I think children who depend solely

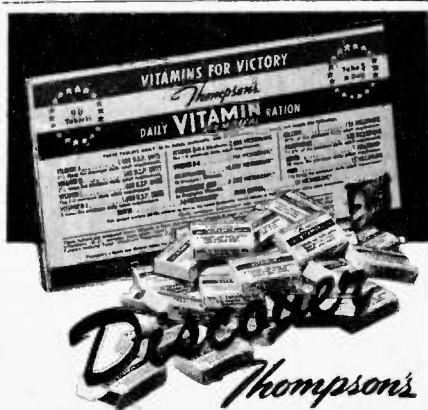
## ENJOY INEXPENSIVE PRIZE - WINNING ORANGE MARMALADE

It's Easy To Make Anytime With This Simple Recipe

- 6 Medium Sized Oranges  
(2 lbs. Sliced)
- 6 Cups Water
- ½ Cup Lemon Juice  
(About 6 lemons)
- 1 Package M.C.P. Pectin
- 9½ Level Cups Sugar  
(Measured ready for use)

1. Cut oranges in cartwheels with very sharp knife to make slices thin as possible. Discard the large flat peel ends. Sliced fruit should weigh 2 pounds.
2. Put sliced fruit in 8-quart kettle. Add the water and lemon juice.
3. Bring to a quick boil; boil gently for 1 hour (uncovered). If peel is not tender in 1 hour, boil until tender.
4. Measure the cooked material. Due to boiling, the volume will be reduced below 7 cups. Add water to make total peel and juice exactly 7 cups.
5. Put back in kettle. Stir in M.C.P. Pectin; continue stirring and bring to a full boil.
6. Add sugar (previously measured). Stir gently until it has reached a full rolling boil, and BOIL EXACTLY 4 MINUTES. Remove from fire; skim and stir by turns for 5 minutes.
7. Pour into jars. If you use pint or quart jars, seal hot and invert jars on lids until Marmalade begins to set. Then, shake well and set jars upright. This keeps the peel evenly distributed throughout.

**NOTE:** This recipe works equally well with Navel Oranges or Valencias. When either variety is over-ripe and peel is soft, use ¾-cup Lemon Juice instead of ½-cup. (Be sure to discard any seeds.) This recipe makes 7 pounds of prize-winning Orange Marmalade.

**B**ING DIDN'T know it. How could he, standing there on the stage of Loew's Jersey City Theater, nonchalantly crooning "Just an Echo" to a packed, breathless house, while shy little Eddie Lang plucked an accompaniment on his guitar?

Bing couldn't know . . . that out in that sea of countenances peered the wistfully thin face of an 18-year-old Hoboken lad. A lad who had brought his best girl to the show to see and hear the crooner . . . who

*That's For Me!*

had bought his admission tickets from the \$25 a week wages he was making as junior sports editor for the Jersey Observer.

Bing finished, and the young couple walked out onto the street. The boy spoke up: "That's for me! I quit my job tomorrow morning. I'm going to sing!"

So the hollow-faced Hoboken boy with a yen to warble, quit his newspaper job and started to vocalize.

Today, he is singing as the adored baritone of millions . . . Frank Sinatra, the gaunt-looking interpreter of ballads with a caress in his voice and an obstinate fringe of curly, brown hair falling down over his right eye; the "Hit Parade's" stellar attraction, of whom the Lucky Strike sponsor thinks so highly that it recently expended \$4,000 a week to cut Hollywood-sojourning Sinatra into a New York-originating program . . . the young crooner, who wraps his frail frame around a mike, sways slightly as he sings, and gives out with such a sincere, wistful appeal that every girl in the audience is positive he is chanting just to her—so she heaves a sigh, muffles an "ah," and looks at him with adulation.

Frank Sinatra, the greatest sensation since Bing Crosby caught on . . . the popular warbler whose single appearance at Hollywood Bowl pulled that aristocratic sponsor of Bach and Beethoven \$12,500 out of the red . . . not least, the sensitive lad who vies with Bing in popularity polls, but who still says of The Groaner: "I idolize him. What I want most is to be on his radio show. Not even to sing. Just to work with him."

Some persons insist that Sinatra is merely a fad. After we talked with him, for two and a half hours, we were convinced that he has worked hard for this phenomenal cloud-burst of success and that he will, if properly handled, become an institution—like Bing.

"I can remember," Frank said, "when Crosby was getting his first success. I argued with a lot of people because they thought he was a fad. I didn't."

Frank has always been crazy about music. Until he had finished high school, his singing was confined to the school glee club and a little warbling at a party.

"The kids thought I could sing better than any of the other boys, so I'd have to get up and perform."

He was an only son, born of a fair-complexioned mother whose parents came to this country from Genoa and of a dark-complexioned Sicilian father who was brought to this country when he was six months old. The Sinatras planned that their son should attend college. His high school courses pointed toward this training.

When Frank, at 17, was graduated from Demarest High School in Hoboken and told his father he wanted to become an entertainer, Mr. Sinatra flashed an angry finger in the

direction of the door and ordered: "Get the h--- out of here!"

Frankie got out. He found a job in the Jersey Observer's circulation department. He was supposed to lay the piles of newspapers gently down on the sidewalk; instead, he threw them.

"The insurance companies were after me 15 or 20 times to give me heck," he recalled. "Lots of busted windows."

One day, he had a chance to advance upstairs for another job in the editorial department. Frankie took one look around this bustling room where writers huddled over their typewriters.

"That's for me!" he said to himself. He started to run errands as a copy boy, but all the time, Frankie had his eye on a typewriter job. His girl friend, Nancy, who had taken a

business course, helped him and encouraged him to attend night school. Within a year, partly because he was so ambitious to write and partly because he was a lazy copy boy and was always jamming up the delivery chute rather than walk up six flights of stairs, Frankie Sinatra was established as The Observer's junior sports editor.

"I was awfully prejudiced," he remarked. "I favored my own high school and it burned the others up. I got more mail than anybody else on the paper. The letters usually started out: 'You stink, you bum! How do you get that way saying that . . .'"

# Maestro with Pen and Ink

Clever Cugat Can Caricature  
Whenever Baton-Waving Bored

XAVIER CUGAT, maestro of Latin-American rhythms on the Dubonnet show, wagged his head in despair. He was standing by the podium in Studio A, his hands in hopeless gesticulation. But there was an unmistakable twinkle in his eyes and a broad smile flashing below his beak-like nose and brushy moustache.

"They drivin' me crazy!" he protested.

"They" meant all his fans who had discovered that Cugat can concoct perfectly fascinating caricatures. Concocting them is his hobby.

If ever clever Cugat becomes bored with baton waving, caricatures may easily become his vocation.

"I hav' three brothers who are arteests," he explained. "Francis is motion peecture color director. Albert is commercial arteest, and Henry ees also arteest."

Engaging Cugat, who heralded the 20th century by getting himself born in Barcelona on January 1, 1900, and who debuted as a violinist with the Cuban symphony when he was six, went to school with two famous artists, Sem and Sirrio. When he was 16, he toured the world as violinist and accompanist with Enrico Caruso.

"He was a great cartoonist," Cugat pointed out. "Backstage at the Met he made many drawings while waiting to go on."

The maestro follows a habit of studying faces and capturing their owners' personalities. Sometimes it takes two hours to get that "certain something," but the minute it is discovered, Cugat hastily sketches on whatever is handy—a menu, a letter, a sheet of music.

The 'Night and Day' arrangement might have a page missing—and turn out to be the one Cugat has made his drawings on.

"Once I used bullfight teickets," he grinned.

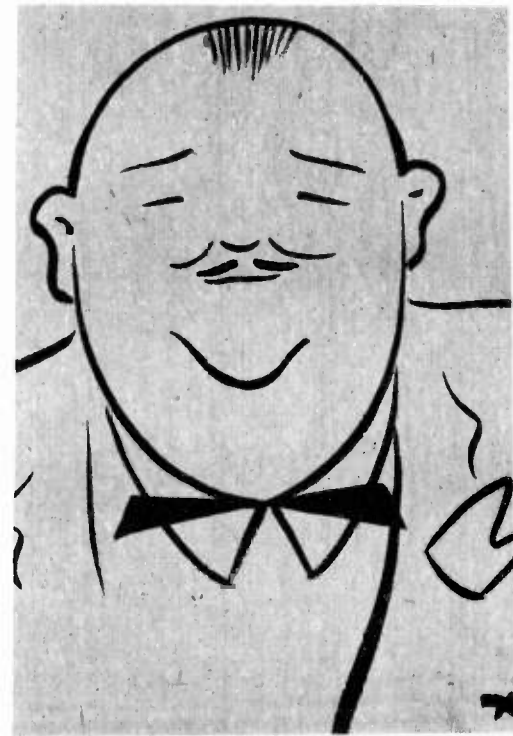
The original of the Tom Breneman caricature accompanying this article was sketched on a "Breakfast at Sardi's" song sheet.

The maestro never caricatures from a photograph. "There ees no character," he claims. "If you hav' crooked mouth, the photographer feex it up!"

By now, the caricature library of Cugat numbers 30,000.

He has had ample opportunity to meet scores of famous persons on his world tours. When playing a lengthy engagement at New York's Waldorf, he saw the King of Spain and Queen of the Belgians. Every

night, near and near-great danced past his podium.

Cugat thinks Mrs. Roosevelt is the most caricaturgenic person in the United States, followed closely by the President.

"Wallace is terreific, too!" he added. "A politician ees always a pleasure!"

The only persons he really exaggerates in caricature are his wife

and himself. He has drawn her so many times that now she looks in her mirror and sees herself as Cugat caricatures her.

Last month, the maestro started a King Feature Syndicate caricature called "Birthday of the Day," in which he supplies a daily drawing of some notable celebrating a birthday anniversary.

He lightly mentioned that he had done some work 14 years ago for

the rotogravure section of the Los Angeles Times and that he had created the Curtain of the Stars for Grauman's Chinese Theater.

"Someday," he concluded, "I will make a book on the theengs I hav' seen from my music stan'. But not unteel I cross the border." Then addressing the Radio Life reporter directly, he twinkled:

"I mak' your caricature, too—after thees story ees out!"

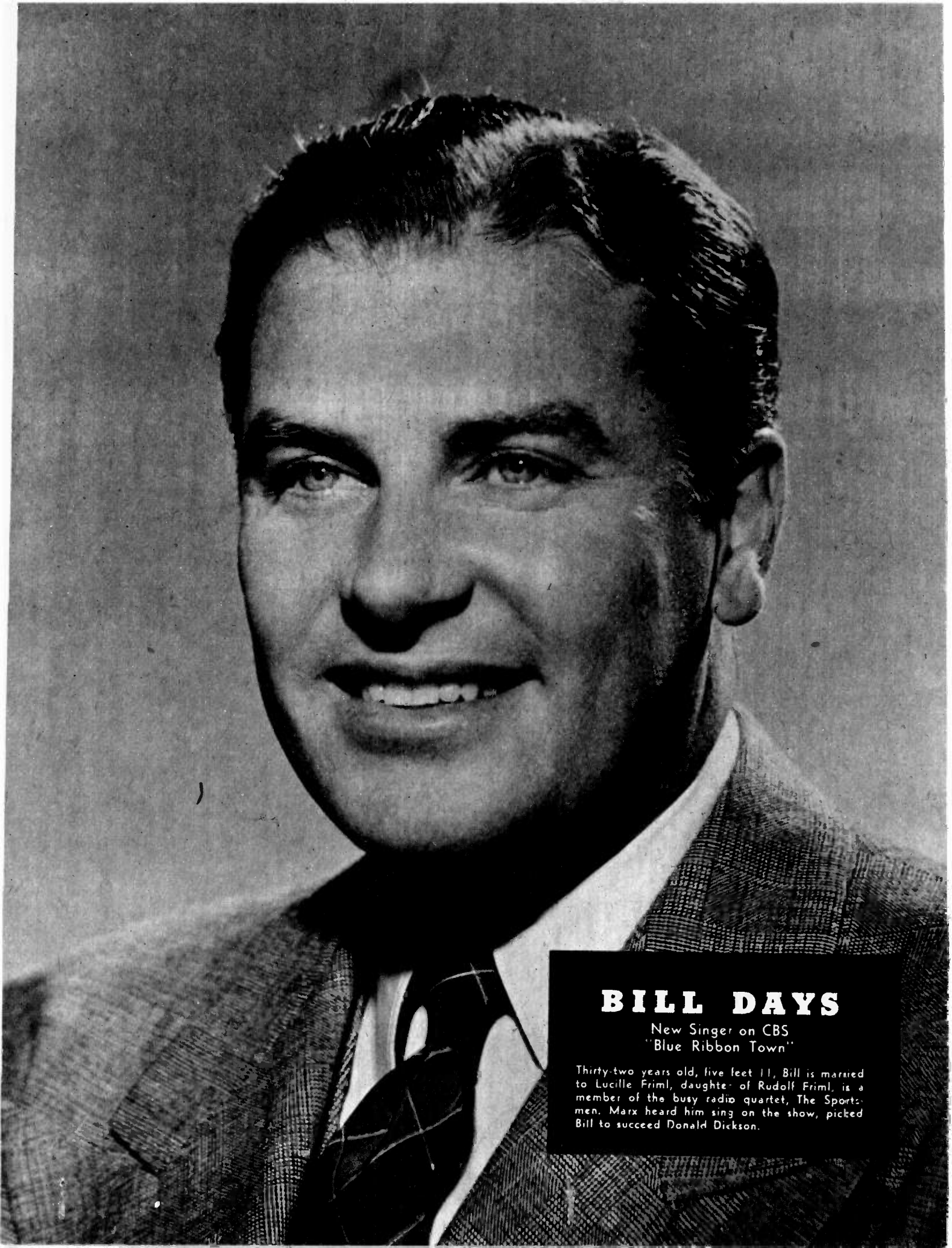

### Football Prospects

"Football this season promises to be full of incongruities." It was big, hearty Frank Bull speaking. He was sitting behind a huge glass-topped desk in his private office at Smith and Bull Advertising Agency.

Behind him, on two walls, were hundreds of badges—blue, red, green, gold—representing hundreds of athletic events Bull has covered for radio. These included track meets, swimming meets, tennis meets, boat races.

Among the badges were autographed pictures of the many, many sports celebrities Bull has known—football stars, coaches, baseball players, prize fighters, tennis, track and basketball luminaries.

We were anxious to learn for Radio Life's sports fans what Bull's outlook was for the current season.

"It's hard to say," he told us, puffing reflectively at a big cigar. "Many great grid stars, all-Americans and

professionals, now are training here at leading colleges and universities. They are a tremendous aid to coaches, who are not too happy with the new, raw talent they have to work with.

"Only trouble is, most of these powerful grid stars of former years are apt to be called for foreign service or sent to any one of a hundred other stations throughout the country, as they finish their training here.

"On the other hand, by the same procedure, western colleges and universities are apt to be reinforced with fresh grid material from other parts of the country.

"So you see, it's just about impossible to make any predictions, either for teams or individual stars."

Bull favors the Del Monte Pre-Flight Navigators as a likely top team of the Pacific Coast, since their roster includes many all-Americans and pro stars.

The Fourth Army team at March Field likewise looks like a good bet,

under coach Major Paul Schessler, who has many members of last year's team back in the lineup, plus added college and pro stars.

But Jeff Cravath of USC expects to lose his entire starting squad to the service this Fall, Bull said.

"Yes," he reiterated, "Football this season promises to be full of incongruities," he said, "with star members of former rival squads now training at the various colleges and universities. USC, for example, is conditioning Navy and Marine Corps men who formerly were on other west coast teams.

"But the coaches have asked sportscasters to give these boys every break, and fans, also, are learning to root for men who in the past were hated rivals.

"That's how the war is affecting football. It's bringing a stronger unity to team members and fans alike than we've ever before known."

### Come True

When Frank Sinatra was here a few weeks ago, he told Radio Life that what he wanted most in radio was to be a guest on Bing Crosby's show and have a show of his own, opposite, say, Jack Benny.

Well, Frank's latter wish has come true. His summer program, which filled in for Lux, is being spotted on KNX Sunday afternoon, but at 5 o'clock, opposite Bergen McCarthy. Bert Wheeler will be a regular, and there will be guest stars. Probably no sponsor, because Sinatra is tied up to Luckies for another year.

### Fields Delayed

Gracie Fields, English singer-comedienne who spent her radio vacation in her native land, and in war zones entertaining troops, was delayed in getting passage back across the Atlantic to this country. Hence, her radio series scheduled to take off on October 11 over KHJ-Mutual has been set ahead to October 18. At this writing she is aboard a train for the West coast.

### A. and C. Return

Looks as if Lou Costello's return to the air is definite.

Last week, the doctors told chubby Costello, who has been off the air since last spring, that he could count on November 4 as date of his return with Bud Abbott. Until then, Durante and Moore will double over from their CBS show for the same sponsor, Camels.

### Worth A Trip!

Commuting to her job, as it were, some time this autumn, will be NBC's Ginny Simms. The singing emcee of "Johnny Presents" will make a trip to New York—her first since she became a radio star in her own right. Chief purpose for the jaunt is a personal appearance, slated for mid-November at New York's famed Capitol Theater.

The salary? Ginny's paycheck will be for \$5500 a week! That's a considerable increase over the sum she drew

## Paraded Too Fast

Writing his "Passing Parade" script is as easy to John Nesbitt as talking. In fact, before his elevation to the class where elaborate production methods were attendant to his broadcasts, he used to dash off his script just two hours before dial time.

The NBC Passing Parader likes to recall an incident that happened to him a few years ago when he was broadcasting over San Francisco's KFRC, when he almost lost a valuable research assistant because of his insistence on waiting until the last moment to write his material. Being a notoriously bad typist, he had told his assistant to have the rest of the pages of the script retyped, as he took the first page and dashed across the street from his apartment to the studio. Everything went smoothly, and the pages arrived one at a time, just when Nesbitt was ready for them. About in the middle of his broadcast he reached for the page which should have been page 7, but it turned out to be page 11.

Without a script, Nesbitt finished the broadcast, ad libbing, all the way, while his assistant who had discovered the error too late, sat biting his nails.

## Wiley and Words

Grammarians and philologists of the stuffy type shudder when Columbia's "Home Front Reporter" goes on the air. Wiley is wont to make himself very much at home in his language on the "Home Front" and he's no respecter of words. He has always given interviewers to understand that every bit of every program he broadcasts—and all that his partner, Galen Drake, emcees as well, is ad libbed and, despite the verbal missiles and shocked criticism hurled at

Introducing Wilbur Hatch's orchestra, he said, "Let's see what gives in the music department." His lady listeners were reminded by him not "to go around shooting their teeth off" when they chanced upon what might be a military secret. His acknowledgement of an elaborate introduction from his announcer, "Galen Drake," was the amused demand, "Whaddya mean, introducing me with that blast of trumpets? I'm just people, too, you mugg." He waxed wrathful in his verbal attacks upon promoters who have been preying upon the wives and mothers of service men, denounced them as "rats" and called their pseudo-charities "gyps." And these are only a few of thousands of high-flavored examples.

It appears that robbing Wiley's daily broadcasts of the tang of his pungent slang is a project about on a par with the building of Boulder dam. Furthermore, his huge audience of listeners are "agin" it.

In a recent "Mayor of the Town" radio script, Lionel Barrymore had the following lines—and then at rehearsal he added his own comment!

Said the script: "Get me the Clark residence, then Reverend Dinwiddy, and then please switch me to the trucking company."

Said Barrymore in an aside: "Humph! If the telephone operator

ever gets me three right numbers in a row, she'll be the first one who ever there will be guest stars. Pobably no did!"

## They're Listening

In normal times, it would take something more than a mere pressure cooker to get an air audience all hot and bothered. But it was this humble kitchen article which very definitely raised the blood pressure of radio listeners recently as a result of one of Art Linkletter's "What's Doin', Ladies" broadcasts.

Thinking up new reasons to give prizes and money away at "What's Doing Ladies" keeps emcee Art Linkletter's brain busy all the time. He has to have a different excuse for his generosity every day. A recent gag was one of his best.

"Accidents will happen in this crowded city of ours," said Art. "So I'll give a prize to any lady who has a run in her stockings."

Proudly, one of the women in his studio audience pointed to a run. The doomed hose were her last pair of nylons. What, under any other circumstances, would have been a tragedy was, in this instance, a bit of luck which won her a prize.

"It's a beauty," said Art, in compliment of the run, as he bestowed the award.

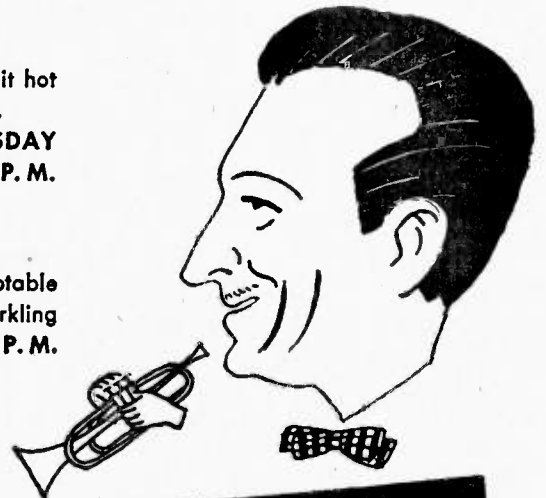

HUGHES, LARRY SMITH, RUPERT HUGHES, BILL HENRY, FLEETWOOD LAWTON, WILLIAM WINTER, etcetera, need no such prayer. Yet they are the ones of course who bind themselves to just such rules of conduct and walk the straight and narrow path to success.

One of the best examples of this conscientious attitude is contained in a letter sent me and which is reproduced here in full:

Dear Bill:

This is what I broadcast over the NBC network from Berlin, Germany, on the night of May 1, 1939:

"When I am asked to say something about the award of the Pulitzer prize to me, I can only blush, stammer, and say that I am grateful to the Associated Press for the opportunity of having worked in this unique center of news—Berlin—for fifteen years.

"Secondly, I regard the prize as a solemn obligation always to interpret the news, and especially the German situation, to the American public impartially and fairly."

That is still my journalistic creed!

Radio City—(BR)—A radio reporter who possesses the abilities and the ambition to become one of the best of all world war correspondents has left this coast for the Pacific theater of operations. His name, familiar particularly to Blue Network listeners, is Clete Roberts.

Since entering the network news business a few years ago, Clete Roberts has been up and down like a berserk elevator. He's a creature of impulse. An expert special events man, he developed into a crack commentator and went commercial. Then, wanting to do more for his country, he joined the OWI, abandoning his whole career. In another fast move, he left the OWI to train as an army pilot. Now, qualified as a commercial airman, he's roaming the Pacific as war correspondent for the Blue Network. He deserves great credit for the fight he has always put up for the people he calls "the man in the street and the woman in the kitchen." And he has merited a place among the other commentators mentioned by name in this column.

Bob Hope program. Virtually every man in Stan's band is a native, including his talented, carrot-topped vocalist and featured saxophonist, Howard (Red) Dorris. It was Dorris who thrilled Palladium dancers in July with his romantic but unSinatra-like singing. Dolly Mitchell, Kenton's 19-year-old canary, also has played a big part in the Kenton band's success. But most of all, first and foremost from the very beginning, it was Stan himself who carried on in the face of discouragement.

"If my style of music isn't accepted by America," Kenton declared a year ago, "then I'll go back to waterfront saloons playing piano solos for a dime a dance." But America, at that time entranced by Harry James' saccharine trumpet whinings, did accept Stan's music. The acceptance came this year after the Kenton organization piled up sensational box-office grosses at the New York Paramount, Frank Dailey's Meadowbrook, the Chicago Hotel Sherman and, of course here in Hollywood at the Palladium where coast to coast broadcasts attracted wide attention—including the attention of Bob Hope.

Towering three inches above an even six feet, Kenton is a colorful performer, wise in the ways of showmanship. Frequently he takes to the piano to play both solo and in ensembles, but most often he's in front of the band, directing his musicians with wild gestures. "I can't sit still long enough to play piano all the time," Stan says. "I want to be up front there so I can see all that's going on."

Born on a farm in Kansas, near Wichita, Kenton as a child alternated in his studies of piano and trumpet. Finally he abandoned the horn and started studying arranging—a talent which naturally calls for an expert knowledge of the piano. And although he's not yet 30, and the Hope stanza is his first really important radio show, Kenton has more than fifteen years of radio experience, including broadcasts with Gus Arnheim and other veterans of west coast dance music.

Traveling in big time company, with Hope, Langford and dozens of others of notables, hasn't changed Kenton a whit. He recalls the time he was playing solo piano, for \$18 a week, in a little Gold Coast bistro in San Francisco. "Some tough guy walked in one night," he says, "and a minute later the lights went out and bullets flew all over the place. When I came out from under the keyboard three longshoremen were lying on the floor dead.

"The boss made me continue at the piano while we waited for a hearse to arrive."

Another time, while Kenton was on the road with a California band, the promoter of a dance failed to pay off and Stan was stranded for

three days in a Missouri town. "I had a quarter in my pocket," Kenton reminisces. "And that lasted for a day and a half. But it wasn't so bad—all the other guys in the band were in the same fix." Kenton sold two suits and a new overnight bag, bought a bus ticket and returned to Los Angeles.

Once, during a radio broadcast, a couple of Stan's musicians had not arrived on the bandstand when the program went on the air. Kenton was afraid to give the downbeat without them. Quickly, he rushed to the piano, started his theme, and began chatting into the rhythm section mike near his keyboard. For three minutes he played and talked, stalling until the men finally rushed into their chairs. After the program ended, the station manager telephoned Kenton to compliment him on his unique way of presenting his band! "I've never heard another dance band do as you did," he told Stan. Kenton gasped. "I hope I never have to go through it again," he says now, chuckling. "No wonder he thought it a bit 'unique'."

in exhibition golf matches with Bing Crosby.

Then came the big trek, the beginning of the 20,000 mile hike all over the European theater of war, including England, Ireland, Iceland, Sicily and North Africa.

"And I was hoping," commented Hope, "that I'd be around to hit the airwaves from Station 2-Ro—that's in Rome."

Bob appeared before men in over 200 camps, visited more than 47 hospitals, and was the first American entertainer to reach the shores of Sicily. He entered Messina and put on a show three days after the Italians and Germans fled across the straits, and he was there when Axis gun batteries were still pounding the city from across the shore. While he entertained 19,000 men, fighter planes above laid a protective ceiling on the show.

Bob found himself equally at home with the lowliest G.I. spud-peeler and the highest ranking four star general. And more than that he tossed lines with General Jimmy Doolittle. He kiddingly referred to Jimmy as General MacArthur.

"How's that, Jack Benny?" Doolittle asked, and that retort brought the house down. The guys loved it.

Bing Crosby and his horses were the butt of many of Bob Hope's overseas jests, and it seems that the men in uniform know the story of Bing's horses that always seem to run last—or, at least, never seem to run first.

On one occasion when a stage spotlight wouldn't work, the sound system was off playing Bing Crosby records and everything seemed keyed

to start off wrong. Bob quipped, "Get that ham off the air!"

Tony Romano and Frances Langford were there to help out with the gags and the singing and the music, and Frances was a wonderful sight to men who had been spending their waking hours in foxholes and craters.

"Have dinner with me tonight," Bob cracked at his wolfish best.

"Love to," Frances responded, "But I'm hungry."

And then on another occasion, Frances asked Bob why Bing wasn't there with him in North Africa.

"Couldn't make it," Bob replied. "Crosby wanted to join the show but couldn't make it. One of his horses is dying and he wants to stick around. It'll be the first one he ever saw finish."

To which Bing replied: "Bob didn't leave the country to go on a camp tour. He was deported for wise-cracking about my horses."

Learning of the Italian woman who had received a medal for contributing eight children to Mussolini's progeny drive, Hope again made Bing the target of his wit: "That guy Crosby should feel ashamed of himself!"

Nor was Bob Hope's flip humor and quick wit too sharp for his English audiences. Hope discovered that they roll in the aisles in Merrie England just as they do here at home.

"Churchill certainly travels. He's been in Casablanca more than Humphrey Bogart," kidded Hope.

Toward the Scots, he quipped: "What a wonderful blackout! You should see the Scotchmen running around developing films!"

To Forlorn Boys Over There*

ON July 4th, Bob Hope was one of the honored guests at the Independence Day celebration in London, England. A lot of soldiers were present, focusing all their attention on Bob, whom they well knew.

Then a huge cake was cut as part of the ceremony.

"Who's that unknown guy cutting the cake?" a private asked. "I recognize Hope, but who's that guy next to him."

"Him," another soldier answered, "I guess that's Ambassador Winant."

When it comes to ambassadors of good will, whether it is in the middle of North Africa or in London, America's entertainers seem to take precedence, international protocol notwithstanding.

According to famed war correspondent Ernie Pyle, who has covered several theaters of battle action in various parts of the globe, what the boys up at the front want more than anything else is a slice of home for an hour or maybe two.

"Give me a piece of ma's homemade apple pie," one wounded youngster is reported to have said at a medical station on the shores of Sicily, when the doctor asked him what he wanted. And his request for "apple pie" is like asking for a slice of America.

It's impossible to bring them the front porch, ma's cooking, the Sunday funnies, the silky-eared mutt who sleeps under the deserted bed of most of those youngsters now at their stations in this war. It is equally impossible to get them home fre-

But it is possible to bring a little bit of home and America to them in their foxholes and bomb craters, to their camouflage nets—and the one man who has brought it to them is Bob Hope, who has just completed a twenty thousand mile front line trip, entertaining thousands upon thousands of boys in the European theater.

Bob Hope is the guy who has been promising himself a vacation for a dozen years, and winds up on a transport plane, bound for some camp somewhere. Six months ago, after completing his then current

radio assignments and picture commitments in Hollywood, Bob hit the trail and went on tour of U. S. Army, Navy, Marine, WAC and WAVE camps throughout the nation. He said goodbye to Hollywood, and travelling through more than forty states, hit the airwaves from makeshift stages, barracks, messhalls all over the nation. He went by plane, trolley, jeep, taxi, bomber and even ferry to get to his destination in his 500 camp tour. While on the camp trail, Bob raised \$25,000,000 worth of Defense Bonds, and then knocked off an additional \$2,000,000

*"Too Radical" Stan Kenton Finally Climaxes Fight for Distinction by Landing on Bob Hope's Radio Program*

**T**HEY SAID his orchestra was "too radical," and that his musical ideas were too advanced ever to win the acclaim of the public.

But Stan Kenton stuck to his guns. He continued composing, and arranging, and rehearsing his musicians until some of the men swore at him.

Those long years of heartaches and physical fatigue are over now. For Kenton's orchestra — acclaimed by many critics as the greatest dance aggregation of them all—is riding the crest. The climax to Stan's one-man battle came last month when he accepted the music assignment on

Bob Hope's famous program, replacing Skinnay Ennis who now is in the army.

"It's the greatest thing that ever happened to me," says Kenton. "Working with Bob Hope still doesn't seem possible. Just a couple of years ago I couldn't even get one-night engagements with the band."

But look at him now! Next month he starts work at Paramount in a big-budget musical film. His orchestra just completed a featurette at Universal. His records and transcriptions are being played on radio stations coast to coast. Fan mail is

pouring in as it never did before. Stan Kenton and his band have hit!

Stan is no stranger to California—and California radio audiences. He's lived in Los Angeles since he was a baby. He took his first music lessons here, tackled his first professional jobs here, and finally, in 1941, organized and perfected the orchestra which he now conducts from the piano. Married to the non-professional Violet Peters, and father of a two-year-old daughter whom Stan and Violet named Leslie, Stan just last month purchased his own home on Holly Ridge Drive in Hollywood. On Sunday afternoons he spends the time taking movies of the baby.

Kenton isn't the only Californian holding down important spots on the

*Music of the Mauve Decade and Early 1900's Forms a Hit Program of Nostalgic Listening for Monday Night*

**T**IME turned back by a twist of a dial. Nostalgic music. The Columbia Broadcasting System's "Gay Nineties Revue." Monday night, 8:30 o'clock. A steady stream of carriages and hansom cabs draw up at the curb in front of the opera house. Ladies in elegant hour-glass gowns of cream or pastel-colored satins and velvets, and hats trimmed with sweeping plumes,—gentlemen in shiny top hats and Prince Alberts alight, to hurry into the theater. The curtain soon will rise on Joe Howard's bright new musical show, "The Time, the Place and the Girl."

In homes all over the city, families are grouped about the glow of parlor lamps whose china shades boast painted pink roses, blue forget-me-nots, or Cupids. Mother is knitting a lavender hug-me-tight and father, handsome with ferocious handlebar moustache and sideburns, reads aloud from the evening paper, pauses to pull a pouch of Model tobacco out of a back hip pocket and refill his pipe. "Sis" sits at the piano, trying out a new Joe Howard tune.

\* \* \*

If you're American-born and above middle age, life was its sweetest

for you in the days memory links with the songs Columbia's "Gay Nineties Revue" gives you. If you're younger, your mother or your grandmother, Dad or Grandpa, have told you how gay the nineties were, have sung you some of their favorite old tunes. Possibly you took the older relative's word for it, but maybe you were a bit skeptical, knowing that time has a way of coloring the past with tints far rosier than were the actual hues. But in the Columbia Monday night program which airs at 8:30 o'clock, you have a chance to judge for yourself.

What you get out of the "Gay Nineties Revue" depends upon your age, and your music preferences and mode of enjoying life. That, of course, is true of all entertainment, but this show especially. It mirrors the mauve decade, mingling the best-loved music of that period with bits of the early 1900's.

#### Typical Tunes

Many of the tunes heard on the program were written by its still-stalwart master-of-ceremonies, seventy-four-year-old Joe Howard, who always sings one or two of his songs. For Mother or Grandma, Grandpa or Dad, when they hear "After the Ball," Howard's "I Wonder Who's Kissing Her Now," "Sweet Adeline" and "The Band Played On," every one of the old songs holds a smile or a tear for joys, sorrows, things,—friends—that have vanished into the past.

But listeners of lesser years hear the program through younger ears. Young Bill Jones wasn't even born when Joe Howard first wrote and sang his tender ditties. To Bill, perhaps they're just so much "corn." Or, on the contrary, maybe he's heard them when he was a little shaver, falling asleep on Grandpa's knee, or Dad's, to the soft humming or whistling of the sentimental ballads, and, for him, too as for the older folks, they have a reminiscent sweetness.

It's significant that, in an age which, at least outwardly, scoffs at sentiment, so many of these mellow old airs have lived on, while but few of the hits typical of the newer school's smart, shallow, brittle attitude have survived. It's no accident that the U. S. Tobacco Company, manufacturers of Model Tobacco and sponsors of the program, have chosen this type of program to advertise their product. As the steady, continuing success of the show testifies, men and women whose hair is gray or graying love to dawdle in the past and their children and grandchildren likewise delight in dusting off old customs, costumes, tunes and moldy jokes that were the vogue in their elders' heydays.

Suppose you headed a large pipe tobacco manufacturing company and faced the problem of building up a fast-diminishing market. Suppose your brand of tobacco was one of the old ones, possibly associated with frail oldsters by today's adolescents. Suppose you recognized

that the years were constantly thinning the ranks of your product's most regular purchasers. How would you solve the problem? What type of radio entertainment would you offer to win new customers and hold the old? Quite likely, a program which held appeal for all ages.

To serve this purpose, what better fare could the manufacturers of Model Smoking Tobacco have found than Columbia's "Gay Nineties Revue?" Have you pondered the phenomenal success of Los Angeles' revived "mellerdrammer," "The Drunkard," America's record-holder for long runs,—the popularity of such plays as "Life With Father," James Cagney's "Yankee Doodle Dandy" and "Strawberry Blonde," New York's footlights hit, "Yesterday?" Young and old alike welcome entertainment reflecting the Victorian mode of life.

The "Gay Nineties" show induces a dreamy, reflective, pipe-smoking mood. Some of its numbers are romantically presented, others in a jocular vein. Imaginary scene of the entertainment is the "Broadway Gardens," with white-haired, brown-eyed, ruddy-faced Joe Howard presiding. Many interested listeners, telephoning CBS studios, are definitely disappointed when they learn this entertainment spot has no real existence or address. New York has a "Gay Nineties Club," famous for years, but the program has no connection with it.

However, a capacity audience sees and hears the show twice nightly on Mondays in Columbia's New York Playhouse No. 2, formerly the famous Avon Theater. It is one of the few radio shows put on with all the members of the cast, including the band, completely in costume.

#### Wear Old Costumes

Howard is resplendent in a Prince Albert or a dinner jacket of the vintage of 1899. John Reed King, the announcer, wears a Prince Albert coat, handlebar moustache, sideburns, middle part and plastered-

down haircomb, "mail order" trousers, cloth-topped shoes.

Lillian Leonard, auburn-haired songstress of the program, is a distant relative of yesteryear's famous singing stage star, Lillian Russell. "Discovered" among the show's Floradora Girls after a long and fruitless search for a suitable ballad singer, she wears a costume typical of Lillian Russell's lavish footlight finery,—be-trained white gown with tight, jewelled bodice, ostrich-feathered hat, bejewelled staff. Incidentally, la Russell inspired Miss Leonard's own career ambitions, which gave her a repertoire of more than fifty songs when she was three. She's had her debut in opera and is continuing her operatic studies.

Music conservatory product Jenny Lynn, soprano on the "Gay Nineties Revue," winner of a 1929 school prize scholarship, big cash prize and later singing contests, wears trailing pink, cream or peach-colored gowns, with modest high collars and Gibson Girl outlines. Versatile comedian Danny Donovan, the Elm City Four (male quartet) Floradora Girls and Gay Nineties Band also wear clothes in vogue in the mauve decade.

A board composed of stage stars famous a generation ago keeps the program authentic in expressing the style and period of that era. Among them is emcee Joe Howard, famous troubadour of the Gay Nineties, to whose tunes the Drexels, Astors and Vanderbilts danced. He made—and spent—\$1,500,000 with his music and stage productions, slipped out of sight for a time when the new school of song writers replaced the old. More than 3,000,000 copies of his "I Wonder Who's Kissing Her Now" were sold and "Somewhere In France Is the Lily" made him \$50,000 during the first World War. His own favorite of his works is "What's the Use of Dreaming." In each of the 28 musical comedies which he produced were 12 to 18 of his songs.

If you attend a broadcast of the show on your birthday and raise your hand to let Announcer King know it, flowers will be sent to your mother from you, without cost, with the compliments of that gay old blade, Joe Howard, and his cast. It's appropriate that Howard should originate this sentimental idea. His stage career began in the eighties, with Howard, in a "Little Lord Fauntleroy" suit, singing, "A Boy's Best Friend Is His Mother."

aimed at American boys, he cracked: "Were the soldiers at the last camp happy to see me! They actually got down on their knees. What a spectacle! What a tribute! What a crap game!"

Hope made the boys happy, but he came home a sober Bob. Immediately after his first broadcast for NBC, he made a curtain speech to the audience.

"Well, folks," he said, "we popped in on your son over in Great Britain, Africa, Sicily, Newfoundland, and Iceland. Had a great time with him, too.

We ate army chow with him, jumped into ditches with him when the Junkers came over. We saw the shadow of pain and tragedy on his face, and we've seen a belly laugh chase the shadows away. And he said to us, 'When you get back to the States, tell the family I'm doin' fine!' Doin' fine! That's the soldier's way of saying nothing about a nightmare week of sudden death and suffering that felt like seven days of steady rain. And 'doin' fine' is the sailor's way of saying nothing of the ocean-burial of his buddy.

"We spent three months with your son, and believe me, you come back and some things here don't seem real anymore. Saturday night the towns are buzzing with big pay-rolls, and some people wonder not how long the enemy will hold out, but how long this country's meat supply can hold out. At swanky hotel tables, they wonder if the end of the war isn't just around the corner, but in Sicily I've seen more who wonder if one day would ever end!

The white beaches on Sunday seem so far from those red beaches of Italy . . . and the black market gas station so far from a P-38 running out of gas over the Mediterranean . . . and the War Bond window at the local bank seems so far from those rows of little white crosses in North Africa. And to some people, the high cost of living is really something, but Mister, they really ought to figure out the high cost of living on that beach-head at Salerno.

"We can do a lot to help bring our boys back. Let's do it. Because the sooner we bring them back, the more we'll bring back!"

# Chef Milani's Page on Foods

## THE SAVING GRACE AND A CABBAGE:

A real honest-to-goodness saving grace, with the accent on saving, and a cabbage amounts to sauerkraut this year. Besides being a good way to use up some extra cabbage heads that would otherwise be wasted, sauerkraut is a wonderful companion for a few spareribs, ham hocks or frankfurters for dinner on a cold autumn evening.

So find yourself a shiny crock like Grandma used to have and a slaw cutter and get going!

First let the cabbage stand at room temperature for a day. Then wash and remove the cores. Shred with your slaw cutter to about one-eighth of an inch thick. Mix with each ten quarts of shredded cabbage, three and two-thirds tablespoons of salt. As you salt, pack it firmly (not

tightly though) in the crock. Place a cloth on the cabbage, and on top of that put an inverted plate, leaving about an inch of cloth showing around its edges. Lastly, place on the plate an object heavy enough to force the cabbage down so that the brine is forced to the surface.

After that you sigh deeply and store the crock in a room where the temperature is always about 75 degrees, for ten to fourteen days. Daily skim off the skum. At the end of a week, treat yourself to a taste—and every day thereafter, until it meets with your approval. When it has reached that stage, bring the kraut to a boil and pack lightly in preserve jars. Pour over it, until the jars are filled to overflowing, three quarts of boiling water that has been combined with three tablespoons and two teaspoons of salt. Fit on the covers and set the jars in boiling

water deep enough to cover them by an inch. Let them boil for fifteen minutes. Remove and adjust the seal of the jars.

P. S. Cabbage in the sauerkraut form, as well as fresh, is an excellent source of Vitamin C—should you be interested.

## ODDS AND ENDS:

While we're still on the subject of cabbage, sauerkraut and what-not, here is another suggestion for this redoubtable vegetable. They "sprung" this one on us in Wisconsin. It's a custom of the State you might say. To wit: When serving hot dogs, slice them with sauerkraut! Don't be so startled. It's good!

The Dutch think so much of their cabbage, it has a place of honor on one of their flags. We refer to the banner of Saba, West Indian Island owned by that country. It is displayed in the corner of the flag.

As for the cabbage in Russia—well, the national stew is red borsch made with red cabbage. It's a favorite dish with the Reds. Wonder why!

One warning to the Irishmen, though. According to undisputable sources of the old Midwest, "Sauerkraut cures a Dutchman, but kills an Irishman."

We're still looking for a Dutchman who knows why.

Well, that ends the odds and ends.

## Recipe for Cheese Souffle

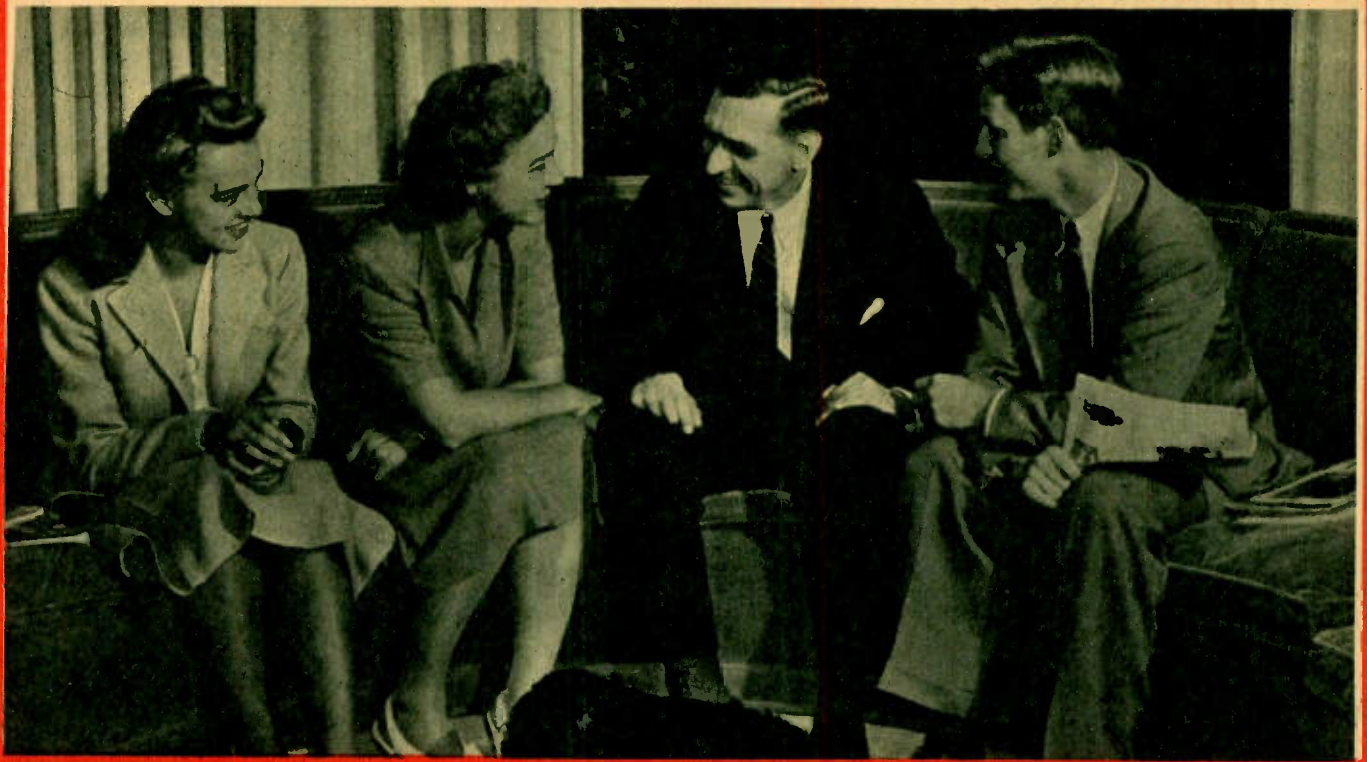

1 pint of rich milk	½ lb. grated parmesan cheese
¼ lb. butter	½ teaspoon salt
¼ lb. flour	Dash pepper
6 egg yolks	6 egg whites "whipped stiff"

Heat the milk in a double boiler. Mix the flour and the butter working both well together. Add then to the hot milk and cook until thick, stirring all the time. Take from the fire and add the yolk of eggs. Whip lightly. Then add ¼ of lb. of the parmesan cheese, season with salt and pepper. Then fold in the stiff egg whites. Put into a large buttered casserole, sprinkle the top with the rest of the grated cheese and put to bake in a preheated oven at 375 for 25 minutes.
