▲ **TONY MARTIN** was born on Christmas and is very happy about it all. His birthday has a double meaning to him.

IT TOOK ME quite a while to realize what a great privilege it was to be born on Christmas Day." Tony Martin, in between rehearsals for his NBC show, made this comment with quiet sincerity.

"Like most youngsters I used to feel that I missed out on presents because I was born on Christmas," Tony went on. "As for birthday parties. I only had one. That was when I was six. My mother invited a lot of kids but only one came. The rest had the flu.

"When I was a youngster I remember being puzzled about one thing. I kept asking my father how mother brought me down the chimney.

Childhood

"Looking back on my childhood, though, I realize I was quite lucky in many ways. My family was rather poor. Dad made about thirty dollars a week so the going wasn't too easy. I can still remember how mother used to get a bone with some meat

on it to make soup. With the leftover meat she'd make stew.

"But the emphasis in our home wasn't on material things. My parents believed in sharing, in leading a decent, clean life. They taught me to treat others as I'd like to be treated. They taught me to be unselfish by seeing to it that other children could at all times share what I had.

"Now that the years have gone by I no longer think of my birthday. Yet, it is not forgotten by my family. I must confess I get a big thrill when my two boys, Nicky and Tony, Jr. come over to me the first thing Christmas morning and say, 'Happy Birthday, Dad.' Then they go to their tree.

"Usually we have a birthday party for me the day after Christmas. We let Christmas be for the kids, which is the way it should be."

Tony has had many memorable birthdays, but the one he will not forget occurred during the war. He was in the service at the time.

"With some others I had been called up to a forward area to entertain some troops," Tony said. "A general got us a plane and we flew to the front. Not knowing when the battle might be resumed we left the plane's motor running while we put on the show. Suddenly, some one said it looked like we were in for some trouble so we got into slit trenches. However, it was a false alarm and we finished the show.

The Day

"Yet, to me, all my birthdays are memorable because of the meaning of the day itself. Children born on Christmas should feel very proud because they are so directly sharing the joy of the world in the birth of Christ. They learn, perhaps more than any others, what Christmas really means. They learn to respect the day itself. This is a day that even those who aren't Christians know as a joyous day. It's a time synonymous with peace on earth and good will to men. To be born at such a sacred, wonderful time is a privilege. So maybe children born on Christmas do miss out on a few presents. This doesn't matter. It's best for them to remember that this day is one revered by millions of people who stop in their busy lives to be reminded of the teachings of Jesus Christ, to fill their lives again with hope and charity, to forget their material cares and to count their blessings.

GAIL DAVIS, KTTV

IHAD JUST tested for the part of "Annie Oakley" and was told that the role would be mine if the packager decided to make the series. I had spent months improving my riding; learning to shoot correctly and accurately. I read everything I could get my hands on about the real Annie Oakley.

The packager took forever to make up his mind. It was Christmas week and I flew to Little Rock, Arkansas to spend the holidays with my parents.

Christmas morning the family gathered around the tree. My first gift was a small doll, dressed as "Annie" with a note pinned to the jacket: "Merry Christmas, Annie Oakley. We start shooting as soon as you get back to Hollywood." It

was signed by Gene Autry, who was packaging the new program. Autry had telephoned my mother to prepare my most memorable Christmas gift.

Somewhere between New York and Ohio, along U.S. Highway 40, I spent my most dramatic Christmas.

On Christmas Eve, 1947, that historical blizzard swept over the East.

The highways wore white six feet deep, but I wanted to go home.

Tony Pastor, with whose band my sister Betty and I had been touring, advised us not to risk our necks. He might just as well have suggested that we give up singing. We're a clannish lot—we Clooneys. Home is where the heart is, and what's Christmas without a heart?

Ever try driving through a blizzard? It's a little like climbing through mashed potatoes piled as high as the Empire State Building.

The bus balked, the driver detoured, the snow snowed, and we sang. In that deserted Greyhound, to the accompaniment of the howls outside the windows, we put on the best performance of our careers.

About 8:00 o'clock, the following evening, we limped into Cincinnati. At home the glad cries were mixed—relief and welcome. Betty and I attacked the turkey, our presents, and our relatives like Grant took Richmond.

MARY BRIAN, KRCA

I'll never forget the Christmas in 1944 in Germany. It was during the Battle of the Bulge and six of us were sent to entertain the boys at Christmas time. In our strategic location we became stranded, but the show went on . . . in a stable. The boys in attendance couldn't even put down their rifles or take off their helmets.

We scouted around the territory and found a facsimile of a Christmas tree, and all of the girls pooled costume jewelry, feathers, and other colorful items for decorations. We received rations along with all the troops, and for several weeks we had saved our candy bars, which we wrapped as gifts to the soldiers. I like to draw, so on the back of postcards I sketched each of the boys in ink, using nail polish for the Yuletide

motif. And even with our handicaps we managed to have a memorable and happy Christmas.

JACK BAILEY, KHJ-TV

The Christmas that I will always remember is one that involved a practical joke and that probably saved a hotel full of people.

I was doing a show in the East at the time and took quite a bit of ribbing from the other members of the cast because I would expound on the virtues of California.

The gang decided to play a gag on me Christmas Eve and phoned my hotel at three o'clock in the morning, which was midnight in California, to wish me a merry Christmas on behalf of the state of California.

We had been working quite hard and I was sound asleep when the phone rang. I stumbled across the room, picked up the receiver, and was greeted with loud cries of "Merry Christmas" when suddenly I heard the desk clerk's voice cut in. "Mr. Bailey," he said, "will you please leave your room immediately. The hotel is on fire."

Naturally, I thought it was a gag—until I noticed the acrid smell of smoke in the air. I opened the hall door and realized that he wasn't kidding.

The phone call from my friends had awakened the sleeping desk clerk who, after ringing my room, discovered that a fire had started in the main lobby. Thanks to a practical joke the fire was checked.

JOHNNY JACOBS, CBS RADIO

In 1943, the week before Christmas, orders came through for Ensign Johnny Jacob's assignment to sea duty, immediately. My first taste of active combat service.

My wife Virginia and I had been married for eighteen months and we had hoped to spend our second married Christmas together.

When I told Virginia the news she wept. After the tears dried, we went out into the near tropical weather of Mobile, Alabama, and with our remaining few dollars bought a Christmas tree.

We forced ourselves to laugh and decorated the midget fir. Virginia's jewelry, my cuff links, bits of colored paper hung crazily from the boughs. Between moody pauses, we ate dinner and stared at "our tree."

It was Virginia who first discovered the miracle. She looked through the window and gasped, "Johnny, it's snowing!"

And so it was. For one of the few times in the state's weather history, snow, not stars, fell on Alabama. As young newly-weds do, we interpreted this as an omen that God too was sorry we couldn't be together on Christmas.

The most memorable Christmas present in my life was given to me the next day. A call from Base told me I didn't have to report to duty for another two weeks.

ELEANOR POWELL, KRCA

My most memorable Christmas actually started on Christmas Eve and lasted for almost two weeks. It was at the height of my career and my mother and I boarded the Grace Line steamship to go from Los Angeles to New York through the Panama Canal.

When I came down to dinner the first night, the ship's orchestra played "Rosalie," my starring picture at the time. Just as we were arriving in Havana the Captain informed us that there would only be a six-hour lay-over. I was elected spokesman by our group to request that we stay longer in order that we might see more of the beautiful island.

The Captain radioed my request to the President of the Line in New York, who graciously acquiesced on the condition that we dine with him

BECAUSE THEY advocate Christmas every day, "Uncle Bernie" and "Miss Corinne" are two of the most popular personalities on the videolanes.

Eyes become as big as saucers and little hearts beat like tiny trip hammers when toys, fun and games are presented on Channel 13's "Toy Menagerie" program. Games of skill, requiring mental agility and physical co-ordination, songs, birthday festivities, magic tricks and imaginative anecdotes are important segments of the program. The display of unusual toys—life-size animals, miniature houses, fascinating musical wind-ups from Switzerland and other toys from the four corners of the globe makes the "Toy Menagerie" a veritable paradise for children.

"Uncle Bernie" is a firm believer in toys the year 'round. "After all, a child has to grow and develop the 364 days between Christmases," he

says. "Toys should be selected with the child's particular interest in mind. Some children are artistically creative while others like to work with their hands. The properly selected toy can combine fun and learning."

The story behind the "Toy Menagerie" telecasts revolves about a man who couldn't retire. "Uncle Bernie" came out to the Coast about eight years ago to take it easy. But the inactivity was more of a hindrance to his health than a help. He decided he would have to get back into harness and invested in a toy emporium in Beverly Hills. Since then his health has improved rapidly. He even felt energetic enough to try live television. And as long as "Miss Corinne," his co-host, and "Uncle Bernie" continue to captivate and entertain the small fry, and to relegate merchandising to secondary importance, the pair will continue to be favorites of children and adults alike.

The Ten Turning Points In Jack Benny's Life

Now that Jack Benny has reached the ripe old age of 39, he is apt to fall into a reminiscent mood more often than he did, say, ten years ago. In fact, "The Life of Jack Benny" was brought forcibly to his mind just this past week when a representative from the Simon and Schuster Publishing company approached him with the suggestion—well, it wasn't really a suggestion, it was a firm offer—that his life would make biographical fodder.

"My first thought was that I was too young to be biographed," said Benny. "At 39, how much has a man lived? Then, as a sort of a tentative thing, I thought back over my life and tried to select the points that were most important—at least to me."

And these are the points he thought of—as it turned out, ten of them.

No. 1—he was born. "The next nine wouldn't have happened if this didn't come first." He was born Benny Kubelsky on Feb. 14, 1894, in a Chicago hospital, but has always claimed Waukegan, Ill. as his home, because that is where he lived the major part of his youth.

No. 2—his father, Meyer Kubelsky, bought him a half-size fiddle when he was six-and-a-half years old. "This gave me my first taste of the show world, a taste which whetted my appetite, and which still hasn't been satisfied." Jack's subsequent teachers thought he'd make a fine violinist if only he'd practice. However he practiced just enough to be good, never great. But his years of sawing away at the fiddle weren't wasted. He started in show business by playing parlor concerts for friends and finally got a job when he was fifteen playing in the orchestra pit of Waukegan's sole legitimate theatre.

Navy Man

No. 3—World War I and Jack enlisted in the Navy at the Great Lakes Naval Station near his home. Prior to his enlistment, he had entered vaudeville, always as the violin part of a piano team. And he just played the violin, no jokes. But in the Navy, he was cast in the "Great Lakes Revue," playing "Izzy There, the Admiral's Disorderly." The director of the show, Dave Wolff, liked the way Jack read his first line and kept building the part. Jack discovered he had good delivery and timing. He also found he liked getting laughs. From then on he was a comedian first, a violinist second, then third, then fourth, then the worst violinist in the world.

No. 4—He met and married Mary Livingstone. They met first in Vancouver when Mary was twelve. He wasn't too impressed. They met later in Los Angeles. She was no longer twelve, and he was impressed. Their courtship was interrupted by the fact that he had to leave on tour. When he was in Chicago, he heard that she'd become engaged to another fellow. "I wasn't ready to get married, but I didn't want Mary to marry anyone else. So I asked her sister, Babe, who was also appearing in an act in Chicago, to persuade Mary to come and visit her. She did. Three days after

her arrival, we were married, on Friday, January 14, 1927. It was the smartest thing I've ever done. I'm a lucky man."

No. 5—In 1929, after having signed a lucrative contract with Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer studios, he asked to have it cancelled. "This was a tough decision. It was the beginning of the depression. But the waits between pictures were too long. I felt my career was dying. I wanted to get back to Broadway. I talked it over with Mary. She wanted to do whatever would make me happy. So we did it. That was a real turning point!

No. 6—Ed Sullivan, who had a radio show in New York, asked Jack to make a guest appearance on it for free. This was in 1932. Jack's first words were: "This is Jack Benny. Now there will be a slight pause while everybody says, 'Who cares?'" A lot of people cared and the next day an advertising agency offered him \$1,500 a week to go on the air in a show selling ginger ale. He accepted and has been in radio ever since.

No. 7—In 1934, Mary and Jack adopted a daughter, Joan, when she was six weeks old. "We always wanted children, but for some reason or other we never got around to it, so we adopted Joannie. We should have adopted more children; we were just negligent."

Few Changes

No. 8—On January 1, 1949, Jack's radio show began broadcasting on the CBS Radio network, where it has been heard every Sunday evening at 7 p.m. (EST) since. His show has consistently been in the No. 1 rating spot for many, many years. His cast has changed little in the twenty-three years he's been on the air. Announcer Don Wilson has been with him for twenty-one of those years. Rochester seventeen, Dennis Day, fifteen. And of course, Mary, who joined him on the show shortly after it started in 1932. His writers, Sam Perrin, George Balzer, Milt Josefsberg and John Tackaberry, have been with him for twelve years.

No. 9—In November, 1950, he made his coast-to-coast television debut on CBS with a line that compares favorably with the first he uttered on radio. When he stepped before the cameras he said: "I'd give a million dollars to know what I look like."

No. 10—this happened just a few weeks ago when his daughter Joan, who had married Seth Baker in March, 1954 in one of the most publicized weddings of the year, informed him that he was going to be a grandfather. "Which will make me one of the youngest grandfathers in show business."

"Catch My Boy On Sunday"

Philco-Goodyear TV Playhouse

One of the greatest things that television has accomplished in its "infancy," is that it has given a tremendous opportunity to playwrights.

One such playwright, and possibly the greatest that TV has discovered so far, is Paddy Chayefsky. Previous Philco-Goodyear plays of his, such as "Marty," and "The Bachelor Party," have already received justifiable acclaim.

Chayefsky's latest was called "Catch My Boy On Sunday." Sylvia Sidney played the role of a frustrated

woman who tries unconsciously to gain attention for herself through her son's career as a child television star.

The NBC-TV play had several minor shortcomings: in the beginning, it dragged; even though her role was that of a neurotic, unloved woman, there were times when Miss Sidney screeched just a little too much; and there were moments when the usual Chayefsky magnetism lost its hold.

Nevertheless, because of Chayefsky's magnificent ability as a master of dialogue and a "builder" of plot and character, the overall effect achieved the desired catharsis.

Miss Sidney and her dentist-husband weep for themselves and their child, but there is the implied hope that they will eventually be restored to normalcy, even though "it may take years."

Although the greatest of playwrights have an occasional "flop," thankfully, on television, Mr. Chayefsky has yet encounter the experience. T.H.

Upcoming Shows

Several new shows make their video debut with the coming of the new year. First of the 1955 crop is "So This Is Hollywood," with Mitzi Green, Virginia Gibson, Gordon Jones and Jimmy Lydon. It's situation comedy about the "small" people in the big movie industry. (NBC, January 1).

Daytime viewers get their soap opera glossed up with "Way of the World," which is reported to be "vigettes" in serial form. (NBC, January 17). Tennessee Ernie Ford will also grace the videolanes for daytime viewers when he takes over the vacated Betty White spot. (NBC, January 3).

"The Millionaire," dramatizes the age old question—"what would you do if you had a million dollars?" With five-a-week airings, "Millionaire" should come up with some diverse answers, in dramatic form of course. (CBS, January 19).

A story about a kindly vice president of a small bank in charge of making small loans is the premise of the "Norby" series, starring David "Teahouse of the August Moon" Wayne and Joan Lorrington. (NBC, January 5).

"TV Reader's Digest," half-hour dramatizations based on articles and stories in the national magazine joins their debut under the sign of the capricorn. Hugh Reilly hosts the film series. (ABC, January 17).

Looks like viewing will be "bigger" than ever in 1955.

Bob Cummings returns to the videolanes with a completely new situation-comedy format. He plays the role of a Hollywood photographer, who is swamped by beautiful models. (NBC, January 2)

IF YOU WATCHED ED SULLIVAN'S "Toast of the Town" Sunday evening, you caught TV's newest starlet, little **Portland Mason**, daughter of **James and Pamela Mason**. "Porty," as she is called, headed an all-children cast in a fifteen minute Nativity reenactment called "Star of Bethlehem," produced and directed by her daddy.

A FEW DAYS PRIOR TO "TOAST," the Masons had a small press affair at their Beverly Hills home. After an informal buffet luncheon, the scribes adjourned to the projection room to see the film screened in color.

IT ALL CAME OFF VERY WELL. Along with some others, who'd expected the little girl might be just too precocious, I was gratefully surprised when "Porty" showed up at the luncheon and proceeded to behave like any other normal six-year-old. She seemed, however, to express herself like an eight or ten-year-old. With the same penetrating gaze of her father, little Miss Mason answered all the reporters' prying questions directly and precisely. When asked what she most wanted to be, she replied almost primly, "At the moment, a dancer on stage, then a movie actress, then a TV actress."

THE INVITATIONAL WIRE OVER the Masons' signature called Portland "our favorite actress," and this statement was probably not far from right. Her parents are openly proud of Porty, and Porty herself seems equally proud and quite impressed about playing the Virgin Mary.

MASON HAD HIMSELF QUITE A DEAL lining up some thirty or forty youngsters between six and ten years of age for the various roles in his juvenile production. The children, who worked only four hours daily, were admittedly a problem. Some of them were awful hams and despite the plainest of direction, insisted on looking into the camera the second they had divested themselves of their little speeches. Then, toward the end of the day's haul, many of them almost conked out disinterestedly. Mason admitted he had visited a Hollywood joke show prior to shooting and had loaded up on all kinds of funny items to arouse lagging interest when the moppets' attention drifted away, but somehow or other, he found himself so busy with all the production's details he never got around to utilizing his gimmicks to their best advantage.

APPARENTLY PORTLAND LIVED UP every minute of her acting chores. She even contributed a line of the script—the closing line when she says, "I just love the whole world."

"I'LL NEVER TRY MAKING ANOTHER picture with animals," Mason stated flatly. Getting the children to do what he wanted was a cinch compared to cudgeling donkeys and a lamb into proper poses. The Masons may have encountered their problems with Porty's starring vehicle, but I found the general effect quite disarmingly delightful. You who want to see it in color may find it this week at your local theater.

THEY'RE PUTTING CHUCKLES and guffaws into the laugh track for "Dear Phoebe." Seems that the **Peter Lawford-Marcia Henderson** show rolled for almost two months without the ha-ha tape, but then somebody conducted a "survey" and came up with the information that viewers wanted to feel identified with the audience, so now the show will be screened to a live audience and this group's reaction will be captured for show release. Thank goodness that canned laughter is not being used!

EDITORS ARE CONSTANTLY BEING given gentle reminders to catch certain shows. Last week **Voluptua** sashayed into my office and presented me with a lace-edged hankie heavily perfumed. Thursday, just before the "White Carnation" drama on "Climax," CBS-TV brought around flowers of the same name. Small **Maryellen Clemons** also dropped in with a record which she and her mother had made of **Frank Scully's** verses from the "Blessed Mother Goose."

I GET MUCH MAIL, most of it pleasant. Mrs. **Gertrude McCall** recently sent a charming note along with a subscription for her eight-year-old daughter. She wrote in part, "I started out my son's subscription when he was eight (three years ago). TV-Radio Life has been almost like a school book to him. He learned to read that much faster. If it will make my daughter progress as fast in reading, comprehension of articles and knowledge of the various TV and radio programs, it will be well worth having two of your copies in the home at the same time."

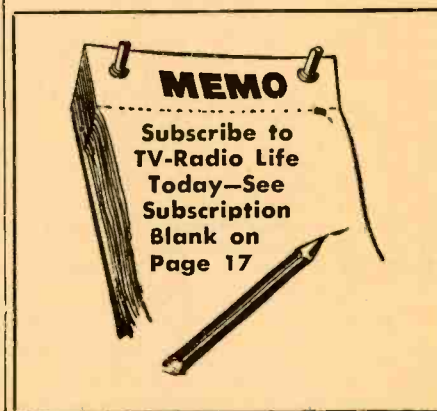

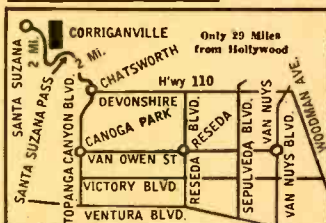

A couple of columns ago there was a discussion about the current situation with the "Comedy Hour" under its present set-up. In answer to this, in the mail came an anonymous letter obviously from someone more than casually acquainted with the show. He put the blame for the not-so-successful shows on mediocre casting and mediocre writing. He seemed to feel, too, that the program was too often in the hands of inexperienced people, those who had little show-business know-know. As he said, "The inventiveness you miss is what was always supplied by good writers . . . To cure this situation the network bought old 'books' and you have seen the dreadful result with 'Revenge With Music' and 'Let's Face It' . . . The men who wrote the great Colgate shows of the past conceived the ideas." That's how one man feels. Any further comments?

Andy and Virginia Mansfield, who turn out imaginative record shows on radio, go along with the prevalent idea among some disc jockeys that music on radio today and on records is mainly tripe. But—Andy and Virginia insist that if these same jockeys would play better music themselves the trash would go. "Most jockeys refuse to play anything that is solid and good because they have the idea their audiences don't want it. The only reason their listeners don't go for the better music is because they haven't had a chance to hear it on their radio." This is something worth listening to, you boys on the records. KPOL, for instance, under Bob Scott's supervision, has found there is a good audience for really fine music. As for this column's opinion, driving around in my car and listening to the radio I find it very dull to switch from one station to another, with a few exceptions, and hear nothing but the old, familiar razz-ma-tazz. Seems that those in charge of record programs have encouraged the stream of blah music heard these days.

Paul Newman is one of the better TV actors. He has delivered some fine performances, but his first movie stint left much to be desired. He played the lead in Warners' "Silver Chalice" and you would have thought he had never acted in his life. This should win an award as the most wooden performance of the year. Certainly it is a feat to transform an inspiring role into an uninteresting one. There must be some reason for this. Possibly it was direction, but whatever it is, Paul Newman just does a magnificent flop. The rest of the cast is good in this colorful, inspirational picture.

Speaking of Warners, their New York office sent a list of names of people who are to appear in forthcoming Warner pictures who are also on TV—and this is further proof that movies and TV are happier together these days. The stars listed were: John Baragray, Charles Bickford, Paul

Birch, Lauren Bacall, John Camden, Jack Carson, Walter Hampden, Tab Hunter, Diana Lynn, Raymond Massey, James Mason, Guy Madison, Betsy Palmer, Marisa Pavan, Aldo Ray, John Wayne, Teresa Wright, and Gig Young.

Dan Dailey is another name who is hitting the TV circuit. Currently in New York for the premiere of his 20th Century-Fox picture, "There's No Business Like Show Business," he looks set for a forthcoming Ed Sullivan show. Meanwhile, 20th hasn't as yet okayed his appearance on the Chrysler show in February when he hoped to star in "Burlesque." The only reason for not supplying the okay has been the constantly changing schedule on "Pink Tights," which is to introduce TV's erstwhile bombshell, Sherry North, to movie audiences.

Preston Foster just returned from a personal appearance tour for "Waterfront"—and this show seems to be really catching on. Pres and his lovely wife, Sheila, rode in the Thanksgiving parade in Philadelphia and all down the line he was greeted with cries of, "Hello, Mr. Waterfront." He also did several benefits. In Milwaukee he was on a cerebral palsy telethon for seventeen hours straight. He was on his way home when he was asked to do this show.

Jack Bailey is in the midst of hundreds of letters and pictures from girls all over the country who want to be chosen the "I Love You Girl." The winner will ride a mammoth float in the Rose Parade New Year's Day. Five finalists will be flown to Hollywood for the December 29 broadcast of KHJ's "Queen For A Day" and the Cinderella girl will be chosen by the studio audience.

A merry, merry Christmas to you all. May we all remember the true meaning of this day and take time out to attend the church of our choice. Let's remember that this day marks the anniversary of our greatest gift.

"Top Ten" Not For Him

"In my opinion, the quickest way to kill off a good popular number is to play it to death. That's why I steer clear of the current ten top tunes on my 'Saturday Platter Show' on KABC and the ABC Radio Network," says Jim Boysen.

"I can't help but feel that there are many others like myself who get sick and tired of hearing the same numbers played over and over again throughout the day and night whenever they tune in a music program," Jim says. "No matter how good the tune, it soon becomes 'old hat' in my book, even to the point of becoming annoying, when it is played so frequently. For that reason, no one will ever hear a current 'Top Ten' on my show, so help me.

"Rather," the personable, pleasantly spoken Hollywood newcomer states, "I shall feature vocal hits of the past and those I believe will be hits of the future, Broadway and movies musicals that are perennial favorites or bid fair to become so tomorrow, and off-beat recordings usually referred to as collectors' items."

Boysen, whose personal library of 45 rpm records numbers over 4,000, considered one of the largest private collections in the country, augments his own discs with preview tunes from various major and minor recording companies, so he has practically an inexhaustible supply to draw upon for his "Saturday Platter Show" on KABC-ABC-Radio.

The Story Behind KPOL's Policy

KPOL, applying the build-a-better-mousetrap philosophy, has discovered that there's a large audience for the radio station which offers listeners what they can't get anywhere else.

According to Program Director Bob Scott, here's how it works:

(1) The one thing radio can do better than television is play music (after all you can't watch music),

(2) The world's most commercially successful music is music composed for the American musical theatre,

(3) No other radio station in Southern California features these show-tunes in the light concert style.

Such was the reasoning behind KPOL's decision to program music by Kern, Gershwin, Romberg, Berlin, Rodgers, Porter, Herbert and other such great American composers all day long.

It's already evident that the decision was a wise one. "The Great Music Station" is commercially sound and the music format has attracted a large and faithful audience of adults who write that they listen constantly.

In addition to a unique music policy, KPOL, 1540 on the dial, has come up with a rather unusual advertising policy as well—especially for Los Angeles. Lead deals, fast pitches, come-ons, screaming commercials with weird sound effects, and such products as wine, beer, and tobacco are not accepted. The principle underlying this ad policy isn't just moral. The purpose is to create advertising acceptance and loyalty to KPOL-advertised products and services.

While KPOL's entire broadcast day features light concert arrangements of showtunes, the programming actually offers considerable variety, Jim Narz, quizmaster on "Merchants Quiz," has talked with more than 15,000 listeners who have called the station during the last two years. Paul Snider plays music from a different musical comedy with interesting sidelights on "Musical Comedy Theatre" each afternoon. Norma Gilchrist presents an interesting program of music and helpful suggestions daily on "Time For Norma." Joe White plays old popular songs which somehow never lost their popularity on "American Masterpieces." And Bob Scott adds his own tenor voice (live) to recorded music by famous orchestras and famous sopranos with "The Tenor Sings With The Records."

The biggest drawback at the moment is the FCC regulation requiring KPOL to sign off at sundown. That, however, is soon to be corrected. The best guess is that KPOL will be granted a full-time permit within the next six months.



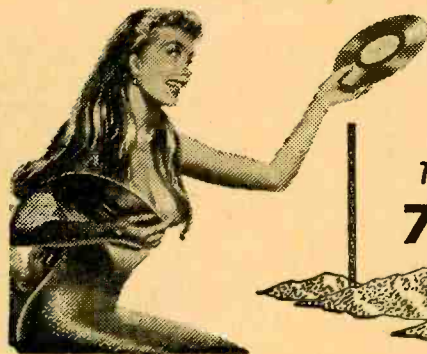

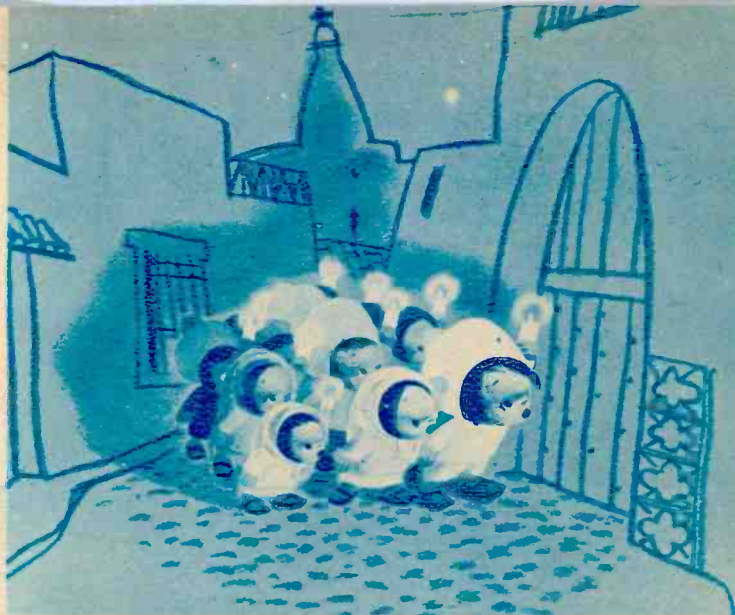

Walt Disney Takes His ABC-TV "Disneyland" Audience on a Gay but Respectful South-Of-the-Border Observance of Christmas



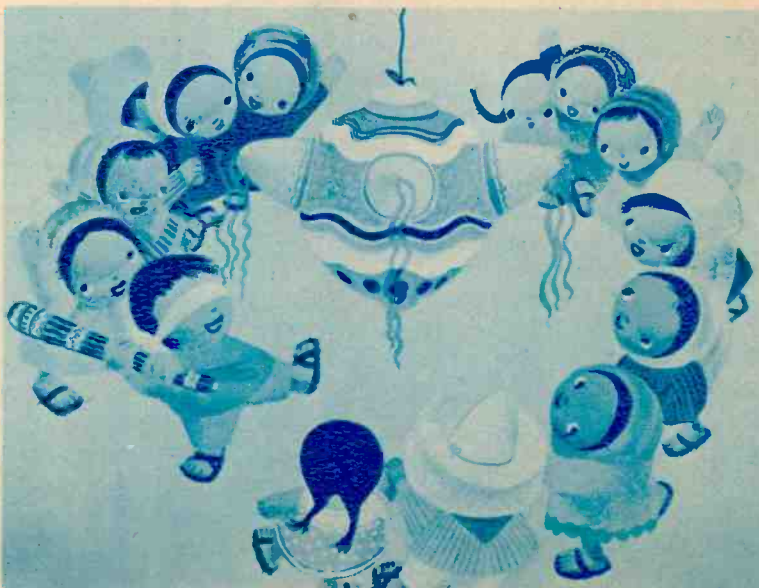

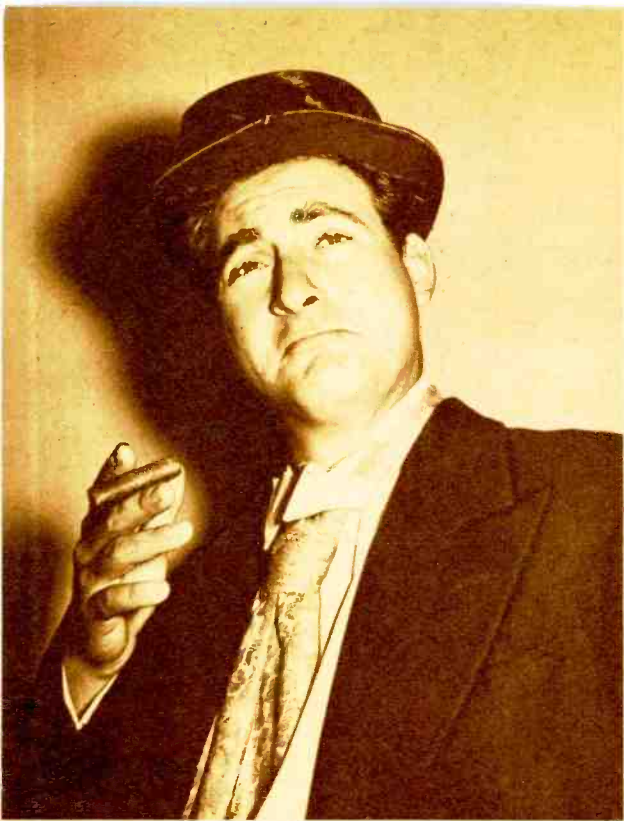

Has Sid Caesar

SID CAESAR, comic extraordinary of NBC's "The Sid Caesar Hour," was sitting in his penthouse office in New York. He had just emerged from a conference with agency representatives and sponsors about his show and he was in something of a fighting mood.

"Frankly, I like my new show," he said firmly. "Sure I have a lot of troubles and a lot of headaches, but I also have a lot of happiness. I can do what I want to do—and anyone wants to be his own boss. But with being your own boss you carry the responsibilities, including the responsibility of deciding what to do if you fall flat on your face.

"I have done several conventional shows so far because I was asked to do a few in the beginning. But I stopped going in for the ordinary sooner than I was supposed to simply because I couldn't wait to try some of the things I've had in mind for a long time. I'm really doing now what I've done before but in a new light.

"As far as 'Show of Shows' is concerned, I have great compassion for my fellow artists. Max Liebman, Imogene Coca, and I were being unnecessarily put upon. The show was broken down morally. We reached the point where no matter what we did nothing seemed to help. We were caught in a rating freeze—and here is my big gripe."

Ratings

When Sid began discussing ratings he pulled no punches. They were obviously a sore point with

him—as they are with all sensible performers.

"The movies go by how much an artist brings into the box office," Sid said emphatically. "In TV he's at the mercy of about 200 people out of several million, and if this makes sense I'll eat it. Someone in the so-called 'rating' field gets up on the wrong side of bed one morning and your show is dead. It's a shame that any artist has to live by ratings which are so much at dissension—and whose results are so contradictory. Yet, they are taken as gospel.

"If ratings continue to be the last word, shows will settle into mediocrity. These systems just don't give a new program a chance to build. You're told the next morning whether you're good or bad. And how can any rating system give an accurate appraisal of a new show's popularity the morning after its debut? Because of this system a performer is afraid to try anything new or different. If he happens to hit what is a success formula he keeps at it, for fear his ratings will drop, until it becomes mediocrity.

"I may fall on my face doing the things I intend to do but I will at least have tried something different. If the colonists in the beginning of our history had been afraid to cross a river we might still be thirteen states. And I'm sure the people who did cross the river were told they were nuts.

"A performer can go on and on, on TV, without wearing out his welcome if he doesn't have to rely on ratings every minute. A baseball

player doesn't get a hit each time he's at bat, does he?

"I think sponsors should go by how well their products sell—and by the mail pull. And not by what some rating system tells them."

Private Life

Sid lives in New York and he says his family is doing better than he is. His wife, Florence, worries a good deal about him, and yet is his severe critic.

"She at least has patience with my new show," Sid remarked. "My children aren't unduly aware of the antics of their father but go along

with him. They're really the ones who run the house."

Sid would frankly like to concentrate more on movies than on TV. He feels that TV audiences get everything served to them on a silver platter, that, as he puts it, "they get too much happiness." Movie audiences don't have the same attitude.

When Sid was then asked what was the major mistake he felt comics made on TV he paused and then said, "Going on TV."

There may be some startling developments from the Sid Caesar front. Keep your eye on him.

LUX RADIO THEATRE" came of age last fall when it celebrated its twenty-first birthday. Actually "Lux" became of age long before its chronological birthdate. "Lux" has ruled the ether waves, despite its many imitators... all of whom have fallen by the wayside... since its inception. The show has always been listed in the "top ten" bracket of the rating surveys.

"It's hard to pinpoint the success formula of 'Lux Radio Theatre,' says Cornwell Jackson, vice president of J. Walter Thompson and executive producer of "Lux." "But I believe it's a combination of ingredients including a well organized competent group of men. Over the years, the efforts of such men as Tony Stanford, Sandy Barnett, Rudy Schrage, Fred MacKaye and Frank Woodruff have made 'Lux' what it is today."

At the end of two decades "Lux Radio Theatre" had acquired an impressive list of statistics. It had 893 broadcasts to its credit; 733 of these were film adaptations. There were 52,000 pages of script, 18,667 music cues, 22,667 sound cues, 496 stars and 1467 AFRANS who appeared on these broadcasts.

Fred MacMurray is at the head of the roster with twenty-six appearances and Loretta Young runs a close second with twenty-five broadcasts to her credit.

Almosts

Normally, "Lux" is a smooth production but there have been a few near catastrophic incidents. On one occasion, Bette Davis approached the director two minutes before airtime with the statement: "Don't be alarmed, but I've just taken poison!"

At first, everyone thought she was joking. Then it was discovered that she had asked her chauffeur to get some aromatic spirits of ammonia. Upon drinking it she found that it was household ammonia. By keeping calm and sending her agent to a nearby drug store for an antidote, she was able to play the role with a magnificence that wrung hearts.

Another close call happened when Burt Lancaster was confused about the actual air time and did not show up in time for the broadcast. Jeff Chandler, who was also in the cast, took over the Lancaster role while director Fred MacKaye took over Chandler's role. Midway through the broadcast, Lancaster arrived and the cast reverted to their proper roles. Fortunately the audience never knew the difference. Incidentally Chandler has been on "Lux" sixty-three times. He did sixty broadcasts as the well-known AFRA-ite, Ira Grossell, and three shows as the equally well-known star Jeff Chandler.

To most fans, "Lux" is successful because it represents Hollywood. Top-ranking men in the motion picture industry such as Cecil B. DeMille, William Keighley and Irving Cummings have served as hosts on "Lux Radio Theatre." The movie adaptations and the film luminaries heard on the program are all part of Hollywood. In 1934, when "Lux" launched its radio dramas with "Seventh Heaven," starring Miriam Hopkins and John Bo'es, it started a series which was soon to become identified with Hollywood. This identification and all the other winning ingredients will undoubtedly keep "Lux Radio Theatre" on the airplanes for another twenty years.

Outdoor Decorations You Can Do Yourself

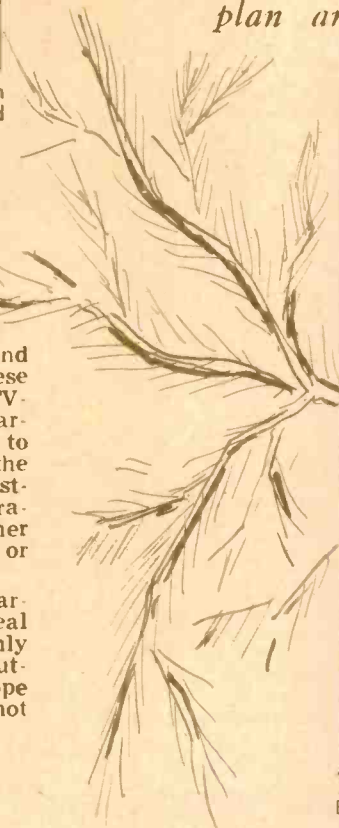
