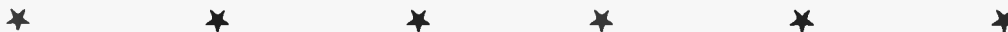

SEND IN YOUR YEHUDIS.

Mrs. Sherwood Hewitson Urges Mothers Guide Child Radio Tastes; Foreshadows Small Child Programs

FROM thousands of national backlots, front lawns and alleyways junior G-man, border bandits and tough tot "netherworldlings" play at modernized versions of cops and robbers.

Viewing with concern radio's unintentional dubious moulding of infant imaginations and minds, are many a woman's organization which, perhaps, feels that Crackywackles might be sold as easily with programs less homicidal than now are absorbed by the nation's babies.

Patly stating the case of Nationwide, influentially powerful, Parent-Teachers' Association, came forward this week Mrs. J. Sherwood Hewitson. Pleaded Mrs. Hewitson, forceful and rightminded P-T. A. radio official:

"A mother reads to her child to develop reading tastes. Why does she not listen, too, with her child to develop radio tastes?"

Sowing her reformatory seeds with Radio Life's columnist, Beatrice Henshaw, Mrs. Hewitson gave radio commercial managers, advertising place-

ment agencies and production chiefs, much that is pertinent to think about.

"... I have just finished a most interesting year with 229 active chairmen in 187 associations. We have just completed our second survey with an expression of 67,000 opinions for 56 programs.

"May I suggest that you discuss Radio for even younger children, and develop a list for children not in school. Over and over comes the cry: 'Give us some programs for very little children.'"

Implying, but not by saying so, Mrs. Hewitson's statement foreshadowed in minds of many a concerned mother, a movement to drydock some juvenile programs, to scrape from them themes that cling, with barnacle-like possibilities of harm, to minds of many a child, in school and out.

On these mothers, harried by constant howls: "Bang! Bang! You're dead," and screams of toddler heroines being playnapped by radio inspired baby baddies, P-T. A. inference of action sat well this week.

Nancy Dickson Wangles Her Way To Successes

Clothes are at once woman's adornment and besetting passion, the first and last flickers of thought in the minds of charwomen to princesses. Few girls, at one time or another, have not speculated on careers as designers, fashion experts, milliners and such other glamorous esceteras, as they linked with an industry revolving hundreds of millions of dollars annually keeping up with woman's changing whimsies of dress.

For Nancy Dixon (Mondays through Saturdays, 8 to 8:15 a. m., KNX "What's News in the Stores Today"), banks of Oregon's Columbia River born, fashion commentator, many another woman's dream has come true. Starting off as an actress after graduation from a Los Angeles high school, Nancy Dixon was determined to find authoritative place in Fashion's glamorland. No sluggard Nancy Dixon made her job, creating Fashion Staff and Xmas Gift section of Los Angeles' great "Robinson's," began lecturing to women, saw the years emerge her as accepted oracle on things women wear. Physically, Nancy Dixon tops for ocularity many of her creations she talks about. She is 5 feet, 8 inches tall, weighs 135 and has brown hair to which staid business men mentally pen Byronesque stanzas.

Changing Battle Scenes Test Stamina And Courage Of Net Reporters; KMPC Short Wave Casts Praised

THIS week, with Nazi power ending resistance of France, with resolute England facing threat of Nazi air might and lightning war, weary correspondents of America's great broadcast systems, caught sleep where they could and when, and struggled wearily to keep uninterrupted descriptions of what they had seen and heard.

Scarce noted were correspondents' activities by service conditioned Americans and efforts of CBS, NBC and major western independents to keep all citizens informed. From front to changing front, from capital to moving capital, government office to government office, the foreign stationed reporters raced to tie into one dramatic piece elements of moment to moment made history.

Quoth a radio official: "When this red interlude shall have ended there must come just dues for many, not least of whom in sense of a Nation's gratitude, must inevitably be CBS's courageous trio, William L. Shirer in Berlin; Eric Sevaried in Paris, and Edward Murrow in London. And to NBC's Fred Bate in London, its Berlin reporter, William C. Kerker and Paul Archinard in Paris, and to dozens of others who are civilization's listening posts on the swift changing fronts of war."

To bring to Americans the voices of their crack descriptionists NBC picks up and rebroadcasts European carnage news eight times a day. Pacing giant NBC is equally potent CBS with warcasts daily at 3:45 p. m., with both net-

works Sunday summarizing European lethalties at 3 p. m. (CBS) and (NBC) at 11:30 a. m.

Rendering signal, wide praised service to listeners, are KMPC and KGH, the first with a listening station of its own in empurpled Hollywood Hills, the other tied in with a listening post on the Atlantic seaboard. To able Clete Roberts, KMPC news editor, commendation comes for close liaison with British Broadcasting Company, a liaison so close that not once, since war broadcasts first cracked from towers of romantically named "Station of the Stars," has KMPC failed to bring in BBC simultaneously with sounding of Big Ben in distant London.

Alertly listening KMPC broadcasts daily at 4:30 p. m. and 8 p. m. excepting the latter hour on Saturday evenings for purposes strictly commercial. Its familiar tie-in "This is London," has become a daily radio page-turn for hundreds of thousands of Southern Californians.

Added to vital news scurrying of foreign correspondents are nationally significant interpretations by commentators Fulton Lewis, John R. Hughes, H. B. Kaltenborn, Paul Sullivan, and Raymond Gram Swing to name those whose names and socio-genic voices have become as familiar to Americans as old shoes.

Thus does radio, crystal racketsy gadget of a generation ago, bring to a nation in peace the bomb racketsy spectacle of a civilization, 2000 years in making, going hell bound in the space of hours.

Fun for everybody is strutting talent before less gifted others. Throughout America the urge for self expression has tidal waved into little theatres, play groups, literary societies, uniformed drill teams and, even, a whole Texas community takes part in an annual circus that compares more than favorably with best efforts of three-ringed Ringlings.

Bridging neatly psychological ditch between Major Bowes and his amateur hour, KECA week ago aired (to continue Saturday evenings at 8:00 o'clock) a mad melange of amateurs doing whatever they think is heading them for radio stardom.

Under title, "Tune Out Time," KECA's program becomes first of amateur hours to use local talent without first exercising caution of preliminary auditioning. Result is show of potential audience entertainment. As long as amateurs are available the show will go on, according to program's director,

Pearce Tosses Lifeline To Discouraged Talent

In Radio's highly specialized field, where professional competition might have been the despair of Greek thespians in all their glory, scores of ambitious, outstandingly talented, men and women, girls and boys look with misgivings on radio as a career. Of these there are scores who are passed up by studio talent scouts, or who are lost in the comings and goings of an industry in which, besides competence, persistency of purpose is an asset. Almost all, however, refuse to be discouraged, holding on to dreams and plans for recognition against buffetings that would dismay many another group.

To these odd scores, then, last week came a ray of promise, if not of a job, at least for opportunity to apply to themselves the best test of all—showing their wares. The promise was wrapped up in the genial person of Al Pearce, who last week auditioned professional local talent, may, for such locals who have attained local prominence, set in motion plan for many such auditions.

Net Biggie Gives Tips To June's Wonder Crop

During month of June American colleges and universities loosen from education's chrysalis, hopeful diplomaed wingsters to test their prowess against minor and major storms of a competitive world.

Hundreds of hopeful graduates, brilliant lights in now many numbered schools of theatre, of university English and dramatic departments, will flutter their wings in direction of radio, tremulously hoping to niche themselves with the Pat Fridays (UCLA), Kay St. Germaines, Barbara Luddys, Kenny Bakkers, John Contes and other scholarly individuals who have tasted radio and savored its golden flavor.

For these stalwarts this week came able counsel and paternally couched encouragement from CBS's Earle McGill, casting director.

Said Earle McGill: "There are only two rules for radio success.

First, learn what it is all about and what you can do in it.

"Second, know the markets for your wares.

"If your business is acting, learn how to act. I believe the theatre is your best bet for preliminary training. To play professionally before an audience is to learn the million and one general tricks of the stage. After that it's not too hard to pick up the specialized techniques needed for radio.

"You must have a complete knowledge and understanding of radio's structural setup.

"Realize that a network is concerned only with producing that percentage of programs which are on a sustaining basis. Commercial programs are produced by the advertising agency handling a manufacturer's product.

"Realize, too, that today stock is almost dead and summer stock, too, is scattered and casual. Best entry to radio, short of radio itself, are little theatres, and young actors should interest themselves in a good little theatre group."

In final analysis CBS's McGill hints that young graduates, even though serious dabblers in university dramatics, need tough professional extra finishings. Yet Radio is fed less material than it actually needs to keep moving. Which is way of saying opportunities are constant. Ambitions youngsters will find their places, as actors and actresses, writers, producers, et al., by dint of perfecting their talents for a field in which yesterday's programs are as dead as the same day's newspapers.

Bill Thompson, Fibber McGee-Molly comedian, who swore:

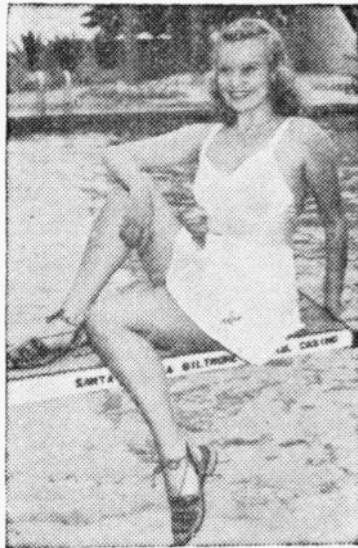

Trained Early, Linda Ware Proved Her Wares

Born Beverly Jane Stillwagon in Tarantum, Pa., May 25, 1925, Linda Ware, currently heard over CBS on "It Happened in Hollywood, last week celebrated her fifteenth birthday. An orphan, Linda was taken under the wing of her uncle, who has been her advisor and manager ever since.

When she was twelve, her uncle sent her picture to M-G-M studios in an effort to land for her a role portraying Jeannette MacDonald as a child. When she didn't land the part, the family packed up bag and baggage, and came to Hollywood anyhow, bent upon cracking the movies. Linda went through all of the trials of waiting around studios until an arranger heard her sing and introduced her to Jack Sherrill, discoverer of Deanna Durbin.

Sherrill arranged a personal audition with Charles R. Rogers at Rogers' home, who signed her for the role in "The Starmaker" after hearing her sing. In making "The Starmaker," Linda sang under Walter Damrosch and the 100 piece Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra. A few months later she sang with Leopold Stokowski in the Hollywood Bowl.

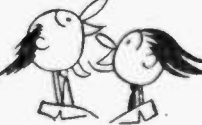

Just a Time Signal But....Behind It

**Strange Things Have Happened at Sound of Gong
Here Are a Few Dramatic Bits from Air's Routine**

"WHEN you hear the sound of the chimes. . . ."

Far out on threatening South Pacific seas, a wayfarer listened and adjusted his chronometer in the cabin of his one man run yawl. He tinkered with calipers over a chart, set off degrees and minutes of longitude, straightened up and pulled himself through a hatch, wind-struggled to the main boom and eased the drum-tight canvas off a point.

No one saw the man do this. He was alone in a desert of water that surged restlessly for hundreds of miles to break on shores of a distant archipelago. But, in the main control of Columbia Broadcasting studio an announcer clasped his hands in comradely well wishing to a man he knew was depending on him to strike a time signal with split-second accuracy. He was more than eight thousand miles from him, but . . .

"Shortly after you receive this I shall be starting across open seas where exact knowledge of time at stated periods is imperative for safety and good navigation. I carry only a chronometer and charts, using the chronometer to figure my course. I must check its accuracy within seconds, else I may wind up as flotsam on the sea. May I ask then, since your time signals are clear for me, that from August 10 until September 4, you ask your engineers to strike their signals promptly with Greenwich? It will mean a great deal to me."

Needless to say, in answer to this plea, CBS announcers gave their time signals a brief but enthusiastic gain, or boost, to complete a service to a voyager.

The unusual does happen behind time

signals that most persons think of only as courteous reminders that hours are fleeting. Indeed it is likely that as a service to listeners the signals have recalled many a husband to the hour's lateness, brought melodious reminder of engagements to busy housewives, club-women, executives and answered the inevitable question that haunts the mind when the clock has stopped.

Yet, time signals echo back strange situations. The like of many seem more fictional than real happenings. . . . If truth ever was stranger than fiction, it's reputation in the case of time signals is well borne out.

On Coronation Gulf, near the Arctic Circle, lives Maniluk, an Eskimo of the Stone Age tribe, described by the great explorer, Vilhjalmur Stefansson, in his book, "I Believe." Maniluk in his igloo huddles through the Northern Nights over a flame of walrus oil, dreams, perhaps, of a woman he, too, has never seen. His story was brought back by a member of an Arctic expedition.

Maniluk was a bad Eskimo, according to the ethics of his people. The Coronation Gulfers packed him off into snowy expanses when they concluded he would never cooperate in the work of the community. The Expedition found him near the Arctic Circle, miserable and lonely. Members pitied him. One left him a compact radio in payment for stout sealskin boots he had made to while away his exile.

Coming back weeks later they came again upon Maniluk's igloo gleaming under the Northern Lights. Maniluk was excited. He assembled them in his ice home and waited with growing impatience for something from the little radio, something he wanted them to hear. An hour later, on the Arctic's cold chasteness poured torrid vocal melody. Maniluk jumped up and dug beneath a pile of polar skins and came up with a delicately carved figurine of walrus ivory. . . . He pointed to the box and then pointed south and then pointed to the little carving. . . . Deeply touched explorers waited to hear what Maniluk would not understand. . . .

"And now Ginny Sims really let's go with . . ."

The little drama had its denouement some months later in Hollywood offices of NBC when a somewhat flustered Ginny Sims, on behalf of snow-ridden Maniluk, was given a little carved ivory memento. Perhaps as she sings her songs with Kay Kyser's band accompanying she puts a little extra oh! ho! into her high notes, for, it is, after all, a long way to the Arctic and Maniluk and his igloo.

In possession of Bernie Smith, public relations counsel for KFI-KECA, is a letter of thanks to his stations for aiding a shy bachelor in the romance of his life. The bachelor was a nervous type, constantly worried about his health which was, to say the least, better than average. As his letter unfolds the story he went to bed each night at ten o'clock, following Franklin's rule of health, wealth and wisdom. Ordinarily he slept well, but one night he was awakened near the witching hour of midnight. He awakened the next time and the next.

Now accustomed to waking the

body at, to him, an unseemly hour, he called upon the tenant next door. To his astonishment he found the tenant to be a charming young woman. She listened to his embarrassed description of his trouble, and admitted, while she did play the radio softly, the time signal did have a habit of booming out quite loudly. She also told him, some time later, he ought to have somebody to take care of him. He mustered up bachelor courage and popped a question which she answered affirmatively.

"Please find inclosed postal draft for the 1 carat diamond you advertised in your broadcast June 6."

Two years ago the cashier of a prominent Los Angeles jewelry firm stared at the return address on the envelope containing a British postal money order.

It looked like a hoax, but the letter seemed genuine. Certainly there was no question about the draft. The letter and draft were four weeks old.

No one yet has found out what it was that prompted the mysterious G.B.R. to purchase a diamond in a city on another hemisphere when, as is obvious, he must have been literally sitting on more diamonds than any one jewelry firm would ever stock. Nevertheless, he got his diamond to complete a transaction that has the Leroy Jewelers and Station KECA still baffled, for, having received his diamond, the firm's distant customer promptly went into postal oblivion. . . .

From the Tonga and Austral Islands of the South Pacific comes another interestingly dramatic part time signals have played in lives of men. Some years ago between California ports and the Islands there plied a trading schooner which, for certain reasons, is not to be mentioned. The skipper was an old island trader, accustomed to getting properly ginned up at intervals he deemed appropriate. Thus, he gave orders to bring the vessel to, the engines idled down to keep up headway only.

The fog, meantime, grew thicker, and no landmark, however large, could conceivably be visible. While the crew took things as a matter of course, being used to the idiosyncrasy of the master, the skipper himself, sat by his radio, waiting for the sharp clear signal of the Australian radio. It came at last

Most of the crew thought this was stretching pride and skill too much. Several took him up on the bet, not believing for an instant that he could come within miles of guessing the position of the ship in that soupy mist.

The following morning the fog lifted and, behold! there was no landmark in sight. A few hours later the ship was at its tiny berth in a sleepy Tonga village. The old captain paid off his bets to an elated crew. It was not for some weeks later, when back in Oakland, California, he heard a news commentator tell of a report that had made its way from the deep South Pacific, telling that a portion of an Island cliff had fallen into the sea. It was after this that the old sea-farer resolved to moderate his alcoholics. He resolved, at the same time, to run down those members of his crew to whom he had paid out on a bet he really had won.

There remains to tell of a drama that called for quick wit and a nerve straining pitting of that wit against an approaching time signal, the striking of which was to have ended the life of a human being. . . . First, however, be it known, that the everyday significance of time signals is rooted in law. When Radio was young the Federal Communications Code made it obligatory for all stations to identify themselves at intervals. Some interprising commercial genius hit on the idea of making these legally required program breaks pay their way. Thus came into custom station identifications, to which are coupled time signals paid for by shrewd business

firms who know how to make time pay.

And now . . .

"I'm going to end my life when I hear your midnight time signal!"

The lone night operator of a major independent station was flabbergasted at this tense and desperate sentence.

"I'm tired of living, but I want to die talking to somebody."

The telephonist quick-wittedly kept up a running fire of conversation with the death-resigned woman somewhere in the city, talking away the last seven minutes of her last day on earth. She beat a tattoo on the glass panel of the office booth, to attract the attention of the midnight trick announcer. He was making ready to play the last two transcriptions of a musical interlude before signing the station off air, but came running to read a note the telephonist frantically scribbled.

"Call police. Trace call. Woman threatens suicide."

The resourceful girl then started a grimly humorous and nerve-wracking game with the death-seeking woman. What kind of a time signal would she like to hear? A long one? A loud one? A soft one? Wouldn't she want a little farewell song played right before it, a song especially for her?

The second hand seemed to race around the studio clock. Midnight came. Late listeners failed to hear a familiar station sign-off. A waltz recording kept on spilling melody into their living and bedrooms.

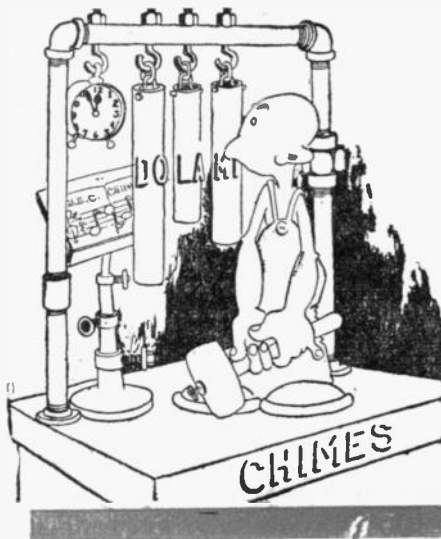
Suddenly the voice of the would-be suicide broke off. The operator's heart stood still. Then a strong, friendly masculine and official voice:

"It's okay, sister. You can stop now. We got her."

Two minutes after midnight the station's announcer broke in with the familiar time signal and sign-off.

Somewhere, maybe, that night, many a listener smiled amusedly and said, "I bet they were asleep at the switch, coming in late like that."

However, it may be that an announcer and a telephone girl slept a little sounder with the thought of a job well done."

FOOD FILOSOFY

WHEN it comes to food we wonder if you know your A-B-C? Perhaps we should say A-B-C-D-E-F-G, for that is how the vitamins which we have in mind go. One way or another, it won't do any harm to review them here, for it is generally accepted that they are extremely necessary to our normal good health and well-being.

Vitamin A: Builds up resistance and appetite. When you feel tired and are not very hungry, try a dish of bananas and cream.

Vitamin B: Attends to our nerves. If you require it, just remember that B is spelled "bee," and that the bee makes honey.

Vitamin C: Help us get the most out of the air we breathe. Sip a glass of orange juice when next you open a window.

Vitamin D: Is very good for the muscles. To obtain it, just follow in Pop-eye's footsteps and eat your spinach.

Vitamin E: Is necessary to reproduction. A salad of lettuce and watercress will not guarantee results, but it won't hurt you any either.

Vitamin F: Encourages growth and a rosy complexion. Oatmeal and rye bread, or oats and rye in other forms are said to contain it. Note: By other forms, we do not mean that the rye should be taken as a liquid!

Vitamin G: Is vital to calcium metabolism, which means stronger bones. Use eggs and yeast if you have a weak skeleton.

Fish, especially codfish, is rich in many vitamins, so this week we are glad to offer a fish recipe called Codfish a la Fisherman. In order to prepare it, you will need the following materials:

Two pounds of codfish, boned and skinned and cut into four-inch squares. One-half cup of chopped bacon. One medium-size onion, chopped very fine. Four cups of cubed potatoes. One tablespoon of salt. One quarter teaspoon of pepper. One cup of parsley. One large can of tomatoes. One cup of celery, chopped fine. Four tablespoons of shortening. And one clove of garlic, also chopped very fine.

Of course, if you're in a hurry, you can get your codfish vitamins at the drug store as a pill or a liquid, but if you have the time and want something more tasty, try fixing the above items as follows:

Melt the shortening in a pan and then add the bacon, celery, onions, garlic, parsley and salt and brown, pour in the tomatoes and bring to a boil. Having washed and drained the cod, spread it on the bottom of a large casserole or roasting pan. Put the potatoes on top, and then pour the tomatoes and seasonings over the potatoes. This done just cover, and bake at 350 degrees for thirty or forty minutes, or until done.

This recipe should give you plenty of A, D and F vitamins.

For the rest of your dinner, you might serve a shrimp cocktail, some olives, a consomme, a sliced-tomatoes-with-may-

The World on Your Dial

By Earl G. De Haven

SEVERAL weeks ago in this column I told of the remarkable feat of the French Government Short Wave Station in Paris, beaming its nightly broadcast particularly "to our listeners in California." Careful check has been made nightly on this transmission and five nights out of seven in the week clear, understandable reception may be enjoyed. Now another scientific achievement, singularly remarkable, is registered for "Radio Saigon," known as "The Voice of France in the Far East."

"Radio Saigon" directs a daily broadcast to the Pacific Coast of North America from 7 to 8 a. m. which is received here. The conclusion of this program coincides with the beginning of the "Empire News Broadcast" over the British Broadcasting Corporation stations in London. One of the B. B. C. transmitters is directed to Asia at this hour and apparently lays down an excellent signal in Saigon. Accordingly, "Radio Saigon" relays or re-broadcasts the London station so successfully that we in California receive the re-broadcast more clearly than it comes direct from London at this particular hour, even from the London transmitter beamed to North America. Truly a triumph of no small magnitude for French radio transmission engineers and short wave experts.

Incidentally, French radio engineers were in the vanguard of the pioneers of short wave broadcasting fifteen years ago. Old-timers will recall that the original "Radio Saigon" was generally considered to be the most reliable (from the standpoint of consistent reception), of all short wave broadcasting units operating at that time. Radio dealers and servicemen alike, actually relied on "Radio Saigon" in determining whether a short wave received was providing normal reception or not.

Reminiscing on "the good old days" with Mr. K. O. Hester of Eastern-Columbia, (thru whose courtesy I had the opportunity to test the phenomenal little ADMIRAL Radio), he made the statement that in those days "a radio receiver was judged by the way in which it could play Saigon." Then, as now, this famous "Indo-China station sent its programs to us at breakfast time. Generally, classical and semi-classical music (mostly instrumental), was broadcast.

Today, the pleasant-voiced lady announcer of the new "Radio Saigon" attempts to lure us to that far-off land with phraseology such as this: "this broadcast for our friends on the Pacific Coast of the United States comes from Saigon, in that colorful, mystical land that you've dreamed about so many times. Indo-China, the place you've always hoped you might visit some day."

Our local Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce has often been referred to as being capable of effectively using more alluring adjectives of description, to entice the world to sunny, Southern

Many an ambitious youngster, realizing practically that the technical end of the radio industry is, perhaps, a safer place to be than in other departments, has interested himself in necessary sound mechanics.

For such youngsters this week Al Span, efficient effect director for "tio":

CE. gave a few practical sugges-

"Study the science of acoustics and experiment with time synchronizations of readers' lines and sound effect directions.

"Make a list of all devices used by sound men in their work. Learn how these devices are made, under what circumstances they were made, how they operate and are operated in use.

"Develop more than a little knowledge of electricity.

"Study tonal differences of different devices in order that you may develop a sensitivity to shades of tones when they are used in combination."

And, finally, Span suggested that sound effect students learn to evaluate dramatic situations in which sound is important, so that the sounded effect will give proper "bang" to the situation.
