"I Covered The Story..."

*Says Each Guest as Listeners Hear
Inside Accounts of Jail Riots, Dope
Addiction, Murders and Germ Warfare*

EARLY LAST spring a fifteen-minute show was dreamed up and put on an Eastern station. The idea was to have a reporter appear each week and tell a moderator how a story was discovered, then covered. The commentator was to be six-foot-one Arthur Van Horn, who explains his vast knowledge of a lot of things by saying, "I specialized in college in foreign affairs and international stuff."

"Story" Time Popular

The show is now off the local station and going cross-country on a full network, ABC's radio web. The production department was quick to see that when such men as veteran New York Daily News reporter Joseph Kiernan, who covered the Arnold Schuster murder case, told how "they found Schuster four doors from his home, in the shadow of a tree, with two bullets in his head and two in his abdomen," people are going to listen . . . by droves. That same principle lies behind the success of many a tabloid. Let the facts supply the drama.

Of "I Covered the Story's" twenty-odd shows, eight have been with newspaper reporters, five with reporters and writers for national magazines, and four with radio reporters. Stories covered have ranged from germ warfare in Korea to the mysterious green fireballs seen in our Southwest. Murders, jail riots, dope addiction and political conventions have been discussed.

While an avid mystery reader might put down his book only to hear the grisly details of a crime covered, a political convention would leave him coldly more interested in the antics of his favorite private eye. But most people sense immediately and strongly the authoritative quality of the show.

The feeling that these reporters know—really know—what they are talking about impresses instantly.

Holding the Copy Down

The listener hears but fifteen minutes of narration and exchange between reporter and host Van Horn. And this is the trickiest part of producing the show.

"These reporters speak so naturally and so well and have such a great deal of background in their story that a fifteen-minute interview often stretches to thirty, forty or fifty minutes. Then we have to edit it down, and what a heartbreaking job!

"Bill Davidson, reporting in Collier's magazine on our Arctic defenses, gave a solid one-hour-and-fifteen-minute interview. Every minute was fascinating, tremendously exciting material. There was enough for at least four programs. Editing wasn't easy.

"Some of the high spots of the programs have been Herbert Philbrick, ex-FBI undercover agent in the Communist Party, now a Herald-Tribune

writer, telling how he saw England's Red Dean of Canterbury at a Boston meeting attended only by top-level Communists; Helen Worden, telling about her story in Today's Woman magazine, which dealt with babies of dope addicts being born with their parents' craving for narcotics; and New York Times U. N. reporter 'Abe' Rosenthal telling how his newspaper 'obtained' a copy of the Peking newspaper which was supposed to 'prove' that the U. N. was using germ warfare in Korea, and explaining how he used experts to show the Communist pictures were fake."

Nor do the stories we hear Saturday nights on KECA radio present but one side of any picture. An endorsement of this fair coverage lies in a letter to the show. A convict wrote that Newark News reporter Arnold "Pete" Martin had covered the Trenton jail riots very well, was excellent on the program, and had given both sides of the prisoner-vs.-warden controversy.

Both Van Horn and Martin consider this a great compliment.

Willson only starred. The brown-haired, blue-eyed commentator lives on Park Avenue in New York, and escapes city life by golfing and fishing or by hunting lens fodder for his own camera.

George Putnam Finds Out What It's Like

GEORGE PUTNAM classifies himself as a news reporter. That is as distinguished from a news analyst—or a commentator. He believes in finding out for himself what it's like to make news.

For instance, George found out for himself and his viewers what it's like to wash windows seventy stories above Manhattan; what it's like to be blind; what it's like to land a plane on top of an automobile.

Never Again

After he perched suspended high up on the outside of the Empire State Building, he decided a window washer's job can be reserved for window washers. George feels that the fellow who makes his living that way

can't feel as George did about the job. He's frank about it's being a completely frightening sensation, and one not to be repeated.

Deciding to find out what it's like to be blind, George Putnam had himself blindfolded and spent one entire afternoon roaming New York with the aid of a seeing-eye dog. He climaxed the experience by taking a train to Long Island.

He was first to describe for an audience the dubious thrill of landing an airplane on top of a moving automobile. Putnam had been a passenger in a Piper Cub which descended to rest on top of a standard Ford sedan.

Another time Putnam wanted to give his television audience some

Who Said Hollywood Was Hard-Hearted?

One Industry in the Tourist's Mecca Pitched in Wholeheartedly to Help The Man Who Almost Lost an Actor's Most Indispensable Ability—Speech

DID YOU ever hear the story about the girl in Pokeville, Midwest, who ran off with her best friend's husband? Probably not. She wasn't well known.

But you have heard the stories of Walter Wanger's carelessness with a gun, Errol Flynn's carelessness aboard a yacht, and Tom Neal's carelessness with his fists. These chaps are well known. They live in Hollywood and work in the movies.

Not Good Reading

And with every such delicious headline there grows the feeling that Hollywood is a hard-hearted, soft-headed place where people sin it up like crazy. Several pages behind these headlines, in the same papers, there is almost a cinch to be a story about new funds poured into a home for the movietown once-great, or a tale of personal rehabilitation, or mention of a new drive for any one of a dozen worthy charities. But this sort of dry doings goes on every day in Hollywood, and doesn't make very spectacular reading.

Here's another Hollywood story, little-known, but just as spectacular, in a different way, as the current shooting scrape or wife desertion.

It started back in the thirties. A blond young man was working on radio and in pictures. Not a star. Just one of the group of reliables who were called back to show after show because they could be counted on to do a good job. Then his show buddies began to notice that John Deering many times missed his place in the script or had to be nudged into action.

"S'pose Deering's hitting the jug?" some of them whispered. Kinder cast members merely admonished him "Better hit the sack early tonight, John, you act knocked out."

The puzzled actor was neither hitting the jug nor missing sleep. But he was due for a knockout. A big one. And it came. Unfortunately it arrived the first night the envied Deering was to do commercials for the coast-to-coast Louella Parsons show. He stepped to the mike, opened his mouth, and crashed to the floor, senseless. His growing brain tumor had finally taken over.

Hollywood was shocked, then forgot him in the years that passed before Deering's emergence from first, the hospital, and second, the darkness that pursued his operated-upon brain.

During those years, untold misfortune piled upon Deering and his family. John's sister, Betty Pruitt, took him in. As a result she lost her husband and was left with the care of a sick man and two children. And no money was coming in.

True, the Motion Picture Fund poured \$11,000 into Deering's care, but even it had to stop some place. AFRA helped. But the debts piled up, and the breaks got worse.

Finally, upon the advice of a physician, Betty Pruitt had to give up John's care. Mentally, physically and spiritually sick, John's only hope of salvation lay in getting onto his feet. He had to be literally thrown out and onto those feet.

That was a little over a year ago. Now John is working in TV films almost daily. He has been on "Big Town," "Dragnet," and the "Hoppy" films. "The Affairs of China Smith" used him; and producer Berman Swartz of "Duffy of San Quentin" wrote a permanent role into the series for John. Others too numerous to mention gave him jobs.

And how did this happen? Hard-hearted old Hollywood came through—again.

The Cure for Unemployment

Newspaper columnists wrote about John. A trade-paper columnist worked unremittingly at getting John early roles. His eagerness to do well and his resultant performances assured him further work. A network had its photographic department run off some 300 "slicks" like the pictures on this page. A press department wrote a long biography that accompanied the pictures to producers of both TV and radio. The trade columnist not only addressed and licked the envelopes that went out, he was busy playing agent in another way.

Betty Pruitt, desperately in need of money for her family and further medical care and therapy for her brother, had gone into business for herself. She, with the help of one worker, turns out Jacques Salad

Dressing. The columnist helped see that she and her product were spotted on various of the TV cooking shows.

The work of getting Deering going again wasn't glamorous. It was hard, risky, and time-consuming.

But it paid off. You've seen John Deering on your TV screen. He's the forty-six-year-old man with the strong face and thinning, light hair. He doesn't say much on the screen. But he does a good job.

John is the "down-and-out" actor whom Hollywood, hard-hearted old Hollywood, didn't kick casually in the teeth. It took good care of him, just as it has many others you never hear about. But this "taking care" doesn't make very good headlines!

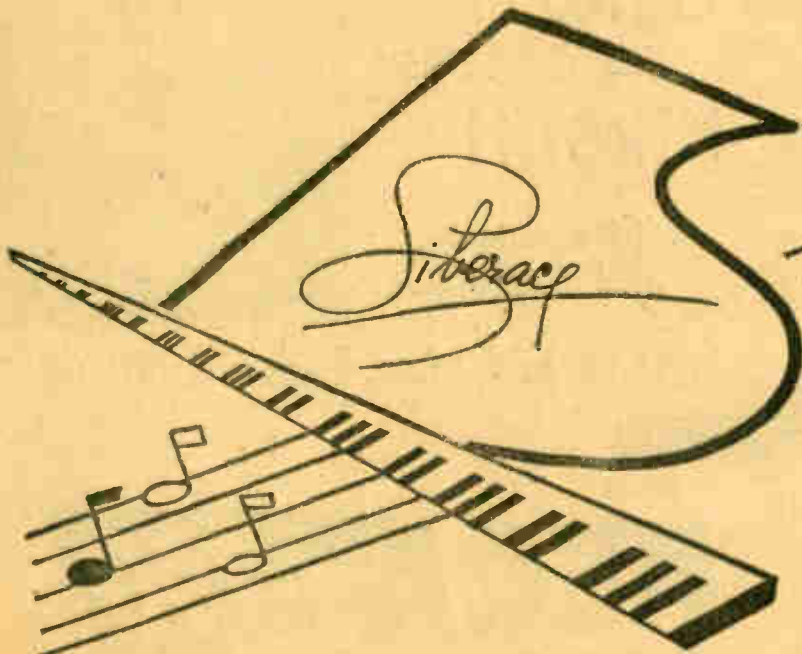

AS WE GO TO PRESS I HAVE JUST come from a luncheon date with KTTV's News and Special Events Director Roy Maypole, who was so full of Election Night plans that he scarcely paid attention to mere food.

ONE PROVOCATIVE ITEM OF CONVERSATION concerned a newsman's control of his emotions during a heated telecast. Roy admitted that anyone

appearing on TV was many times more vulnerable to displaying his true feelings than a person whose contact with the audience was by voice alone. "You just have to act impartial," Roy said, shaking his head warily. "Your livelihood depends on it."

HE ALSO FEELS THAT IT IS A GRAVE MISTAKE for well-known stars to come out for candidates. Roy believes that some stars are so idolized that no matter what they recommend, some persons would agree. Voters today should do their own thinking and make their own choices, not cast their ballots for a candidate just because that candidate is endorsed by someone whose acting (singing, dancing, glamour) the voter greatly admires. It seems to me that this year the motion-picture personalities have taken a greater interest in the political campaign than ever before, so Roy Maypole is hitting right up their alley.

BY NOW THE INCIDENT OF THE

STATLER Hotel telecast and the speech of the President of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce are gone with dead headlines and this reporter has no intention of combing the already threadbare story of how KTLA's Klaus Landsberg found it necessary to cut the speaker off the air because his remarks were in bad taste and offensive.

CONSIDERING THE INCIDENT IN A CONSTRUCTIVE LIGHT, I began to wonder what effect it would have on similar future telecasts. As you probably know, no sooner had Mr. Drinkwater (and also Mr. Xavier Cugat) been faded than both KTLA and the Statler Hotel were inundated with telephone calls. One person estimated

that the hotel had over 2,000 calls by 2:00 o'clock the next morning and KTLA had not only hundreds of telephone calls requiring an extra operator, but mountains of mail. The calls to the station were 99 per cent commendatory.

LANDSBERG WENT TO THE AFFAIR AS AN INVITED GUEST—in fact, he directed the telecast in a tuxedo. He told me that he had anticipated that the ceremony was to be a "dignified affair, not a stag party." When the first questionable references came out on Channel 5, he was reluctant to order a fade. His feeling was and is, "Whenever you cut a man off, it's a serious thing. To draw the line where free speech ends and bad taste begins is very difficult." Placed in the position of not only directing the program but of censoring it, Landsberg turned in one of his own best performances. Later I asked him what would have happened if someone else from the station had been directing and he said, "All of our directors have instructions to guard against bad taste or any expression that may offend any person or group in our audience. This has always been emphasized in our weekly meetings, but the other night pointed an example."

WILL KTLA, OR ANY OTHER TELEVISION STATION for that matter, screen speakers in the future? "It is impossible to do this," in the opinion of KTLA head man. Will scripts be required to ensure avoidance of distasteful remarks? "No," again from Landsberg, "unless we wish to sterilize"

the medium. Some of the spontaneous presentations are the most successful and sincere. But we'd love an outline of a proposed speech," Landsberg suggested, probably as a happy medium between script presentations and complete ad libs.

THE LEGAL ASPECTS OF SOMEONE being cut off the air leave room for speculation and argument. Also, the implications of damages from careless remarks are food for thought. Suppose, just for example, that a hotel or some other concern suffers cancellation of accommodations or business orders due to remarks of someone being considered offensive. Would both the speaker and the broadcasting or telecasting outlet be liable? Or the speaker only? Or would stations be able to protect themselves with a disclaimer?

To sum it up, Landsberg feels that the whole Statler incident has resulted in greater consciousness of a station's responsibility to its audience and renewed efforts to keep the medium clean. Incidentally, you who heard Landsberg's radio instructions to the station when he made the decision to cut the speakers off must have realized it was a cross-over when Landsberg's remarks accidentally went out over the air. Fortunately he used no four-letter words!

In order to create the called-for effects that add realism to a radio show, they must sometimes invent new devices and must do plenty of research. KHJ's crew, like those at other stations, has met the challenge nobly.

Some of the unusual effects they have re-created are: Native boy sliding down a giraffe's neck; Indian sneaking across desert sand; boy dropping 73 cents on a wooden counter; Wright brothers' first plane taking off at Kitty Hawk, and a body ripping through canvas canopy after falling from the fifteenth floor of an office building.

DISC-USSION: Again available on Decca is the great Jimmie Lunceford recording of "Blues in the Night," completely filling both sides of a ten-inch disc with that fine jazz instrumental touch that only Lunceford could produce. . . . Also reissued on the same label is Jimmy Dorsey's dual-tempo'd version of "Yours" with Eberly-O'Connell vocals. . . . George Lewis and his New Orleans Music (Good Time Jazz) provide the Deep South touch on "Mama Don't Allow," "Willie the Weeper," "Burgundy Street Blues" and "Yaaka Hula Hickey Dula" — all recorded in the Crescent City two years ago and featured on their recent appearance at the Dixie Jubilee. . . . "Twelfth Street Rag" (Coral) features the twin accordions of Lawrence Welk and Myron Floren on what looks to be a Big One for the popular Champagne Music maestro. . . . It's not in tempo, but there's an unforgettable version of "Eli Eli" just released on MGM featuring Lionel Hampton's orchestra, and nothing but downright beautiful. . . . Jo Stafford (Columbia) could have a big double-feature in the folksy "Keep It a Secret" and the lovely ballad "Once to Every Heart," with its full backing by Paul Weston's orchestra. "Heart" is the better material, but "Secret" will sell the platter. . . . Strictly for laughs is the zany "Crazy Waltz" by Capitol's Helen O'Connell and Gisele MacKenzie. Letting their hair down and making like a hill-billy sister team, it sounds like the gals had a ball when they made it. . . . Best of the four John Arcesi sides to date on Capitol is the oldie "I'm Alone Because I Love You"; his easy, relaxed singing to Lloyd Shaffer's lush muted string background should get it plenty of whirls. . . . Rusty Draper's "Angry" (Mercury) could hit the winner's circle, but "Blue Tears" on the flip is just an attempt to attract some of the Crying Man's fans. . . . Billy Eckstine (MGM) does his unusual best on "Be Fair" and "Come to the Mardi Gras," but Mr. B. needs something showier to display his full-voiced style, in spite of the solid Cuban beat by Nelson Riddle's orchestra. . . . This story begins in September, 1948. The scene: Municipal Stadium in Cleveland.

The event: a pro football game between the oft-beaten Chicago Rockets and the Champion Cleveland Browns of the All-America conference.



The time: the first quarter.

On an ordinary off-tackle play, a tall, lanky half-back for the Rockets was tackled hard, and accidentally kicked in the head. There was no sharp pain, only a dull ache in his head.

Merely as a matter of instinct, he finished the game. To this day he doesn't remember what happened the rest of that Sunday afternoon. He doesn't even know what the final score was.

On Monday, his day off, his head continued to bother him.

On Tuesday, they took x-rays.

On Wednesday, he was told he had suffered a severe fracture of the skull just above the right ear.

After a month in the hospital he returned home. The headaches continued. When he finally tried to play some basketball in an inter-city league, the ball would blur in his eyes, and his reflexes and timing were way off.

Only twenty-four years old then, it looked like his career was ended. His devoted wife and many of his friends advised him to quit football forever. Having established a name for himself, and with a good business in his own town, he could have lived off the fat of the land.

But he didn't want to quit. Because of other injuries and lack of material, his three seasons with the Chicago Rockets had been very disappointing. He knew within himself he had potentialities for gridiron greatness.

Besides, he loved football. And he didn't want to be remembered the rest of his life as just another ex-pro football player.

But what else could he do? With his head in the condition it was, how could he play? Also, one more bad kick and he might be permanently injured.

He was ready to retire, when a long-distance phone call from Clark Shaughnessy changed his mind.

The following year he played half-back for the Los Angeles Rams, but never carried the ball. A special head-guard protected his skull from further injury.

The rest is football history.

The Perfect Choice

New Emcee of "Lux" Is Former Actor and Director Who Knows All the Old-Timers and Wants To Get Acquainted With the New

WHEN WILLIAM KEIGLEY announced that he was giving up his position as emcee of "Lux Radio Theater," there was quite a to-do over appointment of a successor. I don't know why.

After meeting Irving Cummings and chatting over a meal which was of minor importance compared with his fascinating conversation, I thought he was a perfect choice. He has one of the richest backgrounds in Hollywood. Vital, enthusiastic Mr. Cummings, veteran of stage and motion pictures in which he starred, and subsequently a noted film director, has never kept a scrapbook. He really doesn't need one. His retentive mind prompts an easy conversation and a steady flow of recollections, anecdotes and commentaries. Shirley Temple, when he was directing her pictures, used to get his white trousers dirty when she climbed on his knee. As much as any magazine layout, Mr. Cummings treasures a simple sentence, a quote from Shirley to an interviewer: "Mr. Cummings is the most sensitive and lovable director with whom I ever worked."

"Lux" would have an exciting broadcast schedule were it to present during the next year some of the films which Cummings has directed. Such broadcasts would star, besides

Shirley Temple, Alice Faye, Rosalind Russell, Loretta Young, Herbert Marshall, Gene Tierney, Bob Hope, Rita Hayworth, Betty Grable, June Haver, and two of his discoveries, Tyrone Power and Janet Gaynor. He first saw wistful little Gaynor in a casting-office waiting room, knew instantly she was just the type for a role he needed to fill and demanded that the studio sign her at \$75 a week, "Else you'll have to buy her back from me at \$250."

Though Cummings had never seen a broadcast nor spoken into a microphone before he put the nineteenth season of "Lux Radio Theater" on the air, he was well fortified with legitimate-theater and movie acting experience. In fact, he might have been a great motion-picture star instead of a director. Years ago, when he was making a personal appearance in Oakland, he was asked to do the lead in the picture "Male and Female." Try as he could, Cummings was unable to wiggle out of his stage commitments, so Thomas Meighan was handed the part which zoomed him to stardom. Cummings made the first feature-length film, played leading man to Lillian Russell, Ethel Barrymore and Alice Brady. He was also the star of the longest adventure serial ever filmed.

Something New

To great movie-maker Cummings, radio is an adventure. One broadcast and he had a humble appreciation for the "Lux" technicians, the adaptor, and the director. He marveled that a motion picture of two hours' duration could be whittled to forty-five minutes without impairing essentialities.

Cummings is equally enthusiastic about television, which he thinks is the only up-and-coming medium. He and his charming wife, former leading lady Ruth Sinclair, are especially fond of TV sports. Cummings also likes shows like "I Love Lucy" and "Studio 1," but thinks that TV stars will burn themselves out in the matter of a couple of years if they insist on making weekly appearances. He is also of the opinion that people will grow tired of seeing the same personalities every week, year in and year out. As far as Cummings is

concerned, Bob Hope and Bing Crosby might be exceptions to the rule, for he thinks Hope "the most refreshing comedian in the business" and of Crosby says, "I adore that Bing."

Serving as "Lux" emcee necessitates a weekly trip for Cummings from his sixty-acre ranch in Carlsbad, where he and Mrs. Cummings make their home. And though it was an ordeal for this veteran actor and director to talk for the first time into "that little black monster," Cummings eagerly welcomed the opportunity to come back into public life and meet some of the young stars making their appearances on the famed radio program. His wife, to whom he has been married for thirty-five years, is equally pleased over his new assignment. Mrs. Cummings doesn't watch rehearsals or attend the broadcasts. "The banker's wife doesn't go to the bank with him and the lawyer's wife doesn't go to the office with him. Why should I go to work with you?" she says. "I will listen at home and get my butterflies there"

TED LENZ, WHO WAS everything in radio from station manager to free-lance announcer, and who not only produced coast-to-coast radio shows but emceed them, sells people today on the idea of "call right now." He says Gypsy usually sews up sales for him.

HOW MANY times have you, personally, wondered all the way through a TV drama or a movie "Who are those stars?" Yet come commercial time and you immediately recognize the man who appears to tell you of the wonders of a new kind of tile, a food product, or the garbage disposal that will reduce that food "quickly and quietly" to nothing.

Your own reaction may be adverse and violent. But you are in a minority. Most viewers not only stick with their "pitchmen" friends—they buy their products.

Proof positive of this lies in the fact that an established TV pitchman can run his monthly "take" into four figures—and does, frequently. Some of them gave up solid niches in the radio world or in sales promotion to become pitchmen. They accept the title happily—along with the big cash and friendly recognition.

The real pitchman is a man who pushed peelers and gadgets on the Atlantic City boardwalk. The spiel was perfectly synchronized with the demonstration. Hands and words flew. You have seen them on TV, too. Sid Stone, who touted Texaco for Uncle Miltie a couple of years ago, was an actor who went to the boardwalk and studied to become one.

You've seen real "hair men" in the half-hour Antell product commercials, paraded as entertainment under such titles as "A Hair-Raising Tale" or "Animal, Vegetable, Mineral."

But for the most part the pitchman who is a popular personality is the guy who sold a product successfully one night, received a call from an agency to do commercials for them, and went from there.

Ted Lenz left a highly successful radio career to do TV commercials. Today he is the only pitchman who has a pitchman working for him! Ted's huge list of commitments for

the Martin Gilbert Agency started to conflict with one another. Rather than give up any time, he hired a chap to do the spots he couldn't take. Of course Ted, for all that he is personable, quick and capable, has a real edge on his competitors in Gypsy, a small white Sealyham who has wriggled and worried her way into the hearts of every TV viewer who has seen her. Seeing her isn't difficult. She does about thirty shows a day with Ted, speeding with him by car among Los Angeles's seven TV outlets. On the KNXT daily movie she appears six times. Ted and Gypsy sell and sell and sell.

Another pitchman who graduated into a real TV personality is William D. Haupt, known as "Hoppy." Hoppy is a Loyola graduate who went into teaching, left that for the management of a sales firm, and left that when one night he had to replace a missing actor doing a commercial on TV for Hoppy's company. The response was so great he continued.

Hoppy's forte is being just like the guy next door. Balding, he shuns a toupe because the fellow next door wouldn't wear one. He doesn't watch his weight because the fellow who would lean across the back fence and tell you about this great refrigerator buy he'd found isn't a trim example of sartorial splendor.

As a result he has worked every station in town, and has done more than 8,000 TV commercials, counting his years in New York, when Time Magazine wrote about his way of selling appliances and found a new meaning for the term "pitchman."

There is one actual, honest, straight-from-the-boardwalk pitchman on TV who must hear his casual contemporaries called "pitchmen" in complete amazement. His name is Phil Green, and with the greatest facility and rhythm possible he sells "sets of seven," glass cutters and other enchanting work-saving devices. As the peelings fall, his words pour out. You seldom see his face.

He taught cadets how to fly and piloted a Mustang on the ETO front. After his discharge he returned to his airlines operation. Became KNX's Morning Host in 1949. Radio bounced him right back into the wild blue yonder. His sponsor sent him on a month's flight around the world to tape-record interviews with Californians stationed overseas.

About six months ago, Ralph was chagrined beyond reason. His Siamese cat, Tale, was the cause of it all. Ralph had lived peacefully with his wife and son in a North Hollywood apartment until he acquired his cat. When the management turned thumbs down on pets, Ralph purchased a house. The tale of Tale would end here except for the fact that the house is twenty-seven years old . . . the doors, floors and windows sag . . . and there's a gushing stream running underneath the foundation.

Ralph knew the house needed painting and minor repairs, but he didn't suspect it needed to be completely renovated. After regaining his composure, Ralph aired his housing miseries to a sympathetic and amused audience. "But," says Ralph in a resigned manner, "the hilltop breezes make the whole project worthwhile."
