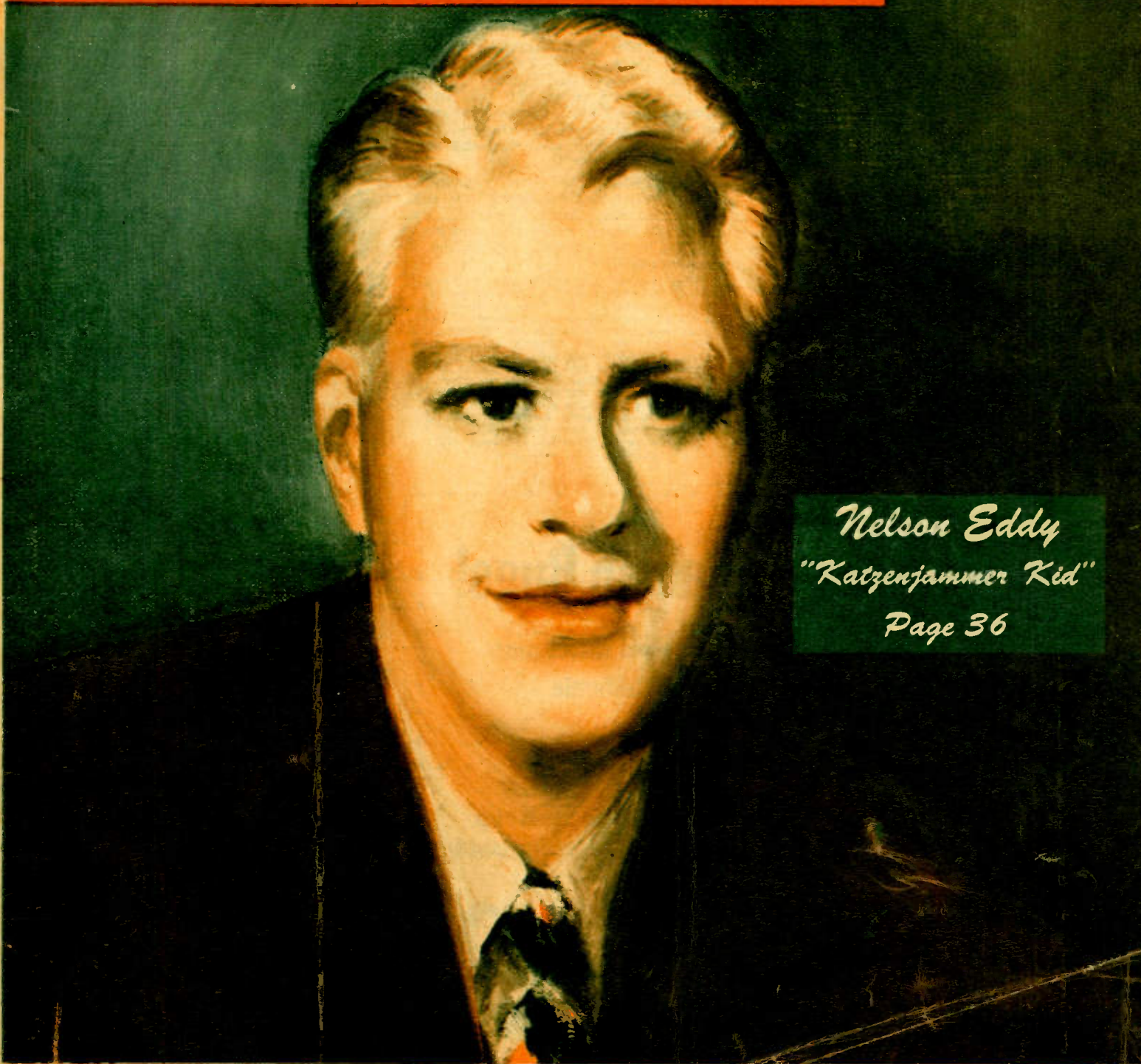

## Mikemen

No. 19 of a Series

### Bob Lemond

*While CBS Announcer Bob Lemond Reads System Cues, Plays Transcribed Spots, and Scans His Schedule, Radio Life Stands By for His Story*

**F**ROM 4:00 p.m. on, Bob Lemond is usually holding down one of Columbia's announce booths. Radio Life decided to catch a miker at his mike, and went right up for an interview.

Bob's big smile stretched out and asked us to come in. Emptying a nearby chair of its motley magazine collection, we slouched back comfortably and waited for the conclusion of the on-the-hour spot announcement. "Now," Bob asked agreeably, "what'd you like to know?"

Facts of his life: he was born in Hale Center, Texas; he went to Long Beach High School; and he came into radio at KEHE (the Hearst Network station, now Earle C. Anthony's KECA) as public relations director. Bob and another Los Angeles announcer, Hugh Brundage, both started their respective careers at KEHE in the same week.

(The booth phone clicked down, and Bob paused to pick up the receiver. "No," he looked conscientiously around the adjoining studio, "Jimmy isn't here. Take your number and he can call you? All right... fine.")

Bob joined CBS in 1939, following production management at KYA, San Francisco. Before the war he was well-remembered KNX emcee on "Hollywood Smarty Party" and "The Kid's Quizzeroo," and announcer on

Arch Oboler's "Lights Out," "The Mary Astor Hollywood Showcase" and "Second Mrs. Burton."

(An overhead testing of the GalenKamp jingle drowned out Bob's next references to the Army Mosquito Network, for which he operated the key New Caledonia station at Noumea, and later moved on as Officer in Charge of Radio Tokyo. When the blasting subsided, he apologetically began again...)

"But I don't suppose you'd be interested in all that army stuff?"

"Heck, yes!" we objected.

"Covered" Rugby

Bob and his overseas staff had some highly recollective experiences. Added to the superior programming sent over by Armed Forces Radio Service were special New Caledonia events inspired and organized entirely through their own facilities. Coverage of football games, fights, baseball, track, rugby. "Have you ever watched rugby?" Bob wanted to know. "It's quite some business. We had a detachment of New Zealanders, and they wanted us to broadcast one of their games. I collected a stack of readin' matter on the subject, and one of the Aussie officers agreed to stand by in case I got befuddled. But when I got out there and started covering the plays, it didn't match a thing I'd read in the books! After floundering through a few minutes of likening it to our

**I**N MY DAY . . . blusters "Major Carson" on NBC's "Rexall Summer Theatre," and before his billowing reminiscences are finished, audiences are clapping their sides in hysteria.

For, still "wowing" them, this time with his fitting radio enactment of a crotchety codger who remembers the silent flicks with nostalgia, is the first and greatest screen idol of them all—Francis X. Bushman.

• Within the year, a book of Bushman's fabulous life, as told by him to Maurice Zimm, will be in publication. Of the work, Zimm says, "It's the chronicle of a fascinating period . . . one that few people nowadays even comprehend. I got the idea for

## Still "Wowing" 'Em

the book when I was writing the "Nero Wolfe" series for Mr. Bushman over at KHJ. Casually he mentioned experiences that absolutely gested an autobiography he said "No . . . I don't like to think back 'No . . . I don't like to think back to those days.' Gradually, though, we got around to it again, and I believe it's been an experience for us both. He needed to get a lot of it off his mind."

Zimm's greatest difficulty was in getting Bushman to really talk. For

fifteen consecutive appointments they spent interminable hours together doing hedging mental research back over the time when Bushman rode crashing across the screen in his last picture, "Ben Hur," and made previous profile history in "The Masked Bride," "Romeo and Juliet," "Graustark" and countless other films—until publicity of his wife and family destroyed him as the romantic figure of the age.

"In those days, you know," Bushman smiles, "a married man was

nil as a screen love interest."

### His Philosophy

Following this catastrophic decline of his fortune, Bushman left movies permanently and went back to the stage, eventually into radio in 1932. For all these many years he has been actively in the theatre, in one capacity or another, but "looking back" is something he has never wanted to do. "Life in the minute, and hope for tomorrow," he'll majestically advise, as the philosophy of his life.

It has taken some convincing therefore, for Zimm and all the others who respect the great Bushman name to make felt their admiration beyond a certain point. The book has been the most obvious monument Zimm felt he could create to honor the pioneer celebrity of the most progressive of the arts, the first King of the Cinema, who made a pattern for them all!

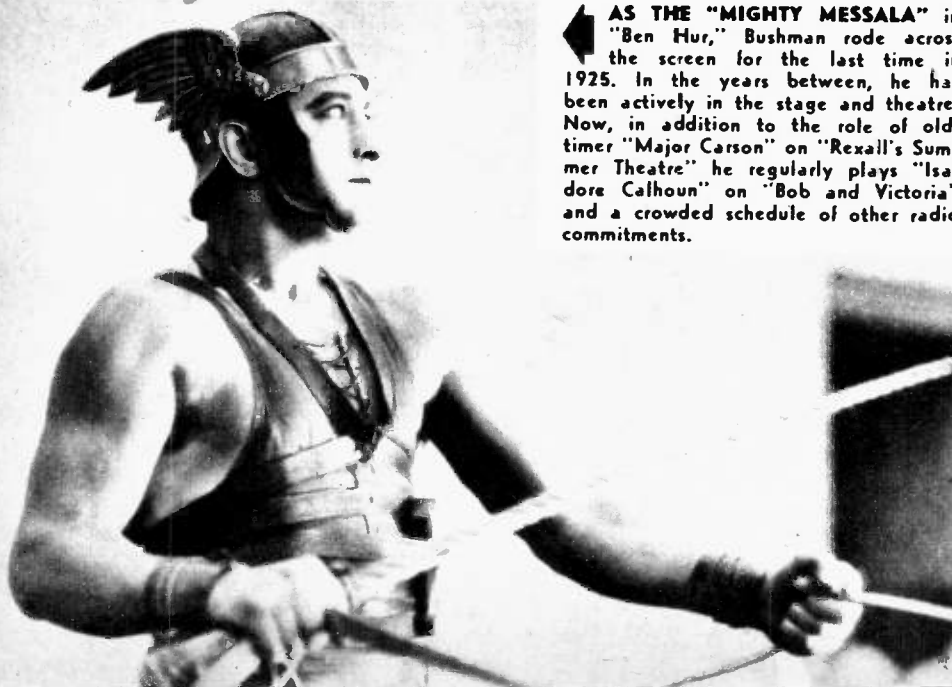
That Bushman's importance as an acting artist has never diminished is no surprise. He has been ardently creating portrayals since 1897, when he started "suping" (going on in mob scenes) for twenty-five cents an hour in Baltimore stock performances. As ninth child in a stern Baltimore family, his profession was looked upon as the Bushman scourge. "Francis," his father once vehemently pronounced, "is not worth powder and shot to blow his brains out."

By 1910, however, the "black sheep" was a leading man with the old Essanay Film Company, his mere appearance on the screen sending shivers up and down the country's collective feminine spines. Louella

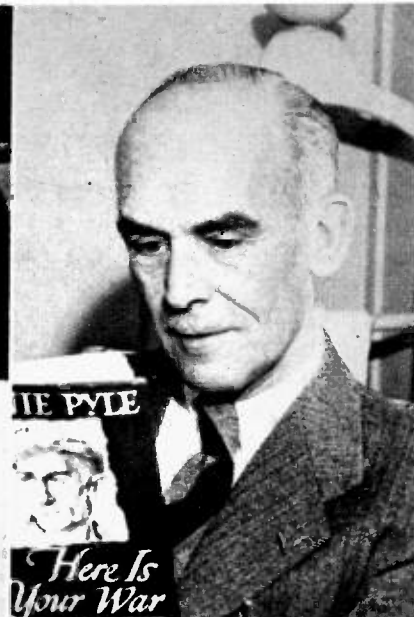

At such points we realized how actually weary we are of "ad-libbing," how unnecessary the effort of a bright comeback can be to an integrally adept humorist.

You'll be happy to hear we're not going to compare Sherman with Henry Morgan, Garry Moore, Bob Hope or Robert Q. Lewis. His wit is the type which issues forth from frowning, hrrrumphing and fortynish college professors with a rhinoceros-hided perspective on "life." Radio hasn't heard anything just like it for lo, these four years. And if a canny program-buyer doesn't clasp the bargain immediately for fall-winter airing we'll eat every one of the issues mentioning, begging, threatening in behalf of Sherman, stapled edges and all.

### Sounds From Home

Did you know that the Armed Forces Radio Service show, "Command Performance," is still supplying our overseas troops with their homesick requests? Remember during the war how the kids overseas would write in requesting that Carole Landis merely step up to a microphone and sigh, or that the sound of a New York subway be beamed to a lonely outpost?

Two recent requests that have been answered are just as unusual. One homesick youngster with the Eighty-Eighth Division in Italy wanted to hear the sound of a cow being milked—he was lonesome for a glass of fresh milk. A request from soldiers in Korea was for the sound of a Moron's Delight being eaten. Moron's Delight, in case you haven't attacked one, is the dollar sundae that includes everything—the

Since Mr. P. W. knows most of the fellows and gals who furnish the rhythm for the records, there is an extra thrill in being able to read off the labels on the favorite records, throw the switch on the turntable, sit back and just listen to my good friends doing their stuff.

You know, I've been aiming music to all you folks for twenty-eight years. Yes sir. That's what Father Time's scoresheet shows.

I guess you'd say that Mr. P. W. has sort of come down the years with the sharps and flats from ragtime to jazz to swing and good old boogie-woogie. Why, I've even been around to learn a little something about the finer tunes, too, like "Rhapsody in Blue," "Concerto in F" and many, many other tuneful earfuls including opera music.

And, through all my years in the business, it has always been my personal thought that we Americans have to be entertained while being educated. In other words, we all don't mind learning our professions and concentrating on becoming a success in whatever field of endeavor we've chosen, but, every man, woman and child in these United States just won't let anything interfere with the entertainment side of the ledger.

That's just one of the several reasons why Mr. P. W. has put together the "Paul Whiteman Club" over ABC's cross-country hookup, five-days-a-week for the daytime listeners.

W., with Larry Williams as engineer, brought the "Paul Whiteman Club" on the air. And we're scheduled to keep the discs playing throughout our original fifty-two-week assignment.

As for the type of music we'll serve up to the "Club Members," well, it'll be a pretty wide range of rhythm. We know that some of you folks think that all classical music is automatically "good" and that all the lighter tunes are automatically "bad." We also realized that many folks feel just the opposite. But, you know, the only REAL test as to whether ANY music is good or bad—is your own ears!

If YOU enjoy listening to it . . . it's good! That goes for "live" or recorded music, too.

The radio drama classes will take place at the Extension center starting at 10:00 a.m. on Sept. 2 and 8:00 p.m. on Sept. 3.

### Your Cue (Shows You May Like)

#### "Cavalcade of America"

Du Pont's "Cavalcade of America" (KFI, 7:30 p.m. Monday) started its fall season last week with a touch more commercialism in its sponsor-appeals, but with the same good taste evident in its dramatization.

Initial presentation was "Iron Horse," the story of Peter Cooper's fight for recognition of the steam engine, and in the two leading roles, movie stars Robert Young and Walter Brennan lived up to the high standards set by other stars in previous seasons. The supporting cast including Francis X. Bushman, Bob Bailey, Barbara Eilers, Jerry Hausner and Joe Bell was, of course, excellent and attested to producer Jack Zoller's casting as well as his direction. Robert Armbruster supplied the well-integrated musical score.

The quality which has always seemed to us to distinguish "Cavalcade" as a radio offering is its reasonableness of dramatization and characterization. Very seldom is a presentation given that over-drawn emphasis that tends to fictionalize a true story. For this reason the previous seasons' "institutionalized" commercials fit the program better than the present product-plugging. Presenting America as the land of opportunity in

the script minused the bugaboo of advertising in the midst of drama.

**"Tobe Reed's Scrapbook"**

That perennial favorite, Tobe Reed, has a great big scrapbook that he opens Tuesday and Thursday nights at 7:30 for KECA listeners. Tobe has compiled a series of little-known facts about well-known people and events, and parades this human interest in full dress.

Did you ever hear the story about the picture of Jeanette MacDonald that was found on the wall of a Far Eastern monastery? No woman had ever set foot inside the monastery, yet a group of travelers visiting there found the lovely face smiling out at them from an inner wall. It seems that relics from a shipwreck near there had been carefully transported to this sacred place, and the glamorous magazine cover tacked up as decoration.

Everyone is familiar with the big Klondike free-for-all. One of the main staker-outers traded his four-hundred-million-dollar rights to a gold vein for the right to walk into a bar and order a drink. The rich cache owner was an Indian, and the old fellow coveted the privilege of equality more than his stake.

Those are typical samples of the stories in the "Tobe Reed Scrapbook." For some years before he started radio work, Tobe was a general reporter and the editor of naval and foreign affairs for a San Francisco newspaper.

From this font of former experience, from research libraries and listener tips, Tobe digs up the tales, adds the Reed slant of deep-down insight, and tops the whole thing off with his narrative abilities. Makes a good dish.

**"Shadow of the Mind"**

KHJ has climbed aboard the air train of whodunits, horror epics and law enforcement chapters with a good new idea that embodies all the elements so dear to mystery fans, yet leaves behind the credence-testing devices of open graves, walking dead or outlandish heroics.

"Shadow of the Mind," heard at 6:30 p.m. Fridays, deals with the hor-

rors that can arise from our own minds. The series of Sherman Dryer productions is linked together by a common denominator, "Dr. David Gannon," psychiatrist supreme.

Into Dr. Gannon's swank office stream people suffering from unrealized mental tortures. The outward manifestations of the suffering minds and the chain of circumstances set up thereby, create story lines for the shows.

For instance a great violinist, suddenly stricken with paralysis, comes to Dr. Gannon for aid. Clever medical delving on the doctor's part uncovers the fact that the maestro is the holder of a terrible secret. He knows of a murder plot, and the weight of his own guilt at not telling about it has distorted his entire mind and nervous system, resulting in what Dr. Gannon termed "hysterical paralysis." Once his malady is explained, the violinist gives up the secret. He and Dr. Gannon help the story line along by assisting in the apprehension of the criminal element, and the maestro returns happily to normalcy.

Giving examples concerning the technique of modern psychiatry to laymen is a touchy bit of business. It requires good writing and authenticity, and complete avoidance of any suggestion that a Junior Home Psychiatry Kit is something you can buy. The writing is pat, and for authenticity's sake a consulting psychiatrist is retained to check scripts carefully before they are presented on the air. At air time the same doctor is on hand to aid direction.

**Playbacks (Critical Comment)**

**Kirkwood at "Arthur's Place"**

Amid the rumors flying concerning "Arthur's Place," one emerges verified. The "Place" is to be vacated shortly. Too bad that with it goes the showcase of a comedian whose reappearance has warmed many a heart.

Corpulent Jack Kirkwood, who recently bounded into this CBS 9:00 p.m. Friday hangout, "Arthur's Place," is dispensing that individual brand of Kirkwood humor that either delights immeasurably or completely wearies listeners.

For our money, we'd say Kirkwood is the exact shot in the arm the show needed. When gravel voice builds his verbal slapstick up to that single pediculous punch line, it's amusing all the way.

Not many men can describe the procedure such as that recent one of piling up cases of raw eggs, cans of molasses and mousetraps as burglar stoppage, then cap the sequence with the laconic remark, "What burglar would want a mess like that!" and have it come off funny. The humor of Jack's performance lies mainly in the effect Jack gives of actually performing all the ridiculous antics his script lines describe, thereby conjuring to mind killing pictures.

"Dreamboat" Mulvany, played by

Sarah Berner, is an even more perfect foil in the new "Arthur's" company. Her witlessness takes on brand new character while hand-in-hand with his zaniness.

Jack Kirkwood's is a voice his fans have remembered well and have been waiting to hear again. Appearance on this Friday night nuthouse is no disappointment.

**"Arthur Godfrey Show"**

Variety, trade paper voice of show business, calls Arthur Godfrey (KNX, 3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday) "one of the major phenomena of his era." We agree, but not entirely in the same spirit. Anybody who could get laughs with some of the gags that Godfrey perpetrates on his audience is indeed a "phenomenon"—or else is mugging outrageously.

Why a statement like "I went with a girl once—and she was a girdle-puller-downer—I was a sock-puller-upper . . ." should send the studio audience into a clatter, we don't know, but it did. On Godfrey's afternoon show his ordinary conversation, full of "Oh dear! Son of a gun! Holy Smoke!," gets continual giggles from the people in the station (doesn't sound big enough to be an audience).

His show, coming as it does in the middle of dull afternoon listening, is a welcome relief nonetheless. Godfrey's style has begun to creep up on us. His sleepy delivery has an almost incantatory effect and his commercials are so indistinguishable from the rest of his chatter that we're perfectly willing to listen to them.

It's half an hour of straight Godfrey, though, without enough time out for the music of Archie Bleyer's orchestra, Jeanette Davis' songs or even the weekly winner of his night-time "Talent Scout" show. Pleasantest moment in the whole segment comes

when Godfrey more or less cooperates with the Bleyer orchestra in a song—his cotton batting voice is admirably suited to the style of the dreamy old ballads.

The Godfrey laugh which goes approximately "huh-huh-huh-huh-huh" would be maddening if the old master hadn't realized it and forced it out to the point of ridiculousness. His speaking voice is so resonant and so full of shades of meaning that the undertone of sarcasm running through his mildest statement enables him to get away with the most hackneyed and trite material.

Maybe that's why people laugh at his jokes!

### "The Al Pearce Show"

Playing to an emptying house over ABC every Saturday morning for sixty minutes, from eight to nine, is the grand guy of radio, "I hope, I hope, I hope" Al Pearce.

The program optimistically bills itself as a "full hour of sparkling entertainment." With Irish tenor Jimmy Lennon, "Humorous Poet" Lionel Allen, the "Human Chatterbox" Arlene Harris, and the two-piano team of Felix de Cola and Bob Brown soft-shoeing in from the supporting wings, it could well be. But, in our opinion, fumbling scripts and a hapless incoherency of acts gum the works.

Al's winning characterization of Elmer Blurt, the "low-pressure salesman," perks up proceedings for a few rewarding minutes. Then the show slumps again, even with all talent valiantly trying to hold up the lowering asbestos.

The Pearce personality has carried even feebler formats before, and audiences have faithfully not seemed to mind. But on this program, returning from a long illness and logically wanting to hit radio again with a bang, Al himself seems a little cranky about his bad material. His tone apologizes for the whole thing. And he's absolutely right.

The old-time Palace Theatre atmosphere has fine possibilities. But the program needs more music, more canned numbers, more lively Gallagher and Shean routines . . . more just plain "git!" The long hook should reach out and yank all less-snappy efforts off-stage.

Al, without that slight irritation in his voice, is fine as he is. We love him dearly. Starting this week, he'll have been in radio for twenty years. The glare of footlights, the thunder of applause and the magic cry for "Encore! Encore!" are the tributes he deserves . . . the birthday presents we'd most like to see him have.

### Wasn't Funny

Nominated for remark in poorest taste last week: on the Jack Paar

show, with Benny guesting, the latter was bragging about having been one of radio's earliest headliners.

Paar asked: Which one were you? Myrt or Marge?

Those who remembered the tragic circumstances of Marge's death only a few years ago must have shuddered at such crassness. If Paar or his writers were unaware of the circumstances, this is one time we think the censor would have been justified in using his blue pencil.

### "Becky O'Reenie Show"

"Becky O'Reenie," a colleen-speaking disc twirler, heard daily on KIEV at 10:00 a.m., is personified by Cathryn Cragen, who, you'll remember, was last season's real life radio version of "Christmas Early." Her voice is ever soft and low, an excellent thing in a woman, and she can sell us any record she wants to in an introduction of only a few minutes, not to mention the probably much more enthralled masculine contingent.

But poor "Becky" gets lost among all those spot announcements. Likewise, her fine choices of music are strong-armed beyond recognition by constant butt-ins from the announcer. In a straight fifteen-minute period we counted five straight commercials and three broken-into musical selections. Made us mad. We turned the radio off.

### On Mike (About Studio Happenings)

#### Personal Questions

It was bound to happen! Almost everyone in the U. S., it seems, must have been queried as to name, age and occupation on the many programs where this is indispensable. Finally on CBS's "Talent Scouts" when Arthur Godfrey asked a lady talent scout her occupation he got the answer, "I am the lady in the ladies' room of a night-club." Like they always say—ask a civil question and you get a civil answer.

### Off Mike (Personalities)

#### "Take It" Up in the Air

Probably many of you heard NBC's "Take It or Leave It" Sunday, August 17th, when the show pulled a switch, and instead of awarding a plane flight as a prize, made it part of the act.

Fifty-two passengers boarded the huge American Airlines Flagship for special flight 18, to soar above the clouds for two hours in a ten-mile diameter circle while maintaining contact with emcee Phil Baker, who asked his questions from the NBC studios in Hollywood.

Radio Life, up in the air, saw the two contestants, L. E. Manseau of North Hollywood, and Helen Daily of Los Angeles, calmly call the answers (to the tune of \$64 each) into the

His new role on the Auto-Lite show crowns an impressive parade of network programs that began twelve years ago when he co-starred with poet Edgar A. Guest on "Welcome Valley."

Songstress-actress Lina Romay will be Haymes' vis-a-vis, composer Gordon Jenkins will again write, arrange and conduct the music in collaboration with lyricist Tom Adair, and Frank Martin and Sam Pierce will be on deck as announcer and producer respectively.

# Radio Lifelines

IT WAS LIKE OLD HOME WEEK, dropping in on Bing's transcription session last Friday. We moseyed into Studio D about half an hour before cutting time. John Scott Trotter was just stepping off the podium to change his brown T-shirt for a white and his coat. Murdo McKenzie, who used to be Bing's engineer and now co-produces the show with Bill Morrow, (in jeans and cowboy boots), was quietly rushing around checking on last-minute detail and Mrs. McKenzie (Trudy Erwin) hurried to snag a front row seat for the show. Guest star Jimmy Durante, who'd left the stage, galloped back to corner John Scott and run over the famous Durante "Ya gotta start off each day wid a song." When Trotter and crew whipped the tune out to suit Jimmy, he turned to the gathering audience, pointed at John Scott, and announced, "Dis man stays next week!"

**THERE'S A DEFINITE ATMOSPHERE** about a Crosby studio before show time. A sort of relaxed alertness. Everyone has worked together for so long, and yet this doesn't encourage a sloppy job. We should imagine that if we were some personality about to debut on big-time radio, Bing's show would be our choice. Certainly his easy approach would minimize any case of jitters. And then, why have mike fright when any really bad slip can be deleted from a transcribed show?

**KEN CARPENTER DIDN'T** attempt to warm up the studio audience. He smiled on stage, made a few pleasant remarks, and introduced the cast. Bing held up procedure for a few moments when he took a phone call in the control booth. In fact, every one in the booth seemed to be hanging onto a phone just before cutting time and the cubby hole was so jammed it would have made a can of sardines look spacious. New face behind the glass was agency head Jim Burton.

For several minutes, all we could see of Bing was his head to the phone and a big splash of color. When he finally emerged on stage, the big splash of color developed as his red shirt—the loudest (and shortest) we've ever seen him affect. For forty-five minutes, from our second-row vantage point, we tried to figure out the design on this crimson evidence of sartorial splendor. It's still got us licked. We'd like some psychiatrist to tell us the connection between inhibitions and wearing loud shirts.

Schnozzola was cute. He also came on stage with his shirt tails flying—trying to "get into the act." Bing stepped up to the mike and warbled a few "ah's", then assuming a mock satisfied air, remarked, "I guess so!"

**THAT MAN TROTTER'S MUSIC** sounded better than ever (and there was no room for improvement). Wait

until you hear Bing and the Rhythm-a-ires' "Feudin' and Fightin'"—it's got suave snap. The three gals in the singing group looked nicer than any facing footlights this season. Their outfits were spandy new—blue dirndls with eyelet hem trim and the same sleeve trim on their fresh white blouses. Skirts were long, and it was a relief to see hems even and all three lengths lined up. We've often thought what a blessing it would be if studios had some wardrobe mistress to check gal performers before appearing on stage, but probably no one, not even Anita Colby, could be tactful enough to tell a bit player, let alone a star, that her slip was showing or her stocking seams awry. Sure, we know television has only come around the far corner, and that what the studio audience sees doesn't matter too much. But it *does matter* . . . we've even been there when a star's lines fell flatter than a poor pancake because she looked so goshawful.

**DURING THE PERFORMANCE** the other night, one advantage of transcriptions became quite evident. Bing and Jimmy had such a hilarious time ad-libbing they got carried away and invested mildly humorous script lines with a wild infectiousness. Jimmy had one line: "This script was written earlier to permit lousing up at this more convenient time!" Finally, when both Bing and Durante had tangented in a free-for-all ad lib spree, Jimmy, searching his script to find a place to latch onto, broke up and admitted, "I don't know where we are, but I'm talkin'!"

What a show! The one person we'd like most *not* to be is the guy trying to decide what to take out and what to leave in a Crosby cutting. Like choosing between Rita Hayworth and Lana Turner, we suppose.



## COSMOPOLITE

Jack Kirkwood, hustling host of Columbia's "Arthur's Place," is a native of Ireland, and has played before audiences in every part of the world—Mexico, China, Australia, the Philippines and Canada. The latter country was where he got his start in show business, with dramatic companies and finally musical comedy. Jack has also written more than 400 comedy sketches during his career.

### MALE VOCAL OF THE WEEK

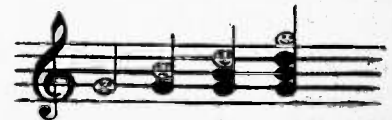

LISTENERS SPEAK—  
WILL RADIO LISTEN?

"Everybody talks about what's wrong with radio—but nobody does anything about it." That heretofore accepted statement can at last go by the boards—the Radio Listener's Committee of the San Francisco Branch of the American Association of University Women is definitely doing something about it.

Members have compiled a constructive list of suggestions from the results of surveys and research and sent it to those who are in a position to act on their demands.

Lacking the space to print their worthy document intact, we at least quote from some of the pleas that arose from the survey:

"The Committee would like to hear full-length plays such as those presented so successfully in England on the 'Third Program.'

"In mystery drama there should be a fuller and more careful analysis of the crime and its solution rather than emphasis on the sordid details of the crime itself.

"Instead of soap operas, we should like chapters read from best-sellers, the classics or short stories told in the manner of Nelson Olmstead.

"We should like to hear more programs of the personal essay type such as Woolcott once did so successfully . . .

"We should not only like fuller news programs, but programs which develop both sides of political and social questions either by an unprejudiced commentator or by two men on the same program presenting opposite points of view in a calm and dignified manner.

"We suggest more programs of international understanding with a conversational give and take between the people of different countries such as the recently deceased 'Yours Sincerely.'

"We need more well conducted discussion programs of current interests such as 'Meet the Press,' such discussions not to be limited to half an hour.

"We should like to be able to hear our government in action—direct broadcasts from the national, state, county and municipal legislative bodies.

"The Committee recommends the establishment of a radio transcription library . . . for rebroadcasting docu-

mentary and historical programs . . .

"We should like to be able to tune in on courses of study such as are being given every day in our colleges and universities.

"For quiz programs with juvenile participants we recommend the use of different children each week rather than the exploitation of a small group.

"We should like a magazine containing the best radio programs each month, the magazine to be published and distributed through the cooperative effort of the various networks without cost to the listener. The selection of programs should not be made by the industry itself but by an unprejudiced listener group.

"We believe that radio networks and stations should pay for space in the newspapers to describe daily their outstanding programs.

"Commercials should be given by the announcer and never by any participant in the program itself.

"Radio should not depend upon other art forms. Schools for professional training of radio personnel both administrative and creative should be established. These schools should be staffed by men and women who meet definite professional qualifications."

Some of the committee's requests seem difficult at the outset—for example, you just don't rebroadcast any program you want to without bumping into musicians' union and allied complications.

As for the suggestion about a "magazine containing the best radio programs"—we're at your service, ladies.

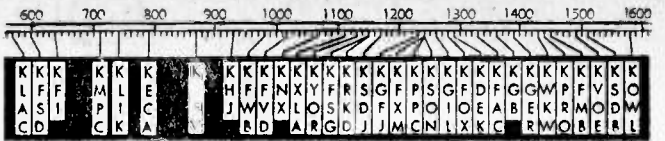

Parsons was scenario editor then, and in charge of a big room of girls assigned to answer tactfully and legally the Bushman "love letters."

On the stage, Bushman had lost extreme weight; in films he immediately gained back thirty pounds. "It was so easy!" he blares, always resonant in his conversation. "We made only one picture a week—and you could make a picture in a day then." Bushman was the first star to insist that supporting players get screen credit; the first, too, to make personal appearances, both before and during the war.

All this, of course, is the best-known part of the Bushman saga. What is equally interesting is his career after then, and now. He went into stage-work in Chicago for years, one of his best performances, "The Bishop Misbehaves."

Then, with another pioneer industry, he began his radio era. His first air program was for Melba Cosmetics. He was also first star of that still-running favorite, "Lightnin' Jim." After eight years with Chicago stations, he indirectly bought a home in California's Pacific Palisades, and with his wife, Norma Atken, moved to the coast.

### Present Stints

"Those We Love," "Glamour Manor" and "Nero Wolfe" have been his recent programs, and you now hear him as "Isadore Calhoun" on "Bob and Victoria," as well as "The Major" on "Rexall."

By four every morning, 64-year-old Bushman is out of his bed. "I can't help it!" he declares loudly, "it's a habit, sort of a timed insomnia. Won't take medicine though." He paused impressively. "Never taken medicine a day in my life. Physical culture! Physical culture!"

And up until 1940 this magnificently-built white-haired man was actually running fifteen miles a day, three days a week! His still superb constitution is, in fact, the result of weight-lifting, bicycle-racing, wrestling and track work-out since his

youth. He blames his recent inactivity entirely on California—"This consarned lazy semi-tropical climate!"

All of the Bushman children, three boys and three girls, are exceptionally tall (none of the boys is under six feet two). "Giants! All of them!" cries Bushman. Bruce is a sculptor and artist for MGM, Ralph Everly is general manager of a builder's supply company, and Richard announces from Syracuse, New York. Two of the Bushman girls, Virginia and Lenore, were doing considerable picture work at MGM until their marriages recently to prominent professional men; Josephine Bushman is married and lives in Milwaukee. There are eleven grandchildren, so far.

"All my kids were with me in pictures, you know," Bushman adds, "although they could never be billed as mine."

Beside the palatial Bush Manor which he once owned in Maryland (where he kept the most famous great Dane kennels in the world and raised saddle horses, jumping horses, show horses and prize cattle) the present Bushman Palisades home seems relatively unpretentious. Bushman, however, enormously enjoys the contrast.

A reporter from PM came to visit him, for instance. "Mr. Bushman," she sympathized, "you've had horses, cattle, dogs, everything, before. What do you raise now?"

"Canaries!" shouted the imposing thespian of several dramatic decades. Bushman slaps his leg as he tells the story, then "You know!" he roars, "from the sublime to the ridiculous!"

American football, I jabbed the microphone in front of the Aussie and said 'Here's Captain Wing.' He laughed and took over. Quite a game, rugby."

(The phone clicked again. "Hello, Jimmy? Yes... call Dr. \_\_\_\_\_'s office. No, nothing else. Right. Bye.")

Christmas, 1944, was Noumea's biggest scoop, Bob thinks. A special crew flew over to Norfolk Island (Paradise of the Bounty survivors and locale of the Nordhoff and Hall sagas) for an interview with the one lone American stationed there during the war. Broadcasting through remote equipment packed into a typewriter case, the GI said hello and Merry Christmas to the U.S.A. An army commendation was given for the show.

(Our cameraman interrupted for a picture of the handsome Mr. Lemond—with much accompanying horseplay from the studio next door. "Listen," informed Bob, "if I have to look at those guys while you're taking this I'm going to die laughing." Silly business is routine in an-

nounce booths, we were told, the entertainment over and the photographer on his way down to print the shot.)

In October, 1945, Bob took over Radio Tokyo. Hy Averback was on his staff and ousted "Rose" to be "Tokyo Mose." Other operations were equally colorful.

"It took six Jap engineers to do what one of our men could," Bob chuckles. "We did one broadcast from the Imperial Hotel, a dance show on New Year's Eve. You'd have thought we'd asked them to move entire Radio Tokyo over there!"

(Bob looked quizzically at the CBS messenger-girl who'd just come into the booth. "Haven't come up yet," he said, after much flipping and burrowing through papers. "At least there aren't any in here." (Schedules.) "Just a second," he told us. "Got another spot." The Gallenkamp jingle made its debut, following system cue. "Gallenkamp's... 535 South Broadway," finished Bob efficiently.)

### Oh, Yes—Married!

"Oh," he remembered, "guess I'd better tell you about my beautiful wife I married last summer. Barbara Brewster, one of the Brewster twins. I met her when she came over to New Caledonia on a USO tour of 'Doughgirls.' When I got back, we were married." Bob adds that he'll be a cigar-passer some time in January. He and Barbara have a home in the Los Feliz hills, but are making plans to move to the Valley. Barbara's twin, Gloria, by the way, is married to Claude Stroud, of the "Vaughn Monroe Show" Stroud twins.

For his eleven years in radio, Bob has wanted to have a station of his own. He and his partner, Clinton Jones, have just received license, he happily told us, to operate their own 250-watter, KSPA, at Santa Paula, this side of Ventura. Until then, you'll still be hearing him on "Hope Chest" and "The Sweeney and March Show," as well as "Hoagy Carmichael Time" when it returns to the air.

As we shoved out into the hall, folding our notes together, the familiar jabberwocky trailed along behind us... "KNX, Columbia Square, Los Angeles... My-tee Fine... It's My-tee Fine. Get My-tee Fine today!"

The road from a painted box to today's swank settings in which Mr. Carle and band play sounds like the proverbial parallel usually told of newsboy becoming editor. Frankie started working just about as early as do most "newsies." At the age

of nine years he did his first piano job with a bunch in the old home town of Providence, Rhode Island.

Spurred by this taste of the big time, the boy plugged away until his unique style launched him professionally. His first teacher stayed by with advice and encouragement.

"I was continually being admonished by my uncle not to listen to other musicians with an ear to learning. He urged me 'Keep your natural style, Frankie, or first thing you know you'll be copying this, and copying that, and after a while

you'll wind up with no style at all!'"

Since the time when he was seventeen years old and held his first really professional job recording with MacEnelly Victor Company, Frankie has always had a band or been in a band. The first berth at the eighty-eights for another's band was with Mal Hallett's aggregation, in company of notables Gene Krupa, Jack Teagarden and "Toots" Mondello. When that broke up, he went to Albany, New York, organized his own orchestra and played locally for about a year before they took to the road.

## Records Help

On the strength of the young maestro's ensuing popularity through compositions and styling, a Frankie Carle album was brought out in 1939, containing "12th Street Rag," "Serenade," "Lover's Lullaby," "Barcarole" and "Estelle." Its steady big-sale popularity set the pace, and the climb "up" was straight, from there. When Horace Heidt and his "Old Gold Show" welcomed Frankie with open arms and equal billing, Carle realized that individuality pays off.

The hard-working musician who heads the Tuesday and Thursday night "Chesterfield Supper Club" and keeps abreast of recording demands, leads an ideal life away from the podium.

His home is a sprawling ranch house at Tarzana, where Frankie has rigged up a studio in which he can compose, arrange and practice with daughter Margie, "the chick with the band." All the spare time mustered is spent in the big garden, or his hundred-and-fifty-tree orchard, "where I hamper my workmen and have a wonderful time. I'm just a farmer at heart."

Marjorie joined his band as vocalist about two years ago, and has since married one of Father Frankie's band members, making her Marjorie Carle Hughes. The three are inseparable, and have now worked up a ditty they feature. Marjorie sings the refrain, starting its several choruses with:

"Me, my pop and my honey,

Given the stint of building a comedy around the established Albert name, scripters Jay Sommers and Jesse Goldstein have deviated from patterns and brought forth an individual thing. There are several nice touches which make the Eddie Albert show a little more than routine. As successor to his attorney-father, Eddie Albert Sr., Plainville's young, earnest lawyer attempts to give a semblance of intelligence to the prescribed comedy confusions in which he finds himself. One concludes that Eddie knows where he's going even while he's stumbling over his feet.

The usual boy-holding-hands-with-girl sequence boasts a flourish, too. Barbara Eiler, as "Joan Cartwright," patiently puts up with Eddie's problems, as usual, but versus tradition Eddie conveys that he's in love with the girl in a most sensible manner, and not dopily oblivious to her charms. Throughout the script he gets across a protective "I can provide for you and help make decisions" tone which is reassuring. One doesn't worry what a jerk the poor girl will have when she's tied to the guy for life.

#### Other Cast Members

Constance Crowder has been given, and accomplishes expertly, a very appealing character . . . that of "Miss Dodie", a mother-hennish individual who was secretary to Eddie's lawyer-father, and who bosses his son around with forgivable cluck-cluckings.

Eddie's big pal, "Harvey Haggermyer," an anxious-to-please cabbie who drives the only taxi in town, is enacted by Joseph Granby. And semi-villain interest is supplied by "Judge Jason Cartwright," Joan's father, who takes exception to Eddie in the courtroom and on the front-porch steps. This latter role is sputteringly done by Earle Ross, a master at charging vociferously about the radio stage, but the hysteria in the lines is often a little more alarming than necessary, (to offer a slight suggestion).

The show's joyfully skipping theme music has attracted considerable interest, and was written by Buzz Adlam, musical director for ABC's western division. Buzz backgrounds the program after receiving script twenty-four hours before and jotting suggestions to himself all along the edges of the paper until the right musical atmosphere "sort of happens along." He likes to use popular pieces as much as possible, adding the unique Adlam arrangement effects. The theme music he tried to make "just a little bit rustic, to suggest the personality of a country boy still not quite a country boy".

Rehearsals are closely timed, but casual affairs. The "Big Three" of the show, ABC producer Harfield Weeden, and writer-team Sommers and Goldstein (who co-produce), sit

in horizontal 1-2-3 formation in the control booth exchanging comments and watching one another's scripts. Engineer George Otte holds down the adjoining platform, and between the four of them progress is systematic and unharrowing.

Eddie, always a casual dresser, works rehearsals in his shirt-sleeves and wears glasses most of the time. He is a pleasant sort of "program star" and has genial conversation for fellow members of the cast. During breaks, he often wanders to the piano for a few minutes of classical musing, being a genuine connoisseur of fine music and an artist of the piano, violin and guitar.

#### His Interests

His real name is Albert Heimbürger, but when he started singing over the air years ago and announcers introduced him as "Hamburger" he made the professional change. Eddie, incidentally, is married to Margo, and they both like to travel. The Albert yacht, "SSS Tarawa", has

been on many exploration jaunts through Mexican waters, and can be seen traveling near Catalina nearly every weekend. Eddie himself once took a holiday from Hollywood and toured Mexico—as a clown in a roaming circus! Pre-war, he made a jaunt to Europe and would like to repeat the trip.

He has one more project for the future . . . Eddie Albert Productions . . . a 16-millimeter motion picture venture, about which he intently has been making plans for quite some time.

Eddie quite enjoys his new radio establishment of residence in "Plainville" and gets the feeling through the mike. With conscientious script management and further coherent handling of such an expert leading man, the program should make an important bid for a continued fall and winter season, when the hot weather listening schedule comes up soon for its annual Indian Summer re-do.


*Behind the Scenes Nelson Eddy Reveals Himself as Unable to Resist a Gag and Possessor of Irrepressible Good Humor*

**N**ELSON EDDY is a frustrated comedian! We decided this upon visiting his rehearsal of "Kraft Music Hall"—and then immediately afterward decided that as a comedian, he's not so frustrated. The boys gets a lot of laughs.

For instance, we watched the singer stride out on the stage, take up his position mikeside and go through a rousing Friml number—and he watched us watch him. Being alone in the studio audience, we interpreted Nelson's musically preoccupied stare in our direction as an indictment of our peering attention. We waited in apprehension for a signal meaning "git." He finished his song, walked slowly across the stage, paused imperceptibly as he

passed us and gave a large, solemn wink!

During another run-through of this same song, Eddy, after a sustained note climaxing the chorus, ended the rendition with a loud and unmusical "Whoohooof!"

This season's script gives Nelson a chance to apply the light touch to his emceeing, and he makes the most of it. Introducing a musical number, he says, "Speaking of Rudolph Friml, for those who remember 'The White Eagle'—and for those who never even heard of it—Nadine and I will sing 'Give Me One Hour.'" Ken Carpenter asks Nelson what he carries in his ever-present briefcase, and wonders if perhaps it's Rudolph Friml? "No," says Nelson, "he finally got an apartment." Ken invites Eddy over for an outdoor barbecue. "Swell," enthuses Nelson, "we can sit around and roast John Charles Thomas." If any or all of these whimsies get a yuck (as they all did during the broadcast) no one is quite as delighted as Eddy.

#### Inspired Dance

Concert pianist Leonard Pennario's part of the rehearsal was a brilliant playing of Chopin's "Fantasie Impromptu." Armbruster's orchestra men sat and listened with great interest. Armbruster himself rested his head on his arms and shut his eyes to give Leonard's music complete attention. The respectful silence behind the Pennario recital was too much for Nelson's prankish soul. Assuming a dead pan, he quietly but energetically threw himself into a ballet interpretation of the Chopin music. All six feet and 180 pounds of baritone were behind the jumping and toe-pointing of Eddy's mocking dance. He got his laugh and assumed his seat happily.

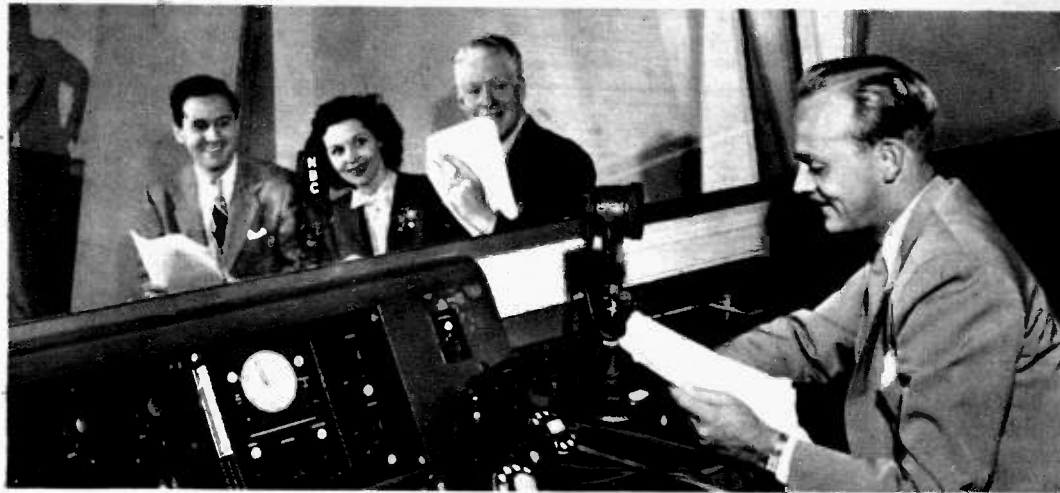
The flying saucer craze had struck Hollywood the day of the KMH rehearsal and, equipped for endless gags on the subject, Nelson had the pockets of his jacket crammed with those little paper plates that usually come with nickel pies. During a lull in the rehearsal he put on a flash juggling act, the effectiveness of which was marred only slightly by the fact that he used but one plate. Occasionally he punctuated a line by sailing a plate out across the footlights into the empty audience.

An NBC photographer who was busily clicking away covering the show asked Eddy for a shot of him juggling his flying saucers. At the moment, nothing could have pleased Eddy more. Paper plates flew as the photographer tried to catch Nelson and his juggling act. Between shots, the imposing looking baritone scrambled around the stage picking up his plates. "I'm afraid that in the pictures the plates in the air will cover your face," volunteered the lens man.

"That's all right, too," shrugged

**S**HOULD the United States have universal military training now?"

"Should we withdraw our representative from the Vatican?"

"Should unions be required to incorporate by Act of Congress?"

These questions and similar topics of civic, state and national importance may be heard debated on KMPC's "Open Forum" program each Sunday evening.

"The Open Forum," which has the reputation of being the first sponsored discussion program in the United States and the first program of this nature to originate on the Pacific Coast, has been under the continuous sponsorship of Floyd A. Allen and Company, investment dealers, since 1936.

The subject debated on each broadcast is of controversial issue and each program introduces four prominent civic or business officials; two pro, two con. Each speaker has four minutes of prepared statement upon the topic discussed, followed by fifteen minutes of unrehearsed round table discussion; and concluded with fifteen minutes of questions from the audience.

Mel Uhl, producer of the "Open Forum" and a former newspaperman, conceived the idea for this program which immediately impressed Floyd A. Allen, the original sponsor. Mr. Allen believes that an uncensored discussion of policy and economic

#### How Run

The present moderator of the "Open Forum" is Edward S. Shattuck. Mr. Shattuck, a former colonel in the U. S. Army on the staff of General MacArthur, has returned to his law practice in Los Angeles as a member of the firm of Guthrie, Darling and Shattuck. Two of the previous moderators on this program were Lt. Gov. Goodwin J. Knight and Edward Clayton Jones, attorney and U.S.C. professor.

Assisting Mr. Shattuck in conducting the "Open Forum" is Mrs. Lucille Jones, who has been affiliated with this program since its inception in 1936. Mrs. Jones contacts the speakers, writes the script, and during the broadcast selects the questions from the studio audience.

Leaders of political, judicial, economic, and labor activities in the city, state and nation have appeared on "Open Forum" panels. Some of the prominent speakers have included: Miles Mander, English writer; Upton Close, commentator; Doctors Theodore Chen and Y. S. Han, Chinese scholars; Dr. Albert T. Haucke of Chicago; Dr. F. Pottenger, international leader in the medical profession; Dr. T. N. Carver, former dean of Harvard Economic Department; and Rupert Hughes, commentator.

The reaction of the listening audience to "Open Forum" is ninety per cent complimentary, although sometimes participants have been accused of partiality when a subject is one of radical controversy. Among political and economic groups of diverse opinion, however, the "Open Forum" is equally popular, indicating the fairness with which it is conducted.

"Composing is strictly a gamble. Some of the tunes I hardly thought would sell went over big, and adversely, some of my favorites are still on the shelf. For instance, when I was just getting started in Albany, I had a tune I thought was a sure cinch to go over. No one seemed to want it... I tried and tried to sell it. Then Glen Gray heard it, liked it and had his old Casa Loma band record it. Glenn Miller did it next, and it was a hit by then. The unwanted song was 'Sunrise Serenade'."

Nelson philosophically. "You can tell 'em it's Bing Crosby."

In spite of (or maybe because of) the high spirits of the cast and its star, at rehearsal it's evident that the show strives for perfection. Eddy himself takes time off between gags to do a heap of hard work. He sings each of his numbers many times over and in full voice. He employs all the gestures of the concert stage in putting across his song to the empty auditorium. In addition to a good handful of music scores, Nelson, as emcee, has the bulk of the script to take care of as well. He employs a music stand to hold his formidable sheaf of papers.

Under the yoke of a "stuffed shirt"

reputation for much of his screen career, Eddy's cheerful soul must have rebelled many times. According to those present at the first rehearsal of this present KMH series, Nelson came to grips with the problem. It seems the script writer had penned in Nadine Conner and Leonard Pennario as referring to "Mr. Eddy" throughout the first show. "Can't somebody call me 'Nelson'?" "Mr. Eddy" asked wistfully. "There's been entirely too much of this darned stuffed shirt business!"

And what happened to the paper plates? Well, it seems that Nelson bought five hundred of them, spent three hours autographing them, and that night at the show strolled happily up and down the aisles sailing them into the audience.
