While Hollywood celebrities of press, screen and radio looked on, dance-inspired couples, led by two South American rumba and conga experts, dipped and weaved; wiggled hips and bent knees, beneath a towering and ornamented ceiling,

on a floor half a city block square, flanked by hooths and tables, entrancingly lighted; renewed across centuries kinship with those in whom ancient lyres and tympani once had inspired the grace of bodies in musical motion.

Sports Family of Radio

YOU can't go very far in radio without bumping into one of the Slocum family. They get around.

When the Slocum boys were small, father William J. Slocum held a refreshing parental view about careers. "You boys can do anything that interests you," he said.

"If your heart's set on being a street sweeper, why I'll buy you the best broom on the market."

He didn't have to. They've all gone into radio, and now the father himself is in it, too.

Father Bill Slocum is known wherever games are played. He was a sports writer and editor for 30 years before going in for radio full time.

He is with General Mills Corporation now as their radio ambassador to baseball.

Eldest son is Bill Slocum, 28, director of Columbia Broadcasting system's special events department. He's a lanky 6-footer who slouches around in loose tweeds.

Son Jack, 26, makes things sparkle in the Columbia sports department where he works with Mel Allen, ace CBS sports reporter.

Son "Tod" Charles Slocum, just 23, is an unknown quantity yet, but liable to shoot off in any direction.

Frank, 16, is still in school. With radio talk flying around his family group, he is softening up. His chief interest now in radio lies in the hot and sweet bands.

Bill Slocum Sr. has jolly eyes, hearty voice, and is not eclipsed by his sons. He was the first man to have a regularly scheduled sports broadcast on the air, back in the crystal detector and earphone days of 1922, over station WJZ. The senior Slocum then was sports editor for the New York Herald-Tribune. Before that he had been an ace reporter of sports in general, baseball in particular.

As General Mills' man of good will to baseball he travels 50,000 miles a year.

Bill Jr. gets around too. He pops up all over with a radio reporter, technicians, and a ton of special equipment to put big events on the air for American listeners. He is one of the few men who covered both Avila Camacho's and President Roosevelt's inaugurations this year.

Bill got his training for radio work on newspapers, too, as did Jack Slocum, the brother in the CBS sports department.

The youngest son in radio, Tod, hasn't picked his branch of radio. He keeps meeting people who not only tell him what a mark his old man has set up for him to shoot at, but how good his brothers are.

Tod is unmoved. And when the family is all in town at once and gets together over the dinner table, Tod holds up his end as well as anyone.

Mrs. Slocum long ago gave up any thought of banishing shop talk from the table.

Through the storm of radio talk, 16-year-old brother Frank is calm, somewhat disappointed.

"Here are all you fellows with an inside track in radio and you haven't even got me a special pipe line to Glenn Miller," he says.

And he goes and turns on his radio to add to his knowledge of hot swing.

FARMERS' EDITOR: No mere theorist is Charley Stookey, CBS director of agricultural activities who is "editor" of "Columbia's Country Journal" every Saturday. (KNX 11:30 to 12:00 m.)

Stookey is a "dirt farmer," born and raised in St. Clair county, Ill., his father a farmer before him. Stookey's favorite hobby—aside from fishing—is raising vegetables in the garden behind his Belleville, Ill., home.

His greatest ambition as a boy was to own a grocery store. Pungent aromas and sight of good things to eat fascinated him on infrequent trips to the local Belleville store. Shopping at the grocery was even more fun than fishing in the summer or trapping muskrats and skunks in the winter.

On August 11, 1924, Stookey made his radio debut. He spoke for five minutes on a farm program, giving listeners tips on how to grow fruit. Five years went by, however, before he got his first paid job on the air, with a station in Chicago. He joined KMOX, CBS' station in St. Louis, on February 4, 1935, as emcee of a hill-billy program. Shortly afterward, Stookey was made KMOX farm reporter, and July 30 last, with inauguration of the "Country Journal" series, became farm reporter for the entire CBS network.

Taking his job seriously, Stookey travels frequently and distantly in rural America, talking with farmers of high and low economic degree, from them gathering information on conditions and circumstances of agricultural significance which he relays to the nation's farmers via his program.

AUDIENCE PENOLOGISTS: A social scarecrow is the recurring problem of criminals' parole, a subject on which many a sociologist sharply disagrees with hardbitten and realistic penologists. Such differences usually are reduced to the poignant question: To be paroled or not to be?

Getting away from the usual crime story formula, Max Marcin's "Crime Doctor" dramatizes penology problems involving the man who has committed a crime, been caught, and has been placed in the custody of correctional institutions.

Thus, CBS audiences "sit in" on coast-to-coast juries which join a fictional examining committee in determining whether the prisoner should be released after serving the minimum sentence, whether he should be compelled to "do all his time," or whether other rehabilitative measures are to be taken.

Amateur penologists have an opportunity to weigh the evidence, presented in dramatized flashbacks. They learn of the crime, the background of the criminal . . . all the facts available in real life to a real prison board of examiners in a similar situation.

A \$50 award goes to each of the two listeners who gives the best pro or con judgment—based on analysis of the facts presented in each broadcast. Authors of the 10 next best letters (all 100 words or less) receive \$10 each.

The fictional characters of the "examining committee" heard in each broadcast will be Dr. Benjamin Ordway (Crime Doctor), professional man D. A. Miller, and businessman Harold Sayers.

Make 'em Laugh--Bernie's Creed!

In This All Out Interview Bernie Scans His Life!

AS A KID in Bayonne, New Jersey, I had a yen to be a concert violinist—a real honest-to-the-Good-Lad violinist. My blacksmith father wanted me to be a civil engineer, but my mother was for me. So while we argued, I let my hair grow long and managed to scrape enough dough together to buy a fiddle and take lessons.

A little snide about four years younger who lived on our block played an accordion, then a novel instrument, and we decided to team up. After our debut in a third-rate vaudeville house, the team of Ben Bernie and Phil Baker went on the road. To me those dates were merely steppingstones to the Philharmonic, and with that dream in the back of my medulla we hit all the tank towns, moving gradually up the scale from \$35 a week to \$50 . . . to \$75 . . . and then, so help me, to \$125!

Then a wet blanket fell on my concert aspirations. Phil and I were doing our act as part of the floor show at the old Edelweiss Gardens in Chicago, backed up by as pretty a Viennese waltz orchestra as I've ever heard. One day the talented old first violinist told me his salary. Twenty-five bucks a week! For musicians who could actually read music! Each one of the strings in that combination could play rings around me, yet here was I, a kid with practically no fiddle technique, making almost three times as much. What hope was there for me in serious music? The better I got on the fiddle, the less I'd earn. If the managers ever heard that I wanted to play Caprice Viennois with double stoppings, they'd probably knock \$50 a week off the pay check.

Well, I did a lot of muddled, perplexed thinking about the relative value of things in a cockeyed world. Maybe the Old Man was right; maybe I'd better resume my engineering studies. But even that meant dough for tuition, so I filled in with a fiddling job at the old Haymarket on Sixth Avenue where on Saturday nights I doubled in slinging mugs of beer. Many's the mug I slung at many a mug . . .

One night in a cafe I got chinning with an easygoing guy with a drawl—one of those kindly souls you confide in, you know? I told him my fiddle-violin dilemma. He listened sympathetically, then he said:

"Ben, if you want to get into the big money, forget that fiddle and make 'em laugh. Anybody who can make 'em laugh can write his own ticket."

For me, of course, who'd never opened my kisser on stage, it made the future even more uncertain. And in a dead-black frame of mind, Baker and I opened a three-day engagement in Hopewell, Va.

In those days there were usually five "artists" on the bill, but only the first two had any kind of contract. For the rest of us, the first show told the tale: If good, we finished the three days; if

bad, veni, vidi, scrami! Every old trouper remembers that cryptic sign backstage:

"Don't send out your laundry until after the first show."
 "(Signed) The Management."

On my way off stage that first afternoon I passed the manager and gave him a cheery, "Good afternoon." The reply was a stony stare that would have done credit to the Archbishop of Canterbury, and it seemed obvious we were through. Thin-skinned as I was, I took it deeply to heart. With that hollow, gone feeling, I walked the streets alone.

You know the story if you've read any of those old-time WCTU pamphlets. Discouragement . . . despair . . . a future wrecked . . . utter despondence. Then, DRINK! Yowsah, Bernie, you might as well come clean. I knew that men in trouble drank whiskey. So I had me a snorter, then another, and then another. Old Man Rum had me.

Eventually instinct steered me back toward the theater. On my way a tobacco store caught my eye. Just the thing to make the picture of carefree affluence complete, I walked in and plunked a quarter on the glass counter.

"Give me three cigars," I ordered.

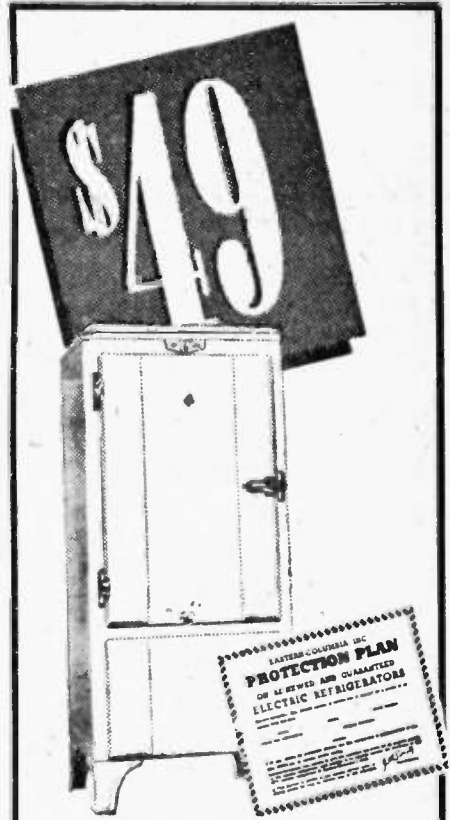
Phil was amazed when I gazed out for the opening of our second show, but I hadn't a care in the world, nor an inhibition. In fact, I was so strictly 100 proof that I kept puffing furiously on my cigar, Baker all the while rolling an apprehensive eye in my direction. Then it happened. It was one of those believe-it-or-not things.

A frankly candid balconyite was not much impressed by my tipsy fiddling. A tobacco chewer he was—and an accomplished one. Perfect aim had he, and after expressing himself lustily with a single word, "Lousy," he added a fluid exclamation point in the form of a copious squirt of tobacco juice which struck the keyboard of my fiddle with a resounding thwack!

"Ahhh!" I blurted out in the astonishment of the moment, "there's a critic in the house!"

To my surprise, the audience roared. Seeing that they wanted to play, I shot a remark to the gallery. Back bounced an answer and from then on flowed a steady stream of repartee.

I don't remember taking those six bows but, according to sober eyewitnesses, (Concluded on Page Eleven)

GLENN HARDY:

Shields to Hardy to You, Has Been the Slogan for a Brace of Newsmen

SHIELDS to Hardy to You!

Yes, that's been a winning combination now for seven years. It seems quite a while to have been on the air for the same sponsor and at the same time, but that's the story.

Back in 1934, February we think it was, Frederick Shields spoke those familiar words:

"Now we take you to the press studio for the news. Here's Glenn Hardy!"

That was the beginning of this news broadcast series at 9:00 each evening with the Shields-Hardy combination and it has been going on like that ever since. All of which may or may not be something of a record in west coast broadcasting. Granting that these fellows may get the nod for most consistently popping out of miscellaneous loud speakers at the same time and for the same sponsor (which, if you put out the cat during the commercial, we might mention is Alka-Seltzer), here's a word or two about the newscasting half of the team, Glenn Hardy.

The birth records back in St. Louis, Mo., show Charles Glennon Hardy as having first gone on the air with a lusty squawk on March 4, 1906. (And, with publication costs what they are, this parenthetical statement covers the detail of Glenn's life: Schooling, Central high and Washington university, St. Louis; odd jobs, forty-seven of them—until he went to work at KMTR in Hollywood in 1932. Ed.)

Nineteen thirty-two, if you remember, was a tough time to be looking for a job, even in radio—or even in anything else. Glenn wanted to be a radio actor. With the brilliant cerebral flash that to further the ambition to act on the air the best place to be was in a radio station, Glenn applied, got a job on his own terms—\$10 a week, went to work punching "plugs" in a switchboard, opening the mail, filling the inkwells. There was quite a turnover at KMTR in those days and through a fortunate series of circumstances, a year later Glenn was chief announcer. He still wonders how it happened, because there was a standing bet between the studio and transmitter engineers that Glenn would miss the correct time on time-signal announcements by from two minutes to an hour. Shortly after that Glenn bought himself a pair of glasses.

Well, it was about this time—let's see, 1933—that Gus Mack discovered Glenn had a certain sincerity of delivery that worked well with the Beverly Hillbillies (mostly the "originals," too!) and when Gus was away from the studio on occasion he left Glenn in charge. Gus later

found out that Glenn spent most of his boyhood in the Missouri Ozark country, two jumps behind a plow.

At KMTR Glenn met Van C. Newkirk, at present program director of the Mutual-Don Lee network, who offered him a job as m.c. on the Hollywood Barn Dance over KNX. Glenn took the job, and for the next two years was on the air one hour five nights each week with the Crockett Family and two hours on Saturday with the Barn Dance variety show. And it was through the Crockett Family, featured on the program, that Glenn feels he "made friends" with a large part of the listening audience here in the west.

Shortly after starting the Hollywood Barn Dance broadcasts, Glenn began reporting the news regularly at 9 o'clock. That takes us back to the beginning of those seven years on the air at the same time and for the same sponsor. As to why Glenn has been fortunate enough to continue in the 9 o'clock spot over that period of time he has just this to say:

"I've always thought of the folks out there at home who listen as my friends. I suppose that feeling started with my work on the Crockett Family program and carried over to broadcasting of the news. In broadcasting I've never had the feeling that I was talking to the "great radio audience" but rather to just one family out there by the radio or perhaps to just one person. As a matter of fact, if I ever started thinking during a broadcast that a great number of people were listening—I think I'd be scared to death!"

Yes, Glenn's work is that way—friendly. So, when he says: "Good evening, friends!" . . . why not? He means it!

Music In Wax

JENNY is fast becoming very popular—particularly the Decca recording featuring Mildred Bailey and the Delta Rhythm Boys. From the Harris musical, "Lady In the Dark," the saga of this extraordinary person is told anxiously by Miss Bailey, whose excellent enunciation might well be copied by a number of other popular singers. The only fault of the recording is the obvious timidity of the Rhythm Boys, who pick up their cues almost too late, and then sing their lines in an abashed fashion. The lyrics tell the story of Jenny, who spoke 27 languages but couldn't say "No."

Reverse: When That Man Is Dead and Gone. Irving Berlin, this week, thank goodness, waxes not sentimental, but rather vicious. "Under the lawn, dead and gone," refers to a gent with a moustache who Mr. Berlin wishes under the sod. A blue tune—the type for the blare of muted trumpets—but 'tis Mildred Bailey again and the Delta Rhythm Boys, but good.

Boogie Woogie Conga, recorded by Will Bradley and his orchestra for Columbia, with Ray McKinley as vocalist, is one of those things with a preponderance of rhythm and drums. There is something

attractive about the melody, but is there anything attractive about the lyrics and the vocal? Only out and out McKinley fans will think so.

Reverse: I Need Somebody to Love. A nice set of saxophones leads off Terry Allen's vocal. The melody moves slowly into a blare of brass, back to the saxophones again, and then the full band comes in for a typical Bradley finale.

A Little Church in England. Glenn Miller on Bluebird, with Ray Eberle, Dorothy Claire and the Modernaires sentimentally accompanied by an organ. Irving Berlin's latest effort concerns churches—English churches—and their subsequent reduction to heaps of broken brick and rubble. "A Little Church in England" is undoubtedly due to become quite popular. Mr. Berlin, as always, is quick to sense a timely trend and capitalize on it.

We met, and talked with, Irene Rich! Twenty-one years ago Georges spat over the side of a New England fishing trawler, heaving on the swells of the Grand Banks, and exclaimed:

"Lee-sen, my fran'. Much bettaire for you eef you spand more tam look-eeng aftaire de nets den making thees sighs ovaire thees Irene Recch, a gal t'ree t'ousan' mile away."

And we came to meet her after all these years, to find a lovely woman, matured experience glistening in eyes that have a veiling light of deep understanding and spirituality, to learn:

It's always Easter for Irene!

Almost the same girl, despite the fact she's over 40 and not at all reluctant to "Welch's grape juice" the fact.

So we took a deep breath, estimating this girl who had been the idol of a horny-handed New England fisherman fresh from the wars, and said:

"What is Irene Rich's reason for existence?"

"That," she said seriously, "would take a lot of stopping in one's tracks and taking a good look at oneself, wouldn't it? Wouldn't it be doing what one has been doing for more than 20 years, acting, doing one's best to do a good job of that, trying to live up to one's ideal of one's self, not letting people down who expect reasonable services from you, being big enough to meet life as it comes? Voices Across Seas of War

Britain's Babies in America Talk to Dad and Mother at Home!

"HELLO, Mummy . . . hello, Pops . . . This is David in America . . ." The thin, excitement-tight, 8-year-old voice leaps the Atlantic, falling on the ears of grateful London parents.

"David, my child!" . . . A voice, full of breaking, goes out from the old world to the new. "It's good to hear you, son!"

Through regular two-way broadcasts of National Broadcasting Company, scores of "Davids" and their sisters—British child refugees who have found haven in the United States and Canada—are being reunited for glad moments with their parents back home. Six times since last October NBC has opened the airplanes to "cheerios" and halting greetings between child refugees and their war-weary parents.

Conversations are sincere, artless. Permitted to talk about anything, seldom do they mention war or its hardships.

Thirteen-year-old Christine Vassar spoke with her mother, father and grandmother gathered in the British Broadcasting Corporation's bombproof studio.

"I have to practice the piano one hour—one single, solid hour every day!" declares Christine.

"Oh, I say," her mother counters. "You wouldn't practice at home, and neither would you drink your milk. Do you drink milk in the States?"

"Oh, yes. Everybody drinks milk here." Daughter and mother grope for another subject. The mother breaks her silence, voice trembling.

"I forgot you were away the other day and set your place at the table."

Christine, blinking hard, caught her breath. "Oh, Mummy . . ."

Tensely dramatic are these homely chats, but they have their lighter side. One father couldn't believe that it was his son, Allan, talking.

"Snort, Allan," his father asks. "Snort like a pig—you know—like you used to."

Allan snorted. "Good boy! It's you all right!" the father exclaimed.

These are stock comments found in nearly every refugee broadcast:

1) Parents ask how the children like American ice cream (one 12-year-old boy said he "hated" it).

2) What they think of New York's skyscrapers. (Invariable reply: "They're jolly!")

3) Have they gained weight? (Without exception they have.)

4) Parents regretfully observe that their offspring are picking up an American accent and Yankee slang. ("Okay" is first Americanism they learn.)

Refugees in Canada are brought to

studios of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation in Montreal, Toronto, Vancouver. Names are radioed to NBC's London representatives, who locate the parents. Fred Bate, NBC London representative, describes the meeting of the parents:

"They are invited to have dinner together before the program—factory worker, industrialist, farmer, titled aristocrat. Shyly, they talk of the forthcoming broadcast that will link them with their children. Once the common interest is felt, formality and stiffness fade. They are united by a warm bond, eagerness, to hear the voices of loved ones."

In NBC's New York studios the children gather around a table, earphones clamped to their heads, eyes glistening. Ben Grauer and George Hieks, special events announcers, have handled all the refugee shows and know how to put them at their ease.

Refugee children sent to the United States for safety will exchange Easter greetings with their parents in England

during a two-way conversation across the Atlantic, Sunday, April 13, from 8:30 to 9:30 a. m. over KFI.

well-rounded and well-established career, the material comforts of wealth, youth when most women look fearfully at age, beauty at a time when many women resign themselves to shadows?"

She smiled, her mouth curving entrancingly:

"That depends on where you are sitting, old boy! I started out with nothing—with no more prospects, let's say, than any other woman of similar characteristics. But I reached out for life. It made me an actress. I tried hard to be a good actress, to earn what came my way. There's nothing wrong with that, is there?"

Admittedly, there wasn't. She is a tremendous person, this Irene Rich, the sort of person Georges Aligou would have given his right arm to have known (at least it was he, who before the fish harvest ended, had laid claim to the newspaper photograph of Irene I had glued

to a bulkhead of the forecastle), the sort of person who dignifies friendship, who is your friend when you meet her. . . . She can be talked to with outrageous frankness. So we tacked back to love and marriage.

"Will there be a fourth, Irene?"

"No, never." She was positive about this.

"Isn't that admitting you have no ideals about love and marriage?"

"But I have," she protested.

"What are they?"

"Simply—a successful marriage is a practical working together, in shoulder-to-shoulder fashion, seeing in each other the answer to a common necessity of companionship, of accomplishment, of holding to marriage as a godly concept—of living good dreams for each other in a practical world."

"But, these didn't work for you?"

"Perhaps, because living fully—doing the best with one's material—is im-

portant. Marriage that doesn't meet these simple requirements isn't marriage at all."

We watched her eyes. They are brown and glow with an inner urgency. Suddenly we realized that Irene Rich has learned from marriage that unhappiness is, as she said, a preparation for life, that, lovely as women have a right to be, she is still a woman for whom love is necessary, despite her brave assurances that there will be no fourth man in her life; that she is free to do her work, to live her life as she has earned a right to live it.

When the fourth comes, perhaps, in all the new strengths of belief and experience she has gained, he will come, as she says:

" . . . as a clamor in my heart in God's disposition of Irene Rich."

In the meantime, Irene Rich devotes herself to being a good daughter to her mother; a good mother to her daughters: Frances, the elder, a fine sculptress; Jane, the younger, married to William F. Muller of Glen Ridge, N. J.; to being a good grandmother to Jane's tiny son.

WORLD ON YOUR DIAL *By Earl G. De Haven*

IT IS SPRING once again—that season when we're told that a "young man's fancy lightly turns to thoughts of love," et cetera, et cetera. About this time, too, the short-wave enthusiast usually has his receiver thoroughly checked and put into first class operating condition, to the end that he may enjoy the best possible reception from "the world on his dial." With that in mind we'll devote a portion of the column space this time to subjects pertinent to improving your reception of programs, whether on local broadcast or foreign short wave frequencies.

One of the questions most often asked is in regard to improved types of aerial and ground equipment, particularly by apartment house dwellers. To those who have purchased receivers in the last two or three years, let us say that all such sets should have built-in antennas that are designed to give the best results of which the receiver is capable, and that

the installation of outside antenna systems would be of no advantage whatsoever. As a matter of fact, it would be necessary to alter the antenna coil in the radio itself before the conventional antenna kits on the market could be connected to these 1939-41 model radios, and even then it is extremely doubtful if any real improvement in reception could be noted.

Those of our Reader-Listeners who own receivers built prior to 1939 may derive benefit from practically any of the antenna kits being marketed. Advice of the radio dealer should, of course, be obtained to determine which particular one would be best adapted to the set in question. For those aforementioned apartment house dwellers, there are both base-mounting and bracket-mounting types of telescoping rod antennas that will actually improve both broadcast-band and short wave reception on radios manufactured prior to 1939. Some of the best of these are manufactured by the Ward Products Co., and in addition to being easy to install or erect, are reasonable in price, the range being from \$2.95 to \$6.95. Any of you who desire more information on antennas of this type can have it by addressing a request to your columnist in care of Radio Life and enclosing a self-addressed,

stamped envelope for reply.

Now for a few reception notes. Many of you will be glad to know that MTCY on 11.78 Mc., "The Voice of Manchukuo," is quite consistent once again and showing good signals. Schedule remains the same—10:30 to 11:20 p. m. And—this is interesting—JWV, Tokyo, Japan, on 11.73 Mc., was heard carrying the baseball games (in an evidently early-starting season), after 10 p. m. on two nights we dialed them last week. Another Tokyo transmission is reported from 4:20 to 6:30 a. m., using JLU-3 on 15.16 Mc.

Unquestionably the best reception ever enjoyed from the far-famed "Voice of Guatemala," TGWA, on 9.68 Mc., was on Thursday last, from 8:15 p. m. to sign-off, when the marimba band concert came through with great volume, unusual clarity and practically no fading. Two old favorites, "Nola" and "Yolanda," were interpreted more beautifully than we have ever heard them from any radio station! Accordingly, we shall revisit 9.68 Mc. on our short wave dial more often after this, and suggest you do the same. 73's now, and pleasant DXing!

Cream of asparagus soup
Gherkins, green cured olives, radishes, celery on branch
Wilson Tender Made ham a la Edward Arnold
Baked candied sweet potatoes
Creamed mashed potatoes
Green peas in butter
Artichokes with Hollandaise sauce
Roman salad with wine vinegar and olive oil

Recipe for Cream Asparagus Soup

1 small onion	2 lbs. fresh asparagus
1 leek	1 qt. rich milk
4 tbsps. butter	4 tbsps. cream
1 cup flour	1 tsp. Seasonettes

Put in a saucepan the onion and the leek, chopped, and the butter, and let simmer slowly. Add flour and simmer little more. Put in the stems of the asparagus and the milk and let boil till done. Strain through a sieve. Put in pot and add the cream and stir well. Season with Seasonettes, cut the tips of asparagus and boil them in salt water until done. Add to the soup before serving.

Recipe for Ham a la Edward Arnold

(I made this recipe and dedicate it to one of the finest men in America, Mr. Edward Arnold, because, to my knowledge, he is an epicurian connoisseur—in other words, he knows good grub.)

1 Wilson Tender Made Ham, 10 lbs.	1 jar Signet pears
4 tbsps. dry mustard	1 large can jumbo ripe olives
4 tbsps. melted butter	2 cups sherry wine
4 tbsps. brown sugar	1 tsp. Seasonettes
1 jar Signet peaches	

Mix the mustard, brown sugar, butter, and Seasonettes. Decorate the ham first with pears to form a rose in the center of the ham,—to fasten the pears use 2 toothpicks for each piece of pear—then surround the rest of the ham with quartered peaches in the same way, fastening each quarter with 2 toothpicks. Then warm the mustard, brown sugar, butter and Seasonettes in a small sauce pan, and when sauce is well mixed, pour in the empty spaces between the fruits. Place ham in a roasting pan and pour 2 cups of cooking sherry on the bottom of the pan. Put to bake in a preheated oven at 400 deg. and bake uncovered for 5 minutes per pound. When done, take from oven and insert on each toothpick one jumbo ripe olive and serve.

EASTER NOTES—Easter was originally the name of a Saxon goddess and the whole month of April was once called Eastermonth. The resurrection of Jesus Christ, which is celebrated at this time, replaces the Saxon spring festivals which celebrated the resurrection of the earth. The real name of Easter is Pasch, which is also the name of the Jewish Feast of Passover.

The custom of Easter eggs goes back to the Persians. The Christians adopted it because the egg represents a new life, and a new life is what Christ offered us. Easter eggs were originally painted only in red to symbolize the blood of the sacrifice which Jesus made for this new life.

In general, the whole theme of Easter is one of rebirth. Things are renovated, rejuvenated, given a new lease on life at this time and we even refresh our outlook and appearance with new clothes. That's why your table should be as gay as you can make it this Sunday—with flowers, nice linen, colorful dishes, and a general atmosphere of rejoicing. This is one time of the year when the setting of the festal board should be a happy ritual with sunshine radiating from everything and everybody.

SOME LITTLE KNOWN THINGS ABOUT EGGS IN GENERAL—You throw away over 10 per cent of an egg when you discard the shell. They blacken your silver because of the sulphur in them. They can be dried and used in powdered form, can be preserved by covering with lime water, and substitutes are available, made from the albumen and casein of milk.

An egg has just as much protein value as wheat flour, more than twice the fat value of milk, and nearly double the calories of potatoes. From the standpoint of minerals they are especially important in that they furnish phosphates, which build up the body. Large eggs should weigh at least a pound and a half a dozen; medium eggs, a pound and a quarter.

A hatching egg not only contains the embryo of a baby chick, but enough nourishment to keep the chick going until it can shift for itself. Duck eggs weigh twice as much as a hen's, and a goose egg more than twice as much as a duck's.

Chef Milani's Egg Recipes

Recipe for Eggs Brasilienne

- 1/2 lb. rice
- 4 eggs
- 1 can Superio mushroom sauce
- 1 slice Wilson Tender Made ham
- 1/2 tsp. Seasonettes
- 2 tbsps. butter
- 1/2 cup grated cheese

Wash rice four times and boil until tender. Mince ham and saute in butter. Divide rice in four equal parts while it is piping hot, and place on four plates. Place a poached egg on top and cover with hot mushroom sauce and the minced ham. Sprinkle with grated cheese and serve.

Recipe for Eggs Suzette

- 4 medium size potatoes
- 5 tbsps. butter
- 1/2 pint rich milk
- 1 tbsp. flour
- 1 cup grated cheese
- 4 eggs

Bake the potato. Cut off the tops and scoop out the insides. Mash half of the potato that has been removed, add 2 tablespoons butter, season with Seasonettes and put back in the bottom of each potato shell. Break an egg in each, cover with cream sauce, sprinkle with grated cheese. Put one-half tablespoon butter on each one, replace top, and bake in a medium hot oven for 10 minutes.

For the cream sauce: Melt one tablespoon butter with tablespoon flour, when well mixed, add one-half pint of hot rich milk and stir for few minutes and use for the eggs.

Recipe for Eggs a la Gitanella

- 8 eggs
- 2 or 3 cloves garlic
- 1 pinch saffron
- 12 blanched and skinned almonds
- 2 slices bread, cut in one-inch squares
- 1/2 tsp. cumin seed, ground
- 1/2 tsp. Seasonettes
- 4 tbsps. olive oil

Put the oil in a small frying pan and lightly fry the garlic, almonds, and bread. Mix the saffron, cumin, and Seasonettes, add the fried garlic, almonds, and bread, and pound thoroughly. When reduced to a paste, add first a little of the oil in which the garlic and the other ingredients were fried, then a little water to thin the sauce. Pour the mixture into an oven-proof dish, break the eggs carefully into it, and put in a quick oven until the eggs are set.

Recipe for Boiled Beef

- 3 pounds boiling beef
- 1 onion
- 1 package dry vegetable soup mix
- 1 carrot
- 2 teaspoons Seasonettes

Boil 3 pounds of beef in 2 quarts of water and skim, then put in 1 onion and 1 carrot, cut in 4 parts, and add 2 level teaspoons of Seasonettes. Let simmer until beef is cooked. Strain liquid from the meat, put in a soup pot. Let stock reduce to 1 1/2 quarts and add 1 package of Superio dry vegetable soup mix. When vegetables are cooked, serve.

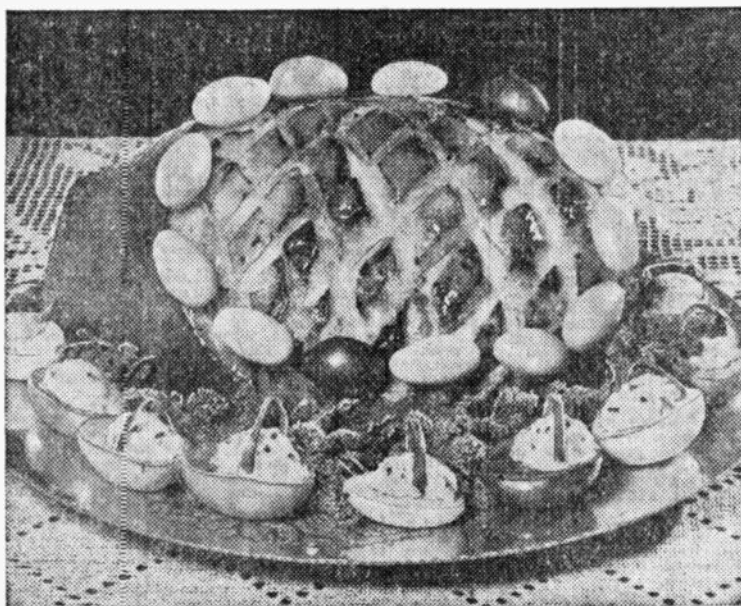

She "lives alone and likes it" (pending the clamor in her heart) in a smart Hollywood apartment, a large section of which has been made into a studio where she paints.

Before making her first regular appearance before the microphone in 1933, she had won acting laurels as a star of stage and screen, bringing to her NBC broadcasts such finished performance that she became a "must" on the average dialer's weekly listening schedule.

Oddly enough, today she broadcasts each week from the very site where she got her start in motion pictures. When she left a real estate job back in 1918, to appear as an extra girl with Paramount Pictures, the movie lot was then located at Sunset and Vine street in Hollywood, where now stands NBC's Hollywood Radio City.

Irene recently created a national sensation when, during Hollywood's benefit broadcast for Red Cross, she offered personally to collect any contribution of \$500 or more in the Los Angeles area and any contribution of \$5,000 or more coming from any other part of the country. Her subsequent flight to Miami, Fla., to collect that city's generous donation to the cause was widely heralded in the press.

We said, "It's always Easter for Irene." And here's proof:

On the corner of Sunset and Vine she stopped and clutched my arm:

"Here's my philosophy in a sentence: Each new minute, each onrushing hour, and each coming day is a resurrection. In the moment, the hour and the day we can realize we are born to live up to what we, remembering God, are told to do . . ."
