MEETING Gene Carroll in the corridor at NBC the other afternoon was like meeting a couple of old friends. That, in fact, was just exactly what it was, for besides being himself, Gene is a couple of other people, "Jake" and "Lena," by name. They are our old friends, and yours, too; we imagine, for practically every long-time radio dialer is familiar with the team called Gene and Glenn, and their comic chums, Jake and Lena, and everyone considers the four of them old friends.

Well, of course, the truth is that there were only two of them. Now, Glenn has left the act, and two minus one leaves three. Or are you following us?

Anyway, as we said, we met Mr. Carroll in the corridor of the studio the other day and we asked him, "What are you doing in Hollywood, Gene?"

"Lena's on the 'Fibber and Molly' show," he explained.

It's Gene Carroll, of "Gene and Glenn", and of Course "Lena's" with Him; She's Working as a Maid for "Fibber and Molly"

"Where's 'Jake'?" we asked immediately, very concerned.

"That's what all of 'Lena's' friends are asking," he grinned. "People who hear her on the 'McGee' program have been writing in, asking how 'Jake' is getting along without a job and if he's jealous about her being on a big show like 'Fibber and Molly' without him."

Well, Gene told us not to be worried about 'Jake'. "He's too good a character to be out of work," insisted Mr. Carroll. "I'm going to try to get him on a big show, too."

So, stick close to your radios, "Jake and Lena" fans—chances are, they *both* will be back with you soon.

Their Origin

We asked Gene how "Jake and Lena" happened to be born, and he related this story:

"It was a number of years ago when Tony Wons was doing his Woodshed Theater on WLS in Chicago. He dramatized little stories and did all of the voices himself. One day, however, when he was doing Rip Van Winkle, he anticipated difficulty in varying his voice enough to exchange rapid repartee between Rip and Mrs. Rip, so he asked me to step in and play the latter. Tony's voice was deep, and he explained that if I talked almost in my natural voice the contrast would be marked enough. So I did, but at the same time mimicked the trace of a Dutch accent that Tony was doing for his portrayal of Van Winkle.

teners wrote in with some indignation that it was shocking to have 'Lena' living with three men! In those days, too," continued Gene, "we were able to play tricks on our listeners with recordings without telling them that a record was being used. Glenn and I would record a song, play it on the show, then I'd join in with the voice of 'Lena' so that listeners would think that there *must* be more than two of us. They'd often call the station to ask, but the operator was instructed not to tell."

Nostalgic

Gene and Glenn's listeners have always been loyal and devoted, and Gene reminisced fondly about the incidents, some humorous, some sad, all touching, which evidenced the ardent attention their fans accorded them. "Sometimes we would stage endurance broadcasts for charitable causes, agreeing to stay on the air as long as listeners called in their pledges to contribute toward the charity. It always ended up in our being on the air all night long. Once," Mr. Carroll recalled further, "we received a call from one of our lady listeners telling us that her father had just passed away. She told us that he had always listened to us and that his religious worship had been centered chiefly around the hymn time that we included on our program every day. She asked us if we would sing a hymn at her father's funeral. We were most happy to do so. Our listeners have always watched out for us, too," Gene said then, turning to a lighter vein of reminiscing. "Once, when 'Lena' bemoaned on the show that 'Jake' had sat on her hat, we received a deluge of stylish chapeaux for 'Lena' in the next mail delivery, while another time, when I jokingly accounted for a noise by announcing that I'd dropped my false teeth, I actually received two new sets from obliging listeners!"

Asked what his former partner, Glenn Rowell, was doing now, Carroll answered, "We were playing

The Good Earth Is Kingdom of Mirandy, Whose Advice About "Gardnin' and Sech" Has Been Radio Feature for Over Decade

LAWSY me, if this ain't a day fit fer gittin' way out in the country where a body kin really feel and smell the springtime!" We heartily agreed with Her Rural Highness, Mirandy.

For as long as we can remember radio in these parts (she's got us doing it, too, you see) Mirandy has been part of the scene. As she would say, she's been on as many stations as you can shake a stick at, and for

three years on one network series, the old Blue Network's "Farm and Home Hour." She started her radio career 'way back with the Beverly Hillbillies and has been airing her keen wit, folk lore and yarns about the Ozarks ever since.

Now we don't want you to get the impression Mirandy is primarily a part of the entertainment world—far from it. Her informal little chats about her favorite topics, growing things and homemaking, are packed full of good sound advice and her audience instinctively senses here's a woman who knows what she's talking about as well as how to make a quarter-hour mighty entertaining listening.

Mirandy actually comes from the Ozark country, the twang of which is still in her voice. As she describes it, she was born in southwestern Missouri, "where you can set a milk-in' stoori in three states — Missouri, Arkansas and Oklahoma." From her Irish ancestors who settled in those hills 'way back before the war (the war between the states, that is) comes her keen sense of humor and her lively imagination. And though she's lived in California for many years now, she's always raised children, chickens and a garden—if it is on a city lot!

"Used" Acres

Just now, Mirandy, her husband and her two children, a girl of seventeen and a boy, thirteen, are very busy getting their new place in order. "Rose-Wood Farm," as it is called, is a five and one-half acre plot in the Manville Canyon area, where they've just completed "half-a-house," due to the shortage of all kinds of building materials. But if the house is just half completed, those five and a half acres are fast becoming the most intensively "used" acres in Southern California. Besides the landscaping and flower gardens (in one rose garden Mirandy already has four hundred bushes set out) there'll be a kitchen garden, an herb garden, fifty fruit trees, chickens, two horses and a cow!

Mirandy's quarter-hour on KECA every Saturday morning at 9:15 (on which she's her own sponsor, advertising her famous "Emporium" at the Farmers Market) is packed full of gems of wisdom—not only about growing and care of all kinds of things from apricots to wisteria, but a wealth of her down-to-earth philosophy about life in general. Her programs make as good listening for apartment-bound urbanites (they can dream, can't they?) as for those fortunate individuals who have their own acre or two, or backyard plot. And her weekly letters from that mythical "Sister Susie" back in Per-

The Brain Behind

"Take It or Leave It"

Edith Oliver, Who's Formulated Posers for Seven Years, Says All You Need Is Webster's Dictionary, Daily Newspapers

EVER since March of 1940, a young lady with a mobile face and rare acumen has been grinding out the questions to be asked contestants on "Take It or Leave It". She's alert Edith Oliver, who observed, "At the end of the first year, I felt as if there were no more questions, anywhere. But after the first year, like married life, 'Take It or Leave It' wasn't so bad. Now my real problem is not the questions, but how to form them. We want the program to sound like a game, not like a college entrance exam."

Although Edith appears to be a carefree person without a transcontinental radio program on her mind (she'll talk clothes and feminine frivolity at the drop of a John Fred-erics) she admits, "There's invariably a layer of my mind working on the show. The first few years I always kept a little notebook by my bed, in case I thought of something during the night."

Now, she finds conversation one of her richest mines. The other day she overheard two women chatting, when one remarked, "It's another string to his bow." Edith grasped the idea for a category on hobbies. When two words are confused or a word is spelled two ways, she hits on another fresh way to present the posers: leveled at participants by Phil Baker.

Each week, Edith prepares a history category, one on science, movies, and sports, and always a music category patterned to afford Baker a chance to play his accordion.

Doesn't Know Sports

"I'm such a bookish person," sighed Edith. "I always go overboard on literature. But I'm sunk on

sports and music, and wouldn't you know it? They're always the ones to be picked from the board every week. My young brother helps me on the sports questions, but for a while, when he was in service, I had to figure out other means of assistance."

Edith prepares eighteen categories for each broadcast, but generally only five or six are used. She expects two \$64 winners weekly, but claims that twenty-five shows have signed on and off the air without any money being paid.

For several years Edith cruised along with a casual file, but within the last couple of years she acquired a secretary, Janet Hill, who was courageous enough to tackle the gigantic task of regimenting all the material. It took Janet nine months to reorganize the files. Their backbone is two tremendous black loose-leaf notebooks, one for "Used" questions and the other for "Pending". All questions are cross-referenced, making it simple to locate any category or segment of one, with the date on which material was used. So much thought goes into formulating the categories that unused questions are always salvaged. For instance, if a contestant goes down on the second question of a category, the remaining five posers are placed in the pending file, where Edith "repairs" them. By careful rewording, they may be supplemented by two fresh queries and re-made into a new category.

Asked if the public's store of in-

formation had changed during the post-war period, Edith thoughtfully answered, "Yes, come to think of it, during the war everyone was hep on news. Now they're often blank on current events. Quotations and history are presently the most popular categories. I guess folks are reading more books."

Receives Help

Edith usually works about six weeks ahead of air time, but she can't estimate the hours going into the preparation of her script because she's really working all the time. She makes, on the average, seventy-five telephone calls a week, probing and checking her information. When she first started with the show (that was when Bob Hawk was quiz master) "Take It or Leave It" was not a household by-word. Now, with the "\$64 question" and

Three Wise Men of Radio

Bob Jellison, Frank Nelson, and Hans Conried Prefer Being Carefree Actors To Shouldering Burden of Stardom

THE WORK'S STEADY, the pay's good and the worries are practically nil. So when Bob Jellison, Frank Nelson and Hans Conried say they don't want to be radio stars, thanks just the same, they look like the Three Wise Men of Radio.

You hear them every Saturday night on the Sealtest "Village Store" program over NBC with Jack Haley and Eve Arden. Jelly's the pudgy little guy who simply loathes his

mythical hen-pecking wife. Frank's the pompous fellow of the lines that go, "This is the Dally where-if-you-want - to - sell - some - of - your - left - over - merchandise - we - suggest - you - place - an - ad - in - our - obituary - column - because - if - you - advertise - in - our - paper - you're - a - dead - pigeon - to - start - with - Gazette." And Hans is the John Carradine of the air waves, the lad whose voice swoops on the syllables and rings on the consonants as if every sentence were part of Hamlet's soliloquy.

They're always good for a laugh, for they know their business, these boys. And they're frankly very happy to be supporting players instead of stars, stalwarts of the line instead of quarterbacks.

"I come to work, I read my lines, we do the show, and I go home," says Jelly. "What more could a man ask? If I were a star, I'd probably be worrying about scripts all week, fretting myself into an early grave."

"I make enough money to get along very nicely," adds Frank, "but not so much that I have to be a financial wizard as well as an actor, and work with one eye on the clock and the other on stock market reports."

"And think of the production headaches!" Hans chimes in. "A star always feels completely responsible for the show, and he carries around the weight of the world, worrying about budgets and Hooperatings and rehearsal schedules and competition and writers and producers and everything."

"It's very nice," Jelly sums it up, "to be able to dodge worry the way we do."

Great Golfer

Jelly started in show business when he was twelve, and has never been away from it long since. He's been an NBC contract player since 1936, working out of Chicago until he came to Hollywood and the "Village Store" in 1944. Jelly looks like he sounds—short, plump and wistful in a dimply manner. For Love o' Mike (General Comment)

New High for Radio

A current pastime seems to be for everyone to accuse everyone else of not listening to the radio. This is pointed out in the many columns we have read about how Hooper ratings ten years ago were higher than they are now, how so-and-so has skidded such-and-such an amount of points in the last five years, how people no longer follow favorite programs with the tenacity they did back in 1933, etc. and etc.

This is all very interesting, and doubly so in the light of a statistical communique we've received from CBS on the percentage of radio ownership, multiple-set ownership and total radio listening in the United States.

A survey was made especially for CBS by the Market Research Company of America in January and February of this year (or just about the time the columnists were wailing about the Hoopers) and the results were given special study by Nielsen Radio Index, a research firm. The revealing facts are that radio listening and ownership are currently at an all-time high and that U.S. radio manufacturers have established an all-time production record.

In other words, ninety-three per cent of all U.S. homes have radios—which, if we're not mistaken, is a greater percentage of homes than can boast complete literacy. Not only that, one out of every three families has more than one radio, an increase of eighty-nine per cent over the comparable 1944 figures. One in every five families bought a new radio last year. Total public outlay for new home radios for 1946 was \$330,000,000. Total listening per day is up 4,600,000 hours. Family listening increased twenty-eight per cent or sixty-two minutes a day. Families with one set listened two hundred and twenty-three minutes a day; with two sets, two hundred and eighty-five minutes.

The staggering comparative figures are: 35,900,000 U.S. homes now have radio sets in use, which is an increase of 1,902,000 over the 23,998,000 reported by the Broadcast Measurement Bureau in January of 1946. And this is not counting automobile and portable radios.

Over five thousand households were visited in two hundred sample communities and rural areas. The sample was set up on an area basis according to new procedures developed by the United States Bureau of the Census. Households are selected by a random procedure and the interviewer

must call back where necessary to insure representation of the designated households.

Elmo C. Wilson, CBS Director of Research, announced the survey results, and rates a big thank you for CBS and himself from us. He's proved to us that those who claim nobody listens to the radio any more probably think so because they themselves have stopped listening.

Preparedness

Radio met the onslaught of the nationwide telephone strike with its customary preparedness, the networks setting up a careful emergency program schedule in the eventuality that a line breakdown should occur during the tie-up.

In the event that the network line going east should break down, the local outlet would continue to feed its shows as far east as they would carry, and the Eastern outlet would do the same. With this breakdown possibility in mind (although it occurs on an average of just once in some three months or so), the network's program departments set up a precise scheduling of stand-by programs of musical and speech content to fill in the resultant vacuum. The airtime would be shared equally by the network affiliates in this vicinity and other local stations throughout the country. With its usual response to an emergency threat, the ether industry busied itself immediately with thorough steps to enable the continued performance of its duty to the public without interruption.

Your Cue (Shows You May Like)

"Studs Terkel Show"

If you think you need a change, And you like a show that's strange, Try "Studs Terkel", Thursday nights at six

Hot jazz explained in rhyme Occupies the time.

Go no further than your radio for kicks.

If you think that jazz is static, They'll turn slightly operatic With Studs and "Louie" reeling off the verse.

We don't see how they do it. We've tried it and we rue it, So we'll stop before it's gotten any worse.

The foregoing is our attempt to give you a slight idea of what the Studs Terkel show is about. Studs, we're told, is a popular Chicago disc jockey whose gimmick is to mix up the platters so that no one knows quite what to ex-

pect via the turntable—hot jazz follows symphony, the blues come on next to opera, etc.

He does almost the same thing on his ABC network show heard here, as we have already pointed out, Thursday nights at six. The two bands of guitarist George Barnes and trumpet man Ralph Martire supply the popular jive, jazz and jump. Charlotte Morris embroiders the blues at odd intervals and what seem to be records of things like Mozart Quartets, operatic arias and bits of symphony are played in between jive sets. We say "what seem to be" because no announcement is made revealing whether or not they are recordings, and we can't believe that the show is budgeted so high that it can afford symphony orchestras, operatic singers and novelty performers in addition to the accredited cast.

Each show starts out with Studs putting son "Louie" to bed and admonishing the little thug to be good and listen to a bed-time story. The story is told entirely in rhyme and serves to introduce the musical numbers—and that's what we call doing it the hard way. In fact we composed the limping lyric that opens this review in order to see just what the writer of the "Studs Terkel Show" was up against. Thirty solid minutes of it a week would be enough to rock Don Blanding himself. Unfortunately we can't give you the name of this genius because, in keeping with the rest of the show, the credits at the end are also rhymed and we just weren't quick enough to catch them as they swung by. (Incidentally, we don't think they played quite fair last week when they dragged in the saga of a fictitious ball player named "Fred Merkle" just to get something to rhyme with Terkel).

"Fashion Fantasy"

"Fashion Fantasy", the brain child of Molly Morse, versatile San Diego KGB artist, is practically the next thing to television. Employing smooth music as a background for a well-written script, Miss Morse gives life to the mythical fashion show which is aired Tuesdays at 12:30 p.m. and sponsored, appropriately enough, by one of San Diego's smartest fashion salons.

Proof of the show's realism is the mail response, which includes letters from hopeful wolves, asking her for introductions to the lovely manikins described, aspiring models asking for an opportunity to model on the program, and daily requests from listeners to attend the fashion show.

"The World Dances"

Here's the kind of musical program we used to have before radio got so gosh-darned self-conscious, "The World Dances", KNX, 7:00 p.m. Wednesday. By that we mean there is no emphasis on name bands, hit-of-the-week tunes, vocalists or guest stars. Lud Gluskin, the man with the most

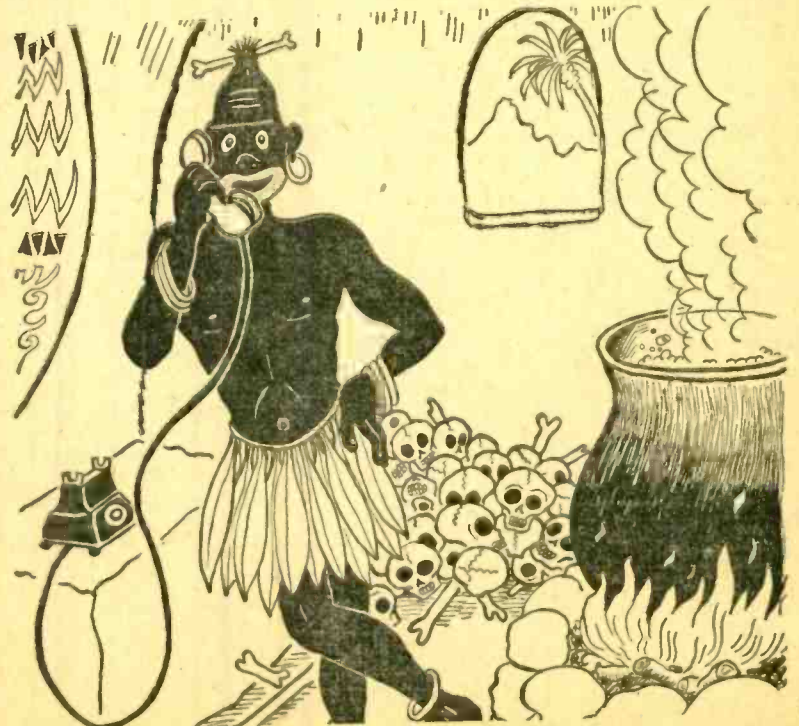


THE EASY WAY

EXTREMELY WORTHWHILE was the talk given last week for Hollywood Advertising Club by New Yorker *Ken R. Dyke*. NBC vice-president in charge of broadcasting standards and practices, Dyke was a brigadier-general during the war and in charge of information and education under General MacArthur for the Japanese occupation . . . tremendous responsibility requiring utmost discretion and judgment.

When the war started, Dyke pointed out, Japan had about eight million radio sets. By the time it ended, two million had been put out of commission by air raids and two million more had become unusable due to lack of replacement parts. Yet the radio was employed by Dyke as a means of introducing American concepts of democracy. Of the three networks, all non-commercial, most of the Japanese preferred the one designated for army listening, as on this they thought they'd get the real low-down.

PEOPLE WHO HAVE HAD to carry on a long and bitter fight to win liberty, naturally treasure something like freedom of speech, Dyke continued. The Japanese, suddenly finding themselves endowed with hitherto undreamed-of privileges, presented a problem to occupation heads. One of the first moves, instituted as an effort to awaken the Nips to the practical workings of our way of life, was to start a man-on-the-street broadcast. The question leveled at the Japanese was probably the most startling anyone could cook up—"What do you think of the emperor?" Dyke said the idea of expressing themselves on such a previously forbidden subject scared would-be participants silly. It was two or three weeks before the emcee could get a peep out of any man on any street.

AT THE INSISTENCE of Japanese radio men, Dyke went to one of the studios to see "the Jack Benny of Japan". Here, the floor was covered with matting and the microphones were about a foot and a half high—just right for broadcasting while floor-sitting. In the studio was an old man with long gray beard. Seems he was doing a soap opera single-handed, taking all the parts. He'd once been one of the traditional story tellers, and so found radio story telling a most natural occupation. The old fellow's apparent affluence puzzled the Americans at first, but some careful investigation brought to light the fact that he'd been pocketing 30,000 yen from the government in exchange for larding his soap opera dialogue with propaganda.

SO, THE JAPS have been exposed to soap opera and interview programs. We wonder what they'll think of us

when they get some give-away and kill'em cold shows?

Incidentally, Dyke said one of the first things his men did was apprehend Tokyo Rose. "She was a very attractive gal," he commented. "Very attractive."

"you'll be sorry" common expressions, Edith receives extraordinary cooperation from anyone she calls. When she picks up the telephone, for example, to check with Columbia University's physics department on some stickler and announces herself as "Edith Oliver of Take It or Leave It", the voice at the other end of the line is apt to answer, "What are you asking about? A \$32 question or a \$64?" (The \$32 question is still supposed to be the most difficult in any category).

Long years of thinking in the direction of a quiz program have made Edith extremely resourceful. Added to her college education and broad interests in the theater and books is her natural interest in people, upon which she seems to be drawing heavily as source material for her writing. In fact, she claims that all she or anyone else needs to formulate a week's question series is a dictionary and the daily papers.

"I'm a great worrier", she admitted. "I used to pace the floor of the control booth while the show was on the air—just like a prospective father. Now I sit in the wings and watch Phil—usually have a set of headphones." Often some contestant will come up with a totally unexpected answer which still may be acceptable. Baker depends on Edith to give him the cue whether or not to qualify such an answer.

Recently there was a category: "Is or was this person a man or woman?" George Eliot was one of the names asked and when the contestant answered, "A man", it was counted incorrect, as most who know it as the pen name of Mary Ann Evans would have replied. After the program signed off, CBS received more than seventy-five calls from listeners who inquired, "What about Major George Fielding Elliott?" The contestant received her belated check for answering correctly.

Should Be Hard

"I'm very cruel about contestants", Edith remarked. "I don't think they should receive help. Of course Phil naturally favors men in uniform, but I think if everyone were able to receive the top money, as happens on some shows, the \$64 would cease meaning anything."

Baker having found a place to live in Hollywood, "Take It or Leave It" has more or less moved its headquarters here, which presented a problem to Edith Oliver. A New Yorker, with a wide circle of life-long friends and a devoted family in that city, Edith can't be pried loose from Manhattan. simmon Holler are a laugh high-light with their salt-of-the-earth humor and folksy tales about life in the hill country.

She gives such practical advice, like the other morning when we heard her say "My granny always used to counsel me, 'Honey, use your head to save your heels.' I've tried. You know, a shovel makes a pretty fair substitute for a wheelbarrow. You can put a bucket of dirt, a big bush or rock on the shovel and drag it a heap easier than you can tote it."

And, "A heavy canvas apron that is mostly all pockets can save a lot of runnin' around. It will hold string, clippers, labels, trowel, seeds—as many oddments as the 'Swiss Family Robinson' had in their chest."

We liked, too, this bit of sage wisdom: "If you want lots of flowers and fruit, fertilize, water and spray, then let nature take its course. But if you want fine flowers, long-stemmed and perfect, or big shapely fruit, you must pinch and disbud. Many and ordinary, or few and fine—that goes for roses, dahlias, tomatoes, peaches—or friends."

As Mirandy herself says, "Hit ain't how long we live, it's how much we git done."

Everyone knows that busy people are happy people, Mirandy says. Work and laughter are mighty powerful medicines. In her full days, Mirandy takes plenty of both prescriptions.

So whether you actually have that garden or if it's still a dream in the back of your head, listening to Mirandy's Saturday morning show is a good inspiration for the day, from the time you hear her cheerful "Howdy, folks, how aire you-all?" until you hear her say, "God love you all, and fare-ye-well."

He was still in the Ohio city when the call came from a friend in California that "Fibber and Molly" were in the market for a maid and it looked as if "Lena" was the "woman" for the job! So, Gene and wife Helen Carroll (an ex-Boston schoolteacher—not the singer) came to California, where Gene likes it best because he hates the cold.

But one of his main interests remains in Cleveland—a radio school which he organized there "to give deserving local talent some kind of a break." other. They weren't showing off — they just liked the show and wanted us to know it. There should be more hospital shows. Many more.

Are your tastes and association away from the mike as congenial as your radio partnership?

On the air it's the CONTRAST that makes our team listenable. We are just as contrasting off the air. Jimmy is constantly on the go, keeping a traditional night-clubber's hours. Garry likes to fish, read and pursue the lazier life.

What's the biggest wrong guess either of you has made?

We make wrong guesses every week. These are indicated by occasional lulls where laughs ought to be. But our biggest wrong guess, we suppose, was the original margin of doubt we both held at the inception of our team. Neither of us knew the other at all well and we weren't too certain of any success. It makes us very happy, therefore, to be starting out on our fifth year together.

Do you have any plans for appearing in a movie as a team?

Not necessarily. Should the right thing come along it could happen. We both feel that it's refreshing to the listeners for us to do occasional guest shots on the air alone. Maybe the same thing holds good for pictures.

What is the most important thing your success has brought to each of you?

Success rarely brings you anything important other than the success itself. It is the overcoming of adversities that gives you lasting benefits. We both feel we've learned a good deal about co-operation and unselfishness.

Is there any experience to relate concerning your opinion of one another before you teamed?

We learned the full meaning of the saying "I'll take care of my enemies, may God protect me from my friends." We have never had any serious clashes of temperament, but when we first teamed up Jimmy's friends warned him against teaming with "some unknown radio punk", while Garry's radio friends insisted that he was "crazy to team up with an old established star like Durante." They kept trying to make us distrustful of each other, but it didn't work.

Have you ever shared any incidents upon which you later based comedy routines?

Good comedy is a slightly distorted mirror of life. Granted the assumption that both of us are alive, we quite naturally run into many things which we later convert to program material.

How did the "Junior" routine start?

Moore: It never really started—it was just "there" as soon as we began. There's a difference of twenty years in our ages—a fact which we feel is important to our "contrast" on the air—and we wanted people to know it. Political Personages Are Put on the Spot, Make Newsworthy Retorts on "Meet the Press"

Friday, 7:00 p. m.

MARTHA ROUNTREE is a tall, thin, attractive girl who knows a good fight when she sees one and, knowing this, has given radio one of its freshest ideas in several seasons—Mutual's "Meet the Press." Born out of her fondness for "putting a guy on the spot and finding out just what he stands for," the show follows a simple format. It's a press conference on the air, which presents top personalities (usually political) being interviewed by four crack members of the fourth estate. Miss Rountree spends two days a week in Washington, booking guests. Two of the interviewing editors are chosen for their known fidelity to the opposite political point of view, one is a middle-of-the-roader, and the fourth is one of the editors of American Mercury magazine, which cooperates in the production of the program.

Miss Rountree, to date, has had amazing success in lining up men who have been prominent in the news of the week. On the second program, which headlined Henry A. Wallace, then Secretary of Commerce, needling newsmen finally persuaded Wallace to give out with his advocacy of a fifteen-to-twenty per cent wage increase. This, to all concerned, was highly significant, as Wallace was the first major administration spokesman actually to air the subject before the public.

The following week, Deputy Director of War Mobilization and Reconversion Robert Nathan headed the

show. That very afternoon, Washington was playing host to two important conferences—one on wage-price formula, the other on housing. Reporters were unable to snare any of the top men involved in the meeting. Nathan went on "Meet the Press" and made a magnificent target for queries about wages, prices and whether or not the administration had decided to back the OPA's plan for putting ceiling prices on finished homes.

Scoop Papers

Radio has been able to turn the tables on the news services with this show. Often the headline news comes from statements issued over this program. For example—Bilbo announced his association with the Klan over the air, via "Meet the Press," and the front pages of newspapers throughout the country took their lead from Miss Rountree's show. Secretary of War Robert Patterson stated on the program that "Pearl

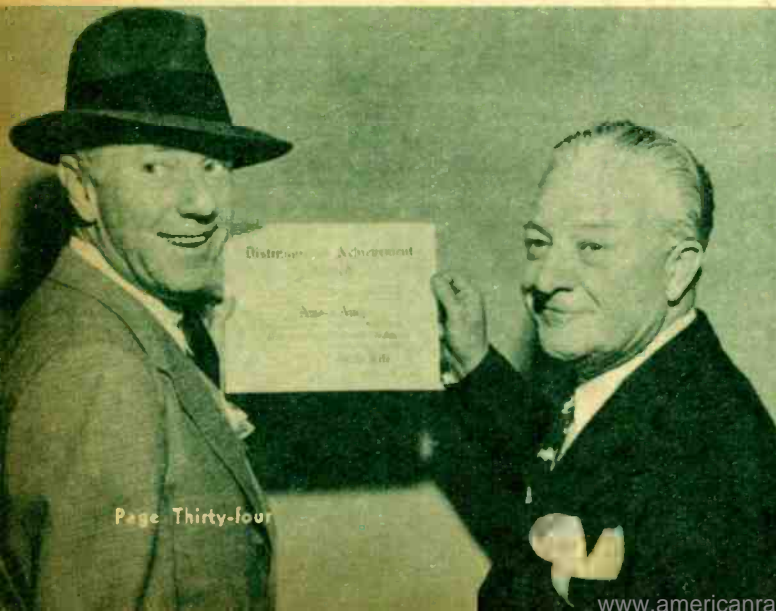

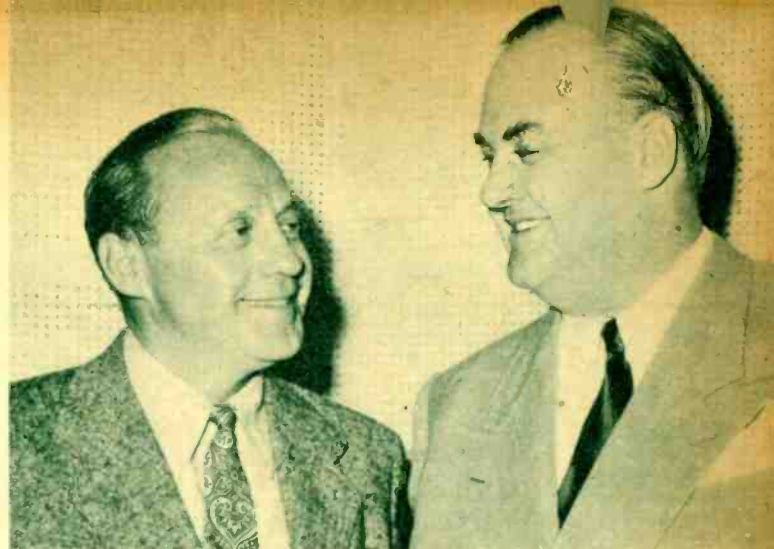

Men of Music

No. 32 of a Series

Billy Mills

A Variety of Interests Is the Outgrowth of a Musical Career That Led Maestro Mills to His Present Successful Spot with McGee and Molly

AFTER a talk with him, and a peek into his background, "interested" is one of the words most applicable to rotund Billy Mills, who is as closely associated with the "Fibber McGee and Molly" show as is the show's best-loved theme song, "Wing to Wing." The theme is an original composition by Billy, so that is as it should be.

From the days of playing sessions in Chicago's famed Friar's Inn or Lincoln Gardens, when he listed among his contemporaries such great names as is the jazz kingdom as Bix Beiderbecke and George Brunies or Paul Mares, Mills' interest in his work has led him to be a "firster" in many phases of music, and to be a first-rate musician on one of the highest Hooper-rated shows on the air.

An interest in an organization important to him during his schooling held over, and he is active today in promoting its growth locally. The organization is Billy's fraternity, Beta Theta Pi, and he is engaged in helping install a chapter at the University of Southern California.

Now to get ahead of ourselves, we'll let chronology provide a background for Mr. Mills' multitudinous interests.

Served Country

William R. Mills started piano study when he was four, and glad of it. "It stood me in good stead socially when I was attending high

school and later in university. There was no shyness left by the time I had played the piano at nearly every party I went to." He attended, first, Michigan University, and later, Syracuse, and had enrolled presumably to study medicine, but has no regret that music took first place in his mind and heart soon after. It was his even-then skilled hand that penned a school opera for each college. The break between universities was taken care of by a completely unplanned-for stint with the United States Army during World War I, during which he turned his talents to serve as bandmaster under Col. Henry L. Stimson.

Schooling and war service were followed by an earnest and highly successful effort to carve out a musical career for himself.

"There were musical opportunities in Chicago, so I went there. I did a little of everything . . . played piano in theaters, played in bands, and even had my own orchestra for a while." Keeping both his eyes and mind open to new ideas in the musical entertainment realm led Billy to pioneer the steel guitar in big band arrangements, to dare the triple saxophone section, and placed him among the very first to introduce sound effects in the theater. "I didn't know at the time what an influence this sound-effect department would become in radio."

It was in the spring of 1923, when Maestro Mills was leading his band at the Marigold Gardens in Chicago, that he received his first introduction to the microphone. Apparently Mr. Mills and microphones took to

one another immediately, for the creditable record of a little over ten years saw Billy as Columbia Broadcasting System Musical Director of the West.

In January of 1937 he joined the "Fibber McGee and Molly" show while in Chicago, and shortly thereafter came to the coast with them. Although he is now entering his tenth year on the show, there is no casual acceptance of the record by Mills. "The music is just as important to the show now as it was then, consequently it is just as important to me. The music on a comedy show has to be lively, too, or the pace of the show would be lost." Maestro Mills' music is lively, and the old ones he dusts off and gives a modern treatment satisfy two decades of listeners. His "Nola," "Canadian Capers" and "Maple Leaf Rag" are classics of their era.

Studies Folk Music

His statement that he "concentrates on the show three or four days a week, and then tries to get away from music" is belied by several more of his "interests." One of them leads him to delve into, and give conscientious study to, what he terms "folk music." A study of its fifty-year background moved him to work in collaboration with Jack Scholl on a plaintive western tune, "Ninety-Nine Years Is a Long Time." The tune was recently published by Gene Autry's musical publishing firm, and at this printing the ditty has been recorded by Tex Ritter and released to western ballad record lovers.

Behind his Hollywood home is a very large garage he calls the "morgue" in which there are stacks of records from years back, and by dozens of artists. A good share of these records he can play here, loudly and to his heart's content on the special high-fidelity equipment built for him by National Broadcasting Company engineers, are recordings of everything he has done on the "McGee" show. These records were taken straight off the line at NBC. Other choice items are waxings brought from Chicago, procured during Mills' Columbia affiliation.

Curiosity led the energetic musician to delve into the Schillinger method of music. This supposedly easier method of learning music is a complicated maze of graphs, yet Billy went into it "just as a pastime."

The business of living he dresses up, whenever time allows, by joining his gourmet friends with their culinary efforts. But it isn't his leaning toward good food that sends him weekly to the Beta Theta Pi fraternity luncheons. It's his interest in the chapter. He is also acting president for the Michigan University Southern California alumni, and Syracuse U.'s alumni in the Southland.

Billy terms reading his relaxation, and is an inveterate mystery fan. It would seem that any form of relaxation would result in one of his

Beck's Bad Boy

Or the Adventures of Tip Corning, the Boy Announcer, with Fred Beck on the Early Morning CBS Wireless

LITTLE did Tip Corning, CBS announcer, realize what lay in store for him when he was assigned to Fred Beck's morning program last October — nor did Fred, for that matter. At first it was just a matter of "CBS brings to all the morning West, a fella name of Fred Beck," at the beginning of the program, and "This is CBS, the Columbia Broadcasting System," at the end.

Somehow Tip's deep voice sounded too much like Fred's so he spoke in a higher range, Fred added a juvenile viewpoint in the writing of Tip's lines and "I got younger and younger," Tip told us, "until now—goll-ee!"

On the air Tip has become the counterpart of Beck's teen-age son. Beck has manufactured a background for him that sounds so logical that people often write to Tip and caution him to be a good boy and mind his "Aunt Ernestine." On the other programs on which he appears he gets many letters that usually start with: "Are you the same Tip Corning as the one on the Beck

program?"—a matter of natural confusion, as Tip's deep announcing tones are as resonant as those of Westbrook Van Vorhees.

No, Tip is not his real name—it's Tibbits. He inherited his nickname from his grandfather, who was also a "Tip."

A native of Albany, New York, (his cousin is the present mayor) Tip got into radio when a friend on a local station invited him to audition. He recalls that at the time he was an automatic coal-stoker salesman. The step to network announcing in New York City wasn't a very long one for Tip to take and until he went into the Marines he was heard on many big-time shows. He got out of the service in California — and stayed when he landed on the CBS staff. Then he met Mr. Beck. "Goll-ee!" says Corning. "Imagine working with a famous writer!" (It seems that Tip had read and loved "Second Carrot

from the End" before he met Beck.)

Prefer Tips

Neither Beck nor Corning realized at the beginning of the series the big part that the "boy announcer" was to play in the broadcasts. "If we had, we would have given me a different name," he exclaimed. Working on the theory that two names would keep two identities separate, the early-morning mike-partners hit upon a solution. One morning Tip announced that he wished he had a nice, fancy name like Knox Manning and that hereafter he wanted to be known as "Ronald Prentyce." A few mornings of signing off with a dignified, "Your announcer has been Ronald Prentyce," and the letters poured in demanding that Tip be Tip and not "Ronald." So he has just about given up hope that he'll ever be able to convince anyone that he's really an adult who knows the business of radio (on the Beck show he's
