We are now living west of Chico, California, and the programs in your magazine do not appear on our radio like they did when we lived in Southern California. Can you tell us which stations replace those given in your magazine?

Our research department has dug up a list of stations audible (we hope) in your locality, which should carry most of the programs scheduled by our four Los Angeles network outlets (ABC-KECA, CBS-KNX, DLBS-KHJ, NBC-KFI).

Your ABC stations are KFBK, 1530 kc., in Sacramento, and KGO, 810 kc., in San Francisco. CBS outlets are KROY, 1240 kc., in Sacramento, and KQW, 740 kc., in San Francisco. Don Lee affiliates include your very own KHSL, 1290 kc., in Chico, KVCV, 1440, in Redding, and KPHC, 610, in San Francisco. NBC coverage is provided from San Francisco by KNBC, 680 kc., and from Sacramento by KCRN, 1320.

You should bear in mind that network stations may at times release local originations rather than the network programs—hence the schedule of one outlet may not always correspond with that of a sister station. However, times of most major shows on all networks will coincide.

WHEN a lady as lovely as Lucille Norman sits opposite you at a luncheon table, and you know she's a Met Opera talent-winner yet with a figure qualified to model swim-suits, you've every right to expect her menu order to read like something served up for rabbits. But the thought of shredded cabbage and carrots set the singer's nose at a scornful angle.

"Pass the bread and butter," she demanded without a qualm. "I like to have something to munch on while I'm waiting to eat."

"My wife," smiled Bruce Kellogg, good-looking, twinkling-eyed young man beside her, "eats about six pounds less per month than my favorite horse back in Wyoming."

Despite this singular distinction, blonde, blue-eyed Miss Norman, who is five feet two in height, declares she makes it a policy to keep her weight an even hundred pounds. "Her favorite song used to be 'White Christmas,'" related Pam's mother, "but ever since I magically transformed her straight hair into curls, she hasn't stopped singing 'T-o-n-i, Toni!'"

"We're awfully proud of Pam," Lucille continued. "Although I know it sounds prejudiced, she does have a priceless disposition and we think she is an extremely well-adjusted child. Until recently, we lived at our home on the beach all the time and Pam seldom had anyone to play with. But she is perfectly happy to amuse herself and never demands undue attention.

"We do have one policy, though, of which perhaps some parents or some child psychologists might not approve. Whenever we come home—and because of our work, sometimes it is very late at night or even early in the morning—we always wake Pamela and have a half-hour of playtime with her. 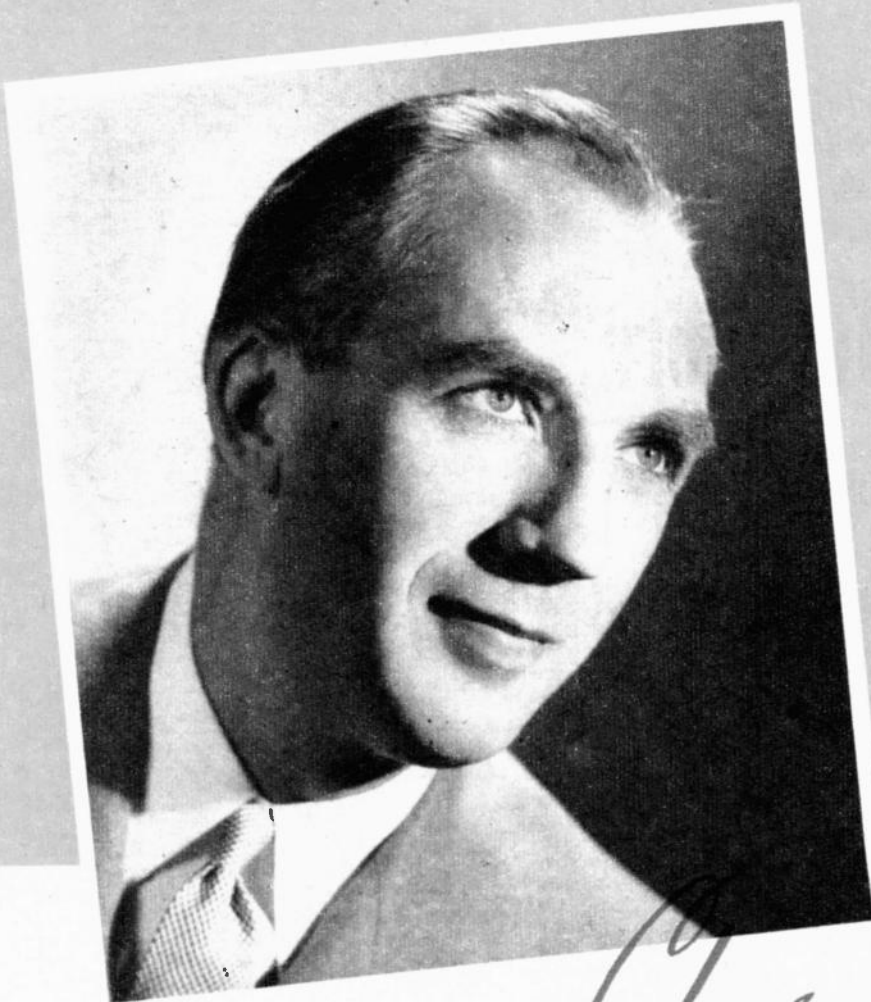

sportsmen. People like Don Black, star pitcher with the Cleveland Indians, and Mike Scarry, captain of the Cleveland Rams (before they came to Los Angeles).

Church at Home

*The First Congregational Church Tells
The Purpose of Broadcasting Religion*

IN A WORLD that many consider completely godless and in Southern California where people feel the impact of Hollywood at its worst and are beleaguered by quack practitioners and peddlers of isms, how can a recognized form of religion, a solid, established belief, best serve the community?

One powerful church, the First Congregational of Los Angeles, has definitely answered this question. It believes in using modern instruments to combat modern conditions and it believes that radio is one of the most vital tools at hand.

Speaking of the job that radio has accomplished in bringing religion to the people, Mr. Clifton E. Moore, Minister of Radio for the First Congregational Church of Los Angeles, commented, "The new medium of radio can be used, not to present the Christian religion with its controversial theological points, but to present the Christian religion as a way of life.

"Radio ought to have a conscience, a soul," he emphasized, "let that conscience and that soul be the Church."

Pennsylvania-born Mr. Moore, a tall, distinguished gentleman, attended Princeton University and the seminary of Western Reserve in

Cleveland, where he received his master's degree. Asked how he became interested in ministry, Mr. Moore said, "I had a friend who was studying to be a missionary. His ideas interested me and I went to Princeton, becoming more and more engrossed in the work and have been so ever since."

Track Record

While at college and afterwards, he participated actively in all types of athletics. He held the track mile record in Tennessee and was a candidate for the Los Angeles Olympic races. His interest in sports made him feel right at home when (after studying at the University of Chicago Workshop, under Mr. Probst, who directs the "Chicago Round Table") he moderated a radio show, "As I See It," on which he interviewed well-known dignitaries, including famous

reflect the heart of the metropolis. A Saturday afternoon show, "Religious News," is narrated by Mr. Moore, who covers interesting highlights compiled from religious topics all over the world.

Writer-Producer

He has also written and produced several network shows including the Easter program, "Faith for Tomorrow," which starred Larry Parks and Alexander Knox. Other motion-picture stars who have worked with Mr. Moore are Jimmy Stewart, Colleen Townsend, Dennis Morgan, Virginia Mayo, and Michael O'Shea. These filmland notables he has found very cooperative and more than willing to donate their time to religious productions.

In Chicago, where he was raised, Earle's family planned a career for him in the Methodist Episcopal Church. He had a fine soprano and belonged to a boys' choir until the night his voice cracked on a high note and changed then and there into the booming tones which radio listeners now associate with "Judge Hooker" of the "Gildersleeve" show.

Enamored of show business, young, deep-voiced Ross used to hang around in front of the Grand Opera House, edging into the clusters of actors discussing roles and chances.

One day another actor turned to Ross just as a small man passed by. "Ya see him?" the fellow asked Earle. "He's Eugene Moore. He has more one-nights to his credit than anyone else in the world."

That was enough for Earle. He followed Moore down the street to the Tribune Building and into the

elevator and put his foot in the office door just as Moore was ready to close it. The veteran actor, so Ross quickly discovered, needed a man to do three parts in his new production, "In a Woman's Power" or "Dangerous Friend." Earle, putting on one of the best acts of his life, read like a trouper for Moore and wangled the parts (at \$20 a week plus \$2.50 for being stage manager). His only previous experience had been in his high-school alumni play.

Because he had such timbre in his voice, Earle was often cast as the villain. His first trip to California was in 1903, and in 1908 he worked with Colonel Bill Seelig in the first five-reeler, "The Holy City." In 1912 he starred on Broadway in "Where the Trail Divides" and "Cost of Living," then built his own shows and acquired his own chain of theaters.

WANNA make yourself \$1.50, kid?"

The question was aimed at a stripling standing across the street from the stage entrance of the old Bijou Theater in New York. The idle chap, Dick LeGrand, had fully intended to become a sailor, because he had grown up in Portland, Oregon, and has always been intrigued by the sailing vessels plying the Willamette River. He had even spent four years at sea, traveling around The Horn to Ireland, South Wales, New York, Hong Kong, San Francisco and other salty ports. But now, unbeknown to himself, he was about to enter show business.

The man from the Bijou had yelled across Sixth Street and asked Dick if he wanted to make \$1.50.

"I looked hungry," LeGrand remembers. "So I nodded my head and went across the street to find out what the job was. They were playing 'The Climbers,' and there was the snow scene using 3600 pounds of

white salt and paper which had to be shoveled. I took the job."

Dick made an exemplary snow shifter and was hired as a stage hand. Shortly after, the bill changed to "Lady Margaret" and a serving man was needed. Dick doubled and actually made his stage debut by saying the line, "Yes, sir, I will, sir." It was 1901. He received \$15 weekly —\$5 for his performance and \$10 for his scene-shifting.

Western Experience

Forty-eight years have passed, and with them, volumes of show-business history. Dick played in stock and eventually drifted to the West Coast, where he received most of his experience doing juvenile leads and light comedy. A top-ranking thespian, he was one of the "Coast Defenders," that band of knowing actors and actresses who withstood the beckonings of the New York stage and remained here to afford lively entertainment to Western theatergoers. "Yes, I remember playing the old Mason once," mused LeGrand as he talked over old days.

He took a nibble at radio in 1928 in San Francisco and found its taste to his liking. For four years he worked in the Bay City. Proudly he remembers, "I was on the first sponsored West-to-East transcontinental show, 'Ole and the Girls'—the girls were a trio called 'The Coquettes'. I also announced the first unsponsored West-to-East program, 'The Vagabonds'." LeGrand furthermore wrote and produced "Voice of Firestone"

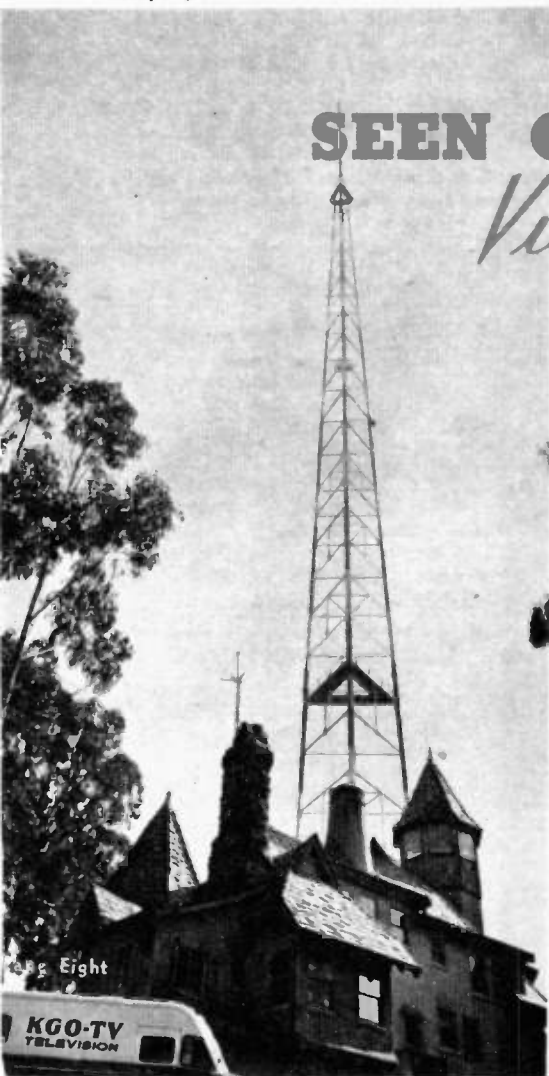

Your Cue (Shows You May Like)

"Name the Movie"

Title of this new ABC program heard on KECA, 6:30 p.m. Thursdays, is misleading, in a way. Best news on the

show is that tenor Clark Dennis is starred in a series of light and airy ballads. There's much more music than there is movie with songstress Peggy Mann, the Statlighters and Edward Gilbert's orchestra assisting Dennis in the songs.

Quiz part of the program merely interrupts the music long enough to present a movie star giving clues to one of his movies. Patients in veterans' hospitals guess, with camera equipment as the award. There's no audience participation, as the title might lead you to believe; the gesture to veterans is a nice one, however.

Marvin Miller does his usual fine job as announcer, often a thankless task on a musical program.

We like the way in which the ABC net has given so many singers their own programs and spotlighted them as guests on other shows. We'd much rather hear these unpretentious ABC musicals, sponsored or not, than some of those gold-plated comedy-variety shows that have gotten so over-written that they've stopped being entertainment.

"Classroom Radio"

We sometimes enjoy the programs we find by accident more than the other kind, and KFAC's "Classroom Radio," 1:15 p.m. Monday through Friday, is no exception. It's a children's program, presented by the Audio-Visual Department for the Los Angeles City Schools, and its purpose is to entertain and instruct members of the elementary grades. Designed for classroom listening, it features narrated stories and interpolated music intended to spark young enthusiasts.

A pleasant-voiced narrator, Betty Van Worden, tells the story, with an interesting piano accompaniment behind her voice. In describing a lion, the lion motif from Saint-Saens's "Carnival of the Animals" is included and the listening grade-schoolers are invited to raise their hands when they hear him roar. Composer and selection, together with the story's author and publisher, are credited. Children are also invited to send in the names of their favorite stories for re-telling on the radio.

All this harks back to a particularly nostalgic time we can recall, when we, too, listened to a schoolroom program much like this one (heavens—it couldn't be the same one!). Adult listeners coming across it in the middle of the afternoon would be no more than puzzled by it. However, it

In & Out of Focus (General Comment)

Looks Like

Mary Pickford and Buddy Rogers may well be the newest Mr.-and-Mrs. team. Indie television producer **Mal Boyd**, who now packages a TV show here starring Rogers, returned from the East recently with big plans for the duo's appearances. . . . **Bob Burns** is all ready for a TV show, even down to having gone through a complete physical checkup. He has a show ready, he reported, and feels that long years of memorizing radio scripts will now pay off in video. . . . **Wayne Coy**, Chairman of the Federal Communications Commission, recently came out flatfootedly and said that in five years television would be the dominant medium of broadcasting. He can get plenty of argument on that. Lots of people think it will be sooner. . . . Television network heads are convinced that kinescope recordings will be developed to the near-perfect mark by next fall. . . . Looks like **Ed Wynn's** CBS-TV shows will be the first kine-scoped in Hollywood to head east. . . . Wynn's program will be based on the "Perfect Fool" characterization he established in legitimate musicals. . . . As the webs go at it hammer and tongs to get up some house-built shows that will double in TV, it looks like NBC's package includes **Sammy Kaye's** "So You Want to Lead a Band"; a tele-version of **Martha Rountree's** "Leave It to the Girls"; and **Allen Funt's** "Candid Camera" (a TV version of the popular "Candid Mike"). . . . NBC-TV's "Kukla, Fran and Ollie" moppet puppet show originating from Chicago is due for an eight-week hiatus.

Stop, Listen, Look (Shows You May Like)

"Piano Portraits"

"Refreshing" is an apt adjective when attached to the melodic interpretations of Warde and Heide, featured song stylists of KTSL's "Piano Portraits." The show is seen each Thursday night at 8:00 over Channel 2.

Mentioning that the two come up with some fine lyric interpretations means nothing. But the background of each tells why the two singers can be standouts in a video field studded with singers.

Heide (her last name was completely lost in earlier months of hectic TV shuffling) was once a co-ed on the South Figueroa playground . . . often referred to as U.S.C. The wartime calendar years found her donating time and talent for the Victory Committee entertainment group and doing U.S.O.

shows with Danny Kaye and Harpo Marx. Another milestone for the blonde songstress was provided not long ago when she appeared with the Los Angeles Civic Opera Company. Her charm is as great as her singing ability.

Teaming with Heide and selling each song he sings, Warde Donovan fills every producer's demand for the telegenic. Back in 1947 Warde divided his time between Broadway, playing the title role in "Toplitzky of Notre Dame," and doing leading roles at the Casino Theatre in Newport, Rhode Island. Followers of "Piano Portraits" recognize Warde's voice as being surprisingly similar to that featured by NBC for two years on a show called "Warde Donovan Sings." The similarity is understandable, for the voice was Warde's.

Whether they are blending or soloing on "Portraits," these two young singers are both a visual and an auditory treat. The singer, unless he or she is a comic, has the hardest niche of all to fill in video. One of the best-known and most popular singers of the airways fell flat when he attempted a video appearance. But, as we said, "refreshing" is the word for Heide and Warde.

"Sportsmen's Quiz"

Each Wednesday and Friday night at 8:00 p.m., KLAC-TV presents the "Sportsmen's Quiz," a five-minute spot during which viewer questions about almost anything, sportwise, are answered by the editors of that hunting and fishing monthly, "Sports Afield."

The presentation is one of the simplest possible for video. While questions are being read and answered, slides and stills are flashed onto the screen. You don't have to know the difference between even a piece of cut bait and a "popper" to get a kick from these flashes of the outdoors. The forest, a salmon run, a dog on point or a buck in flight . . . any of them is a beautiful sight.

Anyone familiar with radio's "Hunting and Fishing Club of the Air" (there is no connection between the two shows) knows what to expect. The answering "editor" has tomes of reference material to draw upon, and consequently can answer questions such as "How many cartridges per bird should a good hunter expect to use?" or "How many yards of line should I let out in surf fishing?"

The answer to the first, in case you are interested, is four. A really good hunter can figure on three. That doesn't mean each bird has to be blasted at by no more and no less than three . . . it means simply that a good hunter who comes home with five birds will find he has expended around fifteen shells.

Arbitrarily, 150 yards is a good

round figure to answer the second question. The editor went on to explain that most people will find this a test, as the world's record for a shore cast is 250 yards.

One sender-in of questions enclosed a picture recently and asked the editor to identify the pups shown. Not fooled at all, the "Sports Afield" expert immediately tabbed them as wolf pups, the type of wolf "that tames easily and makes an excellent pet" . . . he said!

If you have any problems over what sort of salmon eggs make the best bait, what weight line provides the best challenge for a salt-water man, or what laws to look out for when you're after pheasant, send your queries to "Sportsmen's Quiz," care of KLAC Television, Hollywood, California.

Because the show is entertaining and informative, it is only fair to mention that sponsor PDQ Gasoline is keeping it on the channel for all to see.

Second Glances (Critical Comment)

Fred Waring Show

The young Pennsylvania State College student who was once turned down by the head of the Glee Club because his voice wasn't good enough, and who parlayed his determination into almost twenty years of top radio popularity, took the plunge into television some weeks ago.

Frederic Malcolm Waring and his Pennsylvanians prove now that cleverly staged music can be every bit as entertaining as a thrill-packed play . . . if the musical show lasts thirty

minutes to the play's one hour or more. That is no criticism of Mr. Waring, nor of his musicians and regulars such as Stuart Churchill, Daisy Bernier, Jane Wilson and Joan Wheatley.

As an emcee, Waring is most able. His tendency to exaggerate direction when the camera is panning the maestro might be a little overt, but it's not bothersome, and does give

viewers the inside peek they might desire.

Neither expense nor effort is spared. The show goes on a rotating three-tiered stage that cost more than \$12,000, and the costuming and lighting have been specially designed. These factors are evident and make for production de luxe.

The camera work is excellent, and the montages would credit an "A" movie. Even General Electric's commercials are smart.

What makes it too long, then? Sixty minutes in place of thirty, we would

say. About halfway through the show, Waring breaks up the musical formula with an amateur ballroom-talent stunt. This feature allows winning couples, any of whom could enter the Harvest Moon Ball unafraid, to display their talents in all sorts of specialty numbers, ranging from the Charleston and square dancing to rumbas and sambas. Winners draw prizes from General Electric.

The show really should end there. The preceding time gives viewers a look at Waring's popular band and a

Heading this programming are two KMPC feminine personalities, Jeanne Gray and Lois January. Jeanne has been conducting "The Woman's Voice" for approximately two years and has introduced many national and local feminine leaders in civic, professional and social life. Jeanne is as well known in these circles as in radio because of her personal acquaintance with many of these women. Her show, which is aired Monday through Friday at 12:30 p.m., features guest interviews

three times weekly, and on those days when she does not have a guest personality, Jeanne offers information on fashions, interior decorating, charm, etc. A comparative newcomer to the KMPC stage is Lois January, who with her mikeside friend, Cookie, entertains the listeners daily at 2:30 p.m. Lois has been a well-known stage and radio actress in the East and brings her talents to the KMPC microphone with her own songs, musical selections, commentary on news, fashions and round-table discussions.

The station offers several participation programs for the women throughout the day, beginning with Bob Shannon's "Voice of the Neighborhood" Tuesday and Thursday at 11:15 a.m. The show originates from drug stores throughout Southern California, where Bob is on hand to quiz visitors in the store and award prizes to successful contestants.

At 12:00 noon, Monday, Wednesday and Friday, Tom Dixon and Jane Holmes serve a gratis luncheon and conduct a quiz program with cash and merchandise awards for the winners. On Tuesday and Thursday, a telephone quiz program emanates from the KMPC studios. Tom and Jane invite representatives of women's organizations in Southern California to participate and present cash awards to the winning club representative for use in their club's respective charitable projects. Along with

the cash award, contestants also receive valuable merchandise prizes.

At 1:00 p.m., Bob Shannon introduces "The Man Says Yes," to which the public is invited. Bob bases his show on the old parlor game of "Is it animal, mineral, or vegetable?" and varies his contestants between a studio and telephone audience. Four members of the studio audience are allowed to try and identify the mystery subject, and if they fail, four telephone callers try their luck.

For strictly musical entertainment, Bill Ewing offers songs, music and some ad-lib commentary on his own program at 3:00 p.m. each afternoon. Bill is assisted by organist Ray Le Pere in entertaining the feminine afternoon audience. Following Bill's program are those mikeside pals Frank Graham and Van Des Autels with their "Three Alarm" show. Controlled by the activities of three alarm clocks, Frank and Van call contestants when an alarm rings and quiz the contestant, who, if he correctly answers the questions, may receive many prizes.

Novel programming for women is the "Bargain Broadcast" at 9:15 a.m., during which time the announcer outlines bargains which are available to the listeners. That popular culinary expert "Chef Milani" is heard at 9:30 a.m. giving his personally tested recipes and outlining a menu based on "A Dinner for Four, a Dollar No More." Chef also conducts weekly contests, offers free copies of recipes, and presents merchandise certificates for many of the large super-markets in the area.

Corn-Zucchini Casserole

The crash of 1929 wiped out Earle's theatrical interests and he and Mrs. Ross finally came to California in 1933.

Radio Beginning

Many years before this, however, in 1920, Earle had embarked on his radio career by forming the Earle Ross Theater of the Air. He has become noted in Hollywood as a top-notch character actor and is frequently heard on programs like "Railroad Hour," "Our Miss Brooks," and "Screen Director's Show." Next to the part of "Judge Hooker" on the "Gildy" show, Ross likes best to remember his "Ramblings of Jeremiah Quid."

Earle and his wife are addicted to raising roses and canaries at their San Fernando Valley place. He and Mrs. Ross celebrated their thirty-seventh wedding anniversary this month.

No Stage Fright

On the "Gildersleeve" show since it started nine years ago this fall, Ross claims never to have had mike fright. "Never had stage fright, either," he chuckled. Like "Peavey's" impersonator, Dick LeGrand, Ross is gray-haired and blue-eyed and plays up these features smartly by dressing in suits with gray predominating. The day Earle and Dick dropped in to chat with Radio and TV Life, Ross sported a gray chalk-stripe suit, blue striped shirt and red figured tie. Dick had on a glen plaid, plain blue shirt and brown and white tie.

But unlike LeGrand, who plays a pharmacist but doesn't take pill or potion, "Judge Hooker's" portrayer does know law. "I read it for three years," he says authoritatively.

tional Church, the largest of its kind in the world, are conducted by Doctor James W. Fifield, Jr., who has been minister of the church for fifteen years. The programs are "Even Song" (on the air for fifteen years) and "Sunday Evening Club," both on KFAC.

Radio Purpose

"The purpose of radio ministry is to offset all the quackery that has become so prevalent in many of the so-called radio sermons," he told. One example is that of a "preacher" who directed his listeners to put a glass of water on top of the radio. He then, reportedly, would bless the water, which, in turn, would cure listeners of all their aches and pains.

"Such abuses of religious radio in Los Angeles make clearer the challenge we are facing," he concluded, "and we are endeavoring to present programs on a sound, unemotional basis which is constructive in its message that will enlighten listeners in the teachings of God."

The First Congregational Church does no passing of the collection plate via radio. All it asks is that interested listeners take the time to sit down and write a letter to assure those who work so hard to present superior religious programs that their effort has not been in vain.

times-a-week stint, "A Man Named Jordan," actually got his radio start when fresh out of college (where he had majored in philosophy and received a bachelor of science degree from the University of San Francisco). He and a friend popped in for a visit at the Jim Morgan Radio School. They were talking over old times in the lobby when a fellow stuck his head out of a door, looked at Jack and his friend, and asked, "Which one of you can play an old man?" The youths exchanged glances and pointed to each other, sure of each other's ability. Jack wound up with the part. He stayed on at the school for a while in the capacity of an instructor. (Where Vera Vague and Helen Andrews also taught.)

With his forte as a dialectician, Jack has imitated with great alacrity the voices of the late President Roosevelt and Winston Churchill. In order to get just the right inflections, dark-haired Moyles listens to recorded speeches and is able to get the characteristics down pat. Jack has performed the two mentioned celebrities on such programs as "Don't You Believe It" and the old CBS show, "Destination Tomorrow," as well as many benefit performances.

He remembers with great horror the one time his voice gave out. With "Rocky" doing a complete narration throughout the whole thirty minutes of the show, it would be a major catastrophe for the hero not to be able to speak. This happened. It was a terrifically hot day, and once inside the studio the air was cool. "I was on-mike and nothing happened except a croak!" he remembers shuddering. "I gulped, coughed, breathed deep, and still all that would come out was a rasp!" His voice finally returned, much to the relief of everyone around him, who had been frantically thinking of remedies.

Family background finds that Jack had only one other relative in his ancestral tree who was associated with dramatic art. That was uncle Dan Moyles, who created "Officer 666," stage play and silent flicker. A turning point in Jack's life happened during the pre-AFRA era. In San Francisco at that time, Jack modestly remembers he was made an AFRA officer—vice-president, to be exact. "Consequently," he smiled, "I got my walking papers from the radio station, and decided to turn free-lance actor."

It was a good decision, for, as he recalls, "During the first six months I not only made as much money as I'd made in a year previous, but I made a lot more contacts, played a lot more roles and greatly broadened my radio horizons." While in the former Barbary Coast town, Jack

was "Bobby" on "Night Editor," and did everything from singing to working at the controls practically in the same instant on a Bay City variety show.

In Hollywood since 1944, Jack started with local radio the second day he landed. Thinking how nice it would be to surprise a friend in town, he called him up. The friend gave Jack the "Glad to see ya" and hustled him up to a studio and to a job. Since then he has acted in many net shows, being most closely identified with his "Rocky Jordan" character. On the stint with "Rocky" are Jay Novello, who plays "Captain Sam Sabaya" (name means seven in Egyptian), Larry Thor, announcer, and the five-piece orchestra conducted by Richard Aurandt. Head soundman is Jack Dick.

Off-mike moments catch Jack hustling to his Studio City home, putting on old clothes and latching on to a paint brush. He and his lovely wife, the former Nida Vanderbush, whom Jack romantically "discovered" behind the CBS receptionist desk, are redecorating their enchanting house, which is completely surrounded with blooming flowers and shrubs.

Romping in the colorful garden are the Moyleses' cherished pets, two gorgeous collies, "Master and Mistress Major and Misty of Nidack" (Nidack is a clever piecing together of the names Jack and Nida). Playful as the beautiful collies are, both Jack and Nida don't have the heart to admonish them. This job of scolding is handled by another member of the household, "Rocky," a coal-black feline who, when he isn't keeping the collies in their places, delights in teasing them. "Rocky," a wedding gift, is obviously named for Jack's title radio role.

Not too long ago, "Major" developed a hobby usually indulged in only by people. "Major" had a pen-pal with whom he happily exchanged "billets-doux." The pen-pal was "Summer Hooper," a tiny, bushy-tailed skunk belonging to radio writer Helen Morgan. The black and white toy-sized pet, well-mannered that he was, didn't mind at all having his skunk-like protective attribute being associated with the rating some summer-season shows draw. "The pen-pal routine started as a gag," Jack laughs, "so we could exchange messages. But 'Summer Hooper' got sick last year and died. Now 'Major' misses his correspondence chum. Anybody want a pen-pal?"

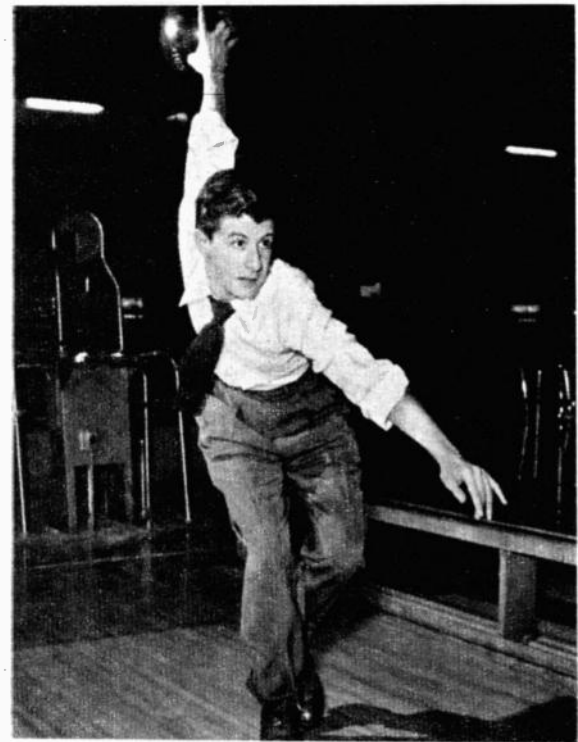

Set 'Em Up!

Bowling, America's Fastest-Growing Sport, Is Tackled by NBC Singer Bill Farrell at The Fifty-Two-Lane Sunset Bowling Center

PIN POINTS

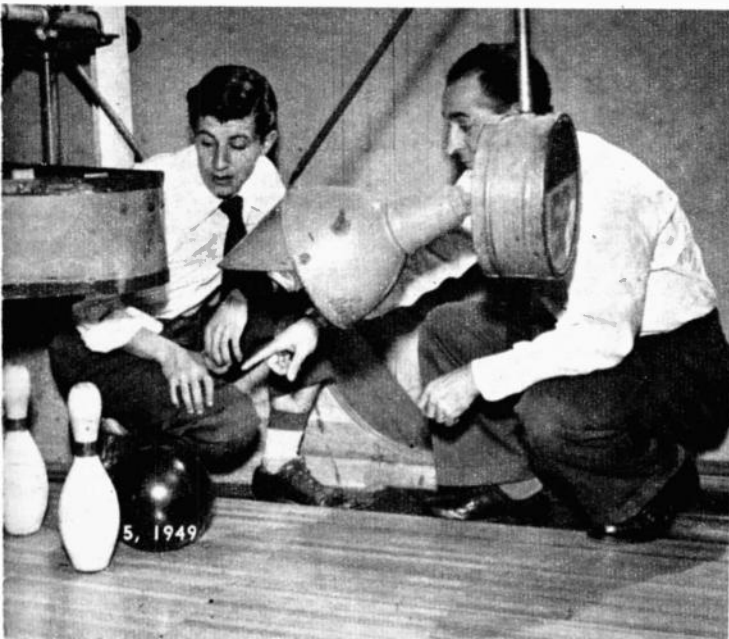
1. Be sure you have the proper equipment, such as shoes (necessary for gliding), a ball that is selected to fit the hand, and clothing suited for athletic purposes.
2. Stance is equally important, for the follow-through depends on your actions. Push the ball away from you and walk with the knees slightly bent. Walk past the ball, as it goes back, taking the number of steps (usually four) that will bring you to the foul line in balance, with your foot and the ball arriving at the foul line together. The ball will be in front again, and a kneeling motion will send it away at the right point.
3. The variety of grips is suited to a person's liking. Among many, the Bates grip, the Ned Day grip, and the conventional grip, which is achieved by placing the thumb, index and little fingers into the proper holes, and sinking the thumb three-fourths of the way into the hole. When the ball is released, the thumb comes out first, a fraction before the final twist is given with the other two fingers.
4. Bowling terms are important to the beginner in order to keep correct scoring. A "strike" is when all the pins are downed by the first ball. A "spare" results when the pins are knocked over after a second try, and a "double" is called when two strikes in a row are made, likewise the thrilling "turkey," which is three strikes in a row.



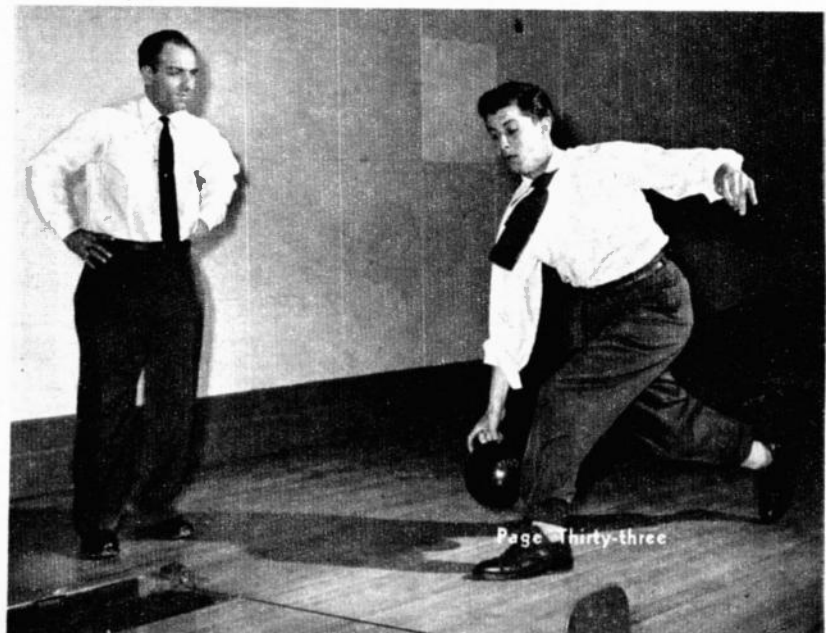

"Theater U.S.A."

Star-Studded American National Theater And Academy Joins With Army Air Corps In Presenting Broadway Revue on Radio

Thursday, 8:30 p.m.

ALMOST two months before the Cole Porter smash, "Kiss Me, Kate," debuted on Broadway, its opening production number, "Another Openin', Another Show," was used to open another show, "Theater U.S.A.," which bowed on the American Broadcasting Company. Material from Broadway productions is usually the theater's jealously

guarded life line between the box office and the footlights. For once, this life line is being diverted past the radio mike.

"Theater U.S.A." is co-sponsored by the U. S. Army Air Corps Recruiting Service and the American National Theater and Academy, an unusual organization affectionately referred to as NTA by performers. ANTA was chartered by Congress in 1935 as a non-profit public-service organization designed to assist both commercial and amateur theatricals in the

U. S. under its sponsorship. Broadway directors and players trek to little-theater groups to assist in their productions. Companies are sent on tour to places that lack theatrical groups.

Tape Scissored

On the air, "Theater U.S.A." provides the same sort of treat for listeners. Theatrical red tape has been cut to a minimum in order to facilitate air production. When Broadway players Nanette Fabray and Ray Middleton appeared in a scene from their hit musical, "Love Life," the music librarian of the show collected the orchestra scores from the studio musicians and rushed them back to the theater for the evening performance there. It was the only "Love Life" score in existence.

Willie Howard, Broadway comedian famed for a generation, made his last public appearance before his death on the opening broadcast of the ailer. Also in the cast on inaugural night were Tallulah Bankhead and Donald Cook, who did a scene from "Private Lives," Mary Martin and Alec Templeton. The opening-night studio audience was filled with more celebrities than the stage could have held. Ray Bolger, Louis Calhern, Paul Muni, Blanche Yurka, Howard Lindsay were among those applauding fellow professionals.

"The Play's the Thing," "Anne of a Thousand Days," "Edward My Son" and "Light Up the Sky" are only a few of the current Broadway productions that have contributed scenes and stars to "Theater U.S.A."

Sitting at a Piano, Singing Songs and Entertaining Folks Isn't Phil Gordon's Idea of Work. For Him It Is Simply . . .

"Doin' What Comes Naturally"

ABOUT fifteen years ago in the small Mississippi town of Meridian, a delivery boy named Phil Gordon used to pause on his way to work at a grocery or in the course of his deliveries, to admiringly watch a Negro friend of his rippling over the keys of an old piano. As Phil's admiration heightened, the pauses to watch grew longer. One day his employer logically took steps, and Phil found himself jobless. The delighted young Gordon at last had time to sit down at his own piano and try to pick out the same ramblings with the left hand, melodies with the right hand, that he had so long admired.

Informal Training

That was all the musical education Phil enjoyed. He simply followed the nimble fingers and the sympathetic but unacademic teachings of the Negroes in his home town and in the country between Meridian and

New Orleans, the acknowledged home of jazz.

This unorthodox education led Phil, via the international night-spots, to Hollywood's famous Mocambo, where he was spotted and signed by NBC producers. Now, nightly on KNBH's Channel 4, Phil can be seen rumbling out a low-down boogie on the piano keys and singing "I've Got the World on a String." That is just the song you would expect as a theme for the boy who grew up on a diet of blues and jazz.

But the road from self-taught piano in the old South to a successful spot on a top video channel wasn't as easy as six sentences make it sound.

Young Mr. Gordon is full of music. He could no more have escaped a musical career than he could later have escaped the ups and downs that usually accompany such a livelihood.

But "doin' what comes naturally" also means that Phil Gordon follows the jolly, carefree line of least musi-

cal resistance rather than hewing to the line of a business operator. He would just as soon sit plunking at the keys in some tonk where he knows a lot of music lovers will gather, as to play to a crowd of smartly dressed but unheeding patrons in a swank, highly-touted night club. Fortunately, following this casual tack has preserved in Phil the appealing personality that has drawn stacks of mail to his "Prevue with Phil Gordon."

Interviewing Phil is a revealing bit of business. You find out a lot—but about other people. The handsome young man is more prone to talk about the blithe time he had roller-skating to the old Cotton Club in Culver City ten years ago when he worked there with Pollack's band than he is to talk about his weeks of knocking them dead at Hollywood's famous Mocambo. He thought it was more fun, and naturally says so.

Knew the Greats

Phil rattles on at a mile a minute in his delightfully mild Southern accent, leaving himself entirely out of the account of his past. Interviewers learn that Phil knew King Oliver well; that he also knew Bessie Smith well. With Ethel Waters, whom he considers the greatest singer of all, it was just a casual "hello and goodbye" acquaintance. Phil enjoyed the music of his friends Pine Top Smith and Meade Lux Lewis, but likes Art Tatum's piano "best of anybody."

At this juncture we managed to drag information from Phil that first of all he had gone directly from high school to work in a radio station, where he sang, played piano, and announced. Before his eighteenth birthday he was signed by Ben Pol-

"The Brighter the Hues the Better," Says Bob Shannon, KMPC's "Yes Man" Who Never Can Say "No" to Anything

As Long as It's Green!

ROBERT LUKE PATRICK SHANNON, otherwise known as just plain Bob Shannon, is absolutely mad about the color *green*. Of course he rather deviated from the Kilkenny shade when he bought a new Pontiac convertible painted a raging red. (No, he isn't color-blind, he knows it's red.) But whatever color he's wearing, as long as it knocks your eyes out he's divinely happy.

In personality, Bob doesn't match the loud clothes he so joyfully wears. He's Irish (as if you couldn't tell with a monicker like that), has very bright blue eyes, wavy blond hair, is twenty-eight years old . . . and he's a *bachelor!*

This very personable young man c'aims he just has never found the right gal. "I don't know *what* I expect to find," he laughs, "but I'm pretty sure that the girl I marry will be someone in show or radio business so her ideas will be the same as mine."

Wisconsin's Son

Born in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, in 1921, the same year as radio, Bob literally had a microphone for a teething ring. While a tike, his biggest and most glorified dream was to go some day to Chicago and become an actor in soap operas. It was just a dream then, and Bob started out to be a commercial artist drawing cartoons. (He still free-lances many of them, concentrating on animal animations.)

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This career was waylaid when he took a job on a Wisconsin radio station, where he did everything from disc-jockeying to news-announcing, and when the day was over, it was part of his job to do the janitor work. Such a varied occupation for eighteen dollars a week! He was seventeen then, but had to stretch his years slightly and tell the boss, who wanted an older fellow, that he was twenty-one.

Army Man

In 1941 he became one of Uncle Sam's nephews and was sent to Fort Sill, Oklahoma, as a soldier in the field artillery. After his discharge in 1943 Bob headed back for the old home state and station WTMT with the position of staff announcer. A year later he came to California. The day he hit Los Angeles, he called up a buddy to let him know he had finally made Hollywood. The friend gave Bob the word that CBS was auditioning for a staff announcer. Bob trotted down to give it a try and luckily enough got the job.

Since that time he has free-lanced on many radio productions, been part of "Surprise Party" (with Stu Wilson and Maury Webster), done heavy, romantic and tough parts as well as dialects (he is a master of Irish brogue) on "California Caravan," is co-announcer on "Ladies First," emcees "Shenanigans," disc-jockeys two record shows, and is the forever smiling master of ceremonies on KMPC's "Man Says Yes."

Proof of his popularity on "The Man Says," a show which is the ra-

dio idea of the old animal-vegetable-mineral game, is seen in the persons of his enthusiastic fan club, composed of adoring ladies who think Shannon is super. He gets a big thrill attending their get-togethers and going to beach parties.

Fun and Frenzy

His five-day-a-week participation program, sponsored by "Klever Kook" (on Saturdays they broadcast from a super market and play it back Mondays), gives at-home listeners as well as excited players in the audience a chance to win. The riddles are made up by Bob, who gives four chances to the people who come in and four tries to the audience. As long as the participants can keep Bob saying "yes," he will continue talking to them. However, as soon as they come up with a clue or an answer that gets the negative nod from Bob, they lose their chance, and Shannon races off to another contestant. The pace to beat the clock becomes intoxicating and the phones jangle furiously with eager listeners who are vying with the frenzied studio members in a race to win. Helping Bob untangle and answer the telephones are Van Des Autels and Frank Graham, producers and directors of the show who also originated the radio version of the parlor game. Walking around the stage behind all the hubbub is Howard Ray, decked out in a chef's outfit and floppy hat, impersonating "Klever Kook." Seated at the Hammond is jovial and talented Ray LaPere, who

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Set 'Em Up!

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Grant believes the greatest bowler to be champion Andy Varipapa, who has made quite a number of 300 scorings. Upon hearing this, Bill's face grew rather long as he anticipated stiff competition. However, Mr. Grant assured beginner Bill that bowling does require constant practice and added: "If a person makes a habit of bowling, he will find himself becoming more professional at the game." 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gives out with the musical riddle renditions as well as the theme. At the end of each day's stint, all four simultaneously pull out of their pockets big white handkerchiefs and mop their brows after such strenuous exertion. Bob, particularly, works himself into a lather running from the audience to the telephones and cleverly hopping and skipping to avoid tripping over the long cord attached to his portable mike.

Going to the beach and getting burned to a crisp (which sometimes painfully happens), riding around in his shiny new convertible with the top down and getting wind-blown (despite protestations from his mother and dad, who don't much like being frozen by the chilly breezes) are a few of the leisurely things Bob is crazy about doing. He loves Crab Louie and taking trips to Big Bear and Arrowhead (he has pipe-dreams to build a cabin some day in the cool green mountains where the terrain is dense with big trees).

He's very fond of his family, including kid sister, who is sixteen and very cute. "The folks" moved out from Wisconsin to the big North Hollywood home that Bob bought.

He is actually scared to death of horses. This fear resulted from a boyhood experience when some clumsy nag ran away with the nearly hysterical Bob, who couldn't stop the beast for love or money. The horse ran five miles through the small Wisconsin town, while people just stood and gaped at the daring, shouting rider, not realizing that Bob

was hollering for help!

The horse was finally stopped by pursuing policemen and weak Bob, his face a ghastly white, firmly vowed to the heavens that he would never ride again. This vow was broken last summer while vacationing in the mountains. Chided by his friend, who urged that the only way he would get over his fear was to ride, Bob mounted a horse, trotted a few steps, then drew the animal to a stop and shakily dismounted with knees knocking—exit one would-be equestrian!

Rapping his knuckles on a wooden table, Bob hopes that he'll never leave California. "Why, if I went East wearing my favorite outfit of a Kelly-green jacket, pink shirt, bright blue tie and gold slacks, the people would think I was just a mad Irishman!"

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lack. When Bob Crosby took over the Pollack aggregation, Phil was out of a job. Down to New Orleans he went, then into the Navy. It was a Navy broadcast from Chicago's Ambassador that launched Phil into the spotlight of that hotel's floor show. His success was instantaneous. When the Navy let him go, the Ambassador grabbed him again. Next step was New York's fashionable Blue Angel, then on to the College Inn in Chicago to sing with Cab Calloway and Glen Gray. The Blue Angel owners again signed Phil and sent him to London and Paris to perform at their clubs there, the Lido in Paris and the Orchid Room in London.

Then back to Hollywood, the Mo-cambo, and hence to NBC television.

Phil admits that when he was playing club dates, television had seemed pretty remote and uninteresting to him. Now he is "crazy about it" and has a set of his own. Ownership keeps him constantly torn between listening to what records he managed to hang onto and watching local video fare.

One Sobering Thought

The Hollywood apartment Phil and his young wife share houses just a small portion of the records Phil has been collecting for years. The rest are strung about the country in storage and in the hands of strangers who took over the casual young singer's vacated apartments. This memory is the only one that sobers the irrepressible Gordon.

Queried about his obviously prodigious memory for song lyrics, old and new, Phil looks puzzled. Apparently it doesn't occur to him that anyone can't remember words to practically every song he has heard; or that all musicians can't sit down to sing and play by memory and by ear. This brought to mind his sister, who, Phil insists, is a much better musician than he. "She

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TA and prominent producer of many Broadway hits, serves as host-emcee of the weekly variety show. He has thirty-two years of theatrical experience behind him, a background that serves him well in piloting the show. An unusual coincidence places Freedley back in the very theater in which he first started as an actor in 1917. The 48th Street Playhouse was selected for the broadcasts because it's in the heart of New York's theatrical district, and theater stars are within easy reach of their 8:30 p.m. curtains. It's also the place where Freedley, as a young actor, rehearsed his first role under the piercing eyes of Miss Grace George, one of Broadway's great stars. During his bit, the action called for him to reach out and grasp Miss George's arm in a consoling gesture. As he did this, the actress shuddered and suppressed a shriek. His first-night jitters had made his hands icy cold!

With World War II, the U. S. Army made its first venture into show business, and with notable success. "This Is the Army," "Winged Victory" and now "Theater U.S.A." have all proved to be fine entertainment and successful publicity for recruiting. "Theater U.S.A." is slated for a presidential citation for its effectiveness in the present recruiting drive.
