branded public enemies as uncouth individuals, far removed from the hero-mold into which romance-starved Americans have cast them. In addition, he started a cycle of pictures which did right well by Hollywood producers for many a year.

The cocksure, strutting, pugnacious individual on the screen is nothing more than a testimonial to the acting abilities of one Mr. James Cagney. For in reality, he is a soft-spoken idealist who, through the erratic casting common in Hollywood, became on the screen one of the leading exponents of gangsterdom.

As are all idealists, Jim is consistently absent-minded. He will start to undress, pause with his arm half out of a sleeve because his eye catches an interesting paragraph in a newspaper or a book, and half an hour later there is Jimmy with his arm still frozen in the sleeve, with a crick in the back creeping up on him.

The tale is told of him that once when he was helping a friend build a cabin, he absent-mindedly sawed through the base log which held up the entire house. Down came house, walls, roof and all on top of Jimmy.

Since then this friend has never trusted him out of sight with either an ax or a saw in his hands. You can never tell when he'll go off day-dreaming and take a chunk out of something that's perfectly good as it stands.

Yet, curiously enough, he never forgets dialog in a scene. As a matter of record, he memorizes the entire script so that frequently he can prompt players who stumble.

And just as curious is the fact that he never forgets a face or an incident connected with a person whom he has met and liked. Recently a woman who had been introduced to Jimmy eleven years ago at a casual meeting came on his set. "You won't remember me," she said, "it's been such a long time."

But Jimmy did. He told her the place, the occasion, the time of their meeting. The widely advertised Mr. Simms of Seattle, with his elephant

memory, couldn't have done better.

Cagney has an extraordinary interest in human beings and human events. It has been intimated recently that he was associated with communistic activities. As a matter of fact, Jimmy has no patience with "isms," but quite too frequently he sticks his neck out in his effort to help the underprivileged, the down-trodden and the poor.

His charities are wide. His vocabulary is devoid of "no" when it comes to giving a hand to anyone who needs it or even pretends to need it. Because of that he is frequently a sucker. For instance, a wire came to him one day with a desperate demand for \$500. The name signed to it was that of a close friend who evidently was stranded in Chicago.

**B**EFORE leaving for the studio Jim asked his wife, Bill (christened Frances), to send on the money, but something in the telegram didn't ring quite true to Mrs. Cagney. Instead of the \$500 she sent \$100. An answer came deploring the fact that Jimmy had not seen fit to send the requested amount. That was so out of character with the man that Jimmy did a little investigating.

The friend was safe and sound and

## "The Biscuit Eater"

EVERY so often a simple little story is written which is so heartfelt and real that it can be filmed against a natural backdrop and at little technical cost and still command the attention of a vast audience. "The Biscuit Eater," telling the simple story of two boys and a dog, is such a story.

Penned as a magazine story by James Street, it was purchased by Paramount with the idea of making a secondary feature of it. As the filming got under way, however, executives realized that they had got their teeth into an earthy and homespun piece of drama that would touch heartstrings everywhere, and production was stepped up to the "A" class.

This is a beautifully acted, nicely directed tale of a "biscuit eater"—a hound dog who wasn't worth his salt—and of a little white boy and a little colored boy who felt that he was a champion at heart. It is upon such a simple theme—the battle of these two youngsters to extricate their dog from the ignominy of the "no good" label—that this drama is built with sure, deft touches.

Except for the principal characters, no Hollywood actors were used. The picture was made—wisely—down in Albany, Georgia, and natives, with their

cracker talk, played minor roles in native costumes against the fields and forests of the natural landscape. Billy Lee as the white lad and Snowflake as the colored companion turn in excellent performances. In the scene where they stand by their dying dog who—finally in death—has lost his ignominious tag, they will tug at the heartstrings of the most hardened movie-goer. They are equally effective in the comedy sequences.

Result is a down-to-earth, heart-touching film that has moments of sadness, moments of great joy, and which, in every department, will prove to be a picture you will long remember.

TO THOSE who have very definite ideas about life after death, this will come as either a pleasant or offensive offering, dependent upon what those ideas happen to be. But regardless of preconceived ideas about what comes after life, the movie-goer will find here a well-acted, well-cast and beautifully photographed vehicle for an old idea.

It is the story of three old cronies—admirably played by C. Aubrey Smith, Charles Winninger and Harry Carey—who live in an old house kept by Maria Ouspenskaya. By way of diversion, the trio plant two pocket-books on the sidewalk outside. One is returned by a girl, Jean Parker, the other by a boy, Richard Carlson. From that point, the three old men try to palm themselves off as the three Fates, striving to stage-manage the lives and affairs of the youthful pair. This interest carries on even after death in a heaven which may—or may not—be the sort of heaven you have pictured.

The performances of the three old cronies and Maria Ouspenskaya are outstanding.

INSIDE Hollywood is always a fascinating subject for films, and this one becomes even more fascinating when you consider the fact that Linda Darnell, who has her first starring part here, enjoyed the same sort of experience in her climb to stardom that the heroine she portrays encountered. With this happy formula for a star, "Star Dust" moves on through good production, perfect casting and keen direction to become a fine piece of movie fare for all types of audiences.

The story—that of a girl who tries in every possible way to crack Hollywood without success, only to become a star after she leaves the film capital—is lightly done but with an air of authenticity few films of this type have managed to catch. Fine supporting characterizations by Roland Young as the talent-scout and Charlotte Greenwood as the studio coach maintain a high level of performance set by Miss Darnell and John Payne. Miss Greenwood had been away from Hollywood for nine years when prevailed upon by Darryl F. Zanuck to try her hand at films once more. Her last picture was "Palmy Days" with Eddie Cantor in 1931.

Miss Darnell plays the part of the disappointed girl who succeeds away from Hollywood right from her heart. Hailing from Dallas, Texas, Linda was

given her first screen test in 1938 after months of preparation in the studio school. Executives turned her down because she was too young. A year later executives saw other pictures sent from her home, signed her without further ado. "Star Dust" gives her her first starring part and, oddly enough, in a film which simply recreates Miss Darnell's own Hollywood experiences!

A light counterpart to "A Star Is Born," "Star Dust" makes for fun without hysterics, tears without sobbing, and gives a glimpse of the hidden Hollywood without too much disillusionment.

## "IRENE"

A Review

Cast: Anna Neagle, Ray Milland, Roland Young, Alan Marshall, May Robson, Billie Burke, Arthur Treacher, Doris Nolan, et al. An RKO picture, produced and directed by Herbert Wilcox, who also directed "Victoria, the Great." Screen play by Alice Duer Miller from the stage success by James Montgomery; music and lyrics by Harry Tierney and Joseph MacCarthy.

REMINISCENT of the elaborately mounted Rogers-Astaire musicals, "Irene" combines black-and-white photography effectively with Technicolor to emerge as a showy musical comedy with Anna Neagle, British actress, easily taking top honors with her portrayal of Irene, the personable and beautiful shopgirl who gives the film its title.

The rather thin story behind a gorgeous musical has Anna Neagle, an upholsterer's assistant, turning mannequin at the famous establishment of designer Madam Lucy. There she becomes the center of rivalry between two wealthy young men, Ray Milland and Alan Marshall, with an entirely satisfactory solution being worked out in the end. More important than the plot, however, is the opportunity the film gives Miss Neagle to wear lovely gowns, dance and sing. Miss Neagle's film future depends largely upon the public acceptance of the star as the light-hearted and wholly lovely Cinderella of "Irene," who also gave such stern portrayals as that of doughty Queen Victoria and heroic Nurse Edith Cavell.

In short, if the public can accept a dancing Queen Victoria, then Miss Neagle can be considered competition for such stars as Ginger Rogers, Irene Dunne or Jeanette MacDonald.

First produced as a stage musical in 1919 with Edith Day winning the acclaim of Broadway in the title role, "Irene" gave such lasting and tuneful numbers to the world as "Alice Blue Gown," "Castle of Dreams" and "Something in the Air." A new tune, "You've Got Me Out on a Limb," has been added to the picture, and, to be certain that it did not clash with the melodious numbers which graced the original production, Harry Tierney and Joseph MacCarthy—who wrote the original score—were engaged to write the new number.

## "SAFARI"

A Review

Cast: Madeleine Carroll, Douglas Fairbanks, Jr., Muriel Angelus, Tullio Carminati, Lynne Overman, Billy Gilbert, et al. A Paramount picture, produced and directed by Edward H. Griffith, who also directed "Honeymoon in Bali"; screen play by Delmar Daves.

"SAFARI" will be remembered by movie-goers who see it—and be sure to see it if you like adventure—as an authentic document of African lore, an intimate picture of big-game hunting with its rules and tabus, and as a series of finely etched characterizations on the part of its cast, every one of whom does his or her bit in breathing life into a vivid story.

The story concerns Linda Stewart (Madeleine Carroll), who, in order to capture in matrimony the wealthy Baron de Courland (Tullio Carminati), rabid big-game hunter, accompanies him on a safari. Guide for the expedition is Jim Logan (Douglas Fairbanks, Jr.). To arouse the Baron's jealousy, Linda pretends to be interested in Jim, a pretension which backfires when she and Jim are forced to spend the night together in the jungle when their plane is downed. The Baron, jealous, wounds a lion, knowing that by the jungle code Jim must pursue the lion and kill it. Jim is wounded in his lone hunt for the wounded lion and flies to the coast for treatment. Linda, realizing her love for Jim, follows.

All of the characterizations are handled with restraint and a nice shading.

The jungle scenes were shot in Sherwood Forest and near Baldwin Lake, a short distance from Hollywood. The steamer used in the film was especially built for "Safari," but sank with all hands on board in four feet of water when first launched. There were no casualties. Ritchie, the lion, had been trained to lunge at Fairbanks by Olga Celeste, famous woman lion-tamer, but, when the time came for him to do his stuff, he refused. Several days' shooting was lost before Ritchie came through. Fairbanks had another unpleasant experience with Nissa, the leopard seen in the picture. Nissa refused to work with anyone not smelling of perfume, so Fairbanks had to be drenched with it. The brand: Gardenia.

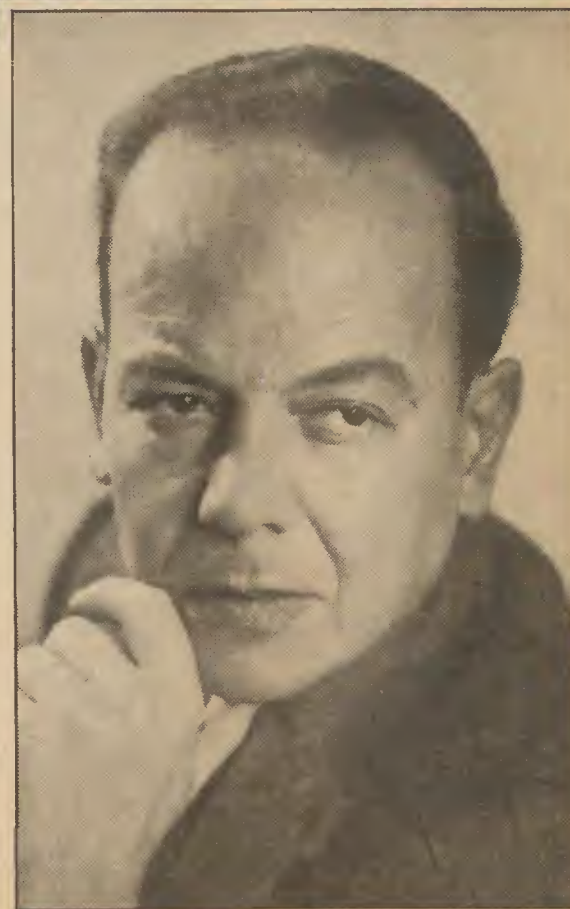

Ford seems for once to have relented in its no-instrumental-soloist policy and the result is that we have some engaging violin music.

Lalo's composition remains a favorite with its typical tunes and rhythms of Spain. It is regrettable that only one of the movements is being played this evening.

Sarasate (for whom, by the way, Lalo wrote the "Symphonie Espagnole") has made an expert transcription of Chopin's ever popular piano Nocturne, and Kreisler did as well for the spicy little piece by Granados.

Spanish Pablo de Sarasate (1844-1908) was one of the greatest violinists of all time, with marvelous style and perfect technique, and perhaps one could best describe him as "the Heifetz of his day." He triumphed in every country of the musical world, including America, where he made a sensational joint tour (1889) with the late renowned pianist Eugen d'Albert. Sarasate's own compositions include the famous "Gypsy Airs"; Spanish dances (of which "Zapateado" is best known), and transcription fantasies on airs from "Faust" and "Carmen."

## Our Star-Spangled Composers

By Leonard Liebling

AT THE risk of being repetitious and of single-track mind, I shall say again that if the American composer does not come permanently into his own these days he is losing just one super-grand chance for the advancement of his cherished cause—and cherished self.

The war abroad has practically stopped the importation of any outstanding European music, and so the conductors of the major orchestras here are forced to look for novelty material from our home composers. In addition, popular pressure and journalistic demands have punctured some of the blatant indifference of the foreigners among those conductors, and now they suddenly are discovering that John Smith or Tom Robinson might reasonably be expected to write as good a symphony as Serge Scribbelokowitsch or Nicolai Uhsplashinski—that is, if John, Tom, Serge and Nicolai all had the same degree of talent and the same measure of training.

Even Toscanini (the world's most frequent program-changer), so long indifferent to serious American music, seems to have heeded the scoldings showered upon him, and recently produced the Symphony No. 3 by Roy Harris.

Again I invite the accusation of hammering away at one and the same thing when I emphasize anew the importance of radio production, commissions and premieres, in the matter of encouraging the American composer to continue his fight for the hearing of his new scores. They never can win notice and appraisal if they be permitted to mildew, lying idle in the composers' studios, or on the publishers' shelves.

The current contribution of radio to the best of the old American music, and the most characteristic of the new—both serious and light—is Raymond Paige's "Musical Americana" program, and Howard Hanson's annual spring festival of works by his composing compatriots.

From Norman Levy, of Sheboygan, Wis., comes a letter which brings a smile from your editor. Mr. Levy first rails at this department for seemingly adding the Toscanini programs through wrong programming, and then he tells

how he listened in for several Saturday days without hearing the music he expected to enjoy at the announced times.

Mr. Levy adds: "I'm just wondering what Mr. Liebbling will have in mind to put on Toscanini's program for next week. In case he hasn't thought about it by now, I can give him some hints. Why not an 'All-Italian' program, with the following numbers:

Thanks, Mr. Levy, and I hope that your satire may move the maestro to stick to his schedule—something which the rest of us have been unable to achieve with him.

## New Books and Records Reviewed

CLARA SCHUMANN. A Romantic Biography. By John N. Burk. Random House. \$3.00.

Here is an authoritative and altogether delightful account of one of the loveliest romances in musical history. Clara Wieck Schumann was one of the greatest pianists of her time, but was also the devoted wife of an even more outstanding musical figure, Robert Schumann. Their love story was stormy, starting when Clara was a child prodigy and Schumann a pupil of Clara's father living in their house in Leipzig. Friedrich Wieck's efforts to keep the lovers apart and prevent their marriage make as exciting a tale as any novel. Their short-lived happiness and Schumann's subsequent madness and early death key the story to tragic pitch, mellowed only by the devoted and probably wholly platonic love of Johannes Brahms for Clara.

Readers will enjoy the description of the start of the romantic movement in music, when Chopin's piano pieces were considered revolutionary and Wagner a prize nuisance by all except the little circle in the Wieck household who had discovered and worshiped the new musical gods.

SYMPHONY NO. 40 IN G MINOR (Mozart). Victor Album M-631, AM-631. The NBC Symphony Orchestra, Arturo Toscanini, conductor.

All the breathless charm of Toscanini's reading of this symphony is contained in this record. Perhaps not completely satisfactory to highly orthodox Mozart lovers, but for this column the most sparkling and enchanting interpretation of all.

Two significant American symphonies, both good and not too difficult introductions to what our serious composers are accomplishing.

THE TWO GRENADIERS (Schumann). Alexander Kipnis, basso. Victor 15825-B.

Alexander Kipnis, Metropolitan Opera basso and one of the foremost lieder singers of the day, raises the hair on your head with this one. Only a little less exciting is Schubert's "Erkling" on the other side, in which Kipnis uncannily changes the quality of his voice to represent each character in the song.

# Musicians of the Week

Ethel Bartlett and Rae Robertson

IN THE big cities the florist shops suddenly fill with yellow forsythia and fruit-tree blossoms. In the country the snow melts away and the gray-brown earth takes on a feathery coating of green. Two people speeding from one end of the land to the other on fast trains watch these signs with wistful eyes. All winter they have been busy, touring, playing in one city after another, preoccupied with all the thousand and one things that take up the time of concertising artists. They have not had too much time to let their thoughts wander back to an island where spring's

ness, Scotland. Ethel Bartlett, whose enormous dark eyes and smooth black hair seem more Italian than English, was born in London. They met as fellow piano students at the Royal Academy of Music in London. Another student was "Tita" Barbirolli, with whom Ethel Bartlett gave piano and cello recitals before Barbirolli joined the army shortly after Robertson had done so. After the war, Robertson returned to finish his studies at the Academy and his friendship with Ethel Bartlett, continued by letter during the war, ripened into something more. They were mar-

coming is like the gentle breaking of day after long night. But now their job for the winter is almost done, and they have more and longer respites between concerts. And two words creep with greater urgency into their talk—"England—home."

In the eyes of Ethel Bartlett and Rae Robertson is the same mutely questioning, steadfastly patient look that one finds in the eyes of all English people today. Evelyn Barbirolli, dear friend of the Robertsons, had it when she arrived in November fresh from war work in England to join her husband. It is the same look one sometimes sees on the faces of those unable to reach the sickbed of one they love.

"We all felt, though, that the way to make ourselves most useful was to do our jobs as usual," Rae Robertson said. "But for the first time, leaving home was a pretty agonizing business. We used to take it very casually, with a 'So long, see you in the spring.' But last autumn, there was more to it than that."

Both Bartlett and Robertson are as English as thatched cottages and strawberries for tea. Robertson, short, round-faced and unbelievably boyish for one who saw front-line service all during the first World War, was born in Inver-

ried but with the understanding that marriage would not interfere with their careers. However, they soon found their careers interfering with marriage, with long, separate concert tours keeping them constantly apart. Their marriage was rapidly declining into a bowing acquaintance when they decided one day to give a joint recital in London just for fun. They had played together for years, but never in public.

"That concert was as big a surprise to us as to everybody else," recalls Ethel Bartlett. "We had never taken our playing together seriously. But after reading the good notices, we realized that we had started something." Shortly afterwards they decided to tour Holland as a professional team. Neither one has played a solo recital since, and today they are leaders in the two-piano field.

For a time the Robertsons owned an old stone house near London, where they lived between tours, but they recently gave that up. Their fondest dream is some day to retire to an island in the Hebrides which they already have chosen. However, Robertson is a reserve officer in the British Army. So far he has not been called up. But they can only live from day to day, not knowing what tomorrow will bring.

## "THE VOICE OF THE ANDES"

TO THOSE listeners tired of the eternal babble of Europe's short-wave voices of hate and war: Turn your dials to HCJB (12.46), "The Voice of the Andes," at Quito, Ecuador. Here, at an elevation of 10,000 feet, encircled by eleven snow-capped peaks of the mighty Andes, nestles the oldest city of the New World, one of the ancient capitals of the Incas steeped in fifteen hundred years of traditions; a city whose many white churches shelter staggering treasures in gold and precious stones; a city with winding cobbled streets, overhanging balconies, ancient archways, sunlit plazas and countless white-stone houses perched crazily on steep hillsides, their red-tile roofs, with green moss cropping out here and there in the cracks, forming vivid splotches of color against the snowy mantle of the guardian peaks.

Such a historic and picturesque setting seems indeed a fitting site for a missionary radio station whose messages are those of peace and good-will. This new 10,000-watt modern short-wave transmitter—the most powerful in South America and the only broadcast station to employ a fully rotatable antenna—stands as a tribute to the sacrificing labors of one man—Clarence Jones, a gospel missionary from Chicago, whose lifework is to minister to and teach the Andean Indians. Because of the rugged contours of Ecuador, making transportation exceedingly difficult, Reverend Jones recognized long ago the vital value of radio in carrying on his work and subsequently installed several small short-wave stations at Quito, including the former 1,000-watt transmitter of HCJB and a mobile broadcasting station which carries this active pastor's voice to the most remote jungle and mountain tribes. The new station—a labor of love paid for by voluntary subscriptions from his loyal friends—was built by an American amateur, Clarence Moore, who is well known to hundreds of amateur friends under his call, HC1JB. The

new "Voice of the Andes" was officially inaugurated on Sunday, March 24.

On the dial, HCJB (12.46) comes in above the 25-meter band and approximately half-way between the 12 and 13 megacycles figures in frequency. You will have no trouble in hearing HCJB, since its unique location and rotatable aerial make it possible for it to project strong signals into North America.

HCJB is on the air for several hours daily with Spanish programs for the benefit of listeners in the Latin Americas, but English listeners will be primarily interested in "Ecuadorean Echoes," on from 6:00 to 7:00 p.m., and the "Friendship Hour," broadcast nightly except Mondays from 9:00 to 10:00 p.m. EST. These all-English programs are directed specifically to North America. "Ecuadorean Echoes," one of the most interesting programs on the air, breathes the very soul of Latin America. During this period the native music, the literature and the very lives and habits of these romantic peoples come to life and parade before the microphone. "The Friendship Hour" is a strictly good-will program consisting of classical music, old-time hymns, simple gospel messages, the reading of letters from listeners and personal messages to friends everywhere.

FLASH! Short-wave frequencies for Scandinavian war news. With the war in Europe now raging in Norway and Denmark and threatening to spread to Sweden at any moment, listeners will want to watch the following frequencies for news direct from the Scandinavian short-wave stations: Copenhagen, Denmark, over OZU (7.26), OZF (9.52), OZH (15.32). Oslo, Norway, over LLH (9.645), LKQ (11.735), LKV (15.17). Motala, Sweden, over LBU (9.535), SBP (11.705), SBT (15.155). Bear in mind, however, that the Nazis may be—and according to reports already are—occupying the short-wave stations at Copenhagen and Oslo.

FROM THE EUROPEAN ARENA: Why the Nazis gained power and what Naziism has meant to Germany are the subjects being discussed in a new series of weekly talks being broadcast from London, on Tuesdays, at 10 p.m. EST, over GSD (11.75) . . . News bulletins in English from London, intended for reception in Europe and which often contain items not included in bulletins directed to North America, may be heard over GRX (9.69), daily at 5, 6:30 p.m. and 1:15 a.m. EST . . . 2R020 (17.77), a new Rome frequency, is now on the air daily from 9 a.m. to

12:30 p.m. EST . . . According to Robert Skyten of East Brookfield, Mass., LYR (9.29), located at Kaunas, Lithuania, was heard recently from 3:30 to 4:10 p.m. EST. This station is seldom heard in the United States . . . The following is a complete list of the various Moscow frequencies which are used more or less regularly for broadcast of the Soviet programs: RNE (12.00), RV96 (6.03, 9.52, 9.685, 15.18, 15.41), RAN (9.6), RK1 (7.52, 15.04, 15.08), RIF (11.9), RIA (11.705), RWG (14.72) and RIC (11.64). RV96 is supposed to have a power of 100,000 watts.

# Major Cinderella

Private life of the star-making money-maker—Major Bowes

MAJOR BOWES (l.) and auto-sponsor Chrysler have been pals since horseless-carriage days

**Y**OUR reporter, a New York newspaperman in those days, was traveling one summer in the South and stopped at a village hotel—one of those nice old places where the ceilings are higher than the fee and where it's bad manners to refuse the second piece of sweet-potato pie. The host, a fat fellow, eyed your reporter very carefully, for reporters and Republicans were two things he didn't like.

At supper the host said, "From New York, huh?"

Your reporter pleaded guilty.

"Don't happen to know O. O. McIntyre, do you?" (It was in those days.)

Your reporter loved he did.

The host warmed up.

"Ever met Major Bowes?"

"Yep," your reporter said. And I was in solid. It was all right if I ate three pieces of sweet-potato pie. I ate chicken bosom only and, for the first time in my life, snooted drumsticks and second joints. I was presented to the other guests as "the man who knows Major Bowes."

I explained, in a fit of affluence, that in my work I had met other headlines—Mayor La Guardia, Grover Whalen, a few race-horse bookies, a couple of Tammany leaders and Franklin D. Roosevelt. It didn't mean a thing. For out there where radios, crickets and frogs never hush, that Major is an institution.

Amateur programs are as old as the stage, but it was the Major who popularized them on the air and began a cycle, out of which came spelling-bees, question-bees and all sorts of things. Some say, humanized radio. He clicked because all the world loves a Cinderella. Every person who appears on the Major's amateur program is a Cinderella, away from the drudgery of life for one fleeting minute. And there's always the chance that the wand will wave over them and they will no longer be Frankie and Johnny but will become Frances and Jonathan, entertainers, satellites or

stars, with an opportunity to dip into the gravy. Of course the Major will get a ladle of the gravy, too.

About two years ago many persons thought the Major was through. Frankly, this reporter, who never hears the program any more, thought the same thing. I was silly enough to believe that because I was fed up with the show that the rest of the folks felt as I did. Great day in the morning! Flag these figures as they run by. Excluding New York City, if the nickels that were used to telephone and vote on the amateur hour during the last two years were strung together they would reach 115 miles! And more than 600,000 nickels were returned because of busy signals.

In New York City alone, fifty telephone operators handle the calls and each says "The Major Bowes Amateur Hour, your vote, please?" at least eighty times during an evening.

If every person in Pierre, capital of South Dakota, would spend thirty-six consecutive hours at a telephone, they couldn't answer the calls that come from the United States during the hour. It would take one man a lifetime to compute the 2,000,000 votes cast only within the last two years. It takes a large staff of clerks to tally the votes.

The Major has made Murray Hill 8-9933 the world's most famous telephone number, for listeners have heard it mentioned at least twenty-five billion times—25,000,000,000 (I hope that's right). He mentions the number six times during each broadcast and between twenty-five and thirty million persons hear him weekly.

**I**F THAT'S not enough, then gnaw on this one: The expression "You are good enough for the Major Bowes hour" has become universal. American tourists have spread it to every nook of the world, and hundreds of amateurs from strange places seek a spot on the Major's program because some traveler

told them "You are good enough, etc."

The Major is the bane of postal clerks' lives. They get letters addressed simply "All right, all right." They know that means Bowes. Sometimes letters are addressed "The Gong-giver, U. S. A." The Major's staff has counted more than four hundred different kinds of addresses on letters for Bowes. These include Good Evening Friends, King of Amateurs, The Wheel of Fortune Man, The G-Man of Radio, and so on.

**F**ANS have found more than fifty ways to spell the Major's name, including Boze, Boas, Boz, Bose, Boes, Boles, Bows, Bowles and Bowers. He has been called colonel, captain, commodore, admiral, general, lieutenant, sergeant, brigadier and corporal. He really is a major. He has more than one thousand honorary titles, ranging from governor to fire chief. He is "mayor" of sixty-seven cities, "city manager" of three, "fire chief" of fifty-seven, "police chief" of fifty-one, "editor" of thirty newspapers, and an honorary flatfoot in seventy-four cities. He belongs to thirteen automobile clubs, thirty-five chambers of commerce, five boards of trade, fifty businessmen's clubs. He is "commander" of a flock of veterans' organizations, honorary governor of one state and a member of six governors' staffs. And he's got about six hundred more titles. He could swap titles with any king and throw in eleven dozen to boot. He is the most-titled man in the world and he loves it.

His fans have showered him with gifts, some cock-eyed, some practical. Only a handful of the Major's "amateurs" (pardon my skepticism) are working today in top-flight shows. Thousands flopped and went back to Podunk to jerk soda and brag that they were on the program. But the Major Cinderella is rich and got that way because he's a top-hand showman and a good businessman. He's made

money coming and going. Radio pays him to present the amateurs and if they click he gets money from the units that gypsy over the country thrilling the folks and working up to the top of the ladder. Maybe! He's given thousands of youngsters a chance they wouldn't have had otherwise.

The Major is a dog-lover, and his "Blarney" (no pun) is a wire-haired terrier with a business address. The dog shares the ritzy office of the Major atop the CBS Radio Theater Building at the corner of Fifty-third Street and Broadway. He lives in a maple-room doghouse equipped with a rose-colored, tufted Beauty Rest mattress. When Blarney takes a walk, he wears a tan tweed jacket. During week-ends he's at the Major's estate, "Riv-eredge," at Rumson, N. J. The Major's press-agents assure us that Blarney's favorite program is the amateur hour.

Now, who is this man whose name is known to millions but whose life is known only to a few? He was born Edward Bowes in San Francisco in the late seventies. The exact date is not announced, but we know the Major is at least sixty. His father weighed cargoes for San Francisco shipping and he died when Edward was six. Mrs. Bowes managed somehow to keep the family of three girls and one boy together until Eddie could take hold. At thirteen he was graduated from Lincoln grammar school and, as millions of other boys had done, he had worked at small jobs during his school days.

**B**UT when he completed grammar school he went out to earn his way and help the folks at home. Nothing remarkable about that. Eddie apparently was just another American boy. He got a job as usher at a convention and there showed first the shrewd business touch that made him rich. Some of the delegates wanted personal identification cards, so Eddie wrote calling-cards for the visitors and sold



them. He wrote a good hand—a Spenserian hand, they called it—and he sold the cards for two bits a dozen.

Later he was an office-boy in a real-estate office at \$3 a week. He got to buying and selling real estate and soon he owned his own business and his real-estate enterprises reached from San Francisco to Seattle.

His business success apparently was assured before he was thirty, for back shortly after the turn of the century we find him as foreman of a vice-crusading grand jury. The crusade caused so much talk that Roosevelt I sent William J. Burns out to San Francisco to help out. Roosevelt I had a high regard for young Bowes. After the crusade Edward Bowes took a year's vacation in Europe and returned home in 1906. The first night he was home he heard Caruso sing, and the next night the earthquake shook San Francisco to pieces and a fire burned the pieces. The earthquake also shook Edward Bowes' business to bits. He built it back and came to New York, where he got interested in theatrical real estate and, with John Cort and Peter McCourt he owned and operated

the Cort Theater in New York and the Park Square Theater in Boston. It was in New York where he met Margaret Illington, the actress, and they were married. The union lasted for twenty-five years, until 1934, when Mrs. Bowes died.

Back in San Francisco he had a reputation as quite a yachtsman and automobile racer. He won several trophies with his racing-car, and one triumph was to drive fifty miles non-stop without a puncture. Hot dog! He owned a sleek Locomobile, one of the first. It was white, with red upholstery. Walter Chrysler owned its twin. Chrysler and Bowes were friends then and today the Major sells Chrysler's goods.

His biggest venture in New York, of course, was the Capitol Theater, which he and Messmore Kendall built in 1918. The Major still is part owner and managing director of the house. He lived on the fifth floor of the Capitol in an apartment built especially for him and Mrs. Bowes. He knew everybody who was anybody on Broadway and they called him the "Gentleman of Broadway." He always was a modest dresser and sported a fresh flower in his lapel every day. A hard worker, he often didn't have time to walk down the hall at the Capitol to a lunch-room but ate in his office. He always ate the same things—a few

**J**UST five years ago, on March 24, 1935, the Major Bowes Amateur Hour first came to NBC, from New York local station WHN. The wide appeal of the program on WHN impressed advertising executives who gave it its first big chance. How it caught on immediately with the public is a matter of history. The NBC program (which later switched to CBS) brought together amateurs from every state, led to establishment of vaudeville units and established Major Bowes as a national figure. "The Capitol Theater Family Hour" is another successful Bowes radio venture. Because Major Bowes for five years has conducted radio's biggest amateur program; because he has given opportunity to those who may not otherwise have been able to give expression to their ambitions; because he has become, as a consequence, one of radio's wealthiest men, we publish this intimate and amazing story of him by James Street.

"When the program went on the CBS network I began working side by side with Major, selecting and auditioning amateurs. I have come to know him better in the last few years. He stays busy, but he is a lonely man since his wife's death. She was a beautiful and charming woman. All the jewelry I have was given me by Mrs. Bowes.

"After her death, Major was like somebody lost. He didn't show it to the outside world, but I saw how his face sagged and how he dreaded to go back to that beautiful, empty apartment. I saw the fresh flowers he placed every day by Mrs. Bowes' portrait.

"What Major has done for me is a story within itself," she said. "Big things and little things. He has often said, 'Bessie, I don't ever want you to worry about anything. As long as these two eyes of mine are open, you'll be taken care of. And when they are closed, too, for that matter.' He isn't a story-book hero to me. He isn't a god. But no gratitude of mine ever can repay him."

Miss Mack, if a contest ever is held to select the most loyal employe I'll have one amateur vote for Miss Bessie Mack. She has taken many of the shocks that the Major would have had to take if she were not his aide-de-camp. She's the trouble-shooter, the shock-absorber of the program. And when bouquets are cast to the "Amateur Hour," Miss Mack must have her share.

They don't know her out yonder where the Major's name is a by-word. But every big man has had a Dr. Watson. Major Bowes has Miss Mack.

sandwiches and a glass of milk. He never lost his temper, even in those days. When he was angry he was silent.

Mae West, Ned Weyburn, Arthur Pryor and Roxy were among talent he had at his fingertips at the Capitol. He got interested in movies and financed and produced "Sherlock Holmes," starring John Barrymore. In that picture he gave Reginald Denny and William Powell their first chances. When the talkies first came along the Major's Capitol orchestra supplied the score for the first show, "Don Juan."

The Major got into radio back in 1925 when he began Major Bowes' Capitol Family, and for years he ran the broadcasts without any remuneration. In 1934 M-G-M asked him to take over station WHN. He told his intimates, who wondered how he found the time for such extra work, "Oh, I just told Mrs. Bowes to set the alarm clock an hour earlier."

Bessie Mack, who became associated with the Major in 1919, said that after he took over WHN he did most of his Capitol work at night. "I didn't see him around for days at a time," she said. "Still he kept going with his Capitol Family, but often he would turn up for rehearsals so tired we would have to get a chair for him."

He began his amateur program on WHN. Miss Mack said: "I didn't know about the amateur program until it was under way for a couple of weeks. One day the Major said, 'Say, Bessie, did you hear our program last night? We had one thousand votes by telephone for the best amateur.' He was as excited as a schoolboy."

She went to the next broadcast in a small studio. The Major was jammed into one corner. He pointed to the gong and said, "It takes the place of the hook." Miss Mack, who now is the Major's right bower, helped take votes that night in 1934 when the program was three weeks old. So let her tell how it all began:

**"W**E HAD half a dozen stenographers and typists answering calls. We all ran around answering telephones, jotting down votes. After the show the Major told me, 'Bessie, this is going to be something very special.' He put me in charge of answering phone calls. I used to sit at a little desk, sorting the special messages and sending interesting ones to Major. We all call him just Major, you know. I still sort special messages, but now I sit in a gorgeous torpedo control-booth which juts out over the biggest radio theater audience in the world.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—To the many listeners who have complained long and loudly about the serious interference of superpowerful radio stations across the Mexican border, one of the biggest pieces of news for many months is the recent ratification of the North American Broadcasting Agreement by Mexico. Under the terms of the agreement, American and Mexican stations will undergo a general re-allocation of wave-lengths and modification of superpower to greatly modify the present confused situation. This will be done sometime next fall or winter. Then your reception will be a step nearer perfection.

NEW YORK, N. Y.—The hoboes of the United States have chosen Toscanini and the NBC Symphony Orchestra as their favorite radio attraction, according to nation-wide poll results published in *Hobo News*, official organ of the nation's touch-and-go tourists. "Information, Please" ranked second, and Ella Fitzgerald barely nosed out Bing Crosby for third place. *Hobo News* commented: "Choice of Toscanini is not surprising, considering the marked intellectual and esthetic tendencies of a majority of the Permanent Itinerants. While riding the rods, nothing could be more soothing than mentally recreating the stirring symphonies of the 110-man ensemble directed by the incomparable maestro. Likewise, to a group as dependent as hoboes on valid information, a program such as 'Information, Please' is bound to have vital significance."

CHICAGO, ILL.—There has been some confusion in the press concerning the realignment of Brown and Williamson shows originating in Chicago. The correct prospect is as follows: "Avalon Time" as a show will leave the air, but its product is to be plugged by "Home Town" and its Wednesday spot

will be taken by "Plantation Party," moving from Friday night. "Home Town" moves from Sunday night to fill the Friday spot vacated by "Plantation Party." "Uncle Walter's Dog House" will remain as it is.

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Frequency modulation—the newest and most promising offshoot of broadcasting—looms larger and nearer after eight days of FCC hearings. Support was stronger than anticipated for Major Armstrong's staticless system, although some friction did arise between FM and television interests. Gradual adop-

tion of the new system seems a very real prospect for the next few years. Officials seek to make it clear, however, that owners and buyers of receivers need fear no upsetting revolution.

NEW YORK, N. Y.—Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, who is said to earn more money through all her activities than her husband, the President, has been signed by Manhattan Soap Co. for two quarter-hour radio programs weekly, advertising Sweetheart Soap, and starting April 30 over NBC. The First Lady's radio income was exposed to the public limelight in 1937 when, although her salary went to charity, Rep. Hamilton Fish charged her with utilizing an income-tax loophole in that connection. The matter was smoothed over. Mrs. Roosevelt is said

to have studied voice culture since her last radio series.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The "survival of the fittest" theory among broadcasting stations was upheld in an important ruling made by the Supreme Court in a unanimous opinion recently. The FCC is given absolute power to license new stations regardless of economic injury which may possibly be suffered by other stations. The court held that the field is open, provided an applicant will not interfere in frequency channels and provided it can show its complete qualifications.

"Please" has been renewed by the film company that produces its short subjects . . . "Medicine Show," due soon on Broadway, will feature Linda Lee, vocalist on Robert Ripley's program.

**DUKE ELLINGTON**—"Jack the Bear" and "Morning Glory" (Victor 26536, \$.75)—The Duke's first record after returning to the Victor label . . . two originals, very danceable with a surprising lift from the Ellington rhythm section, excellent bass thumping by J. Blanton, Rex Stewart's haunting mid-register trumpet and rest of the great Ellington menage . . . A collector's item.

**CHICAGO JAZZ** (Decca Album Set 121, 6 records, \$3.50)—Decca has assembled three fine jazz bands playing Chicago style under the respective batons of guitarist Eddie Condon, trumpeter Jimmy McPartland and drummer George Wettling . . . You'll hear terrific clarinetting by Pee Wee Russell and Danny Polo; trumpeting by Max Kaminsky and Charlie Teagarden; pianistic at the hands of Joe Sullivan, Floyd Bean and Jess Stacy; saxophonizing by Bud Freeman and Joe Marsala, among others . . . A must for the jazz hound.

**BENNY GOODMAN**—"Night and Day" and "Beyond the Moon" (Columbia 35410, \$.50)—The King of Swing and his clarinet give new life to Cole Porter's immortal "Night and Day," in brisker tempo than usual . . . # What's Happened to Eddy Howard?

Is the "Careless" crooner out on a limb—or in the big time?

**E**DDY HOWARD is a singular mid-western radio disturbance. Unlike sun spots or static, he is much easier on the ears. Eddy Howard is also, we hear, out on a limb.

Until recently Edward Evans Duncan Howard—let's be formal—was one of the mainstays of the Dick Jurgens band, a rollicking crew of musicians whose standards are high and whose tempos are low and sweet. As long as he remained a mainstay, an increasing crowd of career kibitzers egged him on with applause and backpats. He was going places and they knew it. The Howard army expanded daily and happily, content to hear him sing each night.

Then Eddy Howard disappeared. As one of the more humble chroniclers of MOVIE AND RADIO GUIDE's current events, it has been this correspondent's chore to read letters from readers and answer their questions. All was quiet along our Maginot line until the night Edward Evans Duncan quit.

What a blitzkrieg of questions! Where is Eddy Howard? What's happened? Will he sing again? Is he singing anywhere else? Print a picture of Eddy Howard. Is his wife really dead? Did he write "My Last Goodbye" to her? Did he win the "Pot o' Gold"? I'll die unless I can hear Eddy Howard sing.

Well!

Let's get this straight. Eddy Howard is a mere mortal just like all the other trouser-wearing males of my or your acquaintance. I know. I've seen him. Medium height, darkly handsome—sort of a combination of George Raft and Laurence Olivier—weight about 150 pounds, dressed better than Lucius Beebe, black hair brushed down hard about a handsome skull. In short, a small portion of dynamite.

**N**OW, most radio singers you can take or you can leave alone. A voice goes off the air and a new voice comes on. That's life. I lose no girlish laughter one way or another. But this Howard is something else again.

Great personalities always give rise to legends. Eddy Howard already has one. Perhaps you have heard it. It concerns the song "My Last Goodbye," which he helped write. The last words, remember . . .

"I smiled through a tear,

Today makes a year

That I said goodbye to you."

The Eddy Howard cohorts will tell you all about that. Eddy's wife died just a year before the day on which

he wrote that song. It was his broken-hearted tribute to her memory. Why, the sob in his voice is as plain as day.

Dear Public, Mrs. Eddy Howard is not dead. She is alive and dangerously beautiful. "My Last Goodbye" is written to no woman in or out of this world. The lyrics, just for the record, were penned during a brief period of employment with George Olsen's band in 1937. Eddy stuffed them into an old coat.

Enter, the wife. She was Jane Fuermann of Evanston, Illinois. She married Eddy in Chicago and they honeymooned on Catalina Island in California, where the Jurgens band was playing. In 1939 the band came to the Midwest. Mrs. Howard sent all her husband's clothes to the cleaner, but, being a dutiful wife, she went through all the pockets first. She found a scrap of paper bearing some strangely haunting words. Impressed, she showed them to Jurgens without consulting Eddy. The rest is song-publishing history.

**A** SECOND legend says he was a hog-caller. True, my friends, but in a slightly different way.

Station KFRC had broadcast that they were holding auditions for vocalists on their "Blue Monday Jamboree." Eddy was a medical student in San Jose State College then, with a sideline yen for amateur theatricals. He would answer the call.

Waving a valiant thumb at everything that rolled toward San Francisco, he hopped aboard the first vehicle that stopped. It was a truckload of hogs bound for the Golden Gate. One hour later, dressed in a sweater and corduroy trousers and smelling slightly of bacon au naturel, he walked into KFRC headquarters. He was a little late. Only 261 other crooners were ahead of him. But Eddy Howard had not sung to hogs for nothing, had not thumbed his way to San Francisco only to be the tired tail-end of a vocalistic queue. He found a back stairway, mounted it, and opened a door marked "manager." Thirty minutes later he was a KFRC singer drawing \$22 a week.

Eddy's first orchestra job was with Eddie Fitzpatrick in Del Monte, Calif. He had won his union card by learning to play the guitar. On free nights, he worked out with a young trumpeter named Dick Jurgens, who had his own outfit. When Dick moved into the St. Francis Hotel in San Francisco in 1935, it was the natural thing that Eddy should go along. That asso-

ciation lasted, except for a brief year with George Olsen and the Royal Crown Cola program, right up until last month.

So, now, what happened last month? The question begs for an answer.

Eddy Howard got hot. That's what happened. His voice and guitar provided part of the heat. His music, "My Last Goodbye," "If I Knew Then," "Careless," and "A Million Dreams Ago," fanned the flame. His looks and his personality did the rest. People came to see him, listeners tuned to hear him, box-office turnstiles spun.

**A** "HOT" man in the music business is worth a million dollars to himself and his manager. Eddy didn't have a manager, but a dozen guys would have given their right eyes for the job. One guy got it. He and Eddy are a team now. It is the old story of a good man leaving a good outfit to seek a career for himself. That, very simply, is what happened to Eddy Howard and why you no longer hear his voice with the Dick Jurgens band.

In Eddy's own words, "Dick and I are the best of friends and shall remain so. I owe him a great deal and I'd like very much to stay with that swell bunch, but why should we both run in the same race when we each can have one to run in. I know he'll win his. I hope I can win mine."

Can young Eddy Howard, age 25, win? Well, he has a caressing tone, a subtle inflection, and a Latin delivery that puts a special twist on every note he holds. He has been serving his musical bonbons long enough now to note both cause and effect. His skill will not diminish. His exposure to unwary ears should increase. So should his popularity.

Leaving a great band like Dick Jurgens' might be called crawling out on the end of a limb. But already Howard's new partnership is beginning to click. He is making recordings for Vocalion. He has talked about forming a dance band of his own. Two radio programs are dueling for his services with weapons that look like dollar-signs.

It's a nice limb to be out on, maybe.



# IT'S SPRINGTIME IN the Smokies

If you haven't already, you soon will be hearing these fine Tennessee folk and their WSM "Grand Ole Opry"

**U**NCLE JIMMY THOMPSON sat in that dingy WSM studio and scraped his bow over jumping, throbbing violin strings until they smoked. George Hay, head of the station, sat with his foot a-tappin' while "Tennessee Waggoner," "Give the Fiddler a Dram," and "Late Last Night My Willy Came Home" hummed in his ears.

Presently he said, "Uncle Jimmy, you've been playing more than an hour. Guess we'd better call it a night."

"An hour, fiddlesticks!" Uncle Jimmy retorted. "A man cain't git warmed up in an hour. This program's gotta be longer."

So, in 1925, was born WSM's "Grand Ole Opry" program

WSM's "Grand Ole Opry" is unique. It was expanded in 1926 to four solid hours of music and songs and it has been broadcast continuously ever since, with two important exceptions. One: President Roosevelt borrowed a half-hour for a fireside chat. Two: A memorial program to Will Rogers took another half-hour.

Wherever WSM can be heard—and it can be heard over most of these United States—listeners have hummed the music of the "Grand Ole Opry." More than likely, other listeners will hear it soon also, for it is scheduled

—a part of it anyhow—to go on one of the networks this spring.

We wonder if any other program in America can boast a record of fourteen years of continuous service. That is 728 consecutive Saturdays. George Hay, who started the program and who still conducts it as the "Solemn Old Judge," must look back with deep satisfaction at the memories it has brought him.

For example, how most of his musicians came down right out of the hills and off of farms in order to make music for their neighbors. Uncle Dave Macon was one. For years he had been the conductor of a double-shovel plow. That had been his profession. But his pastime had been banjoing. In the evening, on the porch of his house, he would get out that five-string banjo and entertain himself and whatever neighbors happened over. Those neighbors did not have to urge him long to "try out" for the "Grand Ole Opry."

He did, and became an instant star, turning professional at the age of fifty-six. Today, Uncle Dave Macon is seventy years old, never misses an Opry performance, and is still the greatest

star of the entire seventy performers that make up the cast. Known as "The Dixie Dewdrop," he is the acknowledged king bee.

His songs reveal both a deep religious feeling and a sharp sense of humor. It was his humor that stood him in good stead last year when he went to New York to make recordings.

Walking down Broadway, with his gates-ajar collar, his big plug hat, his shiny gold teeth, his billy-goatee, and a watch about the size of an alarm-clock, Uncle Dave was feeling so good he just had to take that banjo under his arm and start a-strumming it.

**A** NEW YORKER thought he would have a bit of fun—

"Where you from?" he asked Uncle Dave.

"Tennessee," came the reply, and the old fellow did not miss a beat on his banjo.

"Strange people down there," taunted the New Yorker, to the titters of a gathering crowd.

"Yeah," came back Uncle Dave, "but they don't come in bunches like they do up here."

Hollywood has something to look forward to when Uncle Dave and his fellow performers trek westward late in May for the filming of their first motion picture. It will be titled "The Grand Ole Opry" and co-star the Weaver Brothers and Elvira.

While Uncle Dave Macon, the "Dixie Dewdrop," is the king bee of the Opry, there are many others that played during the first year of the show and are still going strong as the Opry approaches its fifteenth anniversary next November.

The Fruit Jar Drinkers, the Possum Hunters, the Gully Jumpers, DeFord Bailey, and the Crook Brothers join Uncle Dave among the first-year original performers. None of the old group has ever left, although several have since died, including Uncle Jimmy Thompson.

What will never die, however, are the songs they sing—words and music that stretch back through the years to the earliest settlers of America, the true folk-music of this nation.

Among these favorite Opry tunes which have been handed down from generation to generation from earliest times are "Tennessee Waggoner," "Nobody's Darlin' But Mine," "How Many Biscuits Can You Eat—Forty-nine and a Ham o' Meat, This Morning," "Bully of the Town," "Rabbit in the Pea

Patch," "Chittlin' Cookin' Time in Cheatham County," "Cross-eyed Butcher," and many others.

While the tunes have not changed, more have been added as the hills of Tennessee, Alabama, Kentucky poured forth new singers and new songs.

The newest star of the Opry, however, arrived two years ago from the Smoky Mountains of Tennessee. He is Roy Acuff and he calls his group of neighbors "The Smoky Mountain Boys." Roy is just past thirty and has spent all those years living in the mountain areas and rural areas of the South. He has become a student of folk-music and has thereby been instrumental in bringing to life many songs that had seemed lost.

Such songs have been "Maple on the Hill," "The Great Speckled Bird," "The Wabash Cannon Ball," and, more recently, "The Broken Heart."

Once WSM and its listeners almost lost the "Grand Ole Opry." Nashville, which is a thriving metropolis, did not like a four-hour program which they called "hillbilly" as the sole presentation available over their greatest station. They petitioned against it. They said that it misrepresented Nashville and gave the rest of the United States the idea that their city was a hick town.

They were wrong, of course, but there was a time when the show was almost off the air. Arguing, pleading, and hoping, the Opry singers kept going. Presently, folks who had been out of town started coming back and bringing the word that everywhere people were listening to the Opry and praising it as a great show. The Opry stayed.

The spirit of the Opry is best exemplified in the story of Dr. Humphrey Bate, leader of the Possum Hunters.

Dr. Bate loved his neighbors so much that when he graduated from the Vanderbilt Medical School and was offered an attractive internship in a large midwestern city, he turned it down.

Like his father before him, he chose to be a country doctor and to minister to the folk in his own area of Cheat-

ham County. His home had been the gathering-place for the Possum Hunters for several years before the Grand Ole Opry started. He was among the first to bring a string band to Nashville, and he came every Saturday night for more than thirteen years. He often said nothing but death could keep him away—the threat of death to a neighbor who needed him, or death to himself.

THAT death was pressing close upon him, Dr. Bate well knew. But he would not leave either his folk in the hills or his "Grand Ole Opry" to take the rest other doctors had prescribed for him.

"Your heart will wear out," they told him.

"My heart would break to leave the Opry or my people," he answered, and continued the way of life he had known. Each Saturday midnight Dr. Bate would make the rounds, personally shake hands with each member of the Opry cast and tell them "good-by, if I don't see you next Saturday."

Two autumns ago, on a Thursday night when the Possum Hunters had all gathered at Dr. Bate's for their mid-week get-together, they were in the midst of playing "Chittlin' Time in Cheatham County" when his heart wore out. Saturday morning, some sixty "Grand Ole Opry" performers gathered on the lawn and sang "Maple on the Hill," while Dr. Humphrey Bate found a final resting-place beneath a tall maple on the hill overlooking his Cheatham County home. Back to Nashville came those sixty Opry performers, and, as usual, the Possum Hunters opened the show at eight o'clock. In the group were young Humphrey Bate and Alcyon Bate, another generation to carry on.

Men may falter, but each spring-time down from the Smokies and all the other hills and valleys 'round-about Nashville come young singers and fiddlers to try out for the "Grand Ole Opry." Their tunes and their talents will carry on, entertaining their neighbors all over America.

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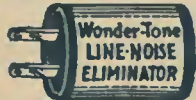

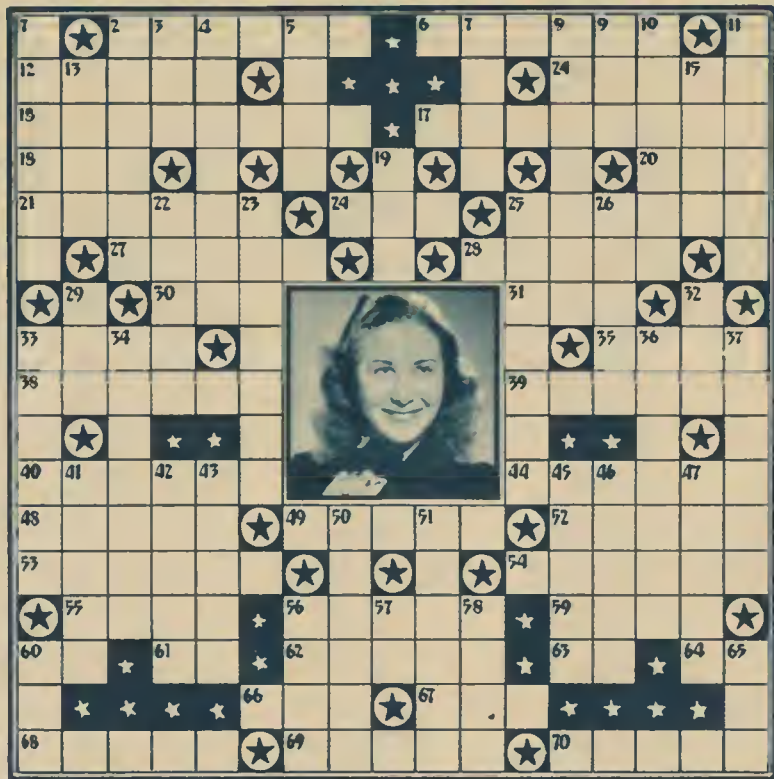
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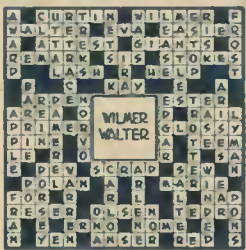

financially able in New York. A phony had chiseled Jimmy out of \$100, but while he suspected the culprit, he made no fuss about it. His angle was if the guy needed the money that badly, it was okay with him.

If it weren't for his wife, Mr. Cagney wouldn't know where his income tax was coming from at the end of the year, so open-handed is he, but between his wife and his brother, they manage to keep him in a state of solvency.

His open-heartedness extends to all the aspiring young actors and actresses with whom he comes in contact. Next to Bette Davis, Jane Bryan's guiding star was Cagney. When Jean Muir first came to Hollywood it was Cagney who took her over the hurdles of the first few weeks in town. When Ann Sheridan was cast with him in "Angels With Dirty Faces," behind the eight-ball as she was with all that "oomph" publicity, it was again Jimmy who made things easier for her.

JIMMY'S interest in people frequently serves him artistically. He uses a different mannerism in each one of the films he makes, in accordance with the character he portrays. Every one of them has been borrowed from someone he knew. That kidding gesture with his closed fist toward a person's chin was his father's. Allen Jenkins contributed to him that playful flutter of his right hand. A writer friend of his who stutters once called on Jimmy and told him a story, punctuating each word by smelling a gardenia in his buttonhole. He borrowed that one, too.

He has an amazing appreciation for the abilities of others. When he first caught Bing Crosby on the air it was during a rainstorm while he was at Martha's Vineyard, on his farm. Jim wanted to send a telegram to Bing immediately, but all the wires were down. After considerable effort and cost, he managed to get his message through. The message read:

THE COWS CHICKENS HORSES AND HOGS FOR MILES AROUND JOIN ME IN CONGRATULATING YOU AND IN EXPRESSING OUR APPRECIATION OF THE ENTERTAINMENT YOU HAVE GIVEN ME

He is quick to react to talent in others. For years he had greatly admired Fred Astaire, and insofar as compatible with his own appearances on the stage, had never missed an Astaire performance. But it wasn't until he came to Hollywood that a meeting was arranged between them. For an hour they sat over a lunch-table at Levy's Restaurant, and because both are so similar—extremely shy—they had nothing to say about the thing which had brought them together until the very last. Jimmy said, "I think you're a fine dancer," and Astaire countered with the compliment that even when he had seen Jimmy in the chorus he had felt his terrific personality. From then on, one of the very rare friendships in Hollywood began. Both today are looking for a play in which they can co-star.

Jimmy has never forgotten his dancing days. If you will observe closely, there is rhythm in every movement and to every speech of Jimmy's on the screen. He has almost a slavish devotion to the art of the dance.

There was a time when Jimmy was an instructor in a dancing-studio. That was a place where you paid a dollar and you could dance all day

long. Jimmy worked there in a special roped-off corner, where he taught dance routines.

He still calls himself a hooper—not an actor. That is in line with his lack of pretentiousness. One thing he can't stand is affectation.

There's the story of the time Mrs. Cagney received a copy of her family tree, with the information that she was a D. A. R. When Jimmy came home that evening, she told him the news. Jimmy stood right in the middle of the floor and saluted. For days afterward he would salute Bill on every occasion. At parties he would take people aside, point to his wife and whisper loudly, "She's a D. A. R. Have you heard?" Bill stood the ribbing well, but the next time she receives word of her important connections she'll keep mum about it.

Jimmy is one of the best listeners in Hollywood. In a place where the personal pronoun "I" plays a large part in every conversation, information regarding Jimmy has to be dragged out of him with tongs. He will sit in a gathering and listen for hours on end without saying a word. He gets excited only when topics of sociological significance are discussed. Then he will have something to say. It will always be to the point—delivered with the force and strength of a steamroller. He has been active in the relief movement to aid the dust-bowlers. Of John Steinbeck and his "Grapes of Wrath" and "Of Mice and Men," he speaks with almost religious fervor.

Jimmy has catholic tastes in books and music and arts. He has one of the largest libraries in Hollywood, and not one of the books has uncut pages. He is always in the middle of at least four books, all on different subjects.

He has a variety of intense interests. He takes singing-lessons just to keep his voice in trim. He cultivates his own vegetable patch.

He collects old muskets, sabers and bayonets.

He has a very special name for the people he likes. He calls them "Chotchke," which liberally translated can mean anything from "darling" down.

Elouise O'Brien, Pat O'Brien's wife, has her own name for him. She calls him "Pixie," which is probably as descriptive of Cagney as a nickname can be.

He dresses in gray and brown and has a habit of keeping his right fist and arm in his jacket pocket. That is a hangover from the time when his hand was broken. He doesn't drink or smoke.

Once he almost gave heart failure to a big-time gangster, who met him in a New York night-club, by refusing to take a drink or smoke a cigar. "But you do eat," the gangster "biggie" insisted in disgust. So Jimmy ate—a bowl of milk and crackers.

JIMMY was born in the upper East

Side of Manhattan Island, known as Yorkville, July 17, 1904. At fourteen, while he was still in high school, he began to work. His ambition was to become an artist, and he displayed great talent in both drawing and painting while in the lower grades. After graduation, he entered Columbia University, but dropped out when his father died. His older brother, Harry, was attending medical school, and Jimmy felt it was only fair that he work full time and give Harry a chance to finish his professional training.

Jimmy went to work in Wanamaker's Department Store, wrapping bundles at \$12 a week. One of the window-dressers was an actor in his odd moments. He asked Jimmy if he'd like to join his act, and offered him \$25 a week. Twenty-five being considerably more than twelve, the idea of becoming an actor appealed to Jimmy tremendously. He didn't find out until after he had quit his job at the store that his part in the skit would be that of a female impersonator. But once having given his word, characteristically he didn't back out, and so his career began.

Jimmy discovered almost immediately that he had a talent for dancing. His family didn't relish the idea of his being in the theater, so he quit and took a job as runner in a brokerage house. But during that three months the theater had crept into his blood.

In the fall, when show-season started, he threw up his job and became a chorus man in the musical comedy "Pitter-Patter." He went on tour with it, met Frances Vernon, a cunning little chorus girl, and they were married. They teamed up as an act and for a time had slim goings.

HIS first great opportunity came when, mainly because he was red-headed and aggressive-looking, he was given an audition for the lead in Maxwell Anderson's "Outside Looking In." It was a successful play, and he was well received by the critics. After that, followed in succession "Women Go On Forever," with Mary Boland; "The Grand Street Follies"; "Maggie the Magnificent," and finally "Penny Arcade."

When Warners bought this play, they also signed Cagney and Joan Blondell, playing opposite Jimmy, to play in it for the cameras. Brothers Warner might have saved a pretty penny if they had read a letter of introduction which Jimmy, several years before, had brought to them. Jim had come out to the Coast during a dull season in vaudeville to try his luck in the movies. A friend of his, who knew one of the important executives, had given him a letter. Jimmy sent the letter, followed it up with innumerable telephone calls to get a hearing. He was willing to work for approximately ten cents a week, and do anything from extra to bit roles. Perhaps it was just as well no one read the introduction or talked to him on the phone, for now, after doing right well on Broadway, he had an excellent contract.

JIMMY made his first sensational success in "Public Enemy." From then on he was a star of the first magnitude, and his staccato, machine-gun speech became a label and a passport to fame.

There came a time when Jimmy and Warner Bros. tiffed because he wasn't getting what he had been verbally promised. Jim went with Grand National and it wasn't until Warners gave him the sort of contract he wanted—a contract, by the way, which is probably the best in Hollywood in its provisions for rest, and billing, and money—that he returned there.

Since then he has made one sensational picture after another. In 1938 the New York critics gave him a "best performance" award for "Angels With Dirty Faces."

It is a page for the book that a law-abiding, unassuming citizen like Mr. Cagney could have done so well by playing tough characters straight out of the rogues' gallery!

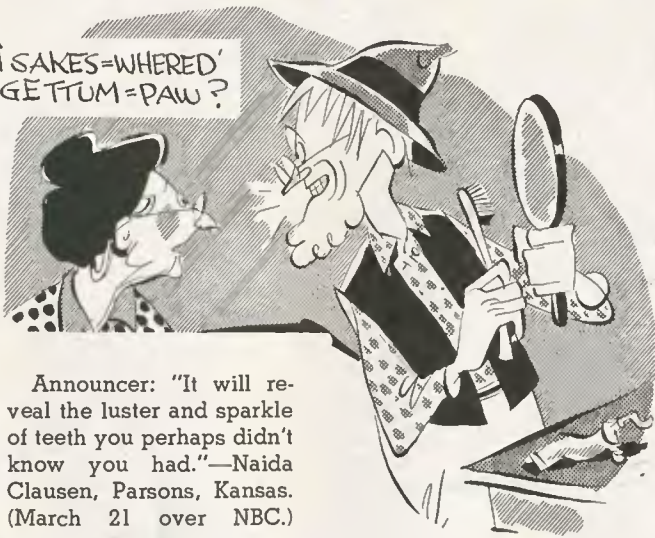

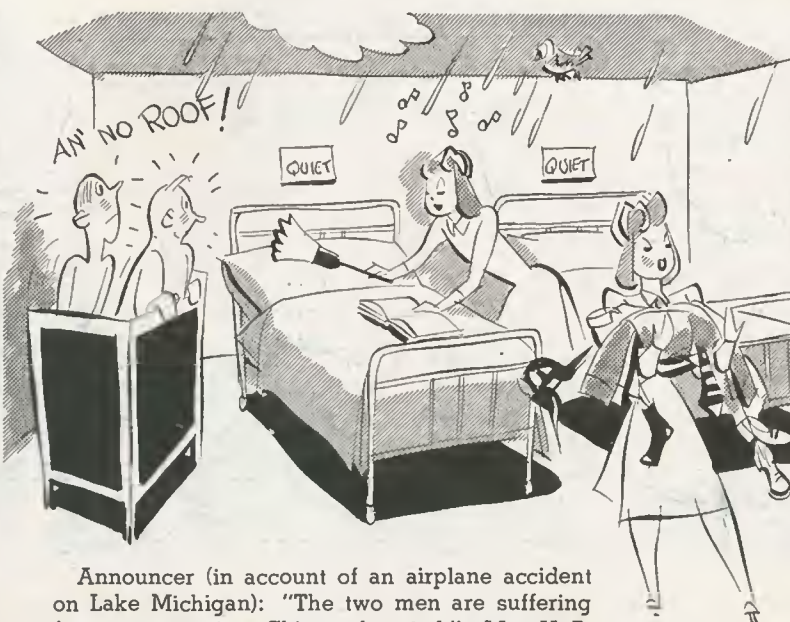
