The Making of

Twelve minutes of swanlike grace and perfect poise in a scene from "I Was

an Unforgettable Moment

an Adventuress" represent a lifetime of study for the incomparable Zorina

MOVIE-GOERS who see "I Was an Adventuress," 20th Century-Fox film starring the lovely ballet-dancer Zorina, will find it a thrilling and a sparkling tale of the old, brightly lit Paris of pre-war days when blackouts were unheard of and the distant rumbling of heavy guns was something that happened in the dim, forgotten past. But for all its sparkling story, the film's breath-taking moments are those in which the lovely Zorina and a beautifully trained group of dancers move with a sheer delicacy and grace through the famous ballet "The Lake of Swans." Beautifully screened through a foglike mist and with a new technique for slow motion that brings every motion of Zorina clearly and sharply to the eye, the modernized version of the ballet was conceived and staged by George Balanchine, noted ballet director and Zorina's husband. Behind the twelve minutes

of dancing you will witness on the screen (this is the longest ballet sequence ever to be included in a motion picture) lie hours of painstaking labor and the closest attention to every minor detail. Hollywood found Zorina the hardest-working actress to descend upon it in many a month. Up at five each morning, she took an hour's limbering-up exercises, reported to the studio at seven for make-up and often worked until midnight on the set. Born Brigitta Hartwig in Berlin, of Norwegian parents, Zorina studied ballet under Nicholas Legat, teacher of Pavlova and Nijinsky, and at seventeen was signed by the Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo. Followed a tour of the U. S., a role in "On Your Toes," and a sensational success in "I Married an Angel" on Broadway. In "I Was an Adventuress" she has her first straight dramatic role and she is determined to make the most of it.

THE GABLES aren't the most popular or the best-dressed people in Hollywood—in fact, they aren't the "most" or "best" anything, according to film-capital standards—but they are happily married and an ideal couple—that no one can deny!

Two HAPPY PEOPLE

Clark Gable and Carole Lombard take marriage seriously—that's why theirs is a success!

In previous issues, James Street has given his impressions of Carole Lombard and Clark Gable, has described their home and the manner in which they live. In this, the final installment of "Two Happy People," he explains why their marriage is a solid one, reveals the intimate little things each has brought to what may be considered one of the most glamorous, and sensibly happy, unions in Hollywood.—Editor.

CLARK GABLE'S favorite topic of conversation is Carole Lombard and her favorite topic is Gable. And that's why we feel justified in calling this man and his wife two happy people.

If they are not happy, then they are better performers at home than on the screen. In Hollywood, where gossiping is a profession and scandal-mongering is a craft, the Gables have been spared the darts that usually are hurled at the folks who live in the goldfish bowls of Graustark.

Before their marriage? Well, that's another story, and let the dead past bury its dead. The important thing is that the crown prince and the court jester of the fantastic realm, where the caste system makes India seem demo-

cratic, are leading happy, normal lives and are proving that it can happen here.

The wise boys who are connected with the propaganda agencies of Graustark will lay odds-on against the happy marriage of two stars. One of the stars must take a back seat, they insist, or else their professional jealousies will clash.

The Gables are old enough, smart enough and experienced enough in marital adventures to know that professional jealousy is the biggest barrier to their happiness.

Without doubt, Miss Lombard is determined to keep pace with her husband in stardom. Miss Lombard apparently has no intention of leaving the screen and settling down with a dish-cloth in one hand and a diaper-pin in the other. However, she is trying, and apparently successfully, to make her life—that is, her personal life—fit into the Gable pattern.

Clark Gable is very much the master of the manor, and Carole Lombard is the wife who sees to his needs, bosses him just a bit without letting him know that he is being bossed, and is his sidekick at play.

Mrs. Gable is one of the smartest

women I've ever met. She is no child-bride, and now that she has what she wants she seems determined to keep it. If her husband wants to do something—say, play a game that she doesn't know—she will learn the game. She is not taking any chances on anybody else hunting and riding with her husband.

And Gable loves it that way. They really have fun together. Some folks say that all the capers they cut together are acts, publicity balts thrown out for the suckers. That is absurd. Of course, they act even when they are not before the camera. It is only natural. It is impossible for natural actors to stop acting the minute the whistle blows. Does a banker cease being a banker at 3:00 p.m.? Does a writer cease being a writer when his story is finished? Acting is a profession with the Gables and they live their work all of the time. That's why—it's impossible for Miss Lombard to retire and devote all of her time to wifing. You might as well ask Jim Farley to quit politics.

She is proud of her success and her ability. Gable says he's going to quit when he is assured of ten thousand a year for life. Perhaps she will retire when he does. But I have the feeling

that these people will be on the screen as long as the public wants them. Energetic, ambitious folks like the Gables simply do not work and fight to get to the top and then retire gracefully and go to their little blue heaven where the vines twine around the door and, hand in hand, walk down the twilight trail together. It's very romantic, but it seldom happens.

In public, Mrs. Gable talks about her husband; not boastfully, but naturally. She'll often say, "The old man thinks so and so." Or "Mr. G. had a lot of fun yesterday building some thingamajig in his workshop."

Mr. Gable never fails to mention his wife during a conversation. He will say, "Mrs. G. sold six dozen eggs yesterday." Or "Carole is doing pretty well with her golf lessons."

HE NEVER fails to rise when she enters the room, and he often compliments her on her clothes and the way she does her hair. He's a smart husband. If they are in a crowd, he always manages to toss a modest little compliment her way. Carole Lombard may be glamour from her lightning tongue to her beautiful feet, but she's all woman, and women glow when their

husbands compliment them.

Don't get the idea that Mrs. Gable plays second fiddle to her husband. She is an individualist and their marriage is a partnership.

They are not social lights in Hollywood, where society is a scrambled institution and so clannish that it makes New York's Four Hundred (or is that four thousand?) look like a gang of clam-diggers. Neither are the Gables the most popular couple in Hollywood. Nor the best dressed. They are not the "best" or "most" anything, and are content to sit at their farm, where life unfolds itself interestingly, and watch the parade and brass bands go by.

GABLE usually wears work-clothes around his place, fatigue trousers and boots. His wife wears slacks. His idea of dressing up is to put on gray slacks, white linen shirt, tweed coat and a tie, always of a solid color. He likes solid-colored socks, too, and he wears supporters, for he hates to see socks flopping around a man's ankles. He always wears one ring—a ruby that his wife gave him. He dislikes dressing for dinner but usually does to please his wife.

When he comes in from the fields, dirty from plowing, Mrs. Gable often meets him on their back porch.

"Don't forget to wipe your feet," she'll say.

"All right, all right."

She will follow him into the house, and if he starts for the table she will tap him gently on the shoulder and point toward the bathroom. Mr. Gable always grins, but he goes and washes and slips on some clean clothes.

They both are healthy eaters. Mrs. Gable plans the meals and they balance perfectly. She is a bit partial to fowl and he likes steaks.

They usually have coffee in their living-room, and then they settle back for a quiet evening at home. They will talk over the day's work, things they did and people they saw. Then they'll play backgammon or each will grab a book. They both are avid newspaper readers, and they really read newspapers. They both pore over the foreign news and domestic political news. Then they will discuss what they have read and will not always agree. That's a healthy sign, too. Each stimulates the other's brain. Mr. Gable also likes the sport pages, and Mrs. Gable often tears out of the paper a recipe or something. Sometimes she tears a page that her husband wants to read, and then the same thing happens in their family that happens in yours and mine.

They have few really close friends. These include Andy Devine, the Tuffy Goffs (Abner of "Lum and Abner"), the Walter Langs, and the Charles Walters. Please note that, with the exception of Devine, none of their close friends is an actor. Goff is in radio. Walters is a lawyer. Lang is a director, whose wife, Fieldsie, once was Miss Lombard's secretary.

Reports persist that the Gables are going to have a baby. Mr. Gable did not discuss it. However, if a baby were expected at their house, Gable probably would say so. He is the kind of fellow who would give out cigars and buy drinks if his wife bore him a child. Mrs. Gable said simply that if she were going to have a baby she would be very proud and would announce it instead of hiding it. One gathers the impression that they would like to have a baby.

Gable is a great story-teller. He likes to hold a highball in his left hand, a cigarette in his right, and weave himself a yarn, embroidering it just enough to keep it interesting. Mrs.

Gable—wise woman—never interrupts. It is rather difficult for her to be quiet and still very long, but when the old man is telling a tale she listens as though she has never heard it before.

Mrs. Gable is a good story-teller, too, but she doesn't weave her stories; she pieces them together. And she acts them out. She gesticulates, walks the floor. Most of her stories are about persons—persons she admires and persons she does not admire. And her tongue can be caustic.

They both are practical jokers and play jokes on each other.

You should never think, because Gable is a big outdoorsman now, that he has always been one. He worked on a farm while he was a boy, but is just now learning to appreciate the land. And those jobs in the oil fields, timber camps, etc., simply were fill-ins between show jobs.

Mr. Gable is a gentleman farmer. He farms because he enjoys it. As much as I admire the man, I doubt if he could make a living farming, and I also believe that Mrs. Gable would not do so well as a real farmer's wife. There's a great deal of difference in telling a person how to cook beans and in cooking them.

Studio publicity may insist that Clark Gable is a farmer by heritage. If Mr. Gable had to earn his bread and meat running an Ohio farm, I do not believe he would eat as well as he does now. And so far as being an outdoorsman is concerned, Mr. Gable learned to shoot—that is, shoot well—comparatively recently. I do not mean that as a criticism, but it simply is a statement of fact.

Hollywood, which despite all of its smartness is still a bit naive and a country town dressed in its Sunday best, has made a great deal over the fact that the Gables are supposed to call each other Ma and Pa. Some folks think that "Ma" and "Pa" sound democratic. Perhaps Mr. Gable calls Mrs. Gable "Ma" and she calls him "Pa" for the benefit of publicity. But I never heard it. They might call each other Ma and Pa in kidding, but the Ma-and-Pa legend really is just that and nothing more.

One story goes that Mrs. Gable recently telephoned her husband and a servant answered. The servant is reported to have shouted to the master of the manor, "Hey, Pa, Ma is on the wire."

I don't believe it. The Gables would not allow their servants to be so familiar. Most persons in Hollywood, even strangers, call Mr. Gable, Clark, and Mrs. Gable, Carole. Seldom do they call her Mrs. Gable.

Mr. Gable is very proud of his wife, his success, his home, his dogs, guns, land and horses. And his mule, Judy.

HE PUT his hand on Judy's head and the old mule blinked at him, not the least bit impressed that he was being fondled by the crown prince of Graustark. "Isn't he a swell fellow?" Mr. Gable asked, and patted old Judy.

Yes, sir-ee, he is, and so are you, Mr. Gable.

Mrs. Gable is very proud of her husband and her other possessions, including her chickens. She insists upon owning New Hampshire Reds because she likes brown eggs. She reached into a nest and lifted an egg. It looked just like any other egg to me, but to her it was different because her chicken had laid it. We're all that way about our own things. It was quite a thrill to see beautiful Miss Lombard, the frosty blonde, the fire-cracker girl, holding a common, every-day egg.

"Isn't it MAR-vel-ous?" she asked.

Yes, it was a good egg, Miss Lombard, and so are you.

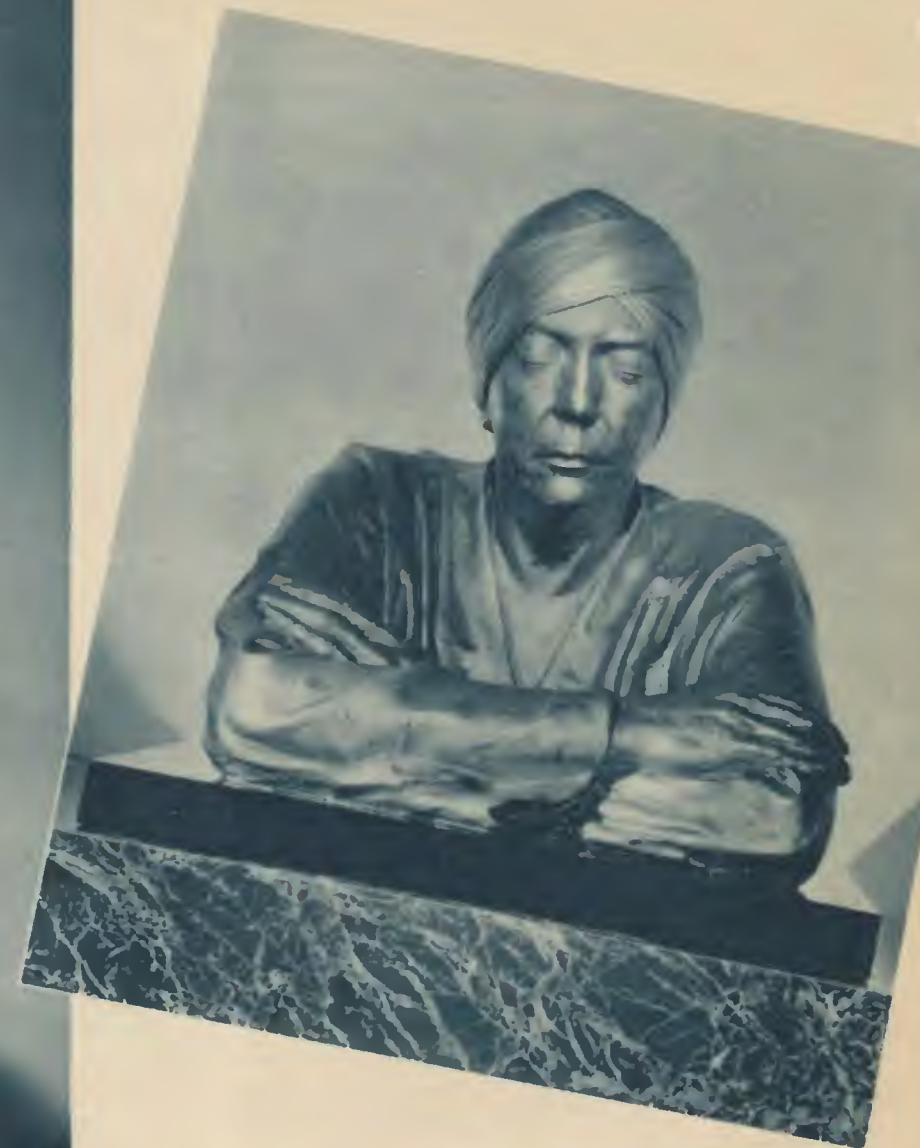

"TIL WE MEET AGAIN" is a new version of the popular "One Way Passage," an emotional romantic drama which starred William Powell and Kay Francis. The new version has George Brent and Merle Oberon cast in the parts of the girl about to die of heart trouble and George Brent as the man returning to pay for an old crime in the electric chair at San Quentin. The story of their hopeless love, blossoming on the ship bringing them back to the U. S. from China, is as beautifully done film drama as you are likely to see for some time.

The story (told in detail in MOVIE AND RADIO GUIDE for April 20-26 under the title "Liars In The Name Of Love") is a touching story of deep and hopeless love and of two brave people who refused to admit their plight one to the other. Nor is it as hopeless and depressing as it seems in bare relation, for the film ends on the strong note that they will meet again . . . and that theirs is the sort of love that survives even death.

IN a season which has seen many fine laugh-provoking films come out of the studios, here is a comedy which promises to top them all and establish Loretta Young and Ray Milland as a comedy team comparable with Cary Grant and Irene Dunne or Carole Lombard and Fredric March. With hilarious situations, sparkling lines and a mile-a-minute pace, "The Doctor Takes a Wife" is grand comedy.

Loretta Young is a career girl who has just written a best-selling novel praising spinsterhood. Then, at a wedding party, she meets Ray Milland, a research medico, and they have a lovely time spitting sarcasms at each other until, next morning, they find that the newspaper has erroneously reported them man and wife. Denials don't count, and in order to protect their careers they decide to masquerade as man and wife until it all smooths over. From there on, anything can and does happen.

Holden makes love to the judge's daughter (Bonita Granville) to stave off a stiff sen-

tence and ends up by really falling for Bonita (who has come a long way in pulchritude from the days of her little-brat characterizations). Ezra Stone, radio's "Henry Aldrich," does nicely with his role of the stodgy roommate, but real acting honors go to Vaughan Glaser as a sympathetic and bedeviled father of a collegian at the turn of the century.

sprightly duet of the romantic Pamina and Papageno; the High Priest's (Sarastro) Invocation to Isis, goddess of Wisdom (asking aid for the previously mentioned young pair); the impressive chorus of priests, "O Isis and Osiris"; Sarastro's immortal air, "Within These Sacred Halls," and Pamina's beautiful and touching lament, "Ah! I Knew It!" in which she declares her love can be ended only by death.

"The Magic Flute" has survived because of its incomparable music, and not through its strangely scrambled plot, mystical, poetical, comic, sacred. Beethoven insisted that it was Mozart's

Henrietta Schumann, pianist; Jacques Gasselin, violinist. *Sarabande, Andante and Bourree* (Bach-Bachrach), the Orchestra; "Where E'er You Walk" from "Semele" (Handel), Jan Peerce; *Prelude to "The Deluge"* (Saint-Saens), Jacques Gasselin; *Moods of a Moonshiner*: (a) At a Still, (b) On the Cliff, (c) A Moonshiner Laughs (Stringfield), the Orchestra; *Tell Me, Oh Blue Sky* (Giannini), *Jasmine Door* (Elijah Scott), Jan Peerce; *Two Pirot Pieces* (Cyril Scott), the Orchestra.

Much of this music was performed last spring and summer at the Music Hall broadcasts; but as it is good, repetition does no harm.

Bach is perennially welcome; and so is Handel, particularly in his dramatic works. "Semele," by some called an oratorio, by others an opera, had most performances in the latter guise, during the second half of the eighteenth century. It was composed to a story taken from an opera-book by Congreve, celebrated English dramatist.

Regrettably, we do not hear any of the numerous Handel operas these days, as a matter of study, but at least something of their style may be learned from the overtures and vocal solos occasionally performed.

The most familiar of those excerpts is the "Largo," generally done as an instrumental piece but originally it was a tenor aria in Handel's opera, "Xerxes" ("Serses").

The National Association for American Composers and Conductors gave an award of merit the other day in New York to deserving Howard Barlow as the American-born conductor who has done most during the past year for the music of his creative compatriots.

Barlow is just returning with his annual summer symphonic series for CBS (using the vacated Philharmonic Sunday spot) and he certainly again will feature plenty of our native works.

The one he programs today is not new (dating from 1911), but sounds fresh enough to have been written this week.

Henry Franklin Belknap Gilbert (1868-1928), a pupil of MacDowell, found an indigenous, individual note for most of his scores, much more so than his American contemporaries and successors, most of whom drew their inspirations and methods from respectively the earlier German and modern French schools. (Some of them still do so.)

Gilbert's interest in the folk-tunes of America and the songs of our colored race was intense and practical, for he made appealing employment of the material in his compositions. He was also the first to transplant "ragtime" artistically into symphonic writing. Best of all, Gilbert frequently put merit into musical use in his pages, and even gave lectures at Harvard and Columbia on "Humor in Music." Altogether, a precious, likable and highly gifted man who made important con-

tribution to the music of our country.

Musical Artists Go 'Round and Around

By Leonard Liebling

MUCH like the somewhat notorious song whose title is the caption of this article, certain musical artists have burst into quick glory on the air only to make an almost equally rapid disappearance into obscurity.

However, while the song probably never will come back, some of the artists in question occasionally do. When that happens, they resemble the song less and the famous Mr. Finnegan more. We all are familiar with his legendary series of ins and outs.

The ways of radio sponsors and their advertising agents are so mysterious that I cannot follow them with any degree of intelligent satisfaction. And yet the subject fascinates me constantly.

For instance, a concert or opera artist of high reputation is engaged as the major attraction on a sponsored program. Then ensues the familiar build-up (often ecstatic, not to say hysterical) effected through announcements over the air and press publication by the radio editors and columnists. The glorified one makes a debut, the same balleyhoo sources report the "triumph," the dialers write bales of praiseful letters to the station, and everything appears to be set for a new fixed star of the microphone . . . Lo and behold, the usual thirteen weeks or sometimes twenty-six weeks of the program go by—and so does the "triumphal" artist! He (or she) quietly fades from the air, and that seems to be that . . . Suddenly, sometimes after a long period, another sponsor secures the same artist, the same drum-beating and other methods of presentation materialize, and the same wind-up results. Again the abrupt vanishment, once more so complete that it would tax the best efforts of a Philo Vance or Ellery Queen to discover where the exile went.

All this comes to mind afresh with the return to radio of Jessica Dragonette, the former universally adored darling of the dialers. Her case, though, is different from some of the others, for she was on the air for eleven consecutive years without a break—a world's record for any musical artist in radio. Even so, and drawing a prodigious salary, Jessica, too, met the day when her voice was stilled on radio.

and she turned to touring the country successfully as a concert singer . . . Now, after nearly three years in that field, she is back again on the air, and under quite glamorous sponsorship and emolument. Somehow her adventure and the related adventures of Lawrence Tibbett, James Melton, Nino Martini, Grace Moore, Gladys Swarthout, Paul Whiteman, Nelson Eddy, et al., do not seem to spell sense of the kind you and I could easily understand.

Either those artists are brilliant and desirable or they are not. Not one of them loses ability overnight and then renews it after a lapse. Radio listeners, having once received certain artists into their affections, do not tire of them from one day to another. In fact, when one of those periodic disappearances occurs, the protesting fan-mail often reaches mountainous proportions.

If there is any logical explanation of the phenomenon, I cannot think of it at this moment. Should I be able to guess the answer, I shall be glad to relay it to you.

New Books and Records Reviewed

CHOPIN'S MAZURKAS. Volume II. Played by Arthur Rubinstein, pianist. Victor Album 656.

Many people claim that Chopin was never more characteristically Polish nor more completely himself than in the Mazurkas. Victor has done a service in recording all of them in two volumes, of which this is the second. Arthur Rubinstein, a Pole himself, plays the Mazurkas with atmospheric understanding and feeling. However, the full poetry and delicacy with which Paderewski and De Pachmann imbued them are somewhat lacking. The recording is a good one and the set is well worth owning.

UNDER THE SPREADING CHESTNUT TREE. Theme and variations by Jaromir Weinberger. The London Philharmonic Orchestra. Constant Lambert, conductor.

Both Columbia and Victor have brought out this jolly, heart-warming piece by Weinberger, premiered here last fall by the New York Philharmonic. There is little choice between the two recordings. Both are good, but neither conductor gives as robust a performance of it as John Barbirolli. However, the piece is fun and should be an added attraction if not quite a star in any collector's library.

PIONEERS IN MUSIC. Lives of the men who were first to develop the chief musical forms. by David Ewen. Thomas Y. Crowell & Company.

Here is a fascinating theme treated by a writer of wide experience in the musical field who has already authored ten previous volumes dedicated to the tonal subject.

Ewen picks out the pioneers who invented novel forms or else made old ones into newer contours and expressions. He shows the beginnings of the symphony; for instance, with Stamitz as its musical Columbus. Opera in its modern sense stems from Monteverdi and a group of early oratorio composers. The sonata, as Ewen points out, for example, had its real start when Corelli developed it for the violin and Kuhnau for the piano.

You will find a wealth of information, much of it unfamiliar, in Ewen's brightly written book, a potent help to sincere music-lovers.

Musician of the Week

Jessica Dragonette

"**I**MMEDIATE joy" is the phrase that sums up Jessica Dragonette's artistic philosophy. A song should mean that, more than anything else, to the listener. But it is also an idea that guides her whole way of life. She never forgets a friend's birthday. If someone is sick, hers are the first flowers to arrive. Exquisitely punctilious in everything she does, she epitomizes that hard-worked, much-abused word—lady.

This writer first remembers her as a tiny wide-eyed girl, fresh from Georgian Court Convent in New Jersey, with a gentle voice and gentle ways,

meeting the audiences who used to listen to her over the air.

"I was so buried in radio that I never realized that there were people who wanted to see and hear me off the air," she says. "I was so surprised when I'd arrive in a town and everyone would know who I was."

Besides getting close to her audiences, Jessica had an opportunity of studying their tastes, of investigating the tremendous growth of musical interest in this country, a growth with which she herself had had much to do. Since her first air appearance, when she was acclaimed at once as radio's

self-effacing and inconspicuous. At the famous Christmas parties given by her teacher, Estelle Liebbling, she sat timidly in corners, smiling uncertainly and in some surprise if anyone noticed her. Only occasionally was the spotlight thrown on her, when she was begged to do some of her uncannily clever imitations of popular musical favorites. Then, with the help of a scarf or flower, she would transform herself into any number of famous prima donnas.

After making one of the most phenomenal careers known to radio and after several years of concertizing, Jessica hasn't changed noticeably. When she floats onto a concert platform in a cloud of pastel chiffon or tulle, she looks more than ever like a child's conception of the fairy queen. The gentle, almost prim ladylike quality is still there. She sits straight up in her chair when she talks, like a good little girl trying to keep her best dress from creasing. And her eyes still gaze into her listener's with heartfelt earnestness. But added to these things, a new awareness of life, a deeper, more meditative philosophy, a greater maturity of thought. During the last few years since she left radio, she has traveled all over the country, giving recitals and

perfect voice, she has set records for the number of radio firsts in which she participated. She was the first to perform Shakespeare on the air, the first radio singer to do acting on radio. She sang on the first international broadcast, sang the first straight concert program on radio, and appeared on the first General Motors broadcast, which had so much to do in influencing radio's discovery of good music.

None of those things were haphazard. For under all the tulle and chiffon and the golden curls is a keenly intelligent, tirelessly active woman, who knows radio from the ground up, whose musicianship has earned the respect of great conductors, and who never stops studying, learning and perfecting herself. She has great respect for her audiences and never sings down to them.

Above all, she works unceasingly to improve her voice so that it shall be an instrument completely under her control, to be used at will. She believes that "the singer must bring something of flight to song—never be pedestrian. To song must be brought something of the perfume of flowers, some crystalline purity; joy, hate, indifference; poetry; beauty; love and devotion."

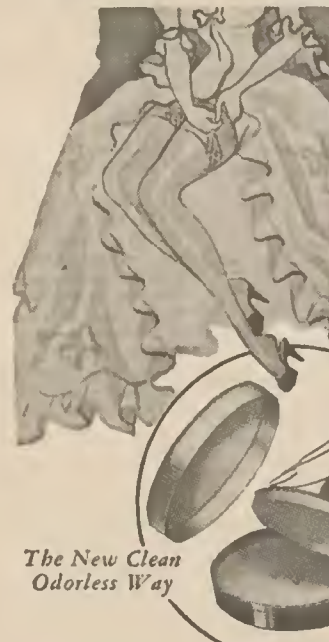

SHORT-WAVE ON A 24-HOUR BASIS

THAT short-wave radio has become a tremendously important factor in the war no one can deny. Those who have been closely following this column will recall that for the past two or three years the leading European powers have been engaged in a feverish struggle for choice short-wave frequencies, each seeking to establish its supremacy in the field of international broadcasting by building more and more transmitters and at the same time continually boosting the power of those already in use. All of this activity was designed for one purpose only: That when war came, as they all knew it would soon, they would be in a position to blast forth with more voices and louder voices than the enemy. Each government had an idea that short-wave radio would play an important part in the war but in their most fantastic dreams no one even guessed at the incredible role that it is actually playing today in the influencing of thought throughout the world. At the present time England's world service undoubtedly heads the list, with Germany and Italy a very close second; France in third place and coming up fast, and Soviet Russia still trailing as a poor fourth.

EACH of the countries mentioned above broadcasts on practically a twenty-four-hour daily basis, each day's schedule being broken up into an elaborate system of transmissions, each directed to a specific country or continent where short-wave reception is most favorable at that hour. In addition, to influence as many listeners as possible, these broadcasts are radiated in the languages that are used in the countries to which the programs are being directed. When Paris or Berlin broadcasts to listeners in the United States, the programs are announced in excellent English; when Paris or Berlin broadcasts to listeners in Latin America, the programs are announced in equally good Spanish or Portuguese, and when they transmit to the Near East, all announcements are in equally fluent Arabic. The extent to which this multi-language system has been carried out can best be illustrated by London's world service, which in addition to English is now radiated in eighteen other languages, including Afrikaans, Arabic, Bulgarian, Czech, Finnish, French, German, Greek, Italian, Magyar, Norwegian, Polish, Portuguese, Rumanian, Serbo-Croat, Spanish, Swedish and Turkish. A huge staff of translators, news editors and announcers are needed to handle this complicated set-up. Some of these foreign-language broadcasts are audible in North America, others are not. In answer to numerous requests for particulars as to the hours at which some of the leading foreign-language broadcasts from London can be heard, I have compiled the following list of the main ones audible in this country (CST):

The Author—by Carlton E. Morse—as told to Kate Holliday

All over the country as you read this, hundreds of people are turning dials to find a pet radio program. For them—the audience—radio is a simple thing: a mere snapping on of a switch, a moment's wait until the machine is fully awake, and a turn of the wrists.

For the men behind that spinning dial, however, radio is a vastly complicated business, a matter of endless rehearsals, of hours of conferences, of nights spent sleepless in search of an idea.

Most of the men who worry about what you are going to hear on the air are never seen by you. Many are not even of that minority who are heard by you.

The work of radio falls upon the shoulders and brains of eight men—the author, the man in the script department of the broadcasting chain, the producer, the engineer, the soundman, the musician, the announcer, and the actor. It is possible to put on a show without one or more of these—the musician or the soundman, for instance—but the others are completely necessary. We are going to take you behind the dial and introduce you to the men who create the programs you hear. They will tell you in their own words what part they play in the business which is radio.

MISS HOLLIDAY has asked me to tell you what my part—or any writer's part—is in radio broadcasting.

Though it is extremely difficult to gauge the importance of the script, I might say that the work of the writer is the trunk of the tree upon which grow all the other branches of radio. The characterizations of the actors, the producer's conception of the show as a whole, the work which is done by the soundmen and musicians—all this depends on the writer and what he has written for their use.

I am going to try to tell this as simply as possible, as I find that often authors get themselves involved in flowery phrases when they are trying to describe their work and, by so doing, lose the sense of what they are attempting to say. So if I don't sound "like an author," forgive me!

In the first place, I write and direct two shows. Miss Holliday is most interested in the writing of them, but you must understand that, in my case, the two activities go hand in hand. These two shows are completely different in feeling, in plot, and in character. Yet there are certain elements which are true of both.

For both of them, I have certain mechanical methods of writing. I have divided the week into two parts: On Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, I write the life of the Barbour family; on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, I write the adventures of Packard and

his two friends in "I Love a Mystery."

I usually arrive at the NBC studios in Hollywood at about 7:30 in the morning. (Grimace from Miss Holliday!) And I usually am without any definite idea of what I am to write. If I am lucky and it is a good day, I get ideas as soon as I sit down at the typewriter. Some days, of course, I don't. I sit, and I sit, and I chew my fingernails. Then I just forget about the whole thing for the day and go fishing! The nearer I get to my deadline, however, the easier it is to write.

For several years I have been writing serials; that is, radio shows which do not end their action in fifteen or thirty minutes. This is by far the easiest type of radio writing to do. I know: I have done both types. And, in the creating of a continued story, certain elements must be kept in view.

"One Man's Family" has been on the air for nine years. Naturally, it would have been impossible to keep any audience interested in only one character all that time. I have had to build a

series of characters, one of which was never the star of the show or held the spotlight for too long a stretch. This also gives me the advantage of having more material to work with in the matter of plots and situations.

I usually try to keep two or three plots boiling in the script of "One Man's Family." One of these is obviously the most important at a given time, but any of the others may be brought forward immediately when I feel that the first situation has begun to pall on my audience. This not only gives me a chance to work from different angles and keep my own interest alive, but it also gives my audience a change of scene.

However, I rarely have more than one complication occurring at one time in the life of one character. It becomes too complicated and too overdrawn when that happens.

While I am on this point, let me say that the keynote of all radio writing is, to me, simplicity. Or, call it naturalness. Too much of any one thing,

whether it be plot or the number of characters or the length of a speech, will destroy the effect intended. The script will become ridiculous.

Therefore, whether I am writing about the family or about Packard, I write basically the same. The main difference is that "One Man's Family" is essentially characterization, scenes which are built around what a given character will do in a given situation, while "I Love a Mystery" is primarily plot—plot which may land the characters in situations as exotic as the human imagination can conceive.

Character in both cases is of the highest importance, since I have found that no audience will listen to any show for long which is not written around characters which interest it. The listeners must be able to know and understand the men and women about whom you are telling the story, and to feel, because they do know Packard or Betty, sympathetic toward those people. But the characters must be simple, easily understood.

Simplicity enters into the mechanics of writing, too. I have found that the number of characters which are used in a script makes a great deal of difference in the way in which that script is received. Naturally, too many people telling a story is confusing. I would say that in a fifteen-minute show, one should never use over six people. In a half-hour show, never more than nine.

The dialog itself should be natural. The speeches should be short, to the point, with punch to them. If a thought cannot be told in two or three lines by one character, his speech should be broken into by another and the thought continued by the second man. In that way, the writer avoids "readiness" and "talkiness" in his scripts.

It is highly difficult to tell people about the actual business of writing. The only analogy which comes to my mind is that of telling someone about a flower. One describes the color and texture and the shape of the flower, but to someone who is blind these are only words. He still has not actually seen the flower itself. Trying to tell someone what writing is is as difficult to put into words.

And it is doubly hard since most writers can't explain the process themselves. They know the actual tools, yes, but they still don't know why it is that some days they can write ten perfect pages, and the next day write ten destined for the waste-basket.

In the matter of radio, this is as true as in any other field of writing. And it devolves upon us writers to avoid these bad days as often as possible. For as I said in the beginning, without a script you are nearly always without a program. The script is the foundation upon which every other part of the structure of radio is built.

THESE ARE THE GOOKS

SINCE 1932 the Gooks of "Vic and Sade" have been drawing out their loquacious, homy lives in Bloomington, Ill., for the benefit of listening eavesdroppers. They were created by young Bloomington-born Paul Rhymer, the author, and have become even more Gookish at the hand of director

Ted MacMurray. As one of the first of radio's first families they now introduce our new "first family" series.

The Gooks are a pleasantly typical family of three. Sade (played by Bernardine Flynn) is the good-humoredly nagging wife of Vic Gook, a bumbling, talkative, small-town clerk. Vic (played

by Art Van Harvey) is continually being interrupted in his newspaper reading by his son Rush (played by Billy Idelson), who has an adolescent yen for reading adventure thrillers aloud. On the Gook front porch, around the dining-table, in the parlor, these three—and no more—have ex-

ploited every known comedy situation. They still rate ace-high with listeners.

In real life, Vic is a former broker's clerk; Sade is a one-time actress protégé of Zona Gale, is now Mrs. Doherty of Chicago; Rush is a Northwestern University undergraduate. You may hear them Mon. through Fri. over NBC.

The answer was No!—when Dan Golenpaul suggested "Information, Please" as a radio program. It was a thousand times No!—when Edgar Bergen and his blockhead dummy first sought an air spot for their "corny" ventriloquist act. They laughed when the NBC Artists Service dared ask radio's perennial holdout, Ignace Paderewski, to sit down at the piano for a broadcast concert. They dinned "it won't work" into the ears of a CBS technician who dreamed of four-way conversations between Europe and America.

Today some of those boys who said "no" are worrying about their next meal.

This article takes its inspiration from the multitudes who hurdled the obstacles and survived the opposition, from the artists who refused to get bogged down in the slough of radio's no-man's-land, from the ideas that "couldn't be done."

Back in 1936 when David Sarnoff conceived the idea of a radio symphony under Toscanini's leadership, he was battling the sort of odds even Lloyds of London would turn down. Toscanini was a giant NO. For one thing, Arturo had stalked off the Philharmonic podium in a huff, swearing before his departure for Italy that he'd never set foot again on American soil. Approaching the choleric conductor with an American offer—even though it glistened with a promise of over \$50,000 a season—was like applying fire to a keg of dynamite. Not that Toscanini wasn't musician enough to appreciate the harmonious jingle of coin. But the man who left the Philharmonic in the lurch would surely never consent to lead a radio orchestra. He disliked radio. He disliked America. He hated orchestras that had no pedigree.

But Sarnoff was obsessed by his idea. One man could undertake the mission of propositioning Toscanini. That was his friend and New York Post critic, Samuel Chotzinoff. In response to a vague telegram from the latter about discussing a "deal," Toscanini agreed to confer with Chotzinoff in

Milan. The emissary left America with Sarnoff's blessing and a hundred "It can't be done's" ringing in his ears. Arriving in Milan's stupendous station on a drizzly winter day, Chotzinoff was not even met. Toscanini said he had forgotten. A week passed before the American critic dared broach the subject of his mission. Even then he took the matter up first with Mrs. Toscanini. It was she who prepared the way for Chotzinoff's all-important interview and for the ultimate acceptance of the scheme. On the seventh day Toscanini gave in like a gentle lamb. After receiving the news from Chotzinoff by transatlantic telephone, Sarnoff called his board into conference and told them they were about to spend a million dollars on the project that "couldn't be done." Within three months another impossibility had been surmounted: an orchestra worthy of Toscanini and later pronounced by him to be one of the world's greatest had been whipped into shape. They said it couldn't be done. But Sarnoff did it.

Sometimes ideas originate with people who aren't presidents of networks. That's when the going gets really rough. Dave Elman, for instance, had to make a veritable hobby of peddling "Hobby Lobby" before discovering someone over at Mutual who shared his faith in the program. James F. Waters and Al Scheibel pestered program directors for two years and went \$4,000 into debt before getting the "Court of Missing Heirs" on the air. Now sixty-one stations are carrying the show.

"INFORMATION, PLEASE," which has developed into one of the most brilliantly successful programs in radio history, was a drug on the market for almost a year after Dan Golenpaul conceived the idea. He took it first to the Columbia Broadcasting System. CBS turned it down. Their reasons tallied with objections all over the lot: The program would go over the heads of radio listeners; no board of experts would want to jeopardize their standing as sages by submitting to public examination; quiz shows were on the

wane. Finally NBC, skeptical till the last moment, agreed to put the show on sustaining. It was to be a sort of tidbit offering for a few intellectual starvelings who might be listening. Eight months passed with nary a sponsor in sight. The big radio agencies steered their clients away from "Information, Please" as a program that could never attract large audiences. When doom looked closest, a man named Bill King, working at the J. M. Mathes agency, made a survey of 60,000 "Information, Please" fan letters. He found as many from the Bronx as from Park Avenue, a fact which immediately rendered the program exceedingly attractive to sponsors in general and Canada Dry in particular. Twenty million people now turn to the Blue network at 8:30 p.m. EDT every Tuesday to hear a program that would never have existed had Dan Golenpaul taken the first "no" for an answer.

While even good ideas often land in waste-baskets, ambitious artists may also wind up on endless treadmills. Once you're in a chorus, for example, you're supposed to stay there for life. Vocal ensembles like Ted Straeter's and Lyn Murray's pay swell salaries. But then, it's supposed to take a lot of money to compensate an alleged artistic soul for its lost individuality. Three years ago Bea Wain was buried along with a lot of other girls in Ted Straeter's chorus heard on the "Kate Smith Hour." Faith in her own ability and a

childhood apprenticeship in all sorts of choirs hadn't lifted Bea out of the ranks. Even her friends and family thought she was stuck with chorus work for life. But Bea still took herself and her chances seriously. One day when Ted Straeter told her at rehearsal to work out a hot lick—five or six notes to be sung ad-lib on "Blow, Gabriel, Blow," the young songstress didn't treat it like a routine assignment. She went home and strung all sorts of notes together until she got just the gem of a phrase she wanted. On the Kate Smith show that night Bea's heart and soul were in that "unimportant" hot lick that nobody noticed—except Larry Clinton, who happened to catch the show at home. It sounds like a publicity story. But this article doesn't deal in publicity. Before the repeat broadcast to the West Coast, Clinton had rushed down to CBS Playhouse No. 2 and engaged the unknown voice as featured vocalist for his new band. A conscientious hot lick had licked the odds.

They told Genevieve Rowe she'd never get out of the Philip Morris program's chorus. But one day the Ohio River overflowed and the show's star singer was marooned in the Midwest. It was tough on the unfortunate prima donna. That night Miss Rowe took the star's place, singing the scheduled "Why Do I Love You?" in her own style. Never again did Genevieve Rowe have to waste her talent in chorus work.

Harry Warnow was told he'd make no progress in music because the name "Warnow" was already too closely associated with brother Mark. But the kid was not to be so easily discouraged. Opening the Manhattan phone book for inspiration he found "Raymond Scott" under his thumb. Since then he has confounded the "no" boys by his erratic spurt to fame. The real Raymond Scott, incidentally, turned out to be a classical trumpet-player with one of New York's most austere symphonies.

Kenneth Delmar, heard as Commissioner Weston in "The Shadow" and anonymously on "Gang Busters," "Aunt Jenny," "Big Sister" and many other dramas, lost the power to form certain syllables at the age of fourteen. Mysteriously attacked by a trio of hoodlums, Ken was left lying on the sidewalk with a fractured jaw. After weeks of confinement with his head "resting" immobile on an iron pillow, the young actor emerged whole but minus the ability to pronounce sibilants. He gave up acting and went into the business of importing olives from Greece. That was nine years ago. Then he fell in love, and found in the woman who said "yes" the inspiration to overcome the big NO in his acting career. Perseverance, practise, a long course of speech study and an immense native talent combined to put Ken Delmar back among radio's acting elite where he belongs.

A year ago Leith Stevens waved a

baton with wild abandon over Phil Cohan's now defunct but immortal "Saturday Night Swing Session." Wise-aces said that Leith's ambitions to crash the classical field could bear no fruit. Never, they said, could he shake off the "degradation" attached to swing. This summer Leith Stevens takes up his duties as conductor of the Ford Sunday Evening Hour.

SOMETIMES radio itself is faced with the necessity of bringing in hard-to-get outsiders for guest appearances, distinguished personages steeped in the legend of their own untouchability. For ten years artists' bureaus of major networks sought in vain to engage the great Ignace Jan Paderewski. They offered their souls and a lot of money as collateral for a couple of sonatas. But not one note would Ignace play. With every proposition meeting flat refusal, networks finally gave up trying to annex the Pole. Everybody, that is, except a persistent George Engles, now managing director of the NBC Artists Service. Engles, taking a chance that maybe the hundredth time might work the charm, entreated Paderewski by cable. Paderewski was back in a flash with a yes. The temperamental pianist, having stormily rejected all chances to play under ideal conditions in CBS and NBC studios, had unaccountably agreed to a transatlantic broadcast with all its fades and cracklings. Radio scratched its head while perseverance up at NBC reaped its reward.

Then there was the unapproachable Miss Shirley Temple, who turned down fabulous sums in what promised to be a lifelong boycott of radio. But some anonymous whiz in the entertainment world hit on a scheme, fantastic in its simplicity. He asked Shirley to go on the air—for nothing. Listeners soon got their only earful of hard-to-get Shirley.

The radio field is full of women who pit female grit against masculine obstinacy with alarming losses for the brawny sex. Betzy Tuthill, formerly secretary to CBS producer Bill Robson, became a director of network programs despite CBS' unwritten taboo against women in control-booths. One of Betzy's assignments now is "Big Sister," where radio's unique sound-effects-man woman, Mrs. Ora Nichols, handles the background noises. They're tough customers, these two, and radio bowed to their dogged determination.

Talking about sound-effects, there's inspiration right in that department for

amateur song-writers, whose first efforts so often meet with failure. You certainly remember "Stardust on the Moon," played six times on the "Hit Parade." It was written by the sound-effects man on "Gang Busters," a Simon-pure amateur tunesmith, Jimmy Rogan.

Upon the closing down of a WPA stage production in which their patriotic song saga "Ballad for Americans" served as the finale number, young Earl Robinson and John Latouche refused to believe it meant the end for their composition. They continued singing their multi-voiced extravaganza in diluted duet form at small parties. But the Broadway critics had failed to commend their work and everybody else naturally felt obliged to give it the cold shoulder. One evening CBS producer Norman Corwin heard the piece, detected its worth, and engaged Paul Robeson to sing it with a chorus on "Pursuit of Happiness." Result? Columbia's switchboards in New York and Hollywood were clogged for two hours with congratulatory calls, unprecedented fan mail poured in, "Ballad for Americans" was repeated twice on the air, was purchased by M-G-M and earned for Earl Robinson (who once flunked out of the University of Washington) a Guggenheim fellowship. Which shows what radio can do for an egg laid on Broadway.

PROBABLY the greatest technical achievement in recent it-can't-be-done history is the transmission of four-way conversations between American and European news commentators, an exclusive CBS innovation embodying a deep, dark secret which other networks evidently have not yet penetrated. Before Columbia's assistant traffic manager, A. H. Petersen, went to work on the project, four-way chats were considered out of the question for several reasons. For one thing they'd require tying up at least eight transatlantic radiotelephone channels. That's almost all the channels in existence and nobody would have permitted a monopoly by one network. Furthermore, there was the unconquered

problem of feedbacks—each speaker being confused by the sound of his own voice in the earphones elamped on his head. Now don't ask me and don't, for goodness' sake, ask A. H. Petersen how it was done. But CBS succeeded in reducing the transatlantic circuits needed to two and eliminated the hateful feedback. Petersen explained the set-up to his colleagues abroad in a laborious three-hour telephone conversation. It was probably the haziest blueprint in wireless history, but the far-away technicians got the drift, and Kaltenborn's "Come in, Paris," "Come in, London," "Come in, Prague," "Come in, Berlin" provided four-way rebuttal to the defeatists who claimed it couldn't be done.

When MBS' Dave Driscoll, noted for his exclusive radio coverage of Howard Hughes' round-the-world fight, decided to aim powerful short-wave signals at Mars to see if they'd bounce back, he ran into the usual guffaws. The scheme had scientific value, for if the beams bounced it would demonstrate the presence of minerals on Mars. Last summer when the planet passed unusually close to earth, Dave Driscoll assembled a crowd of doubting scientists at Baldwin, L. Fifteen seconds of the twenty-three required for a signal to complete a round trip to the skies and back quickly passed. Then sixteen went by, seventeen, twenty, twenty-two—twenty-three and then . . . there burst the realization that nothing, absolutely nothing, was going to happen. Nothing did happen. It WAS impossible. The scientists had been right. NO was the answer! But Dave Driscoll had given Mutual plenty of swell publicity.

And really, it's awfully refreshing to find at least one thing in radio that can't be done. Something that still remains to be accomplished. Why, right now Mars is in its heaven waiting to shoot back the short-wave beam that—who knows?—even you or I might some day unleash from the earth.

The plattermate is the revived "Suicide Song," made famous by Hal Kemp about five years ago, receiving rich ensemble, clarinet and vocal treatment in Shaw's hands.

BENNY GOODMAN SEXTET—"Till Tom Special" and "Gone With What Wind" (Columbia 35404, \$0.50)—The greatest job the Goodman sextet has done on the red label to date, ensemble rhythm effects, the maestro's clarinet and Lionel Hampton's vibraharp making this a must for your jazz collection.

This is Dick Jurgens

He's the bandleader who played Eddy Howard to fame. Will his own fame now outrun Mr. Howard's?

YOU could call it a paradox. Dick Jurgens' music is usually on the easy going, sentimental side, but the head man himself is the most energetic, hard working, enthusiastic gentleman you'll ever have the pleasure of meeting.

When he sold papers in home-town Sacramento, one route wasn't enough, so he got two—a morning and evening. Mrs. Jurgens made all her children take music lessons, but Dick spent more hours in rehearsing. When he played end for Sacramento High and the Junior College he played hard enough to interest the University of California—and they're rather hard to interest. During school, one song wasn't enough, so he wrote two—one for the high school and one for the junior college (they're still being used).

He rarely touches either cigarettes or liquor but smokes the biggest pipe you've ever seen. Two inches across the bowl, caked so thick it barely holds tobacco. To light it, he uses two matches every time.

His tennis games leave a frayed gut on the racket and, though he loves riding, it takes a cross between a Per-

cheron and an Arabian to give him what he wants. Lately interested in home recording, his own individual outfit has already run \$3,500. He's boss of the band, his own manager, does a lot of the band's arranging and answers every single letter via dictation—fan or otherwise.

Yet he still finds time to spend an hour or two in the gym, play six nights a week, rehearse, record for Vocalion, and give the better part of an afternoon to a gent who wishes an interview for MOVIE AND RADIO GUIDE readers.

BUT then he's up, shaved, had breakfast and is out walking "Schnapps," the Doberman-Pinscher, by the time the sun has reached the nine a.m. arc which probably accounts for his finding the time. If all this isn't quite the opposite of what you, you, you and you thought a bandleader's life was like, then don't bother to read further.

The full name of this lackadaisical trip-hammer is really Dietrich Heinrich Jurgens, Jr., the second of four children. Dietrich is German for Dick, which makes it Dick and not Richard.

Though he's the only member of the family that has stuck to music, the children, as a prodigal foursome, used to play such outstanding events as the Moose Lodge dances (his father was a member), church socials and weddings. The roster ran Dick on trumpet, Wilfred on clarinet, Ruth with a violin and Elsie for piano.

"I guess we still could go back to some sort of an association," he remarked, "Wil is in the printing business, Elsie married a florist, Ruth an undertaker, and I have a band."

Dietrich, Sr., died when Dick was twelve and the family-owned grocery store was sold shortly after. The family stocking was a bit on the light side, so every one got out and dug. Sticking to his one and only interest, Dick organized a seven-piece orchestra during high school. Because all the "musicians" lived within six blocks of each other, spare moments were spent either in rehearsals or playing for whatever local affairs they could. Then it was Dick, Lou Vacca, Bob Lee, Floyd Adams, Carl Brandt, Ronnie Kemper and Herald Winder. Add seven more men and a girl and you have today's line-up.

Their debut as professionals was made in a grocery store.

Ronnie worked afternoons for the Clarence ("Sole Owner of My Name") Saunders Grocery in Sacramento and, upon the opening of a new location, he sold Mr. Saunders on the idea of having open house on the first day—with music, of course.

Playing from behind the main food counter, the "Seven Syncopators" were to sound off at 1:00 p.m. and quit at 5:00. The first few hours were fine, but by four o'clock the music as well as its purveyors began to take on a slight green tinge. To this day, none of those seven can look groceries in the face.

From "grocery" dates the band progressed to regular Saturday nights at the Traveler's Hotel in Sacramento and augmented to ten men for the occasion. Still going to school, they played this and other jobs until 1933, when they went to Lake Tahoe for the summer. Here the band became "formal."

In a musical age where today's featured soloist becomes tomorrow's leader, it would almost have to be an accident when a bandman becomes a leader for any other reason. No one—not even Dick himself—can tell you whether he would be fronting that

band today if it hadn't been for an accident.

The Ten Tarzans of Tahoe were playing at the resort when Dick was involved in an automobile accident which injured his lip. Anyone can tell you that a trumpet-player with a cut lip is like a guitar-player without strings, so the boys took him out of the back row and put him up front—with a drummer's stick for a baton. He's been there ever since.

Unmarried (and no prospects), Dick and his mother usually take a small apartment near the job. Though "Mother" to everyone in the band, he only active interest is in Dick and the apartment—especially the kitchen.

Last New Year's Eve marked the band's tenth anniversary with but three changes in personnel during that time—a most uncommon practise in the whirlwind existence of today's orchestras. As a matter of fact, the whole history of the band is unorthodox. In the first place, Dick is boss—but absolute. Secondly, they've gone right up the ladder in the face of all the Goodmans, Shaws and other swing crews during an era of swing mania, yet never playing swing as the jitterbug knows it. Where the majority of present aggregations feature at least the leader on some instrument, the only time Dick plays his horn is on ensemble effects—and then goes back to sit with the last-row brass. The only feature in the Jurgens crew is "Alice."

DICK found "Alice" in a second-hand store while playing at the St. Francis in San Francisco. Her plaintive notes won his heart and approval and he presented her to the band—especially pianist Lew Quadling—as a Christmas ('35) present.

The shop-owner said that her right name was Celeste and that she was born in France many years ago. Though \$450 passed over the counter before she was placed in her new home, her worth today is incomputable.

Dumped in snowdrifts, left standing in pouring rain, dropped from bandstands, bumped, kicked and scratched, "Alice" continues to respond with the bright tones that have helped to identify the Jurgens music.

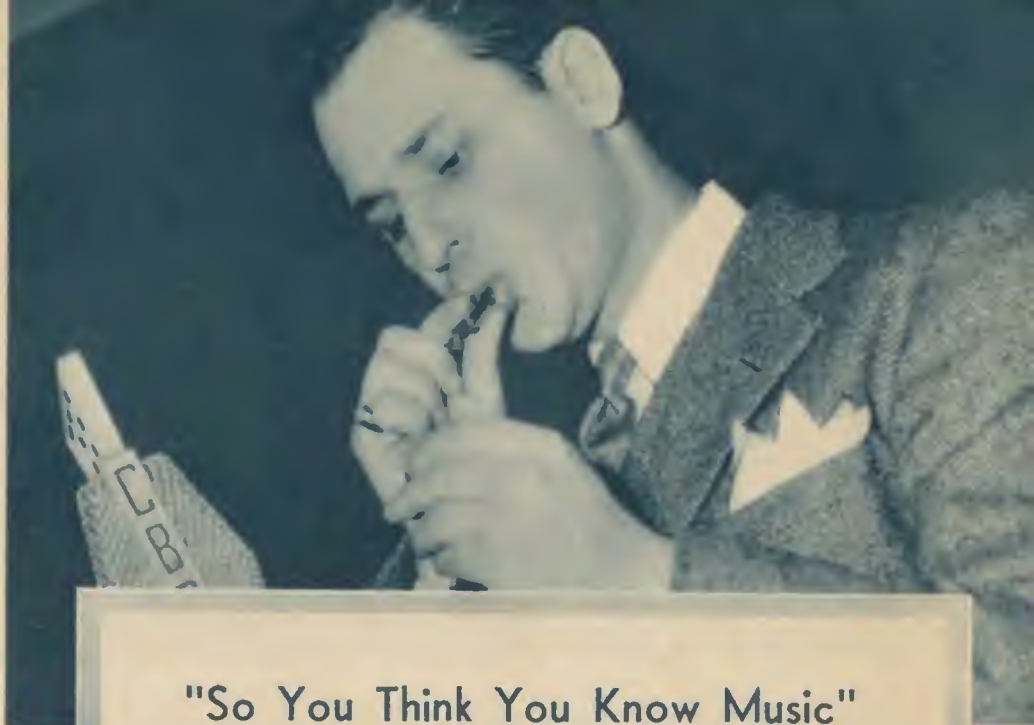
Always willing to comply with the color-scheme of her surroundings, she was born a natural brown but has since been painted black (Memphis), gold (Dallas), red, blue and yellow all

The Show They Couldn't

kill

Happy accidents made a hit show
of "So You Think You Know Music"

LAST January CBS decided to take a sustaining program off the air. There was nothing complicated or unusual about that. Time and time again shows had been whisked off the ether without a word being uttered or a hand lifted against the deed. It was routine. Somebody just squiggled his name to a typewriter order and that was that.

But in this case the show was "So You Think You Know Music," and CBS reckoned without its listeners. On Sunday, January 7, it was announced that the program was going on the air for the last time. On Monday, January 8, a deluge of letters, post-cards, telegrams and phone calls poured into CBS and kept pouring in for the next two weeks, until finally CBS officials woke up to the fact they had a bear by the tail. Or maybe it was the other way round, and the bear had them by the tail. When the program returned to the air three weeks after it had been killed, on January 28, it was literally "by popular demand." Today it is known as the "show they couldn't kill."

From the start its story has been un-

usual, though like so many other successes in radio, it was a "happy accident." It all began when Ted Cott, whose brain-baby it is, was working for New York City's municipal station WNYC as announcer, production manager, director, actor, script-writer, commentator and assistant to the office-boy (all, by the way, without salary for some two years). On Saturday afternoon, July 4, 1938, Ted found he had two hours of empty air time on his hands. There had been last-minute cancellations and various other "acts of God" that happen only in radio. He was faced with the problem of filling that gaping two-hour void with something that would be interesting to the radio audience.

Ted decided to emulate Stan Shaw and his famous "Milkman's Matinee." But instead of doing a request program of popular recordings, he devoted it to classical music with amusing chatter between selections. This went on for an hour and a half, at which point Ted began to weary of it himself. So, to get a change of pace, he cooked up an idea out of thin air,

just like that. He dug up a musical encyclopedia that was kicking around the studio and rounded up a gang of station employees. There were five, all told, in this band of hardy pioneers—an actor, an engineer, a singer, an announcer and the station's reception-

ist. Having nothing in particular to do at the moment and little suspecting what they were letting themselves in for, they agreed to help Ted fill in the remaining half-hour. He proceeded to fish out a bunch of musical questions from his encyclopedia and began



"So You Think You Know Music" (Answers)

firing them at his five human guinea-pigs, who answered as best they could, the actor walking off with top honors.

That was that. The time had been filled and everybody had had fun playing the musical quiz game. No one, including Ted Cott, thought anything more about it. That is, until Monday morning, when the mail started coming in with inquiries about the quiz and requests that it be broadcast again. So great was the demand that WNYC decided to try it out as a regular feature and scheduled it for the next Sunday afternoon. The music quiz went over with a bang. It remained on WNYC thereafter and still is on, even though its creator took the original show, under the name of "So You Think You Know Music," to the Columbia network on June 4, 1939.

ORIGINALLY it was a straight quiz, but fairly early in its history Cott, who is a rather bright young lad, got the idea of combining the "stumping the experts" formula used by "Information, Please" with the audience-participation method employed by most quiz programs. It finally evolved into a battle of wits with two musical experts matched against two laymen. And, surprisingly enough, the non-professionals have made a consistently good showing thus far. The pros' battling-average against the amateurs' is only a little better than even. Statistically speaking, they've been right 53.4 percent of the time. And one of the few perfect scores was rung up by one Allan Bendiner, a five-year-old boy. He was able to identify such brain-busters as the Second Movement from the Beethoven *Second Symphony* and the Finale from the Saint-Saens *G Minor Piano Concerto*, in addition to naming all thirteen of Wagner's operas (try it yourself and see how far you get). Another innovation in quiz technique was having a judge to serve as final court of appeal on all matters of musical fact. The man selected was that eminent musicologist, Leonard Lieblich, who is known to all readers of *MOVIE AND RADIO GUIDE* as its distinguished music editor.

Ted Cott's sympathies, however, are definitely aligned with the non-professional contestants, since, oddly enough, he is not a musician himself.

His musical attainments are limited to playing Chopsticks on the piano—usually with his bare knuckles—and about the only place he can carry a tune is to oblivion. He characterizes himself as a "musical Joe Doakes," but like so many millions of others, he has a deep

love for good music. "I don't know much about music," he will tell you, "but I know what I like." He thinks that music can be enjoyed in the same spirit you enjoy a ball game, a movie or a radio program. There is no reason for approaching a symphony con-

cert or an operatic performance on bended knee. The great composers created their music to give pleasure and joy to listeners.

That Ted's view is correct seems to be proved by the tremendous response "So You Think You Know Music" has received from fans. What is especially interesting is the fact that its audience is not exclusively made up of musicians and "longhairs." Doctors, high-school students, hardware dealers, electricians, clergymen, bankers, plumbers, salesmen, housewives, stenographers, lawyers, engineers and kids were among the thousands who wrote in to CBS last January and forced it to put the show back on the air. One of the strongest (and most amusing) pleas came from a girl in Toronto, who wrote: "I have the mumps. I am eight years old and I love your program. I hope you will get enough letters so you can be on the air, as I am not taking piano or anything about music, so you see I am learning a lot over the radio, so I hope you will be on the air and so does my mother and friends."

at once (Los Angeles) and white as she presently is in Chicago.

"Alicie" looks like a piano, has piano keys (four octaves), has little felt hammers and is played like a piano. But "Alicie" really is a Mustel Celeste. From her come those bell-like notes which identify the Jurgens style.

Some bands become hits overnight as the result of just one good record in a juke box. Dick Jurgens bounced high with "My Last Goodbye." Unlike most bands, however, he continues to turn them out. "If I Knew Then," "It's a Hundred to One," "Careless," "A Million Dreams Ago" and the re-rivals of "Ragtime Cowboy Joe" and "I Only Want a Buddy" are all Jurgens-made hits.

"Any time is all right with me," when asked about New York. "I'm in no hurry and neither are the rest of the boys. Whoever heard of a top band-leader not wanting to go down to New York "for a crack at the bigtime and the big dough." The Midwest booking offices are filled with them and New York is filled with them—wishing they could go back to the West.

That proverbial ladder has carried the Jurgens crew along in fine style ever since the first St. Francis Hotel job (his is the only band to have been called back to the Palomar in Los Angeles for a third term), but up until 1936 most of his work was west of the Rockies. During the winter of 1936-37, they opened at the Drake Hotel in Chicago. Originally for four weeks with option, they stayed for twenty. Since then he's been dividing most of his time between Wrigley's Catalina Island Casino and Andrew Karzas' Aragon Ballroom in Chicago.

"Boy!" said Dick reminiscently. "Do I remember the time Mr. Karzas came out to the Coast specifically to audition two bands—Orville Knapp's and ours. No one had told us that he was coming or that, on this particular night, he was coming into the spot where we were playing. What someone HAD told us was that Andrew Karzas liked sweet, sentimental music and emphatically disliked novelties."

"Well, we're right in the middle of what we called, at that time, a 'novelty.' In fact it was 'Tiger Rag' and Ronnie Kemper was doing his monkey act from one of the beams that hung over the rustie bandstand. With the whole band in an uproar, I turned to see how the crowd was taking it, and

there, almost at my feet, sat Andrew Karzas. He went back to Chicago the next day—with Orville Knapp's contract in his pocket."

Shortly after that, they played the Drake Hotel stand and were booked into the Aragon as a "second" band for one night. The ballroomites loved him ("we didn't play 'Tiger Rag' that night") and he's been playing the spot off and on ever since.

To this day, Andrew Karzas has never mentioned the incident, probably because Dick's popularity induced by the fans has won out. Letters pour in daily at the Aragon, some in complimentary form but a few that are filled with scorn. Regardless what their theme may be, those with any comment whatsoever go up on the wall. The four sides of the backstage office are literally papered with letters and telegrams. One from a prominent movie company states that there's a standing date in the New York studios for the Jurgens band to make musical shorts. Another requests that "My Last Goodbye" be played during a certain broadcast, the writer saying he's planning to commit suicide as the last notes die away, but outstanding of all these communications is a group of wires that were just tacked up two weeks previously. All are from male vocalists now working with other bands.

The answer to the cause of all this did not come from Dick but from a very close friend. Eddy Howard had left the band and Dick was immediately flooded with both wires and phone calls from singers requesting to fill the chair. To all, Dick replied: "I'm sorry. I'd like to use you but I won't hire you away from another band." He auditioned more than 100 persons to fill the bill, took on 16-year-old Gloria (Sandberg) Gilbert (who left high school to join the band) and Lee Johnson as temporaries.

Asked about the future, his comment was logical. "I guess I'm in the music business for the same reason that most men are. I'm in it because it was what I wanted to do. I'm building annuities for the future and when everything is set, I'll probably pull out. While I'm depending on it for a living, I'll do my best to make the venture pay for both myself and those working for me, but when I do quit, I'll quit altogether."

Dick Jurgens was heard regularly over an MBS net until last week, when he opened a tour of one-night stands.

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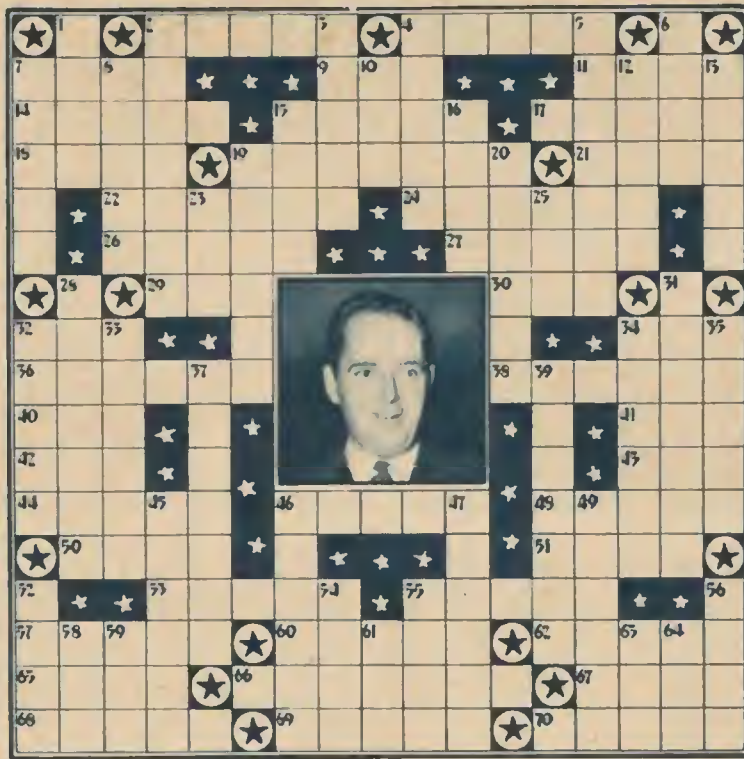

The Show They Couldn't Kill

(Continued from Page 51)

If you've listened to the show you have probably been struck by its breezy, informal, cozy, at-home feeling. This is largely due to the emceeing of Ted Cott and the delightful side remarks tossed into the pot by the program's nine-old-men-rolled-into-one, Judge Lieblich. On "So You Think You Know Music" each contestant is called before the microphone in turn and is given a time limit on each question. This has scared the daylights out of many famous musicians who have flatly refused to appear on the program for fear of being made to look like fools. Yet the questions generally are easy and can be handled by anyone with a reasonably good musical background. If you don't believe us, on Page 50 are ten representative questions which various well-known musicians muffed (we won't mention their names because we don't want to make them blush). Try them yourself and see how you fare.

Questions are made up in part from those sent in by listeners and in part from those concocted by Cott and Leonard Lieblich. Listeners whose questions are used receive a currently popular book on music. As for the contestants, two having the highest score are rewarded with an album of records and a pair of tickets to a New York Philharmonic concert.

These prizes have occasionally produced amusing results. There was the time Erica Morini, the famous violinist, won a pair of tickets to the next Philharmonic concert, at which she was going to appear as soloist. Deems Taylor, CBS' commentator at the Philharmonic broadcasts, won tickets for one of the Sunday afternoon concerts.

Leonard Lieblich's appointment as Lord High Executioner came about in the same roundabout fashion everything else has on this show. He and his daughter, Viva Lieblich, whose name is not unknown to readers of this magazine, were invited to match wits with the musical Joe Doakes. They accepted. To his surprise, Mr. Lieblich found himself trailing behind Viva when the final returns were in. But he had been such delightful company that Cott asked him to hang up his hat, make himself at home and hang around indefinitely as judge.

Thus far, "So You Think You Know Music" has gone unsponsored, as a sustaining feature on CBS. In the lobby of the Columbia Playhouse in which the program is broadcast there is a sign which reads: "So you think you know music? Do you want to be a contestant? Give an usher your name, address and occupation. May the Lord have mercy on you!" One night several weeks ago Ted found that one of the program's many well-wishers had added this line in big letters: "Do you want to be a sponsor?"

What the future will hold for "So You Think You Know Music" no one can tell. But it's sure as shooting that if listeners have anything to say, the show is going to be around the airwaves for a long time to come, sponsor or no sponsor. Which would seem to prove that the old saying about building a better mousetrap is still true.

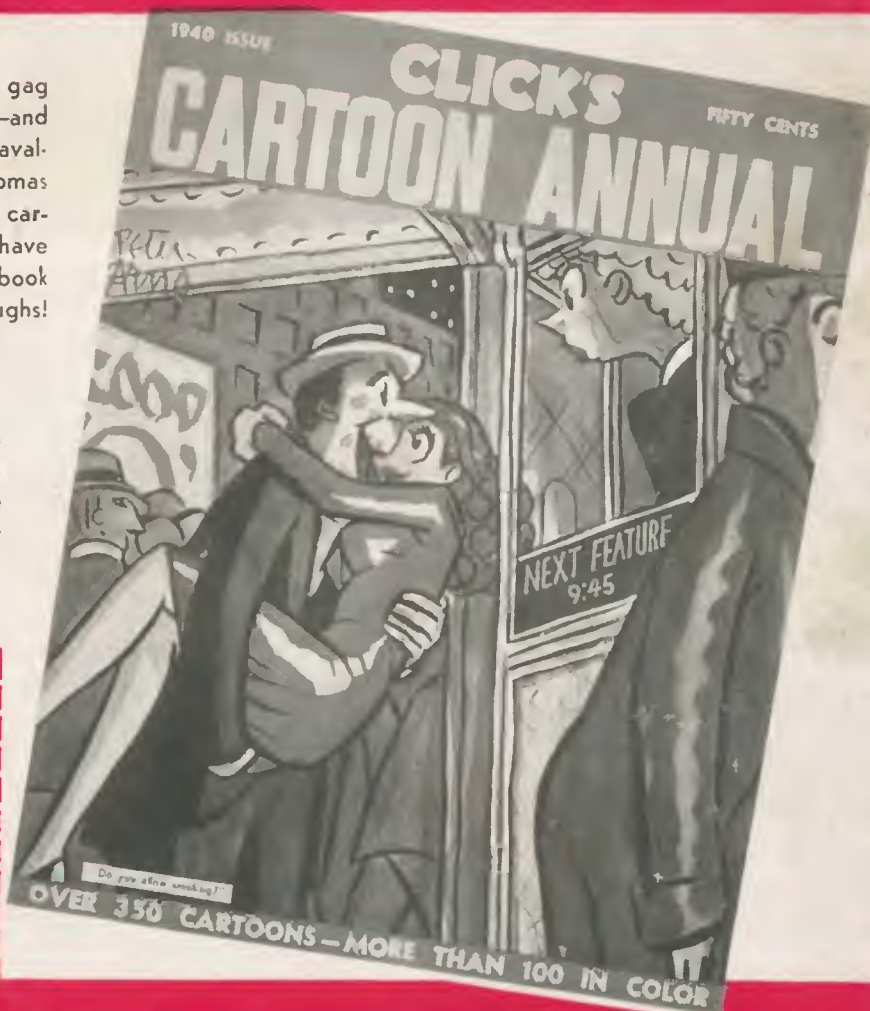
