



The Mayor of the Town . . .

BARRYMORES have led the stage acting profession for many years. They have carved a prominent niche for themselves in motion pictures. It is, therefore, with pleasure but not surprise that we learn that Lionel Barrymore intends to keep the family name high in the radio billings, despite the passing of the great John.

It was John who blazed the Barrymore trail into the great unknown of the airways. Lionel's radio fame began when he joined John in verbal slugfests at the Rudy Vallee program. Later, as John's health failed, Lionel frequently substituted for his brother.

John, his last ribald jest delivered, is gone to his rest. It is up to Lionel to keep alive the family name in a notoriously short-lived profession.

He has done just that by launching his first starring dramatic radio series. "The Mayor of the Town," heard on NBC Sunday nights, presents Lionel as the chief executive of a typical American city, meeting the people and solving the problems which are so important a part of the office.

The program offers a splendid opportunity for the display of Lionel's special talents—

and the dramatic talent which is part of the Barrymore heritage. It bears no similarity to the type of clowning the Great Profile indulged in—for members of this famous acting clan do not need to steal each other's acts and techniques.

One resemblance will remain, however, Lionel, picking up the family's torch to carry on where John stopped, will certainly deliver performances that are, in their own way, as outstanding as John's were in his.

Listeners are fortunate in having Lionel, for his studio, M-G-M, long doubted the wisdom of putting such top stars on the airways regularly. They have at last acceded to public demand, and by so doing have rendered an important service to the lovers of drama. To Lever Brothers, the sponsor, to NBC and to CBS, which will present the program Wednesday nights beginning October 7, a share of our gratitude must go.

There is a certain poetic justice to the part John Barrymore played in establishing his brother's radio success. For years ago, when the motion picture was a crude and flickering "fad," it was Lionel who pioneered the new dramatic form for his family. John followed Lionel into pictures and won fame and fortune. Now Lionel follows John into radio, and unless we misjudge the Barrymore talent, he'll go to the top.—The Editors.

World Series Dope Is Dopey

Breaks, Slumps and Flashes of Greatness Spoil the Dope and Decide the Baseball Classic

Bob Elson, crack baseball reporter for MBS, was slated to broadcast his fourteenth World Series this year. It was in his capacity as a baseball expert that he wrote this article.

But Bob Elson will not broadcast the 1942 series. He has a bigger job in hand—in a bigger, more desperate world series—a series to be played from Berlin to Tokyo.

On September 14 the U. S. Navy called Lieutenant Senior Grade Robert Elson, D. V. S., to active service.

SO YOU think you have the World Series all doped out, eh?

You've taken the still warm National and American League team and individual statistics, sifted them down—put each man involved in this 1942 World Series on the delicate scale of baseball averages, player against player, position against position—and from this mathematical analysis have distilled the winner of baseball's fortieth world's championship.

But have you?

Have you figured in the possibility of an easy ground ball hitting a clod of dirt in the twelfth inning of the seventh and deciding game? Of a catcher tripping over his mask? Of the complete defensive breakdown of a player voted the most valuable in his league? Of some insignificant youngster, or veteran, not even figured into the advance estimates suddenly becoming a super-star in the series? Of a great pitcher jamming his throwing-hand in a door on the

eve of a crucial game?

Have you figured in these possibilities? No? Well, you'd better, because these aren't possibilities—they're actualities on which world's championships have pivoted in the past, and on which they no doubt will pivot in the future.

The inning is the twelfth. The 1924 Giants of New York and Senators of Washington are locked in a desperate struggle for a world title.

Each has won three of the preceding six games. Now Muddy Ruel of the Senators is on second and Earl Mc-Neeley is at bat. McNeeley hits sharply down the third-base line. A routine play. Freddie Lindstrom, the nineteen-year-old New York third baseman, moves into position, set to make the putout. Suddenly the ball hits a clod of

dirt, squirts crazily over Lindstrom's head, rolls on out into left field, and Ruel sprints over the plate with a world championship.

Thus is completed an amazing sequence of events the sporting world, for want of an explanation, calls the "breaks." For, but a minute before, Ruel was at bat. He lifted a high foul a bit away from the plate, and Hank Gowdy, the Giant catcher, whipped off his mask

and gave chase. But Gowdy had taken no more than a few steps when he tripped over the mask, stumbled, and before he could regain his balance the ball dropped to earth. Ruel then doubled and subsequently scored the winning run!

The unyielding pressure of a World Series has squeezed strange happen-

ings onto the pages of sports history. It has elevated previously insignificant players such as Pepper Martin, George Rohe and Babe Adams to the very pinnacle of baseball greatness, and it has cast super-stars such as Rogers Hornsby and Ty Cobb in the role of the most ordinary. It has produced the tragic spectacle of the "most valuable" player in the American League, Roger Peckinpaugh in 1925, cracking up defensively in the series so completely as to carry his team down to defeat with him.


Why has it done these things? In the first place, it matches teams which have been through the arduous mental and physical strain of 154 games during the regular schedule. These teams are thrown against each other for a maximum of seven games. The heaviest pressure falls on the Hornsbys, the Cobbs, the Peckinpaughs. The Martins, the Adamses, the Rohes, lurking in the shadows, nonetheless are caught up in the tremendous emotional uplift of the series. Therein, baseball men say, lies much of the explanation for the queer byways that World Series competition takes so often.

Any advance figuring of the Washington club's chances against the Pittsburgh Pirates in 1925 started with Roger Peckinpaugh as the strong point. His play had been of such a high standard all season as to cause his citation as the league's "most valuable" player. He was the Washington club's primary point of infield strength.

And yet, Peckinpaugh committed eight errors, including two in crucial spots in the final game, as the Senators were beaten in a series which went the limit. Those eight errors still stand as the record for fielding

futility in the post-season classic. And they were made by a player who came into the series the "most valuable" man in his league!

Then there is the batting record of Ty Cobb; also of Rogers Hornsby. By every way of figuring, these men were "doped" to play the lead roles in their team's world title fights—Cobb in 1907, 1908 and 1909; Hornsby in 1926 and 1929. Cobb had won the American League batting title in each of those three years. In all, Ty won the A. L. crown twelve times, including nine times in a row! His lifetime major-league batting average was .367.

And yet his composite World Series average was .262. He hit an even .200 in 1907. He touched .368 the next year, but slumped off to .231 in 1909. The Detroit Tigers were beaten all three times.

Hornsby, who led the National League hitters seven times, including six in a row (1920-1925), went into the 1926 competition against the New York Yankees with a regular season batting mark of .317. He hit .250 in seven series games, but the Cardinals won in spite of his woful slump. In 1929, then a member of the Cubs, he took a .380 average into the battle with the Philadelphia Athletics. His five-game series showing was an anemic .227.

Contrast that, now, with Pepper Martin, George Rohe and Babe Adams. The record of these three is quite different.

Back in 1931 the Philadelphia Athletics, one of baseball's great teams, met the St. Louis Cardinals, just a bunch of ambitious fellows who had a tough fight qualifying for a series appearance. Chick Hafey and Jim Bottomley were the big men on this

Cardinal club. The A's, seeking a third straight world title, gave them considerable thought in preseries strategy meetings.

Mickey Cochrane is author of the statement that one John Leonard Martin, better known as Pepper, didn't even get a tumble in those clubhouse conclaves. "I don't remember his name coming up once," said Mike. After all, John Leonard had hit but an even .300 in 123 National League ball games, and that's hitting on the weak side for an outfielder. He had stolen seventeen bases.

And then Pepper started to run. And hit. And field. He drove out twelve hits in twenty-four times at bat to tie the series record. He stole five bases. He was unstoppable, and perhaps more than any other man in series history swung a world title, practically alone, to an inferior team. And this is the fellow that not only the A's themselves but nobody else remembered in the preseries analyzing. He just didn't "figure" . . .

Then there was the case of George Rohe. You have to go back a long way to pick up his trail, 1906, when the great Cub team of Tinker to Evers to Chance, a superb combination which won 116 games over the National League season—still the major league record—moved against the old "Hitless Wonders," the Chicago White Sox, top-heavy choices for victory.

ROHE started at third for the White Sox only through necessity. The regular third baseman, Lee Tannehill, had been shifted to short in an emergency, and the light-hitting Rohe, ticketed for return to the minors, came in to play the far corner. This, the experts decided, was all that was needed to assure a Cub victory.

And all the twenty-two-year-old Mr. Rohe did was to assure a Cub defeat! He was the series' leading hitter, and fielded brilliantly. He tripled and scored the first run in the opening game as the Sox triumphed 2-1. He tripled with the bases full to win the third game 3 to 0. And then, after the Cubs had tied it up at two games each by winning the fourth (they also took the second), he played a leading role, offensively, in the final two Sox victories which clinched the championship.

And then—Babe Adams. Babe was a young pitcher, destined for greatness, but he was a long way from being a great pitcher when he dictated the result of the 1909 World Series between the Pittsburgh Pirates, his team, and the Detroit Tigers, led by Ty Cobb. He had been up with the Pirates in 1907 briefly, appearing in four games and compiling a record of no victories and two defeats. He went down to Louisville and did so well he came back to the Pirates in 1909. His record in 1909 was good—twelve and three. But it wasn't such as to figure him as a winner of THREE games in the series.

But that's just what he did—three victories, each of them a six-hit game. His earned-run average was a remarkable 1.33. His final victory was an 8-to-0 shutout which gave the Pirates the world championship. Babe Adams—just a rookie, trying to get along!

Against the tense World Series background, the bizarre also has flashed from time to time in a further flaunting of the dope which says this set of games should be productive of the finest baseball of the year. In this regard, the names of Fred Snodgrass and Heinie Zimmerman come im-

mediately to mind, as well, perhaps, as that of Ernie Lombardi.

All three—Snodgrass, Zimmerman and Lombardi—ranked as major-league stars. Lombardi still does, of course. Yet each perpetrated unforgettable blunders in series history.

It was Snodgrass, back in the 1912 competition between the Giants and the Boston Red Sox, who dropped the fly ball, a lazy, drifting fly ball that you or I could have caught, which opened the championship doors to the Red Sox in a bitterly fought series which went eight games—one tied. It was Zimmerman who chased Eddie Collins over home plate in the 1917 renewal, and set up two additional runs which proved conclusive in the settlement of the world title of that year.

AND it was Lombardi, the hard-working catcher of the Cincinnati Reds, who put on the now-famous "snooze" act to make the Reds' rout by the Yankees in the 1939 competition complete, final and humiliating. And all had the misfortune to unfold those travesties at a time when the glare was the most intense, when their actions stood out in such bold relief as to make them unforgettable.

One last clincher in this series to show how dopey the World Series can be. This one involves the important baseball by-product, strategy, and carries us back to the 1933 battle between the New York Giants and the Washington Senators. We are in the fifth game, with the Giants leading the series three games to one, but with Joe Cronin's Senators fighting back desperately. Now, in the eleventh inning, the Senators, (Continued on Page 34)

WASHINGTON

The opening of the Irving Berlin "This Is the Army" box-office on a downtown street in Washington almost stopped traffic. It opened on a Monday morning at ten o'clock. Earlier, a detail of four soldiers came to town with the tickets and stories and pictures for the newspapers. When the news got around, every newspaper in town, as well as the War Department, was flooded with calls which asked where the box-office would be located.

On Monday morning, military policemen and Army noncoms opened the box-office window and the deluge began. The line was three blocks long at one time. Washington wants to go to "This Is the Army" despite the high prices. Opening night admission will be \$16.50 for the entire orchestra and \$5.50 for most of the balcony. Other nights the orchestra seats will be \$5.50 with balcony seats running down to \$1.65 . . .

Do you want to help your Army? You can do it by getting some young man who has a radio or mechanical background to enlist in the Army Signal Corps, the Army Air Forces, or the Army Ordnance Department. There is a great shortage of technical men. The advancement is rapid. The pay is good. Any youth who knows the inside of a radio should enlist at once. Any man who caninker with en-

gines and differentials is needed for tanks and trucks and that need is immediate. People who have been saying "What can I do?" can start to work right now. Do you know anyone who qualifies? Call him up now and tell him to get in touch with the nearest Army recruiting officer or station . . .

The Waves, to the Navy what the Waacs are to the Army, are looking for women radio operators, or those who have special radio knowledge. Women between the ages of twenty and thirty-six interested in this field can get application blanks at the nearest office of Naval Officer Procurement. Those selected will attend a four-month course in radio communications at the University of Wisconsin at Madison. Pay will be the same as for Navy men of the same classification . . .

Those who enjoyed Elmer Davis' nightly commentary on the news soon will be listening to him again if Washington's grapevine rumor is correct. Talk is that Davis, now chief of the Office of War Information, will return to the air for a fifteen-minute program weekly, broadcast simultaneously on all major networks. Business of clearing the time already is said to have begun . . .

Here are some interesting figures just released by the Treasury Department. In connection with the "Stag Over America" tours, which are being

promoted by Hollywood to push bond sales, Irene Dunne sold \$850,000 worth of this best investment in the world at a luncheon in Bethlehem, Pa., and was credited with the sale of \$1,120,500 worth in Easton, Pa. Greer Garson accounted for \$100,000 worth in Harrisburg, Pa., and \$161,500 in Winchester, Va. Charles Laughton, Ann Rutherford and Virginia Gilmore, in Woonsocket, R. I., sold \$225,000 worth, and \$485,000 worth in Worcester. These are box-car figures, but they're only part of what the movie-radio twins are doing to boost the sale of bonds.

GAIL KUBIK WRITES MUSICAL SCORES FOR OWI DOCUMENTARY FILMS

Courboin Plays Bach's "Passacaglia and Fugue in C Minor" Sun.; Casa Loma Band Still Boasts Ten of Original Founding Fathers

A YOUNG man of twenty-seven, Gail Thompson Kubik, has recently been appointed Music Consultant to the Office of War Information's Film Bureau. His duties will consist of writing musical scores for documentary films and conducting. Mr. Kubik's first achievement in his newly acquired position was to score the Office of War Information's newly released documentary film, "The World at War."

At a special press showing of the film, which surveys the martial scene from the Japanese invasion of Manchuria in 1931 to the bombing of Pearl Harbor in 1941, the listener, if he had any musical instincts at all, was struck by the power and the general expressiveness of the music.

Mr. Kubik, it is evident from the first few measures, knows how to orchestrate. He also knows how to harness interesting rhythmic devices to his purposes. What melody there is to the music—and the subject itself of the film rather discourages its use—is attractive melody.

Born in South Coffeyville, Oklahoma, Mr. Kubik moved, at an early age, across the state line into Kansas, where the family settled down in the neighboring town of Coffeyville. He wasn't particularly interested in music as a boy, though he did show a remarkable talent, being capable of performing interesting things with a violin—thoroughly musical things, too.

He got a flattering offer from the Eastman School of Music in Rochester, which quite suddenly dangled a scholarship before him. Interest or no interest in music, he took it at the insistence of his older brother. His schooling from that time traced a course through a study fellowship with Leo Sowerby at the American Conservatory of Music in Chicago and admission to the Harvard Graduate School, where he worked under Walter Piston.

What do musicians usually do—if they are intelligent—when they come out of school? They teach, which is exactly what Mr. Kubik did. He was barely old enough to vote when he received recognition from the NBC to the extent that a program of his music was played over the radio. He taught advanced composition at Teachers College, Columbia University, but the composing seed began to sprout seriously within him, and in almost no time at all he was doing important work for NBC.

Being a staff composer for a great radio network had its points—also its

labors, because he averaged a score a day for such shows as "Great Plays," "The World Is Yours" and others. Logically enough, Mr. Kubik, far from playing the young dabbler in novelty, betook himself instead to the tried and true musical forms, and endeavored to throw into them his own musical personality by way of modern harmonies and, in general, modern ideas, capable of meeting the specific requirements of each dramatic production.

In the meantime, he found time to write at leisure—that is, not on order—and in that uninhibited frame of mind he penned a number of pieces, some of which earned for him high awards. One of these compositions, his violin concerto, won the Jascha Heifetz prize of \$1,000 in 1941.

There is an amusing story connected with the writing of that work. He went one day to a lecture on political science. A little on the bored side, he began to do some musical doodling, jotting down ideas in a very personal shorthand code. He did not know it then, but he had jotted down the themes for his violin concerto.

Some time later, as often happens, he lost interest in the concerto and he found use for the pages of manuscript by sending them as Christmas cards to his friends. Came the change of heart, and he patiently wrote each and every one of said friends, asking them to return the pages. Mr. Kubik has many friends and they are situated all over the map of America. Fortunately they wrote back.

Mr. Kubik's connection with film music dates from a score of his written for the United States Maritime Commission release, "Men and Ships." He

wrote that in two weeks. It proved good enough to qualify him for his present work.

The young musician is very serious about composing now. He has tasted success, which should prove the whetstone of the appetite. He still believes firmly in the importance of form in music, reasoning that the best possible ideas would be as nothing if they were not expressed in a logical manner—hence, form.

"I do not approve of empty cleverness in music or in anything else, for that matter," he says earnestly, "any more than I would approve of over-stuffed dullness. There must be progress in any art for the continuance of that art, and the artist must be infinitely alive to the subtle changes going on around him all the time. At the same time we cannot afford to dispense with the wonderful traditions in music; in fact, they must be reckoned as the guides to a future that we may merely guess at."

Bach and the Organ

Bach wrote the greatest part of his organ works at Weimar during the nine years between 1708 and 1717. There are over two hundred such works, the most numerous of which are the choral preludes, of which 143 are known.

The Passacaglia and Fugue in C Minor, originally written for a two-manual clavichord, was transcribed for organ during the latter part of the period mentioned above. Bach used as half his theme a phrase from a Trio in passacaille by Andre Raison, who was an organist at a Paris church during the reign of Louis XIV. The word passacaglia first meant a Spanish or Italian dance in triple time whose theme was repeated frequently. When it became appropriated by composers it signified a composition whose structure was built on the same idea of a recurring theme. The fugue accompanying this passacaglia is built of material from the preceding section added to new material. It is a double fugue.

Charles Courboin, noted organist, plays the "Passacaglia and Fugue in C Minor" besides other music, NBC on Sunday, September 27.

Columbia offers John Barbirolli and the Philharmonic-Symphony in an engaging version of the theme and variations from the Tchaikovsky Suite No. 3 in G. The composer's bristling ideas and his marvelous inventiveness are all too evident here. Mr. Barbirolli has been playing the suite or excerpts from it a good deal at his concerts of the past few years. That should make him an authority on it.

Glen Gray: His leadership impressed listeners

THIRTEEN years ago a band of youthful jazzists who called themselves the "Orange Blossoms" was one of the units in a large dance-music organization headed by Jean Goldkette. It made a stand at a hotel by the name of Casa Loma, and the sound of the words was so appealing that the band decided to keep the title.

It is curious to note that for a number of years the Casa Loma Orchestra played without benefit of batonist. All the musicians needed was a few tempo taps on the drum and they were off. When Glen Gray, a tall, personable chap, one day led the men from the front—with a baton—made an impression on listeners. He became recognized as the executive personality of the orchestra, and in a short time the musicians decided that he should be the one to lead them permanently, especially since he had made such a hit with the fans.

Moving Gray from the sax section to the podial spotlight proved a good stunt, for with a definite personality at its head the band made rapid progress. Not the least important reason for its success is the fact that it tried to create trends instead of slavishly following them. And another secret of the Casa Loma's success has been their versatility, the special gifts they have for playing well, whether in strictly straight mood or in the hottest jive consciousness.

Not for nothing has this group of tootlers and pounders been able to remain close to the top of the popularity ladder, for they have known their share of work and disappointments; but, perhaps, because the band's personnel boasts the presence of ten of the original founding fathers, the unit functions as evenly and as precisely as it does.

Currently performing at New York's smart Pennsylvania Hotel, the Casa Loma Orchestra broadcasts four times weekly over the Blue Network. In mid-October the band goes on tour and will return to Gotham in time to observe an annual custom—Christmas week at Paramount Theater, temple of motion pictures and dance music.

Glen Gray and the Casa Loma Orchestra have been making records for many years. Decca's archives proudly list a great number of performances which are unique in point of velvety ensemble work, in addition to completely effective solo playing by any or all the instrumentalists.

BBC BROADCAST DIRECTS ANTI-NAZI DEMONSTRATION IN MARSEILLES

Germans Complain of Russian Resistance; NBC Lines Up More Shows for Troops Overseas; No Essential Food Shortage in Britain Reported

France Is Listening

ACCORDING to "London Calling," evidence of European listeners' response to BBC broadcasts continues to reach London. The ingenious ways in which it gets to this country will make thrilling reading at such time as it may be disclosed. The fourteenth of July celebrations in France afford an illustration of listeners' response. At Marseilles, where the population demonstrated in their thousands, the police opened fire on the crowd, killing four people. Two of them were women. The BBC French service announced this on the sixteenth, adding that the funeral of the two women was to take place at 2 p.m. on the seventeenth. The authorities, having become alarmed, changed the time of the ceremony. At 1:15 p.m. on Sunday, July 19, a message was broadcast from London that at 5 p.m. that afternoon Marseilles patriots should assemble at the gates of St. Pierre cemetery. Then followed detailed instructions. At 5 p.m. precisely an enormous crowd assembled at the appointed place. For an hour flowers and tricolors were simply showered on the two graves. Not a sound broke the silence of this solemn manifestation.

From the Loudspeaker

H. C. Knickerbocker, famous war correspondent, speaking from London the other night, asserted that there is no shortage of the essential foods in Britain. There are enough potatoes so that each man could eat three pounds a day if necessary, he said. . . . According to Bern, Switzerland, radio, Germans are complaining about the stubborn resistance of their foes in the Caucasus. Even after you kill a Russian soldier you have to knock him over before he is finished, they say. . . . Also according to Bern, eleven hundred French children, who have been in Switzerland recuperating and resting up, are now returning to Paris by way of Geneva and unoccupied France. . . . William Holt, regular speaker of the London station, mentioned that since candy is rationed in Britain, many children are buying throat lozenges, as they are the only sweet things they can now get. . . . Fred Cybel, speaking from Melbourne recently, mentioned the fact that 437 Japanese planes have been brought down or destroyed by the allies since Pearl Harbor.

Meet Nicholas J. Polydouris

Nicholas J. Polydouris is a handsome twenty-seven-year-old Greek-American with a personal grudge against the Axis, for he had two brothers in the Greek army whom he hasn't heard from since December 24, 1940, and can only guess their fate.

A former director and general teacher in the Greek Orthodox Community school of Albany, New York, he now works six days a week in one of the defense plants of General Electric; broadcasts on Sundays from 3:00 to 3:30 p.m. CWT in Greek to his enslaved countrymen in Greece over Schenectady station WGEA (15.33). The young Greek-American came to this country only eight years ago, but he already is a citizen and "very proud of it." Three weeks before Pearl Harbor, Nick walked into the office of John R. Sheehan, manager of the General Electric short-wave stations. "I think," declared the slender, well-mannered visitor, "that it would be a great opportunity for me to broadcast your Greek programs. There is nothing I would rather do more." He explained that these programs hurdle the Nazis' tight censorship to counteract Axis propaganda by giving the Greek people the straight news—good and bad. "In addition," he said, "such broadcasts are of invaluable help in keeping up the courage of the oppressed Greeks by assuring them of their coming liberation by the United Nations." Nick went off the air the next Sunday for his first broadcast. He hasn't missed a Sunday since, and although he hasn't received any letters direct from Greece as yet, he is sure many people are secretly listening to him and passing the news to others despite the threat of a firing-squad if caught. He has heard from Greek nationals in almost every other part of the world. To a man, they enthusiastically endorse his efforts.

Play Up Your Posture

WHETHER you are fourteen or forty, tall or short, generously curved or slender as a reed, you are only as beautiful as your posture. And when the season's newest creation finds you looking like a worn-out, bumpy mattress, it's time to snap yourself into shape! So stand as straight as a Greek column. Remember you have a spine and use it to keep yourself in line.

Try visualizing yourself as being suspended by the ears. Then place your heels against the wall . . . bend your knees slightly so every possible part of your anatomy touches the wall . . . then, slowly—oh, so slowly—pull yourself up to your greatest height. Presto! Your chin is up, your shoulders squared off, and the rear protrusion is tucked neatly under the hip-bones. What's more, you look as regal as a queen!

But you feel awkward and uncomfortable? It's no wonder! For months, perhaps even years, you have been slouching around letting one set of muscles slide completely out of shape and cramping others so badly they couldn't even cry "uncle." And there is no time like the immediate moment to fire that lazy body with a little ambition. Try touching the floor with your finger-tips. Chances are you

didn't make it that time, but you have started a set of muscles working the right way. So make it a "must" and a habit to exercise fifteen minutes in the morning and fifteen minutes at night every single day. Try every conceivable exercise you've ever heard of—and stretch those muscles long and limber.

However, just standing at attention and in perfect alignment is only half the battle! So how about it? Do you plop down in a chair like a sand-bag dropped from a hundred-foot level, or do you ease yourself down in perfect control? At any rate, let's give the right way a try. Place a straight-backed chair in the middle of the room and stand directly in front of it. Put one foot behind the other. Keep your stomach in and your hips tucked under. Now gracefully sit down. Did you keep your back straight and your head erect? Are your hands relaxed in your lap? If so, you've made a perfect landing! Now try rising by applying the same rules and using your back foot as leverage. Then every time you see a chair, practise this routine for a lesson in grace.

And now for your method of locomotion! Many—far too many—women either hobble along like a badly jointed wooden doll or lope like an animal.

So sneak a quick look in a full-length mirror as you happen by. And regardless of what you see, don't be discouraged, for really you can recapture the natural grace and carriage you had as a child. It's simply a repetition of the same old thing—practising the right way. This time choose the largest volume you can find in your book-case. Then, after pulling yourself up from the tip of your spine, carefully balance the book on top of your head. Point your toes forward—and start walking! Remember . . . smooth action from the hips. If that book slides off your head, you are either strutting or slumping. So once again balance the book and give it another try. Betcha took three steps that time instead of two. And the next time, you'll probably take four, then five. Soon you'll be going all over the house and up and down steps with your book firmly planted on top of your cranium.

And before many weeks roll by, you'll no longer resemble a comic caricature with rusty joints. Get yourself "prettied up," but first remember to smooth away any obvious bumps with a Hickory foundation garment. Then carry yourself with grace, wear your clothes with dignity, and you'll command attention and admiration wherever you go!

Suddenly there appears a little fellow out of one corner of the Giant dugout, gesticulating frantically. Play is held up, and Chuck Dressen, utility infielder of the Giants, trots out to manager Bill Terry. Dressen is a faded veteran whom the Giants called in late in the season in an emergency. He isn't even eligible to compete in the series.


They stand out there in the middle of the infield—Dressen and the Giant infield... talking. WHAT'S COOKING!

When the Career Woman Turns Chef

THERE comes many a time in a career gal's life when she is called upon to exercise her efficiency and cleverness via the kitchen! So when you can no longer avoid the issue of inviting the office pals or your "hen session" chums over for dinner, do it with confidence—yes, even gusto!

Handling a small group for dinner is no more difficult than coping with the stiffest problem the "boss" ever threw your way. And how did you solve it? Sure enough! You carefully planned every step of that assignment and finished the job with a glorious sense of satisfaction. So start out this problem of guests for dinner by first planning a simple menu. And incidentally, if you develop the habit of clipping recipes as you happen to see an interesting one, your menu-planning becomes a simple process. Here are a couple of ideas:

- Roast Pork, Apple Sauce
- Whipped Potatoes, Buttered Peas
- Lettuce Salad, with Dressing
- Peach Shortcake, Coffee
- or
- Spaghetti or Baked Beans
- Celery, Ripe Olives
- Spiced Peaches
- Buttered Italian Bread Sticks
- Frozen Charlotte, Small Cakes
- Coffee

Once you have decided what you are going to serve those expectant, hungry mouths, take stock of the cupboard. It's a wise gal who keeps the shelves lined with all sorts of necessary staples, including canned fruits and vegetables. Then when welcome—but uninvited—guests come around, you can always turn an uninteresting can of cut corn into a delectable dish by simply adding chopped pimiento or by tossing in a few peanuts when you cream the peas.

At any rate, make a list of all the groceries you'll need for your prospective dinner and do your shopping the day before. This will eliminate

hates in the budget for those who are prone to rush from the office to pick up expensive chops or steaks. Then if you have selected a roast as a headliner on your menu, partially cook it one night and finish it the next. No fuss, no bother!

Frozen foods are another time-saver, for they have already been cleaned. However, if you should prefer fresh vegetables, clean them the night before and tuck them away in the refrigerator for future reference. Salad ingredients should be cleaned and lined up at the same time. And incidentally, if you plan to serve French dressing, add a tiny pinch of curry powder, and listen to your guests "oh and ah" over a new and indescribable flavor.

For dessert, we suggest either the peach shortcake or frozen charlotte. You'll find that frozen desserts are no effort at all, for you can start preparations in the morning while your bath-water is running. - 1 1/2 teaspoons gelatin
- 1/4 cup cold water
- 2 cups heavy cream, whipped
- 1/2 cup confectioners' sugar
- 1 cup finely chopped pecans
- 2 tablespoons Marsala Macaroons

Soak gelatin in cold water and dissolve over hot water. Fold gelatin into cream; add sugar, nuts and flavoring. Stir well to make certain that gelatin is evenly distributed. Line the sides of small molds with macaroons and pour in mixture. Place molds in freezing-trays and put tray in freezing-compartment of refrigerator. Will serve six.

So no five-o'clock jitters for this chef! You can calmly wander home, confident that your dinner will proceed with the smoothness of a banquet. 


