His eyes are very blue, in startling contrast to his jet-black hair. No, he isn't married—he lives in New York with his mother when he isn't on tour. As for "what does he look like when he sings?", we'll have to go back to the mental picture we always project when we hear the Sablon voice coming over the air. We usually see him dressed in evening clothes, standing in a lonely ballroom, crooning out a big window overlooking the city to a girl far away. Just one girl ... and you know, of course, *who* the girl is. That seems to be the secret of the Sablon appeal—every girl assumes she's dis-

covered him for herself. Sablon record collectors are the only disc fiends we know who *resent* other Sablon record collectors. However, the foregoing picture is far from reality. If you must know the truth, the sport-shirted Sablon croons romantically in the general direction of the equally sport-shirted maestro, Tootie Camarata.

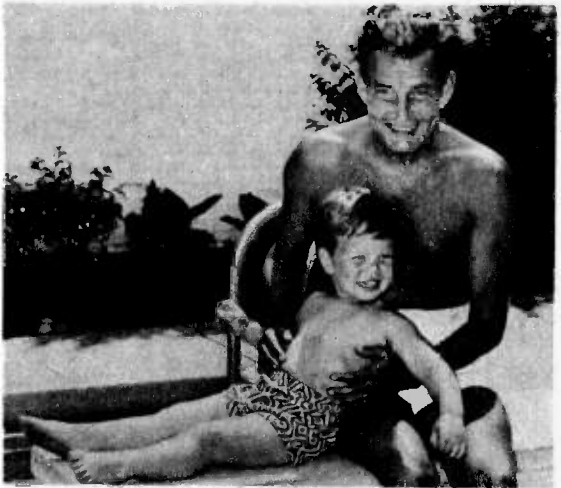

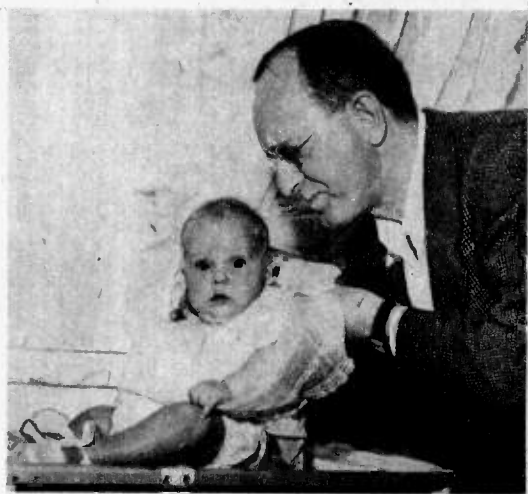

Martin Block

After weeks of build-up, boom-boom and blarney, New York's famed platter spinner, Martin Block, hit the Hollywood airwaves June 2, at 10:00 a.m. on KFWB for his weekly Monday through Friday sessions. Although living up to the fanfare must have been difficult at best, Block pulled it off with the much-heralded charm and ease that gave him his reputation in the first place.

He proved to us that poise and timing are essential to even the most informal of comments—and a good speaking voice doesn't hurt, either.

In the manner of the profession, Martin's records aren't as important as what he has to say about them. Divided into quarter-hour sessions of each type and peppered with commercial commentating, the recordings are pretty much what every other disc jockey has on hand. The difference is in the Block personality and delivery. To Martin, informality doesn't mean um-m-ing and er-r-ing between each phrase, it's rather his intimate manner toward his listeners.

We don't mean to go all-out for the bang-up Block to the exclusion of our other disc raves. Like we said, we love the boys behind the platter prouet-ting business. We just thought we'd

like to welcome Martin back and let him and you know that we think he tackled a hard job and came out on top with one hearing.

Or as Variety, eternal pulse-taker of the theatrical industry, says it: "Block Sock Jock". And he is.

This is the title of the new series over KFI Tuesday nights at 9:30. The show labored in under an introduction, "between you and the evil outside the law, between you and the housebreakers, between you and the murderers, etc., stands the law!" It stopped just short of the listener's dawning hope that the law would really lay down its very life, as promised . . . then picked up miraculously for an entertaining first in this series of dramatizations based on police case histories.

Joseph Julian and Joan Tompkins are in as Commissioner Bill Grant and his psychology-steeped, but pretty, helper. The touch of romance and a light comedy element are provided. Real police files are sure to be full of exciting stories such as this one concerning blackmail and murder, and police proof that neither pays.

A little early in the series for a decisive judgment, but if subsequent offerings continue in the same vein, you can spend some entertaining half-hours listening while you make up your mind.

"Home Is What You Make It"

Another interesting presentation by the NBC University of the Air, "Home Is What You Make It", is heard on Saturdays at 2:30 p.m. over KFI. Since 1944 this program has been dispensing its simple message via a series of exciting, amusing and informative dramatizations. In fact, much of the time you won't be aware that you are listening to a program designed for your betterment—you're too interested in the program. For instance, one show built around the stupid little superstitions and beliefs with which we clutter up our existence was played for comedy, and it got as many laughs from us as any big time gag program.

The production emanates from New York and information available to us here credits writer Lou Hazam with the effective dramatizations.

On May 24, "Home Is What You Make It" started a twenty-week series concerning the cultural contributions of other nations to the American way of life, a topic which should be packed with interest for listeners who expect the answers to why and wherefore along with their entertainment.

"Something to Talk About"

Most of the people we know have no trouble at all in finding something to talk about, but in case you're one whose paucity of small talk impinges

on your sociability, try listening to KNX, Monday through Friday at 2:15 p.m. for the sparkling little show, "Something to Talk About". Who knows? Soon your dinner table conversation may gleam with facts about the annual rainfall in South Dakota, modern control of the Japanese beetle and little-known sayings of George Ade.

Seriously, you will amass a surprising collection of information you may have missed in your daily newspapers. For some reason the facts related by Columbia network's talented handyman, Dave Vaile, have a way of sticking in our memory long after we've forgotten what the newscasters told us we ought to remember.

His news stories concern the little people in the news—the seven-year-old who ran away from home on a bicycle trailing a wagon, containing a mandolin, radio, statue and golf clubs, and looking for Arizona because "they don't have any sidewalks there"; the motorist who was met by a band of city officials on San Francisco's Golden Gate Bridge, presented with a scroll honoring him as the fifty-millionth motorist to cross the span, and then discovered he still had to pay his toll fare; the lady who was haled into court because she kept eleven cats in her apartment and pleaded with the judge to let her keep two of them, promising to speak to them about not raising any more families.

Also of value to listeners is the complete forecast of the day's programming on KNX, interspersed between chatter sessions.

You can even make some money by contributing to the show if you have an assortment of odd facts at your fingertips. One dollar is paid for each fact that is accepted by the program. Did you know that for some strange reason it's against the law to swim on dry land in Santa Ana, California? If you had known and sent it in, you'd be one dollar richer. That will give you an idea of the type of thing we mean.

For the answer to the eternal question popped by each chance meeting with a friend, "What's new?" try investigating the information supplied by "Something to Talk About".

"Saturday Sideshow"

On that precious day off when you find it's too late to hoe, too hot to water, and much too strenuous to weed, just step into the kitchen and get a glass of your favorite beverage. Then for a half hour relax to tunes in time with a lazy Saturday afternoon.

Talking to Mr. West Coast with melodic interludes that won't rock your porch swing too much is Lyle Bardo's orchestra. His cue might be those street car tokens singing host Bill Gwynn just happened to have in his pocket, and away you'll go for "A Ride on the Trolley" without having to stir from your comfortable post.

Merv Griffin and Marjorie Gray

are sure to bend their vocal efforts in the same direction of luring you out of the paths of endeavor.

Fortunately, "Saturday Sideshow" will be almost over before you're jolted from your reverie by the Franklin-McCormick-like tag to the show.

However, if you like Browning and the rest of the boys read to an organ background, you won't feel the windup is out of key with the rest of this pot-pourri of melody and nonsense.

All in all, "Saturday Sideshow" is a jolly half hour and can serve as that good excuse when the little woman catches you idling. Comes at just the right time for idling, too, right in the middle of the afternoon, 3:30, KHJ.

"Believe It or Not"

"How much does an 'ounce' weigh?" Dialing at random we fell onto this bait, and followed it with an enjoyable fifteen-minute peek into Robert Ripley's book of unbelievable truths, now Monday through Friday over KFI, at 11:15 p.m.

The "radio odditorial" has a quiz page, a page of strange truths, and a main eye-opener that takes the form of a dramatized story, full of swell sound effects and characters. Gregory Abbott and Bob Denton aid Mr. Ripley in turning the pages, and the idea is a natural, right down to the famous farewell that winds up each night's presentation.

(All right . . . an "ounce" weighs forty pounds. Yep! The "ounce" is also a snow leopard, native to Tibet.)

"For Your Approval"

Everybody's in the act on this one . . . and that includes you, the rarely-consulted listener!

"For Your Approval," each Saturday now at 1:00 p.m., Mutual network presents a special series of "program ideas," audience-submitted and tested

by reaction. Anything from quiz to glamour clinic gets a hearing, if at all different and adaptable. So, if you've wanted to hear something new in radio for a long time, and can give a good semblance in script form of what it would be, you're urged to send your contribution hastily along.

Live-guy Jock MacGregor produces and announces this showcase time. It is his kindly and continual encouragement which has made the entire experiment a success in spite of its obvious limitations. An amateur offering in radio is like a pretty country girl in her first screen test. If too much upsweep has gone into her hairdo, or if the studio costumer has swathed her in slinky black, none of the freshness and charm which made her individual in the first place are seen by the camera eye. The same cautious regrooming must be applied to public-contributed radio. We applaud Mr. MacGregor for an expert Max Factor touch.

So far, from "For Your Approval," seven new programs have hit major billing, including "Did Justice Triumph?" "The Mighty Casey" and "This Is Jazz." We ourselves have especially liked the clever little Chinese folk tale piece, "The Vase of Mai Lin" . . . although each Saturday has been a complete and new surprise. The entire project, we wager, should be as much fun to the audience as opening packages at Christmas . . . and as much a jolt to the radio minds which think they've heard it all as the light bulb was to the guy who said "Ain't nothin' new under the sun!"

"Editor's Diary"

KHJ's "Editor's Diary" at 8:30 a.m. Monday through Friday ranges its pages from the last word from the labor front to whimsical human interest stories of the day. Henry La Cossett, distinguished editor and author, has a delivery that smacks a little of reading a Kiplinger letter. Just a trace of "we told you so", but certainly his analytical briefs entitle him to remind that he had called the plays beforehand. If you like your headline preview meaty and funny you can probably stand hearing the third in a period of fifteen-minute newscasts following on each other's heels over the same station.

"Treasury Agent"

The Treasury Agents'll get'cha if you don't watch out! That's right, there's just enough of grownup cops and robbers in this show, "Treasury Agent", to capture imagination and hold interest beyond its half hour. Tuesday, KECA, 9 p.m.

Because T-Agent Joe Lincoln and the rest of the Treasury and Justice Department participants each Tuesday night adhere to a logical and down-to-earth procedure of crime-busting in the interest of making the shows what Elmer L. Iry, Chief of the Treasury Agents, introduces as dramatized case histories, the dramas retain their adult appeal.

For instance, Joe Lincoln last week assumed the role of crook "Muscles" Marlan and joined the band of hus-

band-poisoners who were making a very comfortable living from the payments of the freed and joyous wives. After "Muscles" and the barroom pick-up (who was really a policewoman) spied separately and safely, they compared notes, and found they had enough concrete evidence to warrant bringing in a great force of cohorts to close in and tote the criminals away.

There were no horrid and mystic visions to torment the murderers, no one directed anyone else's mind by means of his own wicked will, knives thrown by trained animals didn't flash through the darkness . . . no heroics of any sort. Best of all, no one went overboard and said "his sweaty brown face shone like a withered leaf covered with glue." So refreshing.

"Open Hearing"

This demonstrates conclusively that as long as the actual dialogue doesn't violate listeners' minds, free speech on the airlines still exists, insofar as personal opinions go.

KNX's "Open Hearing" at 10:30 p.m. Tuesdays gets these opinions going with a bang, too. Winston Burdett, CBS Washington Correspondent, is moderator when he doesn't get lost in the melee.

Congressmen Baldwin and Ellender of Connecticut and Louisiana respectively, tossed the Stratton Bill back and forth the other night, citing pros and cons and some constructive criti-

cisms on the question, "Should we take emergency action to admit Europe's displaced persons to our country?" A discussion of questions such as this one concerning our responsibility as world peace leaders to shelter people whose ideologies are paradoxical to ours tends to prod the mind, when the topic is brought out of the parlor and discussed by men in the know who can refrain from becoming emotionally unbalanced. Only rarely could it more appropriately be named "Wide Open Hearing."

Playbacks (Critical Comment)

Dog Rights Man

The other afternoon a strange thing happened. Our Radio Life phone didn't ring—it yipped!

Very gingerly, we picked up the receiver. Instead of a "hello" coming out of the wire, we heard a very polite but firm bark.

Seems the party at the other end of the line belonged to Irene, and being a broad-shouldered, dependable collie, he had been appointed a committee of one by the other animals at Irene's menage—a grievance committee to call to our attention a mistake in an item we'd run.

Against a background cacophony of growls and barks, the dog explained that their feelings were hurt because we'd said Irene's "Pet Program" was recorded. "We'll be doggoned if it's so," he said. "She leaves us every Monday to go to the studio and broadcast."

The surprise at making such a mistake, coupled with having a dog bring it to our attention, floored us so completely that all we could do was murmur an apologetic "woof". We plumb forgot to point out to the collie that any item running under "Playbacks, Critical Comment", doesn't mean we think there's something wrong in Denmark or dogdom. Critical just means "discriminating", which is certainly what Irene's pets are.

"Arthur Godfrey's Talent Scouts"

A name not very familiar to West Coasters but apparently fraught with appeal for New Yorkers is that of Arthur Godfrey, whose "Talent Scouts" program is now being heard over KNX at 9:00 p.m. on Tuesdays.

The idea behind the program is a good one and the show will probably appeal greatly to those who've missed the late Major Bowes and his amateur artists. Godfrey's twist is that he uses strictly professional, though unrecognized, talent and he focuses the spotlight of his personal interview on the person who discovered the talent rather than the discoveree. In his questioning of his "talent scouts", Godfrey manages to make what must be written interviews

sound amazingly unrehearsed and spontaneous (or is the average New Yorker so mike-wise that he can ad lib like Bob Hope his first time on the air?).

The talent on the program sounds professional but young, and the show, like its forerunner, the amateur program, tends to be dominated by singers to the exclusion of other types of entertainers. The talent makes the show, and in most cases it's worth listening to.

Godfrey, himself, sounds to us the way "Vic" of "Vic and Sade" might have sounded if he had played heavies—or like a malevolent Whispering Jack Smith. Some of his commentary seems rather pointless, though perhaps it's all in getting used to his unusual style of delivery—the studio audience sounded as if it loved him dearly.

Something we can't decide about him is whether or not his insinuations have a blue intention. A significant pause after a statement on the part of a theater usherette that her job consisted of having "a man show me his ticket and then I show him his seat" sent the studio audience into giggling fits, as did Godfrey's follow-up line, "For a minute there I thought you were going to get mixed up." On

paper it may not look like much—on the air it made us uncomfortable.

The talent discovered by the scouts evidently has to hie itself to New York under its own steam, but the rewards for the winner are worth it. The lucky artist gets an engagement on another Godfrey program and entry to some of the Broadway production sanctums. Each scout who wins a place for his discovery on the show gets twenty-five dollars, each performer receives one hundred dollars. Well, maybe it'll bring back vaudeville.

Make 'em Eat Cake

Following Al Jolson's recent appearance as "The Jazz Singer" on "Lux Radio Theatre", his encore introduction in the script called for him to introduce his latest composition, "All of My Love."

Without an eye to the unpredictable audience, Mr. Keighley and Mr. Jolson made the mistake of mentioning the old favorite "April Showers" in the same breath. Then the shout went up... seemed everyone wanted "April Showers". However, the music had been set up, and the script prepared, along the lines of a little plug and a chance on Mr. Jolson's part to sing





with a microphone and the first performer to star in a commercial radio show in his country.

He was first introduced to American audiences singing from Paris in 1936. He arrived here in 1937 and fulfilled radio engagements in New York and Hollywood including a session on the old "Hollywood Hotel" series. Later tours in South America made him one of the most popular entertainers on that continent, and he has recorded some of his numbers in Portuguese for his South American audiences. His most recent appearance in Paris was last spring.

Like many another Frenchman caught abroad by the war, Sablon devoted a large part of his time to raising funds for the French underground. His sister, also a favorite singer in France, became a leader of the underground when the Nazis took Paris. Sablon recordings were used as signals for Free French underground stations. Today Sablon is a much more serious young man than when he first arrived in America accompanied by ninety-six suits, a French poodle, Coco, and a portable phonograph! He devotes himself in public and private life to French relief and has won personal praise from the French ambassador here.

Sablon comes from a family that is strictly theatrical. His father was an author of musical comedies; one of his brothers is a popular song writer and another manages the casinos at Monte Carlo and Nice. When Jean left school to enter the theater he sang, danced and acted at the Vieux Colombier with Charles Boyer and at the Theatre Danou with Fernand Gravet. At the Casino de Paris he played leads opposite France's favorite female, Mistinguette, and spent two years with Jean Gabin in musical comedy at Les Bouffes Parisiens. Noteworthy, all these gentlemen became American heart-throbs at a later date.

Sablon's big passion at present is a farm in Brazil. He calls himself "a farmair at 'earth'". And he knows what he's talking about, too. A childhood spent on a farm in the south of France made him a lover of the soil for good and all.

Confiding to Monsieur Sablon that one of our dearest ambitions was to learn to speak French, we asked him what course he would recommend.

"No course," he winked, "two weeks in Paree!"

John Storm Has Done About Everything As NBC Staff Announcer, but His Pet Aim Remains "To Do a Little Acting"



A STAFF announcer at Hollywood's NBC studios for the past ten years, good-looking deep-voiced John Storm confessed to us that ever since he came to Hollywood, he has always wanted "to do a little acting."

His heavy schedule of staff assignments, however, leaves little time for pursuing additional radio paths. An ambition he holds out more hope for is a radio program of his own, one of either news or story content.

Storm's schedule requires his presence at NBC until as late as eleven o'clock three nights a week, which agrees with the announcer, as he is an admitted "night owl." "Never go to bed before one or so," he informed us affably. "Like to read. Not fiction, articles mostly. In the morning, I like to sleep late."

These habits undoubtedly have resulted from the fact that mikeman Storm has always worked at night, and save for a few seasons in stock and on the Chautauqua circuit, always in radio.

Born in Burchard, Nebraska ("a little place—Harold Lloyd's hometown, too," specified Storm), John did "a little acting" in high school, including the lead in the senior play. In college, Fine Arts at Nebraska University, he remained active in dramatics and his appearance in a drama with the University players resulted in the offer of an announc-

er's post at station KFAB. This was followed by broadcasting assignments on the West coast—on Seattle's KJR and KOL; Portland's KEX and KGW; and San Jose's KQW, where he was program director as well as announcer and continuity writer. From there, he came to NBC, Hollywood.

Here, as staff announcer and news and special events reporter, his assignments have been many and varied.

Rose Bowl Jobs

Listeners remember him for his work with Jim Doyle on the news program, "OK for Release", and as announcer for the former Irene Rich series and other top shows. At the start of the war, as NBC's Western Division Director of News and Special Events, he helped create the NBC listening post and was Western division producer of the "Army Hour" shows, handling the directorial reins for the portions of the program which originated anywhere in the Western area from Texas to Washington. He has charge of the NBC coverage of Pasadena's annual Tournament of Roses activities, and for the last three years has worked with Bill Stern, handling the "color" account of the Rose Bowl football game. His past special events assignments have found him making the first broadcast from a P-61 "Black Widow" plane (speaking into a microphone while the pilot put the newly-designed ship through a series of complete rolls and inside loops),

and delivering a verbal account of a simulated bombing mission in a B-17.

Currently, dialers hear his voice delivering the "News of the World" every afternoon, in addition to performing the continuing innumerable microphone chores regularly assigned to a network staff announcer.

In spite of a fairly full schedule, Storm manages some time for his favorite off-mike enthusiasm, sports. "I do about everything in the line of sports," he grinned, then added, "or at least I like to say I do. Even billiards."

PICTURES and radio programs dealing with crime make a worthwhile contribution to society provided they do not glorify the criminal, but instead portray the futility of crime."

So speaking on a currently sensitive topic was F.B.I. head J. Edgar Hoover. His remarks refuted arguments of many groups which have been pressuring for removal of crime and mystery air programs in toto, or at least their removal to time spots less accessible to the younger generation.

ABC's crime program, "This Is Your F.B.I.," measures up to Mr. Hoover's standards as "a worthwhile contribution." "It is the only network radio program," he stated, "depicting the activities of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, which is based on the official records of the F.B.I. and which is produced with its cooperation and approval."

Yes, "This Is Your F.B.I." programs are based on actual material from the Bureau's files in Washington. Periodically, Hoover's office sends writer-producer Jerry Devine a dozen files which it considers suitable for dramatization. "About one out of an average six is good radio material," stated Devine.

A case having been chosen for dramatization on the show, a "dramatic breakdown" is made, then forwarded to F.B.I. headquarters for approval. The resulting script is also subject to Bureau okay. "In the be-

Futility of Crime Dramatized on Program Which Is Based on Actual Bureau Cases

ginning," Devine recalled, "okays were more difficult to get, but for the past year now it's been an uninterrupted pattern between the F.B.I. and my office—sort of a tennis match." In the script, Bureau officials usually look only for details involving technicalities. "My usual pitfall," observed Devine, "is when I think I know more about something than I do."

Idea for "This Is Your F.B.I." germinated a little more than two years ago in the mind of agency executive Jack Warwick (Warwick and Legler), who approached Mr. Hoover with his suggestion. During previous years, various persons had tried to interest the F.B.I. chief in a radio

series, but he had shied away from any possibility of depicting his bureau as a cops-and-robbers agency, portrayed by flatfoots wearing squeaky shoes and talking out of the corners of their mouths.

Enlisting the aid of Jerry Devine, then director of "Mr. District Attorney", Warwick again conferred with Mr. Hoover.

Devine, sitting in on the conference in Washington, immediately caught the ideal of a series which would keep the law-enforcement angle uppermost. He knocked out a sample script, and within three months "This Is Your F.B.I." was on the air.

To F.B.I. School

"But before I did that script," related Devine to Radio Life, "I went to F.B.I. school as an observer for three weeks... went to all the classrooms, went to Quantico (they have their range down there), to laboratory, and into the file rooms. It was very exciting and I learned so much I became more and more enthusiastic."

One day, Devine recalled, he was taken into a huge filing room, so

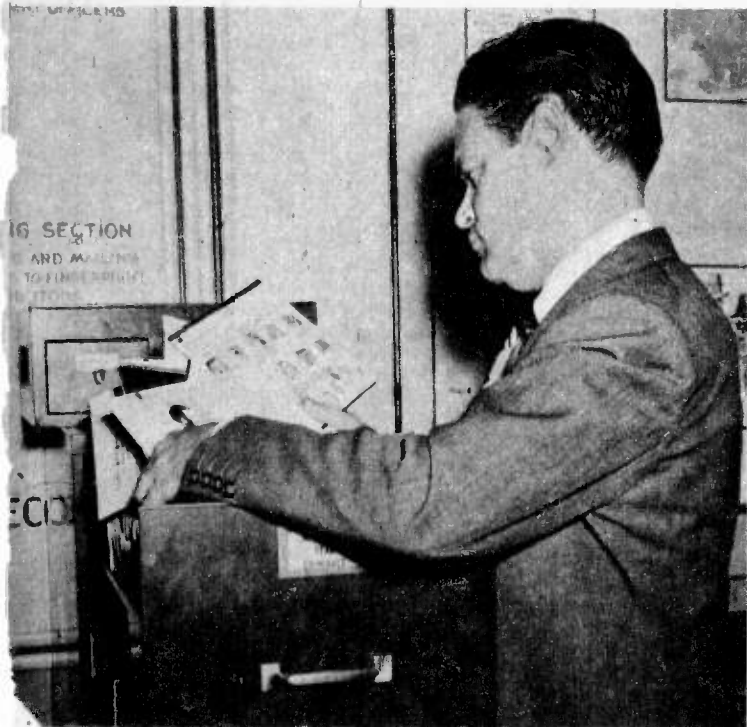

"Deacon" Deserts Jonesboro

Carl "Deacon" Moore Has Come, Bag and Baggage, from Arkansas to Make His Permanent Home and a Place in Radio as Western Platter Jockey

MODERN version of the Arkansas Traveler is Carl "Deacon" Moore, native of Arkansas and nationally known orchestra leader, who now conducts the popular "Home Hour for Western Folks" five nights a week for Seaboard Finance Company.

Before the war, Moore owned his own plane and flew from city to city to fulfill his continually consecutive bookings across the country. In fact, he was known as the "Flying Deacon."

But, after coming to Hollywood, he has decided to "stay put" and make Southern California his home. He has brought his wife and family and all his hunting dogs here from Jonesboro, Arkansas.

A pal of Chet Lauck and Tuffy Goff, "Lum and Abner," he worked with the boys in pioneer radio days back in Arkansas, but blended music

with his native Ozark wit and went off on the road as a bandleader. Today "Deacon" receives hundreds of letters from people who remember him as a batoneer back in his barnstorming days.

"Deacon" began drumming on his desk in school with pencils, ordered his first set of drums from a Sears and Roebuck catalog, organized his first band at the age of twelve. His music, plus his quaint, droll humor and familiar "Howdy do, folks, howdy do," took him to the biggest hotels, night clubs and theatres in such cities as New York, Chicago, Denver, Milwaukee, Houston, Dallas, Cleveland, Fort Worth, Cincinnati, Memphis, Boston, Kansas City, Nashville, Miami Beach, St. Paul, San Antonio and others.

Won Audition

Several months ago, when Dick Smith of Smith, Bull and McCreery advertising agency was seeking the "top western disc jockey" for the new Seaboard program, Moore was

immense it appeared to be an illusion created by endless reflecting mirrors. Row upon row of filing cases were regimented, about chin-high. "I couldn't believe there were that many cases and people," Devine marvelled. "Then my mentor said, 'Yes, and there's a very good file here on you, too!' Seems I had been thoroughly investigated before being allowed to attend F.B.I. school."

Jerry Devine is no radio novice, for the thirty-nine-year-old producer has spent all but eleven years of his life in show business. Son of a well-known New York character actor, Jerry appeared in more than fifty pictures and on the air before he decided to try a hand at radio scripting. He wrote the Jack Benny summer show of 1937, guest spots for Kate Smith's program and the Tommy Riggs show (for three years) before entering the field of radio directing in 1941.

Moving of "This Is Your F.B.I." to Hollywood for "an indefinite stay until October, at least," was in conformity to Jerry's desire to take a whirl at living here. Accompanying him west were Mrs. Devine (the former Powers model, Dorothy Drew), and their small son, Michael. Jerry is no stranger, however, to Hollywood, as he has frequently produced programs on tour. Of his picture career, he remarked, "I lived (or rather, starved) here fifteen years ago."

Stories Fascinate

Devine takes an amazing interest in the stories made accessible to him by the F.B.I., also supplements the files with copious reading of periodicals. He thinks the "Doll Woman"

story the most exciting ever dramatized on the F.B.I. program (in case you don't remember, it concerned espionage activities of a native American woman who owned a doll shop on New York's Madison Avenue and who was a Japanese agent). Last fall, a large hi-jacking ring which had been knocking off trucks in and around New York for over a year was broken up, and Hoover immediately suggested the case for a radio program. Within two weeks, Devine had it on the air.

"About every three months," Devine said, "the F.B.I. sends me a list of the six most prevalent crimes. Just like a hit parade, the items on the list change in importance. All except juvenile delinquency. That's been at the top of the list for too long. Carrying out our idea of placing emphasis on top crime, we devote one out of every five broadcasts to a case of juvenile delinquency."

We asked Devine if he'd like to be an F.B.I. man. Although admitting he had enjoyed his observation course and that he was still learning something every week, he laughed, "No, in the first place they'd make me wear a hat and that would spoil everything."

He has written such songs as "St. James Infirmary," "Ding Dong Daddy" and "Bye Bye Blues," but prefers to sing such oldies as "Only a Bird in a Gilded Cage," "Baggage Coach Ahead" and "They Cut Down the Old Pine Tree."

No newcomer to radio, "Deacon" conducted his own show for five years on WLW, Cincinnati, has appeared as guest artist with Rudy Vallee, Ken Murray, Frances Langford, Kenny Baker, Lou Holtz, Dinah Shore, Col. Stoopnagle and many others.

Among the many characters he has created for radio are "Leola Stumpwater," "Snapper Garrison," "Rev. Printwhistle" and "Grandpa." Now that they are reunited in Hollywood, "Lum and Abner" and their old pal, "Deacon" Moore, are seen together frequently on the golf links.
