



Sirs: Thank you for the fine opportunity you give the public of expressing their criticisms of the broadcasts.

Today radio stands as the greatest universal educator. Here in our beloved America, I hope we can prove that our *American way* is as good as the way of our allies and better than the way of our enemies.

Excellent as are our newsreels and radio commentators, the public must be distressed when the theme seems to be *complete annihilation* of our enemies. There may be some good, broken-hearted people among them who long to do our way but can't. We are finding this so in Italy. I am sure we shall find it so elsewhere, too. I suggest that the broadcasters, in their own fine way, give an olive branch to such individuals or groups.

Today, without leaving our homes or opening our pocketbooks, we enjoy, in radio, the greatest symphonies, operas and all other kinds of music, drama, and the best orations in religion, science, history, civics and all fields of thought. We should be very grateful to the sponsors and the artists who devote themselves to the full exposition of their themes, and who so seldom fail to keep within an educational and artistic portrayal. The exceptions usually are withdrawn from the field, which is best if they can not be corrected.

I have noticed with pleasure the great improvement in the "Gay Nineties Revue" and some of the other programs. Everyone enjoys humor and, at a time like this, the laughs the humorist gives us are true health vitamins, but when marred by harshness, coarseness, jarring voices . . . it seems to me, some are not what we wish known

as the *American way*. Radio gives us plenty of wholesome nonsense, which is good medicine.

Radio's programs for children are good . . . but we can not blame the *Sammies* of our schools if they imitate them and so produce new problems for the already over-burdened mothers and teachers. A little thought in that direction would lessen civic burdens and yet give us just as many laughs.

Children and adults will find good entertainment in the new program personality, "Aunt Margaret," who tells circus stories, Bible stories and other lively tales in an unusually pleasant way to the little cub bears.

JUST A minute! Just a minute! Just a minute!
"Ya don't know who I am? Here, take a card. Take any card. They're all the same. Now while you're lookin' at the card, I'm gonta roll up my sleeves and show ya that

I have nothin' to conceal. All right, now put the card back in the deck. Now I'll give 'em a shuffle—the old Egyptian shuffle. A-one, and a-two, and a-three. Now then, did your card say Eddie Marr? That's me! Shake!

"Ya say ya don't know what I do? Ya say you wanna find out? Tell ya what I'm gonta do . . ."

And Eddie Marr is off on another spree to sell Jack Carson anything—even the gun with which to commit suicide.

Eddie is one of radio's newest characters. Last season it was Archie (Ed Gardner) of "Duffy's Tavern," who is still going full speed ahead. This fall, it's Eddie Marr, whose routine has wafted into radio like a zephyr of spring, a nostalgic breath of new life.

One listens to him and into his mind pops the vision of an old-time barker ballyhooing the bearded lady or enticing customers inside the tent to see Little Egypt dance. He talks so fast with such a sing-song inflection that one can almost clap in rhythm, can almost hear the tinny music of the merry-go-round, can faintly smell the peanuts roasting and the cozy fragrance of corn popping.

Well, you won't be far from wrong if you conjure up such visions from hearing Eddie on the radio. For fast-talking Marr really was a pitchman some years ago and still has a pitchman's kit tucked away at home among his belongings.

Well, Eddie, you talked to Radio Life the other day. You told us that you broke into show business when you were six months old and by the time you were sixteen years old, you were making \$450 a week as a specialty dancer at Schanley's at 44th and Broadway. Then you tore the ligaments in your leg in an overly-enthusiastic leap on stage.

Was Pitchman

You told us that your first job as a pitchman was at Palisade Park, New Jersey, in 1922-23, for the Schenck Brothers. Your job was to bark for the House of Illusions. You gave a lecture on illusions, then coaxed the people inside to see the Chinese saw box act. That was funny the day you got even with that fresh Polish girl who was the one elected to get inside the box where the man poked swords. The first sword to go in was always the one the girl sat on; the other blades went into the corners and out again, didn't bother her at all.

The end ones were always the first to come out, too. But you got even by snatching the bottom one first, and the gal was left crouching while the other blades were yanked out. Left, too, with a welt a foot long, where you pulled the blade out in such a hurry. But she never got fresh again.

Your first pitch, as we started to say, was in connection with the House of Illusions. You bought pen and pencil sets for seven cents and sold them to the customers for fifty. But they loved it!

When you reached Broadway, you felt right at home. Your father helped found the Theater Guild, so why wouldn't you be in your element playing in "Irene" (1924), "Greenwich Follies" (1925-26), "Madame Lucy," and "Comic Supplement"?

Things went along pretty well for a long time. In the mid-thirties, your career was tied up with Brock Pem-

berton and you appeared in many of his plays. The great White Way was wide open to your comedy. But every now and then, just for fun, to see whether you could sell, you'd grab your tripe (tripod) and keester (satchell), go down on 14th Street, and buy a few dozen of an "item" to sell. Maybe the item would be soap maybe spot eradicator. Or perhaps the potato grater you sold like hotcakes at the entrance to the Hudson tube.

You learned all the tricks of being a showman, learned that to sell anything you must sell yourself first. "Folks are twenty-five per cent sold when they stop to listen to you," was your observation about a pitchman's customers—an observation you learned from being a real pitchman.

When you and two other men invented the system of radio aircheck, you began to think a little about radio as a really serious part of your career.

To Hollywood

Then something went wrong, Eddie. You can out to Hollywood and there were months when there wasn't a job to be found anywhere. There were lots of times when you and your wife, Maybelle, wondered where the next cup of coffee was coming from, and since you drink an average of twenty cups of java a day, this was pretty serious.

Some picture work started to come in for you. Then you guessed maybe you'd give radio a last long look around. A part on Lux hobbled up—a few others.

Then, one night you were sitting in the kitchen of your house, and Bing Crosby's writer, Carroll Carroll,

The DeMille of the DISCS

*"C. P." MacGregor Is Doing
for Disc Dramas What "C. B."
Achieved in the Presentation
of "Live" Radio Histrionics*

WHICH would you prefer, a diamond in the rough or a polished, perfected gem?

Polished entertainment is what you get in the best of radio's "disc shows." Occasional "fluffs" are inevitable in the so-called "live" programs. But in transcribed plays, the flaws can be avoided. All or any part of the recordings can be done over again

to eliminate bungled bits and improve the whole. In that respect, recorded programs have the same great advantage over other radio features that motion pictures have over the legitimate stage.

Outstanding among shows which are impressing this fact upon discerning radio listeners is "Hollywood Radio Theater", drama program aired locally at 9:30 o'clock each Sunday night from KFI. Skippy Peanut Butter Company sponsors it. C. P. MacGregor produces it. And

many thousands of American drama lovers listen to it regularly, on stations scattered from coast-to-coast.

MacGregor's is the success story of a man who probably has done more than any other single individual to educate the public to the high quality of entertainment available through recordings. The recognized excellence of "Hollywood Radio Theater" productions is fast winning him fame as a "De Mille of the Discs".

Not only does MacGregor provide radio dialers with super-polished programs. He also brings them some of the best talent money can buy. Sparkling in "Hollywood Radio Theater" dramas waxed in recent months have been such screen stars as Joan Bennett, Herbert Marshall, Paulette Goddard, Frances Dee, Anita Louise, Roddy MacDowell; Pola Negri of the screen's old silent days; John Sutton, John Loder, Ona Munson; Tyrone Powers' actress wife, Annabella; Jane Withers, Mary Beth Hughes, Roland Drew, old-time film favorite, playing opposite Joan Bennett, made his radio debut on this program. Some of these stars' plays have already been heard on the air. Others have been recorded but not yet broadcast.

MacGregor has surrounded these big-name screen stars with the cream of radio's regular dramatic artists. And, as vehicles, he has given his scintillant casts plays by such well-established radio scripters as True Boardman (now a Major in the Army) and original radio adaptations of stories by Mary Roberts

Rinehart, O. Henry and other authors of like rank.

Big stars cost big money. In producing "Hollywood Radio Theater", MacGregor takes the same chance financially that the leading film companies do in creating costly screen plays. Their production is entirely his own enterprise and he sells his shows to the sponsors just as the big motion picture producers sell their films to the exhibitors. Throughout the country, wherever "Hollywood Radio Theater" big-name shows are heard, Skippy Peanut Butter Company is the sole sponsor.

"These shows, presenting high-salaried screen stars, are never carried as sustaining programs. The stations can't afford to pay such a high price for sustainers," MacGregor says.

The Canadian-born producer, always well-dressed, six feet tall, nice-looking, with keen blue eyes and curly, graying hair, brings to "Hollywood Radio Theater" a wealth of experience in sound, comparable to the famous De Mille's impressive background in motion picture production. "Hollywood Theater" is but one of several transcribed radio features from his studio. Among others currently on the air are "Eb and Zeb", "Cavalcade of Drama", "Mutiny on the High Seas", "Academy Award," "House of Peter MacGregor" and "Crimson Trail".

Fine Studio

The MacGregor Sound Studio at 729 South Western Avenue is one of the largest and best-equipped in the country. MacGregor has produced hundreds of shows there, as well as

"Fitch Bandwagon," we understand, will originate from the Warner Bros. studio off Fernwood near Bronson. Blue shows may be coming from any one of three places: Radio City, the Radio Playhouse at Sunset and Highland, or Warner Bros.

KFI on North Vermont handles only local originations. It is the local outlet for NBC, but the network shows, except under rare circumstances, originate from Radio City or subsidiary studios.

Rickenbacker's Prayer

Ever since Radio Life published Ed die Rickenbacker's prayer in the issue of December 6, 1942, requests have come in for copies of this magazine. As our supply is now running low, we are repeating this much-wanted piece for the benefit of all those who wish it. The following is a copy of the prayer carried by Rickenbacker during his eventful life. It was given to him by Barney Oldfield in the old days when both men were racing autos. It accompanied Rickenbacker on his perilous lift-raft trip, and was afterward broadcast on KHJ's "Curtain America."

Translated from the Latin, it reads: "Whoever shall carry this prayer on their person shall not be drowned, not die a bad death, nor suddenly. He shall be delivered from the plague, the pest, and the lightning. In the houses where this prayer is kept shall never happen any betrayal or mean thing. Of those who speak this prayer, heed it, will be pardoned of all their sins. Even though they shall be as many as the stars in the sky, says God, provided they fully repent. God who has left us a memorial of Thy passion in the Holy Shroud, by which Thy most Holy Body was wrapped by Joseph when taken down from the cross, mercifully grant that by Thy death, and burial, we may reach a glorious resurrection who liveth and reigneth one God, world without end, Amen."

Another Fan

Perhaps you don't know it, but around Radio Row, "Vic and Sade" is the prime favorite of writers, announcers, and actors. Last week we heard of another "Vic and Sade" fan. It seems that she is Gracie Allen.

Gracie has to rehearse her show on Tuesdays, along about 3:30 when "Vic and Sade" comes on. Out of courtesy to her, the CBS engineer pipes the broadcast into the control room so Gracie can listen just before she starts rehearsing her own program. Formerly a two-network serial, "Vic and Sade" isn't heard now on CBS, but as Duffy's Archie would say, "Perish forbid mentioning that here."

Turkey Day Show

Robert Young, popular screen star, has been selected to play host on the annual two-hour Thanksgiving airshow sponsored by the Elgin National Watch Company, as a tribute to America's fighting men, on November 25, from 1 to 3 p. m., PWT, via the nationwide Columbia Broadcasting System network.

China's Inflation

China's six years of war have brought about inflation which is "without parallel anywhere", according to CBS news correspondent Eric Sevareid. The newsman recently arrived in China's war emergency capital, Chungking, after his rescue from Burma's jungles and later, a brief stay in Calcutta, India. Radio Life recently carried his thrilling story of his rescue from the Burmese jungles by headhunters, after he and 19 others parachuted from a disabled plane.

Columbia's World News Department simultaneously received Sevareid's cable from Chungking and a letter mailed from Calcutta. The comparison between Asiatic and American price fluctuations is interesting.

Data from Sevareid's Calcutta letter shows that he paid \$12 for a pair of shorts, \$2 for a tube of shaving cream, \$1.50 for a safety razor blade, 35 cents for a bar of soap, \$118 for an old portable rebuilt typewriter. In China, the news correspondent lost an old American watch bought for \$75. To replace

You don't have to wait for ten o'clock to hear the evening news.

Lowell Thomas has been giving news to the east for 10! these many years (11 to be exact), but westerners have heard him on the air only on special shows, or in the movies via his news-reels. Now the man who was voted the top newscaster in Movie-Radio Guide's famous "Star of Stars" poll is coming to the west, over special lines, in a show that is just for the coast.

Every evening, Monday through Friday, Thomas will present last-minute news and stories about the really important developments of the day. His new BLUE series, set for 52 weeks, is a real break for news-hungry listeners west of the Rockies.

Erskine Johnson (Skinny to everyone in radio and the movies) moves into the coveted 10 p. m. spot with his "Hollywood Spotlight" series Mondays through Saturdays.

Johnson is a Hollywood reporter, story-teller, discoverer of stars and almost a psychic. He proved that he has second sight when, last season, he named his own Academy Award winners before the Academy picked its stars. And so the movie big shots came up with a duplicate of Johnson's choices, proving either that Mr. Cagney and Miss Garson were so good everyone had to select them, or that Johnson was looking over the shoulders of the vote-counters (which he wasn't) or that he has his finger right on the pulse of Hollywood (which he has).

So . . . there's your lineup across the board. Lowell Thomas, 9:30 to 9:45 p. m., and Erskine Johnson's "Hollywood Spotlight" from 10:00 to 10:15 p. m. The station, may we repeat, is KECA, the same station that brings you "Duffy's," Xavier Cugat, Gertrude Lawrence, the Quiz Kids and more other good programs than we can name off hand.

It in China, he would have had to spend \$500.

Sevareid found little to buy in China, and people there talking less about the war than the high cost of living.

"The American embassy residence has no meat platters", he said. "It did have two, but the other day a messenger appeared at the door, asking for them. Ambassador Nelson Johnson had borrowed them from the Standard Oil Company two or three years ago and Standard wanted them back.

"Recreation in Chungking is a problem."

He found the parks bare of grass, the trees' leaves gray with dust, privacy unknown, whiskey and western wines entirely missing. There is much hammering and building in progress, but nearly all the new structures are of bamboo or mud, replacing the homes and business buildings smashed to the ground by raids.

"You need a strong pair of legs to do your work in Chungking now", he reports, explaining that there are few cars, a bus ride is an excruciating experience and the steep streets of the hilly city, full of dust.

"It is something to realize that this great city . . . rebuilt its houses and took up its life again because of the appearance of a few adventurous American flyers in a handful of

patched-up American planes," says Sevareid.

Query Campaign

Recently the daytime radio program "Bachelor's Children," heard daily over CBS, inaugurated a query campaign on what the American public feels about our post-war aims. Subject of the letters written by listeners is "What We Are Fighting For—What America Means to Me." Five letters are read on the program each week. For each, the writer receives a \$25 War Bond.

The question has brought an amazing response. More than 1,300 letters were received in the first week—more than 500 a day ever since. These letters reveal as many shades of opinion as the sources represented.

Mrs. Maurice Wilson of Fort Wayne, Indiana, wrote:

- "For the flowers in the garden and the right to enjoy them,
- For the books on the shelves and the right to read them,
- For the songs on the piano and the right to sing them,
- For the prayers in our hearts and the right to say them."

This constant awareness of public sentiment has helped to make "Bachelor's Children" a favorite for more than eight years.

Watch H. S. Teams

For real thrills, the best football to watch this year, according to sportscaster Frank Bull, is that being played by high school teams. Boys 16 and 17 years of age, evenly matched and all fired up, are putting out a "no holds barred" variety of game.

Bull explains that most of these lads are full of fight, because they know that before long they'll be going into service. They seem to be in better physical condition than ever before, and most of them belong to the R. O. T. C. Their football is full of daring and flash.

Price of Not Airing

The year's most expensive railroad fare, \$2,000, plus the usual one way New York to Hollywood fare has been paid by Reginald Gardiner.

THE QUICK BROWN FOX JUMPED OVER A LAZY DOG'S BACK, 1234567890, BR SENDING "MEN IN WOMEN'S CLOTHES"

Ed Wallace, radio war reporter in Australia, passes this one along. It illustrates how important are the ladies to one phase of the war effort.

Victims of quartermasters' red tape, a group of very red-faced allied jungle fighters is hacking its way toward Madang on New Guinea, nattily attired in women's slacks. musical libraries for radio stations all over the country. And, although entirely lacking in stage experience, he is thoroughly at home in front of a "mike". In his "Hollywood Radio Theater" broadcasts, he chats informally with the guest stars, in much the same way as does Cecil B. De Mille on "Lux Radio Shows", and he enjoys participating in this way.

Recently "C. P.", as he is called by many of his associates, received a medal presented by the Canadian government in appreciation of his co-operation in extending the full facilities of his studio to Canada's treasury department. Recordings waxed there were broadcast in furtherance of the fifth Canadian War Loan Drive. Herbert Marshall was among the stars participating in these programs. MacGregor shares his decoration with such celebrities as Mary Pickford, Ingrid Bergman, Loretta Young, Bing Crosby and Gary Cooper.

Toronto, Ontario, Canada, was MacGregor's birthplace. He is of Scotch-Irish descent and possesses many of the fine, substantial traits of character we associate with the British. He has a reputation for integrity rare in such theatrical centers as this city. Actors and actresses appearing in his productions are paid the same day they do their work.

It was MacGregor's keen foresight which brought into being the prospering business he has built up here. He had no ambitions for a career in any way connected with the entertainment field. As a University of Toronto student, he was preparing to become a lawyer. But the war intervened, and when it was over, the young ex-lieutenant of the Canadian air force came to the United States. It was shortly after his marriage to Mildred Meadows of Kansas City in 1923 that he was made west coast manager of the Brunswick-Balke-Collander Company. The recording firm had headquarters in San Francisco. Talking pictures had just set Hollywood agog. Suddenly a good speaking voice became of paramount importance in the film industry.

MacGregor was quick to see the possibilities in transcriptions. The moving picture stars saw them almost as quickly. Hundreds of them came to him for voice-tests. In 1926 he moved to Los Angeles and established his own studio at its present location. His business grew fast and soon he was producing transcribed radio programs in a location where more and better talent is available than anywhere else in the world. While he built up prestige, he used able, but still-climbing, thespians in his "Hollywood Radio Theater" plays. But in recent months, that program has graduated into the "big league". With two complete sound stages, his studio now has facilities for turning out 120 programs a week. It is an attractive building, with much colored tile in its interior, and a pleasantly hospitable atmosphere. A swank, tiled bathroom, with plumb-

ing fixtures whose metal parts are gold-plated, elicits many "ohs" and "ahs."

The MacGregors live on a ranch near Encino, next to Ann Sheridan's. MacGregor's ranch is the producer's greatest source of relaxation. Mrs. MacGregor, an attractive, alert, dark-haired little woman, finds much enjoyment in acting as hostess at the studio. Both are exceptionally friendly and cordial and always entertain their guest stars at dinner at famous Perino's after the interview portion of each play has been recorded.

Radio Life's introduction to the MacGregor studio was on the night Herbert Marshall was at work there, making a transcription of the play, "Heaven Is Like That", by True Boardman. At dinner at Perino's, he proved to be a charming and witty conversationalist, ordered "Free French potage", refusing to call the soup "Vichy soisse". Although very tired, he gave a superb performance. The English-born star has the reputation of being an exceptionally loyal friend and the inclusion of veteran actor Frederic Worlock in the cast would seem to bear it out. "Worlock, a captain and my superior in the English army in the last World War, was badly wounded at Neuville Vitasse just three days before I got mine", Marshall recalled.

Like Marshall, Joan Bennett, on the occasion of her appearance, was very democratic in her mingling with the other members of the cast. She provided them with a good laugh when she telephoned the elder two of her three little daughters just before the transcription was made. "I always do that, so they can listen in", she laughed. "I simply forgot that this time we were doing it by transcription!"

Pola Negri made both masculine and feminine hearts about the studio flutter. Still glamorous with a capital "G" and stunning in a cream-colored suit with chocolate brown accessories and brown fox furs, she studied her script with complete concentration for two hours before the recording process began. She was very dramatic and, at first, much perturbed at the prospect of doing her first "commercial." But in the end, she waded gallantly through the peanut butter!

Those who worked with Jane Withers found her completely unspoiled,—just the opposite of the grown-up brat one might expect her to be, were she judged by her former juvenile screen parts. That she is the sensible, likable girl she has turned out to be is largely due to the influence of her refined, intelligent mother, Hollywoodsters inform us. The young star was exuberant about the camp tour from which she had just returned.

MacGregor takes much pride in the high quality of the talent on his shows and believes the time will come when most radio programs are presented by transcription. "Wouldn't you rather hear a Marshall or a Paulette Goddard on a recorded program than inferior players on a less finished 'live' broadcast?" he asks.

was listening to your story about a fellow who used to be with the Amusement Park in Jersey—the one who made such a terrific pitch, then short-changed the customers. As you talked about the old days, your voice assumed the twang of the pitchman, your sentences took on his choppy rhythm.

Next day, Carroll called and asked if you'd do the part on one of Bing's shows. Five or six times you were pitchman on Kraft Music Hall. Then things happened. The way they do in radio. That Abbott and Costello audition you had made had not borne any fruits as yet, and when Abbott and Costello dropped out of the picture on account of Lou's illness, you hit a blank spot. But Marty Gosch, producer of the Abbott-Costello show, refreshed his memory when he heard you with Bing, and he landed you on the Carson show when it was plugging Camels. Now you're with Jack for Campbell's Soups, and every Wednesday night, the rubes and the slickers alike, are tuning in because they love your stuff. You've become, once more, the blustering, blatant pitchman, conjuring up visions of striped side-show tents and circus sawdust.

Line Catching On

Your line, "Tell ya what I'm gonta do," is becoming a popular catch phrase, in fact, the daughter of one of the show's writers said the other day that kids in school are using it and driving the teachers nuts. You'll have to watch it, that it's not overdone and we think your idea to cut it down to two times on every show, instead of five, is good. It would already have become monotonous if it weren't for your wonderful delivery and the expert writing; and you've modified it, now and then, to "Tell ya what I've already done."

Yes, Eddie, you can sell Carson a new idea every week. You've sold us on yourself. What you really are, is a super salesman, and we think the topper to being a super salesman happened during the recent campaign to sell war bonds.

You were on another show, the Roma Show, and were supposed to sell Charlie Ruggles a bond during the broadcast. Then the United States Treasury Department stepped in and asked you *not* to sell the bond . . . you've acquired, it seems, a reputation for selling people *anything*, so most of the time it's something phoney. A war bond, so the Treasury Department folks figured, certainly wasn't a phoney.

Charming Red-Head Recently Discovered by Cantor, Does Not Drink, Smoke, Dissipate

IT WAS a couple of days after red-haired Nora Lou Martin had made her debut as Eddie Cantor's newest singing discovery and had stopped the "Time to Smile" show with her first, big-time song. We asked her: "What did you do when you were told that you were going to be Mr. Cantor's new singer?"

Nora Lou clasped and unclasped her black-gloved hands, raised questioning eyes on her manager, Stephen Janik.

"Go ahead and tell her," he nodded. "It's nothing to be ashamed of."

"We were so happy," said Nora Lou, "that we sat next to each other in the studio and couldn't believe it was true. Then we prayed and thanked God for it."

To hard-bitten Hollywood, the idea of a beautiful, 22-year-old glamour songstress praying about her career and thanking God for the breaks is something of a novelty. Maybe some of the other singers do, but they don't admit it much.

God, her own faith in herself, and

"Boss," as she calls Janik, have been the forces molding Nora Lou for eight years. When Janik first saw her, she was a plump thirteen-year-old, ready to go on the stage for a personal appearance in Portland.

She was wringing her hands and walking backstage like Felix, the cat.

"Look little girl, you're going out there and knock 'em dead!" Janik told her.

She did "knock 'em dead"—Janik, too. "You're going places," he said, "and I want to be your manager. I want to talk to your mother."

For the past eight years "Boss" has carefully built Nora Lou's musical talent until today she has a range from E above high C. She has never had music lessons,—just coaching, plenty of radio experience in the Northwest, and more recently, small parts in singing groups for motion pictures.

Her break came when Cantor heard her auditioning at a local studio. Nora Lou sang two lines of "It Can't Be Wrong." Cantor sat immobile, his pop-eyes popping even more.

Suddenly, he jumped from his

seat. "Your voice!" he gasped excitedly. "It's sheer magic! It's terrific! It sounds like a vibraphone. That's it—you're the girl with the vibraphone voice!"

So the man who launched the careers of Deanna Durbin, Bobby Breen, and Dinah Shore took another young aspirant under his wing.

Now, her long period of watchful waiting for "the break" has given way to a madly joyous procession of shopping, rehearsals, and press interviews befitting a newly-found gem. It should be mentioned, however, that Nora Lou did not stick to formula on the waiting preliminary. She didn't go hungry or desperate while working for her chance. Janik saw to it that she hung onto enough radio work in Portland to keep the wolf away. The pair even "commuted" between the Pacific Northwest and cinema town to keep the balance between career ambitions and "making a living."

A year ago, the career prospects became so rosy that Mr. and Mrs. Janik, their son, and Nora Lou

*A Song
in His Heart*

*Frank Forest, Soloist of
"Double Or Nothing," Puts
New Meaning Into Old Airs,
Cheer Into War-Dimmed Days*

IT WAS the night of a big boxing match. New York's huge Madison Square Gardens rocked and rang with the shouts and babble of a gigantic crowd. Then came an announcement, an organ's rich tones in the introduction to a beloved air, and the high, clear voice of a young singer, spotlighted in the gal-

lery, with "Old Glory" in the background.

The audience listened in profound silence,—listened with all its heart. The singer was Frank Forest, blue-eyed, brown-haired young American opera tenor, heard coast-to-coast on the Mutual-Don Lee Friday night quiz show, "Double Or Nothing". The song was "The Star-Spangled Banner". The reception which the big fight crowd gave his solo stands out

as the most thrilling experience of his life.

"Never have I seen or sung to a crowd so quiet or received applause so thunderous", says Forest, telling of the incident. "A broadcast of the program went out over the Mutual-Don Lee Network. Listeners sent me hundreds of letters in appreciation of the solo. Never, with the exception of a film play that I made for Pine-Thomas, have I done anything that brought me so much fame."

Those thousands and many others who have heard Forest sing the national anthem will always think of him when they hear it sung anywhere. For the star of "Double Or Nothing" puts into it some distinctive quality of interpretation which makes it virile and expresses the valiant spirit of a nation dedicated to a gigantic program for victory.

Every age, in war time, has seen its people turn to their composers and their bards for sustenance of the spirit. When the big guns start to roar, then, too, there begins the gathering of a great flood of song,—of music of every kind and cadence, from the most beautiful to the most bawdy. Our age is no exception. It, too, in music, has sought and found courage, forgetfulness, expression of its sorrows and its joys. Frank Forest's fan mail brings him daily proof of the gratitude his audiences feel for the cheer and the inspiration that his singing brings them.

Like the bards of old, this modern singer also reaps the adulation of his war-time listeners in many other gratifying way. "After that Madison

Square Gardens appearance, I got the best ice cream sodas, the best shoe shines, the biggest pieces of pie in New York," he laughs.

Forest shares starring honors with emcee John Reed King on "Double Or Nothing". The popular quiz show, now in its fourth consecutive, unbroken year on the Mutual-Don Lee Network, has changed its ways to meet the nation's war-time needs and put a shoulder to the wheel. "The program is so far removed from what our sponsor first bought that no one would recognize the original," says Forest.

The quiz portion of the show brings light-hearted fun to a nation whose need of laughter today is greater than in many years. Frank Forest represents the program's serious and sentimental elements. His glorious tenor voice each Friday night brings into the broadcast a salute to one of the Allied nations or the Nazi-occupied countries' "underground". Some twenty-two thus far have been so honored. And all America is singing and playing the stirring songs of these other lands.

Popularized Songs

Perhaps it's because Frank Forest, himself, finds so much joy in music that he has had so much success in popularizing such airs as China's marching song, "Ci-lai", Australia's "Waltzing Matilda" and England's "Tuppence Song". Music is his life.

Forest's acquaintance with the music of foreign lands began early in life. His mother, Mary Binde, was born in Rochester, New York, but his father, Emil Hayek was a native of Hungary. From him, the singer, (whose name, in Hungarian, means "forest"), learned some of the songs of Hungary. When he was ten, and living in St. Paul, his piano teacher urged his parents to provide training for his remarkably fine soprano voice, which they did. At twelve, he began to sing professionally, as boy soloist with the choir of a St. Paul church.

Forest continued the study of voice throughout his grammar and high school years, but he was not certain he had sufficient talent to succeed in a musical career. So it was as a student of agriculture that he enrolled at the University of Minnesota. Music leaders there induced him to change his plans. As a member of the Metropolitan Singing Party, he was booked over the Midland Chautauqua circuit by Arthur Kachel, now a member of Hollywood High School's teaching staff.

Emil Hayek soon thereafter moved his family from St. Paul to Oregon's Bitter Root Valley, where he had bought orchard acreage. When the family investment there was lost by a poor apple market, Frank opened a piano and voice studio in Stevensville, Oregon. Then came the World War I, rejection, due to his youth, officers' training at Augusta, Georgia, and the Armistice.

In New York, government post-war work as a War Camp Community song leader financed Forest's musical studies. Successful authorship of a book about this brand new field led

to a seat on the faculty of Hunter College, New York. But teaching community singing there was bad for his voice. His vitality and charm made him an exceptionally successful salesman for a manufacturing concern. Then he invested in a newly-formed drug company, sold out a year later with a bank account big enough to make possible several years of voice study in Italy. That company is a leader in the drug field today. "I might have made a fortune in that company if I had stayed with it, but I have never regretted my decision", he told us, when we interviewed him at luncheon at Lucey's Cafe. "I dislike business".

The years he spent in Italy, studying music, were among the happiest of his life. Intensive work under Italy's most famous masters produced excellent results.

In Italy

He lived in the home of a wealthy, retired Italian Army officer, whose family spoke English, French and German, as well as their own tongue. "Conversing with them in their home was a great help to me in mastering the three foreign languages", he comments. "I've always believed that speech itself is the basis of all superior vocal development".

In 1928 Forest made his operatic debut in Italy in "La Boheme". In 1931 he attained the highest goal in the opera world when he was listed as a member of La Scala in Milan. A world tour followed, in a company financed by the Italian government itself. Then Forest re-

turned to the United States in 1935, to be featured with Jack Benny in the film "Big Broadcast of 1937" and "Champagne Waltz", with Gladys Swarthout.

Just recently, Forest was signed for a featured role in "Rhythm Rancho", a Pine-Thomas production for Paramount, in which Jack Haley, Harriet Hilliard, Mary Beth Hughes and Ozzie Nelson and his band also will appear.

Forest, clean-cut, olive-skinned, rather tall, looks more like a Western rancher than a New Yorker. Much as he loves his musical activities, which center in New York, he always looks forward eagerly to returning to California and spends as much time here as he can. Here part of last summer, he picked up a tan to be envied by many a year-round Californian. Both he and his wife regard their beautiful Beverly Hills house as their real home.

The Forests have no children and lavish much affection on the perky little dog which is their constant companion. The singing star golfs and swims as much as time permits, is good at both and looks superbly healthy.

"Mike jitters" are a thing of the past with him now, he says.

"But I'm never so sure of myself that I can afford to take foolish chances, like ignoring such good old superstitions as never refusing a beggar on the way to the studio, never throwing a hat on a bed, never saying I feel fine and I know everything is going to go nicely on a broadcast!"

shots he took from a Jap officer. . . .
When the makers of White King Soap saw how vitally important the news of the day had become to the thousands of women who were their potential customers, they (quite sensibly) decided they would go "all out" for news during the morning hours, when the housewife listens to the radio as she sets the breakfast table and cleans up the house.

That's the reason the first soap company to sponsor a so-called "soap opera" ("Chandu, the Magician") now serves up news for the housewives of the West over three networks, spotted throughout the morning from the moment the alarm clock jingles at seven until the youngsters come home for mid-day lunch.

Art Baker smilingly admits that he pretends he's talking over the news with three people, when he goes on the air. One is a maiden aunt of seventy (if he can sell her, he can sell anybody.) Another is a friend who is a brand new bride, and the third a middle-aged housewife.

In fact, when he was first asked to do a newscast, Baker frankly declares he was somewhat dubious. He read over the news dispatches, those cold, impersonalized, factual

statements filled with implications of stark human tragedy, and suffering . . . and delivered his verdict. "I can't give news with a harsh, gatling-gun delivery" he said "the only way I can do it, is to talk things over with my listeners, as if I were seated across the breakfast table from them."

His sponsors said . . . "go to it".

Radio Down Under

Former Hollywood Radio Man
Writes of "the Wireless" in
The Land of Tea, Distrusting
Kangaroos, Sleepy Koala Bears

Somewhere in Australia,
September 17, 1943

MY DEAR EVELYN:
Your charming requests, your frantic beseeching, your cajoling—and then finally your threats have done it. Here beginneth my long-belated epistle to the Radio Life Family.

One word, however, by way of fanfare to this variety show in letter form. Since I am unable to write about my work because of Navy censorship regulations, I shall devote the various and disjointed spots of the pot pourri "to the wireless" (radio to Hollywood and Vine) in this land of innumerable cups of tea, distrusting kangaroos, and sleepy Koala bears.

As you know, I have been "down under" close to six months. During this time—when Uncle Sam has given me a few hours to myself—I have visited several Wireless Stations. I have talked with production managers, sat in script conferences, and watched shows in rehearsal. Once (by some misconception of my abilities) I was even invited to guest-produce the Lux Radio Theater, Australian version. For obvious reasons of course I bowed out. Australian radio conditions, you can be sure, have improved by that one fact alone.

I am reminded at this point that every story teller at the outset of his yarn, should have a gag up his sleeve—to "soften" up his audience before the final assault. I shall adhere to that old formula with Humor—Australian brand.

I submit the following gag as a model for all bespectacled gag writers who wander dejectedly through the flowing cornstalks of Hollywood and Vine in search of slightly used material. Here 'tis:

Voice: Pardon me, sir!

Announcer: Yes?

Voice: There's a man outside with a wooden leg named Smith.

Announcer: What's the name of his other leg?

Wow! A snappy record of "Waltzing Matilda" promptly waltzed out into the fresh air this delicious mor-

sel of nonsense to make way for a soap plug. No doubt the soap plug was deliberately placed afterwards to facilitate the gag's deckward flight.

Have you been properly softened up for the final assault? I should add, by way of explanation, that the above gag was discovered in the early morning Australian programs. On the whole, these "waker-uppers" follow our usual format—especially on our smaller stations, or what the Australians term "commercial stations." They feature records, mostly American, from light opera and ballads to unadulterated hep. There is very little programming or balancing of musical selections. Anything might come at you, and does, in the span of just ten minutes.

Here is a typical ten minutes (a bit exaggerated, perhaps) in one of these early reveille calls. First, Paul Robeson will sing beautifully, "Deep River"; next, Benny Goodman will make with a jar of jam; a time signal; a song by Bing Crosby; a commercial for a new headache pill; and then a gag. In a word, Variety.

As the broadcasting day roars on its merry way, a semblance of programming rears its ugly head. By mid-morning the listener will find programs written and produced with more thought and care. In passing, I might note some of their titles: Australian Composers' Corner, Morning Devotions, In the Lighter Vein, Echoes of Stage and Screen, Modern Moods, Betty's Shopping Basket, Women's Page of the Air, Kindergarten Session. Interspersed throughout these morning shows, which last all the way from five minutes to thirty, are numerous news flashes, commentaries and public service discussions. In fact, the Australian morning strip of "Wireless Transmitting" resembles our own in many details—with one exception!

No Soap Operas!

Right! No serials! On second thought, however, I believe I should qualify that statement, thereby putting a damper on your exultation. There are no serials—to the extent we "enjoy". That does not mean these "hanky dampers" are an unknown hazard in these parts. It

means simply that Australian production managers do not program them in the morning stretch as a single block through the week. At present, there are several serials spotted throughout the day's broadcasting. A very popular one is "Mr. Morte Takes a Holiday". Another one is "Secret Service Agent K7", which runs three times per week. There are several more; some passably written and produced; others badly acted and carelessly thrown together.

In aping our own radio serials, the Australians have not hesitated to copy our faults as well, even to the point of exaggeration. The final concoction then is very amusing at times.

Coming into the afternoon and evening, the listener will find more variety and more of the American touch. By the American touch I mean our own popular shows are heard, particularly in the evening. Bob Hope, Bing Crosby's Music Hall, Maxwell House, Command Performance, National Barn Dance, CBS Symphony, America Speaks, Eb and Zeb, Fibber McGee and Molly, Charlie McCarthy,—are only a few which pass into the night to make the Yank down under perhaps a bit homesick at moments, but reassuring him he has not been forgotten.

Moreover, his brothers-in-arms, the Aussies, are beginning to enjoy and look forward to these nightly American visits. A rapid-fire Bob Hope wisecrack, or a Bing Crosby off-the-cuff witticism, may leave him bewildered, but a bit of explaining soon brings a smile and a—"I say! That's a bit of all right!"

The tournabout comes when the Yank visits and listens to the Aussie's favorite shows. Then it is the "Digger" who must do the explaining—the why and wherefore his pet joke was so funny to him. After the painful explanation is over, it is the Yank's turn to exclaim, "I get it, Bud!"

This mutual exchange of ideas and temperaments leads me to do a bit of editorializing. I am going to depart from my role of reporter and voice an opinion.

Radio's Importance

Evelyn, if American Radio does no more than entertain the transplanted Yank down under, it will have accomplished one of the greatest jobs of the war. Probably this fact will not be recognized until later—in the post-war world when we can sit down and reflect soberly on what was attained. This great job I mention can neither be measured by the number of engagements won, nor successful task force missions completed.

American Radio has, and is doing, something more subtle and intangible. American Radio is helping to weld together two great nations with similar ideals. American Radio is giving to the men in the field, Australian and Americans, a medium by which different ideas, viewpoints, sympathies can be exchanged.

So for one year, Art Baker's mid-morning newscast, delivered in his own free-and-easy style, has summarized the progress of world events in a manner designed to interest Mrs. Average Housewife, busy about her home.

Baker does not believe in trying to mold people's thinking, but he is not averse to giving news summaries in such a simple, down-to-earth way that people can form their own opinions. Baker likes to spice his newscast with a factual tidbit that Mrs. Jones can spring that afternoon at her first aid class. With his tongue in his cheek, and a brilliant flash of the billion-dollar Baker smile, Art admits he doesn't mind if Mrs. Jones doesn't give him name-credit. So long as she keeps right on listening to him.

Art Baker's newscast, sponsored by all three of the Los Angeles Soap Co.'s products, White King, Sierra Pine and Scotch Triple-Action Cleanser, is heard Monday through Friday at 10:45, over KFI and 12 other western NBC stations through California, Colorado, Utah, Idaho, Montana and Arizona.

Ex-newspaper Man's Slant

A newspaper gave Bob Andersen his first radio job, when he went on the air for San Francisco's evening Hearst paper back in 1934, as the Call-Bulletin's radio reporter. For a period of nine years, in which he has been successively the Call-Bulletin's news editor of the air, news bureau editor and newscaster for the Bay City's NBC and CBS stations, and a member of the CBS newsstaff in Hollywood, Bob Andersen has developed the same long-nosed scent for news that marks the star newspaper reporter.

"Working for a newspaper taught me one thing," says Bob. "and that is you have to stay on top of the news at all times to do an intelligent newscast."

Bob Andersen, unlike most newscasters, has no actor or producer ambitions. On the contrary, he intends to make newscasting his permanent radio career. He thinks the war has done one thing for newscasts in general: It has made the public not only news conscious, but conscious of the wisdom of listening to a thoughtful, well-edited newscast delivered by someone who knows news, because it is in his blood.

Bob's pet aversion is people who spell his name with an "o". Chief hobby, his nine-months-old daughter, whose diapers he frequently washes himself in White King Granulated soapsuds, of course.

Bob Andersen's newscast, sponsored by White King, Sierra Pine and Scotch Cleanser, airs Monday through Friday at 12:15 p. m. over 12 stations of the CBS Pacific Coast network. Bob also delivers spot newscasts for White King to New Mexico, Texas and Nevada.

Just as this story goes to press comes news that Wilson Edwards

who has been airing the 7:00 a.m. Associated Press News over the Don Lee Mutual Network every Monday, Wednesday and Friday, has been called to active duty as a Lieutenant J. G. in the United States Navy.

First News of the Day

Bill Haworth, popular Mutual Newscaster who did White King's breakfast-hour news for several months last year, goes back on the air for the soap company with the firm conviction that he gets the biggest break of all three White King newscasters.

Bill's reasoning is based on the undeniable fact that twenty-four out of the thirty-three cities which hear his early morning network newscast, have no morning paper whatsoever. Therefore, his alarm-clock broadcast, on which he intersperses news-bulletins with time-signals, is the first news of the day purveyed by any news medium in those cities.

There's another reason Bill Haworth is particularly happy with his new 7 a. m. news assignment. That is: due to time-belt differences, this newscast offers the first complete morning round-up of what has transpired while the Pacific Coast slept.

"The news of most major news developments seems to come over the wire between three and five o'clock in the morning" remarks Bill Haworth. "and that's logical enough when one realizes that it is noon in London when it is only 4 a. m. here on the West Coast. Consequently the Allied Bulletins with the day's most sensational news stories invariably break in time for my 7 a. m. newscast."

Because his newscast is heard throughout the Pacific Coast on thirty-three stations of the Don Lee Mutual network, Bill Haworth's war summary and Washington news round-up is followed by a coverage of Pacific Coast news, gleaned from the A. P. wires. Bill Haworth re-edits his 7 a. m. newscast for the benefit of Los Angeles area listeners at 8:30 a. m. over KHJ. On this rebroadcast he brings the day's news up-to-date, and includes a brief digest of local news highlights.

Bill Haworth's chief hobby is building scale model railroads. . . an interest acquired in childhood days when he spent "half his life" on pullmans and the other half astride a horse. While his current building operations have been suspended due to war-time shortages, he spends his time sketching the model railroad he expects to build in the halcyon post-war days of tomorrow.

moved to Hollywood. Nora Lou's crash to singing stardom won't change living arrangements the slightest. Both she and "Boss" think it is better for him to be near and act as sort of a bumper for "the young lady," as Janik refers to Nora Lou. Her family—parents, brother, and sisters—still live up north.

"Any boy friend?" we probed. Nora Lou blushed becomingly, then put on a Mona Lisa smile.

Janik admitted he is rigid about her routine. If he weren't Johnny on the spot to see that all orders were carried out, we doubt if even as docile and nice a girl as little Martin would mind the letter of the law. She loves the outdoors—fishing, riding, and swimming, but the latter is taboo because water might get in the ears or sinuses and hurt her voice. Through her own choice, she doesn't smoke or drink. Bedtime is 10:30; no shopping tours for five days preceding a broadcast; rising time, 7:30 followed by exercise; food is simple and carefully supervised by Mrs. Janik, an experienced dietician.

Nora Lou is able to keep a sylph-like figure by carrying out this routine. Ice cream is her only stumbling block.

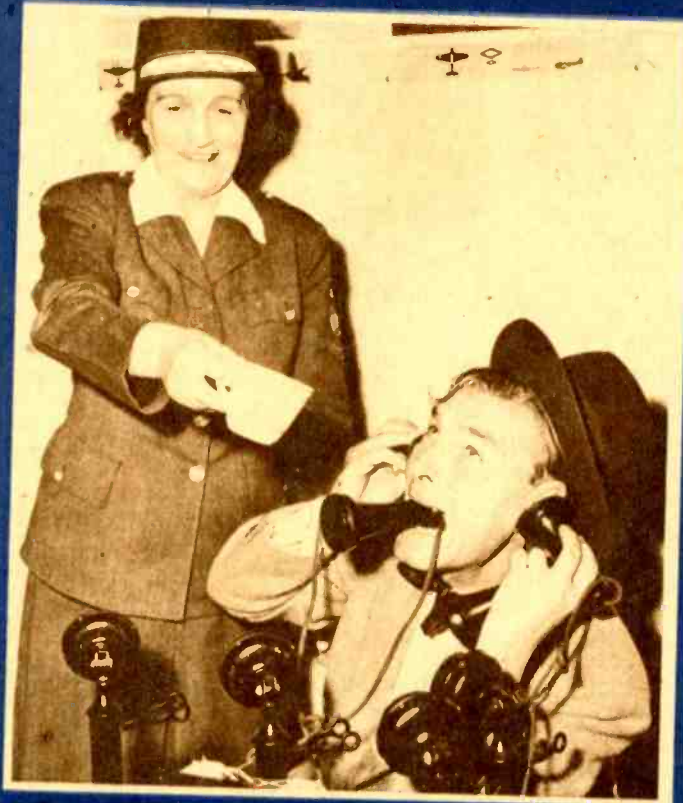

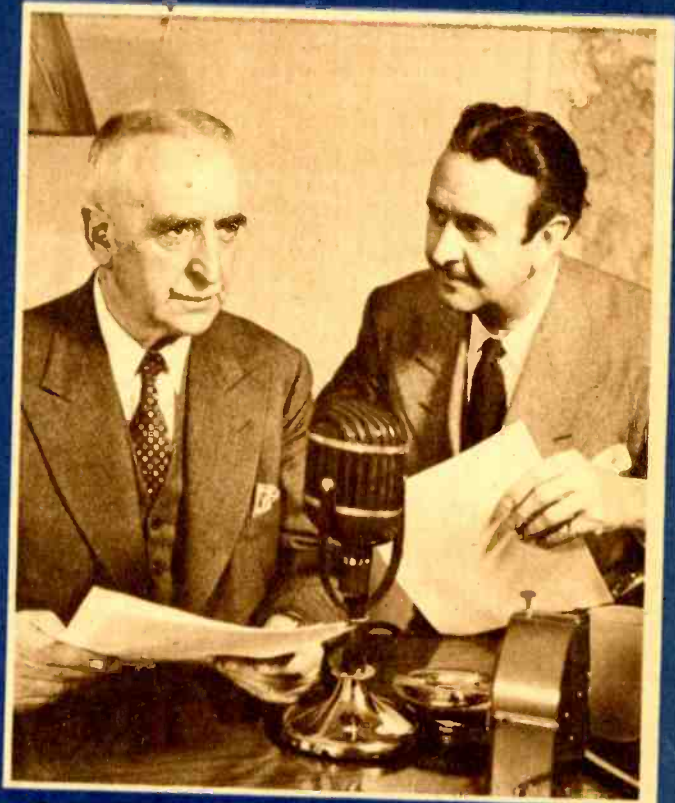
