1:30: Are these soldiers buying bonds! This pair who started 'em off helped send the total to over \$25,000 in this camp alone. I hope that inspires a lot of folks at home; think of it, these boys are not only in the fighting line, but putting most of their pay in bonds, as well. There's real patriotism—and good sense! Some of the companies subscribed one hundred percent.

WHAT MEATS THE EYE:

Here are some suggestions for inexpensive meat dishes and their accompaniments. You'll be surprised what delicacies these are and how much your family will appreciate a change of the dishes accompanying the entree.

Prices quoted are approximate.

- 1 Lamb kidneys (20c lb.). Serve

with fresh green peas and green onions.

2. Lamb shanks (19c lb.). Nice with rice.

3. Beef chuck (25c lb.). Try out the new Tenderoni and serve instead of potatoes.

4. Boiling beef (14c lb.). Tasty accompaniments to this are new spinach and horseradish sauce.

5. Pork ends from the tenderloin (29c lb.). Fresh string beans with bacon go temptingly with this dish, and for your starch, serve a dessert of tapioca pudding.

6. Beef stew (25c lb.). Accompany with Budget Pack lima beans.

7. Lamb breast (14c lb.). Cook French style and serve with brussels

sprouts, broccoll, and a gelatine dessert.

8. Beef hearts (15c lb.). Broiled, with onion sauce. Make a cheese soufflé to go with them.

Sunday Dinner for Eight Persons

- Radishes
- Fresh Fruit Cocktail
- Sweet Pickles
- Alber's Olives
- Chicken a la F. D. R.
- Asparagus a la Florentine
- Beans Sauted in Butter
- Sunny Valley Spinach with Anchovy Sauce
- Mixed Vegetable Salad with French Dressing
- Lemon Pie Supreme
- Monarch Coffee

Recipe for Chicken a la F. D. R.

- 4 young chickens
- 2 large onions
- 2 cups broth
- 2 cups Sherry wine
- 1 pint shelled peas
- 2 cups Budget Pack Rice
- 2 teaspoons Seasonettes
- Salt and pepper
- Olive oil

Joint the chickens, wash and dry with a tea towel. Season with Seasonettes, salt and pepper. Put ten tablespoons olive oil in a thick frying pan on top of stove. When oil is hot, fry chicken to a brown. Add the broth, wine, rice and shelled peas, sprinkle with salt and pepper. Cover the pot tightly and let simmer until the rice and peas are tender. Serve the chicken on one side of platter and rice and peas as garnish.

Dollar Dinner for Four

- Baked Egg Noodles with Onion and Cheese Sauce
- Braised Short Ribs of Beef
- Cantaloupe Salad—Lemon Dressing
- Bread and Butter
- Ice Cream
- Coffee

Recipe for Baked Egg Noodles with Braised Short Ribs of Beef

- 2 pound short ribs of beef
- 1 pound Wilson's Oleomargarine
- 2 4-ounce packages egg noodles
- 1 pound sliced onions
- 1 teaspoon Seasonettes
- Parsley
- 2 level teaspoons salt
- 1 teaspoon pepper
- 1/4 pound cream cheese
- 2 quarts water

Put 1/4 pound Wilson's Certified Oleomargarine in a thick pot; when melted, braise the short ribs of beef cut into 3 inch pieces. When the ribs are nice and brown, take them out of the pot and saute one pound of onions sliced very thin, until they are golden in color. Put the ribs back into the pot, season with Seasonettes, salt, pepper and well chopped parsley and enough water to cover the short ribs. Let come to a boil, reduce the fire and simmer for one hour, or until the ribs are done. Put 2 quarts of water and two teaspoons salt in a large pot, when the water boils rapidly, cook 2 four-ounce packages egg noodles and let cook until tender. When done, drain well and put into a casserole. Shred one-half of 1/4 pound of full cream cheese, sprinkling it on top of the noodles; then pour on one-half of the sauce and mix well. Pour on the remaining sauce, sprinkle with the rest of the shredded cheese and cover the casserole. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes and serve with piping hot short ribs.

hands. "Get over by that mike and read some poems!"

"Sissy stuff!", rebelled Russell inwardly. "Of course, I'll have to do it, but nobody's going to know that it's Alden Russell, crooning pretty verses while an organ plays!"

Resolutely he walked to the microphone and announced: "This is Ted Malone."

As simply as that, the "nation's voice of poetry" was born! Since that day at KMBC, nine years ago, Ted Malone has become known to thousands of listeners throughout the United States, where his "Between the Bookends" program is radio's best-loved poetry quarter-hour.

During those nine years, Ted has had only one sponsor, which footed the bills for 26 weeks. For the remainder of the time, he has proved to be so good, so much in favor, that he has been retained as a sustaining feature on one or another of all four major networks.

His fan mail is terrific, and although 75 per cent of it comes from women, it encompasses all classes and ages of people.

What does Ted Malone have that makes his appeal so universal?

It was my privilege to work with him for six months. Perhaps I may venture some answers to the question.

To begin with, Ted is inherently

a philosophic, analytic person. He has an Aunt Vinny in Glendale who can verify that as a small boy, he always tried to figure out why he had stubbed his toe or taken a spill. Then, he's a methodically-minded man and one with native spirituality. All these qualities contribute to Ted's poise.

But most important of all is Ted Malone's humanness and his happy concept of life. One of his favorite expressions is "the great, glad adventure of living." If you're a Ted Malone fan, you'll recognize this quality in his voice, his attitude, and his interpretation of what he reads.

While I was in New York with him, he gave evidence, on every hand, of being a down-to-earth fellow. He rides the surface cars to the office at 57th and 8th Avenue. While he's riding, he's not detached. He's interested in everybody around him. I remember one day he changed the theme of his poetry broadcast all because of two old ladies he saw chatting on the street corner. He had

For the People

The never-ending hunger for news which today has reached a capacity never before equalled in history, was fed by CBS-KNX last week in their latest radio pioneering. The Seventh Street window of Bullock's Los Angeles store, turned into the CBS-KNX News Bureau Metropolitan Annex, gave the latest war bulletins on the window, with map markers showing locale of action. From early morning until closing time, the Associated Press wire and direct connections with CBS-KNX shortwave listening posts brought in the news as fast as it occurred.

With maps changing from hour to hour, with victories and defeats alternating from minute to minute, with every family in America vitally affected by World War II, men and

women, even youngsters, have a feverish appetite for news during every waking hour. So it was that businessmen, housewives, errand boys, policemen and service men stopped before the department-store radio news room. Bad news or good, KNX saw to it that they were cognizant of the latest developments.

Harriet Ginn, operator-in-charge, was assisted by attendants Ruth Maxwell and Barbara McGee, operating the annex in three shifts from 8 a. m. to 10 p. m. daily.

No story of American life is typical without its humorous aspect and the KNX-Bullock story is no exception. Glass windows are not soundproof and so on the day before the opening, when Miss Ginn was standing still, regarding the large war map in the background, two sailors came the nearest possible to what might pass for a navy blush. It happened after one remarked to the other, "My what an attractive dummy!" and the "dummy" turned the full warmth of a friendly smile upon them!

No Similarity

When the Blue network's "Town Meeting," on tour of the country, stopped off to broadcast in Santa Barbara on Thursday night, July 23, a local young lady was one of four persons invited to participate on the forum and to express her views on the topic: "Will War Marriages Work?" She was Miss Peggy Waggener of Los Angeles, graduate of U. S. C. with the class of 1937 and major in international relations, who was recommended to "Town Meeting" by the university. She and David Seabury, lecturer and psychologist, took the negative side of the question, opposing Louis Browne, novelist, and Mrs. Dwight Hutchins.

Miss Waggener argued: "War generates a lot of glamour. Most of us are doing work for the U. S. O., Red Cross, and other organizations which brings us in close touch with the soldier and sailor. Ability to distinguish between a sergeant-major and a major-general is a 'must' in our education. Everybody wants to be the rose that Johnny Doughboy found in her home town. Against this glamorous background, life itself is streamlined to keep pace with our war effort. A great deal of life must be jammed into a few hasty days, and

the lonely vista of years of waiting prompts many a girl to adopt 'now or never' tactics.

"I wonder," Miss Waggener pointed out to her air audience, "how many of these warbrides realize the difficulties to be faced not only immediately after the war, but immediately after the ceremony. There is seldom time for family approval on either side, and if a girl is lucky enough to live with her husband, she must trek far away and set up a new life in an army or navy community which is already notoriously overcrowded."

To your Radio Life reporter, this all sounded like cold logic and we surveyed Miss Waggener as a Cupid-invulnerable young lady. Then we talked with her mother, who set everything straight. She assured us that Miss Waggener was asked arbitrarily to take the negative side of the question, and that the opinions she had stated on the forum did not necessarily reflect Miss Waggener's own.

Now the program has been dropped indefinitely. Radio Life is fully aware of the fact that radio schedules must be changed occasionally and that sponsored and sustaining programs have certain differences of importance.

But the fact remains—when a group of people get together in a community sing, feeling akin as they send out the familiar melodies of World War I and the newer notes of present day songs depicting phases of war life, there's a lot of morale-building going on. As long as America sings — America triumphs over problems of the day.

Let's hope there will be enough protests to bring "United We Sing" back —sponsored—let's hear America sing with Art Baker!

Scoop Again

Hank McCune, NBC's "It Happened in the Service" man, has scooped them all again. Last week he brought to the microphone Lieut. Bill Christie, and thus scored the first time anybody from the Yorktown has appeared on the air.

On Hank's Wednesday night program, Lieut. Christie told the thrilling story of the Battle of Midway, June 4, 5, and 6, and how the Japanese task force was fleeing on the last day when Christie and two other bombers attacked. They prepared to dive on a vessel, supposedly a small one, which turned out to be about 16,000 tons of Mogama class cruiser. But before doing so, they radioed their carrier: "This is TB-14 to X 149. Located Jap task fleet."

Immediately came the answer: "Do not attack. Return to your carrier immediately." When Christie's operator tried to confirm the order, it was discovered that the Jap vessel was on their wave length and had been the one, in perfect English, to order the Americans to return to their carrier without attacking!

How It's Done

Rudy Vallee got Joan Davis back on his Thursday-night program—but it took a nationwide advertising campaign to do it!

The story is one of the most amusing which Radio Life has stumbled upon in some time and, as might be expected, press agents had something to do with it.

Ordinarily the publicity men, over-garulous about their clients, have little to say about their own part in the stars' activities. It isn't considered good business.

But this time the press agents ARE the story—and here is the inside tale of how one of their "stunts" was carried out.

When Miss Davis left the Vallee program for a couple of weeks' rest, the program's directors and its publicity firm felt it would be good policy to keep interest alive in the comedienne during her absence. Therefore, not only did Rudy and his program guests spend the next two weeks searching for her, but the press agents cooked up a classified advertisement to be inserted, at regular rates, in the "personal" columns of all the big newspapers of the country, over Rudy's own signature. In each case the ad read: "Joan Davis: If you're in (name of town) please return to Seal-test program at once. Everything all right. Rudy Vallee."

Then things started to happen. Curious subscribers started calling the paper. Was the well-known Miss Davis hiding in their town? Editors, smelling a gag, but not being sure, called the press associations, who wired their Hollywood representatives. Associated Press, International News Service, New York's PM, the Boston Post, Time Magazine all shot wires and phone calls back and forth.

Discovering the gag, the correspondents laughed and sent back kidding stories to their offices and everybody was happy—especially the press agents who stirred up a day's tempest with a crackpot idea and had it plastered over dozens of newspapers.

And that, dear Radio Life reader, gives you some idea of how it's done in Hollywood! We thought you'd like the low-down. KECA, 7 p.m. Thurs.

Salt Spray on Vallee?

If you see Rudy Vallee walking down the street in front of a blue gold-

braided shadow, don't be alarmed. But the breath of the ocean winds is already cooling the back of the Blue Network star's neck. The Vagabond Lover, it is rumored, wants to be a member of the armed service and is seeking a commission and a way of blending official duties with duties to his program. In World War I, teenage Vallee was a second class officer on the "Texas."

Sponsors Respond

The overwhelming, tireless enthusiasm of thousands of fans and the faith of radio itself have finally placed Tom Breneman's "Breakfast at Sardi's" under the triumphant banner of sponsorship. Listeners and radio executives can take equal honors for their unwavering belief in the early morning program which, starting Thursday, August 6, and every Thursday thereafter, will be known as the Fisher Flouring Mills program. The Seattle, Wash., company's contract calls for a 52-week schedule for 13 Pacific Coast stations. Breneman's air-child will be heard Monday through Friday and tentative plans are under way for participation commercials on the unsponsored days.

Brighter still in this brightly commercialized future, is the plan to make "Breakfast at Sardi's" a trans-continental program, sustained by the network until plans for participation commercials are carried out through the East.

Tom Breneman's program has had a long, uphill pull. Many another program, well put-together, well presented, too, has fallen by the wayside under similar circumstances. But women listeners would not let this breakfast program fall and the network backed up their attendance and letters with time. From Iowa, from Nebraska, from Texas, from Pennsylvania, California tourists of the feminine ranks have demanded to attend the performance of "Breakfast at Sardi's." And the network proved its championship of sustaining talent by waiting—month after month, until, finally, a program made famous by the public received a sponsor. KECA, KFSD, 8:30 a.m., Mon.-Fri.

New Scriptor

Last week, John F. Whedon arrived in Hollywood from New York and was promptly lunched at the Derby by Cecil Underwood. This is not set down as a social item, but as one in which all "Great Gildersleeve" fans will be interested, for Whedon was brought out by Producer Underwood as the new scriptor for the "Great Gildersleeve" show starring Hal Peary.

This is one program which jelled last year, using as its star a man who had gained his radio reputation on another show—(the Fibber McGee and Molly opus). Like the

program from which Peary came, the "Great Gildersleeve" relied for its laughs on "situation" humor, rather than rapid-fire gags. Its writer, Leonard Levinson, had worked previously with Don Quinn, scriptor for Fibber and Molly, and is now offering his services, without charge, to the Office of Facts and Figures.

However, toward the end of the season, there was a noticeable tendency toward more "cracks" and fewer humor-provoking situations. That may or may not explain the marked drop in "Great Gildersleeve's" listening rating.

Whedon, an unassuming fellow has done scripts for the old "Circle" show which starred Madeleine Carroll and Basil Rathbone, has written for the Old Glory and Ballantyne pro-

Burton, New Thrifty News Man Is Scientist, Traveler

"As the war gets tougher, as the casualty lists grow longer and longer, as human suffering and despair increase, people will long to be told—in ways they can understand—that all this is worth while."

The speaker was John Burton, author, scientist, and international lecturer who will take over the news analyst job on Thrifty Drug Stores' "Inside the News," beginning August 3rd.

If the above is the approach of this writer-analyst to his new job, as it undoubtedly is, it promises well for listener-interest in the familiar 10:30 p.m. spot on KFI.

More and more listeners are becoming grateful these days for commentators who weigh the effect of their words on the audience rather than trying to wring the last ounce of drama out of every bulletin.

Burton is already well known in Southern California. He has lectured at practically all our Universities, and at numerous clubs, as well as at the

Riverside "Institute of World Affairs." Born in Yorkshire, England, although he is now an American citizen, he has a truly international background. During World War I while still young, he was made Chief Projectile Metallurgist of one of the leading arms producing plants in England.

Later he became housemaster at a prominent English public school, St. Christopher's, which would be called a private school over here, and soon gained a reputation as an outstanding speaker and author. His book "The Trackless Wind" was cited by the New York Times as one of the best 50 books of the year in which it was published.

Burton's liberal social views brought him in touch with many of England's liberal thinkers—Arnold Freeman, Arnold Rowntree, artist William Rothenstein, writer Edward Carpenter, known as the "Walt Whitman" of England. In time he became special lecturer for the League of Nations, and before settling in this country, visited practically every country in Europe and Asia.

"Let the rest of the staff wear themselves out over-eating, sun-burning, and tearing around," Shep says. "I've got more interesting things to do right here in my office. And besides, there are some people who don't know a sonata from a caprice, so somebody has to stay around to spell out the details for them."

AWAY FROM IT ALL: We did however, escape a few embarrassing incidents while away from the office. There was the case of the lady who called us down for promising a picture of the Meredith Willsons' cat and failing to deliver. She's still looking for it in Radio Life, and now we'll have to break down and tell her the bitter truth. The only picture we had of "Emily" and the one we fully anticipated using, was too dark for reproduction. This sad fact wasn't discovered until the story was ready to run and it was too late to pose her feline highness. Maybe next time!

Emily was written into Meredith's script the other night on "Post Toasties Time." He was supposed to be raiding the ice-box in the kitchen and stepping on Emily's tail in the dark. Mrs. Willson insisted that couldn't really happen, as Emily sleeps in the bedroom. So Emily was written out of the final script.

But Emma, the Willsons' Negro housekeeper, made the grade and was mentioned on the air. While Mrs. Willson was attending the show at Radio City and her composer-conductor-actor husband was doing his stuff on the stage, Emma sat out in the couple's Rodeo Drive home, her ear glued to the radio to hear her name.

FROM SOMEWHERE IN IRELAND: The day we returned to work was brightened by a letter from—of all persons—Lieut. Mark Finley, who used to be publicity head for Mutual-Don Lee in Hollywood and who is now in military intelligence overseas.

"Here I am in tin hat," he writes, "carrying gas mask and pistol ready to open up a second front any old time they blow the whistle. It may seem that the pace toward war is quickening to folks in the USA, but for the boys in Ireland, we can't get the word quick enough . . . please send me a cable ordering me to take Berlin single-handed so I can go on a mission and finish it up in a hurry . . . I wanna go home to Hollywood.

"It's a problem to get accustomed to British radio production, but some of the programs are very entertaining . . . especially the recording sessions with American platters. It's a scream to hear the soubrettes in the local night clubs warble in their sweet Irish brogue that new hit, "Deep in the Heart of Texas." Incidentally, the cafes and dance spots usually close at 10:30 p.m. . . . religion and politics.

"We would like very much to hear on the BBC a nightly Hollywood and Broadway round-up of news and gossip—not war or political news—just a fast, snappy program on what's doing in the U. S. Nobody has short-wave sets, so we don't hear any of the stuff that's beamed this way . . . the type of program I speak of would have to be done with a hookup through BBC . . . let's say about 3 a.m. your time—a sort of "what happened last night" and given ostensibly as a round-up of things collated and edited just as the night clubs close.

"Haven't been inside or near a radio station for four months, as am so busy in a big and important job and the only country I get a chance to see or places to go are on official missions. I hit the ball hard and really have about seven jobs, all of which need immediate attention. Hollywood was fun . . . only 18 hours a day and two phones . . . and two pretty secretaries . . . here it's 24 hours a day . . . four phones . . . and male clerks!

"Would appreciate a letter full of Hollywood radio gossip going

back about three months, if you can hit the highlights in about a page for a soldier who probably will not return to radio . . . but to television. We'll have it as the No. 1 ether entertainment after the war."

Mark's such a grand fellow. It tickles us when we think of him now. In Hollywood he was a publicity man, telling everybody everything all the time. Last time we saw him, he was a close-mouthed intelligence man. The difference must be tormenting sometimes!

Yet, I wondered if he wasn't up to one of his stunts, and a very nice one too, when I saw that Betty Rhodes had been named "colleen" of some USA outfit in Ireland. Could be the fine hand of Lieut. Finley!

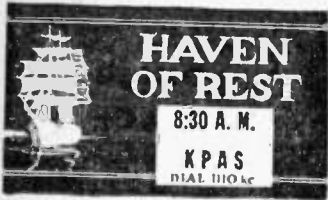

Possible Effects of Petrillo Record Ban Analyzed

Radio Life's Rambling in Rhythm Editor Gives You the Pros and Cons of the Platter Controversy

By CHARLES EMGE

This column is ordinarily devoted to musichatter about radio bands and orchestras but because of the approach of an important event which may have a great effect on the radio pleasure of every music lover, we're going to devote our space this week to a discussion of that event.

Jimmy Petrillo, boss of the American Federation of Musicians (the musicians' union) has decreed that after Aug. 1 AFMusicians shall make no more phonograph recordings or transcriptions of any kind, "except for home use" or "for the Army." (Jimmy, who runs his union the way Mussolini runs Italy, never takes a step without re-affirming his patriotism and wholehearted support of the U. S. war-effort).

A record manufacturer has no control over the use of his product after it leaves his hands. Therefore Jimmy's ruling, if it stands as it is at present, puts an end to the manufacture of phonograph records.

If anyone thinks that passable phonograph records can be turned out by non-union musicians he doesn't know how completely the AFM embraces its field. Its membership includes practically all competent musicians.

It is unlikely that any AFMembers will drop their union cards to make records. Almost all records are made by "name bands," members of which receive \$7.50 per side. The important bands make around 50 sides a year. Musicians do not share in the royalties from the sale, as a general rule.

The point is that to the relatively few musicians who make records, the work is a source of added income, but not in any sense a means of livelihood.

That musicians, for relatively low pay, create the very instrument that jeopardizes—even eliminates—the jobs of other musicians in radio stations and taverns (which use juke boxes) is therefore an obvious fact.

But there are two sides to all controversies.

The best music one hears on the air—a large portion of the best music presented to the American public—is heard on broadcasts of phonograph records. Record broadcasts have been the biggest factor in helping radio listeners in learning to enjoy good music.

We can't say so much for the juke box industry, but we can say that the juke box gives its nickel's worth of musical pleasure to John Q. Public—

and Susie Q. Public—or the juke box wouldn't exist. The juke box helps people to have a good time. And that's plenty these days.

Even if Petrillo's decree stands in its present form, it will not mean the immediate disappearance of record broadcasts Aug. 1. Petrillo has no legal power to prevent the broadcasting of records.

There are scads of good records available which have never been played to any extent. There is nothing to prevent the manufacturers from digging up the "masters" of these records, many of which were slighted by the public when they were issued but which will now become big hits just by virtue of radio airings, and making as many copies as they wish.

It is interesting to conjecture whether records may be obtained from foreign countries. Remember those records by Jack Hylton, Bert Ambrose, Ray Noble? Some of them were the biggest hits the U. S. ever had. And there are some mighty fine musicians in South America. In normal times it would be no trick at all for recording companies to record in another country and then shoot the "masters" back here for pressing. We don't know that it can't be done right now.

If Petrillo's ruling does actually shut off the supply of records in this country, it will hurt a number of smaller radio stations, some of which might have to shut down.

It will hurt the juke box industry, which definitely needs a constant supply of new records.

It will hurt—possibly kill—the record manufacturing industry.

It will hurt the music publishing business, which relies on records to introduce new tunes as much or more than it relies on radio.

It will hurt the American people, who enjoy listening to records.

But it will NOT hurt musicians.

They will be in a state of strike as far as records are concerned, but they will never have to give in because of economic necessity for the simple reason that practically none of them depends on making records for his livelihood.

On the other hand—will musicians gain enough to justify the harm Jimmy Petrillo would have them do to others?

If they don't, Jimmy Petrillo will have a lot of explaining to do to a lot of people!

What's Going On In the World?

Camera Records A Typical Day With the Richfield Reporter

IN THE exciting, intriguing business of radio newscasting the Richfield Reporter is an institution. The oldest program in radio in the point of continuous broadcasting over the same network (NBC-KFI) for the same sponsor, without change of format, the Reporter is an international radio newspaper now in its 13th year on the airlines. Until the war brought into effect on the West Coast recently a temporary silencing of radio nighttime programs, the Richfield Reporter had aired the news of the world every evening except Sunday, for 12 years without a lapse. This record-breaking feat for consecutive broadcasts began on April 20, 1931. More than 10,000,000 words, representing the best of 10 times that volume of United Press news, have been aired by the Reporter since the late-evening (10 p. m.) NBC program first went out onto the airlines over the Coast chain. Listeners from points as far apart as northern Alaska and south-east Africa have written Wayne Miller, editor of the Reporter, attesting to the clear reception of the news bulletins. (NBC, Hollywood Pics).

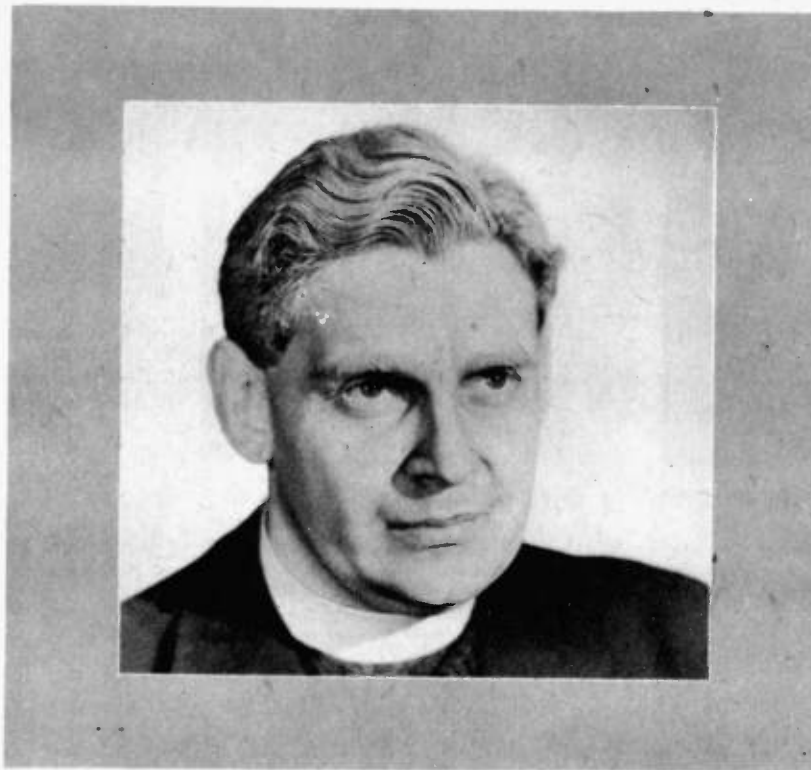

meant, as is his custom, to group his thoughts and verses under one heading, and had chosen "Jealousy" as the day's theme. After watching the old ladies, he switched to "Neighborhood Over the Backyard Fence."

Another day, I saw an old, hermit-type man accost Ted in Radio City. He wanted Malone to look at some of his verses. Instead of giving him the brush-off, Ted bought the old fellow a cup of coffee, listened to his poetry, and accompanied him to his little room in the Bowery where more verses were laid away in a trunk.

Ted used some of the poems and helped him to get the collection published. Not to be outdone, the girls in the office clipped in and bought the newly-recognized author a nice suit, so that he might make the rounds of the book houses.

I agree with the critics who call Malone's the "coziest, parlor voice in America." But it's the human understanding and spiritual power behind that voice which carries over to the radio listener—can even, as it did a few years ago in Portland, prevent a woman from committing suicide. In appreciation for what Ted saved her from, that woman came to New York and insisted on working for Malone for eight months without any pay.

Perhaps you remember Ted's great contribution to American literature—his 50,000 mile tour of the country's author-shrines. He made his circuit in two series, one the "Pilgrimage of Poetry," and the other, "American Pilgrimage." While he was travelling, he broadcast from birthplaces and homes of America's writers, and for you radio listeners he performed such unique sound effects as tapping Mrs. William Cullen Bryant's sewing box, rolling up the shades in Longfellow's home, scratching a line with Poe's pen, hollering down Whittier's well, or hitting a spoon against the outdoor-cooking kettle of Joaquin Miller. These were little things to do, but when Ted Malone wove about them a story of the author's intimate life and then read a few of his verses, it aroused interest in American poetry. That's why I say that Ted Malone, through the medium of radio, has done more than any man in this country to make America conscious of its literary heritage.

For his three weekly radio programs, Ted draws on a huge library of verse which is said to be the largest collection of contemporary poetry in America. Ted can write good verse himself, but he's very modest about reading it.

Each radio program has a central theme which Malone chooses about a week in advance. When time arrives for him to go on the air, he

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seats himself at the studio table and asks for all the lights to be dimmed. He reads by the one near his script. As the lights mellow, the organ starts to weave a beautiful background for the intimately flowing lines which Ted will give to his listeners. Ted's particular about the organ tapestry, but never complains if it isn't "right" according to his way of thinking. He prefers the ad-lib type player at the console and thinks our own Bob Mitchell right here in Los Angeles is one of the finest.

And then, out of the turmoil of the day, comes respite as "Between the Bookends" interrupts the morning's routine and you hear Ted Malone's quiet, cheery greeting, "Hello there!"

Something in his make-up is so tolerant, so understanding, that I am reminded of Joaquin Miller's verse:

"In men whom men condemn as ill
I find so much of goodness still,
In men whom men pronounce divine

I find so much of sin and blot
I do not dare to draw the line
Between the two, where God has not."

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Coming out of the ether

Too often we toot the horn for the quarterbacks of radio, and too seldom for the linesmen. Too often we applaud the antics of the star, when the people marching in the army behind the scenes deserve the roses.

So let us now dedicate a few minutes to these people unloved and unsung. Step up and shake their hands.

THE PRODUCER: He's the fellow who is in over-all charge of the show. He it is who trims out the unfunny comedy, who gives us more music when the show needs a lift, who weighs each minute in the balance and deserves the credit for making a half-hour of our time entertaining and worth the effort spent in listening to it. He's the unsung star of the show.

THE WRITER: Most big shows nowadays have a battery of writers. The job usually is too much for one man. He's the funny man or the dramatist or the poet who performs for his boss, only. He's the fellow you see in the control room laughing harder than anyone else, or frowning the saddest when the show doesn't go so well. He's the lad who listens to other programs and then re-writes the material for his own, or who lays awake in the small morning hours, working out in his mind the details of a sketch or a gag or a plot. Give him a big hand, folks. His job is the toughest of all.

THE ARRANGER: How often we applaud the musical director for a particularly fine musical number. Each time we do, the orchestral arranger sits quietly in the background and feels pretty swell. He's the lad who worked all week on one 4-minute song, just to make it good enough for your ears. He's the fellow who must know the ability of each member of the band, who writes the music, much of it original, to suit the unit as a whole. He, not the director, is responsible for much of the good music we hear.

THE ENGINEER: Poor man! You never hear of him! Yet he's the motor of the engine. He's the lad who sits through long hours of rehearsals, turning a knob here, moving a mike there, so that the sound that comes through your loudspeaker is always at even volume, so that the saxophones won't drown out the violins, so that the sound balance is always perfect. Hats off to the engineer.

He can make or break a program, with a twist of the wrist!

THE TECHNICIAN: He's the first cousin to the engineer, but he's doomed to oblivion. He sits in transmitters from coast to coast, seeing to it that a tube doesn't blow out in the middle of the star's solo, or that a fuse doesn't break while the hero duels the villain in the storybooks of the air. He sees to it that our listening pleasure isn't interrupted by mechanical failures. His job is unglamorous, but he must be remembered when we're passing out the kudos. We owe him a lot; he's made American radio supreme in the world of broadcasting.

THE CENSOR: He rides a barrel of dynamite with a smile. Nobody likes him. He's always at fault when the show goes bad. He's the goat when the comedian lays an egg or the storyteller's mail drops off. Yet the censor is our representative in the program conference. We, the listeners, haven't met him personally, but he knows us intimately. He knows our every whim. He knows what we like and what we don't like in the way of commercial copy. He keeps the minister, the politician, the philosopher, the songwriter, the comedian, the dramatic actor and the newscaster from treading on our toes. If we are offended only once a year by some erring radio performer, we can thank the censor it isn't any oftener. Yes, he gets kicked around. But we like him. And thank Heavens we have him!

These are but a few of the army of people who work 24 hours every day so that we might have a few hours of pleasure and fun and relaxation from that miracle of all-time, the radio.
