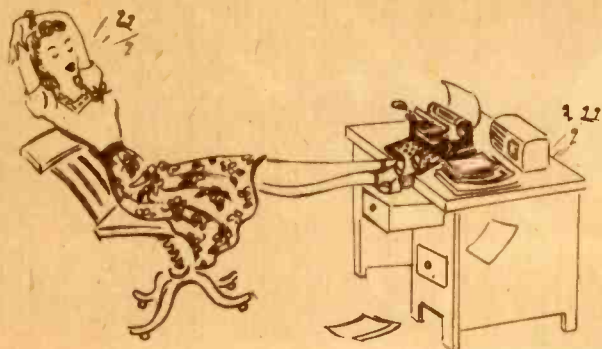

You'd never recognize her by her voice, because that Dago accent she used to manipulate has long since been abandoned. Murray points out that Pasquale, (Minerva Urecal), is a very talented dialectician and just happened to capitalize on the Italian character.

Little "Sally" left show business to marry Walter DuBree, and is the mother of a boy four years old. She's in Philadelphia now. On the old "Hi-Jinx," she played the role of the little dumb dame who always got her words mixed up. She was, in fact, the first of radio's "dumb dames."

Ruth Durrell, soprano of the show, was last heard of in Hong Kong. She was on an American round-the-world tour at the time, fulfilling a life-long ambition. Whether she is a prisoner of the Japs, no one seems to know. Let's hope not.

The male quartet that started on Murray's show has since done very well for itself. In fact it set some sort of precedent the other night by

being the first quartet to sing in Hollywood Bowl. I'm speaking, of course, of the King's Men. They left Murray's show to go with Paul Whiteman and have been big time ever since.

One of the most interesting times Johnny can remember, was the time the "Hi-Jinx" gang tossed a picnic at Calabasas. In order to be invited, you had to buy two dollars worth of the sponsor's bread. Well, there were 30,000 people there! It was some sort of record for that sort of thing.

Another member of the original gang was a talented youngster who could twist his tonsils into those of an old man. He made his biggest early success, though, by imitating an old woman. Remember "Aunt Addie?" Cliff Arquette took that role. He's now "Ben Willett" on "Point Sublime," and various other radio characters.

Then there's Bob Burns. Bob didn't get his start on the "Hi-Jinx" exactly. He was already well-known as one of the stars of the Gilmore Circus, but as a black-face comedian under the title of "Soda Pop." Murray convinced him he would be twice as entertaining as his own natural self, the Arkansas Philosopher. So Burns took a whack at it on the "Hi-Jinx" and was a success. He later spent six months as one of the stars of that program.

We don't want to overlook a youngster named Bob Shafer, a tenor who made the feminine members of the "Hi-Jinx" audience sit up and take notice. Bob sang the lead with the St. Louis Opera this past season, is

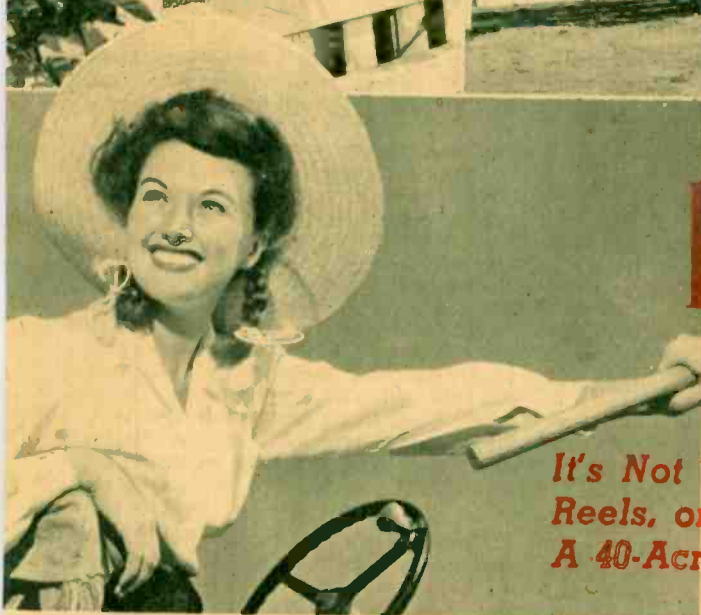

7. It's like pulling teeth to shed my farmerette togs and dress up to go into town. But there's a luncheon date at the Brown Derby. I change upstairs in my lovely bedroom, done in blue and old rose with white organdie curtains. Then a 40-mile-per-hour drive into Hollywood and my favorite meal, a salad.

8. In Studio D at NBC I rehearse with Dave Rose for my "Johnny Presents" program. Dave is such a clever musician and I feel thoroughly fortunate in having him for the show. My writer-director, Myron Dutton, fits into the picture nicely, too. We're all young, ambitious, and anxious to please.

9. I remember the smell of cut alfalfa and mooing of the cows, and get all mixed up as I try to knit between rehearsals. I can't remember whether it's knit two and purl one or drop every other stitch. How're they going to keep me away from the farm? Nuts to civilization and knitting!

# BILL HAY *Reads the Bible His Way*

**B**ILL HAY is back on the air again, reading the Bible. It was years ago when he first read from the Holy Book. At that time he was announcer for Sam and Henry (later to be known as Amos and Andy). Sam and Henry enjoyed a summer hiatus (their one and only) and Announcer Hay occupied the air-time by reading the Scriptures.

The response was so terrific that when Sam and Henry returned for the fall season, Bill Hay had to go on reading the Bible for seven straight years.

Then, in 1935, Hay's Amos and Andy contract forbade his doing any other work than the pair's program. So Hay discontinued his biblical readings. Until last summer, he was still receiving letters asking him when he would return to the air to read the Bible.

Bill Hay is back now, Monday through Friday every afternoon at 3:45 o'clock, and his mail indicates that he is being heard by listeners

from every walk of life, every denomination.

Bill Hay reads the Bible his way. One of his most definite ideas is keeping his presentation simple—because he believes that the grandeur of the Good Book calls for forthright offering.

"Emphatically, no fanfare," Hay comments about the beginning of each day's broadcast. "I am reading from the greatest piece of literature in the world. No build-up is required."

Each day's presentation is woven about a theme which Hay has well in mind. He uses no script. Long experience in radio gives him a sense of timing, so that he is able to estimate what may be read within his quarter hour. Naturally, he prefers not to rush his verses. In case he must lengthen his reading, he has definite passages tabbed for that requirement.

By this, you probably deduce that Hay is familiar with his Old and New Testaments. Briefly, it may be said that he comes of a Scotch family which was deeply religious and that the third week after he came to America as a young man, he joined

a church choir and sang as soloist or quartet member thereafter for 23 years. For five years past, he has been conducting the Easter Sunrise Services at Palm Springs.

One thing Bill Hay insists upon doing when he reads the Bible is to leave verse and chapters unnamed. He feels that for sake of the presentation's theme and unity, he should be free to skip from portion to portion as interest and clarity require.

"For instance yesterday," explains Bill Hay, "I was reading in a certain chapter which led up to a long list of names. Obviously a repetition of names would not enhance the program sufficiently to take time to read them. So I simply bridged over to another passage."

He may have something in the idea, too, that listeners following him with index fingers on lines and verses may not be giving him their undivided attention.

On this point, floods of letters have reached Hay. "Please quote your verse and chapter," they plaint. But Hay insists on reading his way. Whether or not the pressure of his

Davis, who left network commentaries a few months ago to head the government's information office, will come back for a series of talks to the nation, to be aired on all four major networks.

Out of recent huddles between broadcasting officials and Davis will come the announcement of time for the programs, but general opinion favored a weekly quarter-hour and a period early on Saturday evening.

### Will Charm Win?

What has all the earmarks of a deluxe battle of the sexes is the proposed contest between the lovelies of Phil Spitalny's "Hour of Charm," all-girl orchestra, and Abe Lyman's all-man band, current attraction at the Palladium. The encounter will be staged to see whether men or women are smarter at memorizing a musical arrangement.

The whole situation resulted from the recent reunion in Hollywood of Spitalny and Lyman, long-time friends. Some five years ago, along with every one else including Spitalny's own mother, Lyman told Spitalny that he was making a huge mistake when the "Hour of Charm" maestro set out to organize his all-femme aggregation.

Now Lyman, although granting that his friend, Phil, had a brainstorm when he formed his charm-group, still contends that men make better musicians. Spitalny thinks otherwise, and is willing to wager \$1000 that his "Hour of Charm" girls can memorize more rapidly and play better than an all-masculine band.

According to plans being developed, both groups will meet at the Palladium on Monday night, Sept. 28. Each will be shown a special arrangement, which the respective members will run over once and then proceed to

play: KNX hopes to carry the contest on its regular 10:35 p. m. hook-up from the dine-dance palace. The \$1000 will undoubtedly find its way into USO or similar coffers.

### Scoop!

On August 9 Radio Life exclusively predicted that Gracie Fields would do a radio show this fall, and at that time indicated that the only thing holding up proceedings was just a matter of money.

This past week the prediction was confirmed by the news that Gracie is coming back October 12 to do a series of five-minute programs five nights a week over CBS. The show will feature a Yorkshire song done in Gracie's own inimitable manner, and a story.

### Baron Back

Jack Pearl, known to thousands for his Baron Munchausen roles, bows in for a new series over the Mutual-Don Lee network on Wednesday evening, Oct. 14, according to announcements flashed as this issue of Radio Life prepared to go to press.

He will not only bring to the air his "Baron" routine, but a montage of other characters which he has impersonated from time to time. Although aired in the East during the past year, Pearl has not been heard locally for some time. Morton Gould's orchestra will support the actor for the new series.

### Mars Man Back

Radio status of Orson Welles, who recently returned from a South American picture trek, was clarified late last week when news sneaked down the grapevine that he has a show series starting early in October over CBS-KNX.

Welles was provocative of much comment during the time he directed the Lady Esther dramatic series last season. His radio show folded just before he took off for the south.

Monday night has been suggested as the time for the

Welles broadcasts, but the exact day and time have not been determined. It is enough to know that Welles' unusual brand of showmanship will enliven the radio picture during the winter months.

### Fuse Setter

When Theodore Granik, advisor to Chairman of the War Production Board, Donald Nelson, recently paid a hasty visit to the Pacific Coast, Radio Life had an opportunity of seeing the major-league broadcaster set the fuse to the forensic powder bag he explodes every Sunday at 5 in that sizzling Mutual network program, "American Forum of the Air."

Granik possesses an uncanny knack for staging debates on which he acts as moderator. He watches Congressional debates closely, and if a timely question arises in either branch of Congress, he contacts the supporters and opponents and asks them to air their views on the issue. He keeps the forum's program content timed to current Congressional battles and vital questions of the day. His amazing list of contacts includes virtually every senator, representative and important administrative official.

Granik carries an extra shirt to his broadcasts to replace the one which is often wilted by the time he leaves the air. Keeping his emotional orators from blows, and the sound and fury of the debate sane and meaningful requires the skill of a diplomat. If a slight tap on the shoulder doesn't call the speaker to order, Granik adroitly removes the mike, providing he can get it out of the clutches of his argumentative guest who, mayhap, is wildly waving it in the air or using it for a gavel to pound in a point.

When Granik sees the discussion headed toward the revelation of a military secret, he quickly veers the subject in another direction.

Prepared speeches? Canned answers? No, indeed! To open the show each speaker is given an opportunity to state his views on the subject. Possibly this portion of the verbal bout has been prepared, but from there on it's every man for himself and heaven help the hindermost. Knowing Congressmen's and other public officials' penchant for making long-winded speeches, Granik tactfully suggests that introductory remarks be no longer than a column . . . and reminds them to make speeches "no longer than 400 words," with emphasis on the "no longer."

### Records for Victory

More than three-quarters of a ton—that's more than 1500 pounds—of phonograph records were collected at the KHJ-Don Lee studios in the three weeks in which the station, under the direction of George Martin, took part

The records collected ranged in age from 50 years to a few weeks. Mrs. Margaret Mary Garvin, who won the first prize of a \$25 war bond for collecting the greatest amount of records,

—more than 200 pounds,—is generously turning her bond over to the American Legion Auxiliary, Community Unit Number 46, at Culver City.

The \$5 war stamp reserved for the person sending in the oldest record went to J. R. Clark, who sent in some

50 Edison cylinder records, which were at least 50 years old.

KHJ presented to its listeners the program "Swan Song" and played a great many of the old records received. Mr. Clark's venerable Edison machine was used to play the cylinders.

The records collected will be sold to the recording companies and the money obtained will be used to buy new platters for distribution to boys in camps both local and abroad.

## Serviceman Newscaster

Something new on the Western airwaves is a serviceman reporting news, heard each Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday at 12:45 over KECA. "Lieutenant Canady Reports" will replace the Blue Network's "Clete Roberts Reports" broadcast. Clete Roberts reported for duty with the Office of War Information in San Francisco last week and gave Canady a grand sendoff to the radio audience.

Canady is a Senior Grade Lieutenant with the United States Navy reserves, and is public relations officer for the Naval Aviation Cadet Selection Board in the Eleventh Naval District. "Music for Sunday" is unique in that the broadcast will be transcribed exclusively on miniature discs which the boys may take with them right into the front line of battle and play back with their own portable equipment.

This is the first program of its nature attempted for the fighting forces. A religious theme, a boy's choir, the sincerity of a quiet, introspective voice, —all of these are new approaches to



radio's war-time program of aiding fighting morale.

The show is produced by Captain Mann Holmer, newly-commissioned officer in the Special Services division of the Army, who was associated with many top programs in radio before his entrance into the service.

## Marine or Soldier?

"What is a dead marine?", Phil Baker asked a sailor contestant on the CBS "Take It or Leave It" broadcast the other night.

The blue jacket did not know and lost his chance at the \$64 question. Baker announced the answer: "An empty bottle."

Within a few minutes the studio switchboard was deluged with more than 500 calls. "A dead soldier is an empty bottle," insisted the listeners. CBS officials hurriedly got in touch with Baker, who told his audience that he would reconsider the answer.

## What-A-Man Willkie

Diplomat that he is, Wendell L. Willkie fulfilled one of the most delicate missions of his current tour to the satisfaction of all concerned, according to all on-the-spot reports.

Across the mountains of Turkey and over the hot sands of Iran he carried a kiss from Ankara and bestowed it, on schedule, on the lips of Mary Brock, NBC's reporter now stationed on Teheran, Iran.

Mary Brock is the wife of Ray Brock, New York Times correspondent at Ankara.

After greeting the host of diplomatic and military officials, who welcomed him after his plane swept down on the airport at Teheran, Willkie at once sought out Mrs. Brock, who happened to be the only woman present.

"Your husband at Ankara asked me to give you his love," he told Mrs. Brock. "In fact," Willkie added with his big grin, "He told me to kiss you."

Whereupon, in the words of Mrs. Brock as cabled to NBC, "mission carried out most satisfactorily on spot."

## Song of War

There is no song of World War II! And radio is the reason. So says Ted Collins, manager of the CBS star, Kate Smith, who has drawn attention to the fact that there is no hit tune of the 1942 conflict! "Today's popular melodies either have no reference to the war, such as 'Kalamazoo' or they are sentimental like 'The White Cliffs of Dover.' There is no 'Over There' or 'Tipperary.'"

Radio is the reason for that, he thinks. People are closer to the war now than they were in 1917. Into their homes comes the latest news of battling abroad, of air triumphs, or land defeats. There was no radio news commentator in World War I. Reports from the front came in the newspaper, once a day, and they were not quite

so startling because news was a little older than present radio revelations. Because war comes to them so constantly via the air waves, today's listeners are deeply serious, absorbed in the conflict most of the day and night. They want their music to be, not belligerent, but restful, to help them find escape and, above all, hope for the future.

Dinah Shore, Blue Network singer, got an insight on the Collins theory regarding the present musical war trend when she received a recent request from an artillery battery in Alaska. The boys had voted as their favorite, "My Man," the old-time tear-jerker made famous by Fanny Brice long before the present war was thought of.

Frank Forest, Don Lee Broadcasting tenor, believing that music expresses the true thoughts of a nation, began collecting one song, most liked by a nation at war, from each warring country long before the United States joined the United Nations. Forest says of America, "The best song written for our country has not been written. Wherever I go, I keep listening. Some day I will hear it and it will go in my album."

The album now contains these mel-

odies: "There'll Always Be An England," from England; "My Sister and I," Holland; "Waltzing Matilda," Australia and Canada; "Chee Lai," China; "Tachanka" and "Meadowland," Russia.

Rather than an angry belligerency each of these songs carries hope, humor, or belief in the victorious future.

When they find time from school and broadcasts, the Quiz Kids do some quizzing of their own around their neighborhoods, asking for books, magazines, and needed scrap for current government defense drives.

**W**HEN "The Moon Comes Over the Mountain," Kathryn Elizabeth Smith is usually going home from a CBS broadcast but, when the sun comes up on vacation time, the famous singer gives a refined version of an Indian war whoop and gets busy on her hobbies.

To find Kate Smith pursuing hobbies, one would have to look many places. Kate might be found at an art center, from Bohemian Provincetown to experimental Pittsburgh or conservative and radical New York. Again, she might be discovered down in a dusty basement of a book shop searching for first editions. Perhaps her head might be glimpsed over the

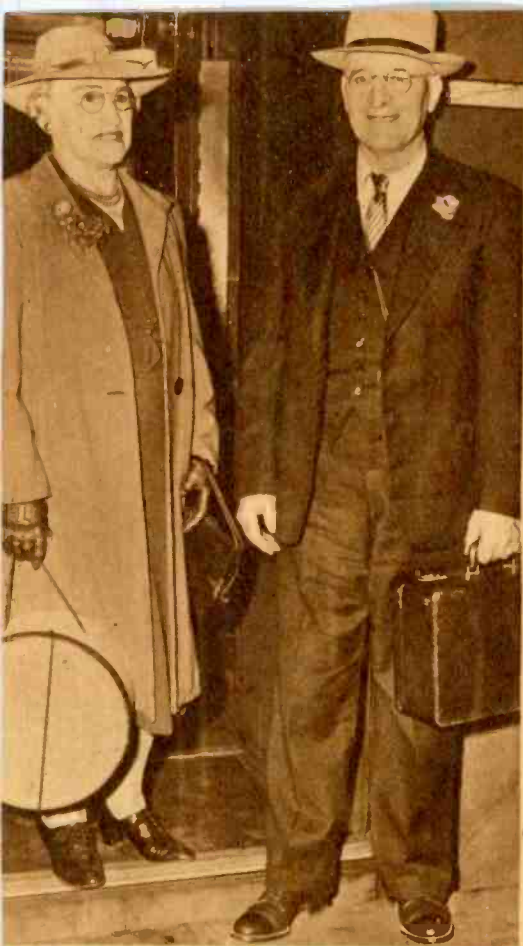
Photography, which is rapidly becoming all-American on the team of hobbies for this country's population, also fascinates Miss Smith.

Her authorities secured the case from the probate court files of DuPage County, Illinois, and four months later, Mrs. Lloyd, 69, and her bridegroom of a year arrived in New York to appear on the air show and spend a belated honeymoon with some of the money.

For the old woman supplicating for a few pennies, the word came too late. But since the "Missing Heir" program started in Oct. 1937, its creators, James Waters and Alfred Shebel, have located 119 persons who have

There's no conjurer's trick about their method. Waters, a law graduate, and Shebel, a former radio advertising man, dig unclaimed estate cases out of musty files in probate court. A staff of five investigators combs the 3,000-odd probate courts of the country, and when

**HELEN LOUISE HERROLD** inherited \$13,000 as the result of the "Missing Heir" program. Helen Louise, 24-year-old wife of John Owen, a Chicago artist, lost both parents before she was seven. An aunt in Cleveland became her guardian. Later, another aunt and uncle in Akron provided her with a home. During September, 1935, while she was attending high school in Akron, Helen Louise disappeared. When her case was brought to the attention of "Are You a Missing Heir?", all that was known about her was that she had assumed the name of Jane Hart. She was discovered in Florida, where she and her husband were seeking employment. For the intervening six years, she had traveled about the country, hitch-hiking and working as a waitress.

**SAMUEL BRUCE WHITE JR.**, 25, inherited an estate of \$11,000. The money represented the savings of his father, who worked aboard ship of a South American passenger line between Brazil and New Orleans, who died aboard the S. S. Deltargentino, and was buried at sea April 20, 1941. When search for the son was instituted, it was known that he was working as a traveling salesman somewhere in the territory of Mississippi, but the firm employing White Jr. was unknown. The case, aired July 29, 1941, brought no response until Aug. 19, when word came that White was in the army. Then a St. Louis woman notified the program that he was stationed in that city. Sept. 2, Pvt. Bruce White, Flight 4, 31st School Squadron, Jefferson Barracks, showed up in New York to appear on the broadcast and claim his \$11,000.

**O**N APRIL 2, 1941, a destitute 83-year-old woman tossed on a sick bed in Ft. Worth, Texas, and between spurts of delirium, begged for 15 cents.

That very same day, the Court of Missing Heirs was effecting a contact with the woman, Mrs. Susan Nichols, to inform her that she was one of the heirs to the famous \$367,000 Dodson oil fortune of Wichita, Kansas.

Two days later, Mrs. Nichols died, a victim of malnutrition. She never knew that she had come into a heritage estimated between 25 and 50 thousand dollars. Ironically, a portion of the \$5,000 cash advance from the estate went for her funeral expenses.

Mrs. Nichols' share of the Dodson wealth was claimed by her daughter, Mrs. Blanche Lackey. Too weak to journey alone, she was accompanied to New York by a traveling companion and on April 22 appeared on

a suitable case is uncovered, an attempt to locate the heirs is made on the "Missing Heir" program. The average recovery of money left unwilling is figured out roughly to be \$7500 per located heir.

There's nothing prosaic about the work done by Waters and Shebel, although the grim specter of the Old Reaper hovers over most of their research. They deal with charged situations and with very live people who are, or should be, interested in getting their share of rewards left by some provident departed.

As a sample case: Somewhere in the world at this moment there is, or we hope there is, a Negro. His name is Gabe McElroy. In early life his stamping ground was the cotton and cattle sections of Texas. He came from Rusk County in West Texas, where his parents had purchased a small piece of land. Gabe left the soil of his forebears and went out to glean souls for the Lord's vineyard. That was 15 years ago.

While he was out gleaning, Old Mother Nature bled wealth out of the pores which covered the land owned by Gabe's parents. The bleeding was oil, now estimated to be worth \$100,000,000.

It's quite likely that if any

reader of *Radio Life* should run into Mr. Gabe McElroy and apprise him of his fortune, he would be rewarded handsomely.

People do funny things with the money that comes to them unexpectedly through the good offices of Waters and Shebel. Their reactions to sudden wealth afford graphic material for students of human nature.

Among some of the things people have done:

An airplane pilot's wife, receiving \$5000, gave this to her husband. He purchased a plane.

In Pittsburgh a crippled pencil beggar took his money to buy a chicken farm and win back the wife who had left him 20 years before.

A man who received \$13,000 sailed to Cuba, bought two horses, and lingered to play the races.

A 70-year-old man who lived at a cheap hotel and who earned 75 cents and two meals a day as a drugstore errand boy, refused to change his living habits after inheriting \$6500. He continued with his 40-cent-a-day room and became the neighborhood Good Samaritan, distributing dimes and quarters to less fortunate friends.

Rawlins Phillips, a Chicago fac-

tory worker, got \$85,000. The first thing he bought was a bathrobe. He'd been wanting it for three years.

The unimaginative habit people have of taking similar names often poses problems for the heir-finders. A Frank Harmon was sought to receive \$5000. When his story was broadcast, more than 600 persons responded, all claiming they were, without doubt, THE Frank Harmon. Selecting the right man required eight weeks of scrutiny.

Along with harmless traits, the program has uncovered one of extremely uncommendable nature. There are harpies in human form who listen to the air program, and note sex, age, and address of heirs or heiresses. Single men and women, no matter what their age, are swamped with letters offering marriage, asking favors, or suggesting money-making inventions.

"I am a blue-eyed girlie," wrote an admirer to George Ruge, the 70-year-old delivery boy who received \$6500. "Come and live with us, pay the mortgage, and we'll all be just one big happy family the rest of our lives." Within a half hour after Mrs. Jessie Stadstead appeared on the program to claim her \$12,500, she received two proposals of marriage.

To date no heir has ever paid any attention to these offers.

In some cases, drama often reaches a high level.

Down a country road one night in Indiana, walked one of life's army

When found as an heir, he was living in a 40-cent-a-day room and working as a drugstore errand boy. For almost three years previous to his hotel accommodations, Ruge had existed in city subways, exiting only to beg a few cents for food and fare back into the tunnel. On the night of Ruge's appearance on the "Missing Heir" program, he acted as host at a gala dinner party given in the only two-room suite in the Mills Hotel, New York. A few of Ruge's cronies, plus Salvator Ruiz and Patrick Dunn, attended the affair. Ruiz and Dunn, night clerks of the Mills, were the people who heard the "Missing Heir" program and the request for information about 70-year-old George Ruge, who, when last heard from, was living in New York. Their recognition of the elderly man led to establishment of his claim.

Showing How a Bit of Cellophane  
And a Few Grains of Birdseed  
Pack Realism Into Listening

**T**HE WAR has closed the doors on tours of radio studios. No longer is it possible to enter those dramatic laboratories where technical magicians create realistic illusions for your "air ears." Those rooms which, for an admission price of 40 cents, were entered in 1941 by 48,189 people at CBS . . . 58,000 at NBC!

So Radio Life takes you for a 1942 inspection of the CBS sound department! First let's see the division most affected by the war—battle noises! Since Pearl Harbor, the sounds of war have been needed in quantities. Yet, bullets are required for fighting men. New, powerful airplane motors have a higher-pitched "sing" than their pre-war brethren. Sound men have successfully solved every problem! Airplane sounds, actually recorded, present one of the toughest jobs in radio—work on the turntable. Al Span, director of the CBS sound effects department, as well as writer and producer, declares, "The job of synchronizing three different war records on the turntable and making them sound like one genuine battle is a real job!" But sound men, who Span believes must

be men of dreams and imagination as well as expert technicians, turn out realistic battle effects.

Occasionally a recording triumph results from an accident. Span, slowing down a record of an airplane idling, had the perfect imitation, long sought, of a cricket's chirping. Cliff Thorsness, with earphones on his head, checking on an air "dog fight" on Gene Autry's program out at March Field, suddenly heard an effect not worked out in rehearsals but fitting in magnificently with the sounds of battle. Looking up, he saw a 4-motored B-17 Bomber taking off the field.

Let's look in on some of the sounds that fool you! When is surf not surf? When is it bird seed on a drum. When is fire not fire? When it is crumpled cellophane. Lightly crumpled in the fingers, it produces the sizzle of bacon frying; tightly squashed it becomes the blazing inferno of a forest fire. A vibrating motor and a genuine snake's rattles on wire provide a rattlesnake's rattles. A suitcase full of broken dishes, odds and ends of cutlery, creates the "falling down stairs" chaos. A box

and motor make a canary sing . . . and stop in a second. A rheostat offers the "voices under water" illusion made famous in Walt Disney's scene with Pinocchio and the whale. Two miniature oars, one with cork, the other with cork and leather, brushing against wood, give the dull bump of a boat hitting against its dock.

Small wheels in a box of gravel are responsible for the dignified roll of carriage wheels drawing up along a graveled driveway. The famous wheel of Major Bowes', "around, around she goes, where she stops nobody knows" is, in reality, a huge circle of wood, studded with long nails, bearing a piece of celluloid which hits the nails in passing. Miniature doors supply various sounds, one of a copy of a house door; another with heavy glass creating the picture of a bank; still another, with midget iron bars, giving the click of a jail door.

Other sounds are created by reality, such as the highly-prized NBC recording of Hitler's troops marching through Berlin, obviously impossible to duplicate.

For CBS real-life sounds, clocks fill

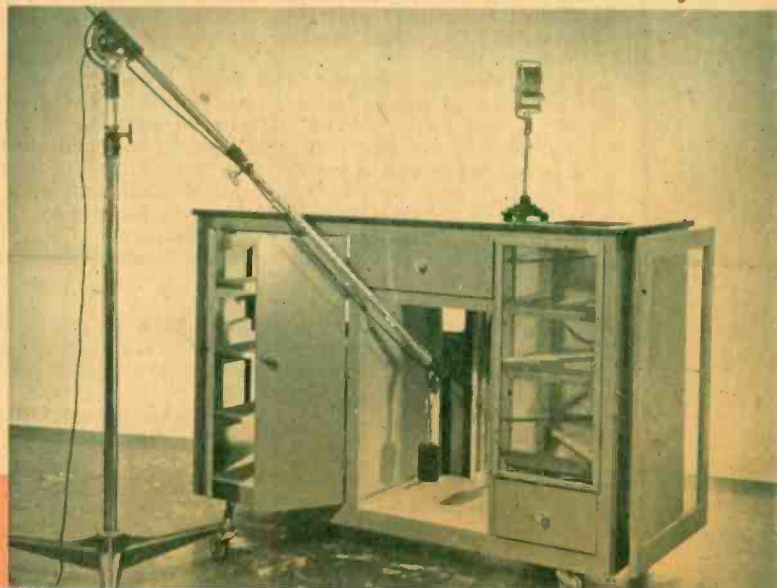

shelf after shelf, adjusted to tick, strike or ring an alarm. Cash registers come in varying sizes. Telephones, private and public style, ring, buzz a busy signal, dial, do everything but get numbers!

Sound men constantly find adventure. Once, Cliff Thorsness nearly landed in an insane hospital. Driving along a country road, he sighted an old farmhouse, high on a windy hill. Delighted, he asked the elderly woman opening the door if he might come in and get the wind sound inside the house. Asking him to wait a few minutes, she telephoned. Next thing Cliff knew, policemen arrived on the porch to carry him to a private cell.

Here is a sound effect truck designed for use at Pasadena's new station, KWKW, by Program Director Dwight A. Hauser. This truck features a dozen different effects which have been completely assembled into one. Auto doors, regular doors, thunder screen, glass crash box, window effects, roller shade, Venetian blinds, and shelves for manual effects are some of the units incorporated in the cabinet.

of lost and unnamed. Somewhere along the road, he turned to face the glare of automobile headlights, to raise his thumb in the well-known gesture of the hitch-hiker.

Confused was the driver as the apparition loomed up in the lights.

Confused, too, was John Doe. His desperate jump aside was matched by the swerving of a wheel. There was the horrible sound of metal striking frail flesh.

In the wayside morgue, among the effects of the unknown, were found \$10,000 in crisp \$100 bills. The only identification was a union card cut cleanly in half by the accident. The other half was nowhere to be found. The half the police did hold bore only a first name. The union, contacted, could disclose nothing helpful. Plastic surgery restored the dead man's face. His picture was given national circulation, and his case was dramatized on the "Missing Heir" program. Six months later, John Doe was identified and a grand-niece received the estate.

Search for missing heirs is continuous. Sleuthing never ceases, no matter how cold the clues. While Waters' and Shebel's research staff ferret out unclaimed estates, other assistants are busily employed preparing air dramatizations of missing heir stories. To these programs, thousands listen every week in hopes that theirs may be the "good fortune" to inherit. Lending still further momentum and appeal to the search are the program sponsors, who offer \$50 to the person from whom is first received information which, in the opinion of the administrators of the estate, leads to the discovery of any missing heirs.

There's an old story about a prosperous cafe owner, who collapsed from hunger one day because he was too busy to eat. It was a parallel in the air histories of Waters and Shebel. They have located a grand total of \$170,000,000 which awaits lucky claimants.

But they have been so busy connecting heirs and heritages that neither Water nor Shebel has made his own will!

*William L. Shirer*

**Complete Paradox**

**W**ILLIAM SHIRER, well-known CBS correspondent and author of "Berlin Diary," is radio's complete paradox. You are familiar with Shirer as the commentator with the quiet, conversational tone, who speaks as though he were just chatting with friends. Yet the owner of this calm, metallic voice has probably lived under greater stress than any other correspondent during his time in Europe.

As you probably recall, Shirer's colorful career began when, fresh out of college, he stood viewing the world from Cedar Rapids, with no job in sight but a scheme in his head. He borrowed \$200 from an uncle and his college president, sailed for Europe on a cattle-boat and went about seeing England, Belgium and France.

By the time he was within three days of returning on the vessel, he had \$10 of the \$200 left. Then he landed a job in the Paris office of the Chicago Tribune.

A record of his assignments from 1925 to date reads like ports of call on a round-the-world tour—London, Geneva, Rome, Brussels, Amsterdam, Berlin, Vienna, the Balkans, near

East and India. Shirer spent some of his most fascinating years traveling up and down India with Gandhi.

Shirer has his humorous side, even in the midst of danger. Discerning American listeners caught his message several years ago when he spoke from Berlin, but gave little actual news, dwelling instead upon the studio hosts. "They are very nice to me," reported Shirer, "they have been with me constantly. In fact they are standing right beside me as I talk to you."

The mystical, inner side of Shirer's nature was revealed when he took up the study of Hindu philosophy. The extent of his comprehension was expressed shortly after he left India and said: "In my opinion, Gandhi is the greatest man of our times."

Last fall, the eminent news analyst visited Southern California and addressed the Lockheed-Vega employees at a picnic. For them, he painted a vivid warscape, intensified by a contrast report of conditions among American and German workers.

Concluding his remarks, he testified: "I know you boys make good planes. I've been bombed by them at least half a dozen times!"

# Chef Milani's Page on Foods

## PIE A LA LEFTOVERS:

*Pie is the answer to the problem of what to do with leftovers like meat and several small dabs of vegetables. Just combine them all. Be sure though, that the meat is cut up into small pieces. Then pour a can of tomato sauce over the mixture, or better still, if your leftovers include some gravy, use that instead. Now into the oven with the whole thing. Leave it there until good and warm. In the meantime you have made some biscuits. You now camouflage the leftovers with the biscuits. Put the biscuits on top and then back into the oven until they are done. And*

*there you are—a beautiful pie a la leftovers!*

## SET YOUR TABLE:

*No matter how much freedom—or should we say imagination—you use on your table decorations, convention still has the last word on what to do with the knife and fork.*

*The usual silver setting includes the dinner fork and knife, and a salad fork. If you prefer, the small luncheon fork may be used for the salad, and incidentally, it is perfectly correct to use the small luncheon knife to cut your salad if it needs it. The last item is the soup spoon, if you*

*are serving soup. Of course the forks are placed to the left, the salad fork next to the plate, and the knives and spoon to the right. There is a bread and butter dish with its knife above the forks, and a glass above the knife.*

*If your courses run in the following order, you dispose of your service accordingly. When you remove the soup, the soup spoon is taken off. After the entree, the dinner plate, the knife and fork are removed leaving only the salad fork, bread and butter plate, and the water glass. At the end of the salad course everything is removed but the water glass. The dessert, the dessert spoon or fork, the coffee and its small spoon, if it is a demi-tasse, or a teaspoon if it's a regular size cup of coffee, are now brought in.*

*Naturally the whole thing depends upon your courses. The best rule to remember is this: Just use the silverware you need for your style of eating. The list given above is very general, and you can substitute wherever your menu demands it.*

## AN AROMA:

*Have you ever wondered what to do about that smell of cabbage cooking in the house? We all love cabbage. It is so good, but, oh, the—aroma. The Colonial housewives could have told you what to do. It's a little complicated, but don't let that worry you. First of all, get a shovelful of burning coals. That is the complicated part. Then you sprinkle on it a pinch or two of powdered cloves and carry the whole thing around the house for a while. It not only eliminates the cooking odors—it also makes the house smell clean and sweet. It is really a good way to settle the burning question of what to do about an aroma.*

## Chef's Famous Dollar Dinner for 4

Tenderoni Pie                      Banana Squash  
Lettuce—Oil and Lemon Dressing  
Bread and Butter  
Jello  
Coffee

### Recipe for Tenderoni Pie

2 packages tenderoni  
1 minced onion  
Parsley  
1 clove garlic  
6 eggs  
Seasonettes  
Salt and pepper  
 $\frac{1}{4}$  pound oleomargarine

Saute the minced onion, parsley and garlic in four tablespoons oleomargarine until a golden brown. Let three quarts of water and three teaspoons salt boil rapidly. Add two packages tenderoni and boil for seven minutes, or until tender: drain well and let cool. Beat 6 eggs and season with 1 teaspoon of Seasonettes,  $\frac{1}{2}$  teaspoon salt and a dash of pepper. Mix well with the tenderoni, and the sauted onion, garlic and parsley. Put  $\frac{1}{4}$  pound oleomargarine into a large thick frying pan and when melted, pour the tenderoni mixture in the pan to form a pie. Cover and cook slowly until the bottom of the pie is nicely browned. Uncover, place a plate on top, and turn the pan over. Return the pie to the pan and brown on the other side.
