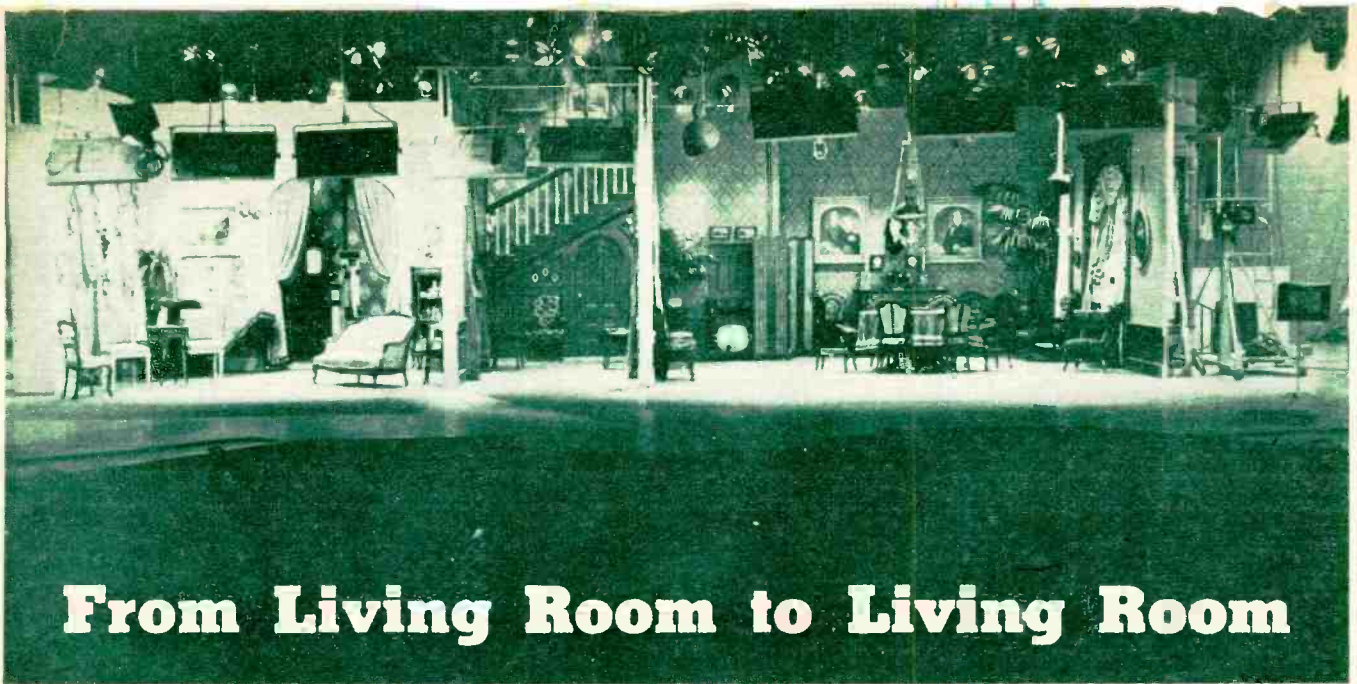

## From Living Room to Living Room

 **CONSTRUCTION OF THE PERMANENT SET** of "Life With Father" was the biggest and most painstaking job that has yet been accomplished at CBS Television City. The sets are in varying shades of light green to harmonize with the bright red hair of the "Father" cast. To the smallest detail, it is a duplicate of an original Brownstone home during the Victorian period. (CBS photos.)

**I**T WAS inevitable that "Life With Father" would come to life on television. As the longest-running play ever to appear on the legitimate stage, and as a best seller, the Clarence Day creation has become as much a part of American culture as the Statue of Liberty.

The idea, and even actual plans, for doing "Father" on TV has been knocking around for some time. CBS-TV was the latest to get the urge.

Everything was finally set. Certainly the material was there. The series of plays would be shown at CBS-TV's new Television City, a perfect set-up for a large scale production. With CBS-TV's dough and know-how it seemed that "Father" couldn't miss. One all-important element was missing however. The key man. The man who would co-ordinate the entire operation; the producer.

### Mr. Markle Enters

Whether it was luck or fate, the "boy genius" of CBS-TV, Fletcher Markle, happened to be out here at this time. Markle has built up a reputation as a "trouble shooter" for CBS. When "Studio One" seemed to be slipping a little, Fletcher went back to New York and put the "Studio" back on its feet with a respectable rating.

Back home now (he's married to Mercedes McCambridge and lives in Bel Air), CBS officials showed him a list of programs they were contemplating. "Father" caught Fletcher's eye immediately.

"I wanted to do it. I knew it would be a challenge. There was a tremendous amount of material—the three

books, 'Life With Father,' 'Life With Mother,' and 'God and My Father,' plus two Lindsay-Crouse plays, and hundreds of other anecdotes from various manuscripts—but there was also a tremendous amount of work yet to be done," Markle explained one afternoon sitting at Television City in front of the gigantic set.

"Life With Father" seemed to me to be a perfect format for a TV program. It is a representational comedy as differentiated from a presentational comedy, such as a Hope or Benny show. It belongs to, and represents, so many things and so many people. It goes from living room to living room—from Father's own living room at the studio, to each and every living room having a TV set."


### At Last!

Markle began the monumental task on September 1. By November 22, after hundreds of tests and auditions for the parts, and endless rehearsals, the famed play was ready for presentation over the CBS-TV network.

"The original play itself comprises only three half-hour TV shows. The rest had to be created by some of our finest writers such as Whitfield Cook and William Roberts. Script is all. Each program is a complete show in itself," Markle explained.

The finished product, starring Leon Ames as "Father" and Lurene Tuttle as "Mother," can be seen each week on Channel 2.

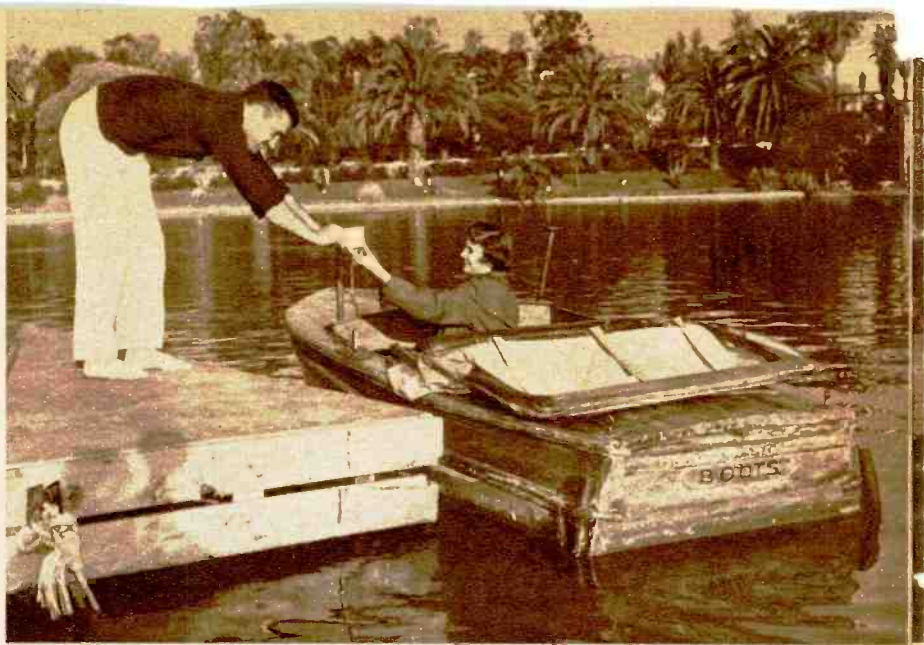
There is one part of the entire operation that will never be seen, and one that Fletcher Markle will always remember: interviewing over three hundred boys for the children's parts!

# The Funniest

**T**HERE was the guy who crouched behind the garbage pails in back of DuPar's Restaurant on Vine Street as part of his outside assignment for CBS's "People Are Funny." Irv Atkins, Art Linkletter's outside man, was supposed to bring the guy in at the end of the program, but somehow or other he, and everybody else, forgot. An hour after the show had signed off the air and the cast was eating dinner at The Derby, someone remembered and, conscience-stricken, rushed up the street to rout the chap out.

He wasn't at all mad. Only thing he muttered was "Pretty long program!"

Then there was the minister's wife who went on the show and was promised \$1000 if she kept quiet for a week. She buttoned up her lips so tightly and played it so safely that even when she went back the following week to collect, she kept mum. You see, she had become a contestant at exactly 7:15 p.m., and considered technically that, the week wasn't up until 7:15 p.m. so she wasn't going to spoil her chances by talking at 7:10!

On another program they sent a perfectly respectable man outside the studio looking like a bum. He was told to go into a restaurant, order a big dinner and when it arrived, say to the waitress: "Look, ma'am, I'm broke." This stunt was designed to test the generosity of the waitress, who would be stuck with the check or unpleasant explaining. In this instance, the girl offered to pay for "the bum's" dinner, which rated him a prize for completing the stunt, and her a trip to the Sahara at Las Vegas. The girl was so overcome however that she didn't grasp the idea and, phoning the good news to her husband, said: "Darling, we get a trip to the Sahara Desert, you and me!" It took some doing to set her straight between hotel and hot sands.

## Refused

One woman who said she needed money was offered \$100 if she would break a mirror on the show; but she refused. Said she wouldn't break one for a million!

This was a twist, so far as Guedel knows, for his experience has been that women are more apt to cooperate in stunts because they're more anxious than men to get money. "Men have more false dignity and pride," observed Guedel. On the other hand, women make better contes-

tants because they are less inhibited in their talking and, on the whole, less stuffy.

One chap, however, seemed to have his whole personality changed when he won a cross-country trip. Instead of the meek, compliant fellow who had appeared on "People Are Funny," he became the type to order waiters around, was eager for publicity, and always preening before pulling into the next stop. "How many newspaper people will be meeting me?" became his invariable query. A quiet little school teacher changed for the better after she had won a 'round-the-world trip on "People Are Funny." She came back home the smart, sophisticated type, and began making travel lectures; a turn which still tickles Guedel who likes to point out that she made her big trip by air in only eight days—"all she saw was airports," he jibes.

They had quite a time on the show when a chap was assigned the job of hitchhiking to the East, using nothing but cigarets as bartering material (this was in the war days when cigarets were often worth more than all kinds of money). Three days after the young man had been given a send-off he phoned—from Pasadena, of all places. That was as far as he had progressed because his

overcoat had been stolen. He got another coat and made out okay; came back to Los Angeles and married a girl who had heard him on the radio.

There was another interesting romance when a young lady who won a glamour trip to Colorado for the purpose of meeting eligible young gentlemen at a Junior Chamber of Commerce convention came back home and married the fellow who lived next door. Apparently a little competition, or threat of it, headed this stalemated romance to the altar.

Adventure is another lure on "People Are Funny." In response to a "blind" newspaper ad offering exciting adventure, eight persons showed up to investigate the proposition—one was a gal, and one of the seven men was quite wealthy. Told that the adventure was a space trip to the moon, and given a chance to back out, not one did. Meantime their remarks were being taped for the program.

Adventure in the stock market was the exciting lot of one contestant; a cleaning delivery man, who was entrusted with \$1000 with which to play. The chap, who applied him-

self diligently to his investment, was often seen studying the financial pages of the papers while munching lunch on his route. As a result he reaped a tidy profit of \$800 though the New York Stock Exchange was a bit worried until he did, and went so far as to call Guedel and express concern over the stunt should it turn out adversely. Guedel convinced them it would be great if the man made a little dough—it would show quite convincingly that one man can go into the market and do all right even though he doesn't know as much as Merrill, Lynch, Pierce, Fenner & Bean.

## Reactions

The studio audience, man-on-the-street, and listeners seem to be pretty tolerant. According to Guedel, they like to see contestants get away with things and even if they are unaware that they are contestants they are easy-going. One time a contestant stood right out on the street and syphoned gas out of a car, but nobody except a small boy bothered

to report the incident to a policeman planted nearby. Another contestant purposely tried to pick a man's pocket in the "Meet Millie" line in front of CBS. The test was to see how the "victim" would take it. After the "thief" put in an eloquent plea and threw himself on the victim's mercy, onlookers voted seven to one to let the fellow go. The victim complied.

Audiences, on the other hand, are very unsympathetic with anybody trying to make jokes. They'll laugh at him or her, as the case may be, but they won't applaud to get them on the show or help them win. Basically, "People Are Funny" specializes in putting usual people in unusual situations, and generally it's the women who like to volunteer to be placed in such situations. It is estimated that thirty per cent of men's wives volunteer for them. But whether male or female, self-elected or nudged by mate, it's the contestant who doesn't try to be funny who'll be the funniest. That's one reason, says Guedel, that now and

then when occasion demands, he employs "regulars." They're great extraverts, he claims, and adapt to whatever is needed. "But," he adds, "they know the key of not being funny. Basically, the most serious person is far best for our shows," he holds. "The people who are serious are funniest."

But, above all, the best contestants are the ones who are natural. That's why Guedel often makes a hasty scrawl on a big sheet of paper which he holds up for the contestant to see while he's on mike.

The scrawl reads, "Be yourself."

# No War In '54

Says KLAC-TV's Clete Roberts

as told to

▲ **CERTAINLY ONE OF** the most respected and authoritative world-wide news analysts is Clete Roberts. His regular news shows and "Street Corner, U. S. A.," are seen regularly on KLAC-TV, Channel 13.

**I**T'S PUTTING a guy on the spot to ask him to make global predictions for the year 1954. But if any man is qualified for the task it is certainly world-travelling Clete Roberts of KLAC-TV. A keen, sharp analyst, who is one of the most respected men in the news field, Clete took a quick trip around the world with us, predicting what he thinks will happen:

"First of all, 1954 will be a 'hot' year for news. There will be no world war in '54."

#### Rest of the World

**England** — Churchill will step down. He will give up his idea of trying to achieve world peace in his time. Health permitting, Anthony Eden will take over with little change in British policy.

**France**—It's presumptuous for anyone to predict what the French will do during the coming year. About the only safe prediction to make is that the French will again change the skirt line of women's dresses, and there will be a new French premier. Seriously however, I think the French will demand some sort of "show-down" on the French Indo-China war. Relatively, that war is costing the French people more than the Korean war cost the American people. The French, through the United Nations, will demand either complete victory or relinquish any claims on Indo-China.

**Germany**—Germany will not unite

in 1954. The *status quo* of the East and West separation will be maintained. But Germany will grow in power; economically, politically and militarily. Within twelve months it will be recognized by all nations as another major power. Also, there will be no Austrian peace treaty in 1954.

**Russia**—Moscow, under Malenkov, will continue its "peace" offensive. Despite the "soft attitude," Russia's intentions will always be the same: complete world domination. They do not believe that Capitalism and Communism can co-exist in the world. The "peace" offensive will give Russia a breathing spell. Russia was badly hurt by World War II, it will be five years before she can risk the possibility of a military attack. However there may be some sort of non-aggression pact between the East and West. But it won't be worth the paper it's written on because one of the signatories (Russia) is an out-and-out "bandit."

#### Asia

**Middle East**—The British will not leave the Suez Canal. Israel, with only 2,500,000 people, would never directly attack the Arab empire of 22,000,000 people. If an outbreak occurs, it will be an overt act by the Arabs. Strange as it may seem, if the Arabs do attack the smaller but spirited Israel, the Arabs will get the pants kicked off them.

**India**—India is not as susceptible to Communism as many Americans think. India regards herself as the

"Switzerland of Asia." She will work actively to keep up that position. India wants peace so that she can continue to build her own nation. In 1954, despite many improvements, there will still be no material change in India.

**China**—Watch out for Red China. Some interesting developments may occur. Mao Tze Tung may not be as prone to take directions from Moscow as he has been in the past.

**Japan**—There will be economic problems in Japan for the United States. The Japanese will look for markets for their manufactured goods and will find them in Russia and China. The United States will protest against this. Politically, Japan will stay with the United States.

**Korea**—No unification in Korea in '54. Russia will continue to build up her armies in North Korea, and will build bigger and better air fields.

**United States**—In this country, Eisenhower's political popularity, as differentiated from his personal popularity, will decrease about ten per cent.

"There's one last thing I would like to say," Clete concluded. "Although I may have sounded pessimistic about some phases of 1954, many good things will occur. For example, in '54 there will take place the first mass test of a new polio vaccine, plus many other great advancements to benefit mankind. I believe we should all be realistic—and optimistic—for 1954."

"I have news for you, gentlemen," **Ralph** replied. "We are doing **Mr. Cantor** on that night." Because of the **Warners'** phone call, however, it was decided to do a part of the show direct from **Broadway**.

**Ralph Edwards** himself also had quite a surprise directly after the telecast. A certain **Private Hilford** of the **U.S. Marine Corps**, who incidentally comes from "Truth or Consequences," **New Mexico**, approached **Ralph** at the **El Capitan Theater**.

"**Mr. Edwards**," **Private Hilford** explained, "there are fifty **Marines** waiting for you down in the basement. Would you follow me please?"

No, they didn't court-martial **Citizen Edwards**. They made him an honorary member of the **U.S. Marine Corps**. Naturally, **Ralph** was thrilled.

### Frenchman Views TV

**Maurice Marsac** left the Parisian stage four years ago for Hollywood, television, radio and motion pictures.

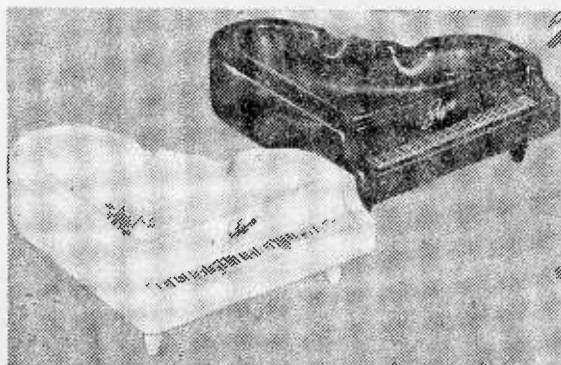

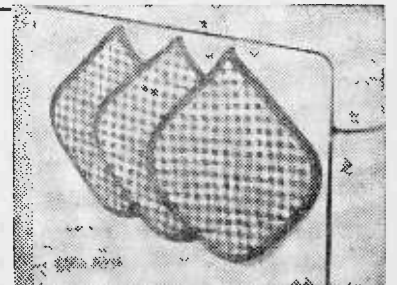

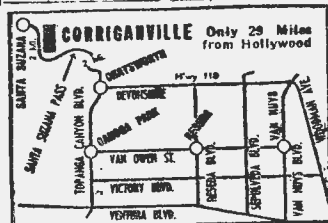

# Lifelines

So Hawthorne starts a TV show on Channel 5 in the spot occupied recently by "Flyboy!" Plans call for Jim doing the type program he used to on KLAC-TV. Hawth is one of my favorite people—has been ever since the old KXLA days—but he's moved around from station to station more than I like. Let's hope he's in soon for a long run.

**THE AIR IS FULL OF CONFLICTING** reports about color TV and some of them are sparked by the newspaper ads signed by the Better Business Bureau. I've heard that set dealers didn't want the FCC approval of the NTSC compatible system to break until after the Christmas buying was over. But the approval went through. Tenor of the ads, in case you missed them, was by way of assuring potential TV set buyers that they should go ahead despite the color announcement and buy black and white. I have a hunch TV merchants started the campaign rolling.

**YOUR GUESS IS AS GOOD AS MINE** as to when color will really arrive for appreciable commercial consumption. However, it should be pointed out in color's favor that NBC plans to do every one of its teleshows at least once in color during 1954. Also, General Sarnoff did express himself that sets would start coming off the line approximately six months after formal approval of the new system (probably February) and that they would be 14 inch (not 12½). For what it's worth, we'd also do well to recall that, so far, every milestone in TV has arrived much sooner than expected, even to the coast-to-coast hook-up.

**ONE OF THE SOBEREST BROADCASTS** of the holiday season was CBS-KNX's "Dead Stop," which aired the night before Christmas Eve. It was horrifying and ghastly in portions, but all the more to drive home the program's theme—traffic fatalities. Release of the hour-long show, one of several CBS "Feature Projects," was timed with grim calculation and cunning to slow down seasonal accidents. Tape recordings of patients' moans, prayers, sobs and stories at the scenes of the tragedies pounded in stark facts. **Stu Novins**, who used to head up KNX's public service operation in Hollywood before being beckoned to the network in New York, was responsible for "Dead Stop," which should be played back in every school in the country. Narrator **Red Barber** finalized with a poignant expression when he said he was more than mildly interested in traffic campaigns. Three years ago, he told his audience, his mother-in-law was fatally injured by a careless driver. It happened just the week before Christmas.

**ART BAKER, WHO HAD A DALMATIAN** on his ABC-TV'er, "You Asked For It," fell in love with the breed and before he knew it, **Rudd Weatherwax** had bought a puppy for Art. The Bakers named it "Mrs. Chips." After the puppy had had only three weeks' training and was only nine months

old MGM "called" her for a role in "The Student Prince." She's been working steadily. "That makes everybody in our family a ham," laughed **Alice Baker**.

**WHERE DOES PAUL MASTERSON** get all that pep so early in the KECA.M? . . . Didn't **Andre Previn** prove a most interesting guest on **Bill Balance's** late CBS show? . . . Nice holiday parties this year, among them that of the **Hollywood Palladium** . . . **Kenyon & Eckhardt** agency continues its fine custom of by-passing gifts to editors and instead, adopting six foster war children in the editors' names . . . Saw both **Roy Rogers** and **Dale Evans** at Hollywood Women's Press Club Christmas party, where Roy and his missus received the Golden Apples as most cooperative actor and actress of the year. Dale told me her book, "Angel Unaware," was selling third highest in the entire country. She's writing another, devotional in nature.

**FEW WEEKS AGO I COLUMNED** an item about difficulty TV-Radio Life staff was having uncovering award-meriting radio shows for its Distinguished Achievement honors. Furthermore, I said radio wasn't coming up with much creatively and that this was no time to slough the job.

**CBS VEEP AND PROGRAM CHIEF, Guy della Cioppa**, responded to my plaint by lunching and explaining some of the posers confronting today's radio scheduler. General idea seems to be that radio can do a good job in the daytime (when very essence of daytime activities mitigates against TV), but that the real challenge to radio is shaping up at night, when TV listening hits its peak between 7 and 10 o'clock. It's then that radio must supply new patterns and at the same time, take heed of financial structures. Right now, said Mr. della Cioppa, programmers are exerting every effort to attract listeners. Instead of nabbing one big audience the way radio did before TV, I think radio may settle on a scheme to draw different segments at different times, which amounts to the hard way of getting the big audience. But could be very effective.

**BACK TO TRAFFIC, THE BEST** quote on careless driving, for my money, was on **Ralph Story's** show: "If you're going to have 'one for the road,' take it literally—and pour it on the street."

**TIMELY BARB (JOHNNY JACOBS)** introducing **Harry Babbitt** on "Second Cup o' Coffee"—"and here's a man who's determined he's gonna see snow on Christmas Day, even if he has to watch a kinescope!"

# Record Notes to You

In reviewing the records of 1953, we certainly had variety in style and material, running the gamut from motion picture scores to a child's novelty tune, and recorded in many tempos and patterns. According to the record-buying public, here is the order of their acceptance:

- 1. SONG FROM MOULIN ROUGE:** Percy Faith's Orchestra (Columbia) was the topper, with its luscious vocal by Felicia Sanders.
- 2. VAYA CON DIOS:** Les Paul and Mary Ford (Capitol) latched on to this charming waltz melody and nobody else ever had a chance. However, strictly for laughs, did you ever hear Wingy Manone's gone version?
- 3. DOGGIE IN THE WINDOW:** Nobody but Patti Page (Mercury) and Homer & Jethro (RCA-Victor) had the nerve to make this little gem, but now it's their turn to laugh instead of the reviewers like Mansfield.
- 4. I'M WALKING BEHIND YOU:** This was another slow starter, but once the Eddie Fisher (RCA-Victor) platter started spinning, versions by Sinatra, O'Connor, Damone and the others were lost in the shuffle.
- 5. YOU, YOU, YOU:** One of the Ames Brothers' first for RCA-Victor, this tune with its easily-remembered lyrics and melody couldn't have been a better choice for these four New Englanders.
- 6. TILL I WALTZ AGAIN WITH YOU:** A holdover in favor from late 1952, little Teresa Brewer (Coral) still made more than enough to keep her in hosiery until her next biggie comes along, as it surely must.
- 7. APRIL IN PORTUGAL:** As "Whispering Serenade," nothing much happened—but under its revised title, Les Baxter (Capitol) took precedence over versions by Armstrong, Martin, Damon . . . and even Eartha Kitt!
- 8. NO OTHER LOVE:** Perry Como (RCA-Victor) had the first recording of this lovely song from Rodgers and Hammerstein's "Ma and Juliet"—and that's exactly where it stayed in popularity among the many recordings.

In general, a goodly crop of tunes were these hits of the past year. Will these of 1954 compare with them? Let's have a Happy New Year while waiting to find out. . . . A.M.



## WHAT'S IN A NAME?

Oakley told me of a young lord, a pedigreed blueblood listed in all the peerage books, who is receiving wide

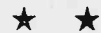
to the many press agents, sports announcers, athletes, executives, and just plain ordinary sports fans who make this column possible.

SO MANY wonderful things happened to 'My Little Margie,' to Charlie Farrell and me this last year that I feel real humility for being so blessed."

And so spoke Gale Storm, the delightful madcap of "My Little Margie," the show which has become in only a short time a TV and radio by-word. Yet it was this very same show that was once brutally criticized when it began on TV and still managed to catch on with the public. Its success is now one of the major TV surprises.

"Naturally, Charlie and I are very proud of the fact that the radio version of 'My Little Margie' for CBS has just celebrated its first year's anniversary," Gale said. "We are also happy that 1953 saw our program in the top ten. In fact, we were number three in the latest national ratings. This is quite remarkable because the radio show came second to the TV program—and this is not

the usual procedure. In addition, the different characters on both TV and radio are now so well known to the public that we no longer have to explain why they do what they do. For instance, Mrs. Odets only has to come in and chirp 'Hello' and everyone knows she has been a peeping Tom again. We used to have to make this explanation.

"As for the television program on NBC, 1953 saw us getting a new time. We had always wanted to be on earlier because children liked our show too, but it wasn't until Scott Paper Company happened to have an earlier hour and took over the sponsorship that this change was made.

"I am grateful, too, to 1953 because I learned how lucky I was to work with a man like Charlie Farrell. With all the pressure on us and the demands on our time, the show might have been a headache if I'd had to work with someone who didn't have Charlie's wonderful qualities of kindness, consideration, and gentility.

"As for my personal life, I am thankful beyond words. My husband Lee and I have five goals in life: (1) spiritual, (2) physical, (3) mental, (4) financial, and (5) social. Their importance is in that order.

1953 saw a fulfillment of all those goals.

"From a spiritual standpoint, 1953 was the most wonderful year we've ever experienced. I've been blessed because the pressure on my time forced me to reach into the spiritual for strength. Not long ago Lee and I went away by ourselves for four days—our first time away from the children. We went to a kind of retreat and spent the time reading spiritual books and, naturally, the Bible. We both gained a closer communion with God. We sort of re-dedicated our lives—and this was a thrilling thing.

"Physically, I've never felt so well. The year before I had been run down and tired. Now I've gained new strength. The same is true mentally. I've found real mental stimulus in doing the radio show. I'd never done comedy before on the air and I had to learn a good deal. My night club engagement in Las Vegas was also good for me—mentally. It was a challenge. I'd always wanted to sing, especially classical things, so this gave me the chance to prove something important to myself.

"When it comes to financial considerations, 1953 was just peachy. I never had it so good. We recently bought a lot and are planning to build a wonderful new home. Now that we're going to have a larger place I'm glad we've lived in a house that was too small because we'll appreciate our new home so much more. We do plan to watch finances though. We intend to keep the security we've found.

"Our social life is the only goal that suffers. We saw more of our friends when I was in Las Vegas than we do here. There just isn't enough time.

"I only hope that in 1954 I shall be able to live a life that will make me worthy of the blessings 1953 brought me."

## Is Pantomime Quiz Fixed?

**P**ANTOMIME QUIZ," the television show that revived parlor games at home, is celebrating its seventh anniversary on the video lanes—and rumors are still persistent that it's a "fixed" deal.

Do the performers know what is to be enacted prior to air time? Do they use basic signals to tip off members of their respective teams?

Investigation has revealed that the answer is an unequivocal no, no, a thousand times no! "Pantomime Quiz" is not fixed.

Creator-producer Mike Stokey is cognizant of the fact that you can't fool all the people all of the time. "There is nothing phoney about "Pantomime Quiz," he said, "any crookedness would sound the death knell for the show."

### Tip-Offs

"As a matter of fact we have turned down many top celebrities who wanted their pantomime bit revealed to protect them from appearing foolish. The spontaneity of the

show has never suffered because of a star's superior ego.

"The only time a performer was tipped off, the audience knew about it. It occurred when Jackie Coogan, one of the regulars, had to remove his toupe. To encompass this delicate situation I found it necessary to forewarn Jackie.

"Some of the regulars have worked together so long they have built up an affinity between them. Their mental give-and-take is comparable to that of couples who have been bridge partners for years.

"When Hans Conreid was one of our regulars he continually amazed viewers with his ability to identify 'bits' from Shakespeare. Years ago he aspired to become a Shakespearean actor, and his retentive mind has never released those famous quotes. Hans claimed he never had to 'be up' on his Shakespeare to appear bright on "Pantomime Quiz."

The program is stamped with letters, fifteen to twenty thousand weekly. Each letter averages three

stumpers for the players. Ninety per cent are eliminated immediately because they are repeats; too difficult, or contain no action. Gags that are too long are also eliminated, else the players would become lost in a maze of verbosity.

Mike claims that you never know how the show is going to turn out. Even though the regulars get more difficult questions, they manage to win about fifty per cent of the time. "Whenever I try to fit the questions to the contestant, they cross me up. You just can't win," smiles Mike.

### Problems

All agree the show is lots of fun. But Mike explains some of its problems: "Good taste in delineating the pantomime must be adhered to. For example, enacting the simple word 'behind' can clearly be illustrated by touching the derriere. Yet, on television, this might appear vulgar to many viewers. So we have to reach for something less concrete to define the word. It can become quite frustrating and it certainly is conducive to creating a mental block."

# The Amazing Mr. Murrow

**I**F ANYONE in New York can get the moon, it's Edward R. Murrow. If this seems like a broad statement, take a look at the facts. When Ed Murrow started his new show, "Person to Person," he was faced with a rather important problem. How could he get permission to invade the privacy of the world's most famous celebrities? Yet within a matter of a couple of weeks, Ed had permission from Valentina, the noted designer, Roy Campanella, well-known baseball star, Gloria and Leopold Stokowski, and Petrillo, controversial head of the musicians union, to come into their homes and let their privacy be made public to the nation.

In each case these personalities had one remark to make when asked if they would appear on "Person to Person": "We wouldn't do it for anyone but you, Ed. But we know you'll treat everything with your usual dignity and good taste."

In short, Murrow was a person they knew they could trust.

"Person to Person" came about in a rather unexpected way. As is his custom, about a quarter of five each day, Ed goes into his office and meets with John Aaron and Jesse Zousmer, who work with him on production.

At one of these meetings Ed happened to mention that he had been to Richard Rodgers' home. He commented about the kind of home the composer had, and the things he learned about the man himself.

"If these things interested me, why shouldn't they be of interest to the whole country?" Ed asked.

This was the springboard, and it wasn't long until arrangements had been made to produce the television show, "Person to Person."

"We're trying to bring out unknown facts about well-known people," this reporter was told while talking to John Aaron and Jesse Zousmer in New York. "And we've unearthed some very unusual points of interest—like Petrillo and his very real devotion to his grandchildren, for instance. It had been rumored that Petrillo was a tough guy and hated children. Well, this was the one fact the labor head wanted clarified. He has eight grandchildren, by the way.

"We have two reporters who go out in advance to do the research on the personalities we're going to present. They aren't concerned with biographical facts already printed before. Nor are they trying to get controversial or provocative material. We only want to show these people as real human beings.

"I think we succeeded in this very well in our telecast with Gloria and Leopold Stokowski. Many people wonder how such a young and beautiful girl could be in love with an older man, and yet we hadn't been with this charming couple very long until we could sense the warmth and real love between them. We found it easy to get Stokowski to discuss his children and their toys—and even to discuss intimate facts about his home life. Ed happened to say to the conductor, upon seeing a picture in the living room, 'That's a very attractive picture of your wife.' To which Stokowski replied, 'That was taken when she had long hair.' Ed said that Gloria's hair looked nice now. It was much shorter than it was in the picture. But Stokowski came right back with, 'Yes, but I liked it better when it was long.'

There are definite problems connected with the show. To many people, it's hard to believe that "Person to Person" is a live show. With Murrow's talking in the New York studio to the celebrities in their homes, there is an illusion that the whole show is filmed. Yet, by engi-

neering tricks, it is all done live.

"We've learned many things in doing these shows," Jesse Zousmer stated. "For one thing, we've learned all about the real estate cooperative business. That's a little democracy all its own. When we wanted to go into Valentina's apartment, we had to get permission from all the other tenants in the building. They didn't like the idea of a TV camera invading their premises. They felt that if they okayed this telecast, they'd be besieged with requests for similar deals by other stations. We finally settled the issue by doing the telecast in Valentina's shop."

On these telecasts Murrow uses about \$150,000 worth of equipment and about \$300,000 on the remotes. Twenty people were involved in the show from West Point which featured an interview with Colonel Blake, yet only Blake and his wife were seen.

With "Person to Person" Edward R. Murrow once again proves that TV can be a challenging industry—with the right people in the driver's seat.

# Sinatra

## MINCES NO WORDS

*Frankie Candidly Talks About His New Love . . . A Zooming Career*

**NBC IS KEEPING** Frank Sinatra busy as star of "Rocky Fortune" and "To Be Perfectly Frank." His dramatic career has advanced so rapidly that he feels equally at home delivering lines as he does rendering a song.

EVERYTHING about Frank Sinatra seems to be changing except, perhaps, his candid comments. In an exclusive interview with this reporter, the ever-popular, ever-rehearsing Frankie talked about his new career.

Sinatra has been in the public eye more than ever since his career started zooming several months ago. It started with his wonderful portrayal of "Maggio" in "From Here to Eternity." Sinatra emerged from this role as a sympathetic, effective actor and the demand for his services has grown tremendously ever since.

NBC radio gave him the starring role in the "Rocky Fortune" series in which he plays a footloose, fast-talking adventurer. He guested on scores of television programs and headlined his own "Colgate Comedy Hour" stanza. Las Vegas niteries were at his beck and call.

With all this activity, ingenuous Frank Sinatra still likes to call a spade a spade. Modestly and without frills, he says: "I apparently made a good test and that's why I was chosen for my role in 'Eternity.' My transition from singer to actor was made without any formal dramatic coaching. I've never even had a singing lesson.

"I get as much kick out of delivering good dialogue as singing a song. The well-written word is the thing."

Frankie doesn't intend to subordinate his singing to his newer dramatic career because he thinks there's plenty of work for both. His aspira-

tions as an actor, or even as a singer, are to keep on working. "I need the money," he frankly admits.

When asked whether he would rather face the music or the drama critic, Frankie commented: "If the first is as good a musician as I, then fine! If the second has had any acting experience (which I doubt), then he'll do."

### Hit Record

Surprisingly enough, Frankie does not consider any of his past recordings as particularly great. He claims he hasn't had a "greatest recording" yet. What about one of your earliest, "Black Magic," Mr. Sinatra?

Now that the crooner has branched out into other entertainment mediums he has a wider adult audience, which obviously compensates for the probable loss of the bobby-sox brigade. However Frankie loves them all—young and old—just as long as they are fans.

Frankie feels equally at home before a camera or a microphone. He enjoys his "Rocky Fortune" series because of George Leffert's fast, bright dialogue. And anyone who has heard the program undoubtedly would nod his head in agreement since "Rocky" is a slick talker. Although there are no immediate plans for giving "Rocky" the video treatment, Frankie cautions that one can never be sure what will transpire.

Frankie has always been direct with the press and so were we with him. We wondered, and for the record, whether he resented the perpetual allusions made to his thinness. "No," he commented frankly, "not when it's done in fun for laughs. But, yes, when it's used by idiotic, illiterate, yellow journalists for purely malicious reasons."

Sinatra hasn't changed; he minces no words.
