Objectivity--- Phooey! Says Kelley

*Healy-Kelley Combo Clicks and
Makes Big Noise on Sports Scene*

ALTHOUGH BOB KELLEY frequently refers to himself as "Ole Kel," he is only thirty-four years old and is already recognized as one of the top sportscasters in the country. (NBC-Hollywood photo.)

AYE, to be sure, Kelley is a grand ole name; a fighting Irish name. And when it comes to sports, Bob ("I have always thrived on controversy") Kelley lives up to the reputation.

One of the current rhubarbs among sports broadcasters, particularly between the Sam Balter and the Bob Kelley schools of thought, concerns the problem of objectivity. Should an announcer adhere to the play-by-play, factual details, or should he stick in his two cents worth whenever he feels like it?

TV-Radio Life recently reported what Sam Balter had to say about the "rah-rah" boys who act as mere "cheer-leaders" for club owners.

Kelley's Turn

This week we listen to what the mighty mite of the mike has to say on the subject. As usual, he has plenty to say, and right to the point:

"A guy that is strictly objective will not last as a sports announcer. Of course I try to be accurate and fair in my reporting, but I make no point of trying to conceal my partiality.

"Even in the field of athletics, radio and television are basically

show business.

"As a broadcaster, I have to sell myself. I not only have to keep my fans, but I have to make them come out to the ball park, even if the home club is on a losing streak.

"As the owner's representative—a personal link between the club and the fans—I have a responsibility to the local club. This is a responsibility that newspapermen and some announcers either don't worry about, or else fail to realize."

But what about the fans who are rooting the other way?

Kelley had an answer for that one too: "Even if they hate you, they still listen—sometimes more so than the fans who are on your side."

Handy Healy

With us at the time of the interview was Jim Healy, Bob's right-hand man. For the past two years, the Healy-Kelley double-play combination (that includes radio and television) has been clicking wonderfully. Originally Jim came from Spokane, Washington, and he worked on the sports desk of the Hollywood Citizen-News before joining the Kelley clan.

Now he writes the entire Kelley-Moran television show, collaborates with Bob in writing the nightly "Parade of Sports" program, and pinch-hits over the air when Bob can't make it.

As Kelley explained it: "It's really an ideal set-up, because Jim not only knows his stuff, but we see eye-to-eye when it comes to sports."

Besides their regular shows, the Healy-Kelley combo are airing all the games of the Los Angeles Rams over a 400-station network of the Liberty Broadcasting System, and eight out of nine of the Loyola grid contests. Although Bob is only thirty-four years old, this is his thirteenth year of calling the play-by-play shots for the Rampaging Rams.

Hectic but Happy

Life gets pretty hectic for Bob at times—he has to change his phone number every three months—but as he explained it, "I wouldn't trade what I'm doing for anything in the world."

For aspiring sports announcers, Bob had some advice:

"Stay out of radio schools. And unless you have a big name in the sports field, such as Tom Harmon or Dizzy Dean, you will have to start in the bush leagues of radio."

That's the way Bob did it. While a high-school student he announced high-school football games at Elkhart, Indiana.

But Bob's a big-leaguer now. From what we've seen and heard, Kelley will be calling 'em as "he" sees 'em for many more successful seasons.

You Can Have Perfect

YOUR TELEVISION set is a good one. It is in proper working order. You know this. You've spent money having it checked and—because you know that any number of experts can't be wrong—you're sure that your set is now perfect.

But you can't get a good picture.

You may have "snow" (weak signal). You may have "ghosts" (multiple signals). You may have interference from automobiles, other TV sets, or X-ray machines. You may be able to get only two or three of the seven stations. Or you may have a combination of any or all of these plagues playing hob with your television reception.

That word "reception" has great significance for you. Has it ever occurred to you that the picture on your screen is only as good as the equipment on your roof? That the picture you do or don't get is only as good as that received by your antenna?

Suppose there were a television clinic you would consult as you

would a doctor in case of illness. Well, here's a piece of good news for you. There is an antenna expert in town who will be glad to talk over your television set's ills on the telephone. There will be no charge. Scotte Gray, whose unique service in bringing television to anyone who wants it will be considered in a later article, is interested enough in his vocation that he offers you any help he can give if you'd care to call him at ARizona 9-7953 any evening after 7 o'clock.

Let's suppose that you're desperate and you decide to call Scotte. Your conversation would begin with four simple questions:

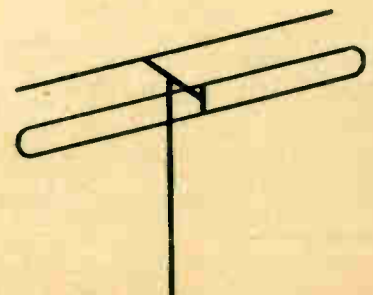
1. What kind of set do you own?
2. Where do you live?
3. What kind of antenna and lead-in wire do you have?
4. How long has it been installed?

\$64 Question

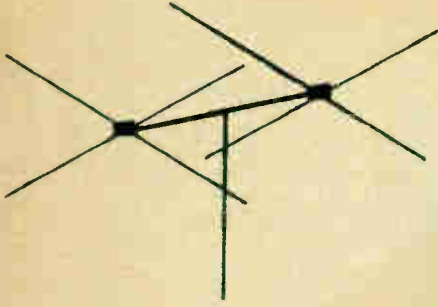
In clinical order you pass your examination easily on the first two questions. Your set is a good one. You live in a good reception area.

The third one is a stickler. You don't know what kind of antenna system is on your roof or whether it is in the correct position. Scotte will then suggest that you get up on the roof, look the situation over, and report back to him.

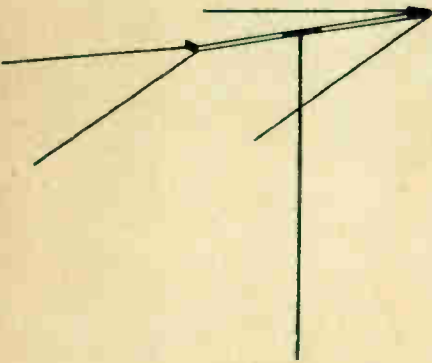
Do you know what kind of antenna you have? There are three types of antennas in general use today. Each is an improvement on its predecessor. In order they are (1) the high-low in-line folded dipole which looks like this:



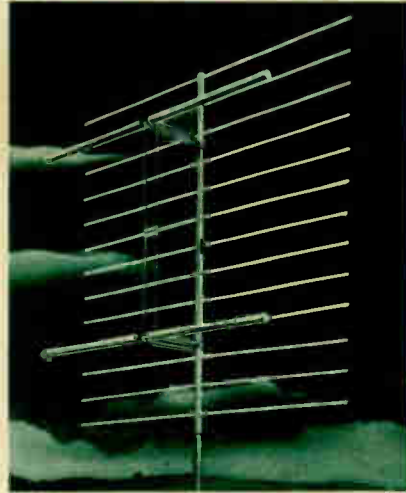
(2) the V-cone, of which there are 1,000,000 in use today in the Los Angeles area:



(3) the arrow, best of the three common types:

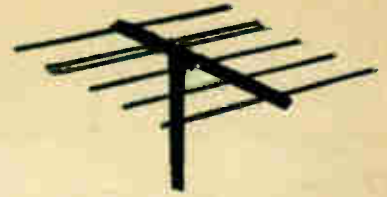


The latest development in the field of antennas is the Gonset Radarray, a really outstanding piece of equipment which goes farther in eliminating "ghosts," "snow" and interference than anything yet developed and has three to four times the "pickup" of the other three. This type bristles on the roof of KTTV as seen in the picture at the head of this story:

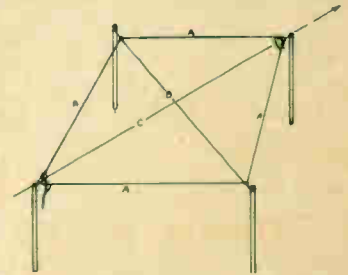


Specialized antennas are the "yagi" and the "rhombic." The yagi is simply a small folded dipole, used to eliminate "ghosts" on only one signal. If you have multiple signal

reception on more than one channel, you must use a yagi antenna for each:



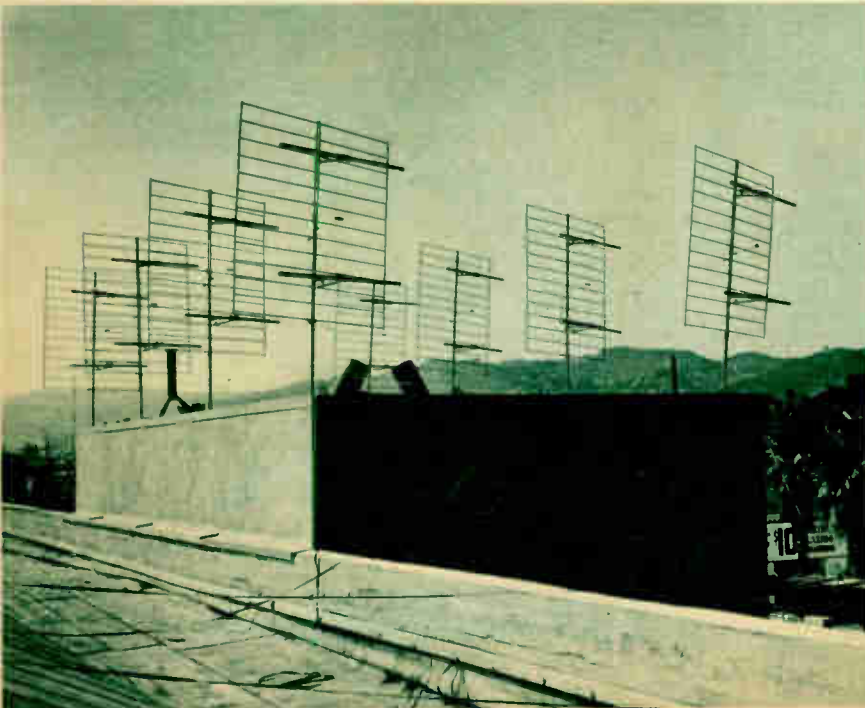
The rhombic is valuable mainly in flat country where you have acres of space. When used on roofs here the rhombic is practically useless:



Well, getting back to our rooftop survey, suppose you find that you have an arrow antenna. So far your set is good, your antenna is good. Now what?

In & Out of Focus (General Comment)

Rumors Are Flying

... That "Dragnet" is definitely set for televising—we hope with Jack Webb on hand. ... CBS-TV is about to do some tall switching of programs to build up the backbone of its Saturday night. ... Dennis Day is going

to get the Alan Young treatment from CBS-TV. His witless fashion of answering and complete naivete should lend themselves perfectly to TV. ... Louis Bromfield is about to follow the pattern established by a fellow novelist, Somerset Maugham. Bromfield will also lend his name, voice, possibly stories and occasional narration chore to TV. ... "Philip Marlowe" is another radio sleuth about to take form on television. ... Robert Montgomery's "Lucky Strike Theater," seen here on KNBH's Channel 4 as it alternates with Somerset Maugham's show, will continue on through the winter, possibly being shown live at a later date.

Looks Like

Health artist Gayelord Hauser may soon appear on TV, telling us for fifteen minutes a week how to look younger and live longer. Some people may say "What a revolting development." ... Apparently everyone, every place, is seeing color TV, with the exception of the Los Angeles area. New Yorkers are used to tint. Then Berliners and the Russians enjoyed a session in color. Now Geneva, Switzerland, has seen a demonstration of large-screen theater TV in color. ... When Jimmy Durante next appears on NBC-TV's "All-Star Revue," his guest will be Margaret Truman. ... Those capsule operas, under the title "Opera Cameos," are due back on TV. ... Jack Benny will don his outlandish Ozarkian outfit of long red underwear and overalls for his first seasonal fiddling, wise-cracking telecast on CBS-TV, November 4. The act was first viewed in the Los Angeles area in March, 1949, when Benny was head man at the inaugural ceremonies of the then-CBS video outlet in this area. The avalanche of requests for a repeat has impelled the comedian to offer it to nationwide viewers. ... Joe Graydon started his "Women Are Wonderful" show on KLAC-TV's Channel 13 on Monday, October 29. The daily audience-participation starts at 9:00 a.m. with Sy Marsh systematically assisting (for some viewers' dough, hindering!) Joe. ... Tennessee Ernie

returned to Cliffie Stone's "Hometown Jamboree" on Saturday, October 27, at the regular 7:30 p.m. KLAC-TV time. Following two weeks of appearances on "Hometown," Tennessee returns to New York for another extended engagement at the Copacabana.

... One of the big soap companies took a single look at the kinescopes made by Pinky Lee and Vivian Blaine and signed the duo for a series which will start on the NBC television net and Hollywood outlet KNBH around Thanksgiving. This funny little mimist, dancer and comic has been away too long. ... Looks like Lawrence Welk, heretofore booked into the Aragon on a two-week option basis, is set solid for six months at a good high price. They love this one not only in Sheboygan, but every place he shows with accordion and band! ... Groucho Marx has a man on his TV show November 1 (KNBH) who is as funny as Groucho himself. Watch for this. ... Next band into the famous Palladium and before the KNBH remote cameras will be Blue Barron and his entertaining dance orchestra, who for some reason obscure to us is just now making his Hollywood debut.

Stop, Listen, Look (Shows You May Like)

"Dixie Showboat"

Monday, 8:00 p.m.
KTLA, Channel 5

At risk of becoming tiresome we drag out once more our favorite moment of televising. It was the night Dick Lane (one of the few on camera who could carry off the moment with complete eclat!) spoke lovingly of the "old Dixie rowboat"! His fumble was generated through allowing the words "riverboat" and "showboat" to cross his mind at the same moment.

It would seem even more incongruous today, what with the riverboat sporting a brand-new top deck on which additional talent can caper. The rise of the "Dixie Showboat" will be denied, probably, by all instrumental in bringing it to a mooring at our television screens. But to this particular reviewer, an uncomplex soul who takes screen fare at face value, the show seems about twenty cuts above what was appearing when "Showboat" first put in.

The acts are far superior. Scatman doesn't seem quite as violent as he did heretofore (a change to the good!), and the comedy routines by John Swor and Harry Cody, as "Popcorn and Peanuts," must be the work of new writers. We don't turn the sound down any more when they come on. Nappy LaMare and his Strawhat Strutters are always good, and have been playing that way for dozens of years each. Incidentally, if you have followed jazz much, and want a laugh, just picture for yourself the faces of Nappy and some of the band boys the night they got the word on those blazers and straw jobs.

The dancing on this show is the best we have seen on TV (outside of "Shows of Shows," naturally), and the new hour-long time gives plenty of leeway for all to strut their respective stuff.—J.P.

Bill Goodwin Show

Tuesday, Thursday, 12:30 p.m.
NBC-TV (KNBH), Channel 4

Afternoon variety shows are up and coming on television's agenda, and Bill "Happy-time" Goodwin has joined the ranks of early p.m. entertainers.

He is aided and abetted by a winning trio ... vocalist Eileen Barton, pianist Joe Bushkin and French song stylist Roger Dann. These three playfully maneuver Bill into "situations," providing him with ample opportunity to clown. At best he is not a comedian, but he joins in the fun good-naturedly, and a good time is had by all.

Bill's forte is salesmanship, and he glides from clowning into commercials with a glib, convincing tongue. Entertainment burden falls onto the capable shoulders of his supporting cast. The format consists of a loosely woven plot around which songs and gimmicks are built. On a recent airing the pace was set by a report that talent scouts were in the audience. Musical numbers included "Thou Swell" and "Never Been Kissed" (Eileen Barton), "She's Funny That

"Search for Tomorrow"

Monday through Friday, 12:45 p.m.
CBS-TV, KNXT, Channel 2

For many years now, soap operas have proven tremendously successful on radio. It was inevitable that sooner or later television would invade this fruitful field.

"Search for Tomorrow" is an afternoon serial which adheres strictly to a soap-opera format.

It is the story of "Joan" and "Keith Barron" in the typical American community of "Henderson." "Joan" is a wife and mother who stands by her husband at all times.

During the past week things didn't look too rosy in this "Henderson" household. "Joan" and "Keith" were having a quarrel—something or other about whether or not "Keith" should teach a photography class at the Community Center, and whether "Joan" herself should devote so much of her time to this civic enterprise.

We feel safe in predicting, however, that by now things have been patched up in this "typical American family."

During the fifteen-minute program there are continuous appositional (e.g., "John, who is my cousin, is coming to visit—") and relative clauses in the dialogue so that even a newcomer to the drama can readily become acquainted with the characters and the plot.

The end of each day's story usually leaves the viewer hanging in the air, so that you will be sure to turn to the same channel the following day.

Except for the visual effect, these are some of the essentials of a soap-opera formula which have been adapted successfully by writer Agnes Eckhardt.

It is the visual effect, however, that this particular program shows to good advantage. Starring Mary Stuart as "Joan," the acting is of exceptionally high quality.

Director and producer Charles Irving has also done an excellent job in changing scenes quickly and in keeping the plot moving at a fast pace.

So, if you are a radio soap-opera fan, "Search for Tomorrow" should end your TV search, today.—T.H.

"Studio One"

Monday, 7:00 p.m.
CBS-TV, KNXT, Channel 2

For the first time since the series' inception we were shocked and disappointed in a "Studio One" presentation, and that harbor a strong suspicion that the property came to TV not from the original novel, but from production reading merely a synopsis.

"Mighty Like a Rogue" dealt with

a petty gangster and his innocently stupid, mountaineer wife who ultimately led the husband and his gang to utter destruction. The original story was loaded with both suspense and humor, and each character portrayed therein was outstanding.

The television play was merely loaded with embarrassing over-portrayals, each outstanding by virtue of being played to the point of caricature.

The young wife, who in the novel-mystery had been merely an uneducated miss whose idea of being a wife included acceptance of an occasional slapping around, was reduced for television into a goggling, cretinish Ellie May who even under grooming and "larning" progressed but little.

"Willie," in the book a dapper sport whose cupidity was relieved by cunning, was on TV a petty crook of the most unattractive type, and a dupe of unbelievable proportions.

The head of the gang, another principal of the book we so enjoyed, was rendered nothing but laughable by this same TV offering. You are all familiar with the quick, dark type of mobster who has risen by his wits and biting talk? Well, this yokel didn't fit even that trite pattern.

Our attention was so taken by the fantastic distortion given our own precious mental conception of the story's principals that we watched with mouths agape until the last dull line of dialogue had been mouthed. Maybe "Studio One" knows exactly what it's up to, after all. But how about the folks that didn't read the book?

(This reviewer, by the way, will make every effort to find the original novel and pass along to you the title. Then all who saw the above sad saga can judge it against the original, just for kicks.)

Perry Como Show

Monday, Wednesday, Friday, 8:15 p.m.
CBS-TV, KNXT, Channel 2

One of the easiest and most emulated of the crooners seems scarcely to turn a hand toward entertaining the three times a week we see him amble onto a TV stage. This high entertainment quotient arises from dividing the thrice-weekly fifteen minutes among old songs, new songs, guests, the Fontane Sisters, and Como himself. There's something for everyone.

Take this Friday's bill of fare. Guest April Stevens will sing, "Aw! Come On." Perry's solo is "My Blue Heaven." With the Ray Charles Chorus he sings "Loveliest Night of the Year," then the Fontane Sisters do "Rollin' Stone."

Musical fare is augmented and supported by the frailest sort of visual business now and then. Literally no fanfare precedes anyone's numbers. At its high production best the show is kicked off by Perry Como strolling on stage, pitching a bit for Chesterfield and then introducing this casual, listenable quarter hour of melodic relaxation. But the show is just long enough, presents just enough talent and is just unbusy enough to emerge as extremely pleasant viewing.—J.P.

... To one particularly informative, complete and timely telecast made over KECA-TV (10:30 p.m.) by Chet Huntley, on the eve of the British elections. With the aid of John Hutchinson, distinguished British economist, Chet not only gave a complete analysis of the election, but also added to the dramatic impact of the historic event. ... To Mary McAdoo's clever Halloween suggestions and decorations, which were not only explained explicitly enough so the layman could grasp the know-how, but early enough so that same layman could employ the ideas for Halloween, not Thanksgiving. ... To the commercials run between every two of the three Monday-night movies on KLAC-TV. Until sponsorship showed up, it all seemed pretty ordinary and tiresome, but the second the dollar was to speak, some thought was generated. Of course the simplest gimmick on earth is used. The spiel is for dog food—so a dog comes out and relishes the product. But can you think of something that gets the word across better? ... Doug Edwards's airing of the news, directly from New York, on CBS-TV's Channel 2 each night at 8:00. Mr. Edwards lives up to every viewer's conception of a newscaster through knowing his news, not reading it frantically while he pretends to know it as some of Mr. Edwards's local contemporaries seem to do.

We View With Alarm

The departure from KNBH of two shows. One is Gene Bollay's weather report. Too bad. And Willock and Arquette's leave-taking after three years of being carried by the station probably sorrowed the powers at Channel 4 as greatly as it did the rabid coterie who must have silently vowed they would buy anything—ANYTHING—made by anyone who would sponsor this wonderful twosome back onto TV. It is the lack of foresight and taste on the part of the potential sponsors who didn't that in this case is viewed with great alarm. ... The sorry pace set by production and cast members of this year's crop of "One Man's Family" antics. Heretofore Carleton E. Morse has moved the plots and dialogue along at a fascinating clip. Possibly the bogging down came as a result of reorienting old viewers and bringing new ones up to date on the expectancies and happinesses of this institutional bunch.

The absence from our television screens of Fleetwood Lawton, who is an outstanding analyst and commentator, not a mere newscaster. Mr. Law-

Before any confusion arising from your natural thought, "But Sinatra's on at 5:00, and Berle not till 8:00!" takes full sway of your mind, let us explain. Sinatra comes on live—Miltie by kine. Every living soul in or east of Omaha, Nebraska, gets the duo on his set at exactly the same time . . . and never the twain shall meet.

Mr. Sinatra was aided in his asinine sketches and stunts by Jackie Gleason. so in-demand a comic that Sinatra and CBS-TV, in lieu of meeting Gleason's price per show, considered themselves lucky to pay him off with a brand-new Cadillac! While Gleason was being very amusing, Sinatra lingered wanly in the background, only occasionally sparking any reaction—at least from us.

It's a safe bet that viewers shot to attention at the broad caricaturing, for an instant, of an effeminate type. Aberrations of any sort are in bad taste when played upon, but this sort of thing is usually reserved for shows banned to minors. We know ours was a *horrified* attention!

Finally Sinatra backgrounded himself by staring out over some mountains from the apparently moving cab of a locomotive and broke into "Beyond the Blue Horizon" in a voice that would, in 1942, have shaken him with shame.

At best the whole thirty minutes were dismal and in our opinion Gleason provided all the entertainment supposed to have come from him and from Frank Sinatra.

Handy Hints

The hint is:
A HANDY WAY TO STORE THE COLLAPSIBLE CLOTHES DRYER. You know how these clothes dryers always seem to be in the way in the garage, whether standing or lying down. Well, try this way of storing them: take a man's discarded belt and nail it to the fireblock of one wall of the garage. Then stand the dryer up and bring the belt around it and fasten. It holds the clothes dryer snug against the wall and is out of the way of everything.

HERE'S A WAY TO MAKE A DIN-NER BELL FOR YOUR PATIO. First go to a junk yard and buy three old brake drums of graduated size. Each drum naturally will have a different tone when struck. These you hang one

below the other by a small chain, put through holes already in each drum. Then the group of three are hung on a bracket in the yard and painted. The bell has an oriental look and gives a clear and melodious tone.

YOU CAN MAKE "WATER-LILY" CANDLES OUT OF THE SHORT ENDS OF CANDLES THAT ARE USUALLY LEFT LYING AROUND THE HOUSE. Place a small aluminum salad mold over a very low flame and melt the remnant of a candle. Remove the wick. Take mold from the fire and let cool until the wax begins to cloud, then hold the wick in the center of the mold until the candle hardens enough for the wick to stand alone. After candle hardens completely, re-heat the mold for a few seconds, and the candle will loosen from the mold. Lift candle out by wick. Then surround with waxy leaves in a low bowl. The floating candles resemble water lilies, and when lighted they make an unusual flower arrangement for the table.

IF YOU HAVE AN OLD BASSINET IN YOUR GARAGE, why not make it into a patio cart? You use the stand of the bassinet and out of plywood you make shelves and a top. Then paint it and use as a tea cart.

HERE'S A WAY TO HAVE A LIGHT IN YOUR CLOSET WITHOUT HAVING TO FUMBLE FOR THE STRING. All you have to do is open the door and the light will turn on, without having to put in expensive wiring. First put two pieces of string on the small ball chain, then lead one string to the screw eye on the inside of the closet and one to the top of the door. Now when you open the door, it automatically turns the light on.

TV-RADIO

Lifelines

LAST WEEK CBS-TV ARRANGED FOR ME to make a trip to Mt. Wilson to look over the newly installed KNXT transmitter. I was eager to go, because I had not visited the TV mountain for three years. At that time it was humming with construction activity, for back in 1948 television was just beginning to burst big on Southern California.

THINGS HAVE SORT OF SETTLED down now on Mt. Wilson. Each of the seven stations and the telephone company are established in substantial quarters alongside their antenna towers, which stick high up, close to one another, in a small area on Wilson's crest. The architecture of each is different, some using stone, others concrete, still others wood. But all are sturdy to withstand the snow and cold which this mile-high location receives in winter.

RIGHT IN THE CENTER OF TV ACTIVITY, the weatherman holds forth in a tidy little building. Though shut off in a little world of their own, the people toiling in TV atop Mt. Wilson do not comprise a social unit. I asked several and they said the main difficulty in getting together was the different shifts in duty. Except when snowed in, a majority of the technicians working at the transmitters commute to homes located in the foothills. They don't seem to mind driving the hairpin-curved road. They do like the wonderful fresh smog-free mountain air and look pityingly down, as I did the day I visited Mt. Wilson, at the flatland communities below, circled with a heavy blanket of gray smoke and mist.

ABOUT THIS TIME EVERY YEAR, the fellows working at the transmitters start stocking up on food. They never know when some snow might isolate them. They also have to have on hand plenty of spare parts in case something goes wrong with the telecasting equipment.

THE FOLKS GET A TERRIFIC TV PICTURE ON Mt. Wilson. The weatherman said the image came in on his set so forcefully that he had to rig up a tinfoil shield to subdue the picture.

KNXT (FORMERLY KTSL) HAS BUILT AN attractive redwood building for its newly-transferred-from-Mt. Lee operations on Mt. Wilson. While waiting for arrival of Ed Cousy, CBS engineer from New York who came here to supervise installations, I met a very interesting man in the person of W. J. Gonyea, whose specialty is erecting and servicing TV and radio towers. He was just putting the finishing touches on the KNXT tower and that very afternoon was climbing it for the twenty-fifth time to be sure that everything was in order.

MR. GONYEA CLAIMED THE KNXT TOWER WAS the largest of its type ever made by RCA. He said he had had "a finger in all the TV towers on Mt. Wilson." In the business for thirty-two years, he has erected many radio towers—KFSG, KMPC, KNX, KGO,

KROY, KFRC (in 1928), and KPHO in Phoenix to name but a few, and also towers for Armed Forces in Alaska. He started his unusual occupation as a young man in Duluth, Minnesota, where his first job was scraping and painting a ninety-five-foot flagpole on top a sixteen-story building. He received \$50 for three hours' work.

MR. GONYEA, A RUGGED-LOOKING BUT VERY PLEASANT MAN, appeared to take his rather hazardous KNXT job in stride. He seemed happy about successful conclusion of his assignment, for guy space had been a problem as the tower is located very close to the edge of a cliff. He expected to move his base of operations over to KLAC-TV's transmitter as soon as he was through at KNXT. Seems there was some repair and maintenance work that station had been waiting to have done.

THE SLEEPY OLD INN STILL STANDS near the observatories on Mt. Wilson. It almost seems to disregard TV's intrusion on the mountain top, except for the presence of a TV set in the lodge sitting room.

I SHOULD PROBABLY IGNORE A rather nasty postcard from someone signing himself or herself "a reader of your magazine for years." But I should tell this reader, in case his or her gripe was legitimate, that my authority is Webster's Dictionary, Fifth Edition.

WENT TO MY FIRST FAN-CLUB LUNCHEON last Wednesday when

On the Ball

with Bob Kelley

Throughout the history of sports, there has been one pre-eminent rule: When you lose, don't cry!

But for some reason or other, there has been more crying during the current collegiate football season than in any year I can remember.



The weeping, for the most part, has had to do with so-called "dirty play." Southern California's Trojans have been the chief victims, being charged with playing dirty after they had beaten Washington and California in recent games.

Actually, there is a very thin line of demarcation between rough play and dirty play. I was guest speaker at a banquet the other night, along with UCLA's fine coach Red Sanders. Red was asked about all the charges of "dirty football" going around this year.

"Well," Red replied, in that slow Southern speech of his, "I myself am not sure where rough play ends and dirty play begins. Any time a ball club plays rough, tough football, it's a cinch someone is going to accuse them of playing it dirty."

I'm not trying to give the idea that anything goes in football. Some players have a trick of rolling on and trying to twist opponents' legs, after a tackle has been made. That is definitely dirty football. So are slugging, elbowing and kneeing. In fact, Drake's Jimmy Bright suffered a broken jaw a couple of weeks ago when an opponent deliberately elbowed him in the face.

However, these are rarities. Coaches and players have a right to cry about such tactics. But what I resent is their wailing every time one of their own boys is injured.

I recall the Notre Dame-USC game of last year, when no less than seven Irish players had to be helped off the field. USC was playing rough that day, maybe a little too rough in spots. But that is the way the sport was meant to be contested.

Incidentally, all these charges against the Trojans this season, added to the ruggedness of last year's game with Notre Dame, should make that December 1 encounter between the Irish and SC one of the roughest in football history. I just hope the loser doesn't start crying about "dirty football" once the final gun sounds.

My attitude on the whole subject of a losing team wailing about its opponent's tactics can be summed up by a statement that Casey Stengel, the New York Yankee manager, made this past baseball season. After his team had won the crucial game from the Chicago White Sox, and the tears began to flow from the White Sox

Now that "City Hospital," the recent drama to appear on radio, has gone TV for ABC it is expected that the air show may soon be picked up by ABC, instead of present net, CBS.

... Two feminine vocalists have signed their talents to new enterprises. ... Hawthorne

Hawthorne is a pretty funny guy. He can also be serious and down-to-earth when he wants to be.

He proved this last Tuesday night on his regular "Encore Night" show, during which time he plays old musical records. On that night Jim put on one of the finest shows he has aired in a long time.

The occasion marked the anniversary of Al Jolson's death, and Hawthorne played some of Al's oldest and most popular records. The list included the original recordings of "You Made Me Love You," "Swanee," "The Spaniard That Blighted My Life," "Sonny Boy," "Mammy," and "Rainbow Round My Shoulder."

There was nothing sensational or startling about the program. As Hawthorne said at the very beginning, it was not intended to be "gushy" or oversentimental.

Besides having a nostalgic atmosphere, it served as a reminder that we are not hearing enough Jolson records these days. During his sixty-odd years of singing, Al made hundreds of recordings, too few of which we hear on the air.

Throughout the entire hour-long show (which ran overtime, incidentally) Hawthorne and his two guests, Andy White and Harry Akst, conducted themselves admirably.

Without cluttering up the program with meaningless eulogies, they told both serious and humorous stories (sometimes even conflicting ones) about each of the records played.

Andy White, a prolific record collector and one of the original founders of CBS, appears on the Hawthorne show every Tuesday night. Harry Akst wrote many of the

"Against the Storm"

Monday through Friday, 11:30 a.m. KECA

A continuous airing of soap operas seems to be reason enough that radio will never die. Daytime serials vie with listeners for their attention and to replace competitive sudsers as a regular listening post. "Against the Storm," a firmly established daytime serial, returned to the air with the same scripter, Sandra Michael, setting the pace. In 1942 this program won the Peabody Award, the only daytime radio program ever to win such an accolade.

The present episodes at "Harper University" concern "Professor Allen's" young daughter and her recent hurried marriage to a young man of whom the Allen family did not especially approve. From all indications, the daughter's marriage is headed for the rocks, as she heads for the East leaving her husband distraught in San Francisco. The story line is woven around the family affairs and the university life, with the scenes transferring smoothly from the academic to the worldly.

This daytime drama has its share of tears, laughter and crises, but then that is what gives any soap opera its appeal. This one is without a doubt better written and more nearly approaches what is called "realism" than many other such radio stories. Sandra Michael puts sharper dialogue into the mouths of her "Against the Storm" characters than do many scripters of nighttime drama. A better-than-average group of actors dramatizes the plot and this fact counteracts any maudlin scenes which may occur in the episodes.

"Against the Storm" will prove a juicy addition to those who live on a steady soap-opera menu, or it would prove a good choice for morning feminine set-siders who only have time to spend with one daytime tear-jerker.—A.G.

New York Philharmonic

Sunday, 11:30 a.m. CBS, KNX

For your Sunday afternoon listening pleasure (and sleeping music), the New York Philharmonic symphony is back on the air for its twenty-second consecutive season.

If the opening show serves as any indication, this full hour and a half of classical music should have another successful season.

With the famed Dimitri Mitropoulos acting as maestro, and after a Mozart selection, the major portion of the initial program was devoted to the magnificent production of "Arlecchino" by Busoni. Starring John Brownlee, the famed one-act operatic comedy was done entirely in English.

This in itself is a remarkable and indicative achievement. We sympathize with the cultured class who insist that "there is really no substitute for the original, really there isn't"—but some of us do not agree with them entirely. An English production half-understood and enjoyed is far better than an all-foreign opera none of which is understood.

James Fasset was also on hand again for his Green Room interviews. His first guest for the year was Gian-Carlo Menotti, author of the famed opera "The Medium." Mr. Menotti had just returned from Rome and he told of his interesting experiences—and tribulations—while making a motion picture of his work in the Italian capital.

Because of time limitations, the second portion of the

Eddie Cantor

A few more shows like Cantor's new radio series and the ether die-hards can be proud of their medium. The memories of forty-two years in show business have left Cantor with a rich deposit of anecdotes. His recollections and intimate stories about celebrities are natural lead-ins to recordings by these stars.

The trip down memory lane on the initial ailer included stories about Al Jolson, Fanny Brice, Will Rogers, Jimmie Durante and Sophie Tucker. Undoubtedly some of the records in Cantor's library are collectors' items. Listening to Fanny Brice's old arrangement of "My Man" one could hear the scratches of the well-worn grooves.

Will Rogers's humorous monologue on the speeding car may have been waxed twenty-five years ago, but its context is as apt and timely today.

Sentimentalists both young and old are bound to like the asides on old-time celebs, as well as the musical arrangements of yesteryear. However, the Philip Morris commercials, delivered by Cantor using the same narration pace, proved annoying. Eddie, leave the commercials alone, syruped sales methods often have an adverse effect.—M.R.

"Big Hand"

One of the better and most recent additions to radio's adventure stories is "The Big Hand." It is aired by the editors of the men's fiction magazine Saga, with a deliberate effort to offer masculine-type action plots of the sort Saga publishes regularly. From the introduction which went something like this, "All men are but grains of sand in the palm of the Big Hand," and "There comes a time when all men see their past, present and future crowded into one moment of time," one can foresee the kind of scripts to be dramatized.

A recent airing was set in the North Woods of Canada, where men, airplanes and rifles were fighting snow and wild weather to collect expensive furs. It concerned the lives of three men, "Mike," "Dutch" and "Skully." There were a number of highly dramatic moments before the three were marooned in a blizzard and displayed their true characteristics. In addition to relating Northland escapades, the story also contained the basic moral drives of good and evil in men.

The broadcast was successful in creating a stark realism which is characteristic of intense adventure. It was a little slow in getting started, but later the fast action

Masterson Collects Zulu Recordings

Paul Masterson, CBS's "International Disc Jockey" in Hollywood, is in the odd position of being as popular outside the United States as he is within. The most recent magazine article to appear about him was in the Dutch magazine "Our Light Music," or "Onze Lichte Muziek," as it is known in Holland.

The Amsterdam publication corresponds to America's DOWN BEAT and is widely read by Dutch music enthusiasts all over Holland. The magazine printed a complete story of the International Disc Jockey program, together with a portrait of the star of the CBS-KNX show.

Masterson's most recent acquisition of unusual phonograph records came from Johannesburg, South Africa. Three of the melodies in the shipment include arrangements in Zulu of "Rag Mop," "Mama, I Want to Make Rhythm," and the hymn "When the Saints Come Marching In."

FROM BROOKLYN to Broadway to "Bumbling Bobbin"—these, in brief, are the three big steps Jackie Kelk took to climb the ladder of success.

Starting as a child star of screen and stage, and later famed for his "Homer" role in the "Aldrich Family" shows, Jackie, at twenty-eight, is now the star of his own TV program.

As "Young Mr. Bobbin" he portrays a young man near his own actual age, with "two left feet" and a mania for getting into—and out of—mischief.

In real life, Jackie lives in a bachelor apartment in midtown New York and maintains a fruit farm at Pound Ridge, New York. Besides his theatrical career, he dabbles in various business undertakings and also writes some sketch material for revues and musical comedies.

To reverse the old saying—Mr. Kelk is a Jack of one trade (acting), and a master of many.

DOROTHY BROWN, ABC's Western Division continuity editor, states, "Trying to define good taste in TV is like pinning jello down."

Miss Brown's reaction is typical. The advent of video has caused the continuity acceptance (or script editing) departments of the various networks and stations to put in an extra supply of blue pencils and to originate some additional rules of good taste to match the radio regulations which exclude from our eyes and ears what we don't want to see or hear.

Each broadcasting outlet has a continuity department, the "censoring" office by which all script material that is broadcast and telecast must be screened. The multitudinous references which must be omitted include (only partially) such material as that pointing up specific minorities, sacrilegious, profane, salacious, obscene, vulgar or indecent things, drunkenness, details of crime, and countless other mentions obviously in poor taste, as well as the almost inscrutable references at which someone, somewhere, will take offense.

Video, to say the least, complicates the work of the groups of the excellently informed, highly specialized continuity workers.

Good Taste?

"Reading a video script is no in-

dication of what the show looks like. Seeing the show in rehearsal gives no clue at all as to how it actually looks on camera. The effects of lighting are so unpredictable, and the facial expressions of the actors so difficult to foresee, that all we continuity people can do is edit the scripts, stand by to advise, and trust to the good taste and discretion of the director," Miss Brown explains.

In the early days of ABC's "Space Patrol," Miss Brown's many worries extended to concern about the possible nightmare-causing effects of the show upon the pint-sized members of its audience. Now she has come to realize that in some ways, futuristic fantasy doesn't give the kiddies as many danger-making ideas as gun-toting cowboys may.

"Good taste in television," she explains, "is a thing we won't be able to arrive at for some time. Viewers vehemently protested the gowns of the TV-necklines' first

glorifier, Faye Emerson. Today Miss Emerson's wardrobes are accepted warmly, and by now they might be considered sedate set-side garb."

On With the Dance

Ballet is another of the censor's concerns, as Dick Bennett of NBC's local office explains. "Lighting often distorts the dancers' movements and makes them unintentionally suggestive. We hear from our audiences about such breaches, via heavy loads of mail."

Television, however, is bringing a new and more "revolutionary" type of advertising to the fore. Formerly, such merchandise as alcohol was not permitted to advertise on radio, but video commercials on beer and wine and on funerals and mortuaries are among the precedent-setting pictures that are permitted on our screens.

The new visual problems do not allay in any way the censorship problems which constantly plague

radio. Broadcast acceptability itself is in a constant state of flux. For instance, William Williams, head of Mutual-Don Lee's continuity, points to a new trend in the portrayal of the police on local radio.

"About four years ago," Williams recalls, "police squads were sadly depleted and there was much concern among officials about the effect of ludicrous radio enactments of the police on the public's opinion of the law enforcers. We were asked to cooperate by making our private-eye-type detectives a little more realistically competent than they had formerly been portrayed.

"A rash of Mexican villains on dramatic shows also brought protests from Los Angeles's large Mexican populace," Williams mentioned. "The scripting had been unintentional, but such criticism points up the fact that we have to make the race, religion, and other identifying traits of our characters as amorphous as possible. We will always get complaints from someone."

Unintentional use of real names which writers believe to be fictitious often causes trouble. "Klondike Kate" was a Gold Rush legend, as so writers of "Fibber McGee and Molly" thought, until NBC was sued by the lady in question.

"The Warehouse Association recently protested the fact that so many radio murders were being committed in warehouses," commented Bill Storke of NBC.

Often songs are rejected because of their titles or lyrics. "The Half-Fast Waltz" was a recent addition to one of the station's vetoed titles lists.

What next?

In adhering to their broadcasting and video codes, continuity staffers have a difficult job, but they are helped by the fact that standards they are attempting to uphold are not arbitrary ones. They have been drawn up at the behest of the "voice of the public," since we all have a part in registering our opinions of the things we want to see and hear.

while relaxed Barbara Whiting and Darryl Hickman enjoyed the ride . . . entered Mabel Stark's cage to get some "candid" shots of the wild-animal trainer and her tigers . . . dangled from a helicopter to get some shots of a "gangster" making a getaway in a speeding car, and when Howard Duff was surf-casting, Coy almost caught the hook intended for the wily fish.

Because these two employ candid newsreel methods, they present off-stage Hollywood as it really is . . . a refreshing contrast to stilted, scripted material. Odd and rare bits of information are gathered by Hollywood's Rover Boys while combing the city. Charles Coburn is the only motion-picture star they've met who actually lives on Hollywood Boulevard . . . Ina Ray Hutton is the only star they've photographed at a pool who willingly dove in to demonstrate her aquatic prowess . . . Spike Jones, prowling about a junk yard in search of new musical instruments, found a car muffler which produced an out-of-this-world sound. Just right for his band, they thought.

The "Reel" not only presents the stars but it also reveals tricks of the movie trade. The studio prop man is an important factor in the art of deception. Movie ice-cream cones don't melt because they are made of mashed potatoes. Spider webs are made to order using liquid rubber and a mechanical gadget. Even the spiders are fooled by their authentic likeness. Snowballs are made of cotton and tissue paper sprinkled with water and sugar to be sure they look just right for that movie scene. And after you've seen the arrow that never misses . . . it's on a wire . . .

you realize how important the prop man is to Hollywood.

Friendship

Our Rover Boys met twenty years ago, working for the now defunct Los Angeles Record. Coy was cub photographer and "Skinny" office boy. They recall Mickey Cohen, with that I knew-him-when attitude, for he was the newsboy selling their paper. (Mickey has been associated with newspapers more recently, but in a completely different aspect.) In the intervening years, Erskine had become a widely read motion-picture columnist and Coy a successful freelance still photographer. The accidental renewal of their friendship, after years of separation, gave birth to "Hollywood Reel."

Erskine sets up the appointments with the stars. As a movie columnist, his contacts have proved invaluable. Coy, using a sixteen-millimeter camera, shoots all his scenes outdoors, taking advantage of natural light. The two decide what action their subjects are to pursue, brief them, and the camera starts rolling.

"As the camera starts turning, I direct the actors, keeping them moving. After all, this is a motion picture," explained Coy. "Skinny" holds the reflector while his mind dwells on the narration he'll dub on the sound track after the film is edited.

"We want our subjects to appear natural and discourage any hamming. Waving or staring at the camera is taboo. The only hams we tolerate are the stars' pets, who seem to have an uncanny instinct and willingly pose for us . . . the Rover Boys in Hollywood."

Local Yokel Makes Good

OFF TO A GOOD start" is the way critics summed up the first 1951-52 Don McNeill TV Club show produced by George M. Cahan.

A native of Philadelphia, Cahan spent the past three years on the West Coast directing and producing television shows for ABC. He joined the McNeill organization in Chicago last August.

As the first TV director for ABC's western division, Cahan helped to launch KGO-TV in San Francisco and KFMB-TV in San Diego. In 1949 he became executive producer at KECA-TV, Los Angeles, and directed "The Ruggles" show for 94 weeks.

The entire Cahan family is in television today. His only brother, Herbert, is program director for WAAM-TV in Baltimore. His father, Louis B. Cahan of 660 Park Lane, Germantown, Pennsylvania, sells television sets.

Even his wife, Alice Talton, is a free-lance movie and television actress. The former Atlanta, Georgia, girl recently was seen in two motion pictures and on the "Front Page Detective" and Alan Young television shows.

Cahan started as a radio actor on a children's hour in Philadelphia. By the time he was eighteen years old he was program director on WTNJ, Trenton, New Jersey. After playing summer stock in New England, Cahan enlisted in the army in 1941.

This wealth of experience is evident in Cahan's handling of performers and production on the Don McNeill TV Club, which shows a new deftness and smoothness.
