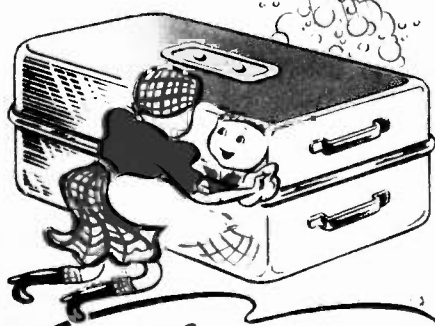

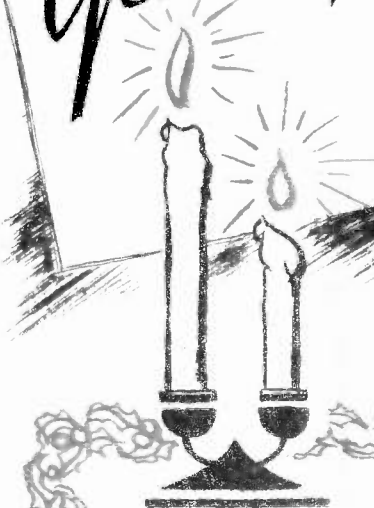

You will be hearing those cheery words on your radio.

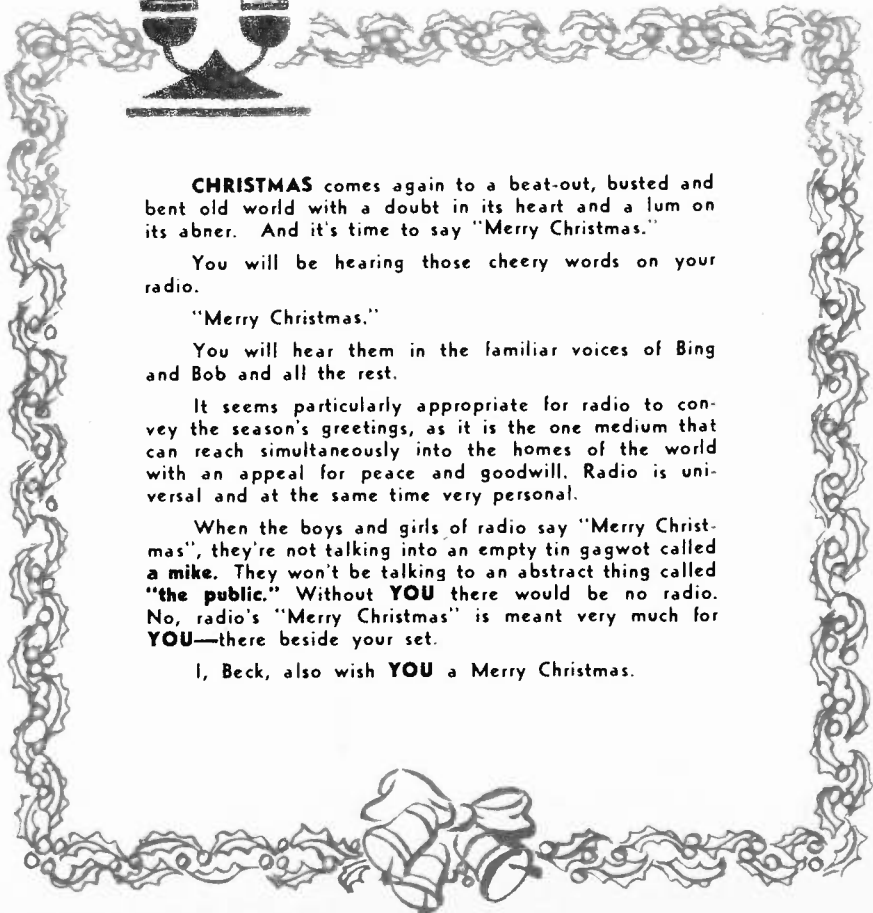
"Merry Christmas."

"This is really the most simply terrific cake I've ever baked and the best idea for keeping on hand during the holidays. It's so simple and easy and all men are mad about chocolate cake. I've found. When my dates bring me home from holiday dances we head for the kitchen and chocolate cake and cocoa."

CHOCOLATE CAKE

2 cups sugar	2 eggs	2 cups sifted flour	4 1/2 tablespoons cocoa
1/2 cup sour cream	1/2 cup butter (1 square) or mar-	1 cup boiling water	1 1/2 teaspoons soda

Mix above ingredients as listed, being sure to add soda to boiling water before mixing. Batter should be thin. Bake at moderate heat (325 degrees F.) until done. About 45 minutes.

ICING (FOR CHOCOLATE CAKE)

1 package confection-	needed
ers sugar	1/2 pound margarine
2 teaspoons vanilla	4 tablespoons cocoa
milk or cream as	(more if wanted)

Mix above ingredients to creamy consistency and spread on cake.

DATE NUT ROLL

1 lb. graham crackers (rolled fine)	1 lb. dates (cut in 1/4-in. pieces)
1 lb. marshmallows (cut in 1/4-in. pieces)	1 to 2 cups chopped nuts
1 cup thick cream	

Save out 1/2 cup of cracker crumbs to roll loaf in. Mix remaining ingredients thoroughly and form into smooth round loaf. Roll loaf in the 1/2 cup of crumbs until entirely covered. Wrap loaf in waxed paper and

let stand in refrigerator for at least 12 hours. (This dessert can be kept in the refrigerator for a week or longer.) Slice and serve with whipped cream to which has been added a drop or two of brandy flavoring.

JOHN SCOTT TROTTER

"This is one of those old 'secret' recipes from our family, that was popular 'way down South long before the Civil War. I still use it . . . it suits the holiday season as well as does its name, and I think it's a mighty good dish."

YULETIDE YAMS

Select five medium-sized red yams. Having washed them thoroughly, grease them with vegetable shortening and bake in moderate oven (325 degrees F.) until done. When cold, peel and slice. In alternating layers arrange sliced yams and slices of orange with the peel left on. Cover each layer generously with brown sugar and lots of butter. Add just enough water to take care of initial cooking period. The juice from oranges, brown sugar and butter combine to make very rich syrup. Bake in a 350-degree F. oven for one hour, basting the contents frequently with the rich syrup.

EDDIE CANTOR

"Here's a favorite holiday drink that I like serving as the last course for the big dinner. It's strong, so it takes time to drink, and thereby promotes conversation."

TURKISH COFFEE

Use finely pulverized coffee. Mix one tablespoon (1 heap mine) of coffee for each demi-tasse (it's too strong for larger cups), with an equal amount of granulated sugar. When the water is boiling briskly, add the coffee, and when it looks frothy, remove from the fire. In a moment or two, boil it up again

and then repeat a third time. It should be thick and foamy. Serve at once without cream.

ED "ARCHIE" GARDNER

(With an assist from Mrs. Gardner)

"Since those of us who live here in the West need not be swayed by the weather in our liking for ice cream, I enjoy making up this dessert at the holiday time. (It's really my wife's idea, but both my young son, Eddie, Jr., and I really go for it.)"

CARAMEL ICE CREAM

2 cups of milk	1 cup thin cream
1 egg	1/2 cup macaroons
1/2 cup sugar	

Caramelize the sugar. Combine the milk, beaten egg, and caramelized sugar. Heat the mixture to the boiling point. When cool, add the cream and the macaroons crushed fine. Beat well and freeze.

"Some years ago, my wife and I were traveling through the South at the holiday season. We had Christmas dinner at one of those quaint roadside taverns that are so famous for their fine food. We had turkey and all the trimmings. For dessert I ordered pumpkin pie, but when the waitress told me there wasn't any, then suggested sweet potato pie, we decided to try that. I've always been grateful to that waitress for a new taste discovery. After we arrived home, I wrote the tavern and asked for the recipe . . . now one of my favorites, especially for Christmas."

SWEET POTATO PIE

1/2 cup sugar	2 cups steamed sweet potato, strained
1/2 teaspoon ginger	1 cup milk
1/4 teaspoon salt	2 eggs, slightly beaten
1 teaspoon cinnamon	1/4 recipe plain pastry
1 teaspoon nutmeg	

Combine dry ingredients and mix with sweet potato. Mix milk and eggs and combine with sweet potato

mixture. Line pie pan with pastry and pour in filling. Bake in a very hot oven 10 minutes, then reduce temperature and bake 30 minutes longer.

DORIS DAY

"Any holiday means munching to me—leisure hours, lots of guests, hot mulled wine or coffee and cookies. Then, too, maybe because I'm not a terrific cook and these particular cookies are always a big success . . . I stick with them as a Christmas favorite."

SOUR CREAM SPICE COOKIES

- | | |
|--------------------------|--------------------------|
| 3 cups sifted cake flour | 1/2 teaspoon salt |
| 1 teaspoon baking soda | 1/2 cup shortening |
| 1 teaspoon cinnamon | 2 cups brown sugar |
| 1/2 teaspoon cloves | 2 eggs, well beaten |
| 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg | 1 teaspoon vanilla |
| | 3/4 cup thick sour cream |

Sift flour, soda, spices and salt together three times. Cream shortening with sugar until light and fluffy. Add eggs and vanilla and mix well. Add dry ingredients alternately with sour cream in small amounts. Mix well. Drop from teaspoon onto greased baking sheet and bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 12 minutes. Makes about 3 1/2 dozen.

JUDY CANOVA

"We've had these honey cakes throughout the holiday season ever since I can remember, and they're delicious. It wouldn't be Thanksgiving or Christmas if I couldn't reach into the nearest cookie jar for a honey cake. Incidentally, you can keep them from starting to harden by keeping an apple in the cookie jar with them."

- Cut into small pieces and combine:

| 1 cup of chopped, blanched almonds | 3 teaspoons cinnamon |
| 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind | 1 teaspoon ground cloves |
| 3 1/2 cups confectioners' sugar | 6 eggs—beaten until light |

Bring to a boil and then cool until lukewarm:

1 pint honey

Dissolve one tablespoon soda in two tablespoons hot water. Add to the mixture with the honey, and one-quarter cup orange juice. Sift and stir in five cups bread flour. Let the dough stand 12 hours or more. Drop from a spoon onto a greased baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.). When cool, decorate with icing. Or, before baking, decorate with blanched almonds.

APPLE FLAPJACKS

- | | |
|-------------------------|----------------------------|
| 1 tablespoon shortening | 1 teaspoon baking powder |
| 1 tablespoon sugar | 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon |
| 2 eggs | 1 cup apples, chopped fine |
| 1 1/2 cups sifted flour | 1 cup milk |

Cream shortening and sugar, add beaten eggs, flour sifted with baking powder and cinnamon, and the chopped apples. Then add milk gradually to make a medium batter. Bake on griddle as for ordinary pancakes. Serve with syrup. This will make about 16 cakes.

SARAJANE WELLS

(Eileen Landis of "Women in White")

"For Christmas dinner I've always loved Waldorf salad because the ingredients go so well with traditional menus. The red apples against the lettuce leaf make a colorful salad which is also in tradition. And the dressing must have the richness of mayonnaise with the tartness that French dressing gives—to fully bring out the flavor."

|--------------------------------|----------------------------|
| 1 cup diced apples (with skin) | and pecans |
| 1 cup diced celery | French-mayonnaise dressing |
| 1/2 cup broken walnuts | lettuce leaves |

Fold together the apple, celery and nuts with French-mayonnaise dressing (French dressing whipped together with mayonnaise) and serve on lettuce leaves. Do not allow this to stand long before serving as the nuts will discolor the fruit.

STEVE ALLEN

"Christmas isn't Christmas without a good old turkey, so fixing up the bird is my favorite recipe.

"Take a 20-pound turkey. And I do mean 'take' . . . you can't afford to buy one these days. Take a clove of garlic, and — no, don't rub it on the turkey. That's too strong. Don't rub it on the inside of the bowl. But go out and rub it on the outside of

the house. That will impart that almost undetectable pungency so important to the discriminating gourmet. Then, dress the turkey. I usually dress my turkeys in powder-blue wool sweaters, white flannel shorts, and a jaunty red knitted cap. Once this is done, put the turkey in your baby's crib to scare the daylight out of your wife when she gets up in the middle of the night, and go have a Christmas dinner at Brittingham's. I'll meet you there at 8:30 sharp."

"AMOS" of "Amos 'n' Andy" (Freeman Gosden)

"Holiday time always recalls to me the South, where I was born. And I never remember those happy days without a mouth-watering memory of my mother's Johnnycake—definitely a southern hot bread. The recipe is familiar to me for I occasionally beat up a batch of Johnnycake for my friends at holiday time and serve with tangy marmalade."

|--------------------------|----------------------------------|
| 2 cups corn meal | 2 cups of sour milk |
| 1 1/2 teaspoons salt | 2 eggs |
| 1 teaspoon baking powder | 2 tablespoons shortening, melted |
| 2 tablespoons salt | |

Sift dry ingredients together and add milk, eggs and shortening. Mix well. Pour into greased pan and bake in a hot oven. It's just that simple and delicious.

REX MILLER

Rex Miller, Mutual-Don Lee news commentator, says he has kept this favorite recipe of his "off the record" for years. But now, in the interest of humanity at large, he is releasing it for publication.



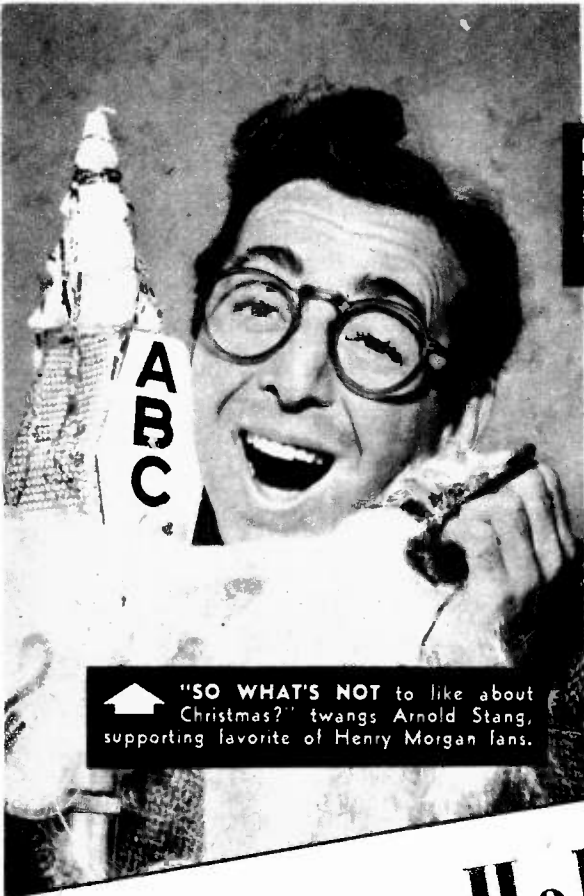

Says Miller, "I buy four or five pounds of spare-ribs and cut them into serving-size pieces. I spread them, meaty side up, in a large, shallow baking tin and sprinkle them lightly with salt and pepper, putting one slice of lemon on each piece, and sprinkling chopped onion generously over all. I put them into a very hot oven, uncovered, for about 45 minutes. During that time I mix the following ingredients:

| 1/4 cup brown sugar | generous amount Worcestershire sauce |
| 1 cup tomato ketchup | |

Bring this to a boil. After the 45 minutes have passed, and the spare-ribs are very brown, I pour the barbecue sauce over the ribs, reduce the heat considerably (say from 450 to

Also rumored that Ralph Edwards is planning two more in the distant future . . . Bill "Riley" Bendix has invested in a chicken ranch . . . Martin Block reported fading from the local scene altogether . . . "Murder and Mr. Malone" renewed for another year on ABC . . . Agnes Moorehead will be seen in the Coronet Theater (legitimate) production of "The Glass Menagerie" after the holidays. Agnes will do the much talked-about leading role . . . Edward Arnold's "Mr. President" has renewed sponsor interest . . . Network series in the offing for the popular Tex McCrary-Jinx Falkenburg team . . . Henry Morgan is under contract to ABC until June and will be kept in the Wednesday night spot as a sustaining feature, if necessary . . . Paul Whiteman's disc show renewed by the sponsors through March . . . It's been suggested that Bob Hope should be put in the half-hour spot preceding Bing on ABC, if he makes a change, giving the pair a whole hour's air romp each week . . . "Teen-Timers" again spotlighted on Mutual in February.

Search for a Star

"Do you happen to know the real name of the old-time radio star, the Masked Tenor?" the voice on the telephone asked us. "It's not as foolish as it sounds," the woman continued. "I have a friend who hasn't been able to sleep nights for trying to remember his name. I thought that you might know . . ."

We said that we were sorry, but that our memory didn't go back any farther than the "Blue Monday Jamboree" days. However, if she would like to have us call her back, we would check around radio row and see if someone could remember. She disliked putting us to such trouble, she insisted, but

she would appreciate it so much . . .

We called the press department at CBS and asked one of the publicity men if he knew anything about the Masked Tenor. He thought that the singer had been at his height in 1928—"before my time," was the way he put it. "I'll ask Lud Gluskin," he offered. "He's been in radio a long time. I'll call you back." It turned out that Lud recalled that the singer in question had last been heard on NBC, but he didn't remember ever hearing his real name. Our informant suggested we call Jack Hellman, radio editor of

Daily Variety, and a man who knows San Francisco, New York and Hollywood radio from experience.

We felt a little foolish by the time we had repeated the Masked Tenor question to Hellman. He remembered that there had been such a star, but didn't know what his name was or what had happened to him. "You should call Joe Rines," he told us. "He's the producer of the Judy Canova show now, but he was an orchestra leader in the old days. He knows everything about radio."

We felt the chase drawing to a close as we called producer Rines and posed the Masked Tenor question. "Yes," said Rines, "I remember the Masked Tenor. His name is Joe White. He was in an accident some years ago and lost a leg. After that he worked in the NBC music library in New York. I don't think he's doing anything right now. His son sang on Fred Allen's program about five weeks ago. Is there anything else I can tell you?"

We thanked him emotionally and assured him that he'd given us more information than we'd ever expected to find. We called the woman who had first asked the question and told her what we had learned. "Oh, no trouble at all," we prettily insisted as she thanked us profusely.

As far as we're concerned, any time Joe Rines wants to leave producing, he can join our staff as human encyclopedia and radio directory!

Flannery on Hiatus

Being one of Harry Flannery's faithful listeners, we followed the news analyst when he moved his commentary to Mutual from CBS. After a brief period of broadcasting, Flannery's series quietly disappeared (we lose more newscasters that way). Mutual set our fears at rest — Flannery retired temporarily to devote himself to completing a book.

Bob Anderson will carry KHJ's 8:00 a.m. news period, Monday through Friday, until Flannery delivers his book and returns to the air.

"Uncle Remus"

In the midst of all the pomp and circumstance surrounding the imminent holidays, KMPC has come up with a nice slice for the kiddies. Each weekday, Monday through Friday, at 4:45 p.m., (a very reasonable hour for children's listening, we might add) Jimmy Scribner, in the person of beloved "Uncle Remus," adopts multitudinous dialogues and relates "Br'er Rabbit's" engrossing little adventures. "Miss Missy," to whom "Uncle Remus" tells his tales, is played by Mr. Scribner's own small daughter.

All the kick of the Briar Patch goings-on blessedly remains in the radio version, a claim some of the other adaptations for the younger set's radio listening can't claim.

The characters of Joel Chandler Harris's original stories troop engagingly through the "Uncle Remus" narrative . . . Tar Baby, Brother Possum, Br'er Fox and Br'er Bear. Sometimes "Br'er Fox" sounds more ponderous than rascally, but he's always satisfactorily outwitted.

Although the show is designed for listeners who won't vote for a good many years, it can be heartily recommended for those adults who drag home at 4:45 p.m. after a laughless day.

Fashions in Food

It seems one of the best ways to the ear of the American listening public is through its palate. The oldest continually sponsored show on CBS is not a variety, dramatic or quiz show. It is the intimate and homey advice on cooking and marketing given to new brides for the past fourteen years by CBS' expert on home economics, Mary Lee Taylor. Mary Lee starts her fif-

teenth year under Pet Milk sponsorship this month, and has never missed a scheduled broadcast.

Heard on KNX at 11:00 a.m. Saturdays, the show devotes the first quarter-hour to a dramatized serialization of the trials and tribulations of the "Young Wife," who has been getting Mary Lee's helpful hints through the years. In the second half of her show, Miss Taylor takes over and gives her listeners new tested recipes, and food- and money-saving tips that have kept her research staff of five full-time home economists slaving over hot statistical tables during the previous week.

Mary Lee plans her programs with a calculating eye on store shelves and cost indices throughout the country. For example, in answering requests for her most popular recipe, pumpkin pie, Mary Lee invariably tells her listeners how to substitute squash or sweet potatoes or yams if the more traditional item is scarce or costly in their region.

Listening to Mary Lee Taylor is in keeping with "the new look" in food, for invariably she concerns herself with the possible return of food controls, and her tips are designed for a self-imposed rationing on the part of her listeners. If you're more interested in combining maximum nourishment and variety with minimum expenditure and waste than in learning new dessert fripperies, 11:00 a.m. Saturdays is a good time to learn.

Playbacks (Critical Comment)

"Between Us Girls"

Monday through Friday, at 11:45 a.m., KECA offers fifteen minutes of records, introduced in a humorous fashion by Lou Cook.

The esoteric title, "Between Us

Girls," suggests fine feminine chatter about "unmentionables" and girl-to-girl secrets about lotions and potions that will make Mrs. Listener as exquisite and desirable as are the nymphs pictured in the advertisements.

But not so. Introducing himself as "that backdoor salesman," Mr. Cook presumably steps into the kitchen (how dull!) to give Mrs. Housewife a little recorded assistance. The "assistance" is some funny talk and a series of pleasant records by Buddy Clarke, Eddy Howard or Perry Como.

The funny talk usually consists of a daily device around which Mr. Cook builds dialogue. He may be attempting to tout the appeal of a mythical

Sift together the remaining two cups flour with baking powder and salt, and stir with the lemon rind and juice into the batter. Add fruit mixture, and stir until well blended. Bake in a greased, waxed-paper-lined 9"x5"x3" pan in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) one to one and three-quarter hours, or until done. Makes a three-pound cake.

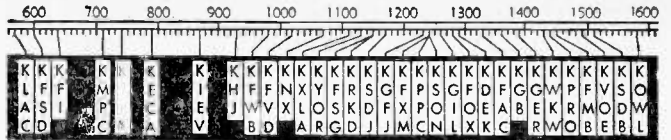

four teaspoons of cinnamon, four teaspoons of allspice, one grated nutmeg to first mixture and beat. Dredge the following fruits and nuts with flour: raisins, currants, pecans and cherries. Add one-quarter teaspoon of soda and warm water and fold in the 12 eggs, beaten stiffly. Put in a buttered deep bread pan and cover with paraffin paper. Steam at 275 degrees (F.) for two and one-half hours. Bake one-half hour at the same temperature.

Cook onion, carrot, celery and ham in butter five minutes. Add tomatoes, peppercorns, bay leaf, cloves, thyme and parsley. Cover and cook slowly one hour. Strain carefully, add hot stock and season with salt and pepper. The recipe can be used for jellied soup or salad as well as for hot soup.

FRANK SINATRA

"As you can well imagine, this is not my recipe. But the holidays have always meant cranberries to me. We always had cranberry sauce with our turkey and cranberries strung on heavy twine on our Christmas tree. One holiday season when we had all had more fruit cake and rich dessert than we should have, Nancy heard about cranberry sherbet. It's been a favorite of mine for years, and young Nancy and Frankie share our enthusiasm for cranberry sherbet — and anything else cranberry."

Boil the water and sugar together for five minutes. Add the gelatin, which has been softened in cold water and dissolved over heat, the

lemon juice, and cranberry juice. Strain, cool and freeze.

One 9-in. sponge cake or its equivalent in lady fingers. Split the cake or fingers and butter with raspberry jam. Cover as sandwiches and soak in sherry. Blanch two ounces of sweet almonds in boiling water and let stand a while. Make egg custard of three eggs and one pint of canned milk—thin the milk slightly with water, but still use only one pint. Add 1/2 teaspoon of vanilla and four tablespoons of sugar. Heat milk and sugar, and vanilla. Beat eggs and add to milk mixture when it comes to a boil. Pour custard over sponge cake. Place in icebox. Crush and sprinkle almonds over cake before spreading custard. Cover with whipped cream and dot with maraschino cherries just before serving.

MINCEMEAT TURNOVERS

| 2 cups sifted flour | 3 to 5 tablespoons cold water |
| 1 teaspoon salt | |
| 3/4 cup shortening | 1 cup mincemeat |

Sift together flour and salt. Cut or rub in shortening. Add cold water to make stiff dough. Roll out one-eighth inch thick and cut in three-inch squares. Put a generous tablespoon of mincemeat on each square. Fold into triangles and press the edges with a fork. Bake in a hot oven (450 degrees F.) 12 to 15 minutes, or until delicately golden in color. Serve hot or cold, with hot fruit sauce if desired.

Crumble Roquefort cheese in a mixing bowl, add the rest of the ingredients, and let stand till room temperature, then mix. Divide into equal parts according to size of log wished for a serving. Shape into log between waxed paper. Tear two more sheets of waxed paper—on one put one cup of ground pecans, on the other put one cup of ground parsley. Roll cheese from wax paper into pecans, then on parsley and repeat until log is well covered. Wrap in waxed paper and store in refrigerator until ready for use.

"Christmas morning found a bunch of lonesome fellows sitting around feeling sorry for themselves. One of the fellows in our barracks received a wire informing him that he had become the father of an eight-pound son on Christmas Eve. Since we were on the alert, the fellow couldn't get home. Not having any money, he couldn't do much about anything so he walked out of the barracks.

"The door had no sooner closed behind him than all the men in the room reached into their pockets and put all the available money they had in one pile. It was placed in an envelope and put under the pillow of the new father.

"When he morosely came in that Christmas night to go to bed, he reached under his pillow, found the money and almost broke down and cried. Of course, you know how fellows are—we threw pillows at him and joked him out of his emotions.

"We all went to bed that night with a feeling of Christmas—wouldn't you?" * * *

ART BAKER—If you are a steady

listener to Art Baker's "Notebook" program, you probably participated in his most memorable Christmas. It was three years ago that Art got his big brainstorm. He got to thinking that the folks at Rancho Los Amigos (in the old days it would have been called the county poor farm) wouldn't get very many presents for Christmas so he asked his "Notebook" listeners to send him new gifts to pass on to the residents of the Rancho. "Wrap it the way you would if you were sending it to your rich aunt," Art suggested to his listeners. He further requested that each gift be marked as to size and whether it was suitable for a man or a woman.

"I planned taking the gifts out to the place in the back of my car," related Baker, "and then they started to arrive! They piled up in the lobby of KFI until the Christmas tree was pushed to one corner. They covered the floor space so thickly that we had to make a path to the switchboard and the sales office. The fire department told us that we had created a hazard and gave us a warning about it (then kindly 'forgot' about it until afterwards.) And how those gifts were wrapped! They really did look as though they had been wrapped for a rich aunt.

When the time came to deliver them—my car was out of the question—we had to use a two-ton truck with a sheet binder on top of the stack of gifts, plus fourteen private automobiles!" * * *

CATHY LEWIS—The sharp-witted "Jane Stacy" of "My Friend Irma" names Christmas of 1945 as the one that stands out in her memory. It was her husband Elliott's first Christmas home since his army service. Cathy had taken a new duplex and redecorated it for the occasion. And Christmas it rained! Rain poured down, not in one or two places, but all over the apartment from the leaks in the roof. Cathy used all the pots and pans in the kitchen under the leaky spots. She ran out of rain-catching utensils and dashed downstairs to her mother's apartment to borrow more. "We had relatives and guests in to open packages," laughed Cathy, "and before anybody could set anything down—first they had to move a pan!" * * *

BOB HOPE—Bob, himself a globe-girdling Santa during the war, says: "Remembering the hectic war years when I usually found myself far from home and family, I think my

ANDREWS SISTERS—"The Christmas we always remember was the one in New York when we were too broke to give each other presents," said Maxene. "How broke can you get?" added Patty. "We didn't feel too bad about not giving anything to each other," continued LaVerne, "but we wanted to give our parents something." "We borrowed five dollars from an agent we knew," smiled Maxene, "and bought our mother a three-dollar cosmetic set and gave our father a two-dollar box of cigars." "We never did pay back the agent," said Patty, "but Maxene married him later." "So that made it all right," finished LaVerne.

STEVE ALLEN—The irrepressible young comedian of CBS's "It's a Great Life," says, "It so happens that I was born on the day after Christmas, December 26, 1921. My most memorable Christmas was December 25, 1921.

"As I remember, I was not allowed out all day."

JACK MCCOY—"It has been over ten years since I have had the privilege of being at home on Christmas Day. Being one of a family of four and enjoying the wonderfully close relationship that so many families know, it has been a great disappointment each year to see the season slip by and not be able to spend the biggest holiday with my mother, father and sister.

"Since the past ten years or so have been by far the most eventful in my life and since Christmas at home in any of those years would have been a rare treat, I can only look forward to the Christmas soon—though not this year—when I can

We did the usual things—decorated the tree, opened packages on Christmas morning and had a big dinner. Did I say usual? For me it was unusual—and wonderful!"

HENRY MORGAN—"My most memorable Christmas? When I got a Number 7 Erector Set. That was not last year. That was when I was seven years old. Or was it eleven?"

EDWARD ARNOLD—"My most memorable Christmas? Well, let's see. It was back in the early thirties when I was touring the country with an actors' company called "A Month in the Country" which starred the great Nazimova and Earle Larrimore.

"The company reached Dubuque, Iowa, at the holiday season and we laid off Christmas week. I soon found that hospitality is not confined to the South—in spite of the deep snow and a temperature of twenty below zero, we were given a royal welcome.

"After getting off presents to my family, I joined the other members

of the cast in trying to make Christmas a day of good cheer, for we were all a long way from home. We planned a dinner and a well-laden tree at the hotel on Christmas Eve. Larrimore's valet, a Negro boy named Joe, was asked to play the part of Santa Claus in the festivities and give out the presents. He gladly agreed, seeming much pleased with the idea.

"It fell to me to put on his makeup. As there was no crepe hair to be had, we bought absorbent cotton to make the wig and the big white beard that practically covered his face. We scoured the town for spirit gum, but none was to be found even in the drug stores. So I had to stick cotton on with glue! Joe had a good time while the celebration lasted, but when he came to take the stuff off his face the skin started to come with it. This was certainly painful for the poor fellow and the hotel doctor was sent for to prescribe a lotion.

"Christmas night the members of the cast were invited to a midnight supper at the home of one of the leading residents, a Mr. John McDonald. The mansion was located on the top of a mountain and could be reached only by an inclined railway. I never go by Angel's Flight, the little inclined railway near the tunnel in downtown Los Angeles, without thinking of that Christmas in Dubuque and that party which was one of the most delightful I ever attended."

VINCENT PRICE—The incident that comes first to mind when you mention Christmas to CBS's "Saint," Vincent Price, is one that took place about five years ago when the Prices were celebrating their first

be at home. So I don't feel as though I've really seen my most memorable Christmas, because I know it will be the one when our little foursome will again enjoy Christmas together."

BEN ALEXANDER—Christmas, 1947, will have a special meaning for Ben. For this is the year five-year-old Nicky Alexander is going to receive a present which was given to his father at the time he was five. When Ben was Nicky's age, he was working in a motion picture called "Hearts of the World," under the direction of the famous D. W. Griffith. Little Ben was adored by Mr. Griffith as well as the stars of the picture, Lillian and Dorothy Gish, who couldn't wait until Christmas time to play Santa Claus to their baby co-star. For weeks before Christmas, the cast began asking Ben what he wanted Santa to bring him. The child actor always replied that he wanted a train—and a track which ran through a town. He even described the town, all of the houses, and the people who lived in them. Because his imaginary town came to life for every member of the cast, Ben found it a reality on Christmas morning. His present was a beautiful little electric train with a track which ran through a miniature village, complete in every detail as described by him. Ben has kept his little town, named Griffithsville, and the train, the Gish Special, and this Christmas is presenting it to his own five-year-old son, Nicky, who just like Daddy, wants a train—and a track.

JIM BACKUS—Jim Backus' most memorable Christmas wasn't too long ago. He and his wife Henny had just been married, he was at the beginning of his career as a radio comedian, and things weren't yet breaking the right way. He and Henny had managed to find an apartment, and an apartment with a fireplace at that, but not much more. They had a roof over their heads, and they had an icebox, and that was all. MRS. PARKS JOHNSON—The lady who is called "Mrs. Santa Claus" by a host of "Vox Pop" listeners from coast to coast is Mrs. Parks Johnson, wife of the genial mentor of the program. Mrs. Johnson earned her title by choosing the particularly apt gifts that are presented to the folks who appear on the "Vox Pop" program. We asked "Mrs. Santa" to tell us her most memorable Christmas, and she recalled a war-time holiday spent in Denver, Colorado. "My son, Bill, was a Marine stationed at Boulder, Colorado. 'Vox Pop' managed to 'accidentally' visit Denver for Christmas and New Years," she smiled. "We were staying at the Brown Palace Hotel.
