## To Our Readers

THESE are times of great transition. Today's events, important and significant, are tomorrow's vague memories. now reports the news of both. To those of us more closely interested in radio, it is gratifying to note that when Hollywood gathered to honor its distinguished citizens, the highest award went to a radio comedian. We speak of Bob Hope, who on the evening of the Academy Award banquet was presented with a plaque bearing the inscription "For Achievement in Humanities." Never has an entertainer been more sincere and generous than Bob Hope in giving endlessly of his time to aid the less fortunate. The honor bestowed upon him means that he has put heart in Hollywood and "hope" into the lives of millions.

# "TALL-DARK

The Cisco Kid is a Latin from Manhattan. Meet Cesar Romero, who sings soprano but answers to the name of "Butch"

**S**ENOR CESAR JULIO ROMERO, the Cisco Kid, can sing soprano and his friends call him "Butch." At thirty-four he's still a mama's boy, but he'll pin your ears back if you laugh at him about it, then regret his loss of poise and display of temper, and be your friend for life if you'll let him.

Mr. Romero is almost too genuine, too human, to work in Suetown, a good name for Hollywood, where friendships often are assessed at their publicity value and a knife in the back is so common that the expression is not even hyphenated. There is nothing phony about him. He uses his real name and is really a Latin from Manhattan. He was born in New York on February 15, 1907, the eldest child of a Cuban exporter and Maria Mantilla, a Cuban concert singer.

As a young man he had looks, family name, poise and not much money.

His fan mail proves that he is one of the most popular bachelors in the business and 20th Century-Fox pays him two thousand a week to break hearts, yet he seldom gets his gal. He is tops in his field and when asked how he got to the top he shrugged his shoulders and said, "A little brazen, a little humbug here and there."

His very intelligent mother says he's always had the happy faculty of making friends with "lovely people," which probably means the right people.

A combination of brass, humbug and the right people is hard to beat. Add to that Mr. Romero's good looks, his good brain and his bachelorhood and you've got a winner.

His earliest disappointment was when his father refused to let him sing in the Metropolitan Opera House Boys' Chorus. He was eight then, and his father didn't want him to have any truck with show business. After a bout with private schools he got a job as a bank-runner, which doesn't mean you run the bank but rather that the bank runs you. He also ran errands for a dress shop.

He never had much money then, but he had clothes and looks and a way of being seen at the right places. He was a top-hand dancer and with his hair slicked down he was the kind of fellow who made ladies stare. New York cafe society of the gilt-and-goofy era usually was so full of bathtub gin that

it accepted Mr. Romero as a foreign dignitary, although he never said he was. He didn't have to. All he had to do was to have his elaborate name presented, then glide across the floor in tails and white tie, and the besotted imagination of society did the rest.

One night at a New York club he danced with a deb. The next day as a runner for a store he called at the lady's house and took back the dress she had worn at the party. He never gave the lady away.

As a young man he crashed New York society and laughed at it. Many a deb listened to the elegant gentleman pour sweet nothings in their pink and perfumed ears without knowing that he was an errand boy. One night he danced with Lisbeth Higgins and then became her dancing partner at the Park Central roof. That led to musical productions and thence Hollywood.

He often was broke in New York but never told his family. His father objected to his son being an actor, so Mr. Romero never cried for help, even when his stomach was begging for vitamins. He once lived in a cheap hotel with John O'Hara, the author, and the two of them cut some wild capers. Today Mr. O'Hara uses his typewriter as an easel and paints society in all of its ugliness and cock-eyedness. He learned about it back when he was kidding society with Romero.

**T**HEY pooled their money and lived on vegetables and salads. They crashed one of Cholly Knickerbocker's balls. The verbose Cholly really is Maury Paul, society editor of Hearst newspapers. Romero and O'Hara put on toppers and slipped up a fire escape to the party. They entered the ballroom behind a corps of bartenders and it was Mr. Paul who told Romero to grab a partner and dance.

After musicals he worked in several Broadway productions and in 1934 M-G-M took him to Hollywood for a spot in "The Thin Man." He borrowed \$140 to go to California but he had a three months' guarantee from the studio. Mr. Romero is a smart boy in money matters.

When he saw himself in "The Thin Man" he told his mother, "If my career depends on that picture, then I'm through right now."

But his mother encouraged him. She always has. She likes to tell that as a beginner he went hungry in New York while dancing with Junior Leaguers who took him partying between meals. She says his first public appearance was in a school minstrel where he sang "Silver Threads Among the Gold." He still has a nice soprano voice. He never had a lesson in acting and his first ambition was to be a farmer.

Early in life Mr. Romero acquired the habit of saying yes. A producer asked him if he'd ever been on the stage and he said yes before he'd had a lick of experience.

After his debut in pictures he worked from one studio to another until 20th Century-Fox tied him to a long contract when he clicked with Shirley Temple in "Wee Willie Winkie." Then he became the Cisco Kid and was typed. He tried to untype himself in his latest job, "Tall, Dark and Handsome." He did a pretty good job of it.

**H**E STARS in that show and actually gets the girl, a new experience for him. As a matter of fact, it's the first time he ever gets the girl, and he and his beautiful bride begin their honeymoon in a locked compartment on a train. The bride says they'll have to stay in the locked compartment for quite a while and Mr. Romero says, "Have you got a deck of cards?"

Hollywood says that's Mr. Romero in life.

This writer doesn't believe it. Mr. Romero is a gentleman but so was Solomon and he didn't play solitaire all the time. He had too much sense.

Although Mr. Romero has been typed as the Cisco Kid, he has worked in thirty-four movies and only five of them have been Ciscos. His predecessor in these roles—and the original cinema Cisco Kid—was Warner Baxter, who played them straight and with an emphasis on romance. The original idea in casting Cesar in the new series was to play the Keed lightly and with a more than delicate touch of humor. To date, the humor has been provided largely by Cris-Pin Martin, and Cesar has provided a wealth of romance—enough to make young girls keep coming back for sequels in the series.

In his early days he wore no mustache and was called the second Valentino and hated it. His mother dislikes the gangster roles, but Romero thinks they're valuable for character work. His favorite role was when he was leading man to Marlene Dietrich in "The Devil Is a Woman."

This will be his biggest year. His contract calls for two thousand a week and he will do only a limited number of Cisco jobs. He has just finished "Ride On, Vaquero." Interviewed on the set, he was wearing his gray-and-silver Cisco Kid costume and was astride his magnificent black horse. In the middle of the shot a prop caught fire and, while the studio fire department worked on it, Mr. Romero was unperturbed. He invited some friends into his "padded cell," which

is just that, for since he has reached stardom his dressing-room is the trailer built for Simone Simon. The walls are of quilted lemon satin. Mr. Cesar Romero, in muddy boots and spurs, is quite out of place in the "padded cell."

He likes his work but he never takes himself seriously. He usually passes off his pictures with a shrug of his shoulders. Making pictures is a job to him and he does the best he can. "If I was out of movies tomorrow, I don't know what I'd do," he said.

A Cuban gentleman, although he's never been in Cuba, Mr. Romero lives in an eighteen-thousand-dollar Cape Cod house in Brentwood, a neighbor to Mr. and Mrs. Tyrone Power. The house, rather incongruous in the monotonous sunshine of southern California, has two very interesting rooms or, correctly, suites. One is a big suite wholly vacant, without even wallpaper. Presumably it is for a bride, if and when. The other is a combination bathroom-clubroom-reading-room. It has everything except a bathtub. Mr. Romero hasn't taken a tub bath in years, only showers.

His living-room has a New England fireplace, but never a fire. The room is brown and deep blue.

He sleeps in a four-poster bed and hates striped pajamas. Under the ash-tray by his bed is a naughty French verse.

The house is filled with gifts from friends . . . a kitten and a puppy from the Powers, a hooked rug from his sister, Maria, some book-ends from the Ray Millands, some old prints from the Fred MacMurrays, lace doilies from Joan Crawford, and silver corks from another friend. He keeps a manservant and the man's wife helps out for parties. He entertains only eight for dinner, but prefers six because he has only six of everything. When he entertains eight he has to borrow cups, saucers, etc. His favorite set of dishes is his breakfast set, left by a former houseboy who won them in a raffle.

He likes to sleep late but is always punctual. Bachelor-like he breakfasts on orange juice, bacon, eggs and coffee. His servant always puts the morning paper by his plate, but he never reads it until night.

When not working he takes long drives in his maroon Buick, or long walks. He likes horses and swimming. He bowls well, usually with Fred MacMurray and Gary Cooper. He never goes to races and often goes stag to night-clubs.

Before he got his own house he lived in an apartment close to his family. The family is clannish, as Latins usually are, and Mr. Romero still goes to his mother for advice. Mrs. Romero is in the Hollywood swim and a member of the Motion Picture Mothers Society. His father is a polished Cuban who greets all visitors with "Do you speak Spanish?"

Brother Edward, twenty-one, is a student at the University of Southern California. Brother Cesar reads the tabs. Sister Maria reads material for 20th Century-Fox and once taught

school. Sister Graciela is married, lives in New York and has a son whom Cesar has never seen.

Cesar sees his family every day that he's in town. His studio publicity pours on the glamour, but at home Mr. Romero is still Junior.

The man is better-looking off the screen than on it. There is a refined quality about him that doesn't register on film. In pictures, his features are somewhat coarse and the Spanish and gangster roles do not help, but actually the man is a splendid-looking specimen.

He has no excesses and is not a faddist. He has a collection of bull-fight posters and model bulls. He reads the Book-of-the-Month-Club sort of thing and his library is filled with modern best-sellers. He hates to write letters and seldom does. He plays the piano well and still dances well.

**M**R. ROMERO seldom goes to New York. He likes Springfield, Ill., because he went there for a premiere. He always cooperates with the studio and doesn't object to posing for stills. "It's part of the job," he says, and lets it go at that.

A magazine once said, "It means as much to an actress to be seen with Romero as it means to a piano to be seen with Paderewski." He has never been in a scandal, and although he goes with many women his excellent reputation is proof of his tact.

He snaps his fingers when he's nervous. Waitresses at the studio voted him the number one customer for leaving generous tips. He seldom eats desserts and always wears suspenders. His usual get-up is a sports coat and an open-neck sports shirt and slacks. He has two pipes but always smokes cigarettes.

Mr. Romero's philosophy is, "Some-

thing will always happen, so why worry? Hold on to what you have and do your best."

Soft-hearted and cosmopolitan, he never criticizes his friends and therefore has no enemies, not real ones anyway.

He almost died of typhoid and since his illness he has become a rather serious fellow and judges the spiritual values of life. He is not quite so agog over the fame business as he once was and he seems to realize that fame and wealth and all things pass.

Mr. Romero is Hollywood's number three appeal for women. He is the most eligible bachelor in the business and is definitely looking for a wife. His mother says, "There is no one yet and he's promised I will be the first to know."

She says she is sure he will not marry a career girl because he will want to be the head of his home and will want children.

Recently he said, "Maybe I did find the right girl once, but if she didn't say yes that was her business, wasn't it?"

His ideal girl must be beautiful, affectionate and, above all, adaptable. He notices a woman's feet first and likes little feet. He is a perfect extra man to call at the eleventh hour and he escorts ladies whose husbands are out of town. He also escorts ladies between marriages.

Any girl expecting a romantic date with Mr. Romero is apt to wind up in the bosom of some Brentwood family gathering, making toast in the kitchen.

He seems to get a kick out of rolling off the names of his family—Cesar Julio, Maria Teresa, Maria Mantilla, Graciela, then he'll always tell you, "My stand-in's name is Joe Smith."

And he has to steal scenes from the amazing Brazilian stiek of dynamite, Carmen Miranda, to do it. Alice Faye, the other star, has never looked more delectable nor acted better in her long screen career.

The double-talk about Ameche at the opening of this review is explained by the statement that Don has a double part, (1) the American entertainer Larry Martin, and (2) the Brazilian financier, Baron Negreti. As Martin, he gets Miranda; as the baron, he woos and wins back his wife's cooling affections. So Ameche stops being the guy who loses the gal and in one big scoop becomes two guys who gets both gals!

"That Night in Rio" is just so good that the blase first-string Hollywood critics broke out in a rash of spontaneous applause—not once but several times—a breach of cold-blooded critic etiquette.

Murder, chills, fun, music lend spice to the new film offerings

### "A Girl, a Guy and a Gob"

Cast: George Murphy, Lucille Ball, Edmond O'Brien, Henry Travers, Franklin Pangborn, George Cleveland, Kathleen Howard, Marguerite Chapman, Lloyd Corrigan, Mady Correll, Frank McGlynn, Sr., Doodles Weaver, et al. An RKO-Radio picture, produced by Harold Lloyd; directed by Richard Wallace, who also directed "The Underpup."

FOR a fast-action slapstick comedy, salted with chuckles and peppered by laughs, Harold Lloyd's production, "A Girl, a Guy and a Gob" (in which he does not appear), will be hard to beat.

George Murphy was never funnier than in this part as a fast-talking, quick-promoting sailor. Lucille Ball gets her first big chance as his girl and Steve Herrick's secretary, and Edmond O'Brien, who plays her boss, Herrick, is introduced to the screen as a most talented and handsome young leading man—one the screen can use again to advantage.

The harum-scarum story, which is reminiscent at times of Frank Capra's "You Can't Take It With You," is disconnected and jerky as a result of the many gag situations inserted, but basically it tells the story of gob Murphy, his excruciatingly funny attempts to earn enough money to buy an engagement ring for his girl, Lucille Ball, and the comical eight-balls behind which she gets her boss, O'Brien, when he, she and her boy friend, Murphy, become a threesome. O'Brien has the time of his life, finally breaks with his socially elegant fiancée and her mother, and wakes up just in time to realize that he too is truly in love with Miss Ball.

Aiding the Murphy-Ball-O'Brien trio most effectively in their laugh-making are the supporting and incidental performances of Henry Travers, Franklin Pangborn, George Cleveland, Kathleen Howard, Lloyd Corrigan, Mady Correll, Frank McGlynn, Sr., Doodles Weaver and Marguerite Chapman.

Take Grandma, Grandpa and the kids to this show and let them laugh themselves to tears.

"RAGE IN HEAVEN" is a chilling thriller about a homicidal paranoid (somewhat crazy person who is plotting murders) which is okay fare for mystery lovers and the married folk who suspect their mates of being slightly off their foundations, but it decidedly is not the proper menu to order for the kids.

Robert Montgomery plays the insane hero, Philip Monrell, most skillfully. Ingrid Bergman, that apt Swedish importation, has the part of his wife, and with it adds new laurels to her acting credits. George Sanders, whose feminine fans are legion, portrays friend Ward Andrews most heroically, and all in all the performances rendered by the stars and the supporting cast, including Lucile Watson, Oscar Homolka and Philip Merivale, are every one of them good.

However, this is a strange sort of story based on James Hilton's novel, and one over which audience interest is apt to be divided pro and con.

Its suspense builds up gradually and to a grand and jittery climax, which has the movie-goer on the edge of his seat. Roughly, Monrell weds a girl of fine character and understanding (Miss Bergman) but his paranoid tendencies cause him to become jealous over the misconceived notion that his best friend, Andrews (Sanders), and his wife are in love. From that point on he gradually builds up a plan to torture and persecute his wife and chum, and finally plots his own

death, manufacturing false evidence that Andrews murdered him.

By this time you have chewed the nails off nine of your fingers, Dr. Rameau (Oscar Homolka) comes charging to the rescue, saves your tenth finger for the next Karloff killing.

ERROL FLYNN wears modern business clothes for a change in this comedy-crime mystery, which alternates entertainingly between thrills and laughs.

Somewhat like Bill Powell in the "Thin Man" series, Flynn plays Francis Warren, who lives the double life of an investment counselor and, unknown to his wife and mother-in-law, is writing detective novels under a nom de plume. Brenda Marshall is most attractive and beautiful in her part as his wife, Rita. Warren's pen name is Pettijohn, and under that name, in a hideaway with his chauffeur, Wilfred (Allen Jenkins), he does the research for and writing of his mystery novels.

Fun begins when he turns to real sleuthing, works out a novel and gripping solution to a murder.

Ralph Bellamy does a splendid dramatic role as Dr. Davis, a dentist. Lee Patrick plays Blondie White, a burlesque-show singer, most believably.

Last week Geraldine Fitzgerald's stormy childhood was described in *MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE*. Her fights in school, her life in a convent, her struggle to become an artist were related in detail. Learning she had no talent for painting, she suddenly decided to become an actress. But this is more than the story of Miss Fitzgerald's professional career. It is the deeper tale of a woman's love and life and dreams and ambitions. It is an expression—and a vivid one—of what is in every woman's heart. And because the inner longings of Miss Fitzgerald are so universally held by others, we bring them to you here as an important human document.—Editor.

**G**ERALDINE FITZGERALD reasoned it out when daylight came. She'd always been an actress "from the time I strutted in primary school, challenging boys in my brother's sweater, to my silly posing as an accomplished artist."

Impulsive, she went right after a theatrical job. London laughed at her. At one window (she was so green that she asked for stage work at ticket offices) a young man thoughtfully stacked and restacked three shillings. "It's nice to hear you talk. So full of hope and all. You won't have much luck here, I'm afraid. We went bankrupt this morning."

Two jolts awaited her when, defeated, she arrived—one cold, rainy afternoon—on the Dublin dock. First, family and friends regarded her theatrical ambition as just another vagary in an unstable girl. Second (though first in point of time), her heart went flip-flop at the sight of a brown-eyed, handsome boy who happened to accompany her brother to the dock. He had been her brother's pal a year before Geraldine went to London; she had been too deep in the art craze to notice him. Now sight of him drove the London man completely out of her mind. As for him, what would you expect? He was a tall, athletic, country-loving young man, a crack steeplechaser and in love with life; she was a skinny, almost emaciated girl, with her nature a bundle of

nerves, her eyes dark-ringed and tragic, her bitter sense of defeat throwing up a defense of rudeness, and her temper snapping like a turtle whose shell didn't fit. Edward Lindsay-Hogg eyed his friend's sister with healthy disapproval. He felt vaguely sorry for her, more sorry for her family!

Geraldine's first piece of luck came to the fore in having Shelah Richards, the Abbey Theater actress, as an aunt. In spite of the Fitzgeralds' general skepticism, Miss Richards said to the pale, jumpy girl, "I'll work with you."

Since trying to fight all the big boys in primary school, disappointments had taught eighteen-year-old Geraldine that you can't conquer life merely by flinging yourself at it. Now she was to learn a specific lesson: Stage work isn't all fire, posture and self-expression.

For five months Miss Richards compelled her pupil to read important Shakespeare speeches *without a shade of expression in a single word*. "What's the use of expression," Miss Richards would demand, "if nobody hears you clearly beyond the fourth row?" Geraldine remembers: "My voice, from nerves, had gone high and fluty. To modulate it, to project it without shrilling, to enunciate clearly—that was the daily lesson. All those lovely phrases in which I wanted to put 'soul'—and all I heard was, 'Clearly, please. Pronounce clearly!'"

To make things seem more drab, Edward Lindsay-Hogg, the handsome young man of the Dublin docks, went

away—to be gone a year—and scarcely noticed Geraldine the day he came to bid the Fitzgeralds good-bye!

Geraldine had pluck. She stuck it out.

The theatrical managers around Dublin knew the girl's reputation for flightiness. They'd say, "Yes, yes. We'll call her when we have a part." And forgot it!

Even Shelah Richards was never able to get her niece so much as a bit part in the Abbey.

One day in 1935, however, the stubborn and still hard-working youngster tagged along with her aunt on a casual visit to a Gate Theater rehearsal. (The Gate, younger than the Abbey, has a tradition and pride of its own.) Hilton Edwards, the Gate's director (noted for absent-mindedness), rushed forward toward the surprised girl.

## FOR FUN AND FIGHT

Love, success, fame—Geraldine Fitzgerald took each in her stride

"There you are!" he cried to Geraldine. "I've been waiting for you. Terribly sorry . . . only a bit part this time . . . but, if you'll play it for me, I'll do better next time."

Geraldine, whose conceit had long since vanished, knew Hilton Edwards was mistaking her for someone else. She rallied her wits: "Quite all right about the small part!" He handed her two sides of dialog. She says, "My hands shook. Shelah stood looking amused—too amused to be of any help."

**W**HEN, after much art training, Geraldine had been trying to do commercial drawing and painting in London, critics and advertising executives had agreed, "You know how, but something's missing. Your work doesn't come alive." Now, in the field for which by nature she was fitted, her abundant warmth and vitality found full expression.

Within three months the Gate's newcomer was cast as Isabella in "Wuthering Heights." Dublin critics grew excited; soon London called her to the films; "The Turn of the Tide," about Gloucester fishing folk, proved a fine picture; her next seemed to her so bad that she debated leaving the screen permanently! ("Besides," she recalls, "all the parts offered me at the moment were the type in which I entered via a staircase, inquiring brightly, 'Daddy, may I take the car for a bit of a spin today?'" )

At this vital moment, Edward Lindsay-Hogg, returning from his year

abroad, stopped off in London and, as a family courtesy, called on his friend's sister. He must have rubbed his eyes! She had taken on adequate weight; her eyes were clear and full of liveliness; her whole bearing was one of poise and enjoyment of life. (It's pretty nice, when you think of "retiring" from the screen, to know that there's a Gate Theater to welcome you home.) The fluty voice that "peeped like a young chick" was now normal and vibrant.

**A**LL this, plus the russet hair and violet eyes, greeted a young steeplechaser who had always taken his hurdles without hesitation. He and Geraldine were married two weeks from the day he reached London!

The further steps are widely known: Trip to America; introduction by friends to Orson Welles (an old Gate graduate); fixing of the bride with an impresario's eye by Orson; stardom as Ellie Dunn in "Heartbreak House"; Hollywood talent-scouts arriving in phalanx. When Geraldine signed, she reserved six months of each year to pursue music (Edward's a composer, too) or hunt horses with her husband. "The time will come in handy," she added, "for having babies."

The young actress' original Hollywood belligerency was caused by strange warnings she had had. "I firmly believed that make-up men had the authority to tear out a piece of flesh from one place and attach it to another. Publicity men, I had been assured, were an actress' natural enemies, conspiring to destroy her. Producers—!"

Even if Hollywood had been such a town, Geraldine's warmth would have won it over. Quick in appreciation, loyal in friendships, active (without publicity) in charitable work, she soon came to be regarded as one of the best—with one proviso: Respect her privacy!

"What's your nickname?" I asked. "Surely they didn't call you Geraldine around the house."

"I think everyone's entitled to his own name," she flared. "I hate nicknames. I'm sorry. I won't tell you."

"But you did have one?"

"My family were very bold to call me out of my right name. I won't have it repeated. I think Geraldine's a lovely name."

We compromised, as the reader has noted. I call her Geraldine!

Miss Fitzgerald's (how's that!) mercurial temperament reacts sharply to physical surroundings. She hates rainy days. Certain colors—mauves and the darker blues, purples with red predominant—depress her; she never wears them. Yellows, light blues and light green bring her cheerfulness. She's really a sunny soul—though a little mixed!

"With a husband, a baby, a home and friends"—Geraldine shakes her cloud of autumn-glory hair—"and the work I want to do, I'm so happy I scarcely dare speak of it. It all comes, believe me, of getting on the right track. So often friends or family, or your own conceit, just jolly you along. Think"—a superstitious shiver—"what would have happened to me, or what wouldn't have happened, except for some lucky accidents!"

A thunderstorm, a toothache, the bold truth from her painting-teacher that she had no talent get the credit.

A fighting character and the honesty to face facts helped out!

## THIS TOO IS HOLLYWOOD

LOCATED on the Sunset Strip, a short distance from where the once famous Trocadero held forth is the Mocambo, Hollywood's latest favored night-spot. The growing importance of the Mocambo as a rendezvous of stars is best shown by the fact that it is considered serious competition for Ciro's. Decorated in the Latin-American motif, it has brilliant, red terra-cotta walls with bright-colored murals, brilliant tin shields, and chrome, hand-wrought rosettes hung about with drapery of a dusty blue. Behind the bandstand, however, is Mocambo's crowning touch—a glass-enclosed aviary where tropical birds flit from one bright tropical tree to another against a blue-sky background. The restaurant is owned by Charley Morrison. Two bands supply music for the dancing feet of the famous—Phil Ohman's orchestra supplying American waltzes and fox trots; Humberto and his Music from Brazil offering rumbas, congas and sambas. Cover charge is usually \$1.50, but is shoved up to three dollars on occasion.

There is no more artful and affecting Italian opera music than Verdi's "Aida" and no more compact or convincing libretto, with its tragically passionate love-story.

The action is laid in Memphis, Egypt, during the epoch of the Pharaohs. In Act I a young warrior, Radames, is chosen to lead the army against the warring Ethiopians. Previously he has fallen in love with the slave Aida, companion to Amneris (daughter of the King), but is himself the object of that princess' adoration, even though she has already sus-

pected his preference for her rival.

Act II: Amneris knows that Radames is returning victorious and she decks herself finely to charm him. Telling Aida that he has fallen in battle, Amneris tricks the anguished girl into confessing her love and taunts her cruelly. The second scene is the triumphant processional entry of Radames, bringing back a band of prisoners, among whom Aida recognizes her father, Amonasro, King of Ethiopia, whose identity is not known to his captor. The Egyptian King asks Radames to name his own reward, and he asks that the lives of the prisoners be spared, despite Ramfis' demand for their death. Radames' request is granted, and in addition the hand of Amneris is bestowed upon him and the King names him his heir.

Aida secretly goes to meet Radames for a final tryst. Amonasro overtakes her and urges his daughter to find out from her lover the intended movements of the Egyptian army, but she refuses. Radames appears; Amonasro, in hiding, hearing him tell Aida his military plans, discloses himself and urges the young commander to join the Ethiopians and claim Aida as his bride. Radames resists the temptation. Amneris, returning from the temple, comes upon the group and denounces them to Ramfis and his guards, who take Radames prisoner after he has aided Aida and her father to escape.

In the last act, Amneris has Radames brought from his cell and promises to help him to freedom if he renounces Aida, but he remains obdurate and the princess leaves him to his doom, to be buried alive for his supposed treason. The concluding two-storied scene takes place in the temple and beneath its floor. The priestesses chant while the entombed Radames resigns himself to his fate. From the shadows creeps Aida, who has gained entrance to the cellared chamber in order to die with her beloved. They perish in each other's arms while above them the despairing Amneris kneels in repentant prayer.

Did you ever see one kid tease another by offering him a balloon and then bursting it in his face? Or were you ever invited to a party on numerous occasions and have it called off each time because the host had something else to do?

That's what happens with a lot of sustaining radio shows. And sustaining shows, many listeners think, are very frequently the better shows. They are often, too, the trail-blazing shows, the daring, imaginative, alert explorers. Such a show is the NBC feature, only a few months old, called "Story Dramas by Olmsted." And as such—as a sustaining show subject to cancellation for special programs—it falls regrettably into the category of the bursting balloon and the canceled party.

Tune in Monday night, and, if you hear this program at all, you'll hear Olmsted's presentation of Robert Louis Stevenson's story "A Lodging for the Night." Tune in Tuesday night, and it's quite likely you'll hear something entirely different from the "Story Dramas." The program is supposed to be on Mondays and Tuesdays, but has been canceled too often for special programs. It is too bad that sustaining shows have to suffer from the exigencies of radio. But in spite of this situation, Olmsted and his "Story Dramas" have built a substantial following and attracted notable comment.

The young actor promises to go far. He should. He has revived the art of story-telling, which in radio has been almost consigned to oblivion by the prevalence of the dialog dramatic form. His understanding, expert monolog presentations of the world's great short stories are real radio entertainment—projected entertainment.

If you can catch him when he's on—discover Olmsted with us.

## ON THE BANDWAGON

**W**HEN, as a college student, Clyde Lucas scored ninety-three points on a psychology test, he suddenly discovered that he wanted to be a musician, not an engineer. Previous to the test Clyde had dabbled around in music, but had refused to take his musical inclinations seriously. His talent, by the way, comes from his mother, Mrs. Maude Lucas, who as a young girl learned to play the banjo, mandolin and violin. Clyde's career as a bandleader started in Hollywood, where from 1924 to 1932 he built bands for the movies. In the deep of the depression he formed an orchestra of his own, appeared for thirteen weeks on a program called "Hollywood of the Air," and afterwards toured to Chicago, where he was booked into several of the Windy City's leading hostelrys. His New York debut was at the popular Hotel New Yorker, this being succeeded by an engagement at the Paramount Theater. A long string of theater appearances in key cities throughout the East and South followed. The theater tour ended with Paramount offering Lucas and the band an opportunity to make several movie shorts. They served to establish the band as a first-rate musical organization. Currently featured in the orchestra are brother Lyn, song-stylist, and Johnny De Voogdt, violin soloist. The band is pictured above as follows (back row, left to right): Paul Gene, Truman Quigley, Paul Geil, trumpets. Center row (left to right): Lyn Lucas, Frank Mane, Clinton Davis, Dave Engelman, saxophones. Front row (left to right): Alberto Mateu, Sam Zimmerman, John De Voogdt, violins. 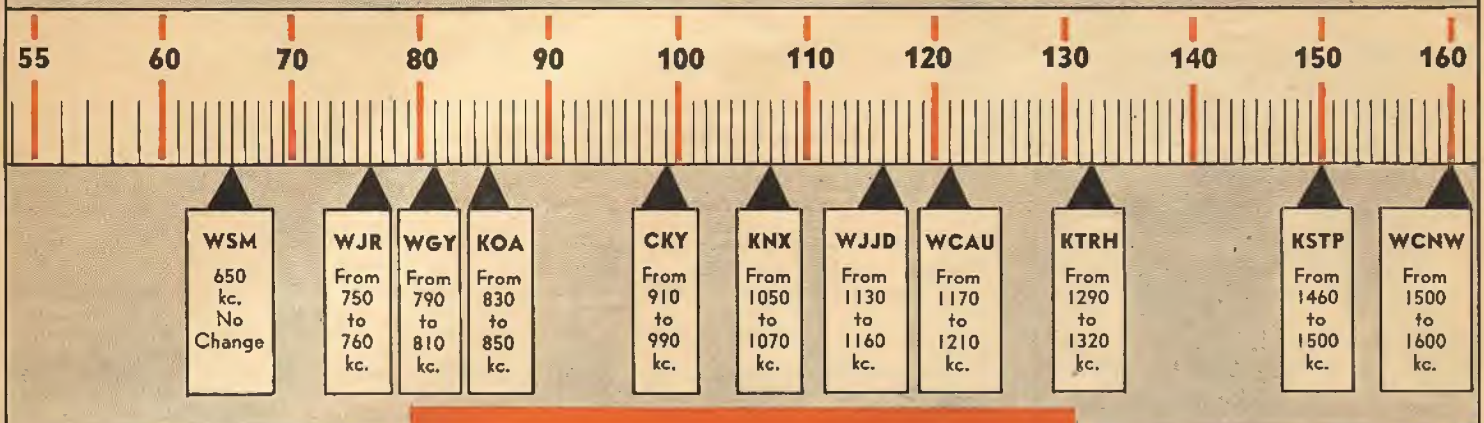

# 785 out of 833 Stations Change Dial Locations on March 29

## Get Ready For Radio's Moving Day!

Don't be confused. Here is what to do and when to do it

**M**OST radio listeners are accustomed to shut off the alarm in the mornings, turn the dial of their radio sets to a favorite station and a favorite program and listen in while they are dressing. On Saturday, March 29, you may go through exactly the same procedure you've accustomed yourself to over the past ten years. But when you twist the dial of your set (or push the button, as the case may be) on this particular morning there is no telling what you'll get. You might tune in the most magnificent silence or, quite likely, some perfectly strange station with a program you've never heard before . . . and may not want to hear again.

Result: Confusion to put to shame the confusion and chaos that followed Orson Welles' "Invasion From Mars" broadcast. But there is really no need for confusion—at least not for MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE readers. Here, in a nutshell, is the story of what it's all about and what you can do to keep your radio life on a level footing and avoid a lot of trouble.

To begin with, March 29 has been designated as Radio's Moving Day. It is really but little different from any other moving day. Families in your range of acquaintance often move from one apartment to another to better their living conditions. That's what is happening to radio. Radio stations—785 out of the 833 ordinarily heard by American listeners—are moving from one spot on the dial to other spots (or from one frequency to another) to make your listening conditions better. Sixty-eight out of Canada's eighty-four stations will also change dial positions. The result of the wholesale change of radio-station frequencies will be better, clearer broadcasts, broadcasts which should be free of interference.

To make it even more clear as to what will occur on radio's moving day, suppose that you live on a street where 833 other families have been

living for ten years. A few of these families are personal friends. You like to visit with them, talk with them, hear the music their talented children play and the entertainment they offer to their friends.

Then one day you go to visit one of those families—and you find the house is empty. Or a strange family, totally unlike your friends, has moved in. You are disappointed. You wouldn't mind their moving to a different neighborhood where they will find living conditions better, but you're disappointed because they didn't leave you a forwarding address. You don't know where to find them. The same thing has happened to other families on the street—to 785 of them.

**W**HAT we're going to do here is tell you where to find these old friends of yours. We're going to tell you what to do if you have a dial radio, what to do if you have a push-button set or any one of the many other designs of sets now on the market. In short, what we're trying to do in this article is make a vast clearing-house of MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE pages so that finding your favorite stations and your favorite programs is as easy as pie.

Back in 1937 representatives of the governments of the United States, Canada, Mexico, the Dominican Republic, Puerto Rico and Cuba met in Havana to draw up a treaty regulating broadcasting stations. Such a

treaty is an essential to good broadcasting, for, if one or another of these countries in the Western Hemisphere refused to collaborate with the other countries in assigning frequencies, conflict and chaos would fill the airwaves. A station in Mexico or Canada, for example, could, unless checked by such treaty obligations, broadcast on a frequency which would interfere with American stations, and listeners attempting to tune in the American station would get a confused jumble of both stations at once.

The representatives of the various countries readily agreed upon a division of broadcasting frequencies which would keep the airplanes clear of outside interference, and the treaty was signed by all the participating governments except Mexico.

Last fall, however, the Mexican government finally signed the Havana treaty, which will mean that each of the countries party to the agreement will have its own share of the broadcasting band so that broadcasts of none of these countries will be able in future to interfere with those of other countries.

Automatically this means that all broadcasters in this hemisphere will be compelled to broadcast on less powerful frequencies and on the wave-lengths assigned to them. But it means more than that.

It means, for example, that practically all radio stations in these

countries must change to new frequencies, and here in the United States the changes have been so planned and will be so executed that many of the troubles and conflicts which have cropped up in the past will be eliminated. As soon as your radio world has again settled back to normal and you are firmly entrenched in your new tuning-habits, you will find that the momentary inconvenience of seeking old programs at new places on your dial will pay big dividends in better reception. Many of the bugs which have been a part of radio since the beginning of broadcasting are being eliminated in this grand-scale reshuffling of frequencies.

Now, specifically, there are certain things that the listener and radio-set owner will need in order to keep tuned to his regular stations and programs. No station will move out of hearing-range of listeners who have, in the past, heard it. It will simply be a matter of learning at what new spot on the dial that station is to be found.

To give readers this information at a glance—or quicker—MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE will publish next week a complete log of the new dial numbers of your favorite radio stations which will become effective after March 29.

**A**RRANGED in alphabetical order so that listeners may easily find the stations they seek, together with their new dial numbers for those stations, this log is an essential to radio listeners. And it appears in MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE for the week of March 29 to April 4—at the very time you'll be needing it most. Reserve your copy at your newsstand now to be sure you'll get one.

Next week this publication will also go into the service and needs of your radio sets to make them ready for Radio's Moving Day. They will require very little attention, but what they will need is important. It is important, too, that you understand the minor changes that may be necessary on your set if you are to receive, uninterruptedly, the programs you want from the stations you want to listen to.

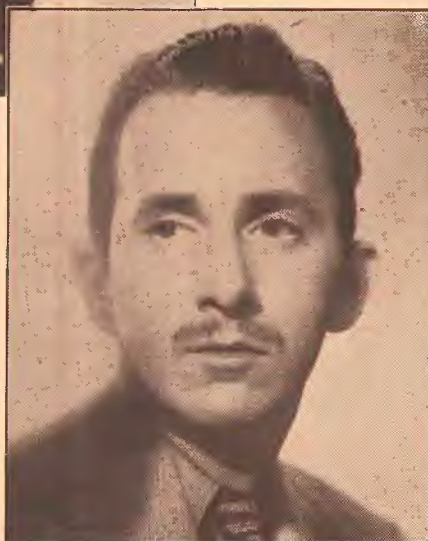

## CROSLY'S INTERNATIONAL VOICE

JUST twenty years ago, back in 1921, Powel Crosley, Jr., collected a few odds and ends of equipment and in his own home in Cincinnati built experimental station 8CR. He tested it by playing a phonograph record of "Song of India" over and over again. When he received responses from listeners in Madisonville and Troy, Ohio, he was satisfied his equipment would work. In March of 1922 he boosted the power of 8CR to 500 watts, moved it into his little manufacturing plant and received a license for the station under the call-letters WLW. As the years moved along the Crosley radio interests increased by leaps and bounds, WLW became the "Nation's Station" and the world's most powerful broadcaster with a regular power of 50,000 watts and an experimental output of 500,000 watts.

Short-wave broadcasting had also become an important cog in the Crosley radio scheme. This chapter had started back in 1926 when W8XAL went on the air with a power of 100 watts. International broadcasting gradually gained in favor and in 1931 the power of the station was increased to 10,000 watts. Nineteen-forty was that important year in which United States international stations dropped experimental status and became full-fledged commercial broadcasters. W8XAL became WLWO, "The Inter-Nation Station," and its power was upped to 75,000 watts, thus making it one of the most powerful stations in the world. The latest type of directional aerials was also added so that it became possible for WLWO to literally flood our Latin listening neighbors with American ideas of democracy and good-will.

A few months ago a fire of unknown origin, apparently the work of saboteurs, destroyed part of WLWO's delicate equipment. No further chances are being taken. Today you would have little chance of getting close enough to the equipment to do any damage, for out at Mason, Ohio, where the transmitters of WLW and WLWO are located, a special guardhouse seventy-five feet high has been built, a high metal fence encloses the grounds which are patrolled by a staff of twelve guards twenty-four hours out of each day, and a

battery of floodlights illuminates every foot of the grounds day and night.

WLWO is the only international station in the United States authorized to operate on each of the six short-wave bands with unshared frequencies and unlimited time. WLWO's assigned frequencies are: 6.08, 9.59, 11.71, 15.25, 17.80 and 21.65 megs. The station operates at present as follows: Daily except Saturdays from 5:00 a.m. to 1:45 p.m. on 15.25; from 2:00 to 4:45 p.m. on 11.71 and from 5:00 to 10:00 p.m. PST on 9.59; Saturdays from 5:00 a.m. to 1:45 p.m. on 15.25; from 2:00 to 5:00 p.m. on 11.71 and from 5:15 to 10:00 p.m. PST on 9.59 megs.

The Cincinnati studios of WLWO are a ceaseless beehive of activity, what with preparing all kinds of programs in English, Spanish and Portuguese, compiling the latest news and stocks for incorporation into the newscasts for Latin America, and the answering of thousands of letters from every part of the Americas. WLWO's international staff includes Oscar Romaguera, a native of Havana; Brazilian-born Henley Hill; Spanish announcers Emeterio Gonzales and Aristed S. Nodarse; George Mayoral from Puerto Rico; Manuel Avila from Mexico City; James Canel of Uruguay, and a woman commentator, Concha Gandia. These Latin experts weave the design for all Spanish and Portuguese broadcasts of WLWO, which include music—popular and classic—special features and commentaries on every aspect of American life that would prove of interest below the Rio Grande and, most important of all, an unbiased interpretation of the day's news.

But this is not all, WLWO is to become the hub for a Latin-American network of stations. Traveling by Clipper, train and boat, two representatives of the Crosley station are now in South America lining things up. Powerful broadcast stations in each Latin republic will eventually become affiliates of the WLWO chain and will relay its programs of commerce, culture and good-will to even the most remote corners of the Americas.

It is my intention to tell you in detail about the interesting programs available over WLWO in an early issue of MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE.

### Suit Over "Cyrano"

Dear V. O. L.:

The piece about Edmond Rostand's "Cyrano de Bergerac" on the "Drama" page in a recent issue was interesting. But if you would visit the Clerk of the Federal Court and ask to see the file in a case entitled "Samuel Ellsworth Gross v. Edmond Rostand, Richard Mansfield," you might learn something that you probably had never suspected.

Samuel E. Gross, a former real estate subdivider in Chicago, wrote a play called "Merchant Prince of Cornville." In order to obtain a copyright in England and France it had to be produced there, and I think was produced in either London or Paris, with the famous actor Coquelin reading the principal part. After the play had been "produced" by reading on a stage for one performance, Gross was unable to find some of the books he had distributed among the cast. At the time he gave this very little thought. But he was much surprised to find Richard Mansfield producing "Cyrano de Bergerac" in Chicago. Maintaining that the latter play was plagiarized from his "Merchant Prince of Cornville," Gross brought the suit and won it, obtaining a perpetual injunction to prohibit production of "Cyrano" in the United States. I believe the suit was in about 1898.

A few years ago Walter Hampden wished to produce the play in New York. Mr. Gross was dead, and his heirs allowed the injunction to be dissolved by consent so that Hampden might be able to produce the play. I am very sure that he never produced it a thousand times in this country, though he may have in England or elsewhere.

Mr. Gross spent a vast sum of money in establishing his case and had a literary figure analyze the plays, and the analyst wrote a book on the case.

"Cyrano" may have been legally stamped as plagiarism, as many great literary works have been stamped unofficially. However, there are probably still a great many people—including us—who think Rostand's "Cyrano de Bergerac" one of the most masterful plays ever written, masterful in expression and emotional impact as well as in conception and story plan.—V. O. L.

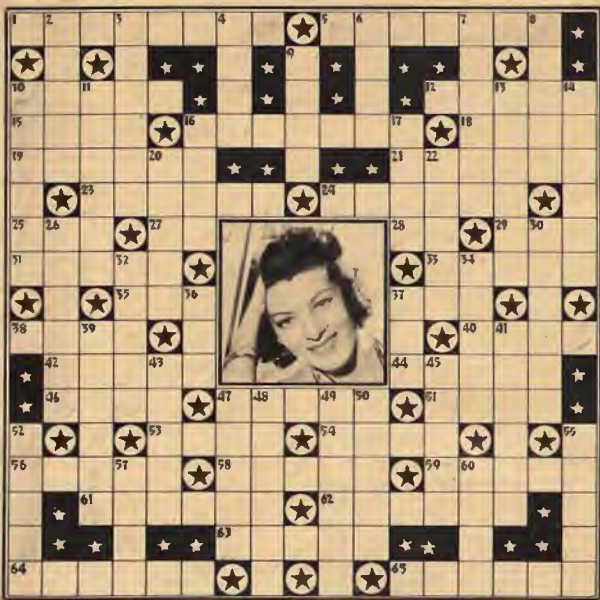
