The Philharmonic

Although most of the vast radio audience that listens each Sunday afternoon for twenty-eight weeks to New York Philharmonic-Symphony concerts may never see the members of that orchestra, it knows the magnificence of their ensemble-playing, through CBS network which, for twelfth season, presents a series of Sunday concerts, (KNX-CBS, 12 noon Sundays).

One hundred and three members are in America's oldest orchestra now celebrating its Centennial Season. They come from politically diverse corners of world—France, England, Russia, Germany, Holland, Italy, Hungary, the United States. Though personal experience, language and taste differ, the artists of Philharmonic-Symphony are united in ideals of playing great music beautifully, rise above brutal philosophies and war.

Most familiar to the radio audience are orchestra's first-desk men, responsible for discipline, nuances and attack of respective sections. Foremost among them is Mishel Piastro, Russian-born concertmaster. Piastro joined the Philharmonic-Symphony in 1931 after serving as concertmaster of San Francisco Symphony. Frequently heard as soloist with the orchestra, he plays such famed violins as the Giuseppe Guarnerius "Del Gesu," dated 1739, or the Carl Bergonzi, made in 1713.

Joseph Schuster is the orchestra's accomplished first cellist. Born in Constantinople of Russian parents, Schuster organized a string quartet when he was only ten, its members playing in Cossack uniforms. In addition to appearing as soloist with the orchestra and concertizing, he has transcribed rare music, such as a Couperin Suite and a Vivaldi Concerto, for cello.

John Amans, Belgian first flutist of

the Philharmonic-Symphony, started his professional career in Helsingfors, Finland, where he was engaged as solo flutist of the Philharmonic Orchestra and teacher at the Helsingfors Conservatory. Among his most treasured possessions is a picture of himself with Sibelius taken in 1908 when the composer conducted "Belshazzar's Feast." Amans, a member of the Philharmonic-Symphony since 1923, says a good flutist needs "good teeth and lips not too thick and not too thin."

Bruno Labate, the orchestra's first oboe and a member of the organization more than twenty years, was born in Calabria. He is noted for his accent as well as for his beautiful playing. The story is told that at one rehearsal for which a Schubert symphony requiring an oboe and a Mozart opera which did not call for one were scheduled, Labate approached Barbirolli saying, "Ey, Maestro, what we play? Motz?" "No," was the answer, "Schub."

Saul Goodman, one of the orchestra's youngest members, is first tympanist. Born in Brooklyn, a little more than thirty years ago, he played the drum in a Boy Scout band and at school patriotic exercises during the First World War. Immediately after hearing his first Philharmonic concert while still a student in high school, he asked to study with the orchestra's tympanist. He succeeded that teacher as first tympanist in 1926.

Theodore Cela, first harpist of the Philharmonic-Symphony, also is a composer whose music has been played at Stadium Concerts and by the Boston Symphony Pops Orchestra. He joined the orchestra in 1920 and before that was a member of the Boston Symphony.

Harry Glantz, first trumpet, calls himself an "ugly duckling" because he showed no interest in music until he was thirteen in spite of the efforts of his musical

family, who had him take violin, cornet and cello lessons. Glantz has played in opera orchestras and with the San Francisco Symphony before joining the Philharmonic in 1923.

John Corigliano, assistant concertmaster, became associated with the Philharmonic-Symphony in 1935 after winning an enviable reputation as soloist in concerts. Of Italian parentage, he was born in New York City forty years ago.

Of his orchestra members Conductor John Barbirolli last week enthused:

"They are like principal singers in a great opera. They train like athletes. They don't eat before a concert, they pale before important solos. I have the proud privilege of heading a superb group of men whose conscientiousness and devotion to music is beyond all praise."

Thus, with praise beyond praise, Conductor Barbirolli began preparing for coming concert series.

The March of Time

From Chungking to Lisbon, Rio to Suez, range correspondents of the magazine Time. Watching, studying, reporting on movements of world interest boiling up from life's eternal fires, these correspondents are among the reportorial elect, chosen for a degree of intelligence and ability which by comparison makes average journalists of more publicized reputation pulling infants.

During last fortnight Time's editors imposed on three-score of their far-ranging reporters a dramatic task. To each one went orders to stations throughout world to write eye-witness accounts of significant developments in their areas. Purpose: To lay script foundations for film and program versions of "March of Time."

What reporters will do: They will in-

terview key-men in vital situations, will include verbatim reports on interviews with detailed descriptions of mannerisms and speech characteristics to give heightened sense of realism to finished films, to NBC's air program, KECA, KFSI, 8 p. m. Thursdays.

The overseas men will also suggest sound effects and musical backgrounds. Scripts written by Time's overseas men will be radioed to Radio City. There they will go to regular staff men of "March of Time" for study and adaptation to be woven into a comprehensive and integrated picture of fascinating pattern of world news.

To bring scripts to life, "March of Time" producers will search files for matching voices. A large collection of recorded voices of news-figures world over has been built to enable producers to select the actors most able to impersonate news characters.

The new job of radio script writer will be an added task of the Time foreign correspondent, who still will have his regular assignment of straight reporting for the NBC-Blue Network feature. Included in the new contributors to the "March of Time" will be Stephen and Lael Laird, formerly in Berlin but now assigned to the London office; Walter Graebner, also of the British staff, and Allan A. Michie, in Cairo. All these collaborated in writing and editing "The Finest Hour," eye-witness reports of the battle of Britain. Others will be Sherry Mangan, Buenos Aires; William Fisher, in Calcutta, and more than fifty other members of the weekly news magazine's foreign staff.

Radio In Defense

A slow but persistent movement among democratically concerned radio executives to plan Radio's increasingly important

part in national defense last week began budding greenly.

Officials and technicians of 239 NBC-affiliated stations in Blue and Red networks had received a letter from Niles Trammell, NBC's gray, austere, organizational-minded president.

Trammell asked for creation of a two-network committee to meet in New York November 4 for the Red, and November 5, for the Blue, there to discuss an "integrated broadcasting service geared to growing demands of national defense, the joint problem of network and station operation in public service."

Said Trammell:

"While we have been preparing for some time to meet all demands of national defense requirements, I believe the time has come for us to sit down together to mobilize our joint resources. The vital part that the network organization and the 239 affiliated stations will play to keep their services at all times sensitively in tune with the nation's growing defense problems and the maintenance of public morale, calls for careful planning and complete coordination of thought and effort.

Interested commentators on Trammell's statement were agreed in one wonder:

Would the New York meetings bring out network decisions from which would be inferred an intensified policy of educational frankness in behalf of the public generally on subjects of public interest in a war world?



Banjo on His Knee

Eddie Peabody is a shock-headed, blue-eyed, perennially youthful vaudevillian with a flair for picking out frenetic rhythms on a banjo.

For years Eddie Peabody has toured

nation's great cities, the back-country "sticks," sometimes featured as a banjoist, sometimes leading his own orchestras, either as a stage act or as house leader.

Most radio listeners who have heard Eddie Peabody from time to time on National Barn Dance have wondered what else he did. Last week this wonder was satisfied.

Eddie Peabody is a Lieutenant Commander in the United States Navy, is at Great Lakes training station, has builded there what bandsmen were conceding is greatest of military bands since heyday of the late John Philip Sousa.

In past months, Peabody has given up most civilian activities for that of Band Music and Entertainment Officer at the Navy's great inland training station. He has expanded the station's band from a 25-piece musical organization into a brass band of 100 pieces. His assistant in the project has been Al Kvale, dance band leader, now a Navy lieutenant.

Besides activities at the station, Peabody has been jumping about the Mid-western scenery at the behest of the Navy to lead his music makers in a series of local entertainments and to deliver a variety of talks on the value of Naval training. As officer in charge of all entertainment activities at Great Lakes, he may expect to have his hands full.



Radio As Theatre

Radio by many authorities is likened to a combination of Chautauqua, Three Ring Circus and Vaudeville. Off in ethereal distance is heard strumming of minstrels, in immediate foreground of attention the verbal antics of highly paid zanies, the swing, jive, symphonics and syncopation of bands, orchestras and philharmonic groups, left and right, brass-lunged self-styled political, economic and art experts bellowing the pros and cons on which a lusty America thrives day in, day out.

Pain to many a listener has been lack of coherent editing of radio programs. Most seem devised in opposition to theory by which women choose hats, that is to say: they all try to be different, succeed only in being dully the same.

Admitted by all, however, is fact that Radio can only be life at its best or worst. The function of Radio, most contend, is to entertain with laughter, with tears, with thrills; to educate within limits, above all to entertain, sell goods.

Tendency most noted of Radio to clean itself of charges of apathy and lack of originality was seen in increase of Radio Theatres, so-called, a less loud emphasis on sponsors, a warmer and more intimate appeal to social intelligence.

Latest to consider Radio in terms of serious entertainment as, for example, legitimate stage is considered, is Philip Morris Playhouse, CBS, (KNX) Fridays at 8:30 p. m.

Off to a bad start October 3 with popularity-losing Eddie Cantor as its opening attraction, the Philip Morris enterprise is ambitiously conceived by its writer and director, Charles Martin. Planned the Playhouse: to produce

Megrims, I Got

Normally, a voice with an adolescent dither in it won't get you very far in radio. But Pat Buttram, (National Barn Dance, 6 p. m. Sat., KFI) pride of Winston County, Alabama, cornfield comedian of National Barn Dance, is exception to rule. He has a dipsy-doodle voice, has used it since early teens to make name welcome in a million radio homes, to produce fat pay envelopes.

Folks in rock-ribbed Republican Winston County (it's gone Democratic only once since the Civil War) think Pat is good. He got his start there on June 19, 1915 in Addison, where the elder Buttram was a preacher. Pat was born in a parsonage that at one time had been a church.

When Pat was 8 years old he gave out first efforts as an entertainer. Kids of the community organized a company of wagon players, put on cross-roads entertainment with a buckboard wagon for stage. A further historical note is that though christened Maxwell Emmett Buttram, he was known as Raccoon Buttram until he was 12. Then, for no known reason, folks started calling him Pat.

At 17, Pat had left Winston County to follow his father's profession, became a divinity student at Birmingham Southern College in Birmingham, Alabama. A role he took in a class play first called him to attention of Steve Cisler of WSGN, Birmingham affiliate. Cisler, watching Pat fulfill a serious drama role, walked up and offered Buttram a job as a comedy announcer.

Cisler it was who decided Pat ought to see the World's Fair in Chicago in 1933. As a side trip, they went out to see a broadcasting plant-at WLS, NBC affiliate in Chicago. In one way that was unfortunate. When Cisler got back to Birmingham with his pet comedy announcer a telegram waited them from WLS offering Pat a job back in Chicago. He grabbed the first plane, hasn't been back to Birmingham since, except for short visits.

Buttram's native style of comedy, delivered in a voice that undergoes the quaking megrims every now and then, has an interesting history. Back in days he was breaking into radio, he was given considerable aid in his delivery by one Luther Patrick, a radio entertainer at Birmingham. Patrick still acts as an advisor to Pat and helps him along with

"name" stars in adaptation of best sellers.

Fred (Shelley) Allen

Time has not softened the gravel-gone-mad voice of Radio funster Fred Allen. Though celebrating a tenth year in radio a fortnight ago, Allen's voice remains wonder of fascinated listeners, many of whom believe no one could be human and have such a wierd output of sounds as speech. Far from a dictionist, Fred Allen manages to make himself understood in terms of laughter.

In a recent article in Saturday Evening

Post, writer J. Bryan, III, thus described Fred Allen's speaking tones, compared the voice to that of Poet Shelley:

"... his voice was not only dissonant, like a jarring string, but he spoke in sharp fourths, the most unpleasant sequence of sounds that can fall on the human ear."

Bryan, writing in the current issue of the Post, thinks that does well enough as a description of the voice that earned its first money kidding its master's juggling and now earns a fittingly fabulous stipend for entertaining an estimated 20,000,000 Columbia network listeners. The Post writer backed his judgment with that of the late O. O. McIntyre, who once wrote that Fred Allen sounded like "a man with false teeth chewing on slate pencils."

"Allen's face," writes Bryan, "is the ideal backdrop for his voice. It might have been used as Villainy's ledger. The avarice of a Scrooge, the treachery of a Quisling, the malignant cunning of a Fu Manchu—all are written here, in an alphabet of pouches, squints and seams."

GOES HER WAY!

The Popular Miss Simms Air-Divorces Kay Kyser And Starts On Her Own!

SOME DAY SOON to a Mrs. Alma Janssen, a voice teacher in Fowler, California, the mailman will bring a recording of the voice of Virginia (Ginny, bless her) Simms.

Sending the record was the last thing Ginny talked about as we sat in her dressing room the other day while she was taking a rest in a quiet interval during a day of shooting on one of her three RKO-contracted pictures with Kay Kyser.

And, the record will be the last thing we'll speak of, for the reason that it will be a clinching argument that our reaction to this blue-eyed Fresno Miss as a girl of consummate modesty and endearing young charms is sound. Our reaction is that she is a girl without a trace of the conceit and affectation with which one usually associates young women who find themselves going somewhere in their chosen field.

So, putting Alma Janssen aside for a moment: Ginny's day had started that morning at 6:30 o'clock. It would end after midnight when tired directors and exhausted players had gone to the last logical outpost of endurance. Between "takes" during the long filming sessions Virginia napped, awakened to study songs she would sing in her new CBS show "Ginny Simms," talked over Columbia recording plans, called mother "to see if she was all right," studied digests of other pictures in which she would appear.

Being a wholesome, vital young woman, Virginia Simms can stand the fast pace that has won her the current title as the "busiest girl in Hollywood." It's not likely at this writing that there are others quite so getting-aroundish as Ginny.

How she came to win the title needs, necessarily, a verbal cutback to a day in 1935 when a brown-eyed miss was singing quite happily and with young abandon in a San Francisco cafe. At that moment she suggested the school-girl, pupil of Fresno State Teachers College of a few months before. But her voice was not such as any school teacher ever raised. If they had there

would be more pupils in school and the percentage of illiteracy much lower.

Kay Kyser, the old Professor of Musical Knowledge, was at the cafe ring-side. He gave Ginny an auditory but not a social tumble and hid himself off to Chicago and the Blackhawk Hotel where he was engaged. An orchestra singer gave out on him, so the story runs, and Kay, being a thorough-going professor, thought of Ginny. He sent for her and she came and there began one unusual thing about Ginny. It is that she is the only singer in radio whose career springs from an association with one orchestra. That her experience with that orchestra is the whole history of her experience in radio.

"For which," she said softly, "I'm deeply grateful to Kay Kyser." And, incidentally, her air debut with CBS, September 19 at 6:55 p. m. marked the end of her professional association with the Professor, who, we sense, in a way, must feel bad at the decision of Ginny to stay in California, go into pictures and continue radio work in the state where the most part of her life has been spent.

Which takes us to the next step. Virginia is a girl so essentially wholesome, so endowed with natural good looks and a voice that makes jaded old ears and alert young ones perk up with terrier-like interest, that it was almost impossible to escape being picture material. Kay Kyser helped in this, of course—for, whenever the Pantomiming Pedagogue of Pleasing Philomels was asked to do a picture with boys he took the gal along. So Ginny learned, and being a bright young woman, and quite serious about trying to do everything just right, it wasn't so long before directors concluded she was just right for pictures. RKO came forward with a contract and Ginny, for the first time in a sheltered professional career, had to make a grim and lasting decision. For years Kay Kyser was the Papa of the College. To him orchestra members and Ginny deferred. Papa knew best. Now Papa has to go east to do his stuff. And pictures and a career for Ginny were in the west. Then came an offer for appearances in a neat little radio idea members of the International

Cellucotton products had whipped up one afternoon. (These are the people who make Kleenex—oh, you girls know). So there was Ginny with her life shaping up the way she wanted it to—out in California whose sunshine is in her eyes, whose fresh and tangy climate is in her clean-moulded face and her bubbling but quietly repressed vitality.

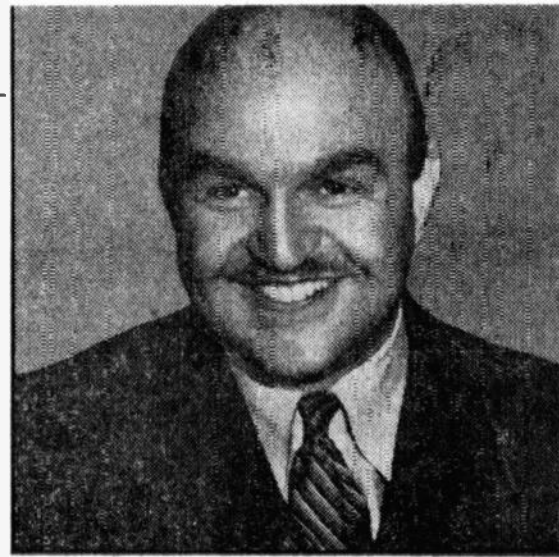

Bernice Berwin Gets Muddled Up With Her Air And Real Selves

WHETHER IT'S having a baby, keeping a tight rein on obstreperous twins, or managing romantically inclined Boarder Murray, Hazel of "One Man's Family" is a Rock of Gibraltar. With a poise which leaves us envious and sometimes a nite irritated by its implied smugness, she may be depended upon to slash through any snarl of complications with a flurry minimum. Confessed favorite of Father Barbour, confidante of Mother, the wise, efficient elder sister of the brood . . . that's Hazel of the script.

In real life Bernice Berwin, both like and unlike Hazel, affords a fascinating psychological study. With the show since it started in 1928, believing that Author Carlton E. Morse's Barbours are being consciously written from life, knowing that it is not uncommon for actresses to confuse personal identities with a part, Bernice has come now to the puzzling place where she draws herself up sharply to demand, "What am I? A housewife with three children or an actress?"

"Except for two things, I'm completely in accord with Hazel," Bernice confided as we chatted in NBC Artists' Corridor. "Occasionally in the script, Hazel seems almost too good. I'm wicked enough to wish that someone would sneak up and throw her off balance. Then, I think

she is often too strict with the children, Hank and Pinky. She'd whale the tar out of them if circumstances provoked and I'm not like that in real life at all . . . at least, I don't think I am," she supplemented falteringly. "I've had more than one argument on how I should raise my radio children, but when it's necessary to discipline my own 7-year-old son, I don't use capital punishment. I use isolation, and it works!"

"Truth is," Bernice acknowledged, "my part in the script is so knowingly written that I suspect Carlton Morse has more insight into the true me than I do myself. Maybe I'm really like Hazel and don't know it."

"I do know this," she protested. "I positively wouldn't live on a dairy ranch, although I'd have the stamina for rugged life if I were as so many listeners picture me—a husky, heavy-set, middle-aged woman."

We were disturbed that Bernice's fans didn't know she's as trim and smart as they're packaged. She exuded femininity as she talked to us, her dark hair and eyes flattered with a chic black ensemble relieved only by a frothy white chiffon collar and cob-webby hankie.

"One thing that makes listeners envious me as larger and older than I am is my voice," Bernice explained. "When I first filled Hazel's role, I spoke in a high pitch. It was labor to bring it down to a mature, poised tone. Now, I've not only lowered my 'One Man's Family' voice, but I've unconsciously adopted it as my every-day conversational tone."

In some fundamentals unlike Hazel, Bernice, in real life experiences, has

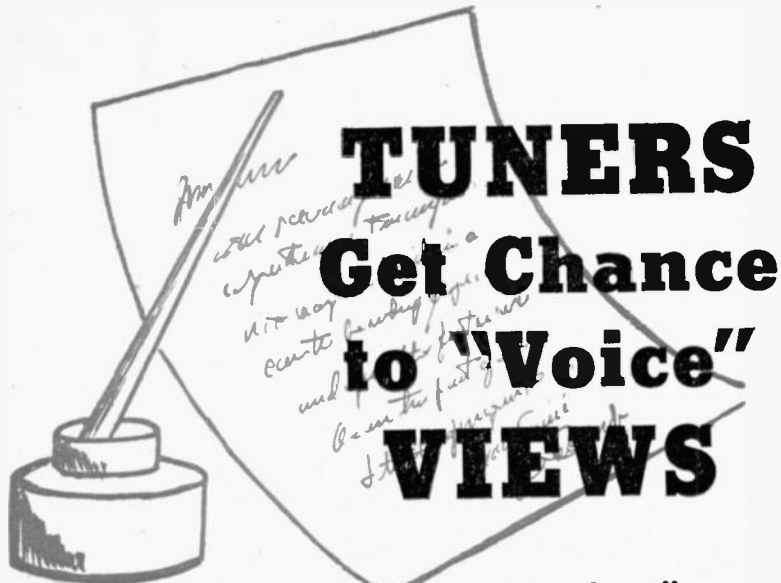
demonstrated Barbourian qualities. A native of San Francisco, an only child, educated in Piedmont and at the University of California, married to a successful Bay City attorney, she has balanced with finesse a personal adventure in living and a career.

She had been "discovered" for radio and had established herself as an actress when she decided to give up the microphone for matrimony. Resolutely she clipped recipes and devoted british enthusiasms to roasting beef and concocting chocolate cakes. Maybe they were good slices of beef and cake, maybe they lacked the dash of a master chef. But when hubby realized how much Bernice wanted to act, he was generous, encouraging, proud to have her continue her career.

When "One Man's Family" moved from San Francisco to Hollywood, Bernice was confronted with another issue. It seemed difficult to diminish parental ties, provide home life for husband and son, adequately meet air requirements. She solved it by 'planing up and down the coast, keeping everybody happy. For the current school year she and sonny have taken a house in Hollywood. In hurried periods when she is unable to fly north, family members rely on the program to know that Bernice is all right.

By adoption, she has a family in Hollywood, too. When she needs sympathetic advice and can't commute to Mother Berwin, she takes her troubles to Mother Barbour. She is enormously fond of Paul and thinks he has an exceptionally fine mind. In Claudia she has found a companion who has compensated for lack

Sam Hayes "Listeners' Lookout" Sounds Out Public's Opinions!

ON HOW MANY questions that you think of as vitally important to your welfare have you been given a chance to express yourself during the past year? During the past two

years? On what questions do you think the American people should be privileged to express themselves in order to guide our national legislators to nationally significant decisions?

For instance:

Last year polls showed that 66.6% of us voted "Yes" on the question: "Do you favor a nationwide public vote before any declaration of war?"

What do you think now?

"Should the United States make another attempt now to bring about world disarmament?"

Fifty and 25/100% of us said "No" to this question last year.

What would we say now?

Just before the fateful day in 1938 when Britain declared war on Germany, Pacific Coast residents were asked this question:

"If Britain and France become involved in war with Germany and Italy would you approve sending an American Army to fight side by side with the democracies to insure victory?"

Only 31% of Pacificans voted to go to war to aid European nations.

In light of world developments since then what do you imagine the vote would be on the foregoing question?

Some of us may say incredulously: "I don't remember that these questions were ever asked of us."

But they were. Sam Hayes asked them.

And Sam Hayes is going to ask a lot more before his forthcoming "Listeners' Lookout" KECA-KFSD, Tuesday evenings at 9:15 o'clock, runs to its end.

The questions cited were asked on Hayes' Mennen's program between October 10, 1938 and April 25, 1939.

Sam Hayes has been prominent as a newscaster for ten years. The son of a Presbyterian minister who was noted for his oratorical prowess, Hayes has inherited an instinct for probing into peoples' minds to find out what they think. Possessed of a brilliant social intellect, he has also an interest in stimulating the public to express itself, first, however, providing an outlet for expression.

Before October 1, 1938, he conducted CBS's "Ballot Box" and plumped into the Mr. and Mrs. Citizen's mildly puzzled minds such questions as:

"Are we for or against embargoes on munitions to Japan?"

Exactly 95% of us said we were against.

"Are we in favor of compulsory military training?" Yes—56%.

"Should the United States adopt a vigorous foreign policy?" This meant: Should we use the "Big Stick" against Japan? It also smoked out what is today's current national headache—intervention or non-intervention in European affairs. There were 60% who wanted a tougher Far-Eastern Policy.

Americans, being a skeptical people in an era of power and pressure politics, with political scandal and confusion the rule rather than the exception, might figurably say:

"What good does it do for me to

say what I think? Who pays attention?"

According to Sam Hayes' theory and the practical results of his polls it does a lot of good.

Perhaps a great many who voted for or against doing certain things in past Hayes-conducted polls have had plenty to do with the positions taken by law-making bodies today on moot subjects.

Hayes sees to it that what Westerners think gets to those who want to know what they think. Virtually every Western United States Senator avidly goes after the final results of a Hayes poll. And Sam sees that they get them. The Senators believe that such responses are sound material on which to legislate. And if Senators think so, isn't it a reasonable presumption that our mass-average opinions are worth uttering when we have the chance?

And a chance is exactly what Sam Hayes is driving at—a chance for the man and woman in Americans' humble and great homes, the workman and the executive, all fused in the amazing heterogeneity that is a unified America.

What are we going to do in the future that is racing toward us, time-bellied with pregnant portents?

Shall we remain apathetic while decisions that are to affect us for generations to come are made by others, willy-nilly?

Or are we to have a voice in what is to be?

Radio, as it is interpreted by Hayes as a public service, says "Yes" to the second question. Radio is providing the questions. The questions are those that rise naturally from the swift moving

Regarding your inquiry: "Is Frequency Modulation taking the place of television at the Don Lee station?"

Don Lee Broadcasting System, which has been conducting television experiments for ten years, has now added a second and separate unit, called "Frequency Modulation," to its scope of operations.

Television employs synchronized pictures-and-sound. Frequency Modulation is an improved method of broadcasting sound only, and is recognized as a new step in the art of commercial radio. It is a noise-free high fidelity method eliminating all static. Sounds of all kinds are heard with amazing realism. A specially-built receiver must be purchased, or adapter attached to a radio of the present type.

The reason for this is that instead of jiggling the signal up and down along the wave band, as in the present or Amplitude Modulation system, the FM transmitter "swings" the signal in a smooth-flowing line, according to a unique but highly complex method.

When Frequency Modulation was given recognition by the Federal Government, the higher bands were re-allocated. Part of them were set aside for television; part for FM.

Going a step farther, the Federal Communications Commission stipulated that the sound portion of television should use Frequency Modulation of a power and frequency commensurate with the power and frequency of the picture. There is no connection between Frequency Modulated radio station K45LA atop Mt. Lee and the W6XAO television studio atop Mt. Lee. Both, of course, use Frequency Modulation for sound, but not on the same channels.

Recipe for Fillets of Halibut a la Clete Roberts

Place 8 fillets of halibut in a buttered pan, season with salt and pepper, add 1 glass of sherry wine, cover with buttered paper, and set in oven at 400 degrees for 10 minutes. Then put the fillets on a platter and put in the fish pan $\frac{1}{2}$ pint of white wine sauce and $\frac{1}{4}$ pint of Hauser Sauce, bring to a boil and strain. Cut 4 slices of Wilson's Old-Fashioned Bacon in strips like matches, fry and put in the sauce, add few leaves of tarragon herb chopped very fine, season with salt and pepper and pour over the fish.

Recipe for Veal Stew a la Edgar Bergen

3 lbs. veal from the leg	1 celery heart
8 mushrooms, large size	1 tbsp. salt
1 large onion	Mixed herbs
2 carrots cut in dices	8 pickling onions

Put the veal in a saucepan and cover with water, add salt. Bring to a boil and skim. Then add the vegetables and herbs. Bring to a boil and let simmer on low fire for 1 hour. Be sure that the meat is tender and firm—cut in 2-inch squares. Boil the mushrooms until tender. Saute them with the onions into the butter.

Recipe for the Sauce

3 lbs. butter	yolk of 3 eggs
$\frac{1}{4}$ cup flour	8 tbsps. cream
1 pint veal stock	1 tbsp. lemon juice
1 tsp. chopped parsley	

Put the butter in a saucepan, when melted add the flour and stir over a low fire for 10 minutes. Then add the veal stock and stir well. Bring to boil. Skim and take from fire. Add the egg yolks, thickening (made by mixing the egg in a bowl with the lemon juice and few tbsps. of cold stock) and adding gradually few tbsps. of the warm sauce. Then add the cream. Put the pieces of veal in a saucepan, pour the strained sauce over them, add the mushrooms, and simmer for few minutes. Just before serving add the onions. Put the pieces of veal in the center of a hot platter, pour the sauce over and garnish with the mushrooms and onions. Sprinkle chopped parsley.

FOR YOUR HOLIDAY CAKE—It's getting around that time of the year now when you should start thinking of fruit cakes. That means you should be laying in a supply of raisins, dates,



currants, citron, lemon and orange rind, almonds, pecans, walnuts and other nut meats, not forgetting some candied pineapple and maraschino cherries. For spices you can use mace, nutmeg, cinnamon, cloves or allspice, and for additional flavoring a few drops of vanilla or wintergreen. Then too, you will be needing something like jelly, molasses or honey, and for liquids some sherry or brandy and maybe some rosewater, unless you intend to use coffee or fruit juices. Anyway start thinking about your Thanksgiving and Christmas fruit cakes now, so that they'll have a chance to age a little before it's time to serve them. We are giving you some recipes on this subject this week, and if you want to get busy on a fruit cake right away, here are some other important things to remember: It's a good idea to dredge the fruits and nuts with flour before you use them, and if you wash the fruits you should let them dry thoroughly. Then you can reduce the baking time on your cake by steaming it first and when you're baking it, a piece of brown paper placed over it will keep the top from browning too fast. Finally, when done, the cake should be cooled on a rack that allows a circulation of air above, below and all around it, and after that it should be wrapped in waxed paper and stored in an air-tight can.

A SALTY MEMO—Last week we told you about pan-broiling, but have you ever heard about salt-broiling? If you haven't, here's how you go about it. You take a couple of large pans which are about three or four inches deep and fill them half full of ice-cream-freezer salt. Then you place the pans in a hot oven and let them stay until the salt begins to pop. Meanwhile you wrap the meat in a double thickness of oiled paper. Then when the salt starts popping, you take out both pans, set the meat, wrapped up as it is, in one of them, cover it with hot salt from the other, put a lid on top, and let everything stand on the kitchen table for about half an hour. When at last you dig out your steak and unwrap it you should have one of the tenderest surprises you've ever tasted.

MORE MOCKERY—We have been giving you quite a few mock dishes lately, and maybe you have started a special file for them, so here is another now, called Mock Chili Con Carne. Chop up four sweet green peppers, making sure you remove the seeds. Then grate one onion to a pulp and mix with the peppers. After this add one small, hot, red pepper and cook everything in a saucepan until it begins to brown. Now add a pint of sifted tomatoes and a teaspoon of salt, and cover and simmer for one hour. After an hour, add a pint of cooked kidney beans and simmer

FOREIGN FOOD NOTES—In the Philippines cow's milk is sometimes diluted with cocoanut milk emulsion. In East Africa sesame seed are considered high in food value and a good source of calcium. In Egypt they use native beans as a breakfast dish. In Copenhagen they believe in keeping cod-liver oil in brown bottles and in the dark to preserve its vitamin-A. From Tokyo we learn that rice harvested in the fall begins to lose its vitamin content during the following rainy season. And from Persia we hear that pomegranates are used there as a symbol of fruitfulness and abundance during a marriage feast.

A MAN'S TASTE—Speaking of rainy seasons, there are those who believe that the grocery business picks up when it rains because men do some of the shopping. Some of the things that a man brings home on a rainy day for instance are cookies, fancy crackers, pickles, olives, meat sauces, sardines, salami, preserves, honey, sausage, snappy cheeses, green onions, radishes, etc. There is a lesson in what a man craves in this, and a wife would be wise to note what her husband seems to like on a rainy day and occasionally provide the same thing for him when the sun shines too.

Recipe for Santa Claus Fruit Cake

- 1/2 lb. butter
- 1 1/2 cups brown sugar
- 7 eggs
- 1/2 cup black molasses
- 4 cups flour
- 1/2 tsp. soda
- 1/2 lb. Budget Pack seedless raisins
- 1/2 lb. Budget Pack currants
- 1 package Budget Pack candied fruits
- 2 tsps. ground cinnamon
- 1/2 tsp. nutmeg
- 1/2 lb. pecans
- 1/2 lb. roasted walnuts
- 2 cups sherry wine
- 1 tsp. salt

First, sift flour with cinnamon, nutmeg, salt and soda. Second, cream butter and brown sugar. Then beat eggs separate. Add the molasses to the beaten egg yolks, add to the butter and sugar mixture, and fold egg whites with it. Then mix in flour, fruits, raisins, and nuts—when well mixed, add all the rest of the mixed ingredients and last the wine. Mix thoroughly and pour in paper-lined baking pans. Bake in oven at 250 degrees for 4 1/2 hours. When done take from oven, put the cakes on a rack so the air circulates all around the cake. When cool, put wax paper all around and place in a hot cover and let stay until you are ready to serve.

Recipe for Black Fruit Cake

- 1/2 lb. butter
- 8 eggs
- 1 cup apple juice
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 1 package Budget Pack currants
- 1 package Budget Pack raisins
- 1 package Budget Pack candied fruit
- 1 8-oz. package Budget Pack pecans
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 cup molasses
- 5 cups flour
- 1 1/4 tsp. soda
- 2 tsps. ground cinnamon
- 1/2 tsp. ground nutmeg

Cream butter and sugar well. Beat eggs separate and add the yolks to the butter and sugar mixture. Then add molasses and apple juice. Mix flour, soda, salt, cinnamon and nutmeg. Sift them all together. Then flour, fruits, raisins and nuts, and when flour gets all around the fruits, mix everything together and when well mixed fold in the egg whites. Line up 2 cake pans with brown paper, fill the pans with the fruit cake mixture and bake for 5 hours at 250 degrees. When done take the cakes from the pans and let cool so that the air circulates right around the cake. When cool take brown paper off the cakes, wrap them in wax paper, and put in a crock and cover.

Recipe for Swiss Steak with Rice

- 1 1/2 lbs. of Swiss steak
- 1/2 lb. Budget Pack rice
- 1 No. 2 1/2 can solid pack tomatoes
- 1 onion, 2 cloves garlic, 1 sprig parsley
- 4 tablespoons oil
- Salt and pepper

First, chop 1 onion, 2 cloves of garlic and a sprig of parsley. Now put to saute in a thick skillet with 4 tablespoons oil and 2 tablespoons of butter. Then fry until onion gets to a golden color. Now open a can of tomatoes and pour into the skillet with the onions. Season with salt and pepper, and let simmer for 20 minutes. Then put 1 1/2 lbs. of Swiss steak in a baking pan, and put into an oven of 450 degrees for 15 minutes. While the steak is baking, boil 1/2 lb. of rice, and when tender drain. Now put rice on a hot platter, and put the steak on top. Then pour the sauce over the rice, and serve.

Filling the Monday-through-Friday schedules will be all of the country's leading tune titans, including Tommy Dorsey, Benny Goodman, Harry James, Freddie Martin, Guy Lombardo, Vaughn Monroe and Horace Heidt. These will not be chosen on basis of record sales.

For first Saturday broadcast, November 8, the band selection will be made on the total phonograph record sales compiled during the month of October—the Number One band of the nation.

Broadcasts will originate from New York, Chicago, Los Angeles, other leading cities in the U. S., before studio audiences. Tickets for these broadcasts will be distributed by bottlers of Coca Cola.

On the dates when Mutual's boxing broadcasts are aired, the Coca Cola programs, as yet untitled, will be heard immediately following.
