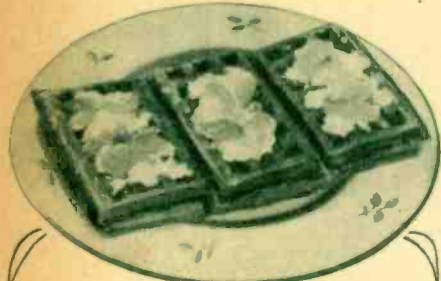
Sirs: I hope you can tell me what happened to "Light of the World", the dramatization of the Bible.

Radio's "Dark Venture" Throws Light
Upon the Innermost Recesses of Mr.
Average Man's Psychological Quirks

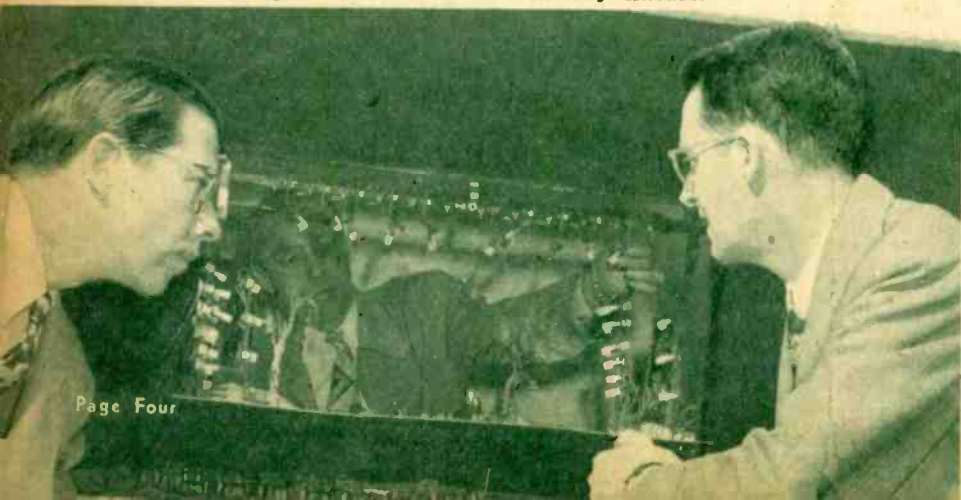

THE psychological thriller, "Dark Venture," is the product of a closely-knit team of writer and producer—the writer being Larry Marcus, the producer, Leonard Reeg. It's concerned with "the little guy"—a clerk, a bank teller, a salesman—who gets involved in a situation which becomes aggravated by the individual's own mental fixations. First aired on ABC's Pacific Coast network on May 30, 1945, it is now heard coast-to-coast and has won the plaudits of the most critical of mike mentors. It's a favorite with those who like "who-dun-its" of extraordinary nature.

Are Modern Crime Chasers on Par With Sleuths of the Gay Nineties?

OUR twentieth-century fiction crime crusaders on radio lane compare with the "antique" but virile creations of the authors of the last century?

The answer seems to be in the negative. Take the case of "Nick Carter, Master Detective," famous fictional character of yester-year. The Carter series is one of the most popular mystery shows on the air, yet this super-sleuth of the gay 90's was created way back in 1886.

"The suave, heroic creations of yester-year blend a necessary superlative ingenuity, strength, courage and intelligence that present-day authors cannot seem to catch," explained Jock MacGregor, producer of the Nick Carter series. "Although these

detectives were the 'Supermen' of their age, they still have enough credibility to their character to escape the pattern of fantasy into which too many of our modern programs fall."

"Nick Carter" nabbed his first criminal on the pages of Street & Smith's New York Weekly back in 1886. Since that time, "Nick Carter" stories have sold more than 400 million copies.

Lon Clark, who delineates the character of the "master detective" on the air, feels, too, that "Nick Carter" is the finest example of creative detective fiction and he feels he owes his success as Carter to the almost flawless background created for the character back in another century.

Clark is one actor who really owes

his career to his mother—and hard work. He first became interested in the make-believe world while attending movies—the old time silent flickers where he was admitted free because his mother played the piano as accompaniment to the pictures which were flashed on the screen.

Senator or Actor

Born January 12, 1911, in the little hamlet of Frost, Minnesota, (population 300) which his grandparents helped to settle after arriving in this country from Norway, Lon and his brother grew up on a farm and attended the proverbial little red school, taking part in school plays,

SAM SPADE calls everybody 'sweetheart.' Because it's an old-fashioned word, when it comes from him it becomes just about the most hard-boiled thing he could say.

"Sam frankly does a job for the money he's going to make. He says to a client, 'How much you got on you? Okay—I'll take that, and you pay me the rest when the job is done.'

"Spade is thrifty. He takes the trolley instead of a cab. And he'll put

the dime he spends on his expense account for his client to pay.

"Sam Spade doesn't let anybody stick a gun in his ribs and get away with it. He'll smile and talk easy up to that point, but when a gun is pulled on him, he gets tough and the guy with the gun finds a fight on his hands.

"Sam is no superman, not by a long shot. Just because they've hired him as a private eye, his clients aren't necessarily safe. Sam's clients get killed as many times as not.

"The police never like private eyes, and they like Sam Spade least

THERE'S an old cliché that runs "you can't get away with murder," which just goes to prove what old clichés are worth—not only can you get away with it, but you can make it pay as well. For murder is rampant on the networks. Never have so many been killed by so few, but fortunately there's no danger of a shortage. Not while "The Falcon" is on the job. And the unsung heroes of this saga are the authors. Next

time you catch that show on the air just remember that half the blood spilled on the broadcast belongs to the writer.

A book may run as long as the writer feels inclined to work, but in radio only a stipulated time is allotted us. Naturally, that cuts down the possibilities of the listener in going wrong when guessing "who done it?" which is fundamentally our purpose. Among our other problems is that we must plant the clue that solves the mystery as an integral part of

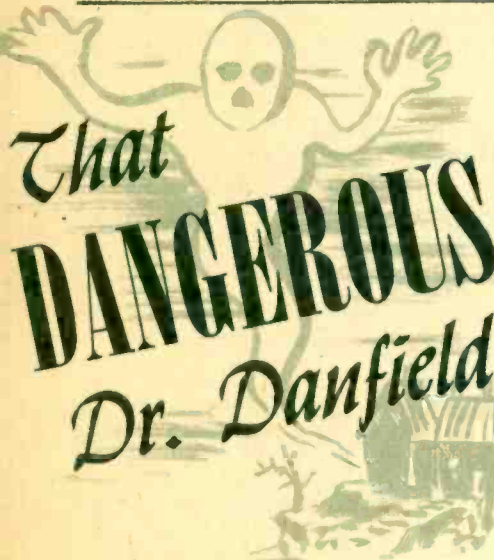

ACCORDING to Richard and Frances Lockridge, who authored the original characters of "Mr. and Mrs. North" for the pages of the New Yorker Magazine, Alice Frost and Joseph Curtin typify in person just what they had in mind in the days when "Pam" and "Jerry" were only figments of their imaginations.

Alice, attractive, smartly-dressed, sparkling with femininity, has the light touch so characteristic of "Pam." Curtin, like "Jerry," has brawny shoulders, a handsome face and a twinkle in his Irish blue eyes. The pair are gay and attractive on and off the air, and are very happily married—but not, however, to each other! There, the resemblance ends

as far as their air characters are concerned.

"The Norths" reached radio by a roundabout route. After some sixty appearances in the New Yorker, the Lockridges wrote them into six mystery books. They became a Broadway hit in the play adapted by Owen Davis and finally achieved national popularity in the motion picture starring Gracie Allen. Nowadays in the persons of Alice Frost and Joseph

For Love o' Mike

"Bingsday"

Wednesday, October 16, was promoted by ABC as "Bingsday" in honor of The Groaner, who started his transcribed series over that network. A show which Crosby had cut with Bob Hope as guest some weeks previously was released at 9 p.m. It was the first time a top notch star had embarked on a long term radio commitment to broadcast via transcription rather than "live".

Along Radio Row the series' debut was greeted with heated discussion. (NBC and CBS do not allow such transcriptions). Many viewed the Crosby innovation as the handwriting on the wall for network radio as we now know it. They contended that if Crosby could get a rating with a transcribed show, other stars would rush to broadcast likewise. The advantages were obvious: no hard-bound rules for checking into the studio, convenience of cutting the disc, greater availability of guest stars, better product through editing, greater freedom in releasing the platters.

Others contended that the listeners would never accept transcribed shows in place of live—that there was a feeling engendered when dialers knew the whole nation or whole Pacific Coast was hearing the same song or words simultaneously, alongside which a "canned show" seemed warmed over. Too, they said, the spontaneity, the excitement of the unexpected fluff or break-up, was lacking in an un-live show.

The morning after "Bingsday", reports were available with lightning rapidity. Reported ABC: Crosby's rating on his first transcribed show was 24. (Practically the same as he enjoyed live on NBC last spring). The Groaner had 60.5 of the listening audience.

On Thursday Radio Row was also talking about the show, agreeing that it was a good one, although many did not like Lina Romay's singing of "Love on a Greyhound Bus" and many did not think the "Turkey in the Straw" number showed Skitch Henderson's pianoizing to fullest ability. But Bing was in fine form and Hope, for his fans, was in his usual

Said the conservatives: wait and see what the rating is six weeks from now. Said the pro-transcriptionists: radio broadcasting has entered a new era. Said the anti-transcriptionists, eyeing the full page ads in the newspapers, Time, Life, the Bingle pennies,

the Bing-advertising blimp: Even Joe Doakes could get a rating with that build-up!

Should Remember

It seems to us that most of what is wrong with radio would be remedied if its performers would remember just one thing: that the ether medium differs from all other entertainment media with its entrance into the homes of its audience. It is a sort of presumption that none of the other facets of entertainment take.

When an audience attends a stage play or the showing of a motion picture, they are in a foreign atmosphere, they have traveled afield in search of diversion and they are there expressly to accept the product advertised out front—good or bad.

But when Mr. and Mrs. America, and Junior and Sis, turn the dial on the radio in their own living room, it is like opening their front door. If what they find there is objectionable in any way, they'll close the door on it with a quick twist of the wrist. Who can expect them to invite into their home a man who is shouting at them, a woman who is talking down her nose to them, or a so-called comedian who wants to tell them jokes of a distasteful nature?

By the same token they are likely to favor programs less stereotyped,

entertainment with an impromptu, informal flavor that fills the rooms of their home with added friendliness and warmth.

Programs with a production complex are more suited to the theater. Radio is an intimate medium. Its personnel should keep that in mind and both maintain and respect this intimacy with its public.

Have you followed the fortunes, dilemmas and delights of the "family in the house half-way up the block" as faithfully as we have all these years? Yes, we mean "Vic and Sade." If you too are a "Gook" fan you're probably as pleased as we are that a half-hour on the air instead of their former fifteen minutes has made their show more entertaining than ever.

We think that scripter Paul Rhymer does some of the funniest, subtlest and most sophisticated writing on the air. "The Gooks" on the surface are an ordinary small town family, no smarter or more unusual than most folks. But the vein of devastating satire on everyday manners, culture, and habits is extraordinary. For instance when "Sade" mentions the Little Tiny Petite Pheasant Feather Tea Room we know immediately what it looks like and what the proprietor serves for lunch. Just the name does it. "Vic's" serious and slightly patronizing attitude as "Sky Brother Gook", Exalted Big Dipper of the Drowsy Venus chapter in his lodge, "Sacred Stars of the Milky Way", is the counterpart of many lodge members we've known. When "Uncle Fletcher" speaks of friends in Dismal Seepage, Ohio or Sweet Esther, Wisconsin, we see the towns clearly enough to describe them.

And still, with all the clever situations and intelligent writing, it's the performers who make us love "Vic and Sade". Bernadine Flynn as "Sade" has what amounts to a genius for sounding ordinary. Her homely phrases, her preoccupation with her family, her respect for "Vic's" man's world are all typical of good wives and mothers everywhere. It's "Sade" who forms the firm, sensible basis for the show. Husband "Vic," son "Rush" and "Uncle Fletcher" are the dreamers of this world. Art Van Harvey as "Vic" is good-humored, a little frightened by his boss, "J. K. Rubich" (in mo-

ments of anger he becomes "Old Rubbish") and wonderfully whimsical. Billy Idelson as "Rush" is amused by the vagaries of his parents, but remains respectful. It's the character of "Uncle Fletcher" as played by Clarence Hartzell which reaches the real heights of nonsense. "Uncle Fletcher" is one of those puzzling old men who hover between near insanity and clear lucidity. His comment on any statement directed to him is apt to be either "fine" or "yes"—whether or not it makes sense never occurs to "Uncle Fletcher". His marvelously anti-climactic stories of "fellas" who all seem to live in Dixon, Illinois and "who later moved to Dismal Seepage, Ohio, went into the shoe business and married a woman thirty-seven years old" always arouse the question from someone of "how old was he?" "Thirty-eight!" "Uncle Fletcher" will reply as if he was announcing some astounding news.

"Vic and Sade" is the only program we can think of that we would refuse to listen to if one of the cast members was changed. For over a decade we've known and loved them and losing one of them would be like losing a very dear friend.

Hmmmmmm

'Tis the consensus, and rightly so, we feel, that this season's NBC Jack Benny show is one of the veteran showman's best. The commercials, long a bone of contention on all Lucky Strike sponsored ailers, have been made more listenable by the welcome addition of *The Quartette*. The Quartette, ostensibly hired by Don Wilson for five hundred dollars, has succeeded in bringing Benny some of his biggest rounds of applause. Thinking he was adding *Klass* to the Sunday program, Jack has discovered his half-a-thousand dollars' worth of talent has only added "Hmmmmmm"-appeal. If you've followed the show, you know the Quartette's "Hmmm" serves as conversation, background for commercials and fills any lulls in the show. It also serves to bring a new crop of laughs to the old spiel about LS/MFT.

Off-mike, the Quartette is composed of our Otto K. Olesen Building neighbors, The Sportsmen. As four of radio's most demanded singers, the boys can be heard practically twenty-four hours a day. They answer to the names of Bill Day, Max Smith, Martin Sperzel and Gurney Bell and are listed as first tenor, second tenor, bass and baritone, respectively. As a clock-working business unit, they've sung together for approximately a dozen years.

When we cornered them last week and asked for a statement, we got one—and you guessed it. "Hmmmmmm!"

Morning Melody

The one compensation we can think of for our having to be in the office so early in the morning is that we're

always up to hear the Fred Waring program (NBC, Monday through Friday, 8:00 a.m.).

Day after day, week after week, year after year, Fred Waring and company consistently present for their listeners' pleasure a musical menu which seldom falls short of perfection. At the rare times that we hear him do a tune with an arrangement or treatment that doesn't quite strike home with us, we remember that it is very likely sending someone else into raptures. Everybody has his own musical tastes, and as the old saying goes, you can't please all the people all the time. Many of our performers use the axiom as an alibi. Waring and company do not have to. They come as close as anyone can to offering a half-hour of entertainment to please everybody—the only requisite being that the listener has to like music.

Music has been Waring and company's chief stock in trade ever since Fred got together with his brother Tom and a group of their fellow-collegians to form an unpretentious musical aggregation back in Pennsylvania, the start of the world-famous "Pennsylvanians".

Waring's most notable contribution to the world of brasses and strings is his insistence that a blending of voices in choral arrangement further enhances a beautiful and stirring melody. He proves it daily on his show.

Waring is a perfectionist, and as such, he gets the most from all of his performers. As a result, each member of his vast organization (too many to name individually) deserves a share of the credit. What we like further about Waring is that he willingly gives it to them.

It must be mentioned also that Fred and his talented crew gave a sorely needed shot-in-the-arm to daytime radio when they accepted this 8:00 a.m. broadcasting time in the face of its obvious disadvantages.

We suppose, because it is being broadcast at this early daytime hour, many dialers do miss the Fred Waring

program. But if you're missing it just because you're a sleepyhead, shame on you! It's worth setting your alarm clock for!

Feather in Cap

The first in a series of three Red Feather Community Chest Shows made its debut on Saturday night (12th) in the Hollywood Bowl. Boasting an impressive list of star names, the two-hour and twenty-two minute show was a forecast of things to come. As often happens in an undertaking of this magnitude, unforeseen delays slowed up production. The remaining shows should profit from the experiences of the first airer and, doubtless, all kinks can be ironed out.

Adverse criticism points up the fact that the Hollywood Bowl is too large an "auditorium" for proper audience reception. Laughter and applause registered as sparse, thereby noticeably affecting the performance of the actors.

But in defense of the show, there is much to be said. All hands were on deck, obviously willing to aid in every possible manner. Jack Benny, Rochester, Groucho Marx, Dennis Day, Victor Borge, Jack Carson, Lynn Bari, Arthur Treacher, the Slim Gaillard Trio, Jimmy Durante, Garry Moore, Ralph Edwards, Art Linkletter, Phil Baker, Frank Morgan, and many others freely gave of their time and talent. Perhaps one of the most original spots was a satire on radio mystery shows starring Myrna Loy as Nora Charles, William Gargan as Ross Dolan, Wally Maher as Michael Shayne, Elliott Lewis as Gregory Hood, Tom Collins as Bulldog Drummond, Michael Dunne as Dr. Dandfield, Howard Duff as Sam Spade, Bill Forman as The Whistler, Brooke Temple as Red Ryder, Jack Mather as The Cisco Kid and William Spier as the Corpse. The clambake was produced, edited and directed by Spier, who directs, produces and edits CBS' "Suspense."

The overall production was under the auspices of Charles Vanda.

Bucking Saturday night's popular NBC "Truth Or Consequences" show is CBS' offering, "Hollywood Star Time". Although emceed and aided by one of our favorite personalities, Herbert Marshall, the show to date strikes us as a slow starter. Because the radio dialer has at the twist of a wrist, any number of dramatic series from which to choose (i.e. CBS' "Lux Radio Theatre", "Screen Guild Players", "This Is Hollywood", "Stars Over Hollywood", NBC's "Skippy Hollywood Theatre" and "Hollywood Theatre", etc.) "Star Time" finds itself in fast company. Mr. Radio Dialer resents having the same air fare crammed down his throat day after day. Just like an overdose of the most delect-

Lauren Bacall, for our money, made a most successful radio debut with her last week's appearance on CBS' "Lux Radio Theater"—co-starring with husband Humphrey Bogart in "To Have and Have Not". role on "Special Investigator", always wanted to be an actor. However, a quirk of fate and a quick decision really made up his mind. At the time, Keith was employed by a men's furnishing store, while furthering his acting career with a little theater group at night.

As luck would have it, the store manager wanted him to work on a night when he was scheduled for a leading part. Dick refused and was fired by the irate manager. As a result, he decided to make the theater his profession, something he had wanted to do for years. A few weeks later he had a job in the Broadway production of "Diamond Lil," the beginning of a successful career behind the footlights and the microphone.

Keith was born in New York on January 7, 1908. He attended the High School of Commerce, where his principal interests were baseball, and, of course, theatricals. Baseball is still his favorite sport, although he enjoys boxing, horses and football. His first job was as "custodian" and driver of the ponies and carriages for children's rides on Central Park Mall.

The stint with the men's furnishings store followed, his last before turning to acting.

Tellegen Admirer

The part in "Diamond Lil" was only the beginning for Keith. Subsequently he appeared in "Jewel Robbery," "Great Lover," and "The Assassin." During his stage and radio engagements, he worked with such celebrities as Helen Hayes, Robert Taylor, Eddie Cantor and Tallulah Bankhead. Of his many associates, Dick picks the veteran actor, Lou Tellegen, as the most interesting person he ever met, admiring his background as actor, boxer, model, coal-stoker and baker's helper. Keith appeared with Tellegen in two plays and also in vaudeville.

"True Detective Mysteries" and "Real Stories from Real Life" are only two of the radio shows in which Keith has had leading roles, prior to his feature assignment on Mutual's "Special Investigator." The broadcast he remembers with most pleasure was during the Christmas season in 1936. Keith played Santa Claus on the air, reading the children's letters and answering them. His favorite fans are three young girls in a Massachusetts sanitarium. He has great admiration for their courage and "chin up" attitude despite their chronic illness.

Tall and imposing, Keith looks the part of "Special Investigator." Curiously enough, he has had one narrow escape from death—when he was thrown from a car which hit a tree at 60 m.p.h.

Lenrow later became speech instructor at Hunter College in New York, and at the University of Iowa, where he was also director of the Iowa State Players. Although he had his first radio audition in 1928, it was eight years later, while broadcasting occasionally in connection with his college teaching, that he decided to make radio his career. He received so much fan mail as a broadcaster, not a professor, that his decision was made for him by his audience! His commercial radio debut was a success, and Lenrow has been busy ever since as a free-lance actor-narrator-announcer.

In appearance Lenrow is tall, powerfully built and red-haired. His hobbies are gardening and carpentry at his Englewood, New Jersey, home. He's an ardent cyclist and enjoys long-distance jaunts with his three young sons who are equally proficient at the sport. Doesn't sound like an ex-college professor, does he? But on Friday nights when you hear him as "Mystery Theater's" "Geoffrey Barnes" you're really getting a lesson in speech and acting from "the master," himself.

Learning to play the piano and the trumpet, and hiking with the local Boy Scouts. While in high school his teachers were so impressed with his sneaking voice that they advised him to become either a senator or an actor—Lon chose the latter because he thought he would make more money.

After graduating from high school, the "Nick Carter" sleuth enrolled in the Minneapolis Music School, where he organized a dance band. By this time he had decided to become a singer, but worked with visiting stock companies for fun. He became so fascinated by acting that he joined one of these summer road shows and toured with them for several years, playing all types of parts in every conceivable dialect.

After an offer from a radio station in Chicago, Lon made the journey to the windy city and worked there till a talent scout from WLW in Cincinnati offered him a job on the staff. While here he took singing lessons on the side, and finally blossomed out as a singer with the Cincinnati Summer Opera Company, appearing with such name stars as Grace Moore and Martinelli. It was in Cincinnati, also, that Lon met his wife, who was appearing as a guest actress on a dramatic program.

Lon is the father of two small sons, age two and one-half and ten months, and is one of radio's busiest

actors. He started playing the super-sleuth "Nick Carter" in April, 1943, and has been with the show ever since, as well as on over twenty other programs each week, which accounts for the fact that he hasn't had a vacation in over four years.

The Clarks are avid collectors of operatic records, and have an enviable number of discs made by the great Caruso. Lon also constantly attends Manhattan's auctions, and has recently acquired several valuable paintings to add to his present collection of antique furniture. Versatile Lon also writes music on the side, and his ambition is to become a singing star either in a Broadway production or in Hollywood.

the story. And above all it must be fair, which any listener with a background of general knowledge can solve.

Diagrams It

Then too, where an author can take thirty to forty pages at the end to explain how he fitted the puzzle together, a radio writer can only take two. And in those two pages the explanation must be crystal clear, for there's no turning back to check up.

"The Falcon," for example, always has a fair lady prodding him with questions in his final scene, which he is compelled to answer before he can ask her a favorite question of his own.

Of course, every radio writer has his own way of putting a detective story together. One thing, however, we do share in common, is that we all work backwards. Although it's the last thing in the story, we first decide how the murder is going to be solved. Having done that, we reverse our field and pick up as interesting an opening as we can possibly get that will add up when the rest of the story is told. True, writers have been known to introduce shows with scenes which are never explained, but the executive committee of the union is laying for them.

To my mind the most important ingredient of a detective story is the action that takes place. Your audience will forgive a lot if the ladies and gentlemen of the cast who supply the menace are colorful. Naturally, we try to oblige.

No discussion of mystery script writers would be complete without asking what motivates us. Are we all frustrated Draculas, who take our blood vicariously? The answer is NO. Actually, we're a timid lot. And though we pile body on body, I have known cases where the mere sight of borsch make a writer sick.

Then the question arises—why do we do it? And the answer which generally follows is—it's a living. And a pretty good one at that. Few radio writers, with the exception of the top bracket comedy men, can match our take. For some unknown reason, boy meets body pays off much better than boy meets girl.

of all. He's always in trouble with his clients, with crooks and with the police.

"Sam likes a good drink. He drinks what he calls 'a prepared cocktail' from a bottle in his desk. When he sits down to dictate a report to his secretary, Effie, the first thing you hear is the clank of the bottles as he reaches for a drink out of his desk drawer.

"Effie doesn't get far with any romantic notions about her boss. Not that he's impervious to her charms. He isn't, nor to those of the glamorous women he meets when he's out on a case. But Sam needs a good secretary more than he needs a wife, so he keeps Effie in her place. He calls her 'sweetheart,' too. Or 'baby.'"

Know Hero

It's obvious from what producer William Spier and his secretarial assistant, Peggy Rea, say about "Sam Spade" in the above paragraphs, that they know the Dashiell Hammett hero well, and immensely enjoy bringing him to the microphone on CBS' weekly Sunday airings of "The Adventures of Sam Spade."

The dangerous devil-may-care doings of the Hammett hero are expertly scripted by Bob Tolman and Ann Lorraine, and ably enacted by veteran ether thespians, Howard Duff as "Sam," Lurene Tuttle as "Effie," and Jerry Hausner as Sam's lawyer, "Sid Weiss." This expert blending of quality ingredients is a pretty good guarantee of a fine finished product, as radio listeners agree who weekly join the fast-talking private detective on his fast-moving round of double-dealings.

Of the production of the program, black-bearded mystery fancier Bill Spier smiled broadly, "I get a kick out of doing the show. Sam's—a 'sweetheart!'"

They Always Remember The Beard

*Wherein We Present Some Memorable Facts About
This Man Who Brings You Unforgettable Airshows*

WILLIAM SPIER was winner of Radio Life's 1944 and 1945 Distinguished Achievement Awards for outstanding radio production. He is director-producer of two of radio's most outstanding thrill shows, CBS' "Suspense" and "The Adventures of Sam Spade."

Mr. Spier likes to wear sporty California clothes and gay print neckties which contrast strikingly with the sombre blackness of his beard. Whenever he has the thought to dispense with this hirsute adornment, he reminds himself of how he looks without it. According to him, he looks "awful!" — but those who've seen him clean-shaven scoff at that opinion. At any rate, the beard serves a purpose. "People remember a man with a beard," he grins. "It's a good thing in this business."

"I don't want his beard to go!" asserts his busy secretary, Peggy Rea. "It comes in handy many times. Whenever I can't locate Bill, I send out calls (usually to the local record

shops) for 'the man with the beard.' Without it, he'd be hard to find!"

Upside-Down Schedule

Bill Spier is married to singer-actress Kay Thompson, head of vocal production at M-G-M. They live in a Georgian farmhouse in swank Bel-Air. Bill plays badminton every night till one a.m., then reads submitted "Suspense" scripts until three. He is no early-riser, save when he is working on a screen production and has to be on the set at an early hour.

He is an excellent pianist, having started study of the instrument when he was five. He owns three pianos. "I may sometimes want for clothing or food," he observes, "but never for pianos."

His major ambition concerning radio is to direct a musical program, and an informal round-table discussion on which he would actively participate—a show such as "The Circle" of several years back. He calls himself "an incurable ham."

He loves to act, and will probably join in little theater work if he can ever find the time. He is anxious to do more movies. He is an Alfred

Hitchcock fan. He is often called "The Alfred Hitchcock of the Air-planes." He has a remarkable memory and an uncanny premonitory sense.

Spier made his first theatrical appearance as a magician at a church bazaar in New York City when he was a small boy. He is both a great friend and admirer of magician-actor-what-have-you Orson Welles. But Bill names Feodor Chaliapin as his favorite actor, and won't commit himself even that far when it comes to actresses because he has to direct them all on "Suspense."

He has an extensive collection of classical records and crime books. At eighteen, he was chief critic on Musical America Magazine. In 1929, he came to radio as director-producer of operatic and concert musical programs. A year later, he toured nine countries on the European continent to record on-the-spot transcriptions for a special international radio show that pioneered the field of electrically transcribed broadcasts.

In 1931, Spier came to Hollywood to record a series called "Radio Newsreel of Hollywood" which marked the air debut of such stellar names of the screen industry as George Arliss, John Barrymore, Walter Huston, and W. C. Fields.

On Original "M.O.T."

In 1932, when drama on the radio was still seldom heard, Spier took over the program which to him was "the greatest education in radio technique any man ever had the opportunity to experience"—the original "March of Time." According to Spier, it was his assignment to this program, which dealt with real happenings to real people, that taught him the true appreciation of an honest, effective radio portrayal.

Several years ago, Spier became producer-director of CBS' "Suspense" series, which has since become one of radio's most listened-to shows, and several months ago, he assumed, in addition, the directorial chores on Columbia's "Adventures of Sam Spade."

Spier speaks French, German, and about thirty-two words in Russian, including one direct question, "Where is the bathroom?"

His favorite book is "War and Peace"; his favorite film, "Citizen Kane"; his favorite music, "Der Meistersinger." He seldom eats breakfast or lunch, and on broadcast days, doesn't eat dinner either.

He reads "Dick Tracy" every day.

He drinks hot chocolate more often than coffee, treasures the sentimental memory of Christmas mornings in his childhood, with snow outside the window and presents around the tree. His weakness is chocolate marshmallow fudge.

JAY JOSTYN is so at home in the role of the law-enforcing "Mr. District Attorney" that he admits the most difficult task for him is to appear as a villain on other air shows. Jay prefers character roles, and that's the way you usually hear

Jay was personally congratulated by Governor Thomas E. Dewey for the law-abiding propaganda he gives with his entertainment. Jay is really up on the news, too. He buys five New York papers a day and makes frequent visits to court when his schedule permits.

He attended Marquette University and studied dramatics at the Wisconsin Conservatory of Music. At nineteen he toured with a stock company throughout the far west and Canada, and was eventually discovered for radio by a Los Angeles station executive. In 1936 Jay tackled New York and soon landed on "Renfrew of the Mounted" and other air shows, gaining his widest audience as "Mr. D.A."

On the personal side, Jay admits to liking cultured people, soft music and the THEATER. He's a member of the famous actors' organization, the Lamb's Club. He's married to ex-actress Ruth Hill and is the father of two sons, Jean Charles and Jon George. Jay and family reside in Manhasset, Long Island, where, Jay says, he's just another law-abiding citizen.

Other deciding factors are the sharp intelligent producership of Dave Taylor, and the dry portrayal of the inspector, as done by Joe Forte.

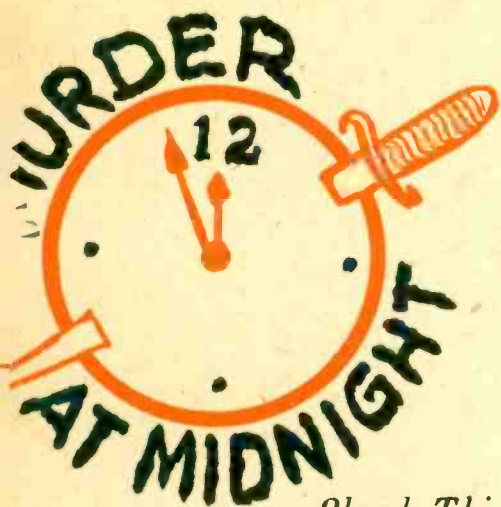

MAN NAMED MOYLES

CBS' Man of the World, "Man Named Jordan" Is in Real-Life, Home-Loving Jack Moyles

EVER SINCE its origination on January 8, 1945, CBS' "Man Named Jordan" has been portrayed by a man named Jack Moyles. So, for our all-mystery edition, we deemed it only fitting and proper that we interview this veteran star of one of Hollywood radio's top adventure-mystery airers. Doing so, we uncovered such choice data as the following:

Mikeman Moyles made his first appearance in the realm of the drama when he wangled himself a part in his high school senior play because he had heard that the Father would give anybody who was in the play a passing grade in English.

Actually, during his high school days in San Francisco, Moyles' real interest was in sports, and he avidly participated in baseball, football and tennis. Today, he maintains that interest, although with his time so taken by radio chores, his active participation in the artistic line is now limited to an occasional game of tennis—"to keep the waistline."

In high school, Moyles also sang with the glee club "for a lark," and later, sang on the air for little more—being paid the small sum of fifty dollars a month as an all-round staff member of a local station, with a working schedule that stretched from six a.m. until midnight.

Actually, Jack related, his very first salary for radio work was two pebble-beach neckties!

Moyles recalled that he worked in San Francisco radio and at the Fair on Treasure Island with many present-day Hollywood radio-ites—among them, Bob Anderson, Jack Kirkwood, Art Linkletter and Bob Neilson (now Barry Nelson of the screen.) Jack also played "Bobby" with Hal Burdick, "Night Editor," for two years.

Busy Actor

Jack Moyles came to Hollywood radio himself in November of 1944, and has since been heard on most of the town's top airshows. Regularly, in addition to his portrayal of "Man Named Jordan," listeners hear him as "Bullface Dickens" on CBS' "Get That Story," in a variety of roles on CBS' "The Whistler" and the Gene Autry show, and doing the one-man narration and dramatization on ABC's "Real Story."

Asked what he regards as the turning point in his career, Moyles stated, "The establishment of the American Federation of Radio Artists." When AFRA was first established, Moyles was elected vice-president and as a result, lost his station staff job. "That's when I started to free-lance," he revealed, "and it's the best thing that ever happened to my career."

One of the black-haired, brown-eyed actor's special fortes is doing imitations of the late President Roosevelt and Winston Churchill. He listened daily for two weeks to speeches by the two men in preparation for his mimicking chores on CBS' "Destination Tomorrow." He also did his impersonation act on club dates in San Francisco and in the more than three hundred camp shows he played in the Bay City area, for which he received a Red Cross citation.

On some appearances, in addition to doing the voice matching, Moyles made up his five-foot, nine-inch frame to resemble the British "Winnie's" ample proportions, topping his costume off with the Churchill derby and cigar.

Recently Wed

As for the personal life of this man named Moyles, he is a happy husband of fourteen months. He calls his home in Studio City a "honeymoon cottage," and his wife, Nida Vanderbush (former CBS receptionist), his "most treasured possession."

The Moyleses have a coal-black cat which was a wedding present and a dog that is the grandson of "Lassie," the movie canine hero. (Note to fact-challengers: "Lassie" is actually a male dog. He sired the Moyles' dog's mother.)

And if you're wondering if this happily-married Moyles man remembers his wedding anniversary—the answer is a resounding yes! He treats his missus to a special champagne dinner in honor of the occasion every month!

ONE FOR THE BOOK

Soft-shoe artist, acrobatic dancer, band leader, show boat owner, tent show magnate, movie buckaroo and now "Buckskin" on Don Lee's "Red Ryder," Horace Murphy is one of those people who "ought to write a book." And he is writing one—he's on chapter two and the title is "Tent Show."

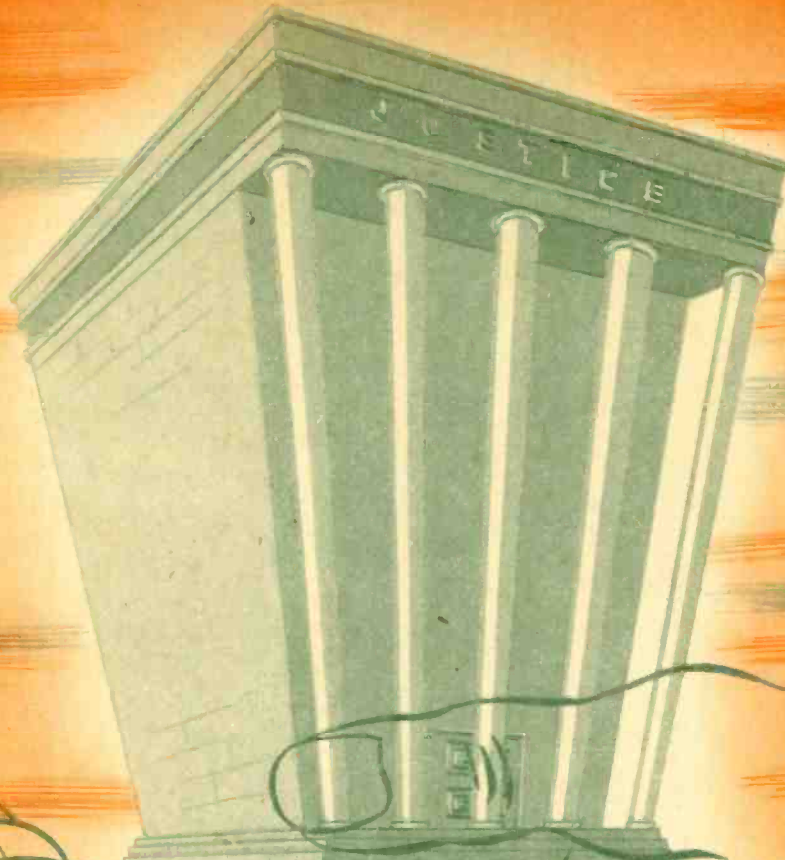
