### Radio Goes to War!

At 11:22 a. m. PST, Dec. 7, 1941, Radio announced to an astounded America in less time than ever such news has been carried before, an amazing bulletin from the White House:

Washington—Japanese airplanes today attacked American defense bases at Hawaii and President Roosevelt has ordered the Army and Navy to carry out undisclosed orders prepared for the defense of the United States.

Superbly attuned to America's attitude toward its leader, — attuned,

too, to Franklin Delano Roosevelt's attitude toward Radio, was the fact that this bulletin was announced directly from the White House to all correspondents within a few minutes after direct telephonic communication from Hawaii-Governor Poindexter to the President,—but made available to the public instantaneously only by Radio.

Within the hour, David Sarnoff, power of the Radio Corporation of America and the National Broadcasting Company, had sent to the President his offer placing world-wide NBC's facilities at the country's disposal. (Text p. 2). Even sooner were H. V. Kaltenborn and Elmer Davis on

the air coast-to-coast for NBC and CBS with unrehearsed, pungent interpretations of the terse announcements beginning to follow from Honolulu. Dramatically through the day as commentator followed commentator, as bulletin followed bulletin—was vividly demonstrated the nation's enormous trust and dependence on Radio. Standing by to provide background interpretations on which no public has ever been so thoroughly informed were Wm. L. Shirer, John B. Hughes, Norman Nesbitt, Fulton Lewis Jr., John Daly, other top-flight news-analysts,—allowing themselves in turn

### Best for Bing

For many years did Mary Martin sing for Radio and for many years and with many bands was she no inconsiderable success. By the time she was ready to essay motion pictures, however, was she overtly press-agented as a girl from Texas who sang a song called "My Heart Belongs to Daddy," no other. In truth, before "Daddy" had Mary done one of equal renown called "Leave It to Me." In truth, now as ever carefully press-agented, has Mary Martin pioneered something new in vocal styles—songs which consistently present the good girl in the act of being good, gooder, goodest—and being so with superlative sophistication. It went over big in Radio, in the movies (Mary is comely; see cut) even bigger.

Came word this week that Mary Martin (good-goooder-gooodest) is to return to Radio and in details of the announcement was it revealed that what Mary's comeliness has added to her reputation in the movies it has added to her stature in Radio too. For no such Radio prominence as Bing Crosby's Kraft Music Hall was Mary's before—with sophistication, she sang goodish songs before the cameras. But now it was the top-ranking radio variety show of the nation Mary was joining.

She was joining it for seven weeks, starting New Year's Day. She was replacing no less a Radio and Kraft Music Hall fixture than goodishlessly sophisticated Connie Boswell. She was certain, in such circumstances, to improve still more her professional standing, more than a little likely to be a rare treat for listeners. Indeed, if being good-goooder-gooodest in song (with sophistication) can be ethered with effectiveness somewhat resembling the movies', Mary Martin will be heard on KMH for many a week more than seven. If not, rumor is, Ginny

Simms will be gooder for KMH in even a different way. KFI, 6 p.m. Thurs.

### Break for the Pause

Many wonders hath Radio, not all of them in precise detail as to origin and nature understood by listeners. For example: henceforth are listeners

to hear station-identifications made on the quarter-hour as well as on the half-hour and hour.

The Reason: The dispensation is made by the Federal Communications Commission in response, it is reported on good authority, to a plea by the Mutual Broadcasting System in behalf of its Coca Cola "Spotlight Bands" series.

The Effect: Now may "Spotlight Bands" or any other show which, due to exigencies of network schedules, starts on the quarter-hour, omit the station-break half-way through program, the break being required only every thirty minutes. Formerly did such programs find it necessary to interrupt themselves half way for the break. New ruling will place "Spotlight", other quarter-hour starting shows on even footing with half-hour or hour starting shows.

Unchanged is FCC rule requiring station break on the hour.

### Science, It's Wonderful!

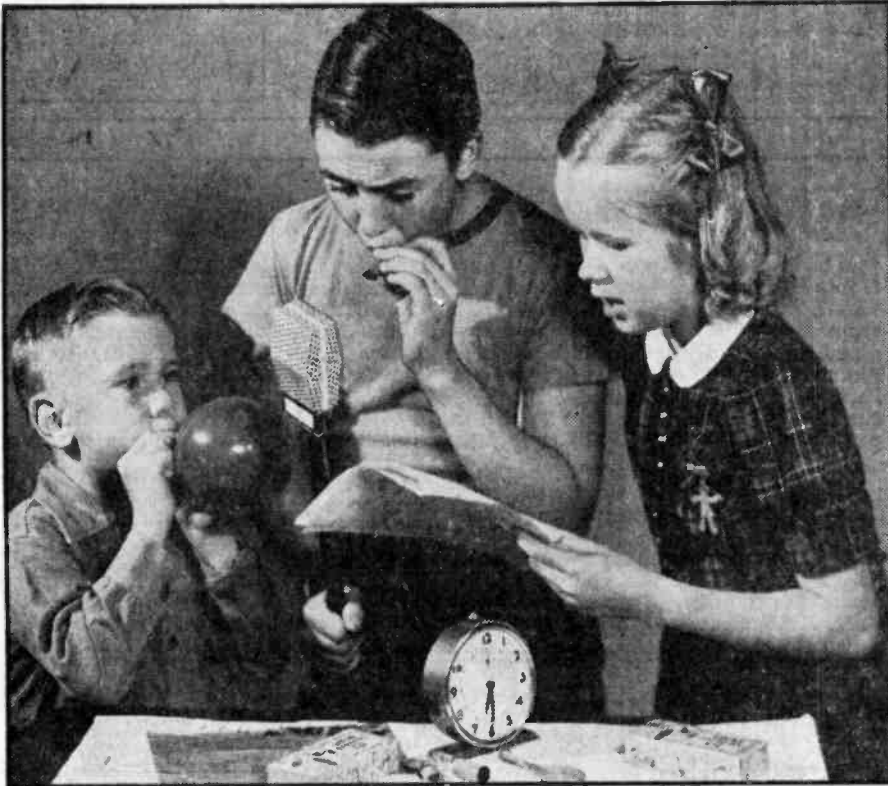

S. nationality. Less publicized but of keener interest to adult minds, however, is that Jack Armstrong is, in the most exact sense and meaning, a scientific boy too.

For before Jack's derring-do is aired must it be analyzed by internationally known child psychologist Dr. Martin L. Reymert. Besides being interesting must Jack's tale be objective in presentation, feasible in plot. Jack's scripted trials, when they have left the scientific hands of Dr. Reymert are certain to be those which are sure to foster a constructive social attitude, develop self-reliance. Comes word this week that what Dr. Reymert has social-conscientiously selected for current offering is no less than a "radio sound effects kit," complete with: a balloon containing shot, a siren, tweeters, a dummy microphone.

But while quiet-loving parents might be inclined to question the savant's judgment on the peace-making propensities of the current give-away, more than a few, learning, as learn they will, of Jack's social-test-tube genesis, will begin to wonder why such standards could not be, or are not being, applied to some of nation's currently radioed "adult" humor. . . .

### Radio Blackouts

New twist to the oft posed question, "If you were stranded on a desert isle

with whom would you like to be?" was radio's query put to 51 students of Long Island University's survey course in broadcasting: "If an emergency existed in this country where it became necessary, aside from news broadcasts, to limit radio programs to only one hour, what would you want to hear and why?"

Students ranging in age from 18 to 60 and comprising teachers, undergraduates, lawyers, accountants, persons already in radio, and one man with money ready for the purchase of a radio station, agreed on one hour of varied entertainment, whether it be a comedian sandwiched in between swing or classical music, or drama between blues singing and grand opera. Garnering the greatest number of program votes (39 out of 51) as a "must" inclusion on the program was the "Aldrich Family" series.

Pointed out one quizzee: If such an emergency came to pass, a preponderance of comedy and music would be necessary on the hour's broadcast as a means of strengthening national morale.

Crabbed the Radio Cynic: If an emergency came, better exclude all radio programs than be left to shift

with an intensified hour of some of the stuff now passing as entertainment, enlightenment.

Vigorously countered Loyal Listener: No better morale builder could be found than an hour's broadcast including Hour of Charm, Charlie McCarthy, Pause That Refreshes, Aldrich Family, Album of Familiar Music, Kate Smith.

### Heavenly Discord

Uttermost and final heaven for young U. S. creative artists is winning of an award such as offered by Guggenheim, other foundations, permitting a year of work with expenses paid. Occasionally such a heaven is proffered too by a commercial organization, in which case the award is no less, only differing condition that the artist works first, gets paid later. Such a heaven was provided last week by Mutual's mighty WGN, Chicago, offering \$8000 for the three best original American operettas.

First reaction, coming not from musical youngsters but from well established songsmiths, most of them ASCAP members, was that they rejoiced at opportunity to make up for loss of revenue to them during recent ASCAP-network tiff. Within few days, however, came word from tunedom's throneholders that WGN had been not too liberal after all. One award is to be of \$5000, three others of \$1000 each. By the time songsmiths paid costs of arrangements, typing, etc., they pointed out, there would be little left for winner.

Undaunted was WGN, however, even by successful songsmiths' bitterest, most extreme charges,—that "WGN was trying to acquire \$100,000 of operetta for \$8000."

If high-earning ASCAP tune-tinkers had not time of their own with which to do orchestrations, perhaps other, less successful composers might be found who had more time than success. That they might also have more talent than they had prominence WGN could not guarantee. Listeners

to be interrupted for magnificently calm, almost pedantic interpolation of flash bulletins by run-of-the-mill announcers.

Forecast for the night and day was 24-hour broadcasting by all of the major networks while the nation awaited first reports from the President's cabinet meeting Sunday night, the meeting of Congress Monday morning.

Out of it all came this signal realization for the man on the street, that Radio was not only equal to a task the likes of which no people had ever the right for which to hope before, but super-willing to put all its resources, blood and sweat and headaches, into the prodigious job of keeping America informed, demonstrating again with more than ever significant emphasis that with Radio the public interest comes first.

Ceaseless is the flow of episodes for which Director-Producer Russ Johnston and Writer Norman Rose prepare the setting, continuous is the search for unique personalities, happenings. But now and again come snags in

By Radio would this information be dispatched to the people more swiftly than the swiftest aircraft, quick as thought.

# Home Folks--Show Folks

## Or 'How To Form a Quartet'

.. And Influence the Wrong People, Make The Right Friends ..

**I**N THE glassed-in sanctity of the control booth in Studio A at NBC's Hollywood radio-program factory the producer leans with befitting augustness, pomp and importance toward his desk-mike and in the rehearsal theater you hear the sharp switch-on click presaging the directorial dictum. Herbert Marshall, Bert Wheeler, Hank Ladd, and the other Old Gold show luminaries take the situation rather indolently but not so the Kids from Minneapolis.

The Kids from Minneapolis, The Merry Macs to you, are doing the rehearsing right now. They're experimenting with a new band combination and in Radio this first whispers—then shouts—trouble. It's been a

long session—they're pretty frankly tired. Comes the great man's words:

"In that passage at the end of 'Moonlight in Hawaii' where you all smell. . . ." The great man is seen to glow lividly behind the grayed glateless glass. A bitter, strangled cough chokes him. He pulls out a capacious hanky and mops his suddenly steaming visage with Chesterfieldian grace, studiously. . . .

"I beg your pardon," he croons apologetically, "what I meant was 'that passage where you all swell' into the mike. . . ."

A fluff like that, though obviously unintentional, might have broken up the rehearsal there and then if it had affected some of Radio's other top names. "Bart" Marshall coughs embarrassedly. But how do the "kids" take it? They take it big!

"A fine thing, a fine thing," they chorus in simulated anguish, with

Mary Lou Cook, the "blend girl" of the quartet jibing, ". . . and we were just starting to think we had this number down pat. . . ." You get the idea,—so does everyone else, and they all relax . . . and things move right along.

Just for the record, The Merry Macs are the highest-priced singing group of any size or number in radio—or in motion pictures too, for that matter. But with all this, and with every Blue Ribbon in their kind of musicking too, including leadership in sales of recordings (over five million copies last year), they're about the most unspoiled bunch of kids that ever struck a highly mystified Hollywood. Furthermore (and it's hard to believe this unless you've been exposed to them personally) the only reason they persisted in pioneering their half-harmony, half-harmonics (or octaves) style of singing is that the idea happened to originate in the minds, throats, and souls of their choir-singing Mom and Pop when the boys were still knee-high to a midget piano stool.

Not "going Hollywood" and, at the same time, not making any enemies, takes plenty of doing, however. When Los Angeles Associated Press critic Verne Hoagland jeered that Ted McMichael's acquisition of a rather spacious ranch house in North Hollywood, following his collaboration in writing the Hut Sut Song, proved Ted was suffering a swelled cranium, things began to happen fast in the now classic McMichael way.

First off, Mrs. Ted's own Mom wrote from the East demanding to know in accents true just what kind of an all-get-out show-window of a house daughter was living in anyway. Then, Ted, with huge aplomb, invited critic Hoagland out to the ranch to "see his private lake and private yacht." Hoagland was to "be sure to bring his binoculars." Arriving at the modest ranch lay-out, binoculars and all, Hoagland was soberly and formally escorted to the "lake," which proved to be a modest gold-fish pond, and shown the "yacht," a dime-store boat novelty. The newsman stayed for dinner—and has been a real friend ever since.

Four years ago, when Fred Allen was searching feverishly for something, anything, musical or non-musical, to add "lift" to his then sagging and scraping program format, The Merry Macs and their "bounce rhythms" provided the answer—and the mighty tidal wave of enthusiasm which swept them to preeminence in their business has gone to their heads about like a stiff shot of distilled water. Judd, the eldest of the three McMichael boys (Mary Lou is no relation), has solemnly sworn he'll devastate the turkey market next year with the fine capons he raises on his ranch. Brother Joe, a bachelor, lives and farms with Mom and Pop on still a third McMichael ranch a few miles

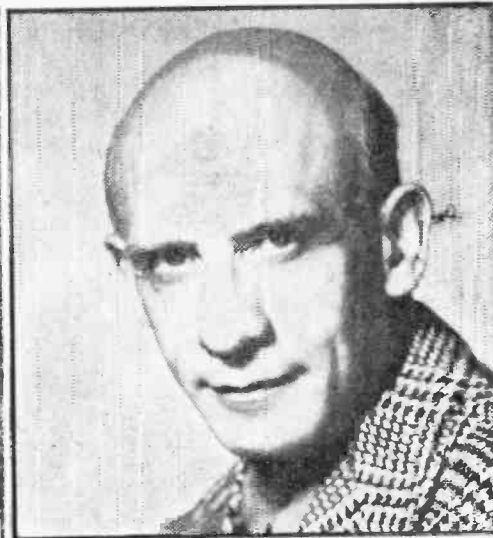

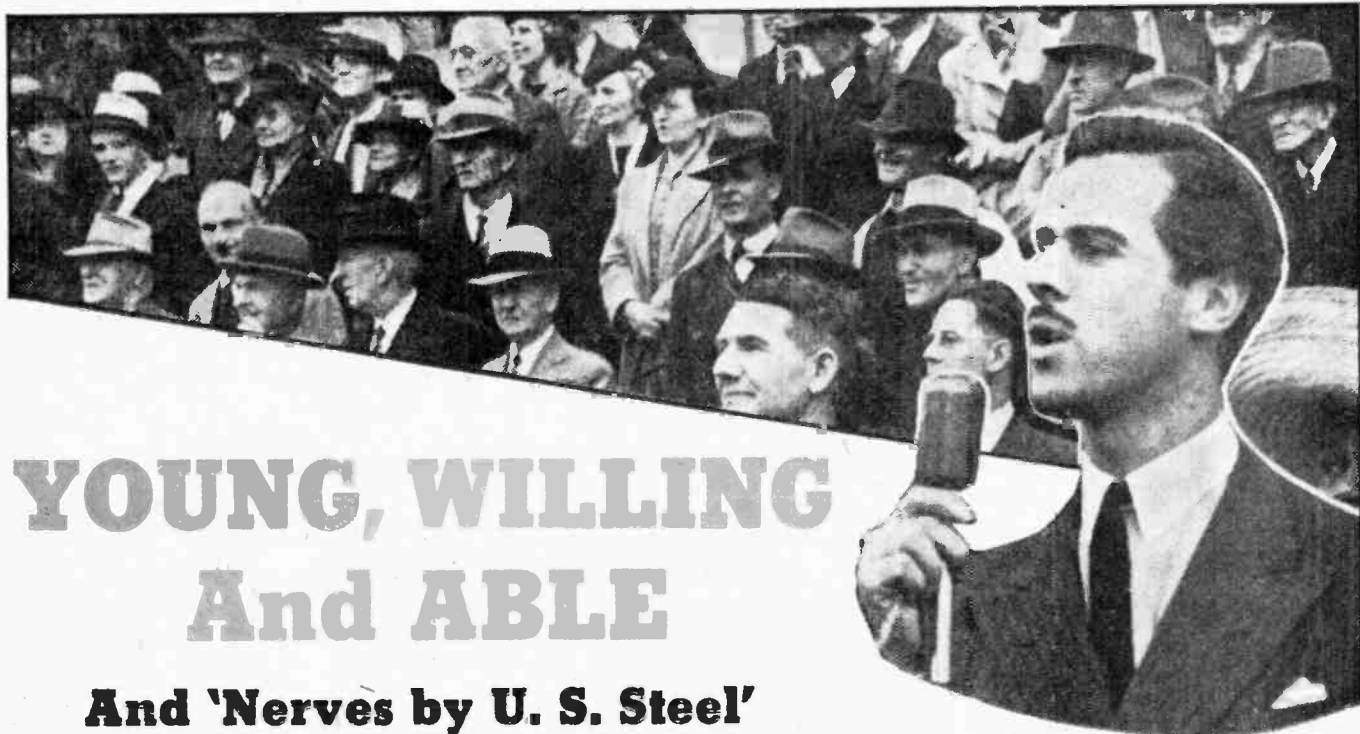

*Your Special Events Man Has Landed, and Has the News in Hand*

**A** O! THE MAN isn't mad. You see him bottled up in a cubby hole at the radio station. Furiously, continuously, he has been jabbering to himself for almost an hour. He's 1) quite sane, 2) a special events man disciplining himself to talk extemporaneously, exhaustively, about and **only** about things in the room—the nap on the carpet, crack in the plaster, dust on the desk legs—anything his eye succeeds in search-

ing out. He's the man with precision-coordinated eye, mind, and tongue, who is to radio what the intrepid news camera man is to movies—an on-the-spot reporter of news while it is happening—accurate, colorful, sometimes spectacular. . . .

Sometimes amusing, like the tale of Clete and the deluge. Clete Roberts, program director and special events man at KMPC, arrived in Southern California simultaneously with the flood of January, 1938. As Trans-Radio Press Service man for KGER, he was assigned to air-survey and describe the damage. In a low-winged monoplane, the pilot and Clete circled over terrain completely unfamiliar to the newcomer. Spasmodically he would nudge the pilot: "Where are we now?"

"Over Long Beach," the pilot

would yell, or "Over Venice." Then a turn northward.

"Where are we now?"

"Burbank," shouted the pilot.

Registered in Roberts' mind was the fact that Los Angeles River had cut some fancy capers in Burbank, so he corralled his select adjectives for a graphic description, then peered earthward.

"Oh, look!", he exclaimed. "Such destruction. It's horrible. Down below are rows and rows of houses, with all but the front part of the buildings torn away."

At this juncture, the pilot turned a jaundiced eye in Clete's direction. "That's not flood damage. We're over the back lot of Warner Brothers!"

## Chef Milani's Sunday Dinner

For Eight Persons

Fruit Cocktail  
 Cream of Dry Pea Soup  
 Anchovies Celery California Olives  
 Stuffed Roast Duck  
 Cranberry Sauce  
 Green Peas in Butter  
 Young Turnips  
 Sliced Tomato Salad with Oil and Vinegar Dressing  
 Three-Flavor Jack Benny Jello Supreme  
 Monarch Coffee

### Recipe for Cream of Dry Pea Soup

$\frac{3}{4}$  cup Budget Pack peas  
 2 tbsps. butter  
 1  $\frac{1}{2}$  qts. milk  
 Melt the butter in double boiler, add milk, cinnamon, salt. When the milk gets hot, add Gravy Master, stir. Wash peas in hot water, drain and put to cook with milk for 2 hours on a slow fire.

### Recipe for Stuffed Roasted Duck

2 young ducks 1 lbs. each  
 1 lb. Budget Pack dried prunes (pit them and chop the pulp)  
 1 celery (washed, boiled and minced fine)  
 $\frac{1}{2}$  lb. Budget Pack Blue Rose rice (steamed and drained)

After the ducks are dressed, wash them inside and out. Make a dressing by mixing the prunes, the celery, the onion, the rice, the bacon, salt, pepper, and the Gravy Master. Fill the cavity of the ducks and sew the incision. Put duck on a rack in a roasting pan. Put to roast in oven at 325 degrees for 15 minutes to the pound. As soon as the fat liquid in the pan begins to show, baste with the apple juice until the ducks are done.

### Recipe for the Gravy

$\frac{1}{4}$  cup fat duck drippings  
 $\frac{1}{4}$  cup flour  
 $\frac{1}{2}$  tsp. salt  
 1 cup of the apple juice free from the fat from the pan  
 Put a thick sauce pan on the stove. Add the fat, the flour, the salt, and the pepper. Stir until the flour gets almost brown. Then add the apple juice and the Sherry little by little. Bring to a boiling point stirring constantly. Boil until it reaches the consistency of gravy desired. Strain, and serve with ducks.

### Recipe for Three-Flavor Jack Benny Jello Supreme

3 pkgs. Jack Benny Jello, lime, lemon, and orange  
 1 jar Sigmant preserved sliced peaches  
 1 cup Budget Pack chopped mixed nuts  
 2 bananas, large size  
 1 bottle maraschino cherries  
 1 pint whipping cream

Pour  $1\frac{3}{4}$  cups of hot water (120 degrees) over the contents of the lime flavored Jack Benny Jello. Stir until completely dissolved, and pour into a large ring mold. Then open the bottle of maraschino cherries, drain them. Place the cherries gently on the bottom of the mold to form a perfect beaded ring. Place the ring in your refrigerator until the Jello gets chilled firm. When chilled, peel the bananas, cut them in round slices  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch thick evenly. Place the sliced bananas flat around the outer edge of the mold to form another ring. Proceed with the orange flavor Jello as you did with the lime, and put to chill again in your refrigerator until firm. Then open the jar of peaches, drain all the syrup and place slices of peaches around the edges (outer) of the mold, and see that each tip of half moon slice touches the other until you form another ring. Work the lemon flavor Jello the same way you did the lime and the orange. Pour gently without disturbing the design, and put to chill until firm. Cut the rest of the sliced peaches in small pieces and put them to drain in a strainer. When almost ready to serve, beat the whipping cream until nice and stiff, fold in the chopped peaches. Unmold the Jello following the direction on the package, and place the dessert in a chilled platter. Fill the cavity of the ring center with whipped cream mixture. Sprinkle the chopped nuts and serve.

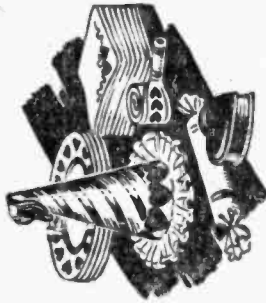

**THE CRANBERRY MERCHANT**—You have heard about the busy cranberry merchant, no doubt. You probably liken your self to one these days when holidays are coming thick and fast. Well, here is another slant on the cranberry. How about a new fruit salad. It's easy enough to make. Just arrange crisp leaves of lettuce on a chilled plate. In the center place a banana and on either side two heaping teaspoons of cranberry sauce. To finish add a garnish of mayonnaise. Oranges, pineapples, pears, or peaches may be substituted for the bananas.

Or if you really want to be different, you can use your cranberries as a drink. Cover them with water and boil until soft. Strain, and to each quart add one cup of sugar. Let it again come to a boil; add pineapple juice to taste; cool and serve.

Incidentally individual molds of cranberries make an interesting garniture for a turkey, particularly when they are placed on candied orange slices. But maybe you are the type whose cranberry sauce just won't jell. Well, for you, here is a last alternative. Save 'em until Christmas, string 'em like popcorn, and put 'em on the Christmas tree.

**PARTIES FOR PRIVATES.**—On a budget of twenty-one dollars a month Buck Private and his Girl Friend are faced with a serious date problem. Even with all the concessions being made for service men, it is difficult to stretch the pay check to cover the expense of the so-called "heavy date." We can sympathize, because we (the editorial "we") is in the Home Guard in the capacity of a mess sergeant. So let us make this suggestion to the Girl Friend. Why not a party in your own kitchen? You know, a good old-fashioned taffy pull. Remember the way to a man's heart is through his stomach, especially if it is a private's stomach. Taffy is easy to make. All you need is: 2 cups sugar, 4 cups corn syrup, 2 tbsps. vinegar, 2 tbsps. water. Cook until cold water test shows a hard ball (250 F) and add one ounce of butter. Then remove from the fire and add two teaspoonfuls of vanilla. Now roll up your sleeves and go to work, only be sure to rub a bit of butter on your hands first. The taffy is pulled until sufficiently cool. Then it is cut and left to harden.



In the meantime some of the gang can gather around the fireplace and pop corn or toast marshmallows. And be sure you have a few big bowls of those wonderfully juicy apples placed at strategic points. Then serve Sigmant's Apple Juice, or hot chocolate if you prefer; finish off with the latest boogie woogie records and you have a party fit for a king, or at least for the royalty of the Boy Friend's Brigade.

**PLUM PUDDING TIME.**—If you are planning on plum pudding for Christmas, now is the time to make it. A Christmas pudding of this type should be allowed to sit for at least five or six weeks before the holiday. Like wine, the longer it ages the better it is. ### Recipe for Pork Loin Ends with Cabbage, Farmer Style

1 head of cabbage, 4 lbs.  
2 lbs. pork loin ends  
1 onion  
1 clove garlic  
2 tps. gravy Master  
Salt and pepper  
4 slices Wilsons' Or' Fashioned bacon

Cut a 4 lb. head of cabbage in 4 parts, and cut out the tough center part. Put the cabbage in plenty of water and wash. When the cabbage is well washed, put in a strainer. Then chop 1 onion, 1 clove of garlic, and 4 slices of Wilsons' Or' Fashioned Bacon. Cut up also the 2 lbs. of pork loin ends into 2-in. pieces. 2 lbs. lamb shoulder

First wipe 2 lbs. of shoulder of lamb with a damp cloth. Then cut the lamb into small pieces. Now cover with boiling water and let simmer while covered for 2 hours. After that repeat the operation until there is nothing left of the bread crumbs. Next fry the oysters in deep hot oil until golden and brown. This can be done in about 3 minutes. Now serve with baked potato and shredded cabbage salad.

nero, gambling czar, stood belligerently on his Rex, anchored three miles out at sea, and defied anyone to approach nearer than 250 yards, he was prime material for a special events broadcast. Struggling to lift six storage batteries, the radio trio loaded its equipment on a water taxi and cut a straight swath to within 250 yards of the boat. Then they saw Cornero's men gripping fire-nozzles and aiming guns.

It required hectic persuasion for Clete and company to assure Tony that they had come out to give him a microphone break—an opportunity to tell his side of the story. They had arranged this precaution, however: to cut a recording of Cornero's remarks, rather than put them on the air "live."

Hard-to-convince Tony finally seemed satisfied the men were straight shooters. Gingerly he accepted the microphone as it was hoisted aboard with a fish line, then he vanished below deck while 300 feet of cord unreeled and snaked behind. Warming to his possibilities, Tony talked for 45 minutes, disregarded orders to stop, halted only after he had accused every official in the state. But the three records he filled withstood libel scrutiny of attorneys for both radio station and Cornero and were air-released immediately.
