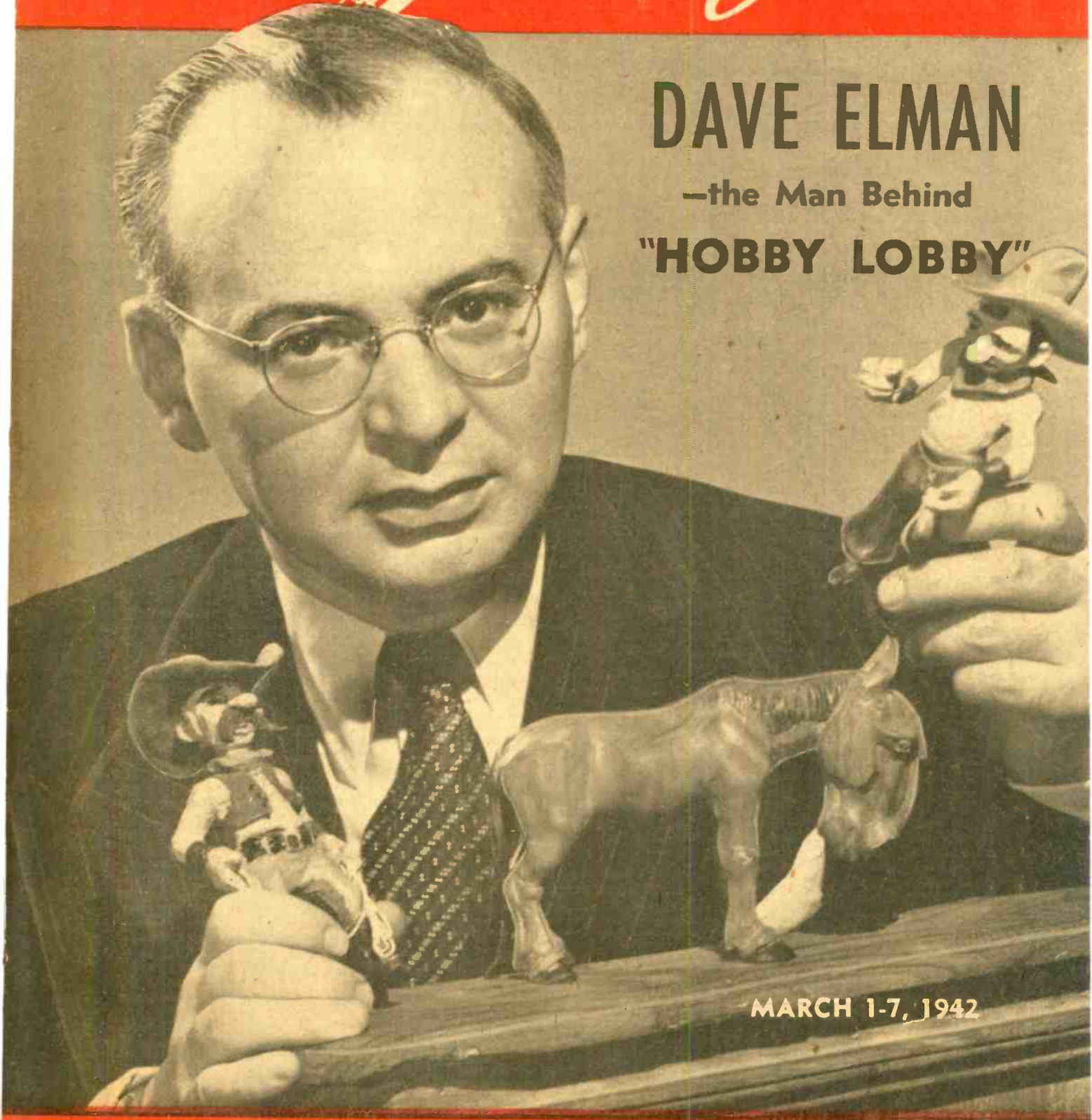

# COMING OUT OF the ETHER

One of the most popular programs of the recent season has just gone off the air. It was not a sponsored program, it sold nothing, and was designed for a very limited audience in the first place.

This program usually lasted on an average of three minutes; no more. Yet during the few months it was on the air, it had one of the largest listening audiences of anything I know of. I am speaking of the frost warnings, presented at 8 P. M. each night over KFI, by Floyd D. Young. The warnings had been on various radio stations for the past fifteen years, but they seem to have enjoyed greater popularity this year than ever before.

I was greatly surprised to discover that the public at large accepted this radio service to the citrus industry as a matter of course. I know for a fact that only four people officially complained that their personal listening pleasure was interrupted. On the other hand, thousands of citrus growers, representing a multi-million dollar industry, showered KFI with praise for the free service.

On at least three occasions this winter, broadcast of the frost warnings saved the citrus industry a lot of money. This is the fine type of public service that radio is able and willing to render. My name is hereby added to the long list of those who commend this station for its public service activities.

**MUSIC DEPARTMENT:** "Somewhere, Sometime, I'll Come Back To You" is the title of a new song by George Duning and Bill Hampton. The catchy air has already captured the boys in the service and I wouldn't be surprised to find it at the top of the Hit Parade in the near future. ### Oboler Tags Stewart

Lieut. James (Jimmy) Stewart, who never had much time to do radio acting before he joined the U. S. Army Air Corps, adds another microphone appearance to his fast-growing list next week when he stars in Arch Oboler's "Plays For Americans" series from Hollywood's Radio City Sunday, March 15.

Such was the exclusive news learned by Radio Life this week and confirmed by high-ranking officials of the U. S. Army Air Corps stationed at Moffett Field, Calif.

Oboler, radio's ingenious triple-threat (he writes, directs and produces his own plays), wrote the Stewart-starring vehicle around the Army Air Corps some time ago with the lanky Pennsylvanian in mind for the role. Titled "Letter at Midnight" the Oboler play is an enlargement of the five-minute dramatic spot presented by Arch on his March of the Dimes of the Air broadcast last month.

Lieut. Stewart, now a full-fledged radio personality what with impressive performances on the Bill of Rights broadcast and the Edgar Bergen-Charlie McCarthy show behind him, will fly to Hollywood from his base at Moffett Field to handle the Oboler role.

"Letter at Midnight" is the sixth in the current Oboler-created "Plays For Americans" which are broadcast Sundays at 1:30 p. m. over KFI-NBC airplanes.

### Jimmie's Last Laugh

Jimmie Fidler, known along the radio rialto as "the man with a ready-made listening audience," returns to the microphone March 2 with a new sponsor (Arrid) and a new series of quarter-hour chatter programs highlighting Hollywood.

Always willing to call a spade a spade, Columnist Fidler has been the target for repeated attacks by those in and out of the industry. The controversies waged over his comments on the air and in print have apparently done nothing but increase his popularity.

In an interview early this week, Fidler told Radio Life that the only new feature of his program will be a letter each week from one of Hollywood stars in the service. These letters, written to Jimmie from the Jimmy Stewarts, Douglas Fairbankses, Robert Montgomerys, etc., will be read by the commentator on a special service spot each week. According to Jimmie, he will retain his now-famous "I DO mean you" trade-mark, the

### A Network Debut

Every spare moment "Scotty," as he is known to fellow-workers, has been composing tunes ("John Scotter Trot") and polishing his ambition to be a network conductor someday.

On Feb. 21 last, young Nathan Scott made his debut as a network orchestra conductor by arranging and conducting the Serenade for Sophisticates over a coast to coast Blue Network.

Scott's debut with a network baton is part of the Blue Network's campaign for refreshing new touches on its program schedule.

As we go to press a half-hour transcription of a dramatic comedy show titled "Lucky Penny" in which Jane plays a female Henry Aldrich is winging its way eastward for presentation to a prospective sponsor interested in Miss Jane's terrific fan following.

Radio Life sat in on the audition broadcast Feb. 19 and came away very much impressed. Produced by National Concert & Artists Corp. of Hollywood "Lucky Penny" stars Jane Withers as a typical young American high school co-ed. The play is authored by Paul Conlon, writer of the Horace Heidt Treasure Chest, with music by Charles Dant's NBC ork. Supporting the 16-year-old Atlanta, Ga. product are such well-known juveniles as Bobbie Mauch of the Mauch twins, Charlie Smith and Jean Howlett. Author Conlon's entertaining, briskly-paced story format provides the energetic Miss Withers with an excellent vocal as well as dramatic exercise, and the auburn-tressed Jane "showed" a swell set of pipes in a

Gargan, one of the few Hollywood movie actors who has a knowledge of the radio business from control room to audience reaction, handled his role with authority and plenty of enthusiasm that registers over the microphone.

Edmund Lowe, the original Sergt. Quirt, and Gargan mixed well under the production reins of Mel Williamson, who was brought out from the east to supervise the series when Wings cigarets took over the sponsorship.

Gargan is not new to radio listeners, having played Joe Turp in the Ethel and Joe Turp series on Maxwell House Coffee Time last year. He will bicycle from the Shirley Temple "Annie Rooney" studio set (he plays Shirley's father) and Radio City.

The current "comeback" radio effort by Donald Novis, once acclaimed as the greatest tenor of them all, is getting a lot of attention from the listening public and industry alike.

When the silver-tongued tenor who became the toast of millions a few years back returned to local airwaves two weeks ago via a 15-minute song recital over KFI's Radio City studios there was much conjecture in the trade as to whether a radio star of yesterday could excite the public after a two-year absence.

Well, Don appears to have answered the doubting Thomases. Or at least his fans have supplied the answer—and it's favorable, too. The flood of letters pouring in daily complimenting the station for bringing Novis back to the air would indicate that the onetime Whittier College singer has an excellent chance to regain some of his lost laurels.

The faith of listeners in Novis this week appeared to be reflected in the attitude of NBC program officials who, after hearing the first few Novis quarter-hours, decided to switch his weekly sustaining spot from Saturdays at 10:15 p. m. to Mondays at 4:30 p. m. as well as handing the English-born singer a weekly guest spot on the "It Happened in the Service" program over KFI at 4 p. m. Saturdays.

**Royal Family Signs**

Report (Radio Life, Feb. 15) that deal was pending for Diana and Lionel Barrymore to join John on the Rudy Vallee NBC Comedy Musical was confirmed this week by the sponsors. The three members of the Royal Family will bicker in typical Barrymore fashion in a one-time appearance March 5, and if shows jells there is a good chance that the combination will do a series of original sketches on the show together. It marks the first time the trio has ever appeared together professionally.

## Lucille Makes Good

The filmagnates at RKO studios, realizing the enhancement a picture personality gets from consistent radio appearances, this week rejoiced over the fact that one of their most valuable properties had "made the grade" on the ether.

She was Lucille Ball, and the Blue Network revealed that the guest airings of Miss Ball's work as a comedienne on the New Old Gold show received such favorable reaction that she has been signed for nine straight appearances on the program, taking her through May 1.

Herbert Marshall's show appears now to have a smooth combination what with Funsters Wheeler and Ladd and the Merry Macs doing their regular spots on the program. **KECA, 8 p.m. Fri.**

## Legion Bouts Aired

Sport fans who for years have been clamoring for a big-time radio coverage of the fights at the Hollywood Legion stadium have finally won their point.

Beginning Feb. 27 the Adam Hat people will sponsor a series of Friday night bouts from the ring in the radio capital, with Buddy Twiss describing the blow-by-blow routine from ringside over the coast Blue Network.

## Ticket Request Flood

Agencies representing sponsored radio programs had the truth of Radio Life's far-reaching, vigorous audience brought home to them several weeks ago (Radio Life, Feb. 8) when this publication printed a guide to free broadcast tickets.

As a result of Radio Life's free ticket guide agency offices and broadcasting studios have been flooded with requests. In fact, demands by the public have been so heavy that in many cases additional people have been needed to handle the requests.

Radio Life's face is red for the reason that we did not make it clear that many of the shows have lengthy waiting lists and have been unable to comply with requests made as long as several months ago. However, patience will be rewarded, and your tickets may arrive in the mail any year now.

## Guidance for America

ST. LOUIS, Feb. 27.—The Bible promise is the one sustaining guidance of the American people through the dark hours of emergency, Dr. Walter A. Maier of Concordia Seminary said today in his coast-to-coast Lutheran Hour broadcast.

Blind trust in human agencies is repeatedly betrayed, Dr. Maier continued, by the inability or failure of those agencies to meet the real needs of the masses. ## Heard on RADIO LIFE'S Short Wave LISTENING POST

That "coming events cast their shadows before" is both grim truth and prophecy as well, in view of present British debacle in the southwest Pacific. Just twelve months ago in **RADIO LIFE** for March 9th, 1941 the following appeared in the column, then titled "World on Your Dial"—**QUOTING "Radio Tokyo"** in a News Broadcast over **JZI** on February 28, 1941: "Japan's mediatorial efforts on behalf of Thailand and French Indo-China are being seized upon by the British to create a 'grave crisis' in the Far East. Actually, continuance of such propaganda **WILL CREATE** an actual 'powder keg' in East Asia which Britain herself will touch off."

Further in this newscast: "Disgraceful conduct of Australian soldiers in cafes and amusement places in **Batavia**, **Dutch East Indies**, incensed both the press and public of **Java**. Wilful destruction of property by the Australian soldiers has raised serious doubts in the minds of government officials of the **Netherlands East Indies** as to the sincerity of British 'good intentions' in East Asia. It is understood formal apologies have been tendered the Dutch authorities by British consular representatives in **Java**." Continuing—"concentrations of Australian troops on the borders of **Thailand**, and the presence of Chinese troops of the **Chiang Kai Shek** regime in **British Burma** constitute a menace to peace in the Far East."

British declaration of war on **Japan**, (true to prediction), touched off the "powder keg" and today Britain's once "impregnable" (?) **Singapore** naval base is in Japanese hands and **British Burma** will soon be in their possession. **Hong Kong** is already gone and **Australia** faces a "last ditch fight" against the **Rising Sun Empire** without even daring to hope for **British** aid.

Consistently, day after day, "**Lon-**

**O**H, BROTHER! Am I dizzy from looking at brothers, talking with brothers, photographing brothers and trying to fit together the brothers who parade under different names on the radio networks!

I've heard a lot about sister acts, but until now yours truly never realized how the brother act operated . . . let alone how many sets of brothers are battling for fame and fortune on the airlines.

Some work together, some battle each other for honors in the same radio field; some look alike and some wouldn't be tagged as resembling brothers if they were the last two people on earth; some come in twos, some in threes and some in quartets.

Jumble them all together and you can field a pretty potent All-American radio team. And for sheer versatility—well, there isn't a group anywhere which can boast more diversified talent than these brother combinations.

Probably the best known brothers in the radio world are the Crosbys from up Tacoma, Wash., way. Bing, the No. 1 popular singer of all time, and Bob Crosby, Bing's kid brother who has blossomed forth into big wage earner in recent years with his Dixieland Band and his first big network commercial, Three Ring Time, on KECA and the Blue Network. Although not the success on records and in the films that Bing is, Bob is probably earning more money at his age than Brother Bing did at 29 summers.

Then of course, there's Everett and Larry Crosby, two of Bing's older brothers who manage Bing's many and varied enterprises such as the Del Mar race track and other projects in which the Great Groaner is interested financially. All of which wins the freres Crosby our nomination as the most influential brother combine in radio.

The Parade of the brothers:

The Nileses. Ken and Wen Niles are the only brothers announcing top network broadcasts. Ken handles the mike on the Bob Burns show for Campbell Soup on KNX-CBS. Wen, Ken's younger brother who once paraded under the alias Ronald Drake in order not to capitalize on his brother's success when he first came to Hollywood from Seattle, is the exclusive mike-

man on Al Pearce's NBC-KFI series. Both boys are graduates of University of Montana.

The Dorseys. Tommy, the Sentimental Gentleman of Swing, and saxophone-playing Jimmy are rated among the first five money-makers in the radio orchestra sphere. Tommy, bespectacled trombonist extraordinary, has just finished a sensational engagement at Hollywood's Palladium ballroom with a Blue Network wire and is now being wooed by sponsors of Eddie Cantor's show to replace Edgar Fairchild in the musical spot. The brothers Dorsey once operated their own orchestra under the name, Dorsey Brothers.

George and Willie Burns. Willie, seldom-publicized brother of George Burns of the famous comedy team of Burns and Allen, is George's right arm. A writer on the Swan broadcasts over NBC, Willie also acts as George's personal manager as well as production supervisor for the show. Away from the studio George and Willie are the best of pals and inveterate golfers.

The Barrymores. John, he of the great profile and unique flair for comedy on the Rudy Vallee NBC program, and Lionel Barrymore, his older brother, are a rare combination. Although John is always clowning and Lionel's reputation is built on serious drama the latter has in recent months given brother John quite a race for laugh-getting honors on the ether. Lionel is much in demand for guest shots on big network shows, while John confines his radio activities exclusively to the Vallee show.

The Nesbitts. Norman, for the past four years familiar to southland KHJ audiences as the voice of the Broadway News, is older than John whose unique historic program, "The Passing Parade," has a large fan following on radio and film. John, who was the first Nesbitt to gain prominence on the air when he debuted his "Passing Parade" programs from San Francisco several years ago, once approached Norman about the latter changing his last name to avoid confusion on the air, but Norman never consented.

The Brenemans. Tom, one of radio's greatest ad-lib artists and master of ceremonies on four of the West Coast's most popular programs—Breakfast at

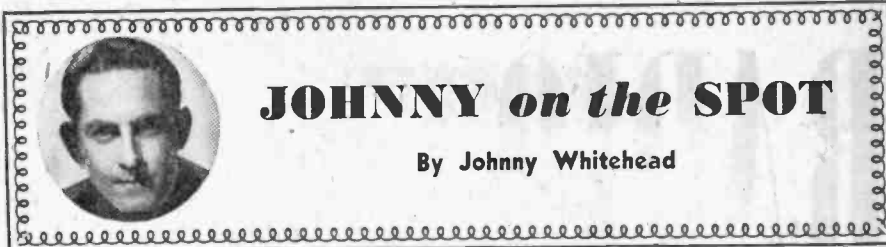

## JOHNNY on the SPOT

● After church services on the Sabbath in H'wood all roads lead to Radio City. It's the vogue, if you're one of the fortunates able to annex a ducat or two for a radio show, to join the throngs at Sunset & Vine for a gander at the stars. Some make the trek to Radio City just for a free gawk at their favorite actor or actress and the long-shot chance that somebody may have an extra pasteboard not in use. From noon 'til midnite the north-east corner of Sunset & Vine is charged with high-voltage names appearing in front of microphones in a dozen different studios for upwards of 3,000 fans who come from Covina to Coronado to see the "greatest show on earth."

● Most of the excitement this particular Sabbath centers around Walter Winchell who is in Hollywood for one of his rare mike appearances on the West Coast. In a small studio we are one of 25 people allowed to watch the greying, dynamic Winchell in action as he broadcasts to "Mr. and Mrs. North America and all the ships at sea!" It is approximately 5:47 as we sit down, and this is the scene our eyes and ears photograph: Winchell sits at a table in the middle of the studio (see page 6) wearing a felt hat (never broadcasts without a hat on his head). At his right is a telegraph key which he operates during the broadcast. At his left is a pitcher of ice water, and he pours himself a paper cup-full of water every few minutes until air-time. He rubs his hands nervously as the studio clock shows five minutes to go. While the producers and monitor men are setting up the mikes for the announcer and the guest artist of the day, Maureen O'Hara, who sits in the front row of seats reading her commercial about "soft, romantic hands," Winchell addresses informal remarks to the informal group in the studio. Looking up from his script he says: "I wish the news were happier today." And everyone is reminded of the early morning headlines which report the fall of Singapore. Photographers enter the studio and Walter turns to them and smilingly asks, "please don't shoot any flashes during the broadcast, you may have all you want afterwards." The producer booms out over the monitor booth microphone that he would like Walter to read a few lines in order to get a "voice level." Winchell grabs a page of copy with a London dateline, marking a line with his pencil in the left hand which says: "Singapore couldn't have possibly been saved after the water supply had been cut off by the enemy." He repeats the line on the mike and the producer shouts his approval. Winchell glances at the clock with 20 seconds to go, loosens his collar, has a last sip of water and goes on the air. That's "America's One Man Newspaper" in action before his broadcast.

● If we had any Winchell orchids they'd be tossed at: Woody Herman for his "Blues in the Night" arrangement which made him last week's Spotlight Band. . . . Ginny Simms for her soloing of "I Don't Want to Walk Without You." . . . Joe Twerp, the Hi Neighbor scripiter, for his tingle-tangled-tongued character on the Al Pearce show last Thursday. . . . Carolyn Lee, guest on the Benny shows, for her well-read lines on the ether. . . . Rochester for his ability to give every bit of dialogue the right "timing." . . . Arch Oboler for his patriotism. . . . The Times' Marion Lorraine for her Rotogravure fashion layouts of radio personalities. . . . Red Skelton for taking the time to give the studio audience a 30-minute impromptu show after each broadcast. . . . Biltmore Bowl's Joe Faber for his smart showmanship in keeping Phil Harris, the people's choice, on his bandstand.

● Breezy Briefs: Watch for an exclusive story on Donald Novis in an early issue of Radio Life. . . . One of the nation's outstanding young dance teams, the Burton Twins, lure most of radio row to the H'wood Tropics these nights. . . . Skinnay Ennis, Ray Noble, Bob Hope, the Merry Macs, Paul Whiteman, Johnny Mercer and yours truly were on hand to welcome Claude (Snowfall) Thornhill's great rhythm crew to the H'wood Palladium Tuesday. . . . Al Donahue's opening at the Trianon also drew a brilliant list of stars. . . . Our guess is that Don Bestor, one-time ork leader on the Benny show, will have his case against Young & Rubicam (sponsor's agency) for the rights to the familiar J E-L-L-O musical signature tossed out of court. Bestor is suing Benny, NBC and General Foods for misappropriation of the Jell-O musical signature. Bestor claims that he created the sing-song signature while orchestra leader on the Benny airshow in 1934 and is asking \$50,000 damages. . . . Tommy Dorsey's new recording contract with M-G-M which is going to manufacture records in competition with Victor, Decca, etc., calls for a flat fee of \$2,500 for every platter Dorsey waxes plus royalties—all of which will net him around about a 100 grand per year.

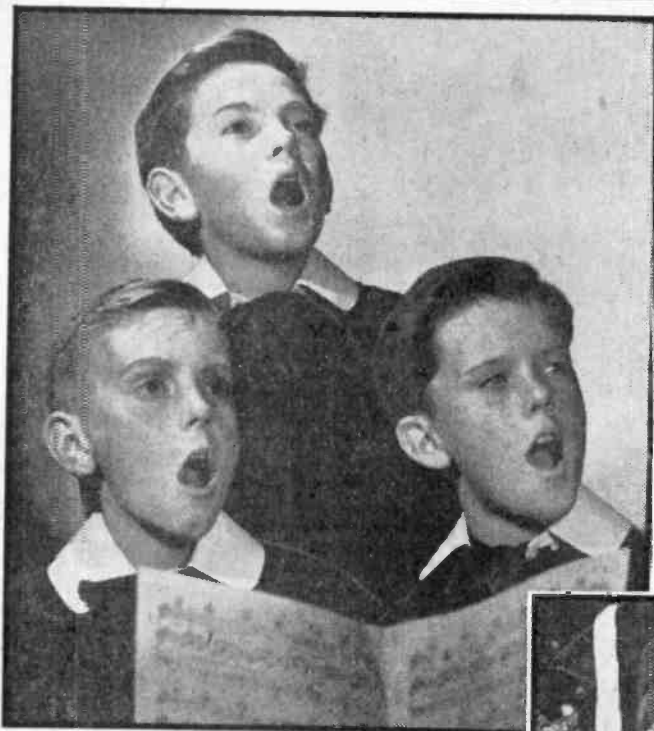

**L**IKE the all-enveloping onrush of an impenetrable fog is the quick, deep silence gripping the choir room. Twenty boisterous boys squirm to erect positions in their chairs, discard their noisy sentences in mid-air, and rivet their intelligent eyes on Director Robert Mitchell. As his sensitive hands give the signal, the Boychoir starts to sing softly, understandingly. Each upturned face assumes a soulful expression, from each throat comes divine music. And lo! On wings of song flit all one's opprobrious opinions about little boys. They aren't mischievous, they aren't naughty or rowdy. They are seraphs!

That is, they are when they are singing. Actually, these 20 boys are just normal, energy-packed youngsters from eight to 14 years old, with good voices and native musical ability. Busy in school, motion pictures, radio, and concert appearances, they reserve small fry's prerogative of raising Cain.

Six weeks ago, the Boychoir was invited to sing the dedicatory mass in Camp Haan chapel. The boys spent Saturday night in camp, worked up an early morning appetite by riding in a jeep, and with carte blanche for breakfast, demolished five eggs apiece. No prima donna would have risked singing after such a meal, but it didn't faze the boys.

At 10:50 a. m., they piled into a bus and waved good-bye to the soldiers; at high noon they were back in Los Angeles singing mass over KMTR—and what a mass! Time for lunch

and a little play and 2 p. m. found them singing for the KHJ-Mutual transcontinental broadcast of "Nobody's Children"; at 8 p. m. they appeared at a Job's Daughters' benefit.

On the way back to the choirhouse, one of the older boys tripped. He turned on a small lad: "Hey! You did that on purpose. See my white pants? You made me get 'em all dirty!" Words and fisticuffs ensued. The accuser emerged as loser of the battle, splotches of blood making a real mess of his pants. "Then," report the onlooking boys who relished the fight, "Mr. Mitchell gave the big fellow hail-columbia!" And so to bed.

In a house which he is buying and whose interior, for obvious reasons, is denuded of furbelows, Director Robert Mitchell rehearses his Boychoir three hours daily. Two teachers sup-

ervise regular school classes. The group comprises eight nationalities and is non-sectarian. Sixty per cent of the boys are Catholic. Bob Mitchell is not, but as musical director for St. Brendan's Church, he has arranged for his Boychoir to sing mass each Sunday, both in service and on the air.

Each youngster draws \$16.50 a day for picture work and \$20 apiece for a transcontinental radio broadcast. Allan, one of the older and thriftier lads, has saved \$360 in two years. It's easy to see why parents are eager to have their sons accepted for choir membership.

But money isn't the only reason. A boy working in Robert Mitchell's group learns to sing in seven languages—anything from swing to Gregorian chants—with a repertoire of 150

don-Calling!" thru GSC and GSW has the same monotonous report on Burma—"our forces are withdrawing to a new defense line." In Hong Kong, Malaya, and Singapore it was the same old story, and now it's Burma—Exhibit No. 4 in the series, "BUNGLES for Britain."

This week, fall of Singapore was the occasion for nation-wide celebration by 100 million Japanese. In Tokyo a thunderous chorus of shouts of Banzai! went up for His Imperial Majesty the Emperor. (Incidentally it is a crime punishable by death for any citizen to refer to the Emperor by his name, Hirohito.)

For enlightenment of reader-listeners who may not understand the meaning of Japan's term, "New East Asia co-prosperity sphere" be advised that it is the plan whereby Japan justifies her policy of "protective occupation" of country after country in the Far East. They liken their "co-prosperity sphere" to the Monroe Doctrine of the United States for Latin America. They claim in effect its plan and purpose are the same—"Asia for the Asiatics" as ours is "America for the Americans."

This week, Britain, in loss of Singapore, receives a shattering blow to her pride and a grievous wounding of her prestige as she appears woefully weak on land, sea, and in the air. Singapore is no more, being re-named Shosan or "isle of sunshine" by the Nipponese conquerors. Sixty thousand prisoners, chiefly Australian and Indian troops, fall into hands of Japanese. "Radio Tokyo" JZJ 11.8 Mc. pays tribute to "great bravery and heroism of Australians, who fought valiantly until their ammunition was exhausted. They had but little rest in six weeks." Claim "more than fifty percent of Australian forces were in Malaya, which means Australia is left practically defenseless."

Regarding conditions in Shosan (Singapore), "Radio Tokyo" states: "Complete order has been restored in Shosan, business is being conducted under normal conditions, and Shosan harbor and naval base will show no trace of a siege in a few days. Powerful units of the Imperial Japanese Navy are already anchored in the harbor, while Japanese planes maintain undisputed control of the air." Reference to United States at a minimum this week from "Radio Tokyo," Great Britain being given the benefit of "special consideration."

### FEASTING AND FASTING:

The feasting we've already had. That came on Shrove Tuesday, or Mardi Gras, as the people of New Orleans call it. Mardi Gras translated means "fat Tuesday" and refers to the French custom of leading a fat ox through the streets during the festival parade. The feasting of the day ends with a ball, which lasts until midnight, when Ash Wednesday begins and festivities must end.

And now the fasting begins. That means less eating during the ensuing forty days. Although the idea of religious fasts is generally thought to be of a Christian origin, we find that the savage has provided it with a primitive background. For example, when a crisis was at hand, fasting was the means of magic persuasion; the savage fasted to avoid danger to himself. The early Christians took up the idea and referred to fasting as "a means to prevent evil spirits entering the body."

### EX-PRODUCTS OF A COW:

The "cow with the crinkly horn" would be much surprised to discover that she has just provided the world with another new product—dried skim milk. She would probably be even more surprised to discover that this is an excellent and economical source of calcium, phosphorus, and riboflavin, (Vitamin G), as well as protein of high nutritive value and large quantities of Vitamin B1. All this will soon be seen on market shelves in neat little cellophane packages.

Now for the uses of dried skim milk: It can be added to the dry ingredients when making breads, cakes, cookies, soups, gravies and other foods. It also has another advantage. Incidentally, Dant y Flew is the old Welsh name for "dent de lion," which in turn is French for tooth of a lion, a good description for the sharply notched leaves of the dandelion!

#### Recipe for Saddle of Lamb International

Put Saddle of Lamb in a roasting pan with 1 carrot, 1 onion cut in 4 parts, 1 stalk of celery, a few pepper berries, and some parsley in branches. Season the saddle with salt and pepper, and be sure to rub in well. Pour 1 cup Sherry Wine on the bottom of the roasting pan. Spread some butter over the top, and put to roast in oven, baste constantly so it will not dry. Let roast for one hour at 350 degrees F., or until the lamb is tender, depending on the age of the lamb. When the saddle is done take out from the pan, remove the fat, and add to the gravy 3 tbsps. of flour and 2 cups of stock, or hot water. Season with salt and pepper and cook for 5 minutes stirring constantly. Strain and serve with lamb. Garnish with peas and mashed potatoes.

#### Recipe for Pork Spareribs Stew with New Potatoes and Cabbage a la Montanara

- 2 lbs. Pork Spareribs
- 1 lb. New Potatoes
- 1 small head Cabbage
- 1 Onion, 1 Clove Garlic, 1 Sprig of Parsley
- 8 tbsps. Oil

Cut 2 lbs. of Pork Spareribs into 3 inch pieces. Chop 1 onion, 1 clove of garlic and 1 sprig of parsley. Then chop 1 small head of cabbage, about 2 pounds. Put 8 tbsps. of oil in a pan and braze the pork spareribs until they are brown on all sides. After that take out the spareribs and then braze in the oil the onion, garlic and parsley until nice and golden in color. Then add the spareribs and top them with the cabbage and cover, and let simmer until cabbage is almost done. Then uncover the pot and add 1 lb. of new potatoes, peeled, washed and diced, season with 2 tsps. of salt and ½ tsp. of pepper, and then cover pot and let simmer until potatoes are done.

numbers. The Boychoir has sung on more than 57 coast-to-coast broadcasts, on such shows as "Dr. Christian," "I'm An American," Screen Guild, and Al Pearce. In addition to the musical assignment on "Nobody's Children," the boys are currently providing the beautiful melodies on the new Mutual program, "In His Steps."

Each choir-boy possesses a vestment, two sets of school clothes, his Boy Scout or Cub uniform, and a dress outfit of white pants and royal blue sweaters. The sweaters were a gift from Penny Singleton after the boys worked with her in "Blondie in Society." Each boy's garments are numbered to correspond to a designated hanger. But at this point the system breaks down.

Mr. Mitchell walks into the wardrobe room to accost Bobby, who has left his garb right where he stepped out of it and blithely turned his attention elsewhere.

"See here, do you do that at home?" demands Director Bob.

"No, sir," comes the reply from a hanging head. "I'm sorry."

This scene is enacted about 20 times a week per boy; until Mitchell laments, "I need four wardrobe mistresses." Willing mothers rush to his aid and also assist in packing daily lunches for the bunch. Sometimes an emergency arises when the children must be fed at the choirhouse. The lads make short work of four dozen hot dogs, 25 quarts of chocolate milk, three dozen bananas, and four boxes of graham crackers.

For benefit appearances the group is most generous with its time and talent. The youngsters never say "Aw—nuts!" to a charitable request. Then rehearsal was called. Music that was "out of this world" wafted from the choir room. With etheric tones and angelic expression on his face, Charles soloed into the "Ave Maria."

# HE'S AMERICA'S NUMBER ONE

## *Hobbyist*

(Editor's Note: Last week Radio Life announced provisions of its Hobby Lobby contest, whose winner will enjoy a free trip to New York and an appearance on Dave Elman's Hobby Lobby show April 25. The following article was written to give Radio Life readers ideas about hobbies which have been demonstrated on the show and to encourage you people with "different" pastimes to jump into the competition).

**D**AVE ELMAN'S hobby is collecting hobbyists.

Each week he wades through approximately 3,000 letters from people setting forth their avocations. Out of this staggering correspondence, Elman selects the five most unusual hobbyists to appear on his Saturday night CBS-KNX show, Hobby Lobby. For instance:

Here's a man named Carl Sea-

gren, who lives in Brooklyn and bakes cakes which play tunes. He made one for Lily Pons which tinkled the "Bell Song" from "Lakme." When the King and Queen of England visited the United States, Mr. Seagren concocted 100 cakes which played "God Save the King." His unique hobby merited the musical cake-baker an opportunity to appear on Hobby Lobby.

Then along comes F. B. Riggs of Cambridge, Mass. He is six foot seven and is invited to tell about the survey he made for tall men. His hobby is to help string beans from being self-conscious.

John H. Furbay of Mills College rates a summons from Elman because his hobby is being a "debunker." He tells the radio audience how he has disproved generally-accepted historical lore.

In a constant procession they come—folks who do something different;

a man, 78 years old, makes keeping young his hobby—he looks like 48; a girl plays the violin with gloves on her hands; a daring fellow pops hot coals in his mouth and proceeds to cook bacon on them; another can spell, write, or talk backwards; still another "milks" snakes with his bare hands, or plays tunes by squeezing his palms together, or paints pictures under water, or sings operatic arias to advertise his "hot dog" wares, or collects black widow spiders.

One of the most spectacular demonstrations to be staged on Hobby Lobby was presented last October by Howard Klein, printer by vocation and hypnotist by avocation. Elman was a bit skeptical about Klein's promise that within three minutes he could hypnotize at least 70 per cent of the listeners, provided they didn't fight the spell. Disconcerted over thoughts of a sleeping America, Elman turned Klein down. So Klein did the next best thing—he offered to hypnotize 14 people in one studio while he was in a sound-proofed studio four floors away from his subjects.

New York radio editors attended the
