The Girl on the Cover

Born to the theater is a phrase which truly belongs to Olympe Bradna, soon to be seen in Edward Small's "South of Pago-Pago." Olympe was born just at the close of the first World War to Jeanne and Joseph Bradna within a block of the Olympic Theater in Paris, where the manager paced up and down worried lest the Bradnas be unable to go on. Papa Bradna, somehow, managed to get through his act and named his daughter for the theater where they were appearing. Eighteen months later, Olympe was a part of the act. She sat on the stage and held a French flag. By the time she was eight, she was such a good dancer that her mother and father retired from the stage and devoted their energies to training and managing her. Later, when she came to America with the Folies Bergere unit which played the Chicago World's Fair, she won the acclaim of columnists Winchell and Sobol, a chance at the movies. George Raft, seeing her on an eastern visit, insisted that she be given the part opposite him in "Souls at Sea," and her reception by movie-goers gave her stardom. I'M GLAD I FAILED MY SCREEN TEST!

A startlingly honest story by a girl who thought she wanted to be a movie star

A person who writes with full honesty and candor is about as rare as a person who never tells a lie. For that reason, the honesty of this story is startling. The girl who wrote it underwent the actual experiences she describes. The studio of which she writes is internationally known. For those reasons, actual names have been avoided.—Editor.

YOU'VE read the title of this story, and you think it's a case of sour grapes, don't you? I know. I should have, too, a year ago. I should have laughed and said: "Sure—she's pretending she's glad she failed. Anything for a story!"

Believe me, that is not the case. I am grateful for this chance to tell you the truth about screen tests. Read on—and then take the next train for Hollywood if you dare!

I'm young, pretty, a blonde, and have a nice figure and good legs. When I got to Hollywood I discovered that I compared nicely with the hundreds of good-looking girls that I saw everywhere. That's one surprising and rather disconcerting thing about Hollywood. In your own home town you're outstanding if you are unusually pretty. In Hollywood you are the rule, not the exception. A red-headed beauty waits on you at a lunch-counter. Your hair-dresser looks like a movie queen. The ten-cent-store girls are knockouts. It's all a little upsetting to find yourself just "one of the mob" when you had come to regard yourself as something rather special. Why don't these beauties all get chances on the screen? Why are there so many of them?

Here's the secret: Most of them have had their chance, one time or another. I found that out when I joined their ranks. Just one more pretty girl who didn't make the grade. Beauty, in Hollywood, is uncommonly common.

But to get on with the screen test. No need to tell you about the months spent in casting-offices. No need to remind you of how my money dwindled and how I ate candy bars for luncheon and soup for dinner, unless some boy friend treated me. (Most of the boys I knew were trying for jobs in pictures too. They ate the same way—sparsely.) How we longed for steak and apple pie and fried potatoes! In fact, the hopeful young would-be actors and actresses that I knew talked about food more than they did about anything else. We were all a little thin and pallid.

I could write a book about that, but the tale I'm telling is about a screen test.

I got my chance by accident. A friend of mine knew a friend who

knew a director, and by a series of lucky chances I ended up at a party given by that director and—well, I told him my woes and he gave me an appointment at the office of the casting-director of his studio next morning. One of the biggest and most important studios in Hollywood, too. Was I thrilled!

I couldn't sleep that night and spent my last few dollars on some sheer hose and new shoes and a wave. Breakfast, therefore, consisted of a cup of coffee—and that was all!

At the studio casting-office I was kept waiting a long time. I didn't mind waiting at all; I was inside the studio! That's more than I had ever achieved before. Two girls were ahead of me, dressed gorgeously and obviously successful contract players. I could feel my heart knocking against my ribs when I finally entered the luxurious office of the casting-director. He waved to me to sit down and finished dictating a letter. Then smiled. He was very friendly, but also very busy. After looking at me closely and examining the pictures of myself that I handed to him, he leaned back in his chair and nodded.

"Come in next Tuesday morning and bring an evening dress with you. You'll be tested at three o'clock. Be here at seven a.m. for make-up and hair-dress. See you then."

HE BUSIED himself with papers and I floated out of the room on a dream. Already the studio was "mine." I nodded to the gateman dizzily and spent my remaining dime on some more coffee and a doughnut to keep from fainting. Because now, of course, everything would be all right. A few weeks and I'd be on the studio payroll. A picture—and I'd be swathed in ermine. I built myself a dream-castle and lived in it all the way back to my boarding-house, where I excitedly told the girls there all about it. They were generously thrilled to death.

My struggles to get an evening gown were terrible and heart-breaking. I had only one and I knew it wouldn't face the camera. There were mends in the chiffon and some places that were worn, which wouldn't show under ordinary lights but in the glare of studio lights they would look just too dreadful. Feeling perfectly confident that I could pay it back very soon, I borrowed money for my finery. I just couldn't ask Mother and Dad for any more, as they were having trouble enough making ends meet in their little orange ranch near Azusa, California.

I tossed and turned at night, wondering what kind of test they would

give me, and daytimes I spent shopping for the evening gown of the century—one that would make me look like a princess. I wondered whether or not the studio would send me a script to study. I worried so much I looked worried, then I tried to stop for fear it would spoil my face. I tried to eat to get some strength but honestly, I was too excited. The week passed in a daze of excitement and fear. My first confidence was waning and now I was afraid. I practised poise in front of my mirror, but it didn't seem to do much good. I couldn't help shaking every time I thought of that test. It meant everything to me!

At last the fateful morning arrived and I set out for the studio at six o'clock after having been awake since five polishing my nails and nervously pacing up and down with a fine case of the jitters. Six o'clock in the morning is no time to try to look beautiful, but I did my best and arrived at the studio promptly with my little suitcase containing the precious evening gown.

Perhaps you can imagine my surprise when I saw two other girls entering the studio gates with me! I had been told to go to the wardrobe department and, marching silently be-

side me, I soon discovered not two but five other girls headed the same way! We didn't speak, but plodded through the cold studio streets together and entered a large room in the wardrobe department, where a kindly looking woman with pins in her mouth looked us over. Two girls were already there, undressing in the chilly room.

"You for the screen test?" she asked. We all nodded, dumbly.

"Come in and put on your evening gowns," she said, indicating chairs and hangers for our clothes. "Then you can go to make-up."

We looked at one another. "All of us?" I quavered.

The lady with the pins nodded briskly. "Yes—we're testing eight this morning. Better hurry."

Eight! And I thought I was the only one! Some of the others felt the same way, I guess, because they looked astonished. I undressed with cold, shaking fingers and got into my evening dress, my body feeling clammy and numb. I noticed the other girls' fingers shaking, too, and we helped one another with hooks and things because we soon discovered that we were as bad a collective case of nerves as could be found anywhere.

When we were all dressed, we paraded around and looked at ourselves in the long mirror. I puffed out my sleeves and swirled my skirts, but the fact I looked pretty didn't help much. My knees were so unstable!

The casting-director came in and looked around, calling us by name, one after another. He nodded at my gown. "That will do," he said. I felt thrilled. I had passed one test, anyway, it seemed.

He called one cute little dark girl to him and frowned. She trembled. "Your dress won't photograph—did you bring another evening gown?" he asked.

The poor kid just looked at him. "It's—it's the only one I have," she said, her lips trembling.

He patted her shoulder. "It will have to do, then," he said, and walked to the door. "See you on stage 14." He was gone.

I heard sobs and turned around. The dark-haired little girl was crying in a heap in one corner. I went over to her and tried to comfort her.

"I haven't much money," she choked—and this is my only dress. Nobody told me what kind to wear."

I patted her shoulder. "You go in there and do your darndest," I said. "Never mind the dress. And stop crying or you'll ruin your eyes."

She stopped and grinned at me through the tears. Her name was Hazel. We were friends from then on.

I was getting mad by that time. Good and mad. Hazel was a waitress and she had given up her job for this chance. She had also spent her last cent on a dress that "wouldn't do." Just what did the studio expect of us, anyway? Seven-thirty in the morning is no time to get stirred up with moral indignation, but my nerves had begun to play a different tune. Apprehension. Not expectation.

DID you ever have your hair waved, wearing full evening dress, early in the morning? It's quite an experience, I assure you. We were berded under dryers in the make-up room, even though we had all had our hair done carefully for the occasion.

Hair-dressers examined our faces and did our hair to suit our "personalities." Hazel looked cute with her dark curls piled on top of her head. My blond bob was curled a la Ginger Rogers and turned under in a page-boy style that I had never tried. It looked grand. We all felt better in the informal atmosphere of the studio

make-up department, and once in a while we caught glimpses of stars going to and from their private make-up rooms. It gave us a feeling of "belonging" which was exciting.

The make-up man tipped me back in a chair like a dentist's and worked on my face, trying different lips and eyebrows. Every one of us was treated the same, and when we were finally finished it was noon and we hadn't even seen a camera. And were we tired! Gosh—we were so tired! My nerves had been doing nip-ups since four that morning. Each girl was suffering the same way. My hands trembled gently all the time and nothing in the world would stop them. Besides—I was hungry!

Once more the casting-director strolled in and looked us over. He nodded here and there and then made some suggestions. He smiled at Hazel. "Very cute," he said, meaning her hair-do, and she felt better, I could tell. Each girl tried to get his eye-make him see her special beauties. There was one lofty silver blonde who had had "stage experience." She was the only one of us who had had any professional training and she seemed to feel herself a little above the mob. We cordially detested her.

"Well," said the casting-director, "get yourselves some lunch, kids, and then go to stage 14." He went out.

I looked at one of the make-up men. "If I eat I'll spoil this nice mouth."

He grinned. "Come back here before you go on the set and I'll touch it up for you," he promised.

THE other girls had the same offer, so we started off down the studio street toward the commissary, feeling very professional in evening dresses and screen make-up.

"Guess I won't eat," whispered Hazel. "No money."

I found quite a few of the girls were in the same fix, so those of us that had some money divided with the others and we promised to pay one another back. I had two dollars left of my borrowed money, so I sat at a table with Hazel and two other girls and paid for their lunches.

It was an expensive place to eat, we found, and the waitresses could hardly contain their glances of contempt when we ordered sandwiches and milk—all of us. We read the menu resignedly. Chops and steak, roasts and fish.

Not for us. All around us, tables were filling with laughing groups of writers, directors and actors. We were not noticed because of our make-up, since half the commissary was filled with people whose faces were similarly painted. We ate carefully, not wanting to spoil our make-ups, and watched with interest those around us. We didn't laugh or talk much, because we were still scared, and worried about the money. Somehow we hadn't thought about bringing money to the studio when we had our test. I just had a hunch about bringing those last two dollars, but most of the girls left their money at home—or they didn't have any to bring.

We laughed only once, and that was when Hazel said unexpectedly: "Gee—I thought the studio would feed us!"

We laughed so hard at that that the tears ran down our cheeks and everybody stared at us. We couldn't help it, though—it did seem so funny!

After lunch we sauntered back slowly to the make-up department. There was lots of time. It hadn't taken us long to eat our sandwiches and our table had been needed by a group of hungry actors who evidently could pay (Continued on Page 41)

GENE TOWNE and Graham Baker, once the wackiest writing-team in Hollywood, with screwball scripts such as "Ali Baba Goes to Town" to their credit, have transformed themselves into producers of serious classics based upon immortal works of literature. "Swiss Family Robinson" was their first. "Tom Brown's School Days," MOVIE AND RADIO GUIDE's Picture of the Week, is the second. Towne and Baker originally planned to make this picture in England but were thwarted by outbreak of the war and the fact that Rugby is now vine-covered, whereas it was vineless in 1830, time of the picture. They did the next best thing. Armed with forty volumes of research and a wealth of photographs, they rebuilt Rugby on the RKO ranch in San Fernando Valley. Word that Hollywood planned to film England's long-loved classic—it is also among the ten most-asked-for books in the New York Public Library—evoked an indignant protest from the present head master at Rugby, who decried "Hollywood's presumption at making a story so close to the hearts of England." The producers replied by (1) pointing out their extensive research, (2) retaining two Rugby graduates as technical advisers, (3) casting England's Sir Cedric Hardwicke as Dr. Arnold, (4) selecting Robert Stevenson, noted English director, to direct and (5) asking for suggestions about its production. All protest was silenced. For movie-going youth, "Tom Brown's School Days" will prove an action-filled, gripping school tale. For adults, it will evoke a yearning for other, quieter years out of the past.

Laurence Olivier, Greer Garson in "Pride and Prejudice"

LAURENCE OLIVIER, fresh from new triumphs in "Rebecca," and Greer Garson, remembered especially for "Goodbye Mr. Chips," are soon to be seen together in M-G-M's picturization of Jane Austen's classic novel, "Pride and Prejudice." For Miss Garson particularly this role holds a real significance. Several years ago in London she was striving desperately to get a start on the stage. After a long period of heart-break and waiting she was finally

selected to play the feminine lead in "Golden Arrow," only to learn that many members of the company were afraid to risk opening with a newcomer. The one dissenter to this fear was the leading man, who insisted upon her retention. Her performance in that play was an overnight sensation and Miss Garson was established in London theater. The leading man was Laurence Olivier. In "Pride and Prejudice" they meet to play hero and heroine again.

Can Your Child Make Good in the Movies?

No parent can afford to miss these revealing, authoritative facts and practical hints about how to get children into pictures

Last week, *MOVIE AND RADIO GUIDE* published the success stories of several outstanding child stars, together with suggestions made by leading directors as to the best methods of preparing a child for a movie career. This article (the second of two) outlines the careers of still more movie-star children, contrasting accomplishment with Hollywood's own suggestions for success. Must reading for every parent!—The Editor.

UPON one thing all child-directors and producers agree. The greatest handicap a youngster seeking a film career can have is parents who are too forward and pushing in their efforts in their child's behalf. The experts feel that many parents—particularly the persistent ones—are attempting to use their children as an easy meal-ticket.

But here again actual cases of successful child stars show how the advice of the experts has been ignored in achieving stardom. The case of Jane Withers and her mother (related last week) is a perfect example of disregard of expert advice. Baby Sandy's is another.

It wasn't solely the fact that Sandy's father happened to be a milkman on the route of a Universal executive that gained Sandra her chance in films. It was the persistence and ingenuity of milkman Henville, as proud and as ambitious a father as you'll meet in many a moon. When Mr. Henville happened to hear, by the back-door

route, that Universal was seeking a baby to play with Bing Crosby in "East Side of Heaven," he knew he had the baby they were after.

The next morning, when Charles Previn, Universal music-director, came to breakfast, the maid brought him a note which had been attached to the milk-bottle that morning. It read: "I have a baby that I think will solve your problem." It was signed, "Your Milkman."

Mr. Henville had chosen the proper word. Universal was faced with a problem in finding the right baby. There were babies who smiled marvelously and had everything until they saw Bing Crosby. Then, having no use for strangers; they puckered their faces and started bawling. Sandy, in addition to being photogenic, having the happy disposition and the marvelous smile they sought, also liked Bing Crosby. They signed her on the spot. (Incidentally, she almost stole the picture, was put under contract, and became a star in her second film.)

The Henvilles immediately gave the lie to any voices charging self-interest. They continued to live in their humble little bungalow in Glendale, still employed no outside help. Mrs. Henville continued to do the washing, her housework, and caring for Sandra, their only child. The Henvilles aren't touching a penny of Sandra's earnings. Only change has been in Dad Henville's status. He no longer delivers milk. The milk company thought that if being the father of such a baby

didn't justify promotion, then his initiative did. They made him a route supervisor!

For an example of fame which came quite uninvited, the case of Baby LeRoy is a good example. Several years ago Norman Taurog, director of "Skippy" and other child films, was making "Bed Time Story," with Maurice Chevalier. A child was needed for the picture and Taurog's search had become almost frantic. None on call answered the requirements. Finally, in near-despair, Taurog started making the rounds of nursery homes in Los Angeles. In one home, he came upon two babies in a single room.

ONE was standing up, holding on to the rail of the crib, singing and grinning to beat the band, while the other youngster was beating him over his head with a rattle. Taurog noted the happy-go-lucky spirit that exuded from the youngster, the cocky way he stood there. He picked him up. The infant smiled all over his tiny face and crowed with delight. This was the baby Taurog sought, and, at fourteen months of age, Baby LeRoy entered the movies and started his scene-stealing career.

Quite unsuspected was the fame Baby LeRoy earned. Yet even in this case it should be noted that had Baby LeRoy been in any other city than Los Angeles he probably would never have been discovered. On the other hand, screen careers can begin in other cities and quite without any

thought of the films in their initial stages.

Larry "Baby Dumpling" Simms, of Columbia's "Dagwood and Blondie" series, is an example. Margaret Simms, his mother, had once been on the stage, and if there was one thing upon which her mind was made up, it was that Larry shouldn't be a theatrical child.

One day, however, the Simmses were at a beach in northern California, and Larry, who had a trick of pulling in his waist, throwing out his chest and imitating Tarzan, caught the eye of a newsreel cameraman, who took a number of scenes of the youngster doing tricks. The cameraman was enthusiastic about Larry's possibilities and even managed to get him a small bit with Edward G. Robinson in "The Last Gangster." But Mrs. Simms was never enthusiastic, never pushed Larry ahead.

A short time before this, a freelance color-photographer — Ivan Dmitri—also had seen the well-built youngster at the beach and had asked permission to photograph him. Six months later, the picture appeared on the cover of the *Saturday Evening Post* and aroused a storm of comment.

Mrs. Simms was asked to bring Larry to Hollywood from San Francisco, where they lived, to test for the part of Baby Dumpling. After the test was made they waited a week, and when nothing materialized, returned to San Francisco. A week later

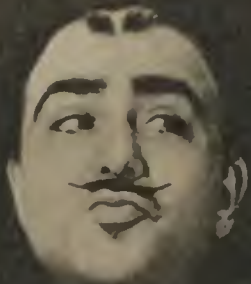
The Tamiroff Touch

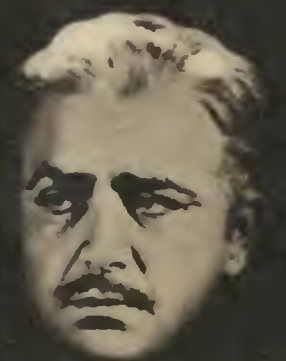

HEDY LAMARR and **GENE MARKEY** are the latest to add their names to the growing list of Hollywood separations. According to a recent report, Markey has moved to his father's home, while Miss Lamarr remains in the Beverly Hills house with their adopted son. Incompatibility, which has been increasing for several months, was given as the cause for the separation. Miss Lamarr, often described as the "screen's most glamorous woman," was formerly the wife of Fritz Mandl, munitions manufacturer. Producer-writer Gene Markey formerly was married to Joan Bennett. Announcement of the separation was first made by Miss Lamarr, later was confirmed in a manner described as "unhappily" by Markey.

RICHARD GREENE is the only English actor who will be affected by England's recent decision to recall for war service all British-born actors in the United States between the ages of eighteen and thirty-one. Greene, who volunteered for service several months ago, and was told at that time to remain in America until further notice, recently completed "I Married an Adventuress" for 20th Century-Fox, was scheduled for Sonja Henie's next picture. Other major British actors such as Cary Grant, Ray Milland, Brian Aherne and Nigel Bruce were not affected by the order. They are over the thirty-one-year-old limit.

CAROLE LOMBARD knows now why it is so difficult for a girl to have a perfect career and a perfect marriage simultaneously in Hollywood. When RKO studios told her that she would have to go on location to Nappa, California, for "They Knew What They Wanted," Carole knew what she wanted. She wanted to drive up to the location with her husband, Clark Gable, and have him remain there while she acted for a couple of weeks. But the studio executives had other plans. It was necessary, they said, that Carole go to Nappa on the location-train along with the rest of the company so the publicity department could take pictures of her en route to advertise the film. Director Garson Kanin pleaded personally in favor of the train. The outcome: Miss Lombard went on the train. What Gable said about making the trip alone by car you can imagine.

SONJA HENIE and Dan Topping were married in a quiet ceremony in Chicago, verifying **MOVIE AND RADIO**

GUIDE's prophecy that Sonja had made her New York trip to shop for a trousseau. The 20th Century-Fox star has been seen constantly in Topping's company in Hollywood and went to Honolulu on the same boat with him. She constantly denied anything more serious than a friendship. Friends of Miss Henie believe that marriage to Topping will not interfere with her career, although his former wife, Arline Judge, did retire from the screen after marriage. Sonja will have months for a honeymoon, as the starting-date for her next picture, "Passport to Love," is still indefinite and her winter ice-skating tour will not start for some time. It is expected that the couple will live in the Beverly Hills house which Miss Henie rented recently.

LANA TURNER - ARTIE SHAW marriage break-up, predicted by Hollywood generally since the announcement of the whirlwind wedding, occurred Monday, July 1, with the elements of comic opera attendant. With M-G-M officials, speaking for Lana, admitting the separation and Artie Shaw and his press representative denying the rift, reporters and columnists learned the truth after the first broadcast of the new Burns and Allen radio show, when Lana rushed down to be with Artie to "refute" rumors of their separation. After viewing the program, Lana hurried to the NBC stage to pose for pictures with Artie, where both denied the break for several minutes, until, pushed by reporters, she refused to kiss him and he turned to her and said: "Darling, you take it from here." Lana did. She said: "It's true. Incompatibility is the reason." Following this verbal blitzkrieg, Mrs. Shaw burst into tears and left the studio and the bewildered Mr. Shaw, who could only murmur over and over, "I can't understand it. I'm dumfounded, I thought she was keeping her date for tonight with me. We were together last night. I can't believe it." **MOVIE AND RADIO GUIDE**, however, was not so surprised, because of its advance knowledge of the break as evidenced by Lana's renting an apartment for herself Saturday, June 29, two days before the news broke. Results: M-G-M representatives refuse to speak of Lana and change the subject with rapidity; Shaw's press-agent rushes forth assurances of the complete surprise to Artie.

Hunt's former wife, Dolly, became Mrs. Hal Roach, Jr., May 27 last.

This Week on The Screen

"Maryland"

Cast: Walter Brennan, Fay Bainter, Brenda Joyce, John Payne, Charles Ruggles, Hattie McDaniel, Ben Carter, Sidney Blackmer, et al. A 20th Century-Fox picture, produced by Gene Markey; directed by Henry King, who also directed "Alexander's Ragtime Band" and "Jesse James."

ALTHOUGH its plot is the usual race-horse plot—hero racing to the track like mad to win the big event at the last moment—"Maryland" is one of the most ambitious and most important pictures of its kind for many reasons, among them an excellent cast, which renders fine performances from start to finish, and the fact that its Technicolor reproduction of a great but little-known American sports-event is faithful and accurate.

The story of "Maryland" is woven about the Danfield family, old Maryland people to whom the stables are as important as the nursery. Charlotte Danfield (Fay Bainter) insists upon her husband riding an extremely dangerous mount during a fox-hunt, and he (Sidney Blackmer) is thrown and killed. Charlotte then orders all her horses disposed of and forbids her son, John Payne, ever to ride again.

The son, sent to England to school, learns to ride and, while there, meets Brenda Joyce, daughter of the old family trainer, Walter Brennan. She influences him to ride their horse in the Maryland Hunt Club Race. Against his mother's wishes, he does so in a well-done denouement which cures his mother of her phobia and leaves everyone happy.

Brenda Joyce, once called the girl with the million-dollar face by advertising executives for whom she modeled, is even more beautiful in Technicolor (this is her first color film), and this goes for Fay Bainter, too. John Payne, in his best role to date, acquits himself with honor, as do Walter Brennan and Hattie McDaniel, Academy-Award winning members of the cast.

But the surprise performance is that of Ben Carter, colored comedian and agent for colored actors, as an old family retainer who gets religion.

"Maryland" is a fitting and dignified tribute to the state which gives it title, and grand entertainment for every member of the family.

"I Want a Divorce"

Cast: Joan Blondell, Dick Powell, Gloria Dickson, Frank Fay, Jessie Ralph, Conrad Nagel, Sidney Blackmer, Dorothy Burgess, Mickey Kuhn and Harry Davenport. A Paramount picture, produced by George Arthur; directed by Ralph Murphy, who also directed "Top of the Town." Based on a story by Adela Rogers St. John.

FROM Hollywood, where divorce is a more-than-common occurrence, comes a diatribe on this social evil in the form of a nicely paced, well-handled film, "I Want a Divorce." Oddly enough, the roles of the young wife and husband over whom the dark shadow of divorce hovers are played by that happily married couple, in real life, Dick Powell and Joan Blondell.

Starting rather slowly, the pace of the story is quickened as it unfolds to tell of Geraldine Brokaw (Joan Blondell) who helps her sister, Wanda Holland (Gloria Dickson), obtain a divorce. Geraldine, despite disillusionment at her sister's unhappy marriage, marries Alan MacNally (Dick Powell), a struggling young lawyer.

Their happiness is marred by his decision to become a divorce lawyer, a career Geraldine opposes, and though he finds success in this field, they grow farther and farther apart until the gap can no longer be bridged. Face to face with divorce, succeeding events demonstrate how completely they were about to ruin their lives. The denouement of the picture is effective.

Joan Blondell is at her very best in this picture. Especially noteworthy is her underacting in the scene where her sister commits suicide. Powell, playing a straight, non-singing role, does it well, and without the usual "mugging" which characterized his earlier films. Powell, busy with a personal-appearance tour, was called back to Hollywood to play the husband to wife Joan Blondell.

In the supporting roles of "I Want a Divorce," special credit must go to Jessie Ralph as the lovable, hard-headed grandmother; to Gloria Dickson as the shallow, divorced sister who manufactures her own happiness and comes to a tragic end; and to six-year-old Mickey Kuhn, who never muffed a line during the entire filming. More—much more—will be heard of Mickey in the coming months.

"The Man Who Talked Too Much"

NOT a new idea, "The Man Who Talked Too Much" is a well-made, excellently cast picture.

Brent, in one of the best roles he has had of late, is a young assistant district attorney in a small town who sends a man to the electric chair only to discover, too late, that the man was innocent. Horrified, he turns to the theory that it is better to acquit a hundred guilty men than punish one innocent person.

Resigning, he becomes a criminal attorney, almost starves until he is retained by a racketeer ring. Trouble comes when Brent's kid brother becomes involved with the gang, is framed on a murder charge. At the trial, all of the tricks which Brent has overdone fail to win the release of his brother, who is saved only by a confession from the real murderer.

Richard Barthelmess, seen here for the first time since "Only Angels Have Wings," makes real progress along the comeback trail as the town's number one public enemy—a part in strange contrast to the hero roles he once portrayed. William Lundigan, as the younger brother, is effective. Virginia Bruce, as Brent's secretary, is as beautiful as usual. Brent, as a combination of crusader and racketeer, has a grand part, which he handles with finesse.

"Millionaires in Prison"

ENTIRELY without that "life is grim" flavor which marks most prison films, this rich little comedy of five millionaires in the hoosegow is notable for two innovations—the funny side is accented, and not one of the five is in jail on a framed charge.

Raymond Walburn and Thurston Hall are two elderly men embroiled in an illegal scheme; Chester Clute and Morgan Conway are top-hat confidence men; and Truman Bradley, the doctor, is incarcerated for drunken driving. Tracy—abandoning the fast-talking, brittle characterizations which are his trade-mark—is a philosophical inmate. Linda Hayes and Virginia Vale, as the girls who wait outside, are thrown in for good measure.

Director McCarey studiously avoided all actions and gestures standard to prison films. Result is a picture nicely balanced between comedy and drama, which is in no way a burlesque of prisons or their inmates, but just a different view of them.

JUDY CANOVA, the Jenny Lind of the Ozarks, is not only a capable yodeler and singer but a right smart comedienne, as evidenced by her first film, "Scatterbrain."

Judy is getting along peaceably in her Ozark home when Isabel Jewell is planted there as part of a fake talent-hunt being staged by Eddie Foy, Jr. Alan Mowbray is the phony movie-director who comes to the Ozarks to judge the talent and, by error, he picks Judy instead of the plant.

By the time the mistake is discovered, the contract has been signed with fanfare and the press as witness. Then follow a series of attempts, ludicrous and highly ineffective, on the part of Mowbray to get out of the contract. These are balked when Joseph Cawthorn, the producer, actually likes Judy and decides to go ahead with a picture starring her. Billy Gilbert, as the voice coach, becomes involved with the Canova mentality and gets as excited as only Billy Gilbert can in one of the most hilarious scenes.

Actually, Judy is a Florida-born, Spanish-descended hillbilly who has never been in the Ozarks. No fake, however, is her grand-opera trilling, for Judy is a coloratura soprano with vocal "it." Radio fans will not only recognize Judy Canova but the music of Matty Malneck's orchestra and the "Hello-o-o Joe" voice of Phil Kramer, a Joe Penner radio cast member and assistant director in this film.

"The Fugitive"

THIS is a grim and tragic—and extremely heavy—psychological study of a man hounded past all peace by his conscience. It brings to the American screen again Diana Wynyard, absent for five years while she appeared on the London stage, and Ralph Richardson, last seen in a supporting role in "The Citadel" and known as England's Spencer Tracy.

Richardson is a barber, Diana is his wife. They live in a state of near-poverty, the wife contracts a debt and, hounded by creditors, Richardson steals money to pay. A neighbor, learning this, begins a systematic blackmail of the barber until he is goaded into killing the blackmailer. The psychological reactions of Richardson after this murder form the story basis.

Unusual and straight from the shoulder, "The Fugitive" is not diverting drama or pleasant theater. It is grim and stark but highly gripping.

Gracie Allen — Patriot

Gracie Allen, screwball comedienne, stepped out of character on June 29, when she appeared in a special NBC Red Cross broadcast. Here is the serious and significant talk she made:

ON EVERY occasion when I faced the microphone before, it has been as a comedienne. For years and years my husband, George Burns, and I have tried to bring a little cheer into your life, to make you laugh and forget some of your troubles. We have enjoyed every moment of it in the past, and we will continue to enjoy being your jesters in the future for as long as you will let us. Tonight, however, must be an exception. I speak to you tonight as an American woman, a woman with children of my own whom I am doing my best to bring up in a world of terrible uncertainties. I cannot help but feel, even as you must feel, the gravity of the times in which we are living, and I cannot help but wonder, as you must wonder, what kind of world our children will be living in. A few thousand miles away, people like ourselves are going through terrible suffering inflicted by the tragedy of war. Most of them are innocent people, who bear no ill will to anyone in the world.

And they are people like us, who wouldn't harm anyone if left free to follow the dictates of their own heart and their own conscience. Today the horrible shadow of the events in Europe, which like most women I don't even pretend to try to understand, is falling across even the security of our own nation, of which we are all so proud and happy to be citizens. That shadow of events in Europe is falling not only across our own security but, what's more important, the future security of your children and mine.

A few months ago, in the spirit of fun, I threw a hat into the ring and announced my candidacy for the President of the United States on a Surprise Party ticket. Also in the spirit of fun, I have waged a campaign for the nomination from one end of the country to the other, even to the extent of holding a Surprise Party Convention in Omaha. The many letters I have received from you, my fans, and

your personal response on my trips across the country, have told me that you have enjoyed my little joke. But like all jokes, this one could be carried too far. And I feel I've carried it far enough, now that the Republican party has met in convention and the Democratic party is about to choose its candidate. Tonight, therefore, I wish to announce that I am withdrawing from my mock presidential campaign and giving my whole-hearted support to the man who is elected President of the United States. While fun is fun and a sense of humor is one of the greatest assets of the American people, the sacred right of franchise under the American constitution is nothing to be trifled with. As a native-born American of Irish ancestry, I consider my right to vote a privilege beyond any price, and like every other American, I will consider casting my 1940 vote the gravest privilege of my life.

And I want you to know that as I take leave of my campaign of laughs, I do so with the deepest gratitude possible for just being an American and for living under the protection of the Stars and Stripes. Where else but in America would a comedy treatment of a presidential campaign be permitted? Thank God that America still has its democracy and its sense of humor! In being serious tonight, however, I don't want you to feel for a moment that I advocate America scuttling her sense of humor. What we need today more than ever before are laughs, laughs and more laughs. But as there are times for laughter, there are also times for a sober facing of our responsibilities.

I don't care how anyone votes, for what party or for what man. Just so each man and each woman votes his or her honest convictions and goes away from the polls sincerely thankful for the privilege of voting. And whoever we elect, let's support him with all our might and with all the unity of which we are capable.

Some Stories for Summer

ONCE in a while it does no harm to look upon the humorous side of music, especially when the summer sun hangs high in the heavens and playful zephyrs seem temporarily more welcome than serious Beethoven.

Richard Strauss told me that when quite a young boy he preferred the outdoors to sitting home practising the piano. (As which lad wouldn't?) The following was a conversation between him and his father:

"Richard, do you practise regularly while I am away at business?"

"Yes, Father."

"Every day?"

"Indeed I do."

"How long did you practise today?"

"Three hours."

"And yesterday?"

"Two hours and a half."

"That's fine. I'm glad you're so industrious."

"Thanks, Father."

"However, my boy, the next time you practise, be sure to unlock the piano. Here is the key. I locked the instrument last week, and I have been carrying the key in my pocket ever since."

Maybe that is one reason why Strauss became a great composer instead of a great pianist.

A new version of a time-honored and venerated song came from another little boy whom I knew. His school-teacher asked him who was Nero. "He's the one we sing about in Sunday school," he said. The puzzled teacher was unable to recall any song in gospel hymns where Nero is mentioned. "What is the song like, Arthur?" she inquired. "It's called 'Nero, my God, to Thee,'" came the answer.

Highlights of the Week

OUR list today opens with an Anglo-Saxon affiliation, the Dorian String Quartet being heard in American Hanson's music, and that of English Bridge. (The latter recalls the story of the dowager who was asked whether her daughter played Mozart, and replied, "I believe that she does, but I think she prefers Bridge, for not too high stakes.")

Although Bridge (born 1879) is nearly twenty years older than Hanson, his style is on the whole more modern than that of his U. S. colleague, although both are essentially melodists. Hanson is better known as an orchestral creator, Bridge excels in chamber-music.

Two Americans, James Dunn (1884-1936) and Howard Brockway, figure on Wallenstein's choral program. Both also wrote for orchestra. Dunn studied with Edward MacDowell. He composed several songs that won popularity, "The Bitterness of Love," "Weary," etc.

Bernard Herrmann, indefatigable conductor of modern music, also bows to the English school with three scores from "the tight little Isle." Dvorak's fourth symphony, while not as famous as his "New World" (No. 5), nevertheless has charm, romance and typical Bohemian rhythms.

At the Stadium we are hearing the fourth violin concerto, in D

minor, by Henri Vieuxtemps (1820-1881), a tunefully brilliant piece of old-fashioned romantic composing. Vieuxtemps, a Belgian, was one of the greatest violinists of all time, and visited the United States triumphantly in 1844, 1857 and 1871.

Record Reviews

CLASSICAL SYMPHONY (Prokofieff). The Minneapolis Symphony Orchestra, Omilri Mitropolous, conductor. Columbia.

Any new recording of Prokofieff's delightful and witty work will inevitably be compared with Koussevitzky's, which brings out all the sharp brilliance and incisive rhythms of the Prokofieff score. This Columbia recording is technically better than the Koussevitzky version (which is ten years old) and while not as brilliant, brings out rather the charm and quaintness of the piece.

SYMPHONY NO. 4 (Beethoven). The BBC Symphony Orchestra, Arturo Toscanini, conductor. Victor.

Toscanini and Beethoven make for the perfect musical combination, and this recording of the robust and vital Fourth Symphony is no exception. The BBC Orchestra is here heard at its best, and anyone who heard Toscanini conduct the Fourth in last winter's NBC Beethoven cycle need not be told how splendidly he does it.

NEW YORK, N. Y.—News that screen star Anne Shirley had given birth to a girl should have broken in Hollywood. Instead, it broke—unexpectedly—in Flushing, Long Island, at the World's Fair. It was "Johnny Green Day" at the Fair and the "Johnny Presents" maestro was offered a free telephone call at the A. T. & T. Building. He put in a call for Anne at her Hollywood residence, but the call was referred to the Cedars of Lebanon Hospital, where Johnny finally reached Anne. Then, while approximately five hundred fair visitors listened to the ensuing conversation between the two old friends, Anne told Johnny (and the others) that she had given birth to a girl, named Julie, the previous night.

NEW YORK, N. Y.—Although NBC and CBS are again broadcasting the

night-spot orchestra pick-ups, the germ of a change may have been born during the few days the dance orchestras were off. Listeners, many of whom have been protesting against too much dance music at night, got a chance to hear something else for a change. A test survey in the New York area showed that seventy-nine percent preferred the evening schedules of variety presented by NBC and CBS during the strike period, while twenty-one percent switched around among the three networks, mixing dance music over MBS with other types of programs on the other nets.

"America" a Must

SHEBOYGAN, WIS.—With a high percentage of German-descended citizens, Sheboygan, Wis., adopted an ordinance requiring that bands playing in any kind of concerts and public programs include "America," "Star and Stripes Forever," "Star Spangled Banner" and "God Bless America" in the program which they present.

Tony Wons Will Return

CHICAGO, ILL.—One of the real pioneers of radio and one of the most beloved personalities of the airwaves, Tony Wons, will bring his Scrap Book of poetry and philosophy back to the networks October 13. The show, which includes Irma Glen at the organ and Shirley Sadler singing, was on WMAQ locally last winter, made a big hit, and will be on NBC this fall three times weekly.

Niles Trammell New NBC Chief

NEW YORK, N. Y.—NBC now has its third president. Niles Trammell, for the past eighteen months executive vice-president, has been elected to succeed Lenox R. Lohr, who resigned June 7 to become president of the Chicago Museum of Science and Industry. Trammell has risen from the ranks through sheer ability since he joined NBC in 1928 and earned quite a reputation as manager of the Central Division of NBC in Chicago before coming to New York.

NEW YORK, N. Y.—Paul Whiteman has given up the hectic activity of leading a dance band in one-nighters and dance spots. "Pops," as he is affectionately known in the musical fraternity, plans to confine his future music endeavors to whatever radio assignments may call for his services. His disbanded musicians are seeking other connections.

it, so for a year thereafter he traveled with Pete, a bodyguard. About a year ago Winchell began to depend upon the "irons" and his own steady aim rather than upon a bodyguard. He has even more enemies now. He knows this and he's proud of it, because every enemy represents one who doesn't subscribe to his anti-Nazi, anti-Communism, anti-everything-that-isn't-American campaign—and they are the ones he wants to ferret out and expose. To those who stand for the Bill of Rights and all it represents, Winchell is America's most popular commentator and writer. Of that, Winchell is prouder. His own views were summed up when he ended a recent Sunday night broadcast and column with this line: "Notice to the ostriches: The Walter Winchell warnings that were belittled as hysterical are now historical." How true!

Arlene Francis Aids Refugees

Arlene Francis ("What's My Name") is giving two British refugee children a home on her Connecticut farm . . . Charita Bauer, youthful NBC actress, will be in the Broadway play "Your Loving Son," which will star Ezra (Henry Aldrich) Stone . . . Wynn Murray, ex-Fred Allen singer, and socialite Henry Oehrig of Long Island are daily doubles . . . Yvette, the blond Birmingham singer with the French accent, makes her first theater appearance August 2 at The Earle in Washington . . . When you hear the new song "Six Lessons from Madame La Zonga" sung on the air, you're listening to a special set of lyrics. The originals are not considered proper by the network authorities for presentation on the radio . . . Peter Cappel of Katharine Cornell's acting group has been added to "Light of the World" for the role of Laban.

Public Necessity

Shocking can be the words of commentators. A Union City, N. J., man heard via CBS that his son, visiting in Mexico, had been shot during the Mexican elections. He hurriedly telephoned CBS headquarters, was advised his son was expected to recover. It was while listening to a Mutual commentator last September that this writer first learned of the death, by a mine-struck ship, of his roommate. Then, too, a telephone call revealed the source and the truth. Truly radio is, as the law specifies, a "public necessity."

Rolph Edwards Causes Mix-Up

Ralph Edwards is taking a vacation. The turmoil caused is typical of this vacation season. In Ralph's case, he's on at such unusual hours that it takes five announcers to substitute for him. Nelson Case took his place on "Life Can Be Beautiful," Ed Herlihy on "Vic and Sade," Allen Kent on "Major Bowes' Amateur Hour," John Darlington on "Against the Storm" and Don Lowe on WEAF's "Children's Hour." He isn't allowing his vacation to interfere with his work on "Truth or Consequences," coming into town from New England each Saturday for the latter.

Observation

It's amusing, glancing over Mutual program listings, to see titles like: Who Knows? Where Are You From? Is Anybody Home? And then to find: The Answer Man . . . I like Fulton Lewis, Jr.'s, description of the Willkie surprise strength: "It's Willkie phenomenon" . . . Irritating is the mispronunciation of "immediately" when CBS' 8 a.m. (EDT) announcer says: "Immidjetly following we will bring you the news from Europe."

Frank Wilson, script-writer for "The Bishop and the Gargoyle," now on NBC, brought his series back to that

chain only after being assured it wouldn't be canceled for anyone but President Roosevelt. Numerous last-minute cancellations during its former NBC run weakened the continuity and Wilson didn't want that to happen again.

"The Show of the Week" returns to MBS September 29 in a new format. Everything but the title will be new. Instead of guest bands, Vincent Lopez will hold the permanent orchestral niche. Singer Buddy Clark and guest comedians complete the set-up . . . When Mrs. F. D. Roosevelt guested on the opening NBC "Washington Merry-Go-Round," Drew Pearson and Robert Allen predicted Roosevelt would not seek a third term but allow himself to be drafted. After making the statement, Allen penciled a note and handed it to Mrs. Roosevelt. It read: "I hope I wasn't talking through my hat" . . . Robert ("Believe It or Not") Ripley returns to CBS September 6.

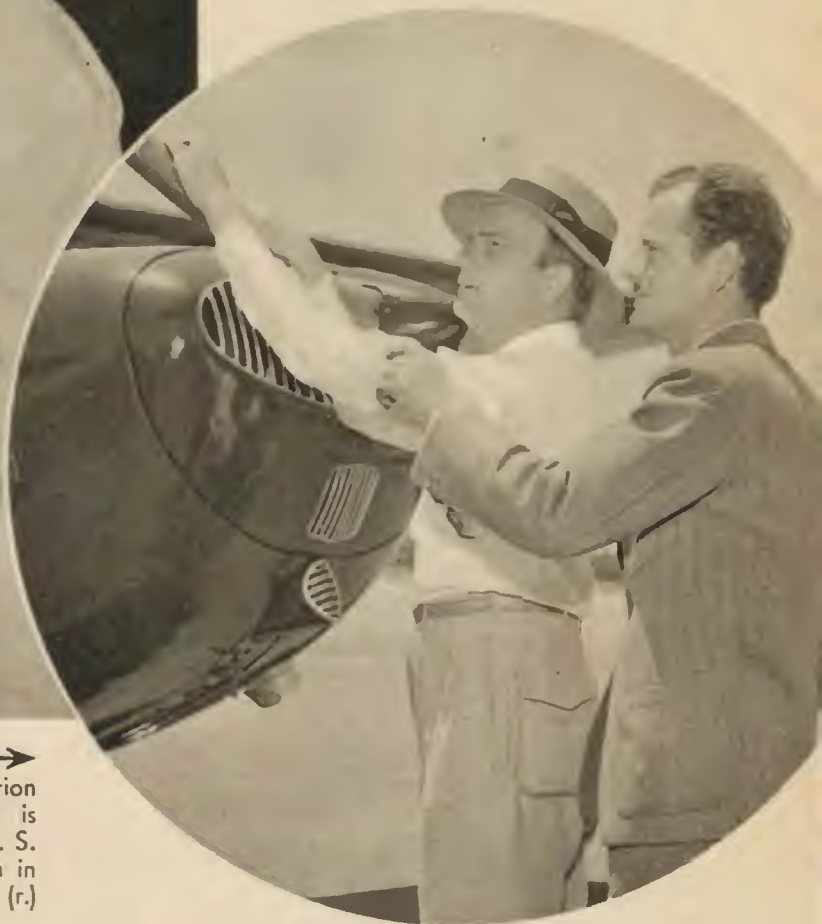

By the time the studio had been turned upside down and inside out in the search, Elmira appeared at the dressing-room door holding an extra pair of shoes. "They were in here," she sheepishly confessed. "That's where I hid them when I took them off."

jelly?" "Yessir," answered Nora. "I'm moving into town. Let's go!"

ON THE BANDWAGON

UNDISPUTED king of Latin-American rhythm in the United States is suave Xavier Cugat, fiddling Spanish maestro currently broadcasting over both CBS and MBS from New York's Waldorf-Astoria. Born in Barcelona, Cugat was brought to the United States by the late Caruso, who engaged him as his accompanist. He organized his first band in Los Angeles ten years ago, debuting at the Coconut Grove of the Hotel Ambassador. Three years later he moved to the Waldorf, made Gotham dancers rumba-conscious via his foot-compelling rhythms. Today America has another Latin-American dance craze as a result of Cugat's influence—La Conga—a comparatively simple rhythm in contrast to the rumba and typified by Cugat's own composition, "One, Two, Three, Kick." An outstanding caricaturist, Cugat has had five books of his art work published. A member of the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers, he composed, among a score of other tunes, his own opening and closing themes, "My Shawl" and "Night Must Fall." His subdued yet strongly rhythmic music highlighting full violin and saxophone ensembles, supplemented by maroccas, Cuban bongo drums and marimba, is on full parade in his Latin-American album, recorded for Victor. His orchestra lines up: Ismael Morales, San Juan, P. R., Rub Moss and Max Nadell, both of New York, saxophones (latter two double on violin); Catalino Rolon, San Juan, P. R., maroccas; Antonio Lopez, Havana, Cuba, bongo; Noah Landberg, Philadelphia, violin; Billy Hobbs, Los Angeles, accordion; Raoul Soler, Havana, Cuba, piano; Walter Shaver, Schenectady, N. Y., bass; Albert Calderon, San Juan, P. R., drums; Eddie Asherman, New York City, guitar; George Lopez, San Juan, P. R., trumpet; Ray Gonzalez, San Francisco, marimba. ARE THERE TOO MANY SERIALS?

Read what this housewife
has to say after a day of
intensive serial-listening

AMONG each American listener's inalienable rights is the pursuit of daytime dramatic serials. Pursuit meaning, as in the dictionary, "an eager endeavor to gain," or pursuit meaning, as in the words of some listeners, "Chase that stuff off the air!" The right is fully exercised both ways. You either cherish radio serials or you hate them. There are many listeners on each side. And there isn't much half-way territory.

I've read letters from listeners printed in *MOVIE AND RADIO GUIDE* saying, "We couldn't do without the serials . . . They lighten housework . . . They are so true to life . . . so interesting." And I've seen other letters saying, in effect: "We have enough troubles of our own without listening to that trash all day. Can't something be done about it?" I read in the papers that a woman's club in New Rochelle, N. Y., has been trying to organize a national boycott of women against the sketches and the sponsored products. But I also know of several groups of women who listen regularly to the serials and consider them not only entertaining but lifting.

I was thinking about this paradox one day while listening to a skit. I'm an average American listener. It's my right to have an opinion about the serial situation. Not only my right but a kind of duty. Like the right and the duty to vote. But what did I really think? What was the "serial situation"? How did it come about and what was it leading to? Being a housewife, I was personally concerned, for they say these dramatic offerings are

aimed at the housewife. And being a modern housewife, who likes to know what's going on and why, I made up my mind to conduct an experiment with my radio. I would expose myself to a whole day of intensive, analytical serial listening, and see what it would do to me.

First, to begin with a solid foundation, I counted the number of daily serials listed in *MOVIE AND RADIO GUIDE*, from 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. I found about sixty network sketches listed each day. Some of these, I understand, are repeated later in the day for West Coast listeners. There are also numerous sketches broadcast only by transcription. It was something of a shock when the actual figures confronted me, for I remembered not so long ago when "Betty and Bob," "Myrt and Marge," "The Goldbergs" and a few other veteran stories were the only serials on the air, and something of a novelty. Now it's a novelty to hear anything but a dramatic skit in the daytime.

With an open mind, I began my experiment, starting early in the day with my listening, just as the housewife listeners are presumed to do. The first story I caught was "The Man I Married." I found myself eavesdropping on a very personal conversation between Evelyn Waring and Phineas Grant. He was telling her that he couldn't stop loving her, even though her husband, Adam, had come back. But Phineas was the right kind. He wanted to remain a friend to both Evelyn and Adam. He even provided

a new job for Adam by secretly paying his salary through the employer. Or was the listener supposed to suspect ulterior motives in Phineas' action?

While the closing commercial slipped by me, I pondered what I had just heard. The episode surely wasn't offensive. After all, love is here to stay, and even the eternal triangle is something you can't do much about except try to stay out of it yourself. At least, I heard no hint of adultery and eroticism, motifs I had just been reading in a couple of best-selling novels.

BUT here was case number two, a pioneer favorite sketch, "Myrt and Marge." Myrt, it seemed, had been befriending a boy whose mother had died and she had been trying to help the lad's father get a job. She sent the unemployed man to an executive she knew. The man thought perhaps he appeared not independent enough, he confided later to Myrt. But, peculiarly, the executive called to tell Myrt that the applicant had seemed too independent to work with the authoritative superintendent he had in mind.

Here was a different dramatic theme. Trouble to be sure. But a situation true to life, surely. It brought to me poignant recollection of husband and son walking the streets and hearing employers say, "No," sometimes for reasons that seemed unjust; coming home discouraged and desperate. The dramatic situation was close to home and held my attention. But then

my husband and my son were not now trudging the streets. Maybe if they were, I wouldn't want a dramatic focus thrown on the painful picture. Maybe I wouldn't then have got much consolation out of the episode.

Then I found myself in the midst of another "woeful" situation with "Vic and Sade," but this time I could grin. The "adversity" in this case was that Sade had been elected president of the Thimble Club, and the members all had axes to grind. Sade was also supposed to make speeches. She was worried about all this trouble-shooting responsibility. It was all she could do, she said, to get up and "pound the gravel on the table."

Poor Sade! I knew just how she felt. Good old Sade—and Vic and young Rush. There surely couldn't be any complaint about this most human, most gently ludicrous of serials. We all like to have fun poked at us, if the caricature is kind and close to the truth. I remembered that my youngest brother thinks the Gooks are tops, and I recalled a number of elderly people who set their clocks by the time for "Vic and Sade."

"The Story of Mary Marlin" was coming up next, and now, indeed, I'd get full measure of misery, if some of the listeners' charges were true. But "Mary Marlin" failed me. The episode about the doings of a precocious little girl named Tootie was not calculated to skyrocket the blood-pressure. So I quickly switched to "Hilltop House," which was on at the same time. And "Hilltop House" didn't let me down.

While Bess Johnson was being tormented by her longing for John, he was working among some Indians, suffering from a loss of memory, listening to the protestations of love from a native girl, knowing temptation, but valiantly putting it away from him for fear that he would recover his memory sometime and find out that his life was complicated by someone else in his past—like Bess. A little far-fetched, perhaps, but why get bothered about it? After all, these things are only make-believe. If a character wants to go and lose his memory—even if there is an illogically high amnesia rate in the serials—let him lose it. Maybe he wants to forget it all, too. But what sinister influence can this have on the listener's own mental and nervous balance? By the time the closing commercial was punched through, I had experienced enough lapse of memory myself that my sympathy for both Bess and John hardly tortured me with impatience for tomorrow's episode.

Came next young Bud Fairchild, with a desperate look in his eyes. Kay Fairchild, his stepmother in the "Stepmother" story, feared something seri-

ous was weighing on the lad's mind. John Fairchild, the father, scoffed at Kay's concern; but the announcer wondered in an aside to us if Bud was involved with a gang of hoodlums. (A plausible plot situation. And pretty tame, at that, to the many who laugh tolerantly at the "Dead End Kids." Anyway, Bud wasn't shuddering with terror as part of a ghoulish bomber's objective. There are worse things than a child's mental struggle over a personal problem.)

PEPPER YOUNG disappeared from the rest of "Pepper Young's Family" when they were waiting for him to take them on a picnic. Mr. Young got the police to help find him. He had driven eighty-five miles to see his girl friend off on the train. It was intimated that this girl had "broken a tie" between Pepper and his family. (More problems of youth. Plenty of them nowadays. Always have been; always will be. Fellows wouldn't grow up to be seasoned men of power and vision if they didn't have trials to look back at and laugh at.)

"Bachelor's Children" presented a

A SAFE AND SANE CHILDREN'S HOUR

Thrills without chills for the kids on NBC's new "Suppertime Hour"

HOW to take the too sensational and the too mature out of children's programs and yet leave interest and fascination for the youngsters—in short, how to give them thrills without chills—has long been a problem with broadcasters. In isolated instances it has been solved. Here and there throughout the week there have been programs which have left nothing to be desired from either parent or child point of view, but likely as not, before or after such a program the loudspeaker would blare out an erotic serial story or a juvenile show filled with blood and thunder. for a real meal. We vacated it under the cool eye of the head waitress and slunk out, not having enough money to leave a tip. Of course I discovered later that there was a hot-dog wagon on the lot, but nobody told us about it when we needed it.

Oddly enough, my dream-castles had all vanished by this time and I no longer thought of "When I would be a star." All I could think of was to get that screen test over with and then go home and get into bed. I was sleepy and tired. We all were.

After we had been revived by the make-up man and our lips touched up, we asked directions and went to stage 14. The test stage.

I began shaking again as soon as the big stage doors shut behind me. The sound-stage had been divided in half with walls, and we were seated on benches near a heater and told to wait. It seemed ages before the casting-director came in.

"I'll take you one at a time on the set," he said. "You first." He motioned to a pretty redhead who had been getting whiter and whiter under her make-up ever since she first entered the room.

She stood up to walk into the set, swayed and fell in a crumpled heap of shimmering satin at the feet of the casting-director. Her name was Jennie and she never had her screen test. She was carried out and sent to the studio hospital for care. Later, I learned that they sent her home.

We were nervous enough, but this sudden elimination of one of our numbers was terrifying. Each girl was wondering the same thing. Will I faint, too?

How can I explain the nervous agony of this business? How can I show you how ghastly it is to wait for

hours, dressed and painted, for a chance to face that unknown adversary, the camera? It is by far the most terrifying feeling that I can think of.

The "stage experience" blonde was next, and she strolled into the next room calmly, though I could see her fingers trembling, hidden by her full skirt. We listened and waited, wondering what was going on in there. In about fifteen minutes she returned and picked up the cape of her gown from the bench.

"How was it? What's it like?" we asked.

She turned to answer and we were surprised to find her face oddly broken, as though she were trying not to cry.

"Don't be afraid," she said, and hurried out.

We looked at one another with frightened eyes, beaded thickly with mascara. Just what was it all about?

"Next!"

This happened four times and, counting delays, it was three-thirty before my turn came. One other girl was eliminated in that time because she had hysterics. The waiting did that. 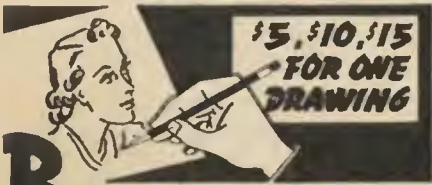

new character named Mr. Ross, who came to the foundling home to adopt a baby and who "may play a sinister part in Dr. and Mrs. Graham's life." (Ominous suggestion there, but hardly enough to cause sinking-spells and chewed fingernails.) "Big Sister" was more explicit than ominously suggestive. Miss Sheldon, the debutante, had been spanked by Aunt Mamie, and to get revenge she hired a tough thug to steal Aunt Mamie's precious good-luck pin from the jewelry store. (Since the first time a prehistoric prima donna bashed in her neighbor's skull for a catty remark and then carved the record on the cave wall, revenge, among the weaker as well as the stronger sex, has been a main motif in literature. Can't blame radio for taking up such time-honored themes.)

THEN came "Guiding Light." But there was darkness. For Ellis Smith was blind. Mr. Nobody from Nowhere, as he is called, bitterly raved through the whole episode. He did so with such interpretative power that, in spite of the pathos of the situation, I felt as if here was a real piece of drama. That is, until the announcer wound it up with: "Out of this darkness must come light—a 'Guiding Light'"—and went into a commercial which seemed to be meant as that "Guiding Light."

What next? I was beginning to feel slightly bewildered, if not quite morbid yet. Drew Sinclair had been using liquor and strong sedatives to keep up with his work, but Helen forgave him for recent unkindnesses, attributing it to the mental attacks he had been having in the story, "Romance of Helen Trent." "Our Gal Sunday" was losing the love of her titled English husband to a sophisticated other woman.

Chi-Chi made good her threat to mop up the floor with the villainess, Rita, to prove that "Life Can Be Beautiful." "Ma Perkins" was feeding a couple of undernourished sisters who came to her door. Their mother had died, their father had abandoned them, and they had been living in an empty shack, eating scraps of garbage.

Patricia, heroine of "Girl Alone," found John Knight with another woman in the jungle, but they were reconciled, even though the true relation of John and the other woman was left for future clarification—both to Patricia and the listeners.

And so on and on and on. These were by no means the only sketches I heard throughout the day. By dialing back and forth between several on at the same time, I managed to catch substantial portions of forty serials—about two-thirds, perhaps, of the full number. And I was tired. Jittery.

Relaxing and thinking back, I could easily recall individual episodes that had stood out as interesting, even absorbing. But the impact of one upon another continuously had been too much, had accelerated the merry-go-round in my head to a giddy speed. I knew what the complainers meant. They were not the listeners who followed two or three favorite serials, probably. They must be those who listened much of the day, as I had done, and finally the merry-go-round got them dizzy, too, till they sought relief.

In what I had heard I could see no justification for charging daytime radio drama with indecency, violence

or improper insinuations of any sort—not, at least, when compared to literature, the movies or the theater. One motif did stand out throughout the day—one against which listeners cry out most insistently—domestic unfaithfulness. Heard as the theme of one serial it would go unchallenged. Splattered through two dozen, it does, perhaps, become an unhealthy overdose.

The sickening number of times I heard "What will happen?" and "Tune in tomorrow and see" and "Is John Doe really losing his mind?" and similar bromides brought home to me this regrettable fact: These dramatic pieces are not planned as literature or drama or entertainment or education. They are planned and executed as advertising—nothing else. I confirmed this fact also by checking systematically the amount of time occupied by commercial announcements and other business outside the dialog itself. The time consumed by commercials on this day ranged from one minute forty-five seconds for "Backstage Wife" to three minutes thirty seconds for "Pretty Kitty Kelly." The average time was about two minutes forty-five seconds. This time is not such an exorbitant price to pay; but combined with time for synopses, summaries, theme music and a few contest announcements, it takes altogether an average of almost half the fifteen-minute period. The average time, in fact, for the actual plots in the sketches checked was eight minutes forty-five seconds.

But if the approximately nine minutes of story can arouse enough curiosity or excitement to make you listen again tomorrow and tomorrow, and perhaps finally accept the three minutes of commercial talking without too much antagonism, then the sketch is a success—to the sponsor. Maybe the sales psychology is faulty, but the fact remains that they plan it that way. Even with this situation, daytime radio drama would be accepted by the general public as pretty much all right, except for two things: There are too many serials; they're too much alike.

WITH magazines, books, movies, plays you can take them or leave them alone. Select what you think you'll like. Not so in daytime radio, ironically supposed to be a sort of public utility. At almost every fifteen-minute period you listen to a serial, much like the one before and the one to come. Or you listen to recorded music on a local station (which is at least a break for the small station). Or you don't listen.

Isn't it possible that advertisers, actors and listeners would benefit from thinning and culling the strip shows?

Maybe if they'd end a serial now and then and start a new story in its stead, it would help.

Perhaps if they'd stress day-to-day life nearer the average or spots of intense acting rather than "do listen tomorrow" suspense in every episode, it would help.

I'm only one listener. Only an average housewife. But to pursue or not to pursue is my inalienable radio right. If through a day of analytical listening I conclude that some of the serials are good, but that there are too many, that they are built on false psychology, that they are too much alike—that is my right. Just as it is everyone's right in America to think for himself. Improvement comes no other way.

Can Your Child Make Good in the Movies?

they were called back to Hollywood. Larry had won the role in the "Blondie" series.

While a chance photograph which found its way onto the cover of a widely circulated magazine gave Larry his big chance, his success really is due to his earlier training. Larry had never been taught dramatics, gestures or recitations. But he had been taught to follow orders—the first time. Like the Baby Dumpling he emulates, Larry is punished for disobedience by having to sit on his chair for fifteen minutes. Mild punishment and a definite drawing of the line between discipline which does not hamper but trains and discipline which might squelch his initiative are responsible for his success.

Joe Pasternak, producer of the Deanna Durbin pictures, comes closest, perhaps, to the actual achievements of child stars in the advice he offers. "Never force a child to act," he says. "Ask the child if he or she would like to act, and unless the child shows a willingness, forget the whole idea."

"Give the child dancing and singing lessons. Give the child every sort of preparation that would develop his or her natural talents. Then, don't come to Hollywood! Let Hollywood send for you. Talent makes its way to the top if it's real." (Mr. Pasternak could easily point to his own career in proof of this point. A couple of years back he was a waiter who spent his spare time going to the movies and dreaming about how he would improve them if he had the chance. Today he's a top-flight producer of pictures, especially noted for his handling of child stars like Deanna Durbin and Gloria Jean.)

"I don't unequivocally say stay away from Hollywood," Mr. Pasternak continued. "But I do say, don't bring your children to Hollywood unless you have plenty of money to live on. Ten child players make a go of it each year. Thousands try."

Boiled down, the almost universal opinion among noted child-directors and producers—men who should know—is that your child has little or no chance in Hollywood. They feel that his or her best chance is to stay at home and be a big fish in a little puddle to which talent-scouts may be attracted, instead of coming to Hollywood, where, nine times out of ten, the child will become lost in the shuffle. These men, too, feel that dramatic training ruins more prospective starlets than it helps, but they agree that dancing and musical education may be a great advantage.

The bright side of this ten-thousand-to-one gamble which has a literal pot of gold at the end of it lies in the fact that children do make good in Hollywood year after year. They make good, as in the case of Jane Withers and Billy Lee and many others, despite the discouragement and by ignoring everything the experts say they should—or should not—do.

That there is no royal road to Hollywood success is quite obvious. It's a long gamble, but for such stakes as are involved in Hollywood success, the odds could not reasonably be expected to be shorter.

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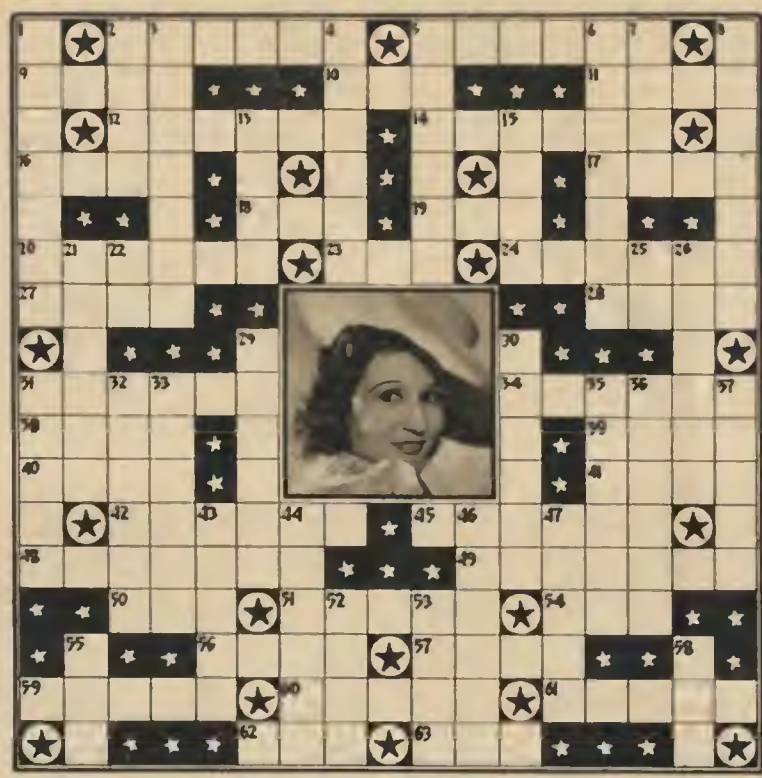

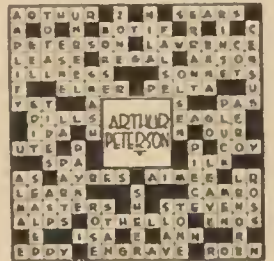
