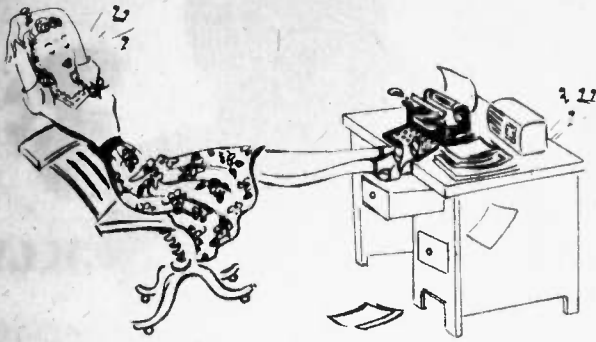

The Show You Won't Hear

Here Are Excerpts from "Command Performance" Script Broadcast Christmas Day to Men Overseas

C
 AN Christmas be merry in a slit trench near Rome? Or in knee-deep mud on some South Pacific outpost? For your boys, wherever they may be, it will be the merriest that Bob Hope, Jack Benny, Fred Allen, Nelson Eddy, Spike Jones, Ginny Simms, Ed Gardner, Jimmy Durante, Kay Kyser, Frances Langford, Dinah Shore, and the Armed Forces Radio Service of the War Department can make it.

Two months ago, these and many more stupendous entertainers assembled on Saturday night in one of the CBS studios, and for an hour and a half, they put on a "Command Performance". The program didn't come out of your loud speaker; in fact, the home folks will never hear it.

Instead, the gags and the songs were cut into waiting master discs. Inside the next few days, hundreds of transcriptions were made. It took six 16 inch discs to hold the complete show and 240 sets were made. Then into the cargo compartments of convoys and ferry command planes the precious records were deposited

and dispersed to our farthest outposts.

That was two months ago, and now it is Christmas. On Christmas Eve and Christmas Day, every local radio station in areas where our troops are concentrated will play these transcriptions. Stations owned by allied governments, stations commercially operated by individuals in Allied countries, and Army Expeditionary stations will be used to send out the program long wave.

In theaters of war, where there are no local stations, the transcriptions will be played over phonographs and public address systems. At the same time, these programs will be broadcast from within continental United States on shortwave beams that will blanket the world and reach our ships on the high seas.

Just the thought that, throughout the far flung world, our thousands of home-hungry men and women will be hearing the same jokes and the same tunes is thrilling beyond comprehension. And the hour-and-a-half "Command Performance" is only one, although the most important, of several holiday "packages" relayed to our fighting forces.

That we at home might share this marvelous experience with our lads was the idea of Radio Life when first we heard of the Yuletide "Command Performance". Last year, we were permitted to hear the program as it was broadcast, for the first time, for benefit of the American public. This year, we at home cannot hear it. But read it, we may.

Thus it is that Radio Life sought permission from the War Department's Special Services Department to print excerpts from this important script, and that Glen Wheaton, who has done such an outstanding job of writing and directing almost 100 "Command Performances" assented to release of the following material:

Hope Monologue

How do you do, ladies and gentlemen. This is Bob "Christmas Command Performance" Hope wishing our servicemen all over the world a Merry Christmas and saying that the way you Pistol Packin' Papas are spread out Hitler and Tojo will never get the lead out. Christmas . . . This is the time of the year all civilians go to restaurants. Pick up the menus . . . Look at the meat selections . . . and reminisce . . . But everyone is busy shopping and sending presents to the boys overseas . . . Crosby's got a novel idea . . . Crosby's gonna find the boy farthest away from the United States and he's going to send him a wonderful gift . . . Frank Sinatra.

And this Christmas spirit of fellowship and good will has affected all the members of our armed forces . . . I saw a happy soldier walk into the post office with a package under his arm and he was singing "Sweet Adeline" . . . I said, "Be careful, there may be an M.P. around . . . And, he said, "Who do you think I've got in this package." . . . But I'm happy 'cause I finished my Christmas shopping this morning . . . And I've been out all afternoon buying expensive price tags . . . I drove down to do my shopping and I have a new system . . . I don't bother to look for a parking place anymore . . . As soon as I get near Hollywood Blvd. I sell . . . And were those stores crowded . . . Going up in the elevator I had to pinch my leg three times to see if it was mine . . . My case comes up tomorrow . . . One little kid wouldn't get in the elevator . . . He didn't want to be a rising sun . . . And I've never seen such crowds of people. One store was so crowded they posted an

hourly list of survivors . . . There was such a mob there a pickpocket asked me to breathe in so he could get his hand out of my pocket . . . I went over to a man with a gray beard and said, "Santa Claus, what do you think I'll get for Christmas?" . . . And he said, "Don't Santa me . . . I came into this store three months ago for some blue blades . . . What mobs . . . I wanted to stick a Christmas Seal on a package so I stuck out my tongue . . . Just then the crowd gave a push . . . The next thing I knew a gocker spunked was licking my face and saying "Well, don't act so surprised . . . You started it." This is the time of the year for giving and receiving . . . But I tried it, and it didn't work.

DURANTE: Why not?

HOPE: I don't know. I guess what I had to give, Dorothy Lamour didn't want!

JIMMY: I admire her foresight . . . not to mention several other things!

HOPE: I sent Bing Crosby a present too. A beautiful package containing twelve Frank Sinatra records. . .

JIMMY: Ah, that Frank Sinatra . . . when he sings the girls swoon.

HOPE: So what . . . when that Crosby sings, the stork swoons! But Jimmy, I heard that you dressed up as Santa Claus last Christmas.

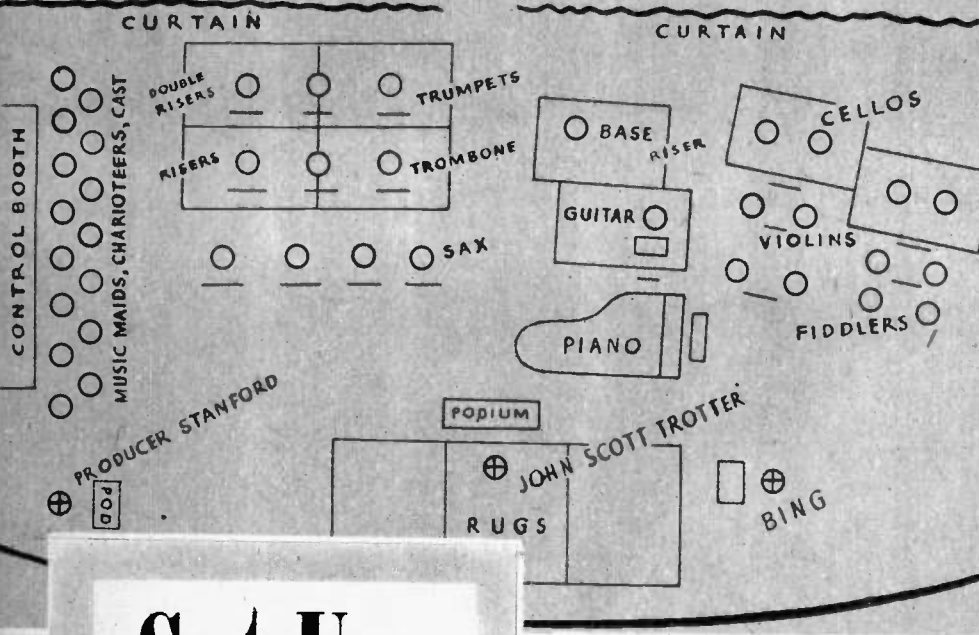

Scene Shifts Behind A Radio Show; Here's How Moves Are Made

"is responsible for all the internal properties of Radio City. We keep the offices and studios clean. We keep the light bulbs working. We supply the dressing rooms. We set up the studios for each and every show. Twelve janitors and janitresses start work every night at 9:30 and clean until six the next morning. Six set-up men arrange the stages. Two men work all day in the basement carpenter shop, building equipment and repairing it. Why, I could keep one man busy eight hours a day, six days a week, doing nothing but putting in good light bulbs for burned out ones.

"The stage arrangement for every show has been worked out on paper." The phone rang again. One of the telephone operators had lost the key to the switchboard room. Ferrell made a note of it. "Sometimes it takes weeks to determine where every chair and music rack must go. Wait, I'll get the book", he said, disappeared, then reappeared with a hefty loose leaf folder.

Diagrams Complicated

He opened the folder to the Chase and Sanborn diagram. It showed the stage, sprinkled with a series of little round marks, little straight marks, squares. "The round marks are seats," he explained. "The straight ones mean music racks. The circles with cross marks in them mean stools. These squares indicate risers."

Each page in the book was different. "These chairs for Kraft Music Hall are for the Music Maids and The Charioteers", Ferrell pointed out. "Chase and Sanborn uses settees instead of chairs. Makes it homier. Charlie McCarthy has his own chrome stand and stool and there's a special rack for keeping Charlie and Snerd. These pieces of equipment are Bergen's personal property, but NBC cares for them and Bergen has to okay any removal of them from this building.

"Now notice the Bing Crosby set-up", he continued. The telephone rang. One of the organists said to fix the brushes on the organ. And

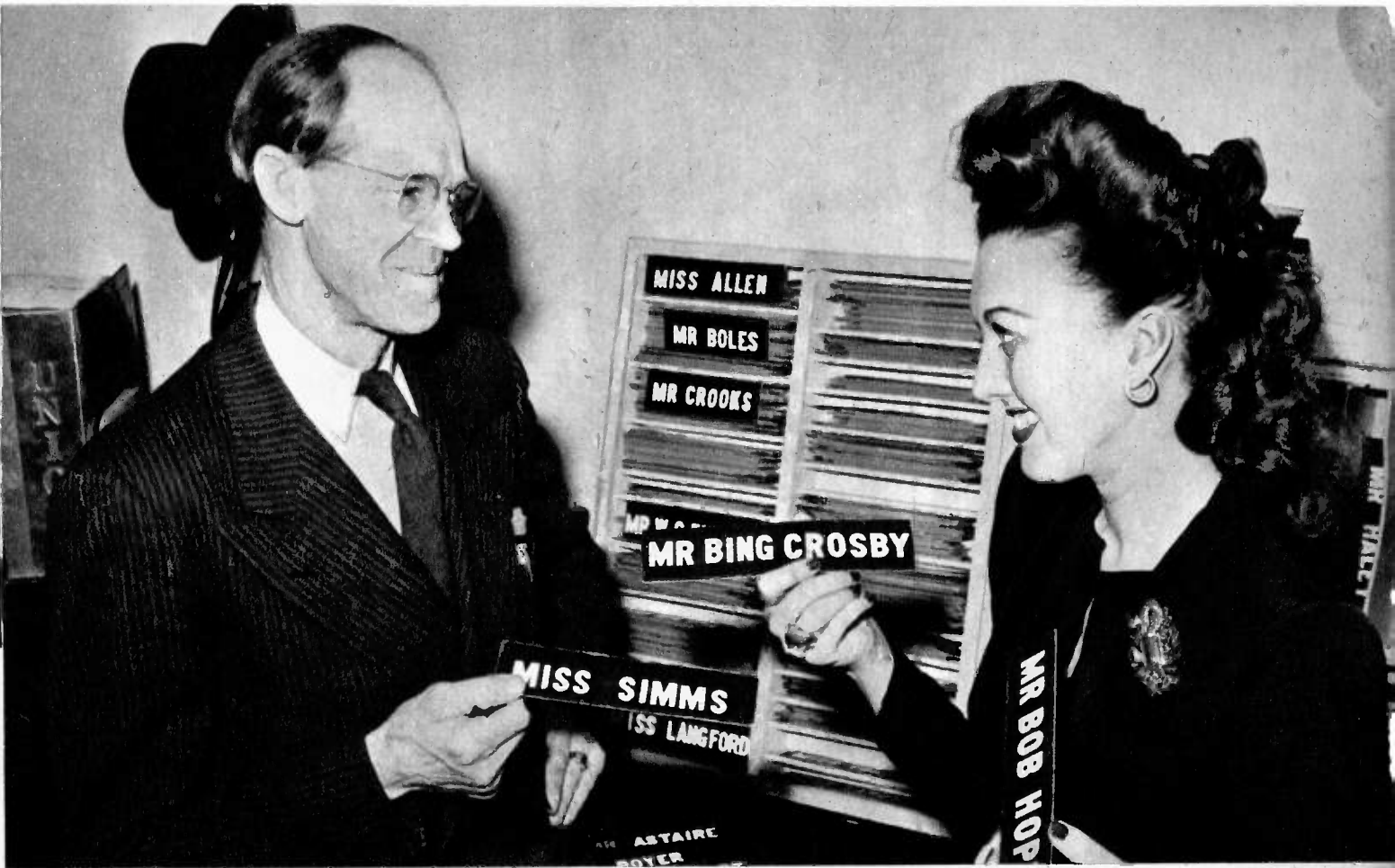
Set-Ups for Stars

I DON'T suppose there's anyone in radio or motion picture world — anyone of great importance, who don't have a name sign", said NBC's Claude Ferrell as he eyed the neatly catalogued cardboards used to designate the stars' dressing rooms. He was sitting in his office in Radio City behind the door of 117 marked "Building Superintendent", and over against the north wall, one of his 21 helpers sorted the name cards for that night's shows—Ginny Simms, Red Skelton, Horace Heidt, Fibber and Molly. "Our department", he proceeded. The telephone rang. The girl in 124 wanted the light bulb fixed. Ferrell made a note of it. "Our department", he tried again,

would Mr. Ferrell fix the crack on the door of the organists' stand-by room? Ferrell made a note of it, then resumed his explanations.

"Bing uses a special rack. It's his own. It's of beautiful walnut and the support is silver plated. Bing's guitarist, Perry Bodkin, uses a special riser. We built it for him, so he can rest his foot while he's playing the guitar.

"Now notice the set-up for Ginny Simms' show. Here's a special stool for Johnny, The Call Boy. Miss Simms uses a special rack. It's cut off on the corner, so she can put her rack right next to her guest's rack and make her interview kind of intimate.

"We made something special for Jascha Heifetz." The door opened and in rushed an engineer. "Kay Kyser broadcasts from Camp Pendleton tomorrow. What are you sending down for him?"

Many Details

Ferrell consulted his list. "Five risers, 21 music racks, two high stools—one for the guitarist and one for the bull fiddle—and Kyser's special stool."

"Has the Lucky Strike backdrop been taken care of?", asked the engineer. Assured that it had been, he left. "Kyser has been sitting on a stool ever since his arthritis got so bad", Ferrell commented.

Reminded that he was going to tell about Heifetz' special requirements, the superintendent caught himself. "Oh, yes. I was saying. Heifetz thinks

his violin sounds better if he stands on a plywood platform while he's playing it. So we built one out of three-quarter inch plywood, three by four feet."

One of Ferrell's men entered and interrupted. "In the newsroom they want the long table moved out by the machines and they want a partition in the big room. They want it moved at 11 o'clock. I may have to saw the middle leg off the table to get it through the door." Ferrell assigned the man extra help.

The engineer came back in. "Say, I was just thinking. If Maxwell House goes to March Field Thursday, why not load your Maxwell House stuff on the same truck with Kyser's and let the fellow drop it off at March after he's through at Pendleton.

Ferrell agreed it was a good idea. "It will be cheaper that way", he threw in. "The engineers order the trucks," he explained, "because all their equipment has to go anyway."

The superintendent was obviously relieved about getting "Maxwell House" out of Radio City for Thursday. "We're so crowded we have to double up in Studio D on Thursdays. Abbott and Costello are in Studio A, Kraft is in B, and Bob Burns is in C. Maxwell House and Sealtest share D. The 'Maxwell House' orchestra comes in at 9:30 in the morning and rehearses in H. We have to have H all ready for them, because musicians can't wait. They are paid for just so much time on the show, and

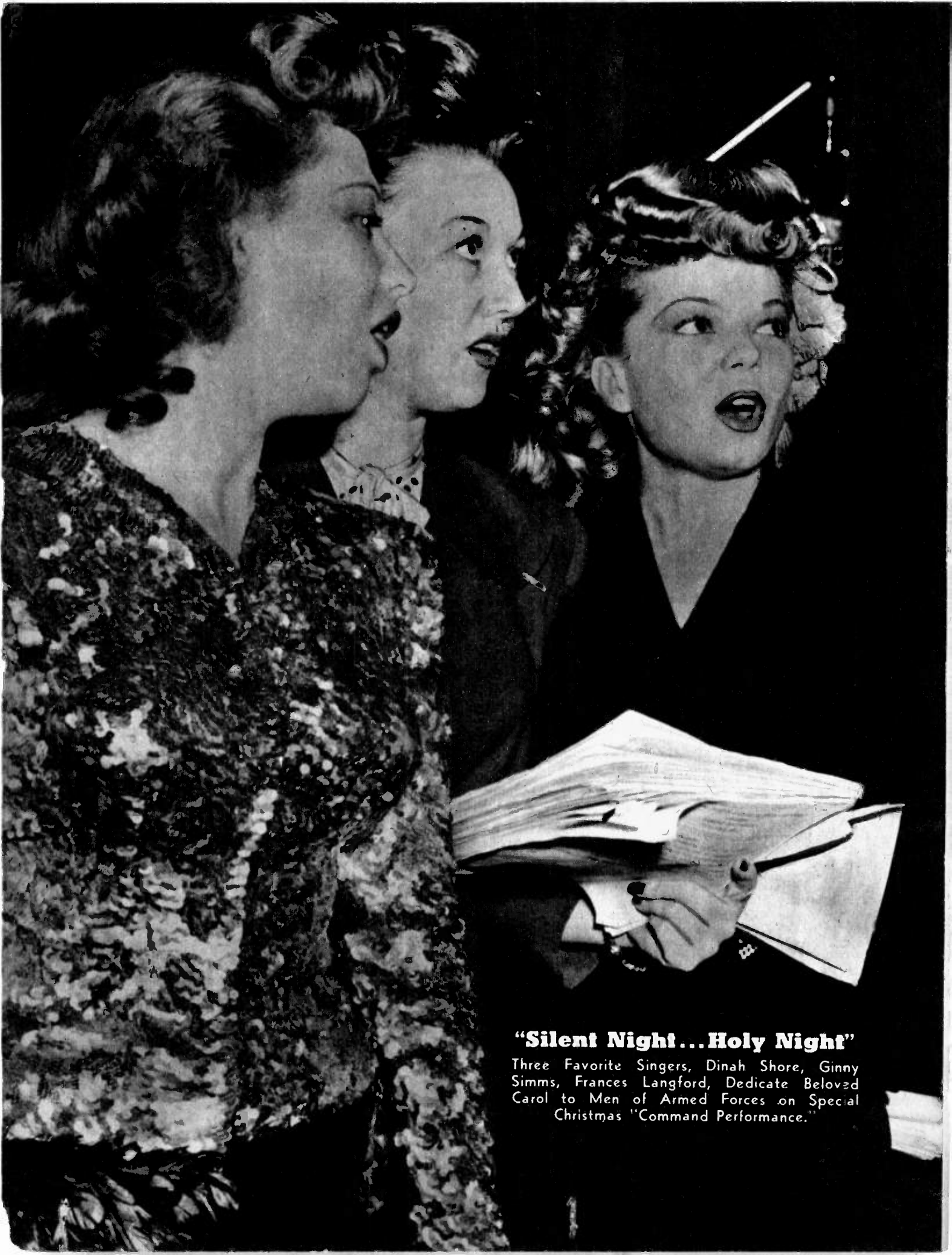
if they lose two minutes, they can't tack it onto the other end. Sealtest comes in at 9 o'clock too, and uses D until 12:30.

Then, we move out the set-up for Sealtest and fix the stage for Maxwell House. It comes into D at 1 and stays until 5:30, when the Eastern show signs off. Then, we move out Maxwell House and set up Sealtest at 6. They go on the air for the Eastern show at 6:30. As soon as they're off the air at seven, we move the Sealtest set-up off and move the Maxwell House set-up on stage, ready for the Coast show at 8:30.

"We have to move fast. We can't hold up musicians. It runs into dough. And Maxwell House and Sealtest agreed to share D provided they could walk right in when the time for them came, and find everything ready. Our main trouble is in getting the crowds off the stage after a show is over. Folks come up from the audience to see their friends, some people always have to stick around and tell the cast how good the show was, sometimes they take pictures, make recordings for commercials, or rehearse a song."

Superintendent Ferrell, relating all hectic routine, had remained calm. Perhaps his many years as a building contractor, his nine years with NBC, stand him in good stead. He is proud because he has seen his network's Hollywood studios grow from a stage with one riser and six chairs to four

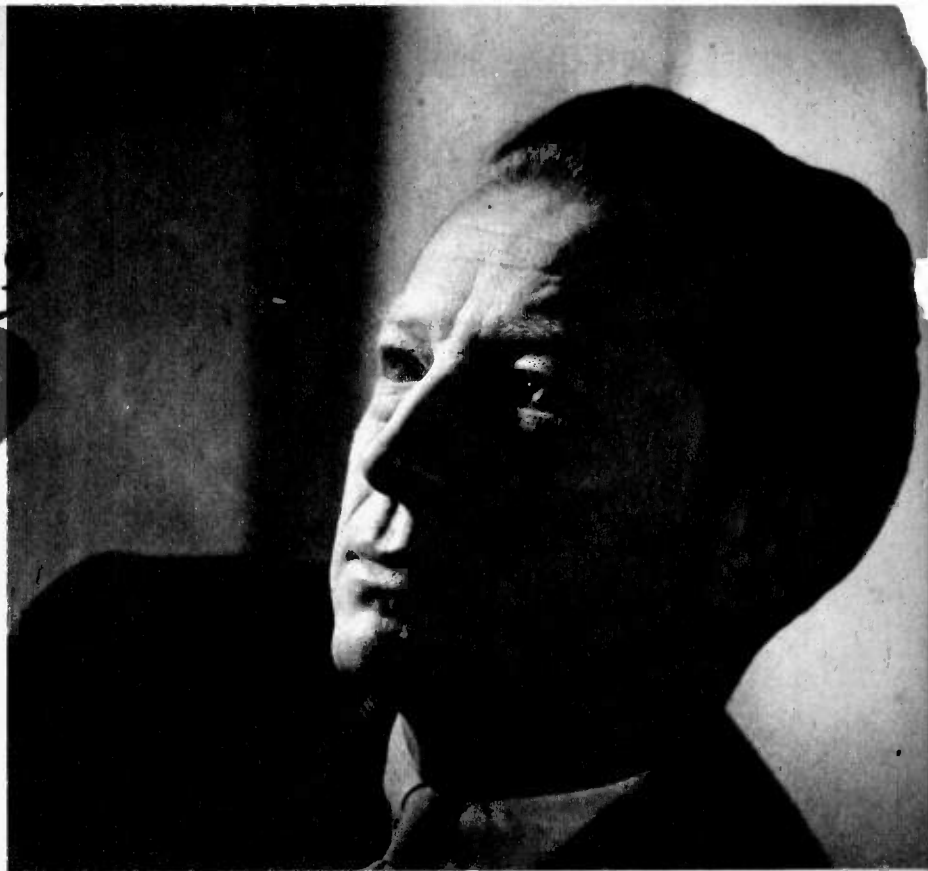

"The Musing Organist"

Paul Carson Uses Melodies For a Pensive Mood to Build His "Bridge to Dreamland," Span 'Twixt Night and Day

WHEN he was a 'teen-age boy, it was Paul Carson's ambition to be an architect. But life has a way of changing our plans and ambitions and in the end he found joy in building a bridge instead,—the beautiful "Bridge to Dreamland". Carson became a musician instead of a designer of buildings and on the radio, he styles himself "The Musing Organist". On the Blue Network each Sunday night, for a quarter-hour before midnight and continuing a half-hour after, he builds his bridge of old songs, new themes and modern melodies, played on the pipe organ and mingled with sentimental poetry which expresses in words the moods created by the music.

Various types of music make up the organ program, but harsh, un-melodious "swing" is never used. All of it is conducive to a dreamy, reflective mood. The exquisite bits of verse on the program are from the pen of the organist's wife, Mrs. Jean Carson. Many of them have been published in book form under the program's title.

The program brings its listeners' Sundays to a pleasant close, misting over whatever of ugliness and vexations the preceding weekdays have brought and wafting weary humans off to slumber with melodious music and rhythmic verse.

Paul Carson's program of music and poetry has gone on the air as a weekly feature without interruption for the last fourteen years. It has been cancelled on only two occasions—for the Paul Whiteman birthday broadcast and on the night of December 7, 1941, when every radio station

in the nation was bringing us reports of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor.

Plays Requests

With the exception of occasional selections interspersed with the others for balance, all the numbers heard on the "Bridge to Dreamland" program are requested by Carson's listeners. However, he uses only those which are suited to melodious treatment. The most frequently asked for are "The Rosary", by Nevin and Rubenstein's "Kammenoi Ostrow". Many requests for hymns of all religions also come to him, and he is entirely impartial in his choice of sacred music for the radio. Jewish holidays as well as days of special significance to Christians are noted in the program's contents.

Carson, a man of medium height, with blue-green eyes, high cheekbones and wavy, graying brown hair, told us, "Most of the listeners who write to me are either young or elderly. Very few of the letters come from middle-age persons."

Several of the musician's millions of fans have been writing letters of appreciation to him ever since his program first went on the air. One of these is an elderly lady whose letters come regularly two or three times each week. She's one of those inspiring oldsters whose zest for life is undiminished by the years. There's nothing very important or exciting for her to write about, but she tells him about all the homey little chores that fill her days, the birds that come to her window for the crumbs she feeds them, and she finds beauty and interest all around her.

Young folk write to tell the organ-

ist of their romances or their sweet-heart troubles and to ask him to play songs that have an association with certain very special memories for them.

The program is not shortwaved but soldiers in Alaska hear it from a Seattle station and write to tell the organist that they wait for it every Sunday night.

Northern Fans

Among Paul Carson's most faithful fans is Alaska's famous "Klondike Kate", (Kate Matson), who married a prospector and now lives in Bend, Oregon. She has been writing to him for years and signs all her letters "Aunt Kate". Another is a young chap who lives up in the Artic Circle, where he spends months alone in his cabin, snowed in. With only his dogs and his radio for company, he looks forward to the program of lovely music and poetry as one of the highlights of each week. He sends in his requests for favorite melodies months in advance and his Christmas card is always dated in June.

Carson is the organist who plays the theme music for "One Man's Family", the serial of home life written by Carlton Morse and broadcast over NBC, and also the theme of the same author's Columbia Network mystery series, "I Love a Mystery". He is the composer of the beautiful theme song for "One Man's Family", titled "Patricia", which is being published by the Theodore Presser Company and will go on sale this month. Among his other compositions is "Chansonette Irene", theme selection for "Dear John", serial thriller starring Irene Rich on CBS.

Mr. Wilcox

With Five Important Assignments, He Holds Radio's Royal Flush

MORE people than anybody listen to Harlow Wilcox! This might be an apt slogan for the convincingly-voiced announcer now holding the royal flush in radio's game.

Monday night, he announces the "Blondie" show on CBS.

Tuesday night, he does honors for NBC's Fibber McGee and Molly.

Wednesday night, Lionel Barrymore on CBS.

Thursday night, Maxwell House on NBC.

Friday night, Amos 'n' Andy on NBC.

The combined ratings of the shows on which he is heard hovers around 112 points, which is not bad going for the erstwhile young lad who was warned that he'd better not try to break into radio.

"I'd advise you to stick to being a

salesman", Wilcox's well-meaning but poorly-psychic counselor told him. That was back in 1929, when today's ace mikeman was selling electrical equipment. Ever since high school days, young Harlow had itched to act. He had revelled in the operettas and plays of his school-days, then after eight years as a salesman, he auditioned in Chicago, Illinois, for an announcing job.

Advised to stick to selling, Wilcox went home and reasoned: If being a radio announcer isn't selling, what is? A month after, he was on the air.

Later, in Chicago, Jim and Marian Jordan were getting a toehold in radio. Wilcox helped them cut some records and when the pair landed their own radio show, they asked to have young Mr. Wilcox as their announcer. The rest is well-known saga to all Fibber McGee and Molly fans.

But Wilcox, himself, still marvels at the purposeful way life has of throwing individuals together and sweeping them upward together to a successful pinnacle.

Wilcox's greatest popularity has been gained as the Johnson Wax salesman on the McGee show, for which he has served as announcer nine years. To McGee fans, he has become beloved for "kidding the com-

mercial", a feat which has been attempted on many other programs but is seldom achieved with comparable eclat.

"Which," we said, "makes you something of an actor, Mr. Wilcox?"

"There's been some question about that", laughed the tall, well-knit spicier, his pencil-fine moustache moving with his long upper lip into a debonaire smile.

To a marked extent, this mikeman possesses a quality which all good air salesmen have in more or less degree—in his case more. This characteristic may be labeled "an element of believability."

When told that his co-workers considered his greatest attributes were his poise and his element of believability, Wilcox shrugged his shoulders and said, "Well, if true I take no credit for it. It's a God-given quality."

When Harlow Wilcox tells you to use Glo-Coat, you are convinced that is what any self-respecting house-keeper should do. When he plugs Camels, you're sure they're milder, slower burning; when he sings the praises of Maxwell House coffee, your mouth waters for a fragrant cupful. And when he extols the merits of Rinso White, you're ready to rush right out and buy a package.

Proof of the pudding? Why sales, of course. His sponsors say he moves the goods. He admitted to Radio Life that he has sold himself on the products he advertises before he ever tries to sell others.

Wilcox is never one to talk about himself, according to his comrades. We found him the soul of modesty while being interviewed. Afterward, Radio Life consulted some of his best friends—Cecil Underwood, producer of the Fibber McGee and Molly show, and Fibber and Molly themselves.

"Harlow?", said Underwood with a facetious smile. "You can say he is a lousy golfer, a good horseman, a

fair polo player, and a gourmet."

"Of the first water", exclaimed Fibber. "He loves to eat. Sometimes spends three hours at it!"

"And a good gin rummy player", added Underwood. "And business man."

He's comfortable company, good at repartee. "But he never tries to top my jokes", Fibber said meaningfully.

No one has ever seen him get mad, except once, when it was righteous indignation and "he should have socked the guy", but didn't. Always dependable and on time, has a fine emotional response.

Asked if he remembered liking Wilcox when he first met him, Fibber said "No!"

"We were talking about that last night", Molly chimed in. "Harlow is so reserved that sometimes people meeting him for the first time don't understand him."

Until he married four years ago, Wilcox was a dashing bachelor, according to his intimates. Now a very devoted husband, he lives in Beverly Hills with wife Mari, a strikingly attractive blonde who devotes much of her time to war work.

Once during Wilcox's single blessedness, Underwood urged him to become a benedict. "You're young, and attractive. You make good money. Why don't you pick the Oak Park girl?"

"Aw", replied Harlow. "I don't think anybody would have me. Besides, when I want your advice, I'll ask you for it!"

But it was the Oak Park girl he eventually married. Harlow's friends still recall mirthfully his wedding in a Reno parsonage, where the parson had an over-friendly dog. While the minister recited the service, his pet kept pawing his sleeve for attention and the solemn vows were inter-

After one highly provoking and humorous foursome, Arlene exclaimed: "I don't see why I sit here at home and argue for nothing when I could go on the air!"

Signed by Pearce

She worked up a bridge routine, or script, soon afterward and Al Pearce signed her at \$60 a week. "I never thought it would be a career", she said the other day. "I wouldn't have called my scriptural husband 'Harry' if I had known the part was going to catch on."

Her scriptural boy, Junior, appeared in the first programs along with the ever-inquisitive and loquacious Masie. These were not intended as permanent characters in Arlene's monologue, but were practically forced on her when their omission provoked a storm of complaints—"What's happened to Junior?" "Where is Masie?" Now, every script is built around the goings and comings of the little boy and the curious female.

"Just a minute, Masie", says Arlene, as she turns away from the 'phone. And the listeners picture

Art Baker loves to play this game. Let's pretend... we're prisoners of war in Japan. We have been captured in the Pacific and sent back to the home island. We pick up some information along the way. The Japs we meet are expecting a big allied invasion of Burma, and have made plans to repel it. Newspapers and radios are warning the people that long, defensive battles must be fought before America is beaten. The morale of most of the enemy we meet seems to be pretty good. We notice plenty of shortages, but the people are bearing up under them. No signs of any cracking. Not even a hint that defeat is possible. Everybody's supporting the war effort.

We don't see much shipping in Jap harbors, and we've been told that lack of shipping may develop into Japan's fatal weakness. But Jap officers laugh at us and say they have plenty of ships. We aren't convinced—and the food we get is indication that lack of transport is hurting Japan both on the home and war front. We aren't the only ones eating light. Even the Japs are pulling in their belts a few notches.

We could get anything we wanted at the Black Market, however—if we could get out of internment—and if we had the money to buy it. When we passed thru Shanghai on the way to Tokio, meat was selling at \$80 a pound—eggs were about \$2.40 apiece—pound of sugar, \$60.

When we arrived in Tokio, we had a touch of malaria and asked for quinine. The Jap doc said: "So sorry, we do not have, please!" So we thought, well, this is the way they treat prisoners huh! They must have bushels of quinine. They stole 90% of the world's supply when they defeated the British on Malaya.

But we find out from other prisoners that, strangely enough, the Jap medical officer was telling the truth. Tokio is short of quinine. Fellow prisoners whisper there aren't the ships to transport the raw product from Malaya. Jap doctors are working on a substitute just as our doctors are doing in the States. We hear from another prisoner that rice is rotting on the wharves of Burma—that sugar and rubber are wasting away on the docks of the Dutch East Indies.

We begin to realize what a classic job American submarines and planes and surface warships have been doing to keep the goods the Japs stole in the Pacific islands from getting to Japan.

There's irony in the situation. Here, we find Japan one of the richest countries on earth as far as raw materials are concerned. But she can't turn those raw materials into finished products because she can't spare the ships. Every available bit of cargo space is necessary to move fighting men and war materials to the fronts. Naturally, our Jap guards try to keep this information from us, but it's common gossip among the prisoners.

We hear that production of steel has been reduced to a fraction in Japan. Well, that's the same story we heard in the United States. We didn't know whether to believe it or not. Now that we're in Japan, we know that no truer words ever were spoken. The Jap Navy—again our fellow prisoners whisper—is becoming a wooden navy because it can't produce the steel to build the right kind of ships. When the Japs took the Philippines they seized the world's greatest iron-ore deposit, the one on Mindanao, but they can't find the ships to transport the metal home so it can be made into more ships. That vicious circle finds the Japs caught right in its middle.

Japan, with all her stolen wealth, was going to do a lot of trading with Germany and Italy. But Italy is forced out of the war and allied navies are seeing to it that Germany doesn't get much from Japan—if anything. Besides, there's the Jap worry that Hitler couldn't pay his debts if they could deliver the goods.

Now let's eat. The menu comes from Hongkong and it's actually what was served there to American prisoners every 24 hours. Quite a feast. Will you have your rice first or your fish or your soggy potato? Two ounces of fish—a fair-sized swallow. Eight ounces of rice, but it's not cooked.

Well, at least it's food for thought—compared to the beef stew, pickled vegetables, steamed rice, combination salad, strawberry sauce, bread, oleo-margarine, and tea, that the Japanese at the Tule Lake Segregation Center were getting when disloyal ringleaders caused trouble there—and demanded more meat and better food.

She has stopped this routine. "I was afraid I was going nuts", she explained. "You know, when I said 'C'mon, Junior' and acted as if I were taking his hand, I got so I could actually feel Junior slip his paw into mine!"

HOPE: That's better than you usually do on Hollywood and Vine! . . . I guess you'd like to hear the latest Hollywood gossip, Kay. Do you want to hear about Lana Turner, and Betty Grable, and Rita Hayworth?

KYSER: Sure. Tell me what's been going on.

HOPE: And do you want to hear about Gypsy Rose Lee?

KYSER: Yeah . . . tell me what's been going off too.

HOPE: Kay, the latest news is about the pin in Dorothy Lamour's sarong.

KYSER: Yep. That pin has been declared undemocratic, and an agent of the enemy.

KYSER: What do you mean?

HOPE: For years now it's been carrying on a war of nerves against the American public!

KYSER: Tell me more about the gals, Bob.

HOPE: Just a minute, Kay. I don't see why you should be so interested in the glamour girls.

KYSER: Well, after all, a fisherman is interested in fish.

HOPE: Not without bait he ain't!

KYSER: You better watch your step, Bob. Another crack like that and I'll tell Crosby to leave you out of his next picture!

HOPE: Let's keep that overgrown jockey out of this. But tell me, have you had any dates since you got back?

KYSER: Only last night I went out with a girl . . . but she gave me up.

HOPE: Why'd she give you up?

KYSER: Well, she was a pistol packin' mama, and she wanted some live ammunition!

BOB: And now fellows I'd like to present a couple of men you all know . . . a couple of men whose careers I have followed for years and years and years and years—

JACK: That's enough years.

BOB: It took a lot of us to bring these two men together tonight and it'll probably take a lot more to pull 'em apart—Jack Benny and Fred Allen!

APPLAUSE

FRED: Stop bowing Benny, the dandruff from your wig is spoiling my shine.

JACK: You're just jealous because I can bend without creaking.

BOB: Well, Jack and Fred, it's good to see you buck together for Christmas and not fighting . . . after all, two middle-aged men should watch their blood pressure.

JACK: Look who's talking . . . middle-aged men . . . Listen Hope, your middle has aged more than ours.

BOB: That's just a figure of speech.

FRED: With a figure like yours I wouldn't go around making speeches . . . Besides, you've got us all wrong . . . there was never any ill-feeling between Jack and myself.

BOB: What are you talking about? I heard you say on the air one night that Benny squeezed a dollar bill so hard that Washington got buck teeth.

JACK: He did not . . . all he said was

I wouldn't pay a nickel to applaud a bubble dance with a hat pin.

FRED: No . . . no . . . you both got the whole thing wrong . . . I merely said that Jack took the first buck he ever made, slapped it on his head and had skin grafted over it . . . Every time he walks down Hollywood Boulevard on Dollar Day his scalp twitches . . . anyhow there's no malice intended.

JACK: Of course not (Hey! That's a straight line! What am I doing with that?)
BOB: Just a second, Jack. How about the time you said Fred's eyes looked like fly specks pecking over two ping-pong balls!

FRED: Jack never said that. All he said was I looked as though Santa Claus came down my nose and left a bag under each eye!

JACK: I did not, Fred. Remember, I said you were the only civilian I know with a sad sack under each eye!

FRED: That's right Jack. And I think that's one of the biggest laughs you've ever had on the air.

JACK: Well, thank you Freddie.

BOB: That's the spirit! That's more like it, boys.

JACK: What's more like it, son?

FRED: Yeah. Who asked you to squeeze toothpaste on these troubled waters?

BOB: Well, I was only trying to be nice . . . but that's out of character for me . . . I'm gonna get outta here, you two guys lean off each other . . . so long.
APPLAUSE

JACK: It gets pretty chilly here at nite, Fred . . . doesn't the cold bother you?

FRED: No, the clerk comes out every hour on the hour and gives me a hotfoot . . . Besides I picked up an old Indian blanket at Albuquerque . . . it's a little crowded in there with the old Indian, but that's housing for you in California.

JACK: When you're away from home nowadays things are pretty tough . . . travel is difficult too . . . Now take my case. I've just returned from a thirty-two thousand mile trip overseas where I entertained thousands of men—

FRED: I was waiting for that. I was wondering how you were going to work it in.

JACK: It was a thrilling trip, South America, Africa, Sicily, the boot of Italy—

FRED: Ah, ha, the heel finally reaches the boot.

JACK: You're just jealous . . . when I was in Egypt, brother, I did a special show for King Tut.

FRED: Now wait a minute, King Tut has been dead for three thousand years.

JACK: I know. He was a tough audience . . . and he still looks better than you do.

FRED: I wouldn't talk . . . everytime I look at your head I think of that song, "The Surrey With the Fringe On Top."

JACK: Well, I don't get the connection. I drive an automobile, brother.

FRED: All right, Surrey with the fringe on top . . . Maxwell with the jerk inside, what's the difference?

DINAH SHORE: Oh little town of Bethlehem
How still we see thee lie
Above thy deep and dreamless sleep
The silent stars go by

Chorus: Yet in thy dark street shineth
The everlasting light

DINAH: The hopes and fears of all the years are met in thee tonight.

DINAH: Yes, we know—Christmas has many memories—little fir trees and strings of dime-store lights that get all tangled that's gone out . . . and even the hap-up, and you never can find the one bulbiest Christmas has a bit of tears and sadness, too. But everything that Christmas has always meant to us, and will always mean to us is wrapped up in "Silent Night." The musical talent which has given comfort and pleasure to millions of radio listeners often brought solace to Paul Carson himself when he was a little boy. He was the son of a Methodist minister whose direct male forbears were ministers, as far back as Paul's great-great grandfather. His father's stern, old-fashioned concepts of right and wrong and his own didn't always coincide. The family's one musical instrument was a small reed organ and Paul began to take organ lessons when he was five and a half years old. When his mind was troubled, he'd turn to his music for comfort.

He began to earn by his music when he was nine years old. His first paying job was playing the piano in a moving picture airdrome, at \$1.25 a night. That was in the early days of the cinema. Many church folk regarded film plays as a new form of worldly wickedness, but the money that Paul Carson earned playing the piano at the nickelodeons was too badly needed in the poorly-paid minister's household to be refused. So he continued with his work at the theaters and also played the organ for the choir in his father's church at Olney, Illinois, for \$2 a Sunday.

His earnings helped put him through the Conservatory of Music at Chicago's Northwestern University. When he was mustered out of the Army in Illinois after serving Uncle Sam in France for three years during and after World War I, he came to Los Angeles. Carson went into radio with the advent of talking films, when jobs for theatrical organists ceased to exist.

Soothing though the program is, it is not without its occasional hectic moments. One night when Carson was in the middle of a selection, one of the high keys in the high pipe organ of the Blue Network's Hollywood studios at Radio City stuck. While the announcer and chief engineer, inside the big organ, frantically hunted for the misbehaving pipe, Carson spent several interminable minutes improvising. The organist played all around the offending key, with very fancy results. A couple of weeks later, Carson received letters from two admirers, asking the name of the lovely selection that contained all the trilly runs and bird calls!
