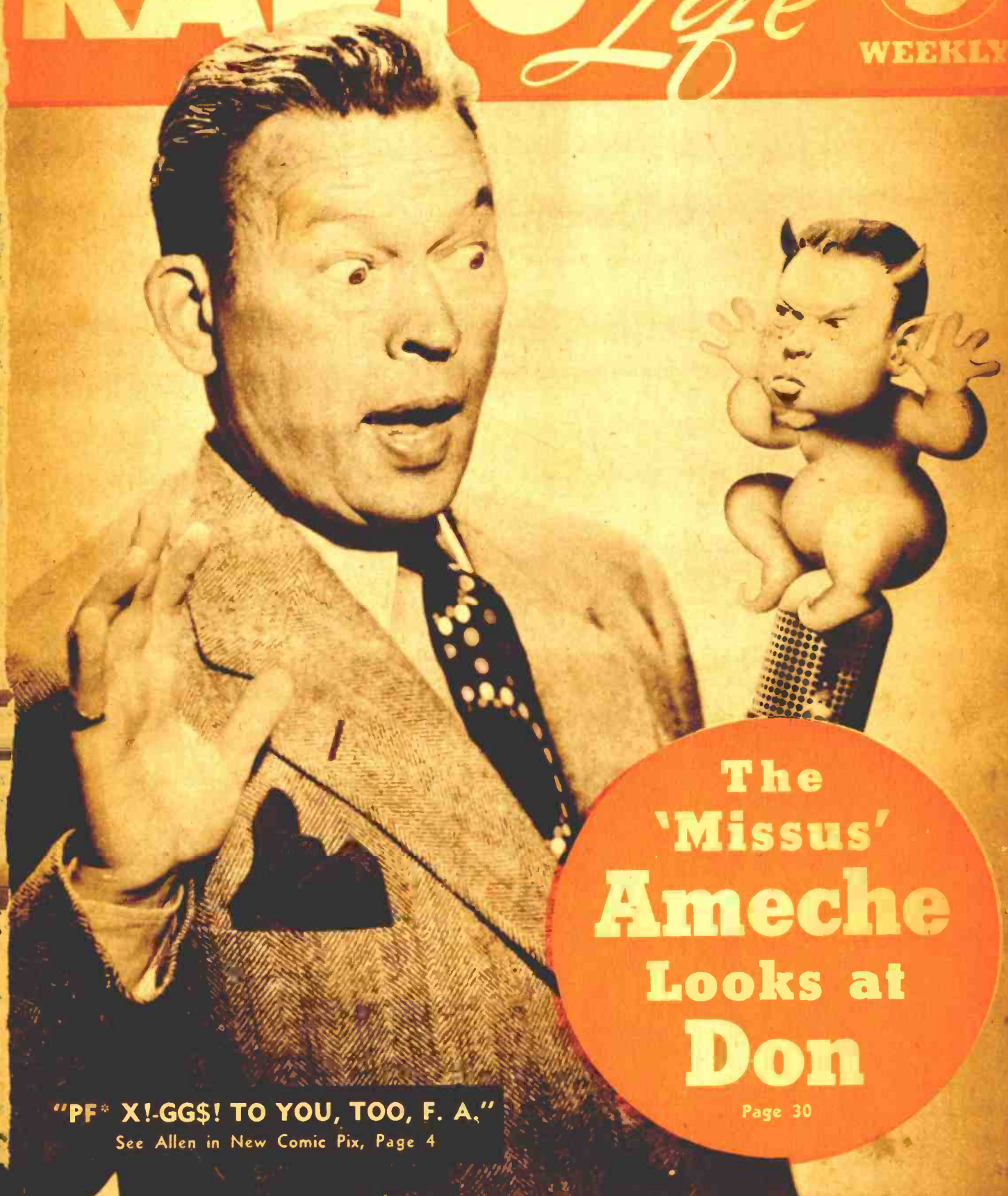

ENJOY INEXPENSIVE PRIZE - WINNING ORANGE MARMALADE

It's Easy To Make Anytime With This Simple Recipe

- 6 Medium Sized Oranges (2 lbs. Sliced)
- 6 Cups Water
- ½ Cup Lemon Juice (About 6 lemons)
- 1 Package M.C.P. Pectin
- 9½ Level Cups Sugar (Measured ready for use)

1. Cut oranges in cartwheels with very sharp knife to make slices thin as possible. Discard the large flat peel ends. Sliced fruit should weigh 2 pounds.
2. Put sliced fruit in 8-quart kettle. Add the water and lemon juice.
3. Bring to a quick boil; boil gently for 1 hour (uncovered). If peel is not tender in 1 hour, boil until tender.
4. Measure the cooked material. Due to boiling, the volume will be reduced below 7 cups. Add water to make total peel and juice exactly 7 cups.
5. Put back in kettle. Stir in M.C.P. Pectin; continue stirring and bring to a full boil.
6. Add sugar (previously measured). Stir gently until it has reached a full rolling boil, and BOIL EXACTLY 4 MINUTES. Remove from fire; skim and stir by turns for 5 minutes.
7. Pour into jars. If you use pint or quart jars, seal hot and invert jars on lids until Marmalade begins to set. Then, shake well and set jars upright. This keeps the peel evenly distributed throughout.

NOTE: This recipe works equally well with Navel Oranges or Valencias. When either variety is over-ripe and peel is soft, use ¾-cup Lemon Juice instead of ½-cup. (Be sure to discard any seeds.) This recipe makes 7 pounds of prize-winning Orange Marmalade.

THE PENT-HOUSE photographic studio at Hollywood's Columbia Square looked like something an harassed wardrobe manager might dream about after a nifty supper of pickles and milk?

A Santa Claus costume . . . complete with beard, boots, cap, belt and

stuffin . . . was draped over the camera crane.

From one doorknob, a regal Persian prince's finery trailed its scarlet sash.

Perched on a wall shelf was a complete stock of headgear . . . derby, straw sailor, swami turban, silk topper, Sherlock Holmes fore-and-after, fencing mask.

Propped against a wall was one vi-

scious scythe, draped with the long white robe, knee-length beard and hour-glass equipment of doddering Father Time.

All this surrealistic drapery was the result of a week's idea-huddling by CBS press writers and a veritable scavenger hunt through Hollywood costume marts for over a hundred "props."

Such was the setting for an off-screen, off-mike, off-the-record drama in the checkered career of Fred Allen, Portrait-Sitter!

When final arrangements were completed for Fred's return to the Columbia airplanes in December, it was the signal for a general campaign to pass the glad tidings on to you, the radio public. One of the first jobs of the publicity department was to set up a series of "gag" pictures and portraits such as you see on these pages.

This is the story of how they got that way. This is the story behind the man behind those fantastic faces!

SCENE ONE

A door opens. Enter our hero, Fred Allen, and his heroine, Portland Hoffa, otherwise known as Mrs. Fred. Both are smartly attired in gray suits . . . looking for all the world like a fashion magazine candid shot titled "Along the Avenue."

(Incidentally, Portland has a charming voice in real life. And she is much more prone to address her husband as "darling" than as "Mr. A-a-allen." She is tiny and svelte, with a shyly gracious manner that is completely winning.)

ALLEN: Gad, this looks like a wardrobe trunk I was born in once!

(Incidental chatter as Fred greets Photographer Ted Allan and assorted executives, press representatives, onlookers.)

SCENE TWO

Deadpan Mr. A. sheds well-tailored gray suit coat, dons Sherlock Holmes outfit, grabs magnifying glass and begins to examine nearby chair.

MR. A.: Looking for posterior prints, y'know. Never can tell where a murder will end!

(Camera clicks as Fred poses cheerfully as super-duper snooper . . . adding his own clever photographic ideas to those already planned out by the picture crew.)

MR. A. holds magnifying glass to ear, glances in mirror, quips: Walt 'til the public gets a load of this. Gable will be through!

SCENE THREE

Costume directions call for fencing outfit . . . quilted jacket, foil, wire-mesh mask. It is obvious to all concerned as Allen struggles to get into said jacket that some traitor in the crowd has been listening to Jack

This is the climax. This is the costume to end all costumes and all little children's glamorous dreams of St. Nick. A bit moist about the brow but still valiant, Allen climbs into Santa Claus garb . . . two-piece wool suit, wide leather belt, boots, wig, beard and a score of et ceteras.

Action: Mr. Allan steps forward

to stuff a pillow into Mr. Allen's middle . . . which, au naturel, is not quite up to character.

ALLEN: This is like having twins . . . in reverse.

Click of camera, followed by sudden expostulation on the part of Mr. Claus.

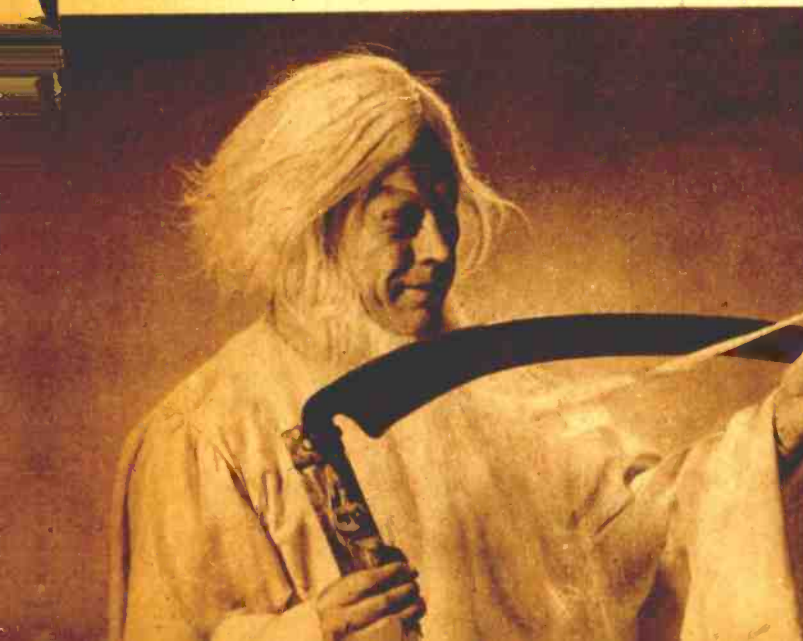

NO! NO details on suicide.
"No stories on forgeries!" It was Editor Wayne Miller of the "Richfield Reporter" speaking, while the reporter himself, John Wald, gave assent with his acquiescent expression.

"No, we don't go in for murders," Miller expanded. "We've carried ten lines so far on the Sir Harry Oakes affair.

"We carried three lines on the Veronica Lake divorce.

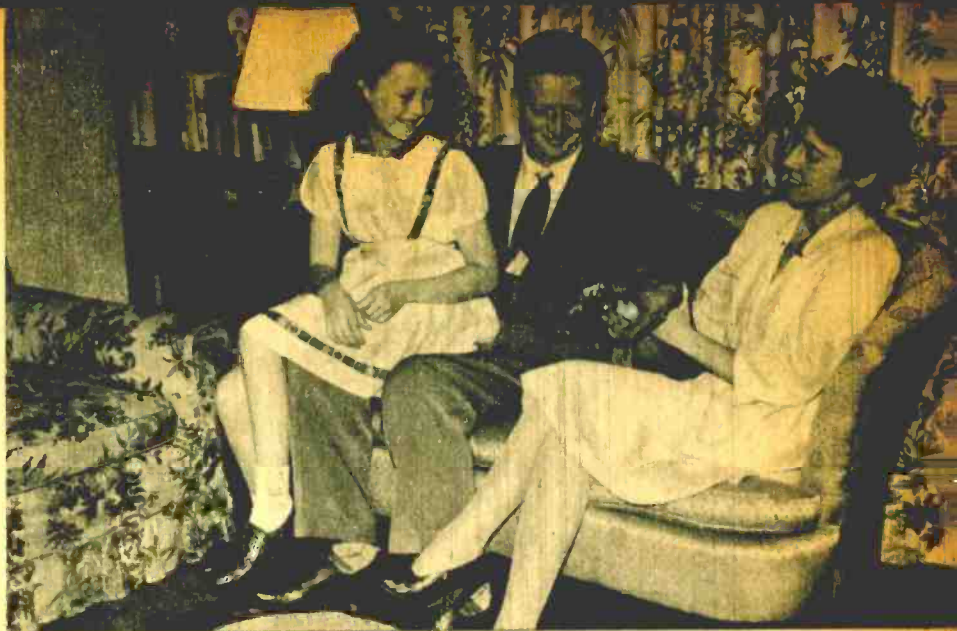
"We'll ignore the latest Flynn case until the court makes a decision."

As "Richfield Reporter's" editor continued to enumerate the exceptional policies of this venerable news broadcast (13 years), it became more and more apparent that the program's success was due only in part to its continuously same spot (10 p.m.), its excellent coverage (NBC-

KFI), and the splendid diction and vocal appeal of its mickeman.

"Richfield Reporter" has held top Hooper rating on the Coast for years. During the first nine months of 1943, it averaged a rating of 12.7; its nearest competitor, strategically spotted an hour earlier (9 p.m.), averaged only 10.8, while two other leading programs struck a norm of 7.1 and 5.3.

As the granddaddy of them all, "Richfield Reporter" has been flattered by imitation. But amazingly enough, it has gained and held its preeminence by avoiding sensationalism, by eschewing editorializing or coloring of the news, by shunning partisanship. It has stuck to a formula which sounds comfortable, but is indeed tollsome: vigorous, carefully-edited newscasting, delivered in a style which is friendly but not familiar.

In a ground-floor inner office of Hixson-O'Donnell Agency, where Richfield's advertising account is handled, Editor Wayne Miller sat contentedly, the other day, in a cluttered room while he hovered over sheets of yellow teletype paper. At his elbow, one teletype machine stood silent while its partner chattered out the news importantly.

Finely-chiseled of feature and faintly silvered of hair, Editor Miller looked through his hexagonal-shaped glasses and explained that he had

been working since two o'clock that afternoon on the coming night's broadcast.

Miller, who has edited the program for nine and a half of its 13 years, turned his back to the map-decorated wall, pursed his button-hole mouth, and went out of his way to explain how the nightly newscast is put together.

Editing Routine

"I start at two o'clock in this office and go over the news which has arrived since six in the morning. I look for stories which may not be repeated on the night wire (after 3 p. m.) and start writing the last pages of the broadcast first, saving the beginning of the program for the hot, last-minute items. Of course, I try for stories too late for

the evening papers," Miller said with a gleam. "Everything of any importance since the previous night comprises the program. Too many people rely on The Reporter for a complete summary for us to pay any attention to other newscasts." Then he added: "We can't be influenced by the fact that a subject has been chewed by everybody and his brother."

By the time Editor Miller leaves for NBC at 5:15, he has approximately 1200 of the 2700 words which will be necessary to fill the 14 minutes and 40 seconds allotted The Reporter. John Wald, whose voice brings listeners this material, speaks at the rate of slightly under 200 words a minute, has managed to get

Hall on NBC, "Great Gildersleeve" on NBC, "One Man's Family" on NBC and is an NBC staff announcer. Wouldn't have blamed him if the wrong network had slipped out in his Thanksgiving Day announcement!

Tommy on "Mystery"

Tommy Cook, the "Little Beaver" of Red Ryder series and one of Radio Row's most demanded young actors, is currently being written out of the last eight minutes of the Red Ryder show so that he may enact a role in Carlton E. Morse's "I Love a Mystery" series.

Carol Nixed

Ex-king Carol of Rumania was all set to speak on CBS' "Report to the Nation" last week. The show, in fact, was in rehearsal and plans were crystallized for the foreigner to be cut into the web from Mexico, when the Office of Censorship for the United

States clamped down on the former monarch's being aired and said it could not, at this time, divulge reasons for the ban. Move climaxed series of protests made against Carol's air appearance by members of Congress.

Lewis in L. A.

Mutual commentator Fulton Lewis Jr. was a Los Angeles visitor last week and broadcast from KHJ's studios. He spent much time investigating the association of contractor Hans Wilhelm Rohl, German-born Angeleño, with army construction contracts.

Police investigated a fire which did minor damage to Lewis' suite Wednesday night at the Town House. The commentator was quoted as saying the circumstances looked as if they might be suspicious, although he had never before "been the target for this sort of thing."

Kaltenborn Travelling

NBC news analyst H. V. Kaltenborn is on an inspection trip of the Pacific fighting fronts and Robert St. John is substituting for him. Most of his time will be spent in the Solomons.

This makes four trips Kaltenborn has undertaken through key war areas in the past 15 months.

Oil On Troubled Water

That the Christmas Day will be replete with diversissements for men of the armed forces was reaffirmed last week when Standard Oil signed for an hour-long Yuleday show over NBC. Program will be directed toward the men at home and abroad, especially 6,000 Standard employes now in uniform.

Emcee for the broadcast will be Lewis Stone. Other participants will include Frances Langford, Lee Sweetland, and Robert Armbruster's orchestra with a chorus. Program will be carried over KFI at 9 a.m.

Collingwood Lecture

A first-hand report of Allied action in North Africa and a graphic description of war on all European battle fronts will be presented by Charles Collingwood, CBS foreign correspondent, when he appears in Studio A at Columbia Square on Wednesday evening, December 15, for the only Southern California "stop" of his current nation-wide lecture tour.

Proceeds from the event will go to war relief organizations, it was announced today by Fox Case, director of public relations for Columbia's western division.

Recently returned from North Africa, Collingwood will discuss "What We Learned in North Africa" and "Europe Looks at America." An open forum, with Collingwood answering questions from the floor, will follow his talk.

One of the nation's most outstanding writers and reporters of World War II, Collingwood won the 1942 George Foster Peabody award and was cited by the National Headliners Club for "consistently accurate and interesting accounts of the fighting in the North African war zone" in 1943. He scored news "scoops" on the assassina-

"It will probably be the last one we'll get to hear from Los Angeles, unless the authorities think one of the other S. C. games will be the best of the day. (Editor's Note: They shortwaved the S. In 3,000 words, but finds that foreign names and figures slow him up.

From six o'clock until air time, Miller is busy whipping the script into final form. "As I go along I get a mental picture," he explained. "I like contrasts. The other night we had several stories more or less alike—the forest fire, a tornado, and wires down in Minnesota. I'd rather play fire against sleet, a strike against a battlefield story.

Close Calls

Asked if he had ever missed getting The Reporter on the air, Miller exclaimed: "Jeepers! Two or three times John has gotten to the top of the last page and I've rushed in with the rest of the copy."

About twice a week Miller averages a last-minute flash which he rushes in to Wald while the latter is still broadcasting. In all, Wald covers 30 stories every night.

Mail? Yes, about a dozen letters a day. It often happens that a piece of unusual information draws a larger than ordinary response. Recently, The Reporter told about a new cure for asthma—bombardment of the victim's blood with ultra-violet rays, as practiced by three Philadelphia physicians. Listeners who weren't sitting with pencil in hand failed to jot down the address if they wished further detailed information. As a result, The Reporter was recipient of more than 200 inquiries. Miller and Wald dubbed the response "The Asthma Incident."

Asked if "Richfield Reporter" had ever been called on something, Miller recalled only one instance. "Yes. A woman objected to our using a football expression (smashing over right guard) to describe troop movements in Italy. She reminded us that war was 'no game.'"

"We responded by telling her that no less a person than General Eisenhower had remarked: 'We are playing in the major league now.'"

"We never anticipate the news," Miller impressed. Frankly, he is an experienced newspaper man, who knows better than to get himself behind the eight ball. Between 1920 and 1932, he covered sports, police, city hall, and re-wrote for the Los Angeles Times and Daily News, wrote a radio column for the Copley chain, and was radio editor for the Los Angeles Examiner. Two years of preparatory law did not come in amiss for his future editorial job.

"John is easy to write for," Miller changed the subject. "He enjoys different words and has a straight forward delivery without being effervescent."

Wald, who will have been on the show seven years next April, has been the one and only Reporter since his air pal, John Forbes, went into

the Signal Corps a year ago. Before that, the pair did a two-way broadcast, each carrying part of the load. It was lively and versatile, but Wald alone has carried on very well.

Ruddy-haired Wald starts working on his script at 8 p. m., marks phonetic pronunciation on foreign words, and goes through the broadcast twice—once silently to "get the grasp of it" and again to read it aloud.

Broadcast Time

As 10 o'clock approaches, he leaves the newsroom and settles himself in Studio H. A sound effects man handles the fanfare record and the dots and dashes. A new fanfare record has to be supplied every week or two, but this is minor compared to the procedure years ago, when a real, live trumpeter was held at the studio every night until "Richfield Reporter" time. His work consisted of blowing the opening fanfare and tootling the closing one.

"Wald," said Miller admiringly, "was picked for his combination of diction and flexibility of voice. He has the ability to shade finely. He can read controversial material and not betray, by one iota, what his personal opinion is. He can handle a story as hot as dynamite."

And wittingly or not, Editor Miller had divulged one of the biggest secrets for The Reporter's success. Neither by word nor inflection of word does the program cast an opinion. It delivers news, lauded of the usual sensational sordidity, in forthright fashion and leaves an intelligent listener with the prerogative of drawing his own conclusions. Wald really strikes the keynote of his news fare when he says, "And a good, good evening!" His is the best a newscaster can make it.

"We'll give equal lines to political candidates in 1944 as we did in 1940," Miller elucidated. "Both major candidates in the 1940 campaign received the same space on the program."

"After the 1940 campaign was over, we received four letters. Two claimed we favored Willkie. The other two claimed we favored Roosevelt!"

Girl from San Diego



Peg Miller Is Now a Radio Success, Helps Write CBS' "Report to the Nation"

IT TOOK a girl from San Diego, Peg Miller by name, to pry open the exclusive masculine field of news commentation. Peg is co-writer on Columbia's "Report to the Nation," heard here on the Coast Tuesday nights. She thinks that women have a truly great chance—but it's not a cinch.

At one time on her way up, she was preparing a 15-minute short-wave program for the CBS special events department. Now, as you may know, there's a lot more to preparing a news broadcast than snatching "takes" from the teletypes and pasting them in order. There's the time element, too. Whether the news is holding a five-minute period or a straight quarter hour, the person preparing it must give the announcer ample copy. One day Peg compiled a short broadcast and thought she had supplied plenty of copy—all nicely written. What a start, when she realized that the announcer had used up all the news she had assembled. There were four seconds of dead air. "They will surely fire me now," Peg thought despondently.

Getting herself in hand, she went back to the newsroom. The staff greeted her with grins and pointed toward the bulletin board. There was a poem signed by the boss. It read:

Old Jack Knell
Was merry as hell
As he gobbled up the news.
They swept the floor
In search for more
But he ended with the dead
air blues.

Did It Again

Shortly after this, she left another CBS announcer high up in the dead

air. It was the general practice, with news breaking so fast, to prepare all but the last two or three minutes of a program. While the newscaster was broadcasting, Peg watched the teletypes and gathered last-minute bulletins. Suddenly, while leaning over the teletypes, she realized that the announcer was strangely quiet. Then she heard a gasp and a shaky voice said: "Well, as you see, the Bismarck was sunk. The—the—Bismarck, yes, it was sunk. Now the Bismarck—" And into the studio she rushed with more copy.

In addition to "Report," Peg writes several news shows, but dramatized news, such as is featured on "Report," is her metier. She loves it.

"Any rules for writing?" she was asked.

"I remember what a teacher said to me once. She said that people relied too much on adjectives and adverbs. That the best writing was done with nouns and verbs."

Not Newspaper Woman

"I'll tell you something. I wish I'd had newspaper background. It would be invaluable, but I was never lucky enough to get a job on a newspaper. Goodness knows I tried. I drove the editor of the San Diego Union stark, raving crazy, I'm sure."

"When I was at Columbia, I wrote him suggesting a daily column. A sort of 'Local Girl in New York' with paeans of praise about tall buildings and subways. He was kind enough to write me and tell me that space wouldn't justify it, but that my writing showed promise. So I went out then and got an interview with Gertrude Atherton, the California novelist. I had great hopes. Several months later, he answered and apologized. He said that somehow the

article had been buried on his desk. He suggested some revisions and I tried to get Miss Atherton, but she'd left New York.

"That didn't stop me," said Peg. "I got a sort of a crazy story by interviewing department store Santa Clauses. Among them I found an old Shakesperian actor, a former opera singer, a ventriloquist who wanted to fight a duel of voice-throwing with Bergen and a lot of other interesting fellows. The Union bought that story at space rates, and I was so excited I tried harder than ever.

"I did a story on a 'Swing Mikado.' Another on a ballet dancer. The Union bought quite a bit of my stuff, but then the editor wrote and said he couldn't use anything else. I'll bet I made his hair curl. I countered with a complete advertising broadside. And, the same letter asked for a job. I'd won an alternate Pulitzer scholarship at Columbia and the paper printed that with the 'home town girl makes good' angle. The editor then wrote me that he'd like to see me when I came back to San Diego, but the Columbia job came along. I found out later that he did have a job for me. So you see, I COULD have had some newspaper experience."

Peg Miller is a business-like young lady. She's slim and quick and dresses extremely well. She has learned that silence is more than golden in a busy newsroom and, except for conferences, rarely sticks her head out of her office. Yes, she has an office and is now one of Columbia's most important news writers.

She'll tell you that there's a great field for women in her game, but she will tell you, too, that newspaper experience is invaluable. Even if she didn't get any herself.

HOW WOULD you like to have a "blind date" with Don Ameche, girls?

Once there was a girl who did and was very unhappy about it. But not for long.

We lunched with her at the Brown Derby the other day,—a tall, blonde young woman, with a poised, efficient manner. She was Don Ameche's first girl friend, Honore Prendergast of Dubuque, Iowa—until she became "the missus."

The "tall, dark and handsome" star of the Blue Network's scintillant Saturday show, "What's New," met his wife when both were high school kids. He was attending Columbia Academy, a Catholic boarding school in her home town of Dubuque, Iowa. She, a convent school there. Next week-end, Ameche phoned Honore at Dubuque, to say, "I'm coming out." The romance was on, all over again. On November 26, at the Church of the Nativity in Dubuque, they were married. Father Sheehy came from Washington, D. C. to officiate. It was a large and beautiful wedding.

With some stage and vaudeville successes behind him, Don Ameche had achieved a well-established place in radio at the time of his marriage. He was earning a comfortable income; but his wife had the prideful thrill of seeing him climb to greater heights in radio and attain brilliant stardom in the moving picture firmament after they were married.

In his screen and radio roles, Don Ameche's is a dashing charm that bespeaks his Italian ancestry. Millions know the Ameche of the mellow, flexible voice that has been heard on so many radio shows; the screen hero Ameche of the flashing

smile and breezy gaiety. What interested Radio Life was the man *behind* that trademark personality,—Dominic Felix Ameche, Jr., second child of Mr. and Mrs. Dominic Felix Ameche of Kenosha, Wisconsin, and head of a thriving family of his own.

That lunch date with Mrs. Ameche gave us a wife's-eye view of a conservative, substantial pater familias, with his share of those funny little foibles and inconsistencies that endear husbands the world over to their wives.

Is Family Man

Don's father was Italian, his mother, a mixture of Scotch-Irish and "Pennsylvania Dutch." He had four sisters and three brothers. Evidently he likes big families. For, happy to have brought four sons into the world, the Don Ameches are preparing to adopt two baby girls as soon as they can find the right ones. And those "baby sisters" are a favorite topic of conversation with their boys, Donny, ten years old (nickname, "Butch"), Ronny, eight; Tommy, four, and Lonny, three.

Awaiting the two baby girls is one of the most beautiful homes in Southern California—white, green-shuttered, rambling, a combination of the Colonial and the California ranch type, with a swimming pool and five acres of garden and fruit trees around it. The Ameches bought the twenty-room house in Encino from Al Jolson.

The radio and film star is a true Latin in his aversion for business matters. Mrs. Ameche is the family bookkeeper and "secretary of the exchequer."

"Don simply won't keep track of the checks he writes. When I'm away, he doesn't even pick up his paychecks for weeks at a time," she remarked.

On one such recent occasion, when she sent for his bank statement, it proved to be just column after column of red figures. Don had made out checks galore without depositing a cent, but his banker didn't consider it necessary to notify him, knowing the account would be straightened out later.

He's equally easy-going about his radio and screen roles—puts a great deal of thought and effort into them, but doesn't fret about the way rehearsals go as many of the other big stars do.

Americans Like Their Murder Straight!

AMERICANS like their murder the way men like their whiskey.

Bill Spier lit his cigarette, blew the smoke slowly through the blackness of his beard, and narrowed his eyes in concentration of thought. "Americans like their murder straight."

William Spier is the man who gives you murder the way you like it on radio's most popular thrill show, CBS's "Suspense," and with his work on that program Mr. Spier is masterfully proving himself to be an Alfred Hitchcock of the Airlanes. In the process, he is revealing to the radio world what results when a

show is molded to perfection by the skilled artistry of one man in complete control of the reins. Producer and director of "Suspense," Bill Spier does much more than stand by with a stop watch.

He carefully selects the stories for their suitability, cautiously rehashes the plot and writes adroit adaptations to transfer the thrills of the written word into the theater of sound. With composer Lucien Marawick, he creates an original musical score to heighten the effect of his every presentation, using the music, not as ordinarily employed to bridge scenes, but to emphasize with dramatic underscoring the thoughts and actions of his players. With ingenuity and skill, he works to create the finished masterpiece.

"Suspense" is thus the delight of

filmland's finest actors. Compliment of a kind not often garnered by any airline show is Cary Grant's declaration: "If I ever do any more radio work, I want it to be on 'Suspense,' where I get a good chance to act!" Cary has the successful habit of choosing his roles with wisdom and care. And many another of Hollywood's biggest names await with anxiety their invitation to appear on Bill Spier's program, delighted with the opportunity to become completely absorbed in the creation of a true characterization, in contrast with the personality ballyhooing that is demanded of them when making their usual guest star stints.

Stars Appear

This big parade of picture personalities who have turned their talents toward bringing you murder and mystery on the ether waves has therefore been formed of the cream of filmdom's drama crop, with such worthy representatives as Gene Lockhart, pretty Geraldine Fitzgerald, Robert Young, Warren William, who is the screen's sleek "Lone Wolf," Phillip Dorn, the enchanting Margo, and the incomparable Orson Welles.

Indeed, the awesome Orson lent his distinguished presence, and accompanying genius, to the program's production for five consecutive weeks. It seems the team of Welles and Spier came into being long before those men from Mars landed on this good green earth! For it was Bill Spier who welcomed wonder-boy Welles into the realm of radio, when Orson was a mere lad of seventeen years! He has reached the decrepit age of twenty-eight now, by the way!

When Welles and Spier effected their reunion to collaborate for the presentation of "Suspense" stories, it

was a tremendous treat for them both, since the two of them form a mutual admiration society. Crowning incident of the gala get-together occurred when Orson had the misfortune to break his ankle while maneuvering his entrance into the echo chamber, box-like compartment on a broadcast stage from which emerge the voices from "beyond." Apparently, Orson has long had the habit of having much misfortune, for the mishap brought a delighted

chuckle from Bill Spier who declared, "It's just like old times! That guy has ankles made of glass!"

When Laird Cregar appeared on "Suspense," he played the leading character who was convinced that there were only five fundamental reasons why a man would not and could not murder his fellow man. To prove his theory, he offered a fabulous sum to each of five hand-picked "murderers" who would have sufficient reason to kill him. So confi-

dent was he of his theory that he set himself up as the purported "victim." The last old boy fooled him, however, accepting the challenge and killing Dr. Bronson (Cregar) after giving him a few minutes in which to write down the results of his unfortunate "experiment."

Robert Young played a young man haunted by the illusion that he was

other American males, Ameche loathes shopping, so his wife buys all his clothes. His tastes are very conservative. In only one item of dress does he kick over the traces. That's his ties! They're usually brilliant, figured affairs, flaunting numerous colors.

Are you one of those wives with a husband who treasures belongings that seem worthless to you? So is Mrs. Ameche! Don, she confides, becomes passionately devoted to occasional articles of clothing and refuses to part with them, regardless of how dilapidated they become with age.

His Pet Hat

There is, for instance, a pet hat that he never wears except when it rains. "He's had it ever since I've known him," says Mrs. Ameche. "From pinching it, his fingers have gone clear through the front of the crown. Once, when we were newly-weds, I sent it to the cleaners and he had a fit! He said it didn't need cleaning and it might get lost! Don wore the hat to the Trocadero out here one night and the checkroom girls misplaced it. You never heard such a fuss! When the girls in the checkroom finally found it and saw what it was he was so upset about, they nearly had hysterics."

Then there's that certain pair of old brown pants. Once, when both the Ameches were away from home on trips, a maid sent the treasured trousers to the cleaners with some old work clothes. She neglected to say anything about it and when Don returned home and couldn't find them, he was inconsolable. Four months later, his wife found them, among the other articles returned by the cleaner. Don's work in the meantime, had taken him east. Mrs. Ameche wired him, "Please come home. I've found the brown pants!" He still laughs about the message.

Sports figure large in Ameche's life, especially horse racing and golf, at which latter he excels. He has no interest whatever in attending baseball games, but loves to listen to the radio accounts of them and can tell you almost anything you might want to know about baseball history, even to the stars' batting averages. With the exception of the newspapers' sport sections, he rarely reads anything except the Readers' Digest,—not even the reams of publicity written about him.

preparing for a duel with none other than the long-since-dead Alexander Hamilton. His poor wife, played by Geraldine Fitzgerald, nearly went mad trying to divert his attention from illusion into the reality of modern living.

In the end, he was found dead, presumably shot, as if the duel had really been fought.

Besides the thrill of mystery acting, another reason filmland's finest find "Suspense" an actor's seventh heaven, is Bill Spier's subtle scheming in presenting the opposite from the obvious. The villainous Peter Lorre thus emerged a gentleman of grace and good cheer, while mild-mannered Harry Carey donned the mask of the murderer. But doing away with type-casting is only one of the tricks Bill Spier has up his sleeve.

Spier's Rules

There are three rules by which he

enabled the two to play many telephone jokes on their wives. "I can't tell Don from Jimmy on the phone, except when they say my name," Mrs. Ameche admits.

As an instance of her husband's constant clowning and unmerciful teasing, she mentioned an occasion when they went out together for the first time after she underwent an operation. She donned a lovely new dress with a poudre blue front. Don was shaving and she picked up the soapy shaving brush and took a swipe at his cheek with it as she passed. He chased her all over the house with it, while she yelled, "Don't spoil my dress!" And when she finally took refuge in the shower and pulled the curtains around her, he turned on the water!

And Mrs. Ameche laughed heartily when she told us about it!

"But I must admit, he can take it every bit as well as he can dish it out," she added, loyally.

abides. He plays his cards accordingly, and makes murder a game of intrigue and fascination for the listener. First is the immediate presentation of a predicament. At the very beginning of the story, a situation of disaster and bewilderment is created, and the listener has the delight of following it through to its climactic conclusion. Rule No. Two, Spier sticks strictly to realism, steering clear of the supernatural, giving the listener the satisfaction of a logical solution to every situation. Lastly, he plays the game fair and square by forever making Good triumphant over Evil.

For Bill Spier is sinister only inasmuch that his mind is constantly on the alert for new and cunning methods of murder. During the months that he was confined to his home with a heart ailment, he continued to guide the program's destiny—and at the same time gained valuable additional knowledge on the art of doing away with people in a safe and skillful way, from his nurse! Then, too, there's his library of murder mysteries, very likely the most extensive of its kind.

If you're in the market for a murder, therefore, the man to see is CBS' Bill Spier; but chances are, after he has devised the safest and surest of schemes for you, he'll talk you out of it by his ingenious explanation of how the most cunning of murderers eventually gets caught in his own trap.

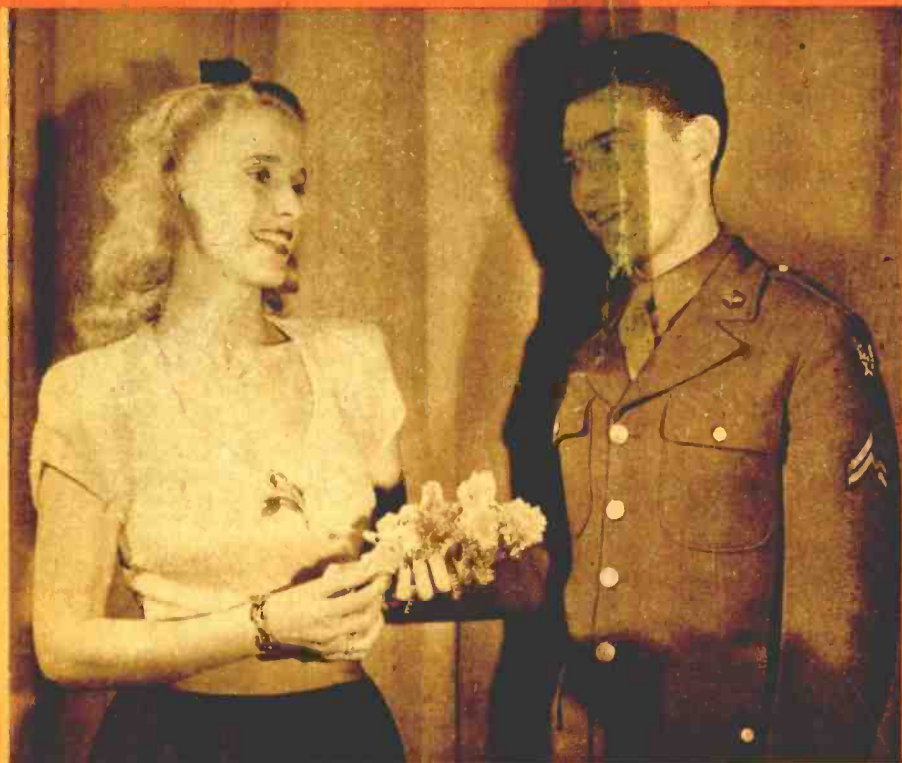
