We Meet a Hero

Radio Life's editorial office in the Hollywood sector was the scene the other day of some real action... action generated in calm, quietly-spoken wordage by Lieut. Comdr. Weldon O. Hamilton, leader of a 15-man U. S. Navy air squadron, which last May 8th sank the new 23,000 ton Jap aircraft carrier Ryokaku in the battle of the Coral Sea.

Back for a breathing spell from the historic encounter in which the U. S. S. Lexington was lost while the Japs were being administered their worst defeat of the war, Commander Hamilton drew rough sketches of the Coral Sea battle on the walls of the Radio Life office as NBC's cameraman shot the picture you see on page 5.

The Navy flying commander who personally sighted the Jap carrier and sunk same with a 1000-pound bomb that split the pride of Hirohito's fleet in two was brought to the Radio Life office by Hank McCune, the enthusiastic impresario of It Happened in the Service who was interviewing Lieut. Comdr. Hamilton for his airshow. With them was a blond, handsome young flying officer from the same Navy air squadron, Lieut. R. B. Buchan.

Most of the details of the battle of the Coral Sea have been reported in the daily newspapers—the most noteworthy account being carried daily in The Times under the byline of Stanley Johnston, only correspondent aboard the Lexington when the carrier blew up and sank en route to Australia from the battle scene.

Lieut. Comdr. Hamilton, a modest man of medium size with fine features and a warm, friendly personality, told us how Reporter Johnston had refused to leave the Lexington when a U. S. destroyer came alongside to take off the men when it was decided to abandon the carrier. "That fellow absolutely refused to leave the ship until final orders were given for the men to slide down the ropes into the sea," declared the commander. "He was going to experience the same things the last men to leave the carrier were going to experience, no matter how great the danger. And he got a great story as the result."

Commander Hamilton declared that Johnston, although he has refrained from mentioning it in his articles, was responsible for saving the lives of many men trapped in the hold of

the Lexington. "Many of the men below were badly burned," said the soft-spoken flying ace, "and every time Johnston would go below to gather together his effects he would come back up carrying explosive-ridden seamen. He was a real sailor!"

Voice of the People

To listen to Manchester Boddy, the hard-hitting editor-publisher of the Los Angeles News, talk about the rubber salvage campaign via the NBC airwaves or in person is invigorating and enlightening to say the least.

Radio Life's editor, on the prowl for some "inside" facts and figures regarding the part radio is playing in the current rubber salvage drive, dropped into the Radio City news room one night last week to chat with Mr. Boddy.

These are first-hand impressions gained by your reporter after interviewing the man who is devoting his time and efforts to a three-week air series based on "Rubber and How It Affects You."

Although his broadcasts have been and are under the sponsorship of the National Rubber Salvage Drive, Boddy is really "the voice of the people." (This is Radio Life's phrase, not the publisher-commentator's). It was Boddy who first advocated that the people demand a chance to produce enough old rubber to keep the automobiles rolling instead of being forced into a rationing plan as advocated by some men in Washington.

The rubber salvage drive, which was ordered by the President, is giving every citizen an opportunity to show the way democracy works when the chips are down. It is giving the man in the street, the butcher, the baker—all of us—a chance to voice an opinion in a vital matter that concerns the war as well as the preservation of private transportation.

Boddy is not only voicing the sentiments of the citizenry by airing the public's views on the rubber situation and a nightly tabulation of the already-amazing results in rubber salvage drive up and down the West Coast, but more important he is "advising" the people how they can lick what only yesterday seemed inevitable—the rationing plan.

Boddy is telling his listeners that it's up to them to reverse the usual procedure and ask the Office of Facts and Figures what it is doing to cut

down the use of non-essential rubber. Boddy pointed out last week that government offices in Los Angeles, for example, have thousands and thousands of rubber chair pads in use. He advocated that the people who are cutting down on their own use of non-essential rubber materials write and wire the Office of Facts and Figures and ask them what they are doing in Washington to aid the drive. Boddy called for "a two way passage" through which the tax payer gets a chance to ask for facts and figures from the government offices.

Boddy told Radio Life that he looks for a closer cooperation between newspapers and radio in the next few months, and declared that there is no doubt that radio, as demonstrated in the rubber salvage drive, is a medium through which many people can be reached who don't get all the news they want in newspapers.

So great has been the response to his talks on rubber via the air that he now has four secretaries handling the mail from his NBC program alone. **KFI, 10:15 p.m., Sun., Mon., Tues., Wed., Fri.**

The Swing Shift

Within the last fortnight Radio Life revealed to its readers the forthcoming swing from Mutual to NBC for one Raymond Gram Swing. When a commentator of Swing's stature shifts from one network to another there is often "a story behind the story."

In Swing's shift of allegiance—scheduled for September—Radio Life sensed an interesting story and herewith presents its "inside" report on what chain of events led up to the transfer.

It now appears that Swing, despite the weekly salary check of \$2,400 from General Cigar which sponsors him, has been unhappy for some time with the length of commercials by his cigar sponsor. He has also asked to be consulted on the phrasing of the commercial announcements, but the sponsor has never seen fit to pay much attention to Swing's thoughts in the matter.

Swing, in making his decision recently to sign with NBC, apparently was looking ahead into the future. Unlike many sponsors who still persist in "stuffing" unnecessarily long commercials down the listener's ear, Swing is reported to have decided that it would be better in the long run for him to kiss his sponsor goodbye and move into NBC in hopes of a happier association.

And anyway, Swing doesn't stand to lose much in the way of monetary reward even at the outset as NBC is guaranteeing him \$100,000 a year on a sustaining basis and a percentage if and when a sponsor is lined up. **DLBS, 7 p.m. Sun., Mon., Thurs.**

Land of the Yaak

You know John McIntire and Jeanette Nolan best for their superb acting on the CBS-KNX "Crime Doctor" series which originates in New York.

Radio Life's editor knows them best as two of Hollywood's finest contributions to big-time radio; as two fine persons who after working together

on numerous plays over KHJ airplanes in 1934 and 1935 became romantically interested in each other and finally became man and wife.

We can still hear John and Jeanette talking about the day when they would have enough worldly goods to retire to some quiet, peaceful spot far away from the glare of spotlights. They talked like that years ago when they left Hollywood to try their hand at radio's prize plums in Chicago and New York.

After encountering sensational success in the east, Jeanette and John retired six years ago. They headed for the valley of the Yaak River up in Northwestern Montana where they rebuilt an old log cabin and settled down to a rugged existence of shooting deer, bear and game; pitching hay, hauling timber and enduring temperatures which sometimes dropped to 15 degrees below zero.

They wrote west that they loved their new life.

But one day several months later another letter came west . . . and it revealed that the McIntires were packing up their belongings and heading eastward again—this time to make another stake—so that they might again return to the land of the Yaak.

And this week the postman dropped another letter in our mailbox. It read:

"It's back to our beloved Yaak River country once again. This time we think for good. And with us this trip is our baby daughter, Holly. We think she'll love it there. Best to all our radio friends." Signed, Jeanette and John McIntire.

Local Boy Wins

There is "local color" to the announcement this week that the original story script contest which has been running for the past several months under the sponsorship of the Dr. Christian CBS program has ended.

For the winner of the first prize award of \$2,000 for the outstanding original script is a home-town boy, John League Oberg of 561 N. Larchmont Ave., Los Angeles.

Oberg, whose picture appears elsewhere on this page, is a native son, born here in 1914. He works in a defense plant and writes every spare moment.

According to the young author, his life has been just one merry-go-round of rejection slips for his literary efforts up to this time.

He thinks the added confidence and prestige gained from winning the Dr. Christian award will put an end to the jinx which has shadowed his writings for the past six years.

Oberg, who was forced to forego military service recently because of his six-foot frame which carries only 117 pounds, is a graduate of Fairfax High School, class of 1931, and won the contest in competition with some of radio's top professional writers.

His script which won him a new lease on a writing career is titled "Home Is the Son," the story of a boy

who went wrong, left home, finally succeeded in the world and returned home a hero. **KXN, 8:30 p.m. Wed.**

Radio's New Role

First example on the West Coast of how radio is being employed to locate families of soldiers who have broadcast short-wave messages to their folks at home from overseas came to light last week.

Eddie Albright, popular KHJ-Mutual commentator, was singled out by the Los Angeles chapter of the Red Cross to help find the relatives of four servicemen—two serving with the A. E. F. in Australia and two being held prisoners by the Japs. All four soldiers had been allowed to broadcast messages by shortwave.

Albright located relatives of the four men in three days with special requests on his Mutual program regarding the whereabouts of the relatives to these soldiers. At the end of his third program he had lined up information which led directly to the homes of relatives.

Behind the search for relatives of these soldiers is an interesting story. The Red Cross, in cooperation with the Australian Broadcasting Commission and the Mutual Broadcasting System, is acting as a medium of communication between men of the armed forces and their families.

Under the plan the messages of the servicemen are transcribed by the Australian Broadcasting Commission at camps and bases in Australia. They are reviewed by Army censors and radioed by short-wave to the U. S. where transcriptions are recorded by the Mutual System.

The master recording of the broadcast is rushed to Red Cross headquarters in Washington where individual recordings of each serviceman's message, suitable for replaying on phonographs, are made and sent to the man's family when it has been found.

Whenever families cannot be located directly by the Red Cross an appeal is made to one of the broadcasting networks here, such as Mutual in the above case, and a program such as Eddie Albright's utilized to gain further information.

'Star Salesmen'

Every week—in Radio Life's opinion—the radio programs do a bigger and better job of "selling" the public on a cooperative effort in America's Victory effort. The government, realizing that vital messages put into the language of radio's top entertainers is the most effective way to present a problem or a plea, is now utilizing the top-ranking stars and script writers in its far-reaching radio campaign.

Typical of radio's "star salesmen" who have been "drafted" for these all-important chores are Fibber McGee, Molly and Mayor LaTrivia who last week collaborated on a message boosting the rubber salvage drive.

We reprint the portion of the Don Quinn-authored script of the McGee NBC comedy to refresh your memory if you happened to hear the show and

to acquaint you with the clever scene in the event you missed the program.

Said Mayor LaTrivia (played by Gale Gordon) to Fibber McGee and Molly, "I came over about your scrap rubber."

MOLLY: Don't worry about that, Mr. Mayor. Tomorrow McGee is going through the house with a fine-tooth comb and take all our scrap rubber over to the filling station. For instance, he has a pair of hip length fishing boots—

FIBBER: Hey! You ain't goin' to take my wading boots . . . They're practically new!

MOLLY: They leak.

FIBBER: They don't either!

MOLLY: Yes they do. I cut some rubber rings out of 'em for some fruit jars this spring. It's wonderful rubber.

FIBBER: Okay, okay . . . can't use my tires to go fishin' anyhow.

LA TRIVIA: Any kind of rubber will do, Mrs. McGee . . . old hot water bottles, tennis shoes, garden hose—if it's made of rubber and you can possibly spare it—GIVE IT. Band Discovery?

Kyser's Two-a-Day

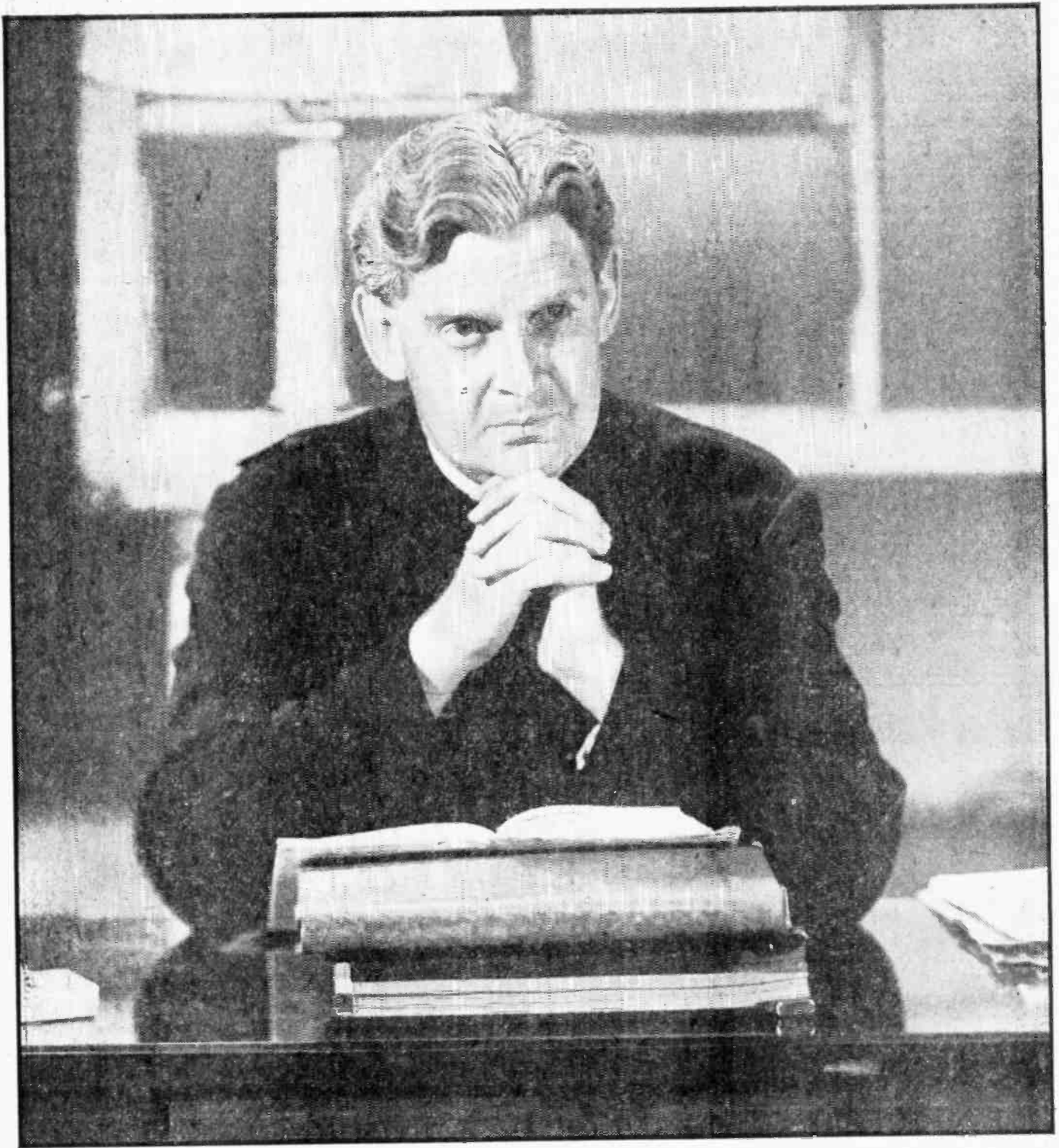
Readers who were vaudeville-conscious will recall the term "Two a Day." Well, according to advices Radio Life has received from the east this week, a bespectacled gent by the name of Kay Kyser is reviving that time-worn phrase.

Radio Life's Album of Stars

THE GUIDING LIGHT

THINGS I NEVER KNEW 'TIL THIS WEEK—

● **About Don Ameche:** That Hollywood newsboys tab him as "our favorite customer." The other night I collared Vernon Mattox, a Vine St. newsboy favorite who's been waving the headlines since 1932 when the northeast corner of Sunset and Vine was known as "the out-cast corner" and Radio City was just a dream. Ameche, who was driving out of the NBC parking lot after emceeding a "Command Performance" show for the soldiers, had just leaned out of his coupe to buy an early edition from Mattox. I happen to buy my early editions from the Sandy-haired, likeable Mattox, too, so I poked a few questions at him when Don drove away. When I learned that Ameche was so highly regarded I asked, "why"? . . . "For one thing," explained the newsboy, "Mr. Ameche is always kind and considerate. He always has a smile for us, and seems to take a personal interest in our welfare. Yes, and he's the 'heaviest tipper' in this town of celebrities." According to Newsboy Mattox and Steve Brooks, former Cleveland Indian infielder who now hustles papers for a Los Angeles morning daily, Ameche always pays a half-dollar for his nickel paper. Brooks tells the story of how Ameche walked up to his corner on H'wood Blvd. one night, shoving some change into the newsboy's hand with "sorry but I have only 45 cents tonight—you'll have to trust me for the balance" and walked away.

● **About Eddie Cantor:** That this restless, always-on-the-go, Mexican jumping bean-like guy could be glued to any one spot for 72 uninterrupted minutes. But that's exactly what happened at the Casa Manana in Culver City the other night when Ted Lewis, the supreme showman of 'em all, tossed his top hat into the local radio ring (KHJ) with a premiere night that brought out Mr. Banjo Eyes and a flock of celebs, jitterbugs and hand-holders. I focused one eye on the memory-drenched show routines which the High Hatted Tragedian of Jazz paraded under a battery of vari-colored spots, and kept the other on Ida's Eddie. Ted and Eddie are old, old friends, and it was fun to watch those banjo eyes drink in every movement made by Lewis. Eddie hardly twitched an eyebrow during the 72 minutes which Ted used to thrill the customers and it all made you wonder what thoughts were in the Cantor mind as Ted sang "When My Baby Smiles at Me" and "Somebody Stole My Gal." It's an opportune moment for Ted Lewis to shine again, because you could feel the pulse of the crowd there in the Casa Manana through the applause that rang out when Ted and Snowball Whittier sauntered out across the floor in that memorable grand finale of "Me and My Shadow." The public is glad to hear those old songs again, and nobody can chant 'em like Ted Lewis.

● **About Gordon Jenkins:** That this quiet, mustached maestro who batons the "solid sending seven" on Dinah Shore's Blue(s) serenade and directs Ransom Sherman's musical interludes via CBS Wednesdays is regarded by those in the music trade as "the man who 'made' Andre Kostelanetz." As "Kosty's" chief arranger several years ago (the Skitch Henderson you hear on various Radio City programs was then playing piano for Kostelanetz) Jenkins was responsible for those fine string effects which everyone identifies now with music by Andre Kostelanetz. Jenkins is another of those ambitious young arrangers who developed his talents behind the scenes with a "name" orchestra leader until the right opportunity presented itself for him to baton his own aggregation. Many of the top conductors of the day first served apprenticeship periods as arrangers. They include Glenn Miller, Charles (Bud) Dant, John Scott Trotter, Claude Thornhill, Stan Kenton and many others. Some of these former arrangers have the personalities and the flair for showmanship that appeals to the public. They are the hotel and ballroom favorites, like Miller, Thornhill and Kenton. Others like Jenkins, Trotter and Dant have slanted their talents as conductors and arrangers mainly for commercial radio programs rather than to the personal appearance angle. Some are equally adept, like John Scott Trotter, at both phases of the business.

● **About Tommy Dorsey:** That the bespectacled trombone star, whose orchestra is airing its new Raleigh commercial in the spot formerly occupied Tuesday nights by Red Skelton, made his first profes-

sional appearance playing a horn on a meat market truck. His pay was \$16 a week, as compared with the \$2,000 he's reportedly drawing for the once-weekly air series.

● **About Ted Yerxa:** That Yerxa, who is better known to you airplane fans as The Lamplighter, is now broadcasting no less than 12 programs weekly from the Florentine Gardens and the Hollywood Tropics. Two years ago Yerxa launched his Lamplighter idea with one quarter-hour interview show and a one-time-per-week column in the Daily News. Now his column appears five times weekly, he has programs heard nightly over KPAS and KHJ, and a song inspired by him titled "The Lamplighter Sere-

nade" is sweeping the country. That's progress in two years, isn't it!

● **About Don Quinn:** That the author of the Fibber McGee-Molly laugh-casts is an accomplished artist. Don is responsible for designing the attractive pins which are presented to all those who participate on the Victory Parade and Victory Theatre broadcasts through the summer on CBS and NBC. Understand Quinn is also adept with a brush and sketches people as easily as the U. S. airmen knock enemy planes out of the sky.

● **That Bing's little brother Bob** is three inches taller than his big brother.

● **That Fanny (Baby Snooks) Brice** was once a chorus girl in Cohan & Harris productions.

● **That Van Heflin, whose real name** is Emmett Evan, was once featured in NBC serials "Betty & Bob" and "The Man I Married."

● **That it was Robert L. Redd, writer-**director of NBC's "Point Sublime", who gave Spike Jones and His City Slickers their first radio break.

● **That Al Pearce was once a band** leader. Played at Lake Tahoe.

● **That NBC announcer Harlow Wil-**cox's father played cornet in the first Ringling Bros. show ever produced.

YOU and I

How the Composer of "You and I" Found Inspiration
For His Song in His Own Remarkable Romance

Dear Editor: I know Radio Life's editorial board doesn't like Pollyanna stories—ones in which everything is just ducky and there's not a marring fipple on the surface. I've heard the board bellow: "Folks aren't angels. Sure! Show up their good points. But give the readers some 'egg on the vest' stuff, too!" I'm sorry, but I'll have to disappoint you in this story, for I found the Willsons just swell folks. Why not let it go at that and chalk up one big, good mark for maritally oft-maligned Hollywood?

IN AN attractive English-type home, fronting the Beverly Hills bride path, live the Meredith Willsons. Behind the house, flanked by an expansive lawn, nestles a double garage which is just a little different from the other garages along Rodeo Drive. This one houses a Chevie—a not-so-new Chevie—but one which is dear to the heart of its owner, Meredith Willson.

In this self-same car, early one Sunday afternoon last spring, Meredith Willson received the inspiration for his song, "You and I." He hurried home, sat down at the piano, and in half an hour had completed both words and music with the exception of the line, "From the first hello to the last goodbye." That passage required an added two hours to polish off.

"You and I" swept the country and grossed into six figures. Shortly after, it was followed by "Two in Love." When "Two in Love" joined "You and I" on the "Hit Parade," Willson became the first composer ever to achieve such distinction.

What actually inspired Meredith Willson to compose "You and I"? If you ask him, he will claim that it was nothing special.

Personally, I think the song was inspired by the Willsons' own remarkable love story.

When was their first hello? Mere-

dith and Peggy can't remember exactly, because they were born six weeks apart and five blocks away from one another in Mason City, Iowa, where they grew up together. Mrs. Willson's name then was Elizabeth Wilson (spelled with one "l").

The now-famous conductor-composer, who started banging the piano at three years, remembers Peggy as a little girl with pig-tails and plump legs which rounded above high-button, grey-topped shoes. She recalls him as a thin, gaunt sort of lad, who was the wit of the school.

Meredith "proposed" to her when they were nine. At a school picnic, he swaggered up to Peggy and announced: "I'm gonna marry you, some day!" When they were 12, he presented her with a cameo engagement ring which cost him \$18 of his own money, earned by playing three nights a week in the country club orchestra.

All through high school, neither dated anyone else. In 1919, Peggy won the lead in the senior play and had to kiss the hero in the final scene. Jealous Meredith finagled the job of pulling the curtain and worked out a scheme to draw it a second ahead of schedule, so that the audience missed the finishing clinch.

The political animosity of Papas Willson and Wilson served to contribute tang to their children's romance. Mr. Wilson, who was city engineer, and Mr. Willson, who was a law graduate managing his father's estate, could be relied upon to take opposite sides of any political fence.

A most unhappy year apart followed Peggy's and Meredith's graduation from Mason City high school. She enrolled as a freshman at Drake and he as a flute student at Damrosch School of Musical Arts in New York City.

Both returned home for the summer. Two weeks before they were scheduled to separate again, the pair climbed into the Ford of another couple who accompanied them to Albert Lee, Minn., where Peggy and Meredith became "Mr. and Mrs." They were only 17 years old. Their amazed parents fumed aplenty, but the Messrs. Wilson and Willson agreed on one thing: "Let the kids go to New York together. They'll be back in three months."

Back in New York with his bride, the young musician began to make headway with his career. He was engaged as flutist with Sousa's band, which was starting a 46-week tour. Against precedent, Mrs. Willson went along on the trip.

"At the end of the season it had cost me \$50 more than I had earned to pay her railroad fare," Meredith recalls.

But gracious Peggy had won her entree into the Sousa royal family, and the following season the famous bandleader himself footed her traveling expenses. Meredith stayed with the band for three seasons.

Before he was 21, he was seated as first flutist with the New York Philharmonic Orchestra.

"Until I was sitting right there in the orchestra I had never heard a symphonic program," he admits, "except for the time that the Minneapolis Symphony stopped off in Mason City for a one-night stand."

During the five years that Meredith was playing with the New York Philharmonic, Mrs. Willson attended all the concerts. She also resumed her education at Columbia University and received her diploma.

Meredith Willson landed in Hollywood via summer symphony and musical directorship of the American Broadcasting Company in Seattle.

A friend wrote: "Come to Hollywood. This is the land of milk, honey, and fish fries."

Meredith came and scored a couple of pictures. But he was weaned away by San Francisco, where he was made musical director of the Don Lee station and in 1932, musical director of NBC's western division. Rapidly, he became one of the airline's most popular and oft-heard conductors, at one time with 18 programs a week. In 1937 he was asked to direct the music for Maxwell House, which originated in Hollywood, and after four months of commuting between San Francisco and the Southland, moved here permanently.

His first symphony, "San Francisco," has been performed by that city's orchestra with Willson on the podium. His symphony No. 2 is called "The Missions of California," while his No. 3 (in process of composition), has, with a glint of Willson humor, been christened "An Old Fashioned Piece for People Who Still Like Melody." No record of Willson's composing would be complete without mention, which has been made previously in Radio Life, of his even dozen war songs, for which he writes not only the music but the words.

This ability of Meredith Willson to interpret and compose in more than one medium is one of his most remarkable assets.

Through all the strenuous years while Meredith has been working his way to the pinnacle of success the "You and I" theme of the Willson love story has not dimmed. Today their love story is just as vivid, just as beautifully simple as it was when they were a couple of kids back in Iowa. She attends all Meredith's concerts and broadcasts and he always plays her his compositions-in-the-making, to gain her advice. It's generally good and he follows it.

Peggy has, in reality, become a perfect radio wife, accustoming herself to take duties from Meredith's shoulders and in every possible manner oiling his living routine so that he may be freed of minor details.

When he once packed his bags

Everyone who enjoys listening to phonograph records via radio—and who doesn't?—should be interested in an announcement tossed out by Jimmy Petrillo, blustery boss of the American Federation of Musicians, at the recent AFM convention at Dallas.

Said Jimmy to the AFM members there assembled:

"After August 1 musicians will make no more phonograph records—except for home or other non-commercial use and for the USO."

LET'S WAIT AND SEE

If you are one of those many people whose chief radio enjoyment is derived from the broadcasts of phonograph records don't throw out your radio just yet on the strength of Jimmy's edict.

Petrillo, who has been astoundingly slow to act in this matter, is aiming at juke box operators as much as at those radio stations that make free use of records for commercially sponsored programs.

Almost everyone agrees that there is something wrong with the fact that a musician should transfer his musical product to a recording (for as little as \$7.50 per "side") and that this product of his talent and training should be sold again and again for profit without some share of that profit going to the musician.

There is also the fact that the use of these recordings for commercial purposes in juke boxes and on commercial radio programs unquestionably displaces many musicians from jobs.

THE OTHER SIDE

On the other side of the controversy we have the fact that it would be a crime to prevent the public from having access to the world's great library of recorded music by some medium other than buying a phonograph or record player and a batch of records, which most cannot afford. There's a solution somewhere, but we doubt if Jimmy Petrillo will reach it by ordering what is virtually a strike against record manufacturers at a time when the manufacturers are already beset with serious economic problems growing out of well known shortages.

BANDS ABOUT TOWN

Into the Palladium this week comes Les Brown, a new-comer to the Coast,

who has been pushing his way steadily up the ladder in the East. Les and his bandmen drew a tough assignment in following world-beater Harry James. Les, by the way, like most batoneers who come to Hollywood, is "doubling" as a movie actor, sharing the featured dance band honors in RKO's *Sweet and Hot* with Freddy Martin, a forthcoming flicker aimed to please the fans of both the sweet and swing styles in music. . . . The Zucca Brothers hope to have their new Hollywood Casino (on Sunset at Gower) open by July 4. It will be opened by Jan Savitt, heading a band augmented by a string section. . . .

Jeannie with the *Light Brown Hair*, the great old song that got such a pushing around during the ASCAP vs. BMI scrap, announced the arrival of Dave Marshall and his band at the new "Louisiana." Jeannie is Dave's musical signature. In case you have wondered where Dave has been since he put in that long run at Florentine Gardens (a full year) he has been on a successful tour that covered the Northwest and took him back as far as Denver. . . . Cab Calloway and his band (they follow Ted Lewis at the Casa Manana) have been signed for the MGM picture version of *Cabin in the Sky*. . . . Jimmy Lunceford's band, heard via the air from the Trianon, sounds mighty fine in spite of having many new men in the band (*Down Beat* says those Lunceford men who left were fired—*Music & Rhythm* says they quit). Henry ("Hot Lips") Busse takes over at the Southgate swingery July 15. . . . It's "Woodchopper" Herman for the Palladium July 21, followed by Abe ("Socket") Lyman September 1.

JIVE JOTTINGS

Caught Bobby Sherwood's new band (hear him via Mutual from Zucca's at Hermosa) rehearsing. He has a line-up of top-notch musicians from one end to the other, which is amazing in a new band at times like these when good musicians are very hard to get. Shows the boys have confidence in Bobby's musical future. Watch for his recording of *Elk's Parade* from the new Capitol record company (whose first six releases will be on sale June 29). . . . Lionel Hampton, our hometown boy, brings his band to the Casa Manana in September, according to Manager Joe Glasser (who also handles Les Brown). . . . Freddy Martin has a new singer—Bob Haymes, formerly with Orrin Tucker. Bob replaced Stewart Wade, who left June 15.

without her help, he left out his baton. He was to conduct the Ford Symphony and as he needed a baton with familiar feel, he had to wire home for one. Peggy sent him six, just to be sure.

Mrs. Willson thinks her husband is perfect, except for two things. First, he doesn't pick up his clothes. Learning a new card game, Peggy inveigled Meredith to try it with the understanding that the winner would dictate terms. Peggy won and specified that he pick up all his things for a week. A good loser, Meredith carried out his penalty. "But at the end of the seven days," Mrs. Willson reports ruefully, "he went back to his former mode of scattering things about."

The other of Meredith's faults is refusing to get up mornings. Last year Peggy made her husband a very thoughtful and clever anniversary gift. It was an alarm clock, which instead of rattling off a rude summons, had a Swiss music box which tinkled the first bars of "You and I."

Mrs. Willson's subtlety didn't work. "There's one thing more I should have done," she says in retrospect. "I should have had the box play 'Darling you and I know the reason why YOU GOTTA GET UP!'"

How unconsciously Meredith's wife assumes details for her husband may be illustrated by a story about Meredith getting some medicine for a slight ailment. Meeting his wife at the door, he put on a dead-pan face and said: "Can you take this for me, please?"

She did!

Coming out of the Ether

(Smitty is vacationing. Before he left, he asked Barney McDevitt, ace Hollywood dance band publicist, to sit at a typewriter and enjoy every press agent's dream . . . the opportunity to write about himself and his friends, with all the stops out. McDevitt has known more big name bandleaders personally and has contributed more to their success than virtually any reasonable facsimile—The Editor.)

Thank you Bernie Smith, for honoring me with the privilege of Coming out of the Ether to write a 500 word 'Guest Column', and I assure you that I will do my best not to upset your loyal and large audience of Radio Life readers.

'Sweet Sixteen' years as a good will ambassador of bands and personalities started right here in Los Angeles in June, 1926, when Fred Waring, popular leader of his famed Pennsylvanians, asked me if I would like to travel. I was a news photographer at the time and Waring and his crew were making box-office history downtown at the Metropolitan Theater (now Paramount) where long-haired and artistic Sid Grauman was staging his famous prologues.

The youthful and collegiate Waringites were a riot. Fred demanded some special 45 degree art on the roof edge of the building, showing his 13 Pennsylvanians (now 53, on the "Chesterfield Pleasure Time Programs") sporting the extra wide Oxford bagged pants and loud sweaters, playing their saxes and horns in darling poses a la Harold Lloyd. Waring liked them, so did the newspapers and magazines. It was then that Fred talked me into a nation-wide tour, as advance man, exploiting, promoting and publicizing the band in the key cities, which lasted a solid year. After that I boarded the S. S. De Grasse, a French liner Paris bound, with sixteen hand-picked Broadway musical comedy beauties, as companions for a three month engagement at the celebrated Des Ambassadeurs Theatre-Restaurant. Bobby Connelly staged the show with Cole Porter supplying the words and music played by Waring and the boys.

Paris was gay then both night and day, and guess who was leading a concert orchestra for dinner guests? None other than our own Lud Gluskin, now musical director at CBS-KNX. And, here's something I think might amuse you. On my last night aboard the liner before docking at Le Havre, and after the usual ship concert, I found a small book on how

to 'Speak French' and believe it or not, I didn't have any trouble.

But Fred Waring and his Penn State grads did. The Parisian taxicab drivers and waiters and hotel clerks could not understand their French lingo, and were they burned at my nonchalance, and ease of reading the lip movement and 'digging' the pronunciation from others immediately.

My European exploits ended, I landed on Broadway in advance of the Pennsylvanians in a collegiate musical "Hello, Yourself" which ran 40 weeks, and which firmly established Fred Waring on his way up the ladder of fame. He doubled in one of the early musical talkies "Syncopation". How many of you remember that one? Morton Downey met Barbara Bennett, his leading lady, who just tossed a career as ballroom dancing partner of the great Maurice, only rival of the famous Vernon Castles. I met Morton Downey in Paris at the swank Casanova Club, and after seven happy years with the Waring Gang, I joined Morton at the height of his career. At that time he was the popular Camel Minstrel on the very popular quarter hour heard nightly except Sunday on CBS, with Tony Wons and Jacques Renard's band.

I remained with Downey four years, until 1936. In the fall of that year I landed back in Hollywood with Mrs. McDevitt and one-year-old daughter, Barna. The Missus, known professionally as Olive Olsen, appeared at the El Capitan Theatre in a play, "Meet My Sister," and when the show closed, the McDevitt Trio decided it had done its share of traveling. I liked Hollywood and up to this time, Hollywood has shown evidence of liking me. So I decided to stick around.—Barney McDevitt.

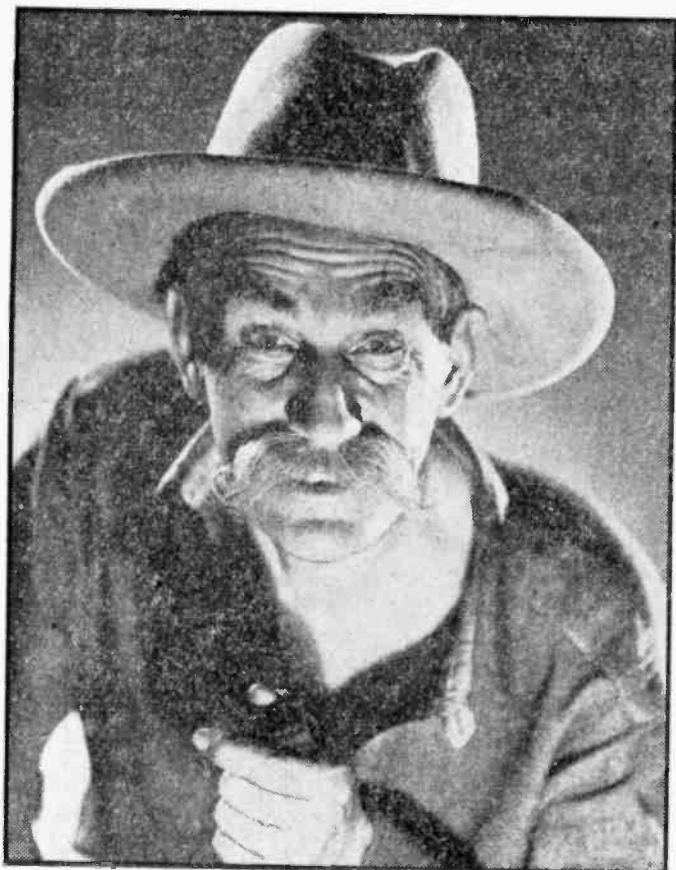

Wild and Woolly

A Woman Treks Through Desert Wastes and Old Mining Camps To Recreate the West's Saga

DEATH VALLEY DAYS, that rugged radio series portraying the blood and thunder epoch of Early California, is not written by a tobacco-chewing, grizzly old prospector or a cultured college man gone native in the cactus-dotted wastes.

It's written by a woman—Ruth Cornwall Woodman—who was born in New England, was graduated from Yassar, raised a family in New York, and until 1930, knew of Death Valley only as an unusual geological formation.

She was an advertising copy-writer when the decision was made to dramatize stories of the West. The most

Mrs. Woodman had heard of this part of the country was from stories told by her father, a mining engineer. But that doesn't mean that she doesn't know, first-hand, of what she writes.

Given the task of preparing scripts, Mrs. Woodman attacked her problem by going directly to Death Valley to gather story material. Since then she has made it an annual practice to visit Death Valley for purposes of gathering and checking data.

Her method of working is simple and she isn't complexed because it's a strange job for a woman. She takes a male guide with her, not so much for protection as for a means of entree into

saloons and such places normally prohibited to an unaccompanied woman. The male guide has proved a necessity, however, on some of Mrs. Woodman's more rugged treks into out-of-the-way camps.

For the most part, story tips are garnered orally. Her opening conversational wedge is "Death Valley Days", and as she has yet to meet someone in the West who is unfamiliar with the program, Mrs. Woodman's wedge usually is fruitful of data and leads on the best people to see.

"I've discovered", says the writer, "that the local newspaper edi-

Why I'm Proud To Be An American

Victor Borge's story is a powerful incentive for all-out assault on the Axis—an inspirational message to Americans who take freedom for granted. One of Europe's most famous stage figures, Borge had to abandon his career overnight and start life anew in a country whose language he could not speak. He has experienced the full weight of Nazi brutality. Radio Life is happy to be the first publication to publish the thoughts and views of the comedy star of Bing Crosby's Music Hall on NBC—The Editor.

MY FIRST GLIMPSE of that grand old Statue of Liberty from far out to sea off New York harbor is to me the most inspiring sight of my entire life.

The Americans aboard the liner American Legion stand beside me as the symbolic statue, backed by New York's so spectacular skyline, creeps into view—and their eyes are misty.

It is a joyous homecoming to the Americans after a hazardous crossing of the Atlantic. They are returning to a land where everyone is free. They are back home.

But they have not felt so greatly the iron-fisted brutalities of the dictatorship as I have, so the sight holds an even greater significance to me. I am beginning a new life in a new land.

And I am very glad I have that life to live under the protection of the Stars and Stripes.

When Germany sets so treacherously upon the low countries, I am in Sweden, and the invasion, the cruel despoiling of Denmark, means I can never return to that land while it remains under Nazi domination.

I have been far too outspoken in my criticism of Adolf Hitler from the stage and in the newspaper column I contribute to Scandinavian newspapers. So my name is high on the Nazi blacklist, and no doubt already agents of the dreaded Gestapo, who have made a fifth column invasion of Copenhagen and other Danish cities, are seeking me there.

I am marked for a concentration camp or worse because I have dared to criticize their Fuehrer.

Still I regard as a miracle my trip to Petsamo, Finland, where I board the liner American Legion. We are under the protection of the Stars and Stripes, but the trip across the ocean is a dangerous one, with mines and submarines in our path.

It is not until New York is on the



horizon that we all feel we are at the journey's end.

That was 18 months ago. Since then, through my friends, Rudy Vallee and Bing Crosby, I have a new career. I have learned to speak your language. I have learned the customs of the country.

Most important, I am on my way to becoming an American—my first papers have already been taken out, and soon I will be a citizen of this great country.

And I am also preparing to help defend my adopted country. It is in the State Guard of California. With other Southern Californians, I am completing Red Cross and evacuation courses and if the enemy ever attacks

these Pacific shores, Sergeant Victor Borge of the California State Guard will be ready for them.

They mean much to me, these Stars and Stripes of America. The flag symbolizes the freedom from opposition, the great opportunity, which come to any citizen from any land who comes to these shores to live.

And I know I speak for all the refugees from poor, stricken Europe who have found haven here, when I say we will defend that haven with our last breath of life.

Everybody in this country says: God Bless America!

Don't they realize that God already blessed this country—long ago.

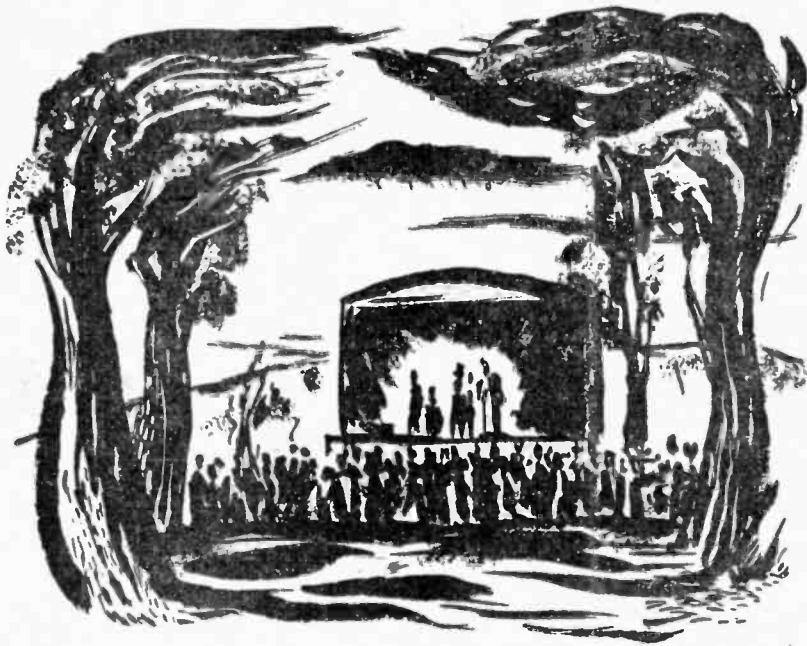

Consumers Club

SALLET BOWLS:

Back in the time of Charles II, one John Evelyn ranted and raved to quite an extent over the use of metal bowls to make "sallet" in. And according to tradition no salad-gourmet ever allows his pet wooden salad bowl to be washed. He merely wipes it out with a soft towel and then puts it under lock and key until dinner the next night.

Although we may not agree with the salad-gourmet in all particulars (we refer to his theory of not washing salad bowls) we do agree that wooden ones always make the best salads. As one famous restaurateur put it, "Olive wood is the aristocrat and bass wood the everyday workman." In any case as long as it's wood, that's the most important thing. Wood, you see, is an absorbent and after you've rubbed your bowl with garlic and anointed it with oil for some time, it will add to the flavor of your salad. So get yourself a favorite salad bowl and start to work.

QUESTIONS?

Our butchers tell us the most frequent question they are asked has to do with the purple marks stamped on meat. "Exactly what do they mean?" While our butcher takes a rest, we will go on where he left off.

These marks are of two kinds. One grades meat that is sold from one State to another on its wholesomeness. This is done by a Federal inspector and the meat is stamped "U. S. Inspected and Passed." It's our government's way of protecting you from unwholesome meat.

The second stamp is not necessary as in the case of the first but it can be requested from the Agricultural Marketing Administration of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. This grad-

ing shows the quality of the meat. For example beef is graded from the best cuts on down as "U. S. Prime," "U. S. Choice," "U. S. Good," "U. S. Commercial," and "U. S. Utility." All of the meat is good but some are better cuts than others. This grading is first of all to help the housewife choose the meat that best suits her needs.

TAY:

The Irish lady with her charming brogue may speak warmly of her "tay," but it's nothing compared to the way the Chinese feel about their tea. One ancient philosopher of that race even went so far as to list the effects of each succeeding cup. The first shattered one's loneliness; the second purified his soul; and the third, lifted

him "into the realm of the unwinking gods."

The English of course have always respected their tea. When it was first introduced there, it was acclaimed as an excellent remedy for headaches, giddiness, clearing of the vision, stomach ache, bad dreams and faulty memory. It was considered especially good when drunk with milk.

Recipe for Chicken a la Eddie Cantor

- 1/2 pound chicken livers
- 4 slices bread soaked in milk and squeezed
- 4 shallots
- 2 eggs
- 1 large onion
- Sprig of parsley
- 2 tsps. Seasonettes
- Salt and pepper
- 1 cube butter

Clean and pick the chicken livers carefully and chop very fine. Do this also with the shallots and parsley. Mix with the bread, Seasonettes and season with salt and pepper. Melt butter in a saucepan and when hot, put in mixture and cook over a moderate fire, stirring frequently for about 10 to 15 minutes. Bind with 2 eggs. Stuff the chicken with mixture. Put 1/2 cup butter in a large casserole and when the butter is hot put in the chicken, brown to a golden color turning and basting frequently. Season with salt and pepper and some Seasonettes. Put the lid on the casserole, let simmer in a moderate oven until the chick is tender. Be sure to baste often. When done, carve and serve.

Dollar Dinner for Four

- Corned Beef and Cabbage a la Mr. Lutkey
- Boiled Potatoes
- Sliced Onions with Vinegar Dressing

Corned Beef and Cabbage a la Mr. Lutkey

- 2 pounds corned beef
- 1 4-pound cabbage
- 1 teaspoon Seasonettes

Put 2 pounds boneless corned beef into a pot and cover with water to two inches above the meat. 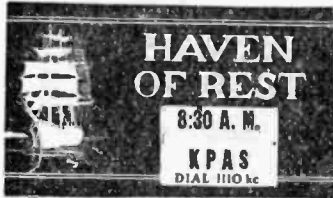

tors, doctors, bartenders, and librarians—if there is a library—are the best sources of story tips."

One "must" in every town Mrs. Woodman hits is a thorough perusal of old newspaper files. In addition, she is a regular subscriber to such western periodicals as Tombstone Epitaph, Inyo Register, and Arizona Highways Magazine.

Of course she never knows, in her wanderings, just where a story may turn up. One night she stopped in the little town of St. George in southern Utah. She expected to remain overnight. A chat with the local sevice station operator started wheels turning that held Mrs. Woodman in St. George for three days.

To get a story from Panamint, historic mining town, Mrs. Woodman climbed eight hours on horseback to the top of a canyon, threading her way on perilous rock and rubble. Another time, she overheard a chance conversation in a luxurious cocktail

lounge and trailed both parties until she cinched her story. One of the parties Mrs. Woodman hunted down was a United Airlines pilot who today wings his way across the very trail made famous by his grandfather as he drove a 20-mule team across the desert.

Somewhere on all Arizona state maps is a pinpoint which most motorists pass by. But it was here, in an auto camp, that the "Death Valley Days" author turned up not one, but three of the best stories she has done. Shamelessly eavesdropping, she followed the trail until she found one of the 60-year-old plural wives of the secretary to Brigham Young, Mormon elder.

Sometimes in her search for material, Mrs. Woodman starts out with just a name and the glimmering of a rumor. Down on the docks of a Pacific seaport, she recently sought out a longshoreman. Walking along the docks with him as he trundled freight aboard a ship, she got the straight of an adventure story of the blazing desert in which the longshoreman had played a principal role.

"Desert people," observes Mrs.

Woodman, "or at least those of Death Valley, don't dry up and wither away to a gnarled old age as they do in the movies. After a couple of years packed with adventure, some of them move like the rest of us. Prospectors, miners, guides, desert rats, just pick up their belongings and move into cities to pound the streets."

Once home from her trip, the author sticks to a rigid writing routine, from 9 a. m. to 1 p. m. daily. She reserves her afternoons for being Mrs. Woodman, wife of a New York banker, and mother to a boy, Billy, 9, and a girl, Winthrop, 5. Young Billy, at first confused at seeing his mother pecking away at a typewriter, now thinks it's swell and plans to take over the program when he is a little older.

He may, or he may not. When Mrs. Woodman started the "Death Valley Days" job, she understood it would last a year. There was a slight error in calculations—the program is now in its 13th year and ranks as the oldest half hour dramatic show on the Columbia network.
