Stay Out of Hollywood and Keep Out of Trouble

The Inside Story of the Record Business with Pictures of Your Favorite Maestros

Will Hays Talks to the Editor and Sends Out an Edict

THIS is good news. It concerns our own modest but sincere effort to eliminate unnecessary drinking in motion pictures. On a recent afternoon we received an invitation to confer with Will Hays, head of the Motion Pictures Producers Association. Our talk was illuminating.

Last April, Will Hays told us, the motion-picture producers whom he represents became aware of the great number of drinking-scenes in movies. At that time they took their first steps to reduce them to those required solely for plot or motivation. Since then, at subsequent meetings, the problem has been discussed. The recent editorial in *Movie-Radio Guide* brought the matter to the forefront. As a result of that editorial your editor was able to show Mr. Hays approximately 4,500 signatures of people opposed to unnecessary drinking on the screen.

We can report now that Mr. Hays promised action. We can disclose also the fact that, despite the MPPA's interest of last April, a survey of 1940 pictures shows an astounding number of drinking-scenes. But now, good intentions are to be supplemented by action. We hear from Hollywood that the Hays office has sent an order to all studios that there must be no more drinking-scenes. Pictures will not show liquor, drinking, or drunks. Lacking official confirmation, we do not know whether or not this is a complete blanket order permitting no exceptions. We hope not. We are against drinking for atmosphere, or for comedy purposes, but there are some great stories in which the use of liquor is required. Such scenes should be permitted.

At this writing a great many movies are in preparation for the 1941 season. We hope they will be produced in accord with the dictates of good taste and artistic reasonableness. We shall watch their arrival on our screens with complete faith in Mr. Hays.

We had seen four movies the week his letter came. They were "Arise, My Love," "Little Nellie Kelly," "Second Chorus," "Long Voyage Home." All of them showed drinking-scenes of various degrees of importance. Mr. DeMille's letter was a tonic. He writes:

"Dear Mr. Mitchell:

"I thoroughly agree with your editorial stand on 'tippling in the talkies.' There are too many scenes in which the actors are shown drinking, and the pity of it is that the drinking in most of

these scenes is unnecessary.

"There are some pictures, of course, in which drinking is held up as a repulsive and dangerous practise, and such cases may do as much good as the joyfully convivial ones may do harm. They are, in themselves, powerful sermons against drink.

"Where necessary to the motivation of a film plot, however, the ordinary kind of social drinking may be handled with a delicacy that renders the scene inoffensive. But, of course, this kind of drinking should be done in strict moderation in a picture, just as it should be done in life itself.

Virginia is five feet three, weighs 119 pounds, has dark-brown hair and green eyes, and presents a lively, vivacious appearance rarely equalled in a broadcasting studio. STAY OUT OF HOLLYWOOD

STAY out of Hollywood and keep out of trouble!

That's the best advice I know for movie-struck individuals who yearn to sever home ties in pursuit of glittering visions of film glory.

The odds against you are insurmountable. Your chances for movie fame are just about equal to those of the proverbial Chinaman. And, lacking funds with which to fight Quixote-like for cinematic fame and fortune, you may get into trouble.

I know what I'm talking about. As captain of the Los Angeles police bureau of missing persons, I come in personal contact with the little-known, non-success stories of Hollywood, when home ties are cut by visions of film fame and a new face appears in the crowds outside studio casting-offices.

Ferretting out these runaway girls and boys, men and women who think Hollywood is a magic city, I uncover only calamitous stories of pitifully shattered hopes—

A beautiful girl putting a revolver to her temple and pulling the trigger—

Another girl forging checks to buy fancy clothes with which to impress studio casting directors—

Still another girl stealing an expensive fur coat—

And a middle-aged woman deserting her husband and two children in a futile attempt to become a character actress!

These and others are the non-success stories of Hollywood which long ago convinced me the best advice I could give to movie-struck individuals everywhere was:

Stay out of Hollywood and keep out of trouble!

Of all the runaway girl stories we have investigated in Hollywood, the saga of a pretty, twenty-one-year-old blonde is the most tragic.

She was a schoolgirl and a church choir singer in an eastern town when she responded to the lure of movie-land and decided to become an aspirant for screen honors.

Arriving in Hollywood sure of triumph, she set out gaily to find a chorus job or a bit role—something that would serve to launch her career in

the wonderful land of make-believe.

But she was rebuffed at every studio. Countless ineffectual visits to casting-offices made her all the more bitter toward movietown. Still she refused to heed the pleas of her parents to return home.

Then she became morbidly distressed about her vain attempts to succeed, and tried suicide by drinking poison. A police ambulance rushed her to a hospital and her life was spared.

Earl Carroll, filming a picture in Hollywood at the time, read newspaper accounts of her discouragement and suicide attempt and offered her a small role in his picture.

Naturally enough, the girl was elated at the prospect of attracting attention in this film. Her work was favorable and she was befriended by Cecil B. DeMille, the producer-director, who gave her a small contract as a "steady extra."

But her vision of quick stardom remained unfulfilled and again she brooded over what she thought was a sad predicament.

One of her friends was a studio cameraman. He tried to paint rosy pictures of her film destiny, but she wouldn't listen. A boat excursion with him to Catalina Island, during which she drank a great deal, served to unleash her hoarded emotions.

RETURNING to his home in Hollywood, she unearthed a gun, held it to her temple and pulled the trigger.

The last chapter in her disastrous career was closed a few days later by the minister in whose church choir she once sang. Mourners included her parents and former schoolmates.

So you see what can happen. Take the case of a twenty-year-old Pittsburgh girl. She, too, came to Hollywood visioning fame, and wound up serving a six-month jail sentence.

Turned down as an actress by film studios, she landed in court on charges of issuing worthless checks to purchase \$180 worth of clothes.

"I dreamed of attracting the attention of film directors," she told us. "I thought they would not notice me unless I had beautiful clothes. I knew

the checks I gave were worthless but I kept track of every one of them. I was sure I could get a job in pictures and make them all good."

The bad checks were written for a pair of shoes, a pair of silver slippers, a blue-velvet wrap, a blue-silk evening gown and a gray suit.

Other cases of girls who endured similar experiences are written into our records.

A lovely twenty-two-year-old blonde came to Hollywood after winning a beautiful-but-dumb contest in New York. Her appeals for film work went unheeded and finally she went to work as a housekeeper for a Los Angeles woman.

Police arrested her for stealing her employer's expensive fur coat. The girl wound up in a home for girls, from which she was paroled to relatives in the Middle West.

Another girl, from Telluride, Colo., couldn't get screen work either. She wrote two bad checks for \$360 and \$512, and a judge gave her two years' probation.

The Hollywood career of another girl ended abruptly when five checks written by her bounced into the hands of police.

A native of San Francisco, she took an expensive hotel suite, purchased an evening gown and orchids and rented an automobile. Then, trying to impress Hollywood, she gave a big party at the Trocadero cafe. She paid off everything with rubber checks and landed behind steel bars.

THESSE are typical examples of the kind of trouble awaiting some people when dreams of movie stardom are shattered—all true stories on file in our office.

Of course, all the celluloid-struck individuals who come to Hollywood and who do not succeed don't get into serious trouble. But, like the cases of those who do, they serve as warnings to others who long to seek fame and riches in movieville.

One day there came to my desk a letter. It was written on cheap paper and the words recurrently wandered

Here is required reading for every screen-struck kid, written in the heartbreak of stars who never shine

from the ruled lines across the page.

It was dated from a little town in Tennessee. Pinned to it was a photograph of a girl—a brown-haired, slim little girl in a bright checkered wash dress.

"Dear Sir," the message began. "My daughter ran away from home . . . she was always talking about working in the movies . . . maybe you can find her . . . she's only sixteen years old . . ."

We receive many letters like this, additional non-success stories of Hollywood.

We found this sixteen-year-old girl a few days after her mother's tragic appeal was received.

She had not even seen the inside of a motion-picture studio. She was penniless and hungry—sobbing her heart out in a cheap hotel room. All hope gone of crashing Hollywood, she was glad to return home.

All such forays to movietown are singularly alike in one respect—none of the girls ever succeeds.

Every year we receive scores of let-

ters asking that we make a search for some girl or boy or man or woman who has run away and headed for Hollywood, resolved to succeed or never return. None of them ever crashes cinematic heights, few ever see the inside of the studio, and those we locate we usually can persuade to return home.

The main reason why these deluded youngsters, and foolish oldsters, find only frustration in Hollywood is because of an, already too large army of several thousand extras. The average number of days worked by Hollywood extras last year was twenty-eight, and their average earnings were only \$317.26 each—hardly enough to live on.

Young girls are most susceptible to the lure of filmland, but boys and older men and women are not excepted from our searches.

One woman we located in Hollywood had deserted a husband and two small children in a Michigan city to try her fortune as a character actress. Luckless, she finally returned home to

her husband and her children.

Cowboys from cattle-raising states are in the majority among our male cases. They think riding ability will insure their success in western pictures. Others think they are handsome enough to replace Gable or Taylor or Flynn. Most of them are disappointed and respond to pleas of relatives or friends to return to their cows.

It isn't difficult to find the average movie-struck kid or adult who comes to Hollywood without telling relatives or friends. Our favorite haunts are at the central casting-bureau, where all extras must register, and, more than anywhere else, in the offices of booking- and talent-agents.

Most of these amateur actors and actresses turn up at the former place. A few have been located outside studio gates and in hotels and apartment houses.

Photographs, enclosed in letters sent by worried relatives, are all-important in most searches for missing persons. Names are usually changed. But in Hollywood we cannot rely too fully on pictured likenesses.

My pet proof of this was the case of a Nebraska farm girl, who, like many others, was lured to movietown by visions of becoming a star. When we found her, through a friend, her straight black hair was blond and tumbled about her head in curls. Her eyebrows had been plucked. Even her family would have had a hard time recognizing her.

ONCE located by the bureau of missing persons, would-be Gables and Lamarrs are either glad to receive money from home (most of them are too proud to write for funds) or promise to communicate with their homes.

Others, who cannot be found, usually are ashamed to write back to say that they found in Hollywood not fame but jobs that pay fairly well—waiting on tables, checking hats or selling ladies' underwear.

Naturally enough, the Los Angeles bureau of missing persons isn't always chasing movie-struck citizens. Every now and then there are notable Hollywood inhabitants to hold our attention.

The bureau's routine was disturbed a few years back by two film stars who had trouble keeping track of their wives. One was a chubby comedian.

The other was a bulky impersonator of screen scoundrels.

The comedian dashed into the bureau one day and reported that his wife, suffering from a nervous breakdown, had vanished from a film colony infirmary. We went to work and found her three days later in a Los Angeles hotel room.

The villain's wife's eclipse wasn't so serious. She desired to acquire a divorce in Nevada and left home with such speed that she forgot to tell anyone, including her husband, where she was going.

The actor was distraught until she was located, "surprised and amused," two days later in Las Vegas, Nevada. Later she changed her mind about the divorce and returned to her home in Hollywood.

A former child actress was the bureau's best Hollywood customer for a while in 1929 when she and her mother battled over financial problems which beset them.

Then seventeen and still working in films, she acquired the habit of just melting away whenever she and her mother quarreled. Most of these disappearances sent her mother scurrying to the bureau of missing persons with all the little details.

The police either found her in some hotel or she would return home before a few hours had passed.

Even such stars as Carole Lombard and Clark Gable and Eddie Albert have held the attention of the bureau of missing persons.

Unheard from for several days during a hunting-trip to Mexico, Miss Lombard and Gable became subjects for a police search when M-G-M studio executives appealed to the bureau. The stars eventually turned up safe and well, explaining they had decided to spend a few days more than expected in Mexico and had not bothered to telephone anyone.

Eddie Albert, reported missing by the Warner studio, was sought by police until he turned up in Mexican waters, to which he had sailed in his yacht without advising friends.

Far more dramatic, though, are the bureau's searches for movie-struck youngsters and oldsters—the non-success stories of Hollywood upon which I base my plea to—

Stay out of Hollywood and keep out of trouble!

WHEN hard work is rewarded, when modesty triumphs and when courage brings success—in a book—it's a Horatio Alger story. But when hard work is rewarded, when courage brings fame, and when a man's headsize remains the same in spite of it—in real life—that's Bob Hope.

Millions of Bob Hope's radio fans got their first glimpse of him on the screen in "The Big Broadcast of '38" with Shirley Ross. So who has a better right than Shirley to introduce him to them personally? Though Bob is regarded purely as a comedian by most of us, those closest to him say that one of the finest things he has ever done was a love scene with this same Shirley in "The Big Broadcast." And he scored romantically with this girl in "Thanks for the Memory" when they sang the song of that name.

Says Shirley: "I imagine everyone has told you the same thing—that Bob's the funniest thing they've ever known. But he is more than that; he's a tonic. He's always in the highest spirits and is a 'pick-up' for everybody he comes into contact with. I don't know of anyone who has such a terrific capacity for work and play at the same time. But no matter how hard he is working, nothing interferes with his sense of humor or his love of fun.

"Nothing ever worries Bob. He makes jokes of difficulties. He is always so gay, full of life and bubbling with joy that there's no room for gloominess in his character. Yet he is shrewd and I don't think there's anyone in Hollywood who is his equal at weighing the possibilities of a joke or a humorous situation.

"There's a lot of courage in Bob's laugh, too. A wisecrack or a funny story is his way of whistling in the dark. When I first knew him he wasn't at all sure of himself; under his gay bravado he was really timid. He had never been in a big picture, and when he came out in front of the cameras he was nervous. But in spite of that he was alert (his brain's the fastest thing you ever dreamed of) and funny.

"Gags and laughs flow from Bob so easily and so naturally that none really stands out in my memory. He had me laughing all the time I was around him. I didn't think I could ever do a serious scene with him, but when our key scene came up he had a depth of feeling that amazed me. I still love to see the picture "Thanks for the Memory" that I did with Bob. Because when I see him on the screen, he's just the same likable, natural Bob Hope.

"Of course I've done a lot of radio work with Bob, and have been on his own show about six times. So you'll probably have to discount my opinion as being prejudiced, because I really

am one hundred percent pro-Hope."

The nicest things said about Bob come from people looking back at experiences with him. Those who are in current contact with him are invariably in a playful mood.

We found Dorothy Lamour in the largest of Paramount's big stages, looking down into the great tank on a scene of tropical wilderness, with its jungle, its winding streams and steaming waterfalls. Down there, Bing Crosby and Bob Hope were hiding, while beating drums and wild chanting heralded the approach of savages—and the flight of their guides.

"Give you my opinion of Bob Hope?" repeated Dot. "A pleasure, my friend. Just say that in 'Typhoon' I had a chimpanzee and that in 'Zanzibar' I have Hope. He swings from tree to tree, picking gags out of the thin air.

"Oh? No kidding? Well, you came to a fine place for that—with Bob and Bing bouncing gags off everybody's noggin. Well, I think Hope's one of the greatest comics—and the greatest fellows—of our generation. His gags aren't rehearsed; they just pop out of him. So many things happen between him and Bing every day on the set that I really can't think of him except in the middle of a laugh. Because that's where you'll always find him. I've been so busy keeping off the butt-end of one of his gags I haven't had time to do any analyzing.

"BUT nobody's ever hurt or angered by Bob's humor. It's so friendly. He wouldn't hurt anyone's feelings to get in a wisecrack—not if it would be the funniest thing he ever did. That's why I like him so much."

Speaking of gags, Harry Ray, a make-up man who has been going on sets with stars for years, is right in the middle of them. And take his word for it, a day spent trying to keep Bob and Bing looking debonair is a day in a monkey cage. They get him between them and, oh, boy!

But apparently Harry doesn't hold it against 'em. He says:

"Bob Hope's a swell guy. Everything about him is natural—just seeming to happen. He's as witty off the screen as he is on. He has a great sense of humor and loves a laugh. He doesn't have to be the one telling the joke. He gets a real kick out of a joke on himself, too. That is, when anybody's smart enough to put one over.

"He's not particular about his make-up. All he asks is to appear neat and clean. He's not temperamental or conceited, and he's always friendly and happy. If I ever feel rotten and Bob Hope comes in to be made up, he has me feeling swell in no time. Actors usually expect us to pep them up, but Bob peps everybody up. And you never feel that he's trying to. You

IN WRITING THIS STORY, Mr. French polled everybody who ever knew Bob on what they thought of him. But he missed the Hope dogs, which, in this picture, eloquently demonstrate how they feel about Bob

don't know it's happening until you're laughing and feeling fine.

"He's the busiest guy in the world. In the nine years I've been around the studios I've never known a star to work as hard as Bob. Movie and radio writers are usually buzzing around him, but he always has time to sit down and talk to you. And I never saw the day he couldn't wedge in his stories, his gags and his jokes.

"It's almost three-quarters of a mile from make-up to the big stage where Bob's working. He's snappy, and usually first of the stars made up. So every morning he steals either Bing Crosby's or Fred MacMurray's bicycle to ride out to the set.

"When they squawk he says he can't ride well enough to own a bicycle, and has to depend on his friends. The other day they discovered he won a bicycle in some sort of a contest and now they're yelling for him to bring it to the studio. But he says his mind is on bigger things. Now, what would you think of a guy like that?"

And what does Bing Crosby think of this team-mate of his; this happy-go-lucky who shares his film adventures that millions of movie fans can't get enough of; this delightful thorn in his side? Frankly, a lot more than he'll ever admit. Bing gives us this:

"My opinion of Hope isn't for publication. I've been trying to do his life story, but it's bogging down in the middle.

"Sore about his natural pilfering instincts? Who, me? MacMurray and I know this bicycle habit of his is inherited. The whole family is a little slow in buying transportation. His brother Jack admitted the other day that his grandfather over in London was collecting rents at ninety-four, on a borrowed bicycle. That's a fact—go on, ask him about his grandpappy.

"I can get along with Bob Hope all right; I know how to humor him. Dot Lamour and I throw him bananas every so often. Keeps him happy, and gives him a nice gloss. He may be sand in other people's spinach, but I like him."

Bing's right, in part at least. Jack Hope verified the report that Bob's grandfather was collecting rents on a bicycle in London at the age of ninety-four—and that he's still going good.

Last year Bob went over there to help celebrate his grandfather's birthday, and discovered he had come by his talents naturally. Once they made that grandfather master of ceremonies of the shindig, he became the life of the party and they couldn't get him back in his seat. He loudly proclaimed that where there was Hope there was life.

Who knows a man better than his own brother? So Jack's opinion of Bob should be enlightening.

"Although Bob's my younger brother," Jack admits, "he's always been a star to me. When he was only four he used to go over to his great-aunt Polly's to entertain. He'd stick his hands in his pockets, push out his stomach and make faces for cookies. She called him 'Pockets' and would send him home with them all filled. She'd say to him: 'That's the idea, laddie, it pays to make them laugh. You'll do all right.' And as great-aunt Polly lived to be 102, she saw her prophecies come true.

"Bob was the funniest fellow in the world to me then, and he still is. That's not because he's made good. Just being successful wouldn't make six brothers cheer you. We're all for Bob because he's been so swell to everybody, because he's never let success go to his head. He's just the same as we've always known him.

"Bob Hope as master of ceremonies at the Academy Award, or at the premiere of his picture, or on an air show, has the same attitude as little Bobbie, the youngest one in the gang of us that used to sing outside Peter Schmidt's beer-garden in Cleveland when we'd boost him over the fence to pass the hat.

"I THINK people like him because they can sense that about him—and because he's not handsome and the average fellow thinks he's no different than himself, only maybe a little wittier. But to his brothers he's the greatest guy in the world."

Scorpy Doyle, caddy at the Lakeside Golf Club, says:

"I've been caddying for Bob Hope ever since he came to California. He's just the same as when he first came here. But I don't agree with the people who say nothing ever worries him. Of course he's always kidding and cheerful, but I can tell when something's on his mind from the way he plays. You can't fool Old Man Golf. If things aren't right at the movie studio or he's having trouble with his radio program, I can tell it from his form.

"He asks me what I think of his program. I say it's good, or it's fine, or it's fair, or it stinks. I don't lie. I call 'em as I see 'em. And that's the way he wants me to do it. Bob may kid everybody else, but he never kids himself.

"He's regular and takes me to the football games and fights with him. He treats all the caddies just like he treats his friends. We give him laughs, and he loves laughs.

"I've been caddying out here twelve years, and have caddied for most of the big stars in Hollywood—like Gable, Bing Crosby and Dick Powell.

"Most all the stars think Bob Hope's the funniest guy in Hollywood, and that he's funnier off the air and the

screen than he is on. They all fight for a chance to shoot a round with him but we caddies get the gravy because we hear all his cracks when he makes a shot or lands in a trap. Boy, if they could just put one of those rounds on the air!"

Eddie Welch, Paramount writer, gag-man and ex-actor, says:

"Bob Hope is great because he's willing to share credit and rewards with the other fellow. He's the greatest comedian in the country for my money, but he never hogs anything. He feeds to the other fellow. He knows the meaning of the word cooperation, and he's generous.

"I knew him when he was struggling to break into emceeing in the presentation houses back in Chicago. Things were tough there for him before he got the break at the Stratford Theater. Even then he was willing to try to help the other fellow. If a tenth of the favors that were owed him had been paid, he wouldn't have been living on peanuts those days.

"One night a team of big radio stars had Bob on their program as a guest artist. They had him up there stooging while they took all the bows. They didn't give him a chance to say a thing.

"But Bob is able to take care of himself. When it came to his big scene—where they asked him a question and he said, 'Okay'—he squinted down at the script in his hand, and then said, 'Okay,' hesitated a second, and added, 'it says here.'

"That brought down the house. It stopped the show. It was so perfectly timed, and fitted so pat with his pantomime of looking for his lines that it got what I believe is the biggest laugh I ever heard—and Bob positively dominated that program with a single line.

"He wouldn't have done that if they hadn't been so selfish. Bob hates self-

ishness. He does more benefits than anybody else in the country. He's always doing his stuff for the Salvation Army, war relief, Community Chest and endless other things. He did a preview show at the Paramount Theater to test out gags, and had the theater turn over part of the take to charity. Because that's the sort of a chap he is."

Sitting on the set fondly watching Bob strut his stuff in "The Road to Zanzibar" was his uncle, Frank Hope. He was willing to give us his opinion of his famous nephew.

"To me the thing about Bob that outweighs everything else is his kindness." He paused a moment, looking down at the whirling natives in the tropical jungle below, but seeing mental pictures of the Bob he knew.

"WHEN he was playing in 'Roberta' Bob's mother was seriously ill. He had had a special telephone put in her bedroom and would call her three or four times a week. And every couple of weeks he'd fly out to Cleveland to see her.

"He was always generous to his mother. He was more than generous—he was thoughtful. When he told her that everything he had was hers, he knew that hearing him say that meant more to her than the money or the things it would buy.

"Of course he played jokes on her. One day he told her he was going to sell the furniture—and then took her over to the new house he had bought and had completely furnished for her. After she passed away, he had his married brother move in and keep the place going for his dad.

"Bob didn't think only of the family. Every time he came back to Cleveland he would look up the old gang that used to be on the corner of 105th and Euclid. He sold papers there

"Hudson's Bay"

MOVIEGOERS who thrilled at "Northwest Passage," "Stanley and Livingstone" or "Brigham Young" will find plenty of the same frontier adventures, but perhaps better done by a bigger cast, in "Hudson's Bay," a historical romance of the founding of the Hudson's Bay Company in May of 1670.

More colorful characters are interpreted in this story by such able actors as Paul Muni, as Pierre Esprit Radisson, and his man Friday, huge Laird Cregar, in the part of Gooseberry. John Sutton, as Lord Edward Crewe, also has a leading role in the adventures of Muni and Cregar. As in most frontier-life stories, the ladies—in this case Gene Tierney and Virginia Field—have little screen time and less chance to act prettily. But a special mark of recognition is scored by Vincent Price for his portrayal of Charles II of England.

The story, inspired when Producer Macgowan noticed the Hudson's Bay

Company label and date of founding on the label of a bottle of Scotch, was written by Lamar Trotti and tells how two French-Canadian soldiers of fortune, Radisson (Muni) and Gooseberry (Cregar), enlist the interest and money of Lord Crewe in their project of a long and hazardous journey into the far north of America for the purpose of making a fortune in fur-trading. They get their pelts and then beat off attempts by the French to raid and steal the furs. Arriving safely in England, the pair are co-founders with Charles II of the Hudson's Bay Co.

On their return to America they bring with them Gerald Hall (Morton Lowry), the brother of the heroine Barbara Hall (Miss Tierney). When he proves to be a weakling and a scoundrel who trades liquor to the Indians for furs, a practise against the rules established by Radisson, trouble commences. The Indians hijack and kill to steal furs to trade for the firewater until Radisson quells the disturbance and takes the frontier law into his own hands to execute the renegade brother.

Paul Muni fans will be surprised at

his portrayal of Radisson, and undoubtedly will take him even more thoroughly into their hearts as the adventurous philosopher with a sense of humor. Playing on the lighter side throughout the film, Muni uncorks a flair for comedy which should have been exploited before.

Strong supporting roles are filled by Morton Lowry in particular as the ne'er-do-well brother, and also by Robert Greig, Nigel Bruce, Chief Thundercloud and Montagu Love. "Hudson's Bay" may not be as pretentious as some of the other historically backgrounded films to come from the 20th Century-Fox lot, but if there's any lack of spectacle it's amply made up for in a tight-knitted plot, plenty of action and humor.

Youngsters (and oldsters) who like to play Indian will love this picture, and historically it is fairly accurate.

Miss Ayres leaves an ailing mother, a brother, and a fourteen-year-old daughter, Maria Eugenie, who since Miss Ayres' illness has been in the custody of the actress' divorced husband, picture producer S. Manuel Reach.

Clark Gable and Bette Davis Top Poll

Clark Gable and Bette Davis were the most popular actor and actress for 1940, according to the movie trade-journal, *Boxoffice*, announcing its annual poll of what cinema stars produced the most business. For the fourth consecutive year, Gene Autry was named as the top western actor. Runners-up in the general division, in order, were Spencer Tracy, Mickey Rooney, Judy Garland and Myrna Loy. Box-office champs of 1939 were Miss Davis and Mickey Rooney. "Boom Town" is believed to have raised the stock of Gable. Another magazine (*Redbook*) selected Sol Lesser's production "Our Town" as the "most distinguished contribution to the art of motion pictures for 1940" and made the award presentation on the "Screen Guild Theater" broadcast of December 29. Now Hollywood is waiting to see what and whom the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences selects for the presentation of the annual selection of "Oscars" at the Academy's banquet early in February.

"This Thing Called Love"

THE pursuit of happiness exhibits itself in many forms but there are few of us who could go through what Rosalind Russell and Melvyn Douglas do in "This Thing Called Love" and come out unscathed. It's a highly stepped-up bedroom farce with a strictly modern cloak.

Although Rosalind Russell and Douglas do swell jobs of acting, the methods used to expound this tale are definitely on the adult side, and not the sort of thing the kids would either enjoy or benefit from. It's strictly adult comedy.

Madly in love with Rosalind after a four-day acquaintance in South America, Douglas comes to New York to marry her. She meets him at the boat and they go straight to the city hall for a license. While waiting in the court, Rosalind tells him of her theory founded on insurance facts she has computed, which provides that if a married couple would live on a strictly platonic basis for three

months they would, in that time, find out if they were suited to marriage and the job of bringing up a family. Douglas explodes with disgust at such a proposition, but finally gives in and marries her anyway in the belief that he can change her mind and her theories with his winning personality and a counter plan. The remainder of the picture is a series of experiments on Melvyn's part to win Rosalind over to his way of thinking with no success, until Rosalind finally does an about-face when she believes she is going to lose him to Binnie Barnes, an enticing secretary.

Climax comes when Douglas returns home to find Rosalind's boss in his pajamas, thus giving rise to doubts upon the part of the impatient husband as well as his platonic wife. He is about to throw up everything when his lawyer entreats Rosalind to intervene, with happy results.

"This Thing Called Love" might well be described as a craftsman's picture, since much of its excellence is due to technical superiority as well as workmanlike performances. Excellent direction, tightly knit (though risqué) dialog, apt casting and in-

genious editing are there in full measure, although such things, it must be admitted, are of more importance to the movie-makers themselves than to the public, which judges a picture solely by its entertainment and amusement value. There's plenty of both, on the adult side, in this picture.

Both Melvyn Douglas and Rosalind play extremely broad comedy throughout, and Binnie Barnes does her usual good job in the role of secretary to Douglas' attorney (Allyn Joslyn). Good support is given by Gloria Dickson, jealous wife of attorney Joslyn, Lee Cobb, Gloria Holden, Paul McGrath and Rosina Galli.

"This Thing Called Love" is based on the play of the same name by Edwin Burke, and it follows the original work closely, except for improvements which were made possible by the mobile eye of the camera and more elaborate production.

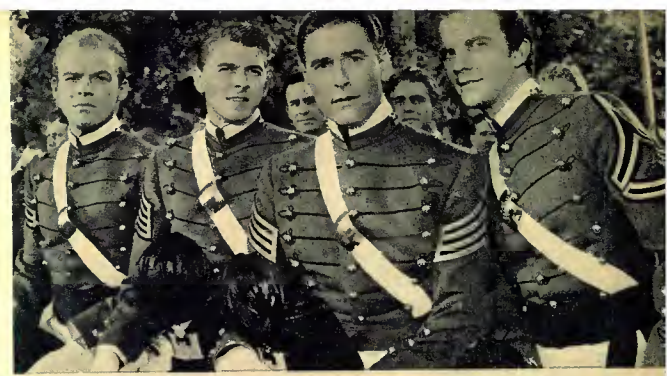

IF THE citizens of Santa Fe, N. Mex., were disappointed in the fact that "Santa Fe Trail," Warner Bros.' latest, greatest super-epic, had so little to do with Santa Fe and so much to do with John Brown's exploits in Kansas and points east, they gave no sign of it to the stars who junketed to the Sunshine State for its premiere. MISS BETTE DAVIS does everything with a flourish. There is an air to the way she lights a cigarette, to the way she mixes a salad. When she says damn, her favorite slang word, she says it unlike any other person. She is every inch an actress. I'll lay odds on that she rehearses and acts in her bathtub, and plays her own audience. So it was natural that her marriage to Harmon O. Nelson should be spectacular. It also is quite natural that her mar-

riage should go on the rocks.

Mr. Nelson is the only sweetheart the Queen ever had. He is a quiet, friendly fellow, the type of guy a man likes to tie to, but the union of Nelson and Davis was something like mixing TNT and tepid soup.

While Miss Davis, aided and abetted by her energetic and ambitious mother, Ruthie, was scooting up the ladder, Mr. Nelson was inching his way up as a bandleader. He first plighted his troth when they were children and finally Ruthie suggested to Bette that if she expected to marry Nelson she had better be about it. After all they had been courting for ten years.

The studio decided they should elope and got everything ready for a publicity splurge. But Miss Davis and Mr. Nelson went quietly over to Arizona for the benefit of clergy. The first thing the studio knew about it was the headlines. The next day Bette appeared at the studio with her husband to pose for publicity stills.

The Queen never has allowed anything, even her marriage, to interfere with her career. Miss Davis loves the headlines. She loves her work. She is the actress who once concealed a first-class dose of measles under an extra coat of grease paint. The mere fact that her ailment endangered other people apparently never occurred to her. For Bette Davis wouldn't hurt anybody or anything knowingly.

It was inevitable that Mr. Nelson would be known as Miss Davis' husband. And, too, she called him Ham. Miss Davis apparently does not understand yet why her marriage collapsed. Any man understands. After the divorce there was a lot of fuss and feathers about Miss Davis and George Brent. She calls him Brentie. No man likes that. If Miss Davis ever has another man we suggest she call him Butch. Maybe that'll help matters.

In conversation, the Queen often refers to her mother and tries to tell how much she owes her. It is not necessary. Ruthie Davis is almost as remarkable as her daughter. Without a doubt she pushed and nudged Bette up the stairs, seeing in her daughter

the things she wanted to be herself.

Bette says, and Hollywood agrees, that she owes her success to hard work. That is only partly true. When she went to Hollywood she was branded as colorless. One can be anything in Hollywood except colorless. The Laemmle team of father and son pronounced her doom. Carl Laemmle, Jr., in those days a big-shot in Universal, once said, "I can't imagine anybody giving her a tumble." Today Miss Davis is the most sought-after feminine star in Hollywood. Junior Laemmle grins every time Davis' name is mentioned. It was Wilson Mizner who suggested that Miss Davis bleach her hair to the color of honey. It was the hair that first attracted attention. Of course the Queen is a hard worker. She keeps a scratch-pad with her at all times, lists appointments and keeps them.

In 1934, after she did Mildred in "Of Human Bondage," she was runner-up for the Academy Award. The next year she won it for "Dangerous." She also has won it for "Jezebel." Most actresses shun the parts that Miss Davis takes. They want to play good little girls, but Miss Davis says, "I like to play gummy girls and attractive wenches."

Warner Bros., in justice to all concerned, has been smart enough to see Bette's side and has cast her as far as possible in the roles she likes. Miss Davis is demanding more parts like Mildred in "Of Human Bondage." The trouble is there are no more parts like that.

THE Queen is known as a director's dream, but she also is a writer's dream. She dislikes stuffed shirts, seldom attends their parties. She is never smug nor prudish. She cusses a bit and has a trigger temper. She talks like a house afire, about anything. And when she laughs she tilts her head and laughs down into her tummy. She's not exactly an outdoor woman, thank heavens, and the pictures that show her golfing and playing tennis usually are posed. But she does like to swim. And she's good at it.

They'll tell you in Hollywood that Queen Bette is still in love with Mr. Nelson. That is a question that only Miss Davis can settle. She babbles a lot about Ham but nothing seems to come of it. As a matter of fact, Miss Davis' romance with the bandleader sort of dwindled into marriage. The marriage dwindled too. She was too busy to get a divorce, so he did it.

Miss Davis is an ardent Christian Scientist and constantly is seeking the good in other people. It is her religion to see no evil, speak no evil and hear no evil. Sometimes she is emotional and moody. Once at a banquet someone mentioned starving refugee children and the Queen lost her appetite.

She used to be obstinate, but now she will listen to reason. She never angers at just criticism, but in talking to or about other persons she always pulls her punches for fear of hurting their feelings. She will tell you that she is brutally frank, but she isn't. She is a gentle, sensitive woman, burning alive with ambition.

Her love for dogs is legendary and her home in Coldwater Canyon overflows with Scotties, Dobermans, Pekingese and Sealyhams. She was president of the Southern California Tail-Waggers Foundation until she had to give it up for lack of time.

Her home looks like Grand Central Station during the rush hour. People call in droves and beat her ears down with their troubles. She answers the telephone herself, tends her own nails and prepares her own salads. She is a trencherman and her favorite diet is a vegetable one. She likes potatoes in any shape, manner or form. The only nickname she ever had was "Spuds." However her favorite dish is her own salad made of lettuce, olive oil, vinegar, garlic, pearl onions, Worcestershire sauce, cider and spices. With it she likes toast melba.

She is something of a prissy housekeeper. She owns a home in New Hampshire and has tried to bring New England to southern California. She knits and crochets. In Hollywood, she is considered an avid reader. And she is for an actress. She goes for Hemmingway, Ertz and Noel Coward. But she is too busy with her own affairs really to be a prolific reader. She plays a nice hand of bridge, but next to her acting her best achievement is conversation. She can idle with words or be serious.

In real life, the Queen does not look the part of the wench she usually portrays. She has frosty-blue eyes, that pop a bit. Her complexion is ruddy and she freckles and sunburns easily. She is five feet four inches tall and has a twenty-two inch waist. Her dress size varies from nine to ten, but has hit twelve. She has beautiful hands and legs. She is inclined to slump a bit when she stands, much to the consternation of her mother.

Miss Davis' contract with Warner's has several years to run and calls for three pictures a year. Her annual gross income from movies is about \$182,000. She lives on a budget, a very liberal one. Her pet extravagance is perfumes. She seldom buys hats and doesn't like to wear them for her one vanity is her beautiful hair and she likes to show it off. She eats an apple every day and goes in for spangled bracelets and glittering doodads.

Her wardrobe is not large comparatively, but her clothes are the best. She likes white things and when re-

laxing she wears shorts or slacks. She has a yen for fine handkerchiefs and often carries two or three with her. She also likes gloves but does not care particularly for handbags. Her lingerie is simple and handmade with no lace or frills.

Her employes include a houseman, a personal maid and a colored cook. Of course she has a secretary and a business manager and she really listens to her business manager. She also listens to her mother. She has two cars and drives herself.

Miss Davis says her ambition is to do a Broadway show if she can find the right show. That's the ambition of most Hollywood actresses. The trouble is there are lots of actresses and only a few good shows. Her screen ambition is to do the life of Sarah Bernhardt.

Her favorite players are Garbo, Barbara Stanwyck, George Arliss, George Brent, Jim Cagney, Leslie Howard and Katharine Cornell.

My favorite actress is Bette Davis.

ALL the country is agog over Miss Davis' latest show, "The Letter." In shooting the job director William Wyler did something that has never been done before. He shot a Davis scene that runs seven minutes without a break. That means Miss Davis acted seven minutes before a camera without a word of direction. It's the scene in the visitors' room of a jail. If you haven't seen "The Letter" then watch for it. Notice that there isn't a break, that the action is continuous.

What is so amazing about that? You may say, why, in stage shows performers go through the whole production without direction. That, my friends, is the great difference in Hollywood and Broadway. That is the difference in a real performer and a puppet. Director Wyler says that the Queen is the only Hollywood actress who could have done that scene. To understand him you must consider the difference in acting before an audience and acting before a camera. Then you can understand the genius of Davis.

On the stage one must do a long part before the public without aid of a director. One must really act. In the movies one need only follow the director's instructions, recite a few lines and do as one is told. If a movie actress makes a mistake, blows her lines, then no great damage is done.

As a matter of cold fact, Hollywood does not like great actors and actresses. That's why many persons have starred in movies who couldn't get to first base on the stage. Most Hollywood pictures are made by directors. The performers are robots.

But Bette Davis really acts in front of a camera. Watch her the next time

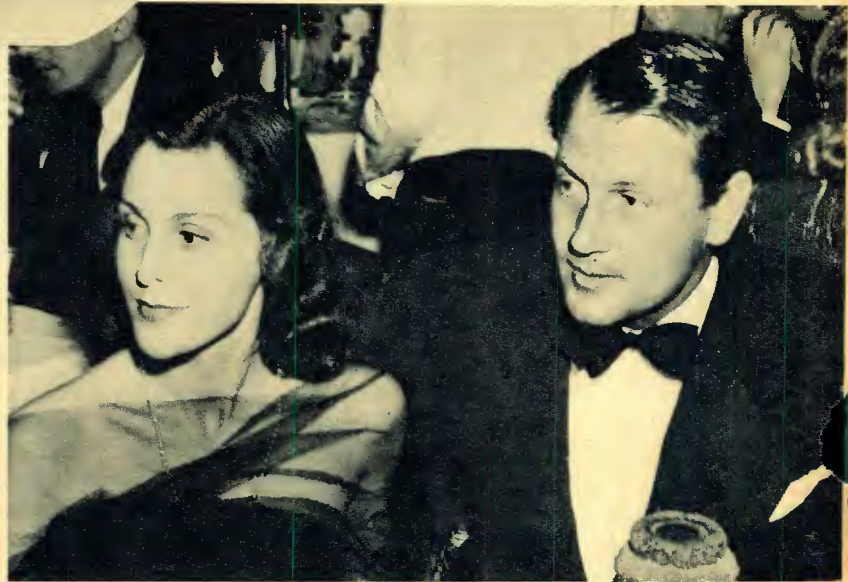

This Week's Opera: "Il Trovatore"

VERDI'S "Il Trovatore" (The Troubadour) tells the tale of the vindictive gypsy, Azucena, and her supposed son, Manrico, the Troubadour. Azucena, before the opera opens, has kidnaped the son of old Count Di Luna in revenge for his having burned her mother at the stake as a witch. She throws the baby into the flames and discovers too late that she has really killed her own child. She raises Manrico to be a wandering minstrel, and in Act I he comes to the castle of the Di Lunas and serenades beautiful Leonora, ward of the old Count, who has died and left the castle to his other son. The young Count, also in love with Leonora, finds Manrico and engages him in a duel. In Act II Azucena is captured by Di Luna and, as the woman who supposedly murdered his brother, is condemned to die. Manrico, about to marry Leonora, is informed of Azucena's plight and rushes to her rescue. In the last act Manrico has been flung into a dungeon with Azucena. Leonora, coming to him, agrees to marry the Count if he will free Manrico. He does so, and Leonora takes poison, dying at Manrico's feet. Di Luna, enraged, orders Manrico to be burned as Azucena watches. She screams, "He was your brother," and falls lifeless. (Broadcast time given above.)

GANG BUSTERS, NBC. Fifth anniversary.

When the tommy-guns bark a violent warning, the sirens scream a relentless alarm and marching feet

tramp with the cadence of "Beware!" out of your loudspeaker Friday, January 17, the sudden cacophony will signalize the fifth anniversary on the air for radio's self-styled Crusade Against Crime.

On that date "Gang Busters," which has broadcast clues that, it is claimed, have helped in the apprehension of 160 criminals, will call the roll of the Public Rats—the most notorious or most vicious of the criminals at large today.

Each year on its anniversary program "Gang Busters" nominates and publicly hangs in an oral rogues' gallery those criminals who still must be reckoned with as social menaces.

Charles Irving Chapman, Maurice Denning, "Soup" Greyson are gangsters who have made the Dishonor Roll on various occasions and are still eligible for this year's blacklist. Benjie and Estelle Dickson and Raymond Duvall are among those who have been named before but have since been captured.

Who the dishonorees will be for this year will not be known until "Gang Busters" charge onto the air Friday. But how they are selected may be of interest.

The year 1940 had barely started ticking before a "Gang Busters" staff went to work ferreting out at least the names for the 1941 Roster of Rats.

Seven hundred fifty law-enforcement bureaus and over 400 especially trained field correspondents have been constantly on the alert for the latest trends in crime waves and who the perpetrators were likely to be—for crime psychology and experience

show that each criminal has an individual *modus operandi*.

Into the "Gang Busters" office pour these reports—dozens each week—where they are tabulated and analyzed by the staff. Crime expeditions are watched and developments noted. Police authorities are consulted in quick airplane dashes throughout the country.

By the end of 1940, volume upon volume of criminal case histories had been compiled. "Punks" who earlier in the year had started out on rampages but who, fortunately, had been captured were eliminated. Mobsters who flared up and then smoldered were put in a special category.

The gangsters most assiduously sought by authorities are the ones "Gang Busters" concentrates on—criminals who have cut a broad and merciless swath through society are the ones who make the "semifinals"; and the process of elimination which selects the "finalists" is based on "survival of the toughest."

Only twenty-four hours before the broadcast the final listing is made. Police are consulted, charges are examined, records are checked. A carefully worded script, scrutinized by the show's attorneys, is written.

Then the guns bark, the sirens scream, the feet tramp, and the show goes on the air. And then listeners will learn "for whom the bell tolls" in the underworld, as one police chief after another announces:

"In my opinion, the most notorious public enemy at large in the United States today is —."

FIRST FAMILIES OF RADIO

"MR. DISTRICT ATTORNEY"

WHEN Mr. District Attorney gets his man he gets him properly. So seldom, in fact, does his quarry live to face trial that certain listeners are fearful lest the D. A. lose his talent as a courtroom lawyer. Most listeners, though, don't worry about technicalities.

Inspired by racket-buster Tom Dewey's career, "Mr. District Attor-

ney" is one of radio's crime thrillers, presented Wednesday nights over NBC. Each week the D. A. (played by Jay Jostyn) has a rendezvous with death, but justice must prevail, so he invariably emerges unscathed.

Miss Miller (Vicki Vola) is his little helper. Instead of busying herself with secretarial duties at the office, Miss

Miller bobs up at her boss' heels whenever some law-breaker maneuvers him into a tight spot—which is every week. Sergeant Harrington (Len Doyle) and Miss Miller are the D. A.'s confidants and compose, with him, a colorful twentieth-century trio of crusaders for justice. In an epilog each week, after they have gotten their

man, the D. A. tells listeners of the sentence handed down by the court.

The scripts, written by Ed Byron, are splashed with enough lead and blood to suit the taste of the most avid adventure-thriller fan, but they have strong enough plots to hold, too, Casper Milquetoasts who don't have any great hankering for chiller-dillers.

100,000,000 Records

Bandleaders are the big noise of the booming record business. For them, records and radio are life blood

IN 1922 Americans bought 100,000,000 recordings and thought phonograph music was plenty good. Then they were handed a new toy, radio. Their recordings went begging, or into the ashcan. The miracle of radio—and its latent possibilities—hypnotized entertainers and entertained alike. Everybody thought recordings were gone for good. They were wrong.

Today, again, Americans are rushing pell-mell to the music stores to buy recordings. After the biggest year since 1922, record-makers are predicting that 1941 will see the hundred-million record reached and outreached. Behind that hundred-million mark is a story; it is essentially a story of dance bands, for whom recordings are—as is radio—life blood.

Juke Box Booms Records

Dancers, it must be remembered, make dance bands and it is the dancers who buy records. Foremost record consumers are dancing patrons of the "juke box," coin phonograph, of

which 300,000 appear in taverns, restaurants and public places throughout the country. And a juke-box hit—which automatically becomes a best-seller record—can make a band. Classic example of this is Bonnie Baker's and Orrin Tucker's "Oh, Johnny," which sold half a million, making Bonnie and her sigh a national sensation. Other examples include "Marie" for Tommy Dorsey, and "Stomping at the Savoy" for Benny Goodman.

Record Prices Cut

A major factor in the record boom are the new fine-tone combination radio-phonographs and inexpensive record-players, coupled with drastic slashes in record prices. There is also the education of the public to popular music—as well as classical—which newspapers have carried on with evangelical fervor as the surge of interest in swing music has developed. Band styles of Benny Goodman or Guy Lombardo have suddenly become more important than their personalities, and

the public wants recordings to study them at leisure. Radio, indeed, has ceased to be a novelty and its limitations are recognized. Records have been rediscovered as the perfect complementary entertainment.

Bandleaders' Big Chance

Spurred on by the record revival, and recognizing their biggest chance—outside of radio—for making the big-time or staying in it, bandleaders have vied with one another in making recordings, as pictures on these pages suggest. Today the recording champions are becoming the champion bands.

Take Glenn Miller, who records for Bluebird. Biggest, most consistent seller in the industry, Glenn has clicked with "Tuxedo Junction," "Moonlight Serenade," "Little Brown Jug" and others. Flawless precision and team-work have soared his disk sales to the quarter-million mark in several instances.

Artie Shaw made his name on the Bluebird waxing of Cole Porter's "Be-

gin the Beguine," until then a flop tune in a flop show. "Beguine" sold over 250,000. Returning to the band business last year, but switching to the Victor Black Label studio, Artie and his new band made "Frenesi," which hit the best-seller list during its first week of release.

Glen Gray's Comeback Record

Although Glen Gray's band hit the top in 1933, it slumped a little in 1936, only to come back—and strongly—in 1938 on the strength of one recording, a revival of an old one, "I Cried for You." It sold 100,000. Other great recording champions include Kay Kyser, Bob Crosby, Guy Lombardo, Benny Goodman and Jimmy Dorsey.

These first gentlemen of bandom want radio and the recording business to join hands to produce new opportunities for themselves and—more important—better music for the American people. That is what they plan to do with their tremendous share in the 100,000,000 records made this year.

Your guide to good
records and news of
the dance-band folk

IF JAN GARBER'S honeymoon had not run a day overtime, the chances are that he might still be sawing a fiddle. But because he took one day too many off for his honeymoon, his boss fired him. Whereupon Jan immediately organized an orchestra of his own and took all of the play away from his former director. Jan, who was educated at the University of North Carolina, also saw service in the army during the World War. It was there that he organized his first orchestra when it was learned that he had studied the violin at the Combs Conservatory in Philadelphia. After the war the Garber orchestra, which was a three-piece ensemble, played at various hotels, notably the Coral Gables in Miami, where they remained for four seasons. Chief feature of that Garber band was Jan's clowning, set to music, which went over in a big way with the "hotcha-minded" folk of the carefree Twenties. By 1930, however, the Garber offerings had gradually changed from red-hot jazz to a more dreamy and melodious brand of music. During this period the orchestra had also been enlarged by the addition of several outstanding musicians who are still with the band. Two of these, Lee Bennett, vocalist, and Freddie Large, sax, are featured attractions. To date the Garber band has played at many noted resorts and hotels, among them the Trianon Ballroom in Chicago, the Catalina Island Casino and Coconut Grove, Los Angeles. Members of the band are shown in the picture above as fol-

lows: Left to right (seated): Lee Bennett, vocalist; Al Powers, sax; George Fortier, sax; Jerry Large, sax; Freddie Large, sax; Muddy Berry, drums. The Garber band's theme song is "My Dear," written by little Freddie Large, saxophonist with Jan's orchestra. Theme, however, may have to be discarded in so far as radio broadcasts are concerned, since it was published by a music firm associated with ASCAP. After January 1 all ASCAP music was to be banned by most radio stations unless the controversy between them and the radio broadcasting industry was settled by then. But regardless of who bans whom, the Garber band will continue to play romantic music in the manner that has gained for them a wide following—and is this correspondent's nominee as the **BAND OF THE WEEK!** Next week: Ray Kinney.

Bandata

Xavier Cugat, the Latin-American music maestro, who replaced Bob Crosby January 2 for Camel cigarettes, is going to have to do some long-distance commuting pretty soon. His band will be playing in Miami, Florida, for several weeks, which means that Cugat will have to fly to New York for the broadcasts . . . Tommy Dorsey's chartered plane trip

from Los Angeles to New York on Friday the 13th, which was mentioned a couple of columns ago, proved very eventful. As a matter of fact the plane was grounded in El Paso, Texas, because of bad weather and he had to continue by train all the way to New York, arriving on Monday instead of the previous Friday . . . The news of Hal Kemp's death was a shock to this reporter, who knew him well. He was one of the grandest of all the baton-wavers and we're going to miss him tremendously along with many others . . . Lester Young, saxophonist with Count Basie's orchestra, refused to show up for a recording date on Friday the 13th, and kept the rest of the band waiting for hours until he was finally located asleep in his hotel room. P. S. Count Basie has a new sax-tooter.

There's talk of Benny Goodman making a feature film for Columbia pictures . . . Saw Artie Shaw's new movie, "Second Chorus." I still think he's a good clarinet player, but, as an actor, that's another story. For some reason or other the band sounded awfully loud and much too noisy, but don't let that prevent you from seeing the picture, because it's good entertainment — especially watching Paulette Goddard dance with Fred Astaire . . . The Cole Porter tune, "Make

It Another Old Fashioned, Please," from the Broadway show, "Panama Hattie," is tabu with networks as far as the lyric is concerned, because of the suggestion of liquor in the title . . . Russ Morgan is being panned by many, and deservedly so, for sending a wire to President Roosevelt suggesting WPA money be used to pay in part for use of ASCAP music on the air. What a brainstorm that was . . . News from the Music Front

ON CHRISTMAS EVE my hotel was in a dither. The desk-clerk was rapidly going into a decline from signing for countless packages. The telephone operator was seriously thinking of having an extra switchboard installed. The bellboys were trying to find out how to say "Merry Christmas" in Polish, and not succeeding. Later in the evening a troupe of musicians marched in, all dolled up in Polish national costumes, and vanished into the elevator. Up from the kitchen came steaming dishes, brought in from the Polish restaurant down the street. And the rest of the hotel staff hung around unobtrusively, hoping for a glimpse of the object of all this excitement.

He sat quietly up in his suite on the fifth floor. What his thoughts were on this Christmas Eve only he could tell. But that they were not happy is certain. The blue eyes that once gleamed fiery and brilliant are pale and dimmed. The mane of red-gold hair that once crowned the proud head is now a soft, silky fringe of white, straggling over his coat collar. His face is waxen pale and sad. The slender, beautiful hands, whose magic power once bewitched millions of people, are quiet and move only to turn the pages of a book, light a cigarette, sign a letter. No longer do they glide over the piano keys. For until Poland is free again, Ignace Jan Paderewski will not play. He has not made a vow to that effect, as has been published. He merely declares that the piano, his career, is no longer important to him. Since the invasion of Poland, Paderewski has dedicated himself to one thing: To send as much help as possible to his stricken country. Although he is making no public appearances and very few radio speeches, he hopes that his presence in America will bring together all factions of Polish-American organizations in order to intensify the aid that Poland must have. This year will mark the fiftieth anniversary of his first appearance in America. To commemorate it Mrs. Ernest Schelling, widow of the late Ernest Schelling, composer-pianist and friend and pupil of Paderewski, is organizing concerts in many cities, the proceeds of which will go to the Paderewski Fund for Polish Relief. Among other

things, the fund is feeding fifty thousand children in German-occupied Poland, with food bought in neutral countries, so that there may be no violation of the British blockade.

Paderewski has always been a welcome visitor over here, but sure proof of the place he holds in American affections was given him by over fifteen hundred Christmas greetings sent from all over the country, most of them with personal good-will messages. Packages from well-wishers filled the elevators, and hundreds of telephone calls came in all Christmas day.

He will read every message, slowly but thoroughly. And he will see to it that every one is answered, although he has been ill and can do very little. He still enjoys a cigarette and a glass of sweet champagne. He reads four and five newspapers a day, and all the newest books on politics and history.

Eighty years old, tired, his blazing artistic career a thing of the past, his foreign home closed and empty, his country overrun and enslaved, Paderewski, with his still-flaming belief in truth and its eventual triumph, is unquestionably one of the great figures of history, a living symbol of the faith and courage that the world so sorely needs.

A few weeks ago one of the leading New York music critics wrote about a young soprano making her Metropolitan Opera debut (as Leonore in "Il Trovatore"): "If Miss Greco had been born in Italy instead of in Greater New York, and had sung in a dozen European theaters, the beholder might have exclaimed as he nudged his neighbor, 'You see? There is an Italian singing! That's what they do in Italy!'" As it happens, the critic was not quite accurate. Norina Greco was born in Italy, but she has lived in New York since the age of eight. However, it is true that she sings like an operatic veteran instead of someone who made her debut in 1937. She has received all her training in America and is a live refutation of the belief that one must have European experience to sing in opera. She makes her air debut this Saturday in "Il Trovatore" and dial listeners will have a chance to hear the Met's newest successful star.—V. Liebling.

PERSISTENT RUMOR which Major Bawes has not confirmed or denied says that the Major wants to buy the New York Yankees. Rumor also has George Jessel forming a syndicate to buy the Brooklyn Dodgers.

CRIMINAL proceedings under the Sherman Anti-Trust Act against NBC, CBS, Broadcast Music, Inc., and ASCAP were authorized December 26 by United States Attorney General Jackson. The action followed the failure to settle a dispute between ASCAP and BMI, a rival music society set up by the broadcasters to combat ASCAP. The Justice Department will base prosecutions on these points: (1) The illegal pooling of most of the desirable copyright music available for radio broadcasting in order to eliminate competition and to monopolize the supply, (2) Illegal discrimination against users of copyright music, (3) Illegal discrimination against composers who are not members of ASCAP or BMI, (4) Withholding music from publication in order to exact fees not permitted by the copyright laws, (5) Illegal price-fixing, (6) Restraining composers in their right to bargain for the sale of their own music, (7) Requiring users of music to pay for tunes on programs in which no music is played, (8) Mutual boycotts by ASCAP and the two networks (through BMI) in an attempt by each to obtain for themselves control over the supply of music by depriving the others of control, which boycotts threaten to restrain and obstruct the rendition over the radio of about ninety percent of the desirable modern copyright music.

The Mutual Broadcasting System was not named, possibly due to the fact that this network is made up of a group of independent stations working on a cooperative basis.

Neville Miller, president of the National Association of Broadcasters, speaking for NBC and CBS, expressed surprise that the two networks should be named, pointing out that BMI was

formed by the association with some six hundred stations participating while NBC and CBS together hold only 17.1 of stock in BMI. Gene Buck, president of ASCAP, said the government's action regarding his society is regrettable but not a surprise. He said, however, that he was pleased that the indictment also names the two networks which he charged are monopolistic powers. The trial will start in Milwaukee this month.

Unfortunate Hissing

When Giovannella Infante, eleven-year-old daughter of the Italian Embassy military attache appeared before the mike on NBC's ninth annual International Children's Party on Christmas Eve, the audience hissed. When British subjects appeared, there was loud applause. This is perhaps the first time that a radio program has been so biased—but certainly unexpectedly so.

Stork News

The Teddy Bergmans (he's the Fred Allen actor who calls himself Allan Reed on "Quixie Doodle") are expecting a baby . . . Bill Quinn of the casts of "Woman of Courage" and "When a Girl Marries" is the father of a new baby girl, Virginia Lillian . . . Eugene King of Mutual's "Dance-land" is now a father—a seven-pound thirteen-ounce girl. "What time was the birth?" King asked the doctor. "About 7:30," replied the doctor. King, used to radio's precise timing, insisted "I want the exact time." "In that case," said the doctor, consulting his records, "you became a father at exactly 7:30:22 p.m. EST."

Unusual Gifts and Cards

It may interest listeners to know what some of the artists gave as Christmas presents, and the kind of cards they sent out. Major Edward Bowes gave tiny silver aspirin boxes.

Parks Johnson of "Vox Pop" gave large baskets of grapefruit from his Texas farm. Gertrude Berg sent cufflinks and tie-clasps to the men. Raymond Paige sent autographed albums of his recorded music. Mutual gave radio editors a large red stocking containing a gift from each sponsor with a program on that network. The sponsor of Jack Benny, Kate Smith, "Maxwell House Coffee Time" and other programs advertising foods sent a large box of those foods. The most unusual gift to this correspondent came from the boys and girls who handle publicity for Jack Benny, Eddie Cantor, Kate Smith, "We, the People," Helen Hayes and other programs. It was a check made out to the New York Institute for the Education of the Blind, a school for blind children where this writer teaches journalism one night a week. The check goes toward a swimming-pool fund so the children can get a little fun out of life.

Nila Mack Burned

Nila Mack, guiding light of "Let's Pretend" and other CBS kid shows, was seriously burned Christmas Eve as paper she used for wrapping gifts caught fire. She was taken to Roosevelt Hospital for first aid, then removed to her Manhattan apartment . . . Organist Dick Leibert of "Big Sister" and "Radio City Music Hall of the Air" injured a leg while skating . . . Allen C. Anthony, "Doctor I. Q." announcer, has three cracked ribs, the result of a fall on ice.

SWITZERLAND TELLS THE WORLD

SWITZERLAND is at present an island surrounded and almost engulfed by ever-rising waves of Nazi domination. Cut off entirely from the democracies, its lofty snow-capped peaks still rise serene and calm amid turbulent and distressing scenes such as these ageless guardians of Swiss integrity have never before witnessed. At the base of these majestic Alpine mountains lies Lake Geneva, its placid waters, sparkling and blue, still untainted by the blood of Swiss soldiers. Perched high on a hill overlooking this peaceful scene is a huge, ornate edifice—the Palace of the League of Nations, its spacious halls once glittering with diplomatic pomp and splendor, now silent, dark, almost ghostly, a monument to a noble experiment that failed. Near by at Prangins stand the powerful twin 20,000-watt short-wave transmitters of the League of Nations. Built to broadcast news concerning the activities of the League to the world, these stations once were of great diplomatic importance. Today, with no League activities to report, the facilities of the stations have been taken over by the Swiss government for regular broadcasts to the outside world. They are the "Voice of Switzerland," feeble but still independent.

Swiss international broadcasts, which originate in studios in Berne, are broadcast weekly as follows (time is Eastern Standard):

To South America, over HBO (11.402), Mondays and Wednesdays, 6:45 to 8:10 p.m.

To North America, over HBO (11.402) and HBL (9.345), Mondays and Wednesdays, 8:45 to 10:10 p.m.

To Africa, over HBO (11.402), Tuesdays and Saturdays, 12:45 to 2:10 p.m.

To the Orient, over HBH (18.48), Wednesdays, 8:45 to 10:10 a.m.

To Australia, over HBO (11.402) and HBJ (14.535), first Sunday of month, 12:45 to 1:10 a.m.

The Monday night broadcast to North America, intended primarily for Swiss nationals in Canada and

the United States, is announced entirely in Swiss and Italian. The Wednesday night broadcast to North America, planned to keep all Canadian and United States listeners informed concerning events in Switzerland, is announced in English. An English news bulletin is broadcast at 9:00 p.m.; an economic report at 9:45 p.m. EST. The balance of the program is composed of delightful Swiss folk-music, yodels and choral selections. A few bars of the selection "O Mein Heimatland" (O My Home) introduce the broadcast.

In addition to these regular broadcasts, war pick-ups from the Balkans for American networks are often transmitted over one or more of the League stations. Telephoned from the Balkan capitals to Geneva, these broadcasts are usually radiated over one of these frequencies: HBJ (14.535), HBL (9.345) or HBQ (6.675).

A little more than two years ago, when the League transmitters were still busily engaged with diplomatic broadcasts, the Swiss government decided to erect its own 25,000-watt short-wave station at Schwarzenburg; it is used now almost exclusively for radiophone and wireless communication instead of international broadcasting. This station, known as "Radio Suisse," and under control of the "Servicio D' Information de L'Agence Telegraphique Suisse" does broadcast to European listeners according to the following limited schedule: From 6:00 to 6:45 a.m. on 11.865 megs, and from 1:30 to 4:30 p.m. EST on 6.165 megs; news in English being broadcast at 6:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. EST. These broadcasts are non-directional and not intended for reception in the outside world, but they nevertheless have been picked up repeatedly in this country and even as far away as in Australia. Reports on reception of this station are being verified with an attractive scenic postal card. Listeners holding this card are lucky, as mail must cross through the occupied war zones both coming and going.

GENERAL NOTES: Westinghouse station WPIT, formerly in Pittsburgh, is now located at Boston, where it inaugurated its new 50,000-watt transmitter on December 16. Studios are at 275 Tremont Street. Six frequencies have been assigned to WPIT but at present broadcasts are being made on 11.87 megs only. . . LLH (9.645), Oslo, Norway, is on the air and broadcasts daily from 5:40 to 7:00 a.m. and from 12:30 to 4:30 p.m. EST. The identification is "Oslo Radio," and according to Robert Skyten of East Brookfield, Mass., the interval signal is a music-box tune. . . No chances were taken with King George VI's personal safety when he broadcast on Christmas Oay to a world-wide audience. The microphone location was a closely kept secret; even his own subjects in Great Britain were told only that he would speak from "somewhere in England," and all precautions were taken to protect the King's person from the attention of Nazi bombers.

as a youngster and the friends he made there are still his pals. He'd always ask them what they wanted him to bring the next time he came back. And he always brought what they asked."

Lee Stewart was Bob Hope's first theatrical agent. He has known Bob from the famous peanut days. He tells us:

"Bob Hope has had a terrific sense of humor from the first day I ever met him. But that's not what stands out in my mind. It's his courage. Somehow, people don't associate courage with Bob but he has more of it than anybody I've ever known.

"A sort of courage that's too deep-rooted to be seen at first glance. Courage that hides under a laugh and a pat on the back is a rare commodity.

"I want to tell you about what I think is real courage. Bob's first big New York show was 'Ballyhoo.' It was a tremendous review that opened at Nixon's Theater on the pier in Atlantic City. The opening night there were so many scenes that the lights became fouled somehow and wouldn't work. Bob was at high tension, and scared. Yet he walked out there and entertained that audience for a solid hour, ad libbing and kidding till the lights were fixed. If you don't think that takes courage, you should see actors sweat and run cold chills opening nights. And that was Bob's first show.

"He was playing at the Palace at Cleveland when I told him he was to go into the Palace at New York the next week. Going into the Palace at New York, the actors' mecca, gives nine players out of ten a case of heebie-jeebies. Even the old-timers are nervous at the thought.

"Bob was excited, enthused, nervous and plain scared. Before the close of his Cleveland week he was on the edge of a nervous breakdown. But his courage was hitting on all twelve. In spite of his nervousness, he was determined to do something sensational.

"'We gotta get a gag,' he kept telling me. 'I gotta have something to carry me. I gotta do something good.'

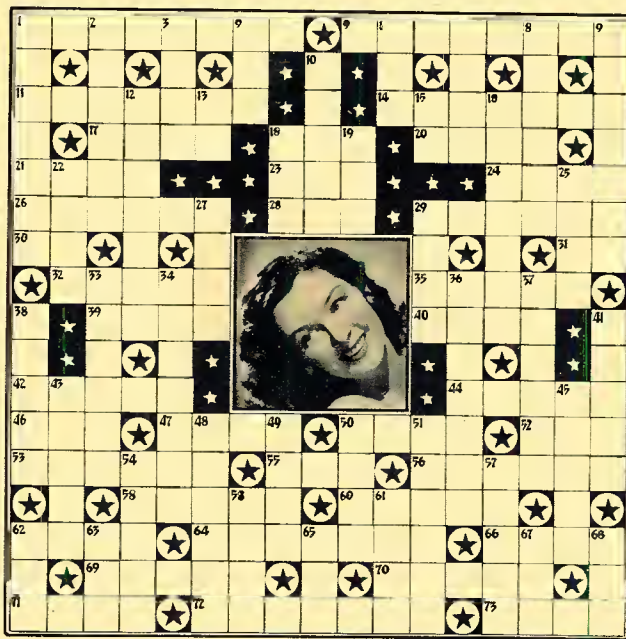

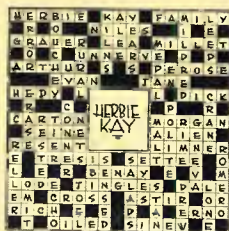

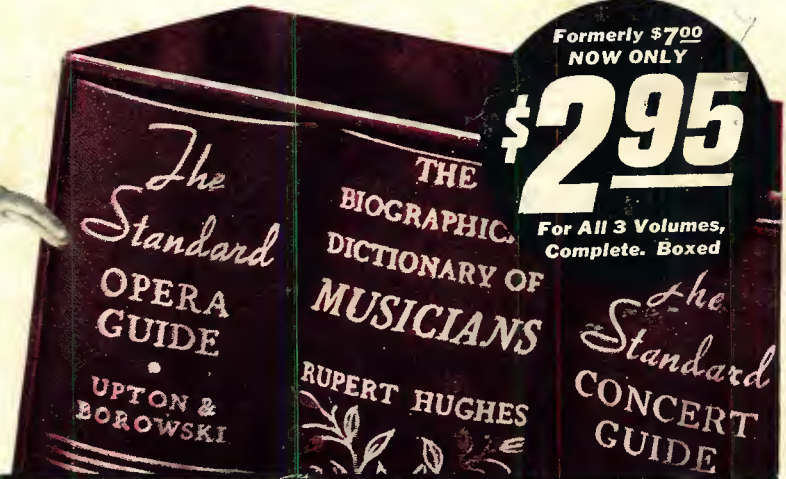
