Two-way facilities between control point and both of the "front" headquarters, will smooth radio coverage, special radio facilities to carry the reports from Alexandria to Chicago, thence to the nation.

Radio Priority

In World War II, radio has assumed a tremendous importance in moulding public opinion both within and outside the transmitting belligerents. Adolf Hitler rode to power on the ether waves—he unified the Vaterland and diluted the morale of countries on the blitz list by the crafty use of radio. As a neutralizing agent, the V for victory campaign was conceived—its seeds were sown by the same medium. Clearly radio is a prime offensive as well as defensive weapon in a well conducted war these days."

Thus last week did Doug S. McKellar, staff member of KFI-KECA, western key-outlets for NBC, preface a statement of general interest to radio officialdom and the listening public.

Continued McKellar:

"By that token, Uncle Sam, now girding his loins for the fray, might well cast an appraising eye at his own broadcasting system. For of late there have been justifiable cries from that sys-

War In America

Few there are living in America today in proportion to the land's 130 million who have seen war first hand. Man's periodic outbursts of murder make a complex business, complicated by problems that rise in handling of machines of destruction, strategies in diplomacy and politics, tactics afield and at sea, disbursements of sums staggering to lay minds.

What war can be like was made possible as an experience, radio-vicariiously, this week by National Broadcasting Company.

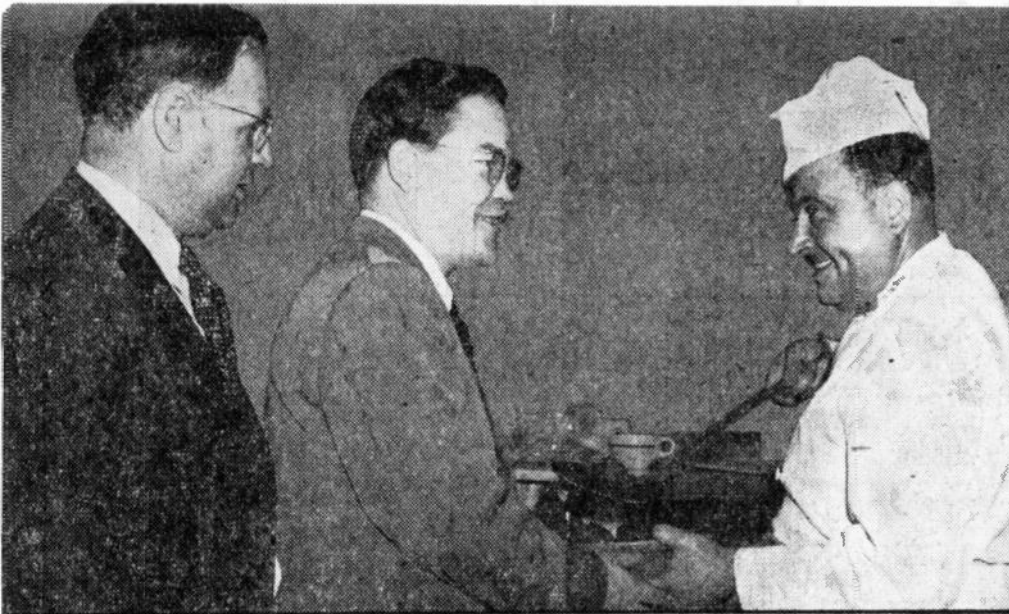
Announced NBC:

America's greatest peacetime "war," fought over 30,000 square miles in Texas and Louisiana with rumbling tanks, screaming dive bombers, blitz buggies,

parachute troops, artillery and infantry, will be covered from beginning to end in reports direct from the "front" over the Blue Network of the National Broadcasting Company.

To report tides of battle, David Garroway and Bob Stanton will give thirteen broadcasts (the first was on Monday, September 15) to be heard Monday through Friday, ten minutes each day. Sunday reports, September 21 and 28, will be heard during the regular news roundup at 12:45 for the West. The Blue Network (KECA) reports will end Monday, September 29.

Stanton, veteran of previous Army maneuvers, has been accredited to the Third Army, commanded by Lt. Gen. Walter Kreuger. With Stanton will be Engineer William Cummings, of NBC's Central Division headquarters. Stanton's

tem that plaintively murmur of unwarranted neglect in the defense program. The gist of these complaints is that the priorities board has passed radio by unheeding. Station managers in many parts of the country foresee the day, not far around the corner, when, for lack of materials allocated to supposedly more important defense industries, stations will have to suspend operations, one by one, for lack of replacements. Tubes and transmitter parts are not only hard to get, they are almost impossible to get; and with the low priority number allotted radio, in a few months such necessities will be as scarce as penguin wings. Should such a condition become fact we'd be able to tune all the stations on the dial with a couple of push buttons."

Without a remedy for these ills the ominous portent is, McKellar thought; with radio crippled or badly scotched its function of maintaining civilian and military morale would be seriously hampered; further, its offensive potentialities in distributing propaganda to other lands would suffer materially.

Contended McKellar: "It's the old story of robbing Peter to pay Paul; taking nourishment from one vital defense industry to feed others, some not nearly as deserving.

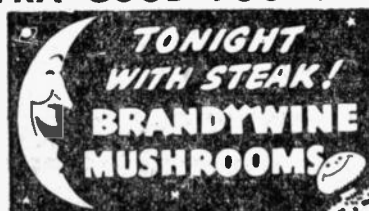

Broadcasting Company in sky-towering pile called "Radio City" in New York, he has, usually, left a minimum of 1000 letters. The letters have come from all parts of the world and when analyzed and classified are found to represent a cross-section of humanity's hopes, dreams, aspirations in a war-muddled world.

On a day last week an NBC official to an NBC mail reading department posed this question:

Are Americans alert to dangers that face this country in democracy's hour of trial?

Here is how alert Americans were as revealed by a publicity release from NBC:

A Texas oil man had a way of stopping Nazi mechanized forces: simply strew bundles of wool in the path of advancing tanks. The wool, he explained, would clog running gear and stop tanks in their tracks.

Another listener, sensitive to words, urged newscasters to avoid "blitzkrieg." It grates on the nerves, he said. Someone else wanted a less harsh word substituted for "conscript."

A lady, disconsolate over Nazi bombing of historic towns, urged a radio appeal to Hitler to save Wordsworth Lake Country "for American tourists."

Patriotism wells full, overpowering in hearts of many a radio dialer. A score of persons suggested all radio programs be opened, closed with the national anthem or "God Bless America." Other listeners want old war songs of 1917 and 1918 revived.

Resurgent is religious faith, heralded by church authorities, dominant as a theme in suggestions from listeners. Since Europe's war began to trouble mind of average citizens, broadcasters have detected an increasing plea for humanity in mail.

This letter, unsteadily written by an elderly lady in Utah, was called typical: "Let us each pray daily that God will spread His Mantle of Love over America and keep it from destruction."

Another listener petitioned the radio

company to broadcast daily this simple plea:

"Let balance and harmony prevail in the hearts of all people and all nations."

Suggestions for programs of prayer, for certain Biblical passages and such slogans as "Crush Hitler with God," to be broadcast daily, bear witness to the rising tide of religious consciousness in America today.

One writer suggested a roundtable forum with Hitler, Stalin, Churchill and Roosevelt.

Fletcher Wiley

Rarely, if ever, photographed — never for radio publicity, is Fletcher Wiley, who this week put behind him 2100 actual hours of airtime; nine and one-half million words poured out on 16,000 different subjects; 14,500 individual commercial announcements for more than 250 advertisers—seven grueling years of broadcasting on CBS' 50,000-watt Los Angeles station, KNX, as chief-of-staff of the "Housewives' Protective League."

Wiley made other news last week. The news: He relinquished duties as commentator on two KNX programs to broadcast only for Campbell's Soups, for whom he has conducted a Monday-through-Friday commentary over 36 CBS stations since April, 1940. Programs he gave up and which provided him with one of radio's largest incomes (\$50,000 annually) were "Sunrise Salute" and "Housewives' Protective League." The programs occupied 2½ hours daily of KNX's schedule, longest total in national broadcasting.

To maintain his hold on confidence of women, millions of whom tune him in with clock-faithful regularity, Wiley has for some time coached two "air-ins," one Galen Drake, carbon-copy of him in voice and idiom. For past 14 months has Drake conducted San Francisco edition of Housewives' League, plugged eight sponsors so doing.

From San Francisco came Drake to handle Wiley's KNX assignments. In his place went radioist Paul Gibson, micro-caster with startlingly Wiley-like voice and delivery.

Free of strenuous KNX schedule, Wiley plans invasion of Chicago and New York with his Housewives' League. Holding him back is time to develop seasoned commentators to carry on as ably as he.

At the seat of Wiley's retirement from his local broadcasts are many reasons: First, Campbell's Soup long desired to have all to itself the bearded publicity-avoiding commentator. He ranks 6th among 58 five-times-a-week programs in sponsor identification.

Other reasons for his relinquishment: Problems of Testers' Bureaus in two cities; directing the two programs and the work of four researchers, an office staff of six; an alfalfa ranch near Lancaster; a small company that makes a motor solvent; building a model apartment house that will provide huge furnished apartments for young married couples with moderate incomes; dickering with publishers for fall publication of a recently completed book, "So Much For That"; interminable talks with listeners who regu-

larly come to the Columbia Square studios, demand to see him.

Camera-shy, Wiley has sound reasoning behind refusal to pose for pictures. Said he: "People are interested in what I say, not what I look like."

Despite this reasoning radio guesses that feminine interest in Wiley as a physical "unknown" takes nothing away from air popularity. In real life he is heavily bearded, personable, not unlikely to attract eyes of fair sex.

When Winter Comes

When, a few years ago, The Land's President, modern day-problem-harassed Franklin D. Roosevelt, sought help in preparing Congressional and Presidential recommendations on Southern economic conditions, he named "thirty outstanding Americans."

Among the outstanding 80 was tallish, bespectacled, Gaurdee-moustached, pin-stripe-favoring William Winter, once admitted to the bar as America's youngest practicing attorney.

Last week proud CBS announced William Winter is heard as a news commentator from its Western key station, KNX, each week night from now to September 28 at 9 p. m., thereafter from 10 to 10:15 p. m.

Good reason had CBS to be proud. From research in law subjects he has formed habit of careful scrutiny, examination of material and reports, takes 5 hours to prepare a fifteen-minute broadcast.

During law practice made standing routine of meeting visiting experts on news situations, maintaining continuing contact with them. His is one of most voluminous correspondences extant; from it comes much of special information of significant events to make his broadcasts potent, direct.

He is son of a Newark, N. J., manufacturer, went to school in Newark, and in Ashville, N. C., studied law, was admitted to practice before he was 21, in January, 1928, under a special exception made to permit induction.

to, said Donald Vorhees, Telephone Hour conductor, last week, was synopated, jived and swinged treatments of master compositions, redesigned to pace the swift moving restiveness of the moderns, caught up in the mazes of a scientifically machined and functioning civilization.

Said orchestra leader Donald Vorhees:

"Most people nowadays are dancing to classics.

"I'll admit that sometimes I squirm when I hear a great piece of music jazzed up. But I doubt that great harm is done in the long run, and it may be that some good can come of it.

"A young person who dances to the Rimsky-Korsakoff 'Song of India' as recorded by Tommy Dorsey and his orchestra, or by Glen Gray and the Casa Loma band, may become interested in Rimsky-Korsakoff music and look into some of his works played in a more serious manner.

"This youth may be literally dancing through the doorway into the palace of classical music."

To swing-trained listeners radio has given opportunity to get terpsichorean versions of classics. Famous is Tommy Dorsey for versions of such pieces as Rubinstein's "Melody in F," Von Flotow's "Martha" has been "hepped" by Connie Boswell with Bob Crosby's orchestra, and familiar to many is Jimmy Dorsey's one-breath version of "The Flight of the Bumble Bee." Alvino Rey has scored Tschaiikowsky's "1812 Overture" as a dance piece, Guy Lombardo has a modified version of "Anitra's Dance."

Thus are Americans introduced to classics, a nodding acquaintance now, that may lead to a closer friendship in future.

At conclusion of period, three finalists will be selected, called for return engagements on separate broadcasts, each of the three finalists to receive an award of \$1000, one of the three to carry back to her college or university a \$4000 Fellowship awarded in her name to deserving fellow musical students over a four-year period!

The 10 schools which have already been selected to participate in these unique national auditions are the Universities of Ohio State, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin, Georgia, Rutgers, Boston, Cornell, and Penn State.

in the booth, signed by McCarthy, read: "Admission free gratis. We don't ask for nothing, we don't turn nothing down. If you can't see the coin box, you better see your oculist. All deals confidential. See me in private at NBC."

Radio Coordinator

Last week to blue-grey-eyed, nimble-minded, handsome Beatrice Shaw, former Radio Life staff member, contributor to radio and educational journals, author, and program writer-director, came signal honor. Mrs. Shaw was appointed Radio Coordinator for Los Angeles City Schools, her job to link together curricular subjects and radio for more efficient teaching, augment classroom studies with radio educational fare, in general be a liaison worker between radio and schools.

No hesitant is Mrs. Shaw. In first interview following appointment she tossed this provocative statement for officials of radio to mull:

"Radio, in general, and sponsors in particular, have accepted a premise, demonstrably false, as one that is true: That more people listen to radio in winter than in summer. In some areas this premise seems logical, but fact is, were a survey undertaken, more people listen to radio in summer than in winter.

Sponsor and radio theory has held that people are more often in homes in winter. This is true, but, population being equal, winter and summer, activities of the population are at lowest evening ebbs in summer."

Mrs. Shaw gave reasons for such unorthodox verbal bombing: Said she: "Winter days, from standpoint of car radio owner and home set listener are short days. In true winter regions car sets are rarely used to properly compensate for program costs. At home average radio interest wanes at early hour, daytime listening not as attentive as in summer. In summer car-set use ranges numerically out of sight of winter usage, home listening increases as human nature expands, beach, resort and general out-of-doors listening increases."

Concluded Mrs. Shaw: That smart potential sponsors would give bigtime radio programs summer tests, would find, she thought, ample justification of her contention.

Partial confirmation of her theory, particularly in the West, was indicated by NBC's summer show "Hap Hazard," successful enough, apparently thought its sponsors, Johnson's Wax, to be held over for a winter's run.

Also thought Mrs. Shaw: Commercial sponsors miss bets in not backing educational programs, cited "Romance of Ranchos" as such a program with wide popular appeal for all ages.

"Most people find a program of this type more interesting than soap box pap programs fed them in lieu of more intelligent offerings to which, it is discoverable, most people would and do respond with appreciation."

BOB BURNS -The Arkansas Lad

Bob's Just The Kind Of Person Anybody Feels Happy To Know

WE HAD met Bob Burns once before at his San Fernando ranch, and so it was with a feeling of being back in a familiar place that we called upon him last week. A few days before, September 16 to be exact, he had brought back to air-life that legendary figure whom most of us recall as the Arkansas Traveller.

Seeing Bob again and bearing in mind his new show it was easy to picture him as we had pictured that tall-story-telling personage who rambled the back-country of the South when Civil War thunders had quieted and the pungent smell of powder at Gettysburg had filtered away.

The original Arkansas Traveller is the pattern to which Bob Burns as a modern air actor is cut. Like that entrancing figure out of the nation's past Bob is a story-teller out of sections from which came Sanford C. Faulkner, first "Arkansas Traveller." Like Faulkner, Bob has made his way through the deep piney regions, past fields of cotton billowing whitely from agricultural bowls of the

South. Like Faulkner he wandered through Arkansas, Tennessee and Louisiana gathering folk lore, folk music and information to form the basis for the dyed-in-wool and homespun fellow he is.

Most of us have heard him on air, so we can dispense with a description of the rusty idiomatics with which he liberally besprinkles his talk, of his simple and genuine instrument called a "bazooka."

For as a kindly backwoods humorist do we know him best. But this concept is, at best, inaccurate, as we shall try to show.

Sitting on the veranda of the ranch house where, some months ago, we had sat with him, he sketched the background of the Bob Burns many of us don't know at all.

In this background we learn that W. R. Burns, Bob's dad, was a civil engineer, who had planned that Robin (as Bob was christened) should follow in his footsteps. As later life records reveal, Bob covered as much ground as Burns senior ever dreamed of doing, but not with sextant and engineering manual. Bob got around, but in a different way and for contrastingly different reasons. Some men are born to be tellers of tales, big ones and little ones, funny ones and tragic ones with an enlivening note of humorous pathos in them but all harmless and tedium-relieving tales. Bob was such

a chap, and although to trace his wanderings intelligibly might require a map of the 48 States, Europe, Canada, Mexico, Cuba and, finally, Hollywood, his engineering was of laughter for delighted auditors along the broad and narrow highways of life that lead out into the world from Van Buren.

It is of record that he did qualify as a civil engineer but this is merely an academic detail. He did very little with it.

"I guess mebbee the way I really got started was when I was a mandolin player in Van Buren's 'Queen City Silver Tone Cornet Band,'" he said. "It was thissaway. We was practicing one night in the town plumbing shop. I picked up a couple of pieces of gas pipe, slid them together and blew a deep tone. There was a couple fuzzy bass notes that made the gang laugh. The notes sounded like 'Bazz-oo-ka', so straightaway I fixed the contraption up and named it just that.

"The bazooka got me three dollars a week and meals with a carnival. When the carnival broke up I was in New Orleans as a day laborer and . .

His warm deep voice went sonorously on, taking the young Robin, the day laborer, across the deltas of the Mississippi with second rate vaudeville, other carnivals—through periods of stress and distress. We saw him laboring under fur-

How Safe Is DEMOCRACY In Our Day

Here's How Radio's Town Meeting
Helps Solve Our Problems

By CARL HAILING



NATIONAL ARGUFIER is George V. Denny, President of Town Hall, Founder and Moderator of "America's Town Meeting of the Air." NBC's sterling democratic program which returns to air on October 16.

NO PEOPLE and the nation they comprise are safe when the people fail to express themselves, or are prohibited from expressing themselves on issues and problems that confront their whole welfare."

The above paragraph might as well come from a standard work on social and political organization. It means that a genuinely informed public opinion is most essential to the successful working out of a democratic system. It means that nothing can be more important than impartial examination and discussion of the vital issues which affect the lives of all Americans.

Today the world has gone wildly mad. Highly trained armies move across the agonized face of Mother Earth. Great guns bellow destruction to both the armed and the fighting, the unarmed and the praying—almost everywhere in the world save in the Western Hemisphere.

In this great half of the eternal globe rocketing its headlong way through space the menace of new and old orders of life has risen to challenge American thought as to the way of the future.

The future's way to all sensible persons is linked with the blazing question: "Can Democracy survive, and is there a Democracy to survive?"

Americans are well aware, of the world's people, that Democracy as a way of life is closer to assurance here than anywhere else on the tortured earth. The wiser and more intelligent among us know that here, above all other places, the ideal of life rises like a sunrise, full colored and powered, for the enjoyment of the day that is come.

But these Americans know, too, that there is a streak of apathy in the most of us. This apathy may prove our undoing, may be the Frankenstein soon to ride roughshod over all that we have

built, all that we have planned, all that we have hoped for.

What is the nature and character of that apathy? How does its existence menace us? What can we do as Americans to go beyond necessary sacrifices for defense to insure that what we are as a nation may endure to humanity's greater glory?

The answers to those questions seem to be implicit in National Broadcasting Company's "America's Town Meeting of the Air."

As a program it is an effective weapon against misinformation and ignorance of what is pertinent and vital to our national life. For, by the simple expedient of frankly and daringly airing the opinions of sober-minded men and women, of permitting the average American to express himself, it tends to narrow down to a logical nub the controversies and the situations in national life from which controversies spring.

In the East economically embattled coal miners, defense workers, dockmen, and transport workers threaten to paralyze essential industries and services. How honest are they? How subversive? How reasonable or unreasonable their case? A politically or economically guided daily press is helpless to make answers to these questions. It cannot editorialize with candor for there are too many ramifications of newspaper control and influence to permit straightforward comment for the greatest good of the greatest number. And a nation at mercy of newspapers is only partially informed. It may know a strike is on, that a war movement is on, that the New Deal is considered a failure or a success, that the budget must be balanced or that it need not—it may know these superficial outlines of fact but rarely are the underlying causes of grievous and nationally painful conditions, attitudes and situations brought out factually and straightfor-

wardly for adult Americans to use as a base upon which to lay their own opinions, to come to their own conclusions and convictions.

"America's Town Meeting of the Air" gives voice to the Americans to whom, ordinarily, there is little voice given, by accepted outlets for expression. It offers a canal of contrasting opinions down which the mental life of the nation may flow to those considered actions of which our history has been made. In a way it is largely up to increasing millions of us to make use of this canal, still free, virtually unlimited in subject, which radio, and radio alone, in these critical times, has made possible. How Americans will use the boon the program potentially represents is in their own hands.

George V. Denny, University of North Carolina graduate and son of Washington, North Carolina, is the man behind the program that weekly in its seasons hauls out the touchy, dynamite-laden topics in American life and gives them a thorough working over in the traditional manner of the colonial meeting house of our nation's infant hours.

About the program? Let Denny tell it:

"In our nation's early days the town meeting was an event to which our forefathers trudged many a weary mile over hills and dales to have their say in what they, as a people and building nation, were to do and how it was to be done.

"If Town Halls had been in operation 20 years ago would the continuing conflict between labor and management have struck with such fury and taken so distressing a form? Would we not have today a readily analyzed and measured public opinion on such subjects as to 'intervene in war' or to remain aloof? Would we not have built up a convincing public opinion to guide us through the turmoils

of the present, to chart our way into the future in the traditional acceptance of the wills of the majority?

"Of these and other serious situations might we not have, through the Town Hall technique, instead of through high-pressure organization, been enabled to avoid consequences inherent in them when a nation fails to understand, is unable, because of facility lacks, to talk things out?"

A wise and moderately thinking man is this Denny, moderator of Town Meeting of the Air. He believes that we are sowing the seeds of our ultimate destruction if we read as Republicans only Republican newspapers, listen only to Republican outpourings, attend only Republican rallies and mix socially only with those of kindred political and economic views.

"If Democrats, Socialists, Communists and Townsendites follow such suit we are destroying our Democracy as surely as if we d'd not possess

the untrammelled political freedom that is our most valuable holding today."

Somewhere in the United States a citizen said he hated President Roosevelt, therefore he would not listen to the man now helming the Ship of State through the roughest seas in all the years of its voyaging on international seas and up the rivers toward the promised land.

George V. Denny heard that citizen make that remark. It roused soul-stirring thought. Out of the thought came Town Meeting of the Air.

"The statement shocked me," Denny said. "It seemed to mean something deadly to democratic principles. I realized this man read and listened only to that which agreed with his own views. It was then I determined to create a radio program wherefrom all sides to a question could be presented and men like him almost forced to listen in self-interest."

Basic principles of the program are conflict, suspense and fair play. The con-

flict is brought up by presenting opinions on both sides by persons whose training, authority and ability qualify them to speak. While a person may tend to applaud a speaker who agrees with him, a tendency rises in him, Denny believes, to listen to the conflicting speaker in order to check the validity of both in terms of the topic discussed.

The meetings are suspenseful, whether held in New York's imposing Town Hall where the program usually originates, or in auditoriums throughout the land when Denny takes the Town Meeting right into our own yards, so to speak. In any audience may be an expert who rises to deliver a breathtaking clarification of a knotty point. There may get up, too, a crackpot who flails stridently at the sins of the capitalistic system, but who, before he has finished, has sobered the mind with a reflection that there is still much we can do to make our America a grander place in which to live.

Fair play is a keynote of the program. Denny is smart enough—were he not otherwise an honest and conscientious citizen, to realize that

In Which We Peg Lucile Werner To Be An Air Topper

LITTLE more than a year ago, life-loving, happy-go-lucky-under-the-soft-shimmery-suns-of-Hawaii citizens found a new interest. Honolulu residents, particularly, had found something to add to the zestful enjoyment of living where living is taken in stride and every day is a sort of holiday and every night a renewal of romance.

Their interest was in the first of Honolulu's big-time radio shows and, more than incidentally, in a hazel-green eyed lass called Lucile Werner, scion of an old California family, little theatre graduate and stock player, who, vacation-bent in the tropical isle, turned her talents to profit for herself and entertainment for Hawaiians.

The radio show was a series called "The Haigs of Hawaii" and it purported to dramatize the more colorful events and incidents in the life of an old Hawaiian family, not of that name.

Two things mark Hawaiians of the well-bred classification, whether native or transplanted Caucasian from the mainlands of the globe. One is that in the

niceties of life they are sticklers for good form. The second is—suggest the possibility of romance to them and, if they are not otherwise morally and legally prevented, they make short work of the hurdles between romance and "woo-mance."

It is about here that Lucile Werner comes in. She was fresh from the WPA theatre circuit, one of the few professionals to be engaged as a sort of administrative and thespian bellwether for those whom circumstance forced under the paternal wings of "Uncle." She led stock companies about the States, sometimes in leads, sometimes in parts that required a steady head and smooth work to cover rough spots kicked up by eager theatrical adolescents.

It was as Lucile Werner that she came to Hawaii. It was as "Phil Haig" she grew via radio in the hearts of all true Hawaiians to whom, as we said, the suggestion of romance is as flame to the moth—or did we? And it was as "Phyllis Haig" that she changed many of the nocturnal habits of the Hawaiians, in effete Honolulu and in the villages of the sur-

SHIRLEY From Hollywood High

*A Shock-Headed Kid Ran School
Honors Into Radio Fame*

AMONG HOLLYWOOD High school's gifts to the public entertainment, first ranking must be given Lana Turner, the original sweater girl, and Shirley Ross, the blonde, singing volcano of KHJ-Mutual's new show, "Three Ring Time," starring Charles Laughton, who is humorously buttressed by Milton Berle, 5:30 p. m. Fridays.

Lana one day went to get a soda at the ice-cream stand across from the school, a decision that was a daily custom, but which wound up in a motion picture contract when a real estate man, root-beering his thirsty insides, saw her and figuratively busted a scam calling a talent scout.

Not so, however, with Shirley Ross, who, in her way, has all that Lana has—a mite more we thought, in course of an interview in the office of her husband, Ken Dolan, the other day.

Shirley as a tow-shock-headed kid minded mama and papa, which is to say she practiced her piano and voice lessons like a good little girl in growing-into-teens age in Omaha ("and don't you make anything of that!" she challenged). This was before the family moved out to Los Angeles, a few years before Shirley matriculated at Hollywood High, an institution whose inmates are nurtured on two substantial items, the one serious education, the other a constant thought embroidered with glamour prospects and garish glitter of motion pictures. Perhaps nowhere under Allah's heavens is there a place of public learning where the average girl student is both potential Minerva and Thalia. There she crams learning into busy brains, keeping eyes weathered to horizons on which, at any unpredictable moment, sound and camera trucks will appear, a riding-habited director dismount, make a coveted signal as a prelude to Names over Marquee and publicity via the old Hollywood razzle-dazzle, and "isn't it wonderful?" Stardom with accent on the "dumb." . . .

Not so, we said, of our little Shirley Ross whose voice has gone bubbling like carbonated water set to music in both radio and in motion pictures for a time sufficient to establish her as one of supports of both industries.

But, first—we see her minding mama and papa. The nervous but agile fingers and absorbing mind couple themselves to the piano keyboard, the lesson notes on the piano's rack. Shirley learns to make a piano act like a well trained something or other. . . .

Around Hollywood High, whose seasonal operettas and school plays and musical comedies have been symbolically opened career doors for many a good looking babe, the word goes around.

"This blonde wow of a Junior. Have you tried her?"

Harassed school casting directors audition the youngster with the educated musical fingers, the rich and vibrant voice. Another Hollywood High career starts to wrap itself up in the chrysalis of young genius, spinning its cocoon from which, soon or late, shall flutter the current butterfly of entertainment. For as many semesters as it took her to graduate (and these were slightly less, really, than average) Shirley was the lead mainstay of the ambitious productions of a school that makes no compromise with mediocrity. She had the stuff and the school generally knew that when its incipiently-star-spangled halls were done for her that she would make good in its best traditions.

Gus Arnheim heard her in piano recital a few weeks before she graduated. He made a note of the fact, but lost it in the shuffle of musical events. Later he was to hear her again at University of California, made haste to go backstage and offer her an audition. This time she was singing, a fact that was right down the Arnheim alley. Out of the audition she got a 9-months contract as

a featured blues singer, the color of her singing having much to do with making many an evening for night club patrons all pink and rosy with delight.

Out in Beverly Hills there is a hotel by that name. It is thought of as a swank hotel by those who cannot afford to bum around in it. The hotel, all its swank aside, is a notorious stamping ground for studio executives and talent scouts. Many an intrepid Diana with Thespian dreams has fitted a charm arrow to an S. A. bow and, opening her eyes much wider than usual, fired the arrow. More often than not, so thick were the scouts and execs around the place, the arrow struck them square in the contracts—and so stars are made. . . .

Not so little Shirley with the torridly golden voice. She just sang, standing with the lights on her in front of the orchestra, her blonde good looks paling the yellow spot-lights, her voice putting customers silent and stimulantly moody or gay as she sang.

Metro was first to come forward. The company featured her in "Anything Goes," to be followed by "What Price Jazz" with Ted Fio Rito, "Manhattan Melodrama," with the late Jean Harlow in "100% Pure," through these to "The Merry Widow" with Chevalier and Jeanette MacDonald, to the "Big Broadcast of 1937," leads in "Hideaway Girl" and "Thanks for the Memory" with Bob Hope—in fact, more than enough picture and stage assignments to do her share to uphold the reputation of the now streamlined institution at corner of Sunset Boulevard and Highland Avenue in Hollywood.

Shirley is a young lady now with responsibilities other than a career. One responsibility is 4½-months-old John. She thinks she can handle both John

one cannot stack the cards on the people.

"If we ever tried to slip something over in favor of a conclusion one way or the other we would be through," he summarizes with blunt realism.

It would be that way no matter what the subject as long as Denny has control. Two years ago the acidulous and opinionated Harold L. Ickes and General Hugh (Iron Pants) Johnson came together on the program. Ickes stood out as a favored son of the New Deal, Johnson as a spanked Bad Boy. After a sort of "Waltz Me Around Again, Willie" interchange of amenities they lit into each other. Like all programs, this was broadcast to the nation. What was brought out by them as they tore at each other's figurative throats might have made many a polit-

ical face blush. And, more, it convinced many a suspicious citizen that basically the land was all right if two grapplers like these could get into the airy open and rip aside propaganda and tear the veils from truth.

Town Meeting is older than most of us suspect. In the days when the bustle was tops (circa 1890) it was called the "League for Political Education." Founded by women, the League brought to its platform scores of prominent in American life. Among them were Theodore Roosevelt, Booker T. Washington, Jane Addams, Woodrow Wilson and Rabindranath Tagore.

Today Town Meeting directors scan the stormy horizon of national and international life. They can almost see the topic titles on the world horizon: Will We

War with Japan? Shall We Get Into the War? What of the After War? What Is the Truth of the Present Conflict? Is Democracy Safe?

Let's take the last question. Democracy will always be safe if we bestir ourselves, shake off apathy in internal and foreign affairs, and make our voices heard where they can be heard, by pen or presence, on Town Meeting of the Air!

nace suns of Oklahoma farming peanuts—doing the same back-breaking labors under hot suns in other states, laboring, haying, threshing, trying his hand and mind at odd jobs of engineering. The vistas widened to include the young Robin, far from his homing nest, standing disconsolately on corners of strange towns, eyeing the unfamiliar faces that streamed past, hugging his lengths of bazooka'd gas pipes, wondering where and what next.

"The first war busted out," deposed Bob from the dusk-encircled veranda. "I enlisted in the Marines and went across."

We follow his husky voice again through the up-coming years. He goes into the show business, makes a desultory success . . . sideshows in Atlantic City . . . a blackface act in vaudeville . . . a setting of the face to Hollywood and pictures . . . a brief try in that City of Glamour, that Bhagdad of Hecticness . . . swallows hard at the singularly drab results . . . turns to radio . . . swallows again . . . cinches up a worn belt, tosses an ironic farewell salute to the City of Dreams and goes East . . .

"It was different there," Bob tells us. "I got on Rudy Vallee's program. Blackface was done and I drew on the only thing I thought might make or break me. I played the bazooka, retold the stories I had heard in my beating around. The audience liked it. They said," his tone was soft and simplicity itself, "they said I made a hit."

Did he start with Rudy—talking the way he does now?

"Well, I guess maybe I was always talkin' like that," he drawled. "It's the way we talk back in the Ozarks and it was natural for me . . ."

The years move faster now. Robin of the levees and the deltas, the hungry-eyed wanderer through cotton fields and pine wood aisles—the wing-finding Robin of farm-field drudgery, shovel and pick—the hard working Robin of small times and small fry swifts up the heights to big time. . . .

"I got me a chance with Bing Crosby. Hollywood was different to me now," he said wistfully. "I got into pictures. You might remember some of them. . . ."

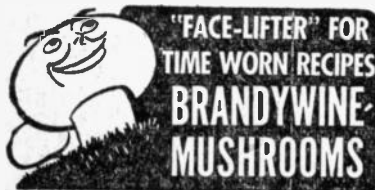

the still valley night. We suddenly remembered that America's topflight humorist was also a successful farmer.

"I like farming," he said, his words coming out with a provocative ambulating hesitancy. "I reckon a fellow from Arkansas just can't get away from the earth. I want to tell you I call myself a farmer, not a rancher. Nowadays, a fellow with two flower boxes and a scrawny tree buys himself a station wagon and calls himself a farmer . . ."

We saw him as we had first seen him, the day we called on him almost a year ago. He was working a tractor down furrows of sugar beets, his weatherbeaten face gleaming with sweat . . . We remembered the rough, horny-handed shake he gave us after dismounting from the mechanical monster on whose bouncing steel back he had spent the better part of an afternoon. We recalled:

"Sugar beets," we remembered him saying, as we looked over well-kept acres. "Beets, alfalfa, corn, pumpkins and beans." His big chest drew in gallons of air. "None of them fancy crops for me. Folks back in Arkansas are the best farmers in the land. They live off the land and" his chest swells proudly, "I haven't forgotten my bringing up."

Somewhere in the darkness behind us a melodious whistling began. The tune was unfamiliar at first, but it changed into a struggling but easily recognizable rendition of the National Anthem. Robin anticipated our question.

"That's 'Flip,'" he volunteered. "'Flip's' a trouppial from South America. They're whistling birds. I got him trained to whistle the theme song from the Arkansas Traveller. He isn't doing so well with the Star Spangled Banner, but he's alearnin'."

Later we got to see "Flip," an amazing orange and black colored bird who seemed proud to do the tricks Bob had taught him. He opened match boxes, flew across the room with cigarettes which he delivered with a wisely solemn frigidly of manner, imitated a dive bomber as he dove floorward to retrieve a collar button . . .

"Speakin' o' birds," Bob began . . . Back to Van Buren and childhood where the young Robin was taught to care for poultry . . . to remember in adult years what he learned until today . . . he points out with pride the row of self-made brooders, feeders, incubators and perches made in his own well-fitted workshop.

"I even raise 'meal-worms' for my birds and chicks. Raise 'em by the thousands."

We hear a gusty yawn from the veranda dark.

"Getting late. Nearly half past eight. Oh hum."

We are about to take the hint when a voice pipes up from the outer dark of the driveway.

"Mr. Burns?"

"Yeah, son. What is it?"

"Can you fix my windie—again?—The propeller's loose."

We hear Bob stretching and getting to his feet.

"Come on down to the shop. I'll show you something."

In the shop he takes a wooden assembly from a neighboring youngster who looks on with pop-eyed interest.

"That's a 'windie,'" Bob explains. "Little wooden toys that operate in the wind. There's nothing like a windie for a youngster to set atop a bird-house or fence post. I make 'em for Barbara Ann,—she's three— for Billy, he's two—and I made a tiny one for Stephen Foster, not quite one."

He showed us a few in the making—a negro mammy washing at a tub, an old Dutch mill, a merry-go-round and a hurdy-gurdy . . .

"I kind of rest up nights after a hard day's work by coming out here and starting a new one for the kids," he said. "I got one in mind, kind of elaborate, a drawbridge opening and closing with a steamboat moving on a wooden shaft under the bridge. . ."

So much, then, and just a little more about Robin Burns, The Arkansas Traveller. There is nothing slapstick about him. He dresses conservatively for his broadcasts. There is no strained effort to make funny "hill-billy" clothes, barefeet or props do the the work of characterizations.

"I reckon maybe folks are going to laugh only if something amuses them. If it ain't funny the're not going to strain a laugh just for a funny pair of pants."

Bob refuses to satirize the legendary Arkansas Traveller. He contends when the real story of Faulkner is written he will go down in history as one of the genuine figures in American folk lore.

meat 2 quarts of water, 3 slices of onion and 2 cloves of garlic. Season with 2 tsps. of salt and $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. of pepper. Let come to a boil and skim well. Then let simmer until meat is tender. When done remove the pieces of lamb from the stock. Simmer the broth until reduced to a sufficient quantity to cover 1 lb. of rice. Now strain the broth through a sieve and add 1 more tsp. of salt. Then chop Wilson's Bacon and $\frac{1}{2}$ onion very fine. Sauté bacon, onion and meat until brown. Now wash 1 lb. of rice 3 times in cold water and drain it. 8 small tenderloin steaks
Salt and pepper
8 lamb kidneys
 $\frac{1}{4}$ lb. butter
8 artichokes
8 shallots
 $\frac{1}{2}$ lemon
1 sprig parsley, minced very fine

Season tenderloin steaks with salt and pepper, roll in oil and broil. Broil the lamb kidneys in the same manner and at the same time. When done, place the steaks on a platter with kidneys on top. Boil the artichokes, remove the leaves, and toss the bottoms in a saute pan with 2 ounces of butter. Season with salt and pepper and garnish the steaks with them. Heat 2 ounces of butter in a saute pan, add the shallots when hot, add $\frac{1}{2}$ lemon cut in 8 parts and the chopped parsley and pour over the kidneys and steaks.

4 apples

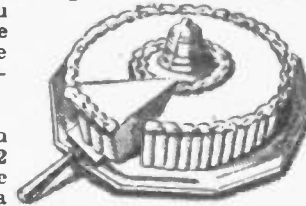

SOFT AND GLOSSY—This is about icings. Some like 'em soft and some like 'em glossy. We'll try to please both. For a soft one you dissolve a cup of sugar in a quarter of a cup of cold water, cooking it a little while you do so. Then you add a quarter of a cup of pure honey and continue cooking until it reaches about 250 degrees Fahrenheit. Then you beat the mixture pouring it over the white of an egg, and that's all there is to it. It should keep soft for several weeks.

About the glossy one: Instead of all sugar, you use half sugar and half corn syrup, cook it to about 232 degrees Fahrenheit, and make sure not to beat it too soon. Let it cool a little first; then beat it just enough so that it will pour over the sides of the cake. Beating it too much will sometimes kill the gloss.

And remember also, that nearly all icings, like human beings, will sometimes grow dull if the weather isn't just right. There aren't many foods, by the way, whose dullness you can blame on the weather.



A NOTE ON CHESTNUTOLOGY—The holiday season isn't very far off, so we can start thinking of turkey; and when we start thinking of turkey we think of stuffings; and when we think of stuffings we sometimes think of chestnuts; so here's how to prepare them for stuffing. Cut a cross on the flat side of the chestnut, deep into the shell. Put the chestnuts in the oven with a drop of oil on each one. Roast them about five minutes, shaking them while doing so; then remove the skin, boil them till soft, and sift them through a colander.

Easy, isn't it?

TAKING IT ON THE LAMB—We're giving you some lamb recipes this week so here are some pointers:

You can make what they call mock duck out of lamb by using the shoulder and fore shank. What you do is remove the bones and then mold it and sew into the shape of a duck. In fact, for almost any kind of roast, lamb should have little bone and fat, and if you want to use the part that corresponds to porterhouse in beef, ask for the loin. What are known as English lamb chops, incidentally, are cut from the entire width of the loin, and they should not be split; just boned and skewered. Saratoga chops, on the other hand, are from the shoulder, and in addition to being boned and skewered, these are sliced.

When a lamb grows up, of course, it becomes a mutton, and an important thing to know about mutton is that it should be aged from two to five weeks before using. It has a stronger flavor than lamb, but the loin can be exceedingly tender and delicious when properly prepared.

When fixing a leg of lamb, always remember to pull off the skin, which on prime meat is usually easy to remove. And if you

want something really savory, rub the leg with a mixture of cinnamon, white pepper, sugar, flour, onions, dried herbs and bacon drippings, then pour cider and spice vinegar over it and let it stand from two to four days before baking, turning it frequently.

DO AMERICANS LIKE ONIONS?—You bet they do, over twenty million dollars worth a year; almost enough to take away the breath they may give you! And for every dollar spent, a bushel of them is raised in this country. But we go shopping for more, in South America, Bermuda, Australia, the Canary Islands, Spain and even Egypt. In fact we like onions so well that science is hard at work trying to develop a smell-less and tearless variety.

Recipe for Lamb Stew a la Brigadier

- 2 lbs. mixed breast, shoulder and middle of neck of lamb cut in pieces 2 ozs. each
- 4 tbsps. Wilson Laurel Leaf lard
- 1 cup flour
- 1 1/2 quarts water
- Some mixed herbs
- 1 clove garlic
- 1 dozen pickling onions
- 2 lbs. potatoes

Put the lard in a sauce pan and when hot put in the pieces of meat. Season with salt and pepper and a good pinch of sugar. Cook on a hot fire, turning the pieces of meat occasionally, and brown thoroughly. Now pour away most of the lard and sprinkle the meat with flour. While cooking, continually move the meat about with the spoon, till the flour is quite brown. Add the water, stir for a few minutes, so that the flour does not adhere to the bottom of the saucepan, but is well mixed with water. Bring to a boil, season with salt and pepper-corns, add the clove of garlic, peeled and well crushed with the blade of a knife, and simmer very gently for 1 hour. Peel the pickling onions carefully and cook in a little hot fat till they are a golden color. Peel the potatoes, which should be more or less the same small size, and put them in cold water till used.

Remove the pieces of lamb from the saucepan and put them in a clean saucepan. Skim all the scum from the sauce, and pour it over the pieces of lamb through the sieve. Bring to a boil and add the cooked onions. A quarter of an hour after, add the potatoes, well dried in a cloth. See that they are well covered with the sauce. Cover closely and simmer for 3/4 hour. A few minutes before serving, remove the saucepan from the fire and skim any grease that may rise to the surface. Serve garnished with onions and the potatoes and if you wish, Hauser sauce.

Recipe for Leg of Lamb with Garlic

- 1 leg lamb
- 1 head garlic
- 1/2 lb. butter
- Salt and pepper

Dredge the leg of lamb with salt and pepper, then insert about 6 cloves of garlic right around the leg of lamb, by inserting a paring knife till it gets to the bones and then insert the cloves of garlic. Then put leg in a baking pan and baste with butter frequently while baking in oven at 325 degrees 25 minutes to the pound and while cooking brush on butter until leg of lamb is done. And never add any liquid of any kind. When done the surplus grease is poured from the meat pan, 3 or 4 tbsps. of hot water are put in the pan and, when this boils, scrape the pan and strain this gravy over the carved meat, and mix with juice which has escaped from the meat when carved. Serve.

Recipe for Lamb Cutlets a la Colondrina

- 1 slice Wilson's Tender Made Ham, diced
- 1/2 lb. small Wilson's Certified Sausages
- 2 tbsps. Wilson Laurel Leaf Lard
- 1 onion
- 4 medium tomatoes
- 8 lamb cutlets
- 2 tbsps. oil
- Salt and pepper

Fry the cutlets in equal quantities of hot lard and oil, seasoning them with salt and pepper. When done, put them in an earthenware casserole with the following sauce. In the same fat in which the cutlets were fried, cook the ham cut in dice with the chopped onion. When the onion begins to brown, add the finely chopped tomatoes, season highly with salt and pepper, and cook for about 10 minutes. Then pour the sauce over the cutlets, cover the casserole and place in the oven at 350 degrees for 20 minutes. The sausages cut in small pieces are cooked separately and served with cutlets.

rounding Isles of Lanai, Molokai, Kauai and Maui (Honolulu being on Oahu).

Residents accepted the Monday night program as part of their social carryings-on. They accepted Lucile (Phil Haig) Werner as the feminine epitome of charm and beauty of the Islands. In both cases they were charmed out of their wits—or nearly so. It was a stock excuse in Honolulu for many a moon for people to beg out of something to say:

"I'm sorry, but this is the night we all listen to 'Phil' Haig." They made a weekly social event of a radio program, and that sets a new high in something or other for radio.

As "Phyllis Haig" Miss Werner was fast on the way to become the most famous woman in the Islands. Part of it was due, of course, to the rather original

idea of Station KOMB in airing a dramatic program, unusual locally originally of which the resident Hawaiians were rightfully proud. The biggest part was due to her consummate ability. Before the program ran to its inevitable end native shopkeepers were advertising "Phyllis Haig" handbags, compacts, toilet waters. She was pointed out on Honolulu streets and, being a right good looking wahine, well bred and professionally competent, she had no dearth of romantic overtures herself.

Illness of her mother brought her back to the mainland. The day she left, saddened Hawaiians piled on her slender shoulders and about her throat the biggest pile of leis yet to weigh down a parting guest.

We kind of look for her to get a few radio leis—mainland style—when we hear

her, as we hope to, sometime soon as we go dial-adventuring.
