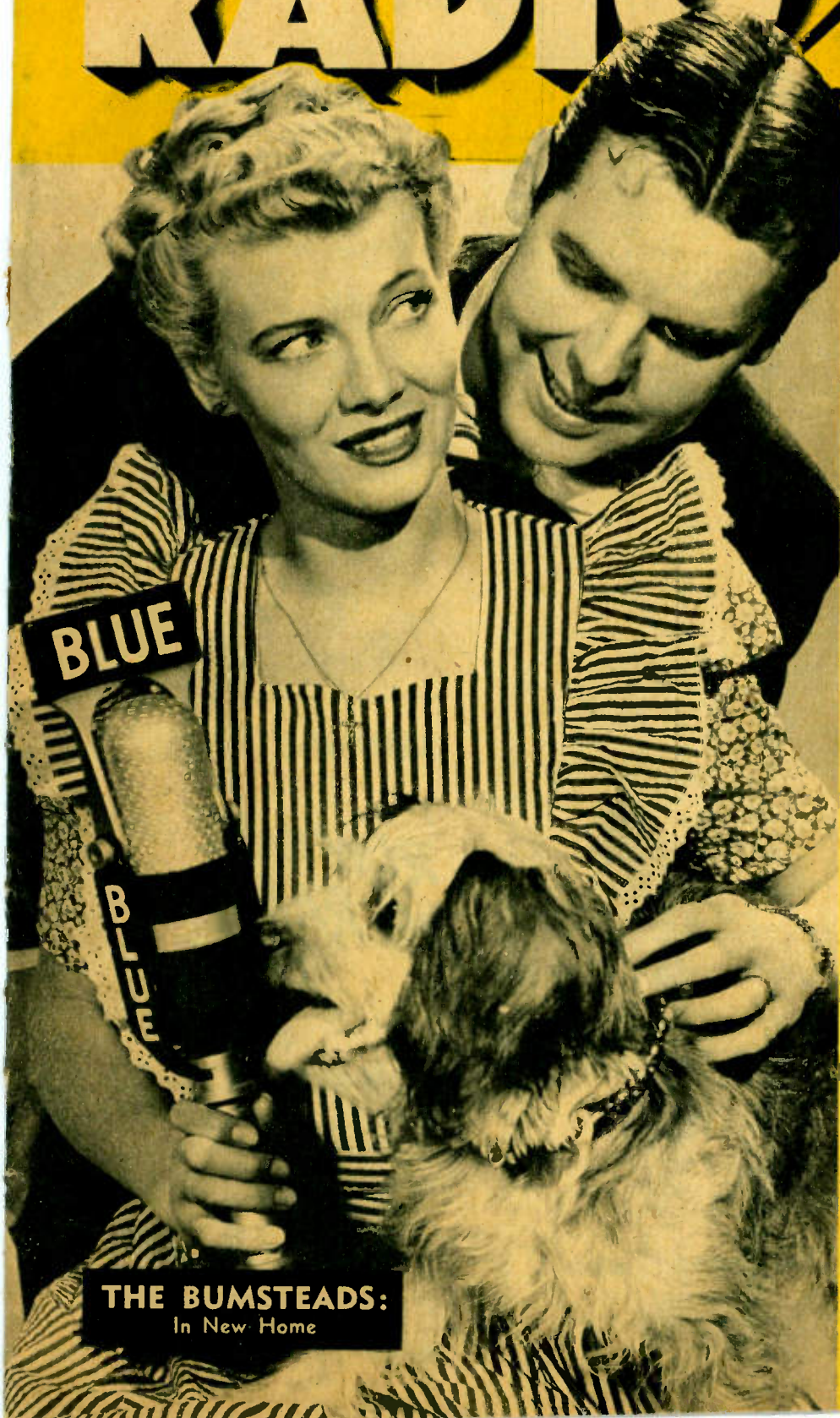

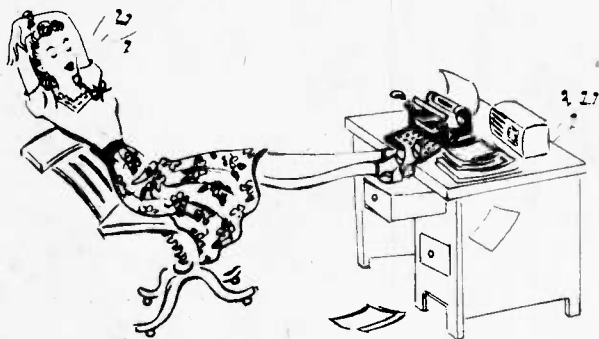

Announcer Doesn't Like His Voice!

Bob Andersen Became Newscaster After Acting and Announcing; Hopes Still To Be a Radio Reporter When War Ends

I DON'T like my voice," Bob Andersen suddenly declared during our discussion of his ten-year career as a radio newscaster. "I simply try to read the news in a manner to make sense," he went on. "I don't believe that a news broadcaster should try to sell *himself*, as a singer or an actor would do."

Bob Andersen started his radio career as an actor, then became an announcer. That led to his audition as a newscaster.

"I was scared to death," he recalls, "so I stepped up to the microphone and *shouted*. It sounded 'Winchellistic', I guess, and listeners seemed to like it."

Later, when the trend changed, Andersen acquired the more conservative unemotional style of delivery he so successfully employs today as one of the west coast's most popular newscasters.

Lunching with the mikeman one recent afternoon, we found him to be an affable fellow who smiles on July as his lucky month. He met his wife on July 2, 1938, and married her exactly one year later. His own birthday is on the same July date, and the month also marks the beginning of his newscasting career.

Started In S.F.

His interest in radio dates back to his high school days in San Francisco. When it came time for him to try his luck in the business world, the depression had come upon the country and jobs were scarce. Undaunted he directed his efforts toward radio dramatics, joining a group that enacted daily dramas on the local airlines.

Later, after he had accepted announcing stints and the opportunity

arose to audition as a newscaster, Andersen relates that he tried it just for fun and was the only one who didn't really want the post. But fate would have it, he won. Later, he went to KPO to broadcast for three years as the Call-Bulletin radio reporter.

Always maintaining the policy of thoroughly digesting and rehearsing the news copy he is about to deliver, Andersen made his pre-war news broadcasts highly competitive to the major network news by his forceful highlighting of local items.

When he commented then on the comparative insignificance of the

news items aired before the advent of World War II, Bob declared with enthusiasm, "I hope to continue radio reporting after the war is over, when the news once again falls into its regular pattern."

His other chief ambition is to work on shows that are fun, and he likes doing his weekly announcing chores on CBS' "Dr. Christian" program. "Everybody on the show is so nice," he enthuses.

How "Nerves" Banished

But he admits that he was shaking from head to foot the first evening he walked out on the stage to conduct the pre-broadcast "warm-up" session with the studio audience at the "Christian" show. Then an odd coincidence occurred that put him promptly at ease.

He was asking servicemen out front the names of their hometowns. To Bob's surprise, one's answer was, "Denmark".

"Denmark *what?*" queried Andersen incredulously.

It turned out that the man in the audience was from the very section in Denmark where Bob's grandparents had lived, and that, what's more, the man's name was actually Bob Andersen, too!

"We're probably forty-second cousins, or something," smiles Bob.

In addition to his radio duties, Andersen does the narration for Paramount movie "trailers," and was

The Ladies Speak Their Minds

*Air Jury of American Women Render
Verdicts on Provocative Problems*

LADIES, what would you do, if you were in my place?" From all over the United States are pouring into Mutual-Don Lee's "American Woman's Jury," letters containing problems too big to be solved by the writers, all ending with the plea, "What would you do?"

These letter writers are asking twelve typical American women what they would do if they were faced with the individual writer's problem. The result is a most unique radio program, allowing members of the listening audience to be both de-

fendent and jury . . . either to present a problem for discussion, or to participate as a juror and help another woman with her problem.

Most of the problems brought before the jury are of a family relations type. In one case, a woman who is divorced from her husband wonders if she should remain in the small town where they lived or go out into a larger city and seek to forget her unhappy marriage. Another woman wishes to know if her husband would be right in selling a farm they have sacrificed to build into a paying venture and start again to develop a new tract with new privations.

A mother asks the Jury if she

should continue to live with her son, where she feels unwelcome, or should she go to her daughter who, though financially not as well off as the son, is most anxious to have her mother share her home. A young wife, with two children, is faced with the problem of deciding whether to live with her husband's elderly parents when he enters the service or to reside with her family where she feels a sense of loyalty, though her family is prone to be slightly quarrelsome.

How Set Up

Three raps of the gavel call to order each hearing before the jury, made up of twelve women drawn from Boston Women's Clubs. Mrs. Emily Williams, played by Dolly Springer, acts as judge or 'trial referee'. She reads the letter containing a specific problem and then charges the jury to vote on one of two possible solutions. The counselors, Mrs. Jane Allen (in real life Evelyn Hackett) is the defense attorney representing the writer of the letter, while Robert Coulter assumes the role of a prosecuting attorney.

Shortly after the program sprang to over-night prominence (it was sold on a coast-to-coast hookup of 212 stations two weeks after it's initial airing) the producers found that in addition to receiving problem letters from the entire nation, there were many parts of the country that wished also to present a jury. Guest juries in major cities then became

a permanent feature of the program's format.

The guest jury hears the presentation of the case by radio, as it is broadcast from Boston, then following the reading of the resident Boston jury's verdict, the program

switches control to the guest city, where a second verdict is rendered.

L. A. Jury

Los Angeles presented a guest jury composed of members of the Los Angeles District Federation of Business and Professional Women's

Clubs. The problem before them was whether or not a young married woman should allow her husband to limit the visits of her domineering mother. The young woman in stating her problem said that her mother

A "Sharp" Answer Turns Away Wrath

WHEN I was a kid, I was too small to fight, so I had to have a smart answer. That's how I started making with the joke," explained Vic McLeod. Top gag-writer Vic, one of Radio Life's award winners and the man who currently is putting the funny words in Gracie Fields' mouth, has never stopped making with the joke.

"Didya hear what Crosby said to Hope,"? queries Vic.

"He said he could put Bob up in a nice spare room over his stables."

Bob answers: "What! And be kept awake all night by your horses coming in late!"

"Until I was fifteen I was a mid-get," Vic relates. "Then I grew up in one year. Mother had to let my pants out every other week."

As a youth, one of McLeod's numerous jobs (he claims to have had a thousand) was as a soda jerk at Catalina. He and his fellow jerk (no gag intended, Vic) so disliked washing the mirrors which adorned the fountain that they swirled over them with Bon Ami. Then, one day, they scrawled some jokes on the frosted glass. Business picked up immediately and the proprietor soon learned that it wasn't the sundaes or banana splits that were responsible. It was such bon mots as: "If you find a fly in your raisin pie, bring it back and we'll give you a raisin for it" . . . "Don't holler about our prices. You can eat dirt cheap farther up the street, that is, if you like to eat dirt!" . . . "Not responsible for any hats or coats left that fit our help." . . . "The best dish in

the house: The cashier, but she's off today!"

Vic even says he may have originated the old chestnut: "we don't know where Ma is, but we've got POP on ice."

His "Case History"

Anyone guzzling a soda and benefitting by such choice pearls of wit should have known then and there that Vic was going to turn into a gag writer. It's even impossible for him to relate his "case history" with a straight tongue.

"Roughly forty" (his birthday was August 2, 1903) Vic says "I was born in Nampa, Idaho, in a little house I helped my father build. We moved to Boise. We'd bought a piano in Nampa, and when the payments became due, we moved."

By the time he had finished high school in Blue Hill, Nebraska, he was already interested in visiting travelling shows that came through town. He won first prize for his gag routine at an amateur night. "I stole gags from eight shows I'd heard and I've been stealing material ever since!"

Soon after, he joined a tent repertoire at winter quarters in Pawnee City, Nebraska. Two suits, one on his shoulders and one chucked in a broken down suit case, comprised his worldly goods. "Actor with large wardrobe; will travel" described me," Vic joked. He pulled down \$25 a week, worked with eight other people who used to perform condensed versions of plays originally requiring a cast four times as large. Between acts, young McLeod staged a specialty. "We got our jokes from big headline vaudeville we'd catch in the big cities. Those people in the Hinterlands never got into town, so you were actually doing them a favor telling them the jokes."

Two years of trouping, then stock and an act in which he teamed with Norman Blackburn (now talent head for J. Walter Thompson Agency) as the "Beach Boys" ultimately brought Vic to Catalina and the jokes on the mirrors. He and his buddy had devised the mirror gags so they wouldn't have to wash the glass every day, but soon the boss was saying: "You'd better change the jokes. Folks are yelling because you've got the same ones you had yesterday!"

Forged (Or Gagged) On

After five years in Walter Lantz's cartoon department, McLeod went to Universal picture studios and wrote westerns and musicals for two years. He still scripts for the flickers, his latest being Columbia's "Hep Cats."

Radio claimed McLeod about the

time Tommy Riggs and Betty Lou rose to prominence. Vic wrote for "them," then for the Ballantine show with Milton Berle, Charles Laughton and Bob Crosby; for the Old Gold show with Lucille Ball and Herbert Marshall; finally Kraft, which he describes as "a wonderful thing for the ins and out of radio. Then, when you're writing for Bing, you're writing for one of radio's top comedians." Only recently Vic left Kraft, after two and a half years, to assume the duties of head writer for the Chase and Sanborn program.

How He Writes

One of the most brilliant and prolific gag writers in the business, McLeod is constantly thinking of something funny and grabs the nearest piece of paper to make a note. "I make notes nobody can read," he confessed. "Sometimes when I can't decipher them myself, I get a new and altogether better joke." He does his best work at night, and also when he's under pressure. According to friends, he's always kidding, but his wife, Mary, has learned to take Vic's gags in stride. So has the cocker, Duffy, who is pet at the McLeods' North Hollywood home.

"Most of the time I just like to write to see how it comes out," Vic said. "Sometimes I wake up in the middle of the night and as the hours tick by, I think up something which seems very funny. 'This'll be great,' I say to myself before dropping back to sleep. But in the morning it's always very foggy.

"A writer," he continued, "should be able to write anything—serials, westerns, two-reel comedies, cartoons, plays. I like to write comedy the best."

His grasp of the humor field is intriguing. Discussing the different types of jokes, he explained: "First, in writing personal jokes, you consider the personality or the qualities of the personality for whom you're writing or their association with different things. By that, I mean well-known facts about them. For instance, John Scott Trotter being advertised as rather portly, you make up jokes with this slant, or should I say, *curve*? Take the time that a well-known traveler guested on the Crosby show. Trotter asks innocently... 'How does it feel to be a globe trotter, sir?'... and the answer which paid off with a zetter (meaning hilarious) was: 'You ought to know

order a meal, only to have the waitress hand him a menu. He looks up from it and queries cheerfully, "Well, what have you to eat today?" to which the waitress unsuspectingly replies with typical sarcasm, "What's the matter, can't you read?"

No Dog Or Cane

One has to watch Collins closely to realize that he is blind. He walks about the streets unfalteringly, without the aid of a Seeing Eye dog or even a white cane, and he boasts proudly of not having a bruise or a broken bone to show for it.

"I guess my body got tired of being banged up," he reflects. When he first lost his sight, he still insisted on doing all the things that other youngsters did. He ran and played and led an active, useful life from the very beginning. Eventually, he developed the "skill" that soon enabled him to do almost everything a person with all five senses can do. The "skill," says Chuck, just *grewed*, like Topsy.

He has developed what he terms "a sense of obstacles." When we walked down the street with him, he told us the location correctly of parked cars, light posts, and stairways. He explained that he hears the echo of objects. "But when I hold my hands over my ears," he exclaimed, "I'm blind as a bat!"

Asked if he remembers any of the things he saw before he lost the use of his eyes, Chuck smiled and replied, "Yes—I remember one Idaho sunset very vividly. I can recall seeing flashes of lightning in the sky, and I can remember the moon." He paused then, threw back his head for another of his hearty laughs. "And one other thing," he chuckled, "I remember a page of shoes in a Sears-Roebuck catalog!"

Collins attended the Idaho State School for the blind, graduating from high school there, then set about to earn his own living. For four years, he worked as a piano tuner and played piano with dance bands.

In 1933, when he was vagabonding around the country, he and a couple pals hitchhiked to the Chicago World's Fair. "Part of the way we rode the rods on a flyer," he related with the relish of an adventurer. "One slip from them, and you're *hamburger!*"

"Bumming Around"

In Chicago, Chuck worked at night spots, seven hours a night, seven nights a week, earning enough, as he explains it, "to bum around some more." But with the money earned as a pianist and as a piano-tuner, he then entered the University of Idaho, graduating from there in 1937 with a major in political science and

Blind Since Five, Chuck Collins Is Ex-Hobo, A College Graduate, Musician, A Sports Fan, Radio Star, Happy Husband and Proud Father!

CHUCK Collins, the Blue Network's new Saturday morning dispenser of cheery songs and friendly, philosophical patter, is writing a book. An amiable fellow, who has a habit of throwing his head back and laughing heartily, Collins has a story to tell, and he feels that now is the time to tell it. With the thought of the many men who will return from war with great afflictions, he has been inspired to write of the way in which he found it easy

to accept the handicap that was inflicted upon him when he was a boy of five. It was then that he lost his sight as a result of infantile glycoma.

He has no use or respect for pity. "It is a hideous, ghastly thing," he declares with an emphatic frown. "It does no one any good."

Nothing pleases him more than to have someone not realize at all that he is blind. This happens occasionally. The times that have tickled him most are the occasions when he has sat down in a restaurant to

Formula for Fame

Radio Life had an enjoyable chat one recent afternoon with Charles S. Lawman, a local vocal instructor who told us the story of Jimmy Cash's climb to success as the singing favorite of CBS' Burns and Allen show.

Lawman related that Cash became his pupil in February of 1940. At that time, Jimmy was a grocery clerk in a Burbank Safeway store, and having a wife and youngster, he couldn't afford much money to study voice.

For almost two years they worked hard on voice production, songs, musicianship and microphone technique. Then Lawman presented his pupil for radio auditions. Lady Luck was smiling since Burns and Allen were in the market for a new singer, and once Jimmy was heard, he was "it". He signed a contract on the counter of the Safeway store while he was at work.

It brought particular joy to Charles Lawman, because he saw in Jimmy's success the fulfillment of dreams that had been shattered for him. Back in the twenties, he informed us, he was an outstanding radio and recording artist himself. His voice broke under a severe attack of sinus trouble. Coming to California for his health, Lawman has since established his own voice studio at 1552 Cross Roads of the World in Hollywood and has coached such personalities as Sunnie O'Dea, Elyse Knox, Sylvia Sefton, and of course, Jimmy Cash.

One of his prize possessions is a photo of Cash, autographed "To Mr. Charles Lawman, my manager and teacher, who deserves full credit for my being where I am today."

Asked for the formula for a successful vocal career, Lawman advises: "First have the talent. Then find the right teacher. Then work and more work. Then when you get the break, remember it's harder to stay there than it is to get there. When you start coasting, you can only coast down."

Pearson Predicts

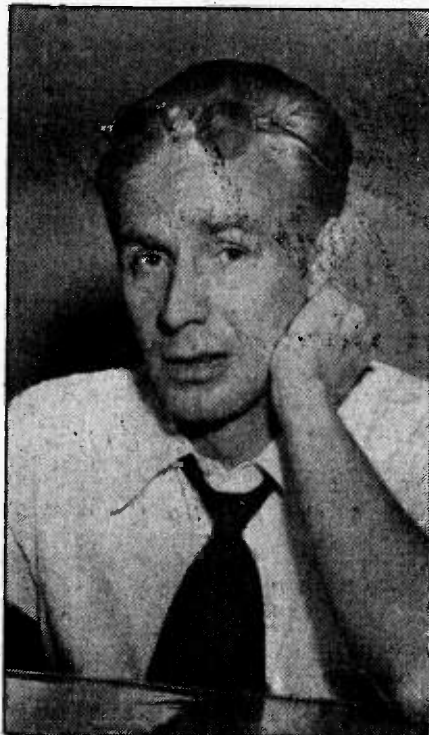
Almost 70 per cent right—that's what Blue commentator Drew Pearson's political predictions are, the records say. In a recent poll among 376 radio commentators, the Republican party's Clare Booth Luce was voted probable best vote-getter over the Democrats' Helen Gahagan Douglas. But the wife of Actor Melvyn Douglas made a greater contribution to her party in

her convention speech than did Congresswoman Luce, most radio-newsmen agreed.

Of the five questions commentators were asked, the answers came out like this:

Will draw the most votes: Luce—225; Douglas—151.

Greatest contribution to party: Douglas—254; Luce 122.

Most convincing: Douglas—254; Luce—122.

Best voice: Luce—225; Douglas—151.

Personality: Douglas—188; Luce—188.

Harassed Hanley

HOLLYWOOD'S OWN Capitol Recording Company is, as our Uncle Hector would put it, "skinning the pants" off of some of its competitors, as far as tunes and talent are concerned. In the recording industry, it's all-important to be FIRST with hit tunes. Of course, many times it might be difficult to predict just which tunes will be hits. Even Bing Crosby has had his doubts many times. Recordings, essentially, are made months before the tunes reach the Hit Parade. An artist who has a hit song can be made overnight.

* * *

TAKE, FOR EXAMPLE, Capitol's Jo Stafford. Jo was just another singer with just another group until the Capitol gang decided she had plenty of stuff on the ball and was worth a hazard as a single. They tried her out with "How Sweet You Are" and "Old Acquaintance." First was a good tune and got a good play. So they gave her "Long Ago" and "I Love You." Both were firsts for Stafford and Capitol. Both were solid clicks. And Capitol became aware of the fact that it had a potential new star on its hands. Capitol also gave the music world Ella Mae Morse, you will recall.

* * *

DECCA HAS Dick Haymes, Columbia and Victor has Perry Como, so Capitol threw a bombshell into the baritone-crooner racket with a young Los Angeles boy name of Andy Russell. Andy, who hails from the east-side Mexican colony (real name's Rabago), tossed off a hit in "Besame Mucho," and then followed it with "Amor," both in the Latin style. Both were firsts for Andy, and "Amor," particularly, has given the jukeboxes a royal working over.

* * *

ANOTHER NEW CAPITOL star is Betty Hutton, who makes her debut as a recording artist with a smash novelty which she performs in Paramount's new musical, "And the Angels Sing." Tune is "Rocking Horse Ran Away," and it's a dilly, done in the slap-bang Hutton bombshell manner. Martha Tilton returns to the Capitol label with "Texas Polka," a rhythm novelty, and "I'll Walk Alone," a ballad in Tilton's effortless, pleasing style.

CAPITOL'S FIRST album of ten inch discs bearing the royal purple Capitol Criterion label comprises eight sides of favorites featuring Johnny Mercer, Jo Stafford, the Pied Pipers and Paul Weston's orchestra. Album is called "Songs by Johnny Mercer" and tunes are all Mercer hits, including "Blues In the Night," "On the Nodaway Road," "Too Marvelous For Words," "I Remember You," "You Grow Sweeter," "You and Your Love," "Jamboree Jones" and "The Dixieland Band."

a minor in English. Chuck smiles over the recollections of his college life. A member of the Phi Gamma Delta, he went dating and dancing all the time.

Upon his graduation from college, Collins went to Seattle, Washington, where he started his radio career, initiating his "Collins Calling" series. He appeared on KJR-KOMO for five years, then went on a 40,000-mile tour of sixteen western states for the National School Assemblies of Los Angeles, during which he addressed and performed for nearly a quarter of a million students in six hundred schools.

Prior to that, he had the opportunity for a professorship and continued to study for it, but still retained too strong a taste for vagabonding to settle down again to campus life.

"Prof" Still

"There's still some of the professor in me, however," he maintains, "and it sometimes shows up in my programs." Collins writes all the material for his Blue airshows, including the commercials, using a Braille writer. He is able to read Braille at the speed of approximately 250 words a minute by employing the use of both hands at once. While one hand is fingering the impressions he is reading, the other is being applied deftly to the following line.

"In other words," smiles Chuck, "I never let my right hand know what my left hand is doing."

Collins told us that his brother was blinded while still in high school. "Lightning struck twice in the same place," he pointed out. But his brother, too, is enjoying an active, successful life. He is a licensed radio engineer, and now works as a traveling salesman, with the aid of a Seeing Eye dog.

"He needs the dog, because he's always going to unfamiliar places," Chuck continued, adding quickly, "I've never wanted one. A dog would be a nuisance to me."

He told us proudly of his various accomplishments. He used to have an act during which he played piano and trumpet at the same time, but now he devotes himself exclusively to piano, practising regularly on the instrument for two hours or so every day. He has also written several songs, one of them we particularly liked called "Rainy Night."

He plays cards, using a braille set, but doesn't call himself a card player. He enjoys baseball and has always had a yen to play it. "I understand it well," he told us, "and I talk a good game." He likes to hike, and he reads every kind of book, enjoying them all thoroughly.

Romance, Too

Collins is married to Marjorie Byrd, whom he met in Seattle. They got off the same bus one day, and

she offered to help him across the street. Traffic wasn't heavy, and he resented it. "I'm not going across the street," he growled at her, then promptly apologized for being rude and invited her to have a coke with him to make up for his impoliteness.

"I knew that she was the girl I was going to marry," Collins recalled with a chuckle. Less than two months later, he made Marjorie his Mrs.

Now they have two children, five-year-old Judith and one-year-old Michael. "Mike is a roly-poly teddy bear," Chuck told us proudly, "and Judith has big round blue eyes that everyone talks about." Judith is musically-inclined too, and sings songs like "I'll Be Home For Christmas" perfectly, maintains her father.

Collins performs every sort of chore in and around his West Los Angeles home. During his tour of the schools, he learned to fix a flat tire in less than ten minutes. He told us then that he nicknamed his old car "Butch," but has dubbed his new one "Claudia," because she has more class.

He likes to work in the yard, mowing the lawn and watering the flowers. He hangs out the wash for his wife, helps her with the dishes, vacuums the rug, and what's more—changes the baby!

Smiles Chuck, "that's my specialty!"

A Morgan Joke

Certain comedians, observed Vic, have styles that suggest the way to set up their jokes. For instance, Frank Morgan in bragging about being an explorer, says: "There I was, lost in the snows of Mount Everest, lying there cold and stiff until a dog with a flask of brandy showed up." . . . "Did it help you?" . . . "Well, yes. I got over being COLD, but I was STIFF for a week."

Further explaining how he contrives to think up so many wise-cracks, McLeod brought up the double entendre joke, which always plays well. Such as: "We've got a rule in the Army that soldiers can't shoot craps with the WAC." . . . "Why is that?" . . . "Cause the boys always make too many passes!"

Sometimes Vic digs into his joke bag and pulls out a gag based on common expressions or well-known sayings. "One of this type," he remarked, "goes this way: Personal column—Boy with sack of flour would like to meet girl with spaghetti factory. Object, macaroni."

Or again, there's the insult type, based on word switches, such as, "I had a good part in my last film, in fact, I was all through the picture." Obviously, the answer is: "Yes, when

I saw the picture I imagined you were all through."

It all depends for whom you're writing, Vic points out. Sometimes an unexpected reply type of joke is indicated, and it's always good for a giggle. Such as: "I know you, We work at the same studio together. We're both out at Paramount." And then the other one says: "I knew you were out, but when did you find out about me?"

Another example of this same type of joke was when Hope said: "They had a rule against taking pictures in army camps, but I fooled the colonel. I told him my camera was nothing but a box lunch." . . . "Did he believe it? He sure did. In fact, he stood right there and made me eat every bit of it."

As fast as he keeps on talking, Vic can deliver a joke. He listens to people on the street and often gets his best material from some small, truthful incident. Or he gets an idea for a pay-off that, with a beginning, polishes into a zetter. "A good joke is one based on minute happenings," Vic observed. "For instance, Hope says to Bing: 'That's a nice coat you have on. Looks like it's made out of old diapers.' Bing's answer: 'It is. Nowadays you gotta use what you got the most of!'"

With so fertile a brain and such a comprehensive knowledge of the gag-writing technique, it should be smooth scripting for McLeod. For the past few years since he became part of the Thompson staff, it has been a comparatively easy voyage, but as recently as three years ago, he remembers he had to borrow money on his car—"and me half Scotch," Vic clucked.

Time means almost more than money to him. One of his pet hates is committing to dates long ahead of time. He prefers the spontaneous to the planned. Perhaps one of his most unusual traits is his ability to awaken himself at any pre-determined time, no matter how irregular the hour may be.

Now, not a big chap (he stands five, eight and weighs around 155 pounds) Vic, nevertheless, could hold up his end in a fight without defense of wise cracks. But he still finds that a punch line is a lot better than a punch.

"Besides, where can you get good punch nowadays," shrugs the ever-gagging McLeod.

Radio Is Her Playground

JUST as filmstars Shirley Temple, Deanna Durbin and Judy Garland have virtually grown up on motion picture lots, young radio-actress Gloria McMillan has spent most of the last seven of her eleven years in front of a microphone. Radio Life suggests that the networks take a tip from Hollywood and keep an eye on this youngster who has zoomed into the big-time faster than many an airplane personality thrice her age.

Currently playing the role of Sharlee on CBS' "Mayor of the Town," Gloria has had featured parts in over 15 top-notch radio shows. Just before she was signed for the Barrymore series she appeared several times on Don Ameche's "What's New," heard over the Blue network. She recently played the part of Amy in the "Dr. Christian" show, has also starred on "Silver Theater," "Star and the Story," "Nobody's Children," "Big Town," the Bob Burns show, "I Love a Mystery," the Elgin Christmas program, Edgar Bergen and Charlie McCarthy, "Screen Guild," and—the list goes on and on and on.

Big things started happening to this little girl at an early age—the age of 4, to be exact. She was introduced to radio as a child "blues singer" on station KGW in Portland, Oregon. After winning a talent contest and subsequently being auditioned for radio, she sang songs in a blues way, ad libbed a few speaking lines and danced on kid

shows several times a week for two and a half years.

Four years ago the McMillan family took a vacation trip around the country, stopped off in Hollywood where their youngest member was offered a motion picture contract. The offer was refused and the family returned to Oregon for the time being. Later when they did move to Southern California to stay, Gloria did her first radio work in Hollywood with Edward G. Robinson and Director-Producer Crane Wilbur.

No Mike Fright

In seven years of radio Gloria has never been late to a broadcast or a rehearsal. And she's never had mike fright, either. When she first went on the air she was too small to know the nervousness that besets most radio artists at the beginning of a performance, later experience had given her self confidence. It's Mrs. McMillan who vicariously goes through the agonies of mike fright for Gloria—every broadcast, still, after all these years.

Long blonde curls, blue eyes and 51 inches tall describes Gloria only in part. The freshness of youth combined with the confidence of

maturity, enthusiasm for everything and everyone around her, and a quick wit must be mentioned to complete the picture. Example: your reporter found herself answering instead of asking the questions half-way

Aunt Mary's Recipe for Chocolate Cake

- 2 cups sifted cake flour
- 1 tsp. soda
- ¼ tsp. salt
- ½ cup butter or other shortening
- 1 ¼ cups brown sugar, firmly packed
- 2 eggs or 3 egg yolks, unbeaten
- 3 squares (Baker's) unsweetened chocolate, melted
- 1 cup milk
- 1 tsp. vanilla

Sift flour once, measure. Add soda and salt, sift three times. Cream shortening, add sugar gradually, and cream until light. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each. Add chocolate and blend. Add flour alternately with milk in small amounts, beating after each addition. Add vanilla. Bake in greased 10x10½ inch pan in moderate oven, 325 degrees, one hour—or in two deep 9 inch layer pans, greased, 25 minutes, 350 degrees.

John Charles Thomas?

WHEN John Charles Thomas decided to take time off from his NBC Sunday morning Westinghouse program, he personally selected Lee Sweetland to replace him.

Like Thomas, Lee is a big man with a big voice. He came to Hollywood radio in 1936, after a varied and slightly unorthodox background of musical training and experience, having attended none of the famed institutes of music nor studied extensively under any artist of great renown.

"I took glee club in high school," Lee informed us, smiling. "Like all

kids I considered it an easy course to get credits."

Actually, from the very beginning, he has taken singing seriously, eagerly devoting his time to long hours of hard study. "But it isn't work when it's something you love," he pointed out.

By the time he was sixteen, he had become a member of the Civic Opera Company in Seattle, Washington (which he considers his home town), and had started to study under an ex-prima-donna—an old-time diva who had a remarkable voice but had never achieved great

fame. "She had grown too heavy," smiled Lee, "but she still could sing and she taught me a great deal."

After three seasons with the Seattle Civic Opera, he came to Hollywood where he attended dramatic school for a time. An instructor told him then that he would never be an outstanding singer, smashing all of the aspiring young baritone's dreams with one cruel blow. But Lee wasn't the fellow to stay down for long, and music meant much to him. He resumed his singing studies shortly, once again with an old-time artist as his tutor.

"People said I was crazy to study with these unproven unknowns who were far past their prime," Lee told us. "And I must admit, I was about the only pupil they ever had. Nobody else but me would go to them."

But, as he continued to tell us of the rare, invaluable training he received under these wonderful old-world artists, it is obvious he was always, and still is, highly respectful of them and deeply grateful to them.

He told us of one of his instructors in particular — an old man who taught him a great deal. "I learned from him," Sweetland stressed, "things that I could not have learned from any other person."

Sad Story

But it seems the old man was continually warning Lee, "We must hurry, son; there's not much time." Then, in the month of October, the old-timer apparently had a premonition of his own death, and he told his pupil the date would be November 12th.

"On the night of the eleventh," Sweetland went on with his story, "I was summoned to the old man's side. He had experienced some undue excitement, and was suffering with a violent heart attack." On his deathbed, the elderly artist gave his pupil a final lesson, and left with him a set of rules to follow. The old fellow died early in the morning on the following day, November 12!

Lee recalls that he was panic-stricken then. Honestly fond of the old man, and feeling strongly dependent upon him for further instruction, the young baritone became desperately uneasy about a forthcoming appearance he was to make with the Standard Symphony in San Francisco. When the time of the performance came, Sweetland relates, "I sang badly—very badly."

Later, feeling discouraged and un-

Yvonne, "Fireball"

Yvonne, who is twenty-one and the "baby" of the quartet, has blonde hair and snapping dark blue eyes which show that she is the "fireball" of the family. "Vonnie" is her nickname, and she is married to "Buddy" Cole, who played with the Alvino Rey orchestra. He is now a staff musician at KHJ-Mutual. Yvonne and Buddy have a ten-months-old daughter.

"We've proved it can be done," Alyce declared at this point. "We're all married, have two children among us, and yet, we're still singing together and still going strong."

The girls told us they are all domestically-inclined, and have always made a home wherever they happened to be, which was often on the road with a band. Now, however, they have settled in California and have made work secondary to living.

All four King Sisters live in the valley—Yvonne and Buddy in their own home, Luise in hers, while Donna and Alyce stay with their mother and father, Mr. and Mrs. King Driggs.

All in all, the Driggs' have six girls and two boys. One sister, explain the girls, is "simply married," meaning she's a non-professional. Their other sister is the stand-in for the quartet, meaning she steps in to substitute for any absent member of the group. Her name is Marilyn, she sings beautifully, her sisters boast, is only thirteen years old "but looks sixteen."

One of the girls' brothers is artistically-inclined, and can also swing out with a mean boogie-woogie beat. The other brother is the bookkeeper at their dress shop.

Talk About Selves

Complying with our request to talk about each other, the girls came forward with the following facts.

"Donna is our secretary. She handles our correspondence, and is the business head of our organization."

"Luise is the calm and cool-headed member of our group. She makes the vital decisions. But her worst fault is being absent-minded."

"Yvonne has artistic talent. Both she and Luise design clothes cleverly. Vonnie's worst fault is her quick temper."

"Alyce is our little Elsa Maxwell. She's always giving parties, and she'll do anything for a laugh. Once, she came to a party dressed like a 'Ubangi.' She looked hideous, but she won first prize. And one time during our act at Slapsy Maxie's, she tripped on a microphone cord

through the interview. Our subject had to know all about Radio Life, how to write a story, plus the life history of her interrogator.

Radio isn't the only thing in her young life. Like any other 11-year-old, Gloria goes to school, and there, as in the multitude of other things she does, she shines. For the last two years she has received all 'A's' on her report cards. Her favorite subjects in school are spelling, English, geography, history, nature study and Spanish. She doesn't particularly like math or French.

Is Musical

In addition to radio and school Gloria takes piano lessons. She sandwiches four hours of practice a day in between school, rehearsals, and broadcasts. She plays classical music under the tutelage of Madame Leginska, undertakes such ambitious works as Bach's Prelude and Fugue and Beethoven's Festival, nourishes a secret ambition to play boogie woogie, much to her mother's chagrin.

Biking, skating, horsebacking, and badminton are Gloria's favorite sports—when she has time for them. But an indoor sport—chess—is her greatest enthusiasm. "She learned to play at school, says "I play by myself when no one will play with me. My mother and sister don't like it very well, they get bored." So she sets up the chessmen, proceeds to pit her own wits against her own wits.

Her ambitions are several. First and most serious, she wants to be a dramatic actress—an actress Broadway-bound. This is no ill-founded dream, either. Three years ago she was in the Pasadena Playhouse production "Escape to Autumn," and since then she has been in several plays put on by Flower Guild

of the Assistance League. She does authentic dialects and plays parts of children three to 14 years of age. She claims the biggest thrill of her life was the opening night of "Escape to Autumn," when she received flowers and presents "just like a star."

More Ambitions

Other ambitions are to be a chess champion with a shelfful of cups to show for it, and to beat out a mean boogie woogie on the piano, in addition to excelling at classical music.

No typical career girl, Gloria likes to cook. She does very well at it—attempts pies and cakes with good results, adjudges her mother. She also likes to shop for groceries with her grandmother, and looks forward to taking cooking in school.

Victory gardening in the McMillan family is a highly competitive proposition. Gloria, her sister, who is a senior at UCLA, and her mother each have separate plots, vie to see who will get the most produce. Gloria claims her crop (of 6 tomatoes) is the best so far this season, says she "uses scientific methods," consisting of "green stuff" sprayed on the plants to kill the blight and twice as much water as other members of the family use.

Little Miss McMillan likes school and hates to go to bed, in fact, she'd much rather practice all night than go to bed. She gets up at seven every morning, doesn't eat breakfast (and never has), then goes to school from 8:30 to 12:30 those mornings when she has no rehearsals. On such days she studies and practices in the afternoon. Otherwise the procedure is reversed.

Here in Gloria McMillan we find a young radio star who "would like to be doing so many shows I would never have time for a vacation." Here is an 11-year-old girl it will be as interesting to watch grow up in radio as la Temple, Durbin, and Garland did in pictures.

enjoys spending money and time on the couple, but accompanies her gifts by unwanted and unasked for advice. Her calls are so frequent as to offer a real crisis in the lives of this couple who have been married just three years.

So great an irritant have these visits become, that the husband has asked his wife to limit her mother's visits to one a week. "Ladies, of the jury, what would you do?"

The Los Angeles jury concurred with the Boston resident jury by deciding, 7-5 that the young wife should limit her mother's calls, with three out of four Los Angeles mothers-in-law in real life voting for the limitation.

Courtroom procedure was certainly not unknown to at least two of the members of the Los Angeles panel, though they, as practicing attorneys, were more accustomed to presenting a case than being on a jury. These attorneys, Katherine Adams Stoll and Percilla Lawyer Randolph were just two of those on the panel whose business it is to know and understand the problems that arise in the field of family relations. Mrs. Ivy Grace, Welfare Director of the Salvation Army was also a member of the jury. Dr. Bernice Harker, counselor in psychiatry lent her training to the problem before the jury.

Each member of the jury, besides being a qualified business woman, was also a homemaker and represented a cross section of the typical American woman who is daily called upon to solve the problems that each day are brought before the air-court and radio jury.

Daily the voice of Dolly Springer in her role of Mrs. Emily Williams, judge on the program, opens the trial hearings. Early Shakespearean training as Portia in "The Merchant of Venice" prepared her to assume her present calm legal position. A New Yorker turned New Englander, Dolly inherited her love of the theater from her mother, a dancer, and proceeded to achieve her first prominence in the field by winning a two year scholarship to the New England Conservatory of Music's Drama Department. In addition to her radio work, she also plays in local stock companies and is a monologist of note in women's clubs throughout New England. She enjoys her role of judge because each case is a real human interest problem.

Attorneys New Englanders

The two attorneys who daily air the pros and cons of each case, are

both native New Englanders. Robert Coulter, (actor Bill Syran), the only man in the American Women's Jury, has been called the bravest man in radio, as he is surrounded by 14 women daily. Acting as prosecuting attorney is no easy job, for frequently his role must be that of the conscience of the writer—attempting to present all the possible avenues of solution to the listener's problem, while the defense attorney presents the writers' side. Sympathy is naturally in favor of the bewildered writer seeking help. Coulter's unwelcome task of factual prying is frequently resented by the air audience. "The listener's letter has to be overwhelming in my favor," he says, "or else I don't have a chance."

Evelyn Hackett who pleads so eloquently for the writer in her role of Mrs. Jane Allen, defense attorney, is a discovery of the Pulitzer Prize winner and beloved actor-producer, Eddie Dowling. A Northwestern University and Mt. Holyoke College graduate, Evelyn applied her theater and speech majors to good use. Shortly after college, she returned to her Providence home town to win not only a radio job but a husband as well. Her job-winning audition took place in June. Five months later she became the bride of script-writer Walter Hackett, now Chief of OWI's Radio Division in New England.

Brad Simpson, creator of the program is a 300-pound plus writer, who after a long career of soap operas, variety shows, and screen writing, hit upon the happy idea of blending all the drama of the courtroom into a backdrop for a human relations program especially designed to allow the daytime feminine audience to exercise its "I-know-what-I'd-do-if-I-were-in-her-place" attitude into a channel that would benefit the puzzled defendants who daily submit their problems to be analyzed and tried by The American Women's Jury.
