**W**HEN THE seventh annual California Hobby Show opens for a ten-day run on April 22, at the Shrine Exposition Hall, many of the brightest stars on TV and radio will be present.

Attending the nation's oldest and largest hobby show has become Hollywood tradition. In some cases, it's superstitiously considered a good luck token.

Each of the young glamour gals who has served as a hobby show "queen" or "princess" has since won new fame and higher income.

"It's a good, clean, friendly kind of show. There's some kind of exciting hobby there for everyone and you feel real good afterward," petite queen Debbie Reynolds explains.

There is motive behind Hollywood's acceptance of the nationally known hobby show, however.

Stars, their agents, networks and studios are well aware that hobbies are more than fun. They are considered an excellent method of crime and juvenile delinquency prevention.

As such, the California event is supported by teachers, youth leaders, the U.S. Navy, the U.S. Secret Service, the sheriff's office and the Recreation and Parks Department.

Countless individual hobby groups and the mayors of fourteen Southland cities have endorsed the event. KTLA's "City at Night" has covered the event for several years, to name only one of many shows that cooperate.

# Marlon Brando At Home On "Person to Person"

**T**WO short evenings after Marlon Brando won his Oscar, the farsighted and astute Mr. Murrow visited the Academy Award winner in his home on "Person to Person." These pictures of the telecast were taken exclusively for TV-Radio Life.

Brando, flushed with the excitement of his recent victory, welcomed Edward R. Murrow and the nation into his home for the television program, which marked his video debut.

His conversation was spasmodic. He spoke fondly of his mother, and recalled the wonderful things she had taught him. He discussed the motion picture industry which had just awarded him an Oscar. And he had some very revealing ideas about the subject.

The man, who was once so nervous when auditioning for Alfred Lunt that he quoted "Hickory, dickory, dock the mouse . . ." when asked to say something, came through with an Academy Award and a successful television debut within the same week.

# The Intimate Side of "Dr. Styner"

*Richard Boone may seem austere and severe on "Medic," but that's only his "reel" life. You should see him when he's for "real." Here is the unusual success story of a fine actor.*

**R**ICHARD BOONE used to be able to walk down the street without being recognized—even though he was a motion picture personality of sizeable importance. Then along came "Medic" and Dick's private life suddenly became quite public.

"Hardly a week goes by that someone doesn't come up to me and tell me of an experience he had that was comparable to one shown on

"Medic," Dick commented. "I usually go to the fights in Ocean Park and one night a man came over to me. He had tears in his eyes. He told me that he had an epileptic son and that he and his wife and his son had watched the show 'Medic' did on epilepsy. It meant so much to them, especially to the boy, because for the first time light was brought into a dark field. Seeing the show had given him hope, had made him feel he was part of the world. And

he had been encouraged to keep up his medication but with a more positive attitude.

#### Too Strong?

"When I hear of cases like that I realize even more the value of 'Medic.' Oh, I've heard that the show isn't entertainment, that it's too strong. But I don't believe the public's tastes have to be titillated. I don't believe it has to be fed a steady diet of pap and superficialities. I feel the public is entitled to be moved, stimulated, to come away from watching a show a little changed. I think people want to think—or maybe I feel this way because I'm no advocate of the escapist fare."

Some have wondered why Dick's

role as Dr. Styner on "Medic" isn't given more prominence, why he is not acting on so many shows. There is a logical explanation to that.

"The medical people have a lot to say about the way my character is used," Dick said. "On 'Medic' I'm a general practitioner and the medical profession is very careful about things practitioners can and cannot do. I am unable to be in any show in which a specialist is required since practitioners cannot enter into the specialist's field.

"I did two shows recently that were tremendously exciting, though. One was on the H-bomb and the other on childhood accidents. I had really strong roles in those two—they caught fire. The H-bomb story is a fantastic one, all about what would happen to Los Angeles if the H-bomb were suddenly dropped. I worked for three days on that and it made such a dent on me I was depressed for four days afterwards.

"I cannot do any other TV without the consent of those in charge of 'Medic.' Recently, I was fortunate enough to be allowed to play Abraham Lincoln in 'General Electric Theatre's' presentation of Irving Stone's best-seller, 'Love Is Eternal.' This was the first time I had a chance to do a highly emotional part."

Dick got the "Medic" assignment through a strange set of circumstances. He was in New York on the stage when he was asked to make a test with a girl being considered at 20th Century-Fox. Well, the girl didn't get the call—Dick did. His first assignment was in "Halls of Montezuma."

"Jack Webb was also in that picture," Dick commented. "He had a radio show called 'Dragnet' at the time and he asked me to do some shows for him. Jim Moser was then writing the scripts. Jim happened to mention that he had a script titled

'The Doctor' that was to go on radio as a summer replacement—and he thought I'd be good in the series. Well, anyway when Jim got to work on 'Medic' and was ready to make the pilot film, he called me for the part."

#### Career Story

Before Dick came to Hollywood he had worked in stock, at the Neighborhood Playhouse and on Broadway. He had also done 150 live TV shows, seventy-five of which were ad lib sports commentary shows. As he said, "Nothing can ever scare me after that. Those ad lib things were the best experiences anyone could ever want. I also did twenty-six 'Mr. I. Magination' shows."

It was quite a surprise, too, to learn that Dick had also danced with Martha Graham for two years! He is heartily glad he had this dancing experience.

"Dancing helped me immeasurably when I began doing all those rough and tumble outdoor pictures," Dick said. "It helped me to know what to do with my body in those fight scenes. I think every actor should be required to take a series of dancing lessons."

Dick's event-filled career really began one day when an executive at the Neighborhood Playhouse gave him a letter to take to John Gielgud, noted British actor, who was playing in town. The letter stated simply: "Dear Mr. Gielgud: This will introduce you to Richard Boone, one of our graduates."

"I went into Mr. Gielgud's dressing room," said Dick, "gave him the letter, and waited. He offered me some tea. And then he began staring at me. Suddenly, he pointed at me and said, 'Why can't you play "Jason" in "Medea"?' I knew that 'Medea' was going to be cast, so I was really elated to think that Gielgud thought I could play such an important role. He did everything he could from then on to get me the part but the producers wanted a bigger man, so I understudied Mr. Gielgud, who finally played 'Jason.' After that I did such shows as 'The Hasty Heart,' 'The Man,' and other others."

When Dick is not working he's concentrating on his string of race horses. He seldom talks about them, saying, "Does publicity about my race horses condition a theatre audience to enjoy a bad performance? I don't think so. I make my living now acting (lucky, too, because I'm too nervous to steal) and I think that the best publicity any actor can have is a good performance on the screen or stage."

#### Interests

His interests are many and varied. He was once amateur light-heavy-weight boxing champion—and he used to spend his evenings attending the Art Students League in Los Angeles. He soon became a professional artist and then World War II came. He went into the Navy. He doesn't talk about his war record, but facts show that as an Aviation Chief Ordnance Mate he saw action for four years in the naval air assaults on Japanese-held Pacific islands. It's also known that his squadron was torpedoed on the Carrier *Intrepid*, bombed on the *Enterprise* and kamikazed on the *Hancock*. During the war he began writing short stories and plays—and he did more boxing. When he got out of the service he had decided to be an actor.

He is still very proficient at swimming, boxing, riding. And he is an expert bullwhip handler. He learned this while working in "Kangaroo" in Australia.

He is married and has a child of about nineteen months.

Yet, with all he's done it wasn't until "Medic" that he achieved such recognition. You'll never get Richard Boone to question the potency of television as far as an actor's life is concerned.

However, it's a little hard to reconcile the stern Dr. Styner of "Medic" with the man who once danced with Martha Graham!

# Ben's New Baby

ONE fateful night in October, Ben Hunter (KFI's popular, world-wide, all-night disc jockey) said to his loyal nightowl fans, "I think we'll start publishing a mimeographed sheet every month to keep you informed about the program." Six weeks later he found himself the slightly bewildered publisher of a completely professional slick-paper magazine with a circulation of 5,000, four pages of classified ads, a good income from display ads, and a complete editorial staff!

You have to understand Ben's show to understand how it came about. The Nightowl show on KFI is one of those chatty shows where the announcer talks about everything from flying saucers to the sex life of lobsters. Ben's show is different in that he allows the audience to participate actively in the discussions. If you know something about flying saucers—or lobsters, for instance—you can write or telephone Ben and he'll put you on the air over the telephone—or he'll read your letter over the air. Thus his Nightowl listeners feel themselves an integral part of the show. As Ben puts it, "It's not my show, it's *their* show." Consequently, when Ben proposed a "Nightowl publication," it was only natural for all his listeners to want to take part in it.

Ben reports that the telephones "went crazy" for a week after his initial announcement. He had volunteer typists, volunteer mailers, volunteer printers, and—most important of all—a volunteer editor, Mr. Graeme Henderson. Before the first word of the first article of the first issue had gone to press, the magazine had 5,000 paid up subscribers with more coming in every day!

Regular contributors to the magazine were sorted out from the dozens of volunteer columnists; a picture editor and a cartoon editor were selected; and the first issue of the magazine came out six weeks after Ben's announcement! Record time, certainly, for the birth of a magazine! Each issue features a food

column written by Mr. Mason Ehrman of the Biltmore Hotel; a cartoon by Mr. Dave Detiege, of Walt Disney Studios; a "guest editorial" by one of Ben's listeners; a poetry page consisting of original "Nightowl" poetry edited by Cecile Bonham, one of Los Angeles' better known poets; and various other features and articles of general interest.

So hats off to Ben Hunter, the only disc jockey in the world (so far as we know) who publishes his own magazine—and also makes radio a pleasant listening habit.

During his service in the Marines, Hugh took up boxing in the light heavyweight class and fought twenty-nine fights, in nineteen of which he came out the winner. Then, the theatre's leading man became ill and Hugh was forced into his role. Hugh was so successful that he became enthused over the acting profession and stayed in it.

**LOOK FOR DICK CONTINO TO HIT** the local TV screens soon. The flashing-eyed accordionist told me recently that he had a film show in the works. He plans to play piano and sing, so the other lady-killers had better look to their keys and chords.

**MY OLD FRIEND, WRITER MILTON GEIGER,** sent me a long letter to remind me that "Flight 951" on "Climax" this week is his brain child. He calls it "a taut drama of decision in the sky and it doesn't detract one bit from one's anticipation of the show to know that the plane isn't going to crash or even miss fire once. The drama depends on human equations." Milton went on to say he'd given his two daughters permission to stay up until 9:30 to see the show and most of the children in their class at Woodman Avenue School, Van Nuys, have received the same privilege, so Milton dubs himself "The Great Liberator of April 21, 1955."

**IF YOU ARE A SCIENCE-FICTION** fan you'll lap up KTTV's "Science Fiction Theatre," which started this Tuesday, April 19. The station is betting it'll put a dent in competitive ratings with this new series. Much of the program's success will depend on the writing, more so than in ordinary drama, for believability will be of utmost importance.

**THERE'S A TREMENDOUS HASSLE** going on over pay TV and the battle is raising so much smoke it's hard to tell how the fight is going. Zenith is pitching hard for its Phonevision, but the National Association of Radio and Television Broadcasters is recommending that the FCC not give toll TV the green light. Recent sideline skirmish occurred when CBS-TV refused to allow Zenith to plug pay TV on its own sponsored "Omnibus" program. Zenith, figuring it was footing the bill and hence entitled to pitch any of its services in the commercial spot, got miffed and jerked its bankroll from the final two programs. More bloodshed will come.

**"WARNER BROS. PRESENTS" HAS** been chosen as title for the new TV series, ABC entry about which I wrote recently. It has also been decided that each of the thirty-nine full hour features to be made for this group will be based on one of three outstanding movies—"Casablanca" (adventure); "King's Row" (romance); and "Cheyenne" (Westerns). The studio, which announced formation of Sunset Productions as its TV subsidiary, also has scheduled an aviation series titled "Men of the Sky," dealing with air adventure. Films will be shot in color.

**WON'T THE REAL SALK STORY** make a tremendous television program? Wonder who'll get to it first. "Medic?"

**INCIDENTALLY, JEAN ("LONE-SOME GAL") King Rousseau,** who collapsed from overwork, is now feeling much better. Spends her time eating, gardening and sleeping. Says she may not have the prettiest blooms

but she's sure she has the best-watered flower beds.

**OVER LUNCHEON THE OTHER DAY** Guy della Cioppa, CBS radio veep in charge of network programming, told me that there were two main problems confronting CBS radio: (1) How to hold a "radio only" home; (2) how to get an audience in TV homes. "There are still fourteen million homes without TV," della Cioppa stated; "and of course radio is interested in these homes."

**IN ORDER TO PLEASE THE AUDIENCE,** a trend has been started toward segmentization, or splitting up half-hour weekly shows into fifteen-minute segments aired several times a week. This new radio program pattern has attracted many advertisers who are using it to supplement their TV buys and to reach homes which are still radio only. "Amos 'n' Andy" and Bing Crosby have already undergone the segmentization treatment and it is being mulled for Jack Benny, whose weekly half-hour would adapt nicely to a strip series. This indicates that the easiest programs to switch over are the popular music and "personality" types, while the most difficult are drama and symphonic music.

**"RADIO NOWADAYS HAS TO BE** easy to listen to," della Cioppa asserted. "We are slowly switching from old-style programming designed for the radio-only family. We will not let radio go by the boards and I mean network radio. There is a great future in commercial network radio, especially if we can give the advertiser a saturation opportunity. Segmentization seems to be the answer." Della Cioppa added that there is more interest in summer radio this year than ever before. TV advertisers are particularly intrigued. Shows remaining "on" include Crosby, "Amos 'n' Andy," Vallee and Rosemary Clooney. "CBS is planning a strong summer line-up," he promised.

**TV-RADIO LIFE'S FIFTEENTH ANNIVERSARY** was observed in the industry with a luncheon for 100 given by the magazine for network and station representatives at the Los Feliz Derby last Monday. It was truly a fun party, with Bob Cobb gifting us with a gorgeous pink-trimmed cake and with our beaming award-winners on hand to receive their hand-illuminated parchments from emcee Ralph Edwards. One of the most poignant remarks was made by Jack ("I Search for Adventure") Douglas, who, in speaking of winner Eleanor Powell said, "I think you will agree

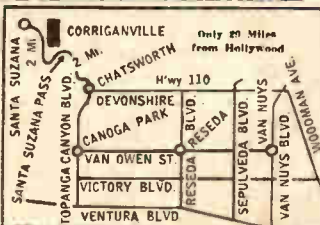



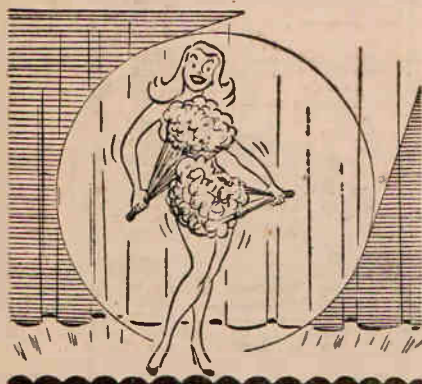

Approval for the new and more powerful equipment, which will provide a steadier, stronger picture, has been given by the Federal Communications Commission, and the equipment has been received from the RCA factory at Camden, New Jersey.

Channel 10's chief engineer, Leroy Bellwood, expects the installation to be completed and the new equipment in use early this summer.

### Special for Teen-Agers

This week brought another new, bright local production on Channel 10. Lynn Taylor, whose "Pantry Playhouse" (daily at 1 p.m., Mondays through Fridays) is setting records for listener response, inaugurated "Teen Review." It will be telecast each Wednesday at 7 p.m.

The program revolves around the news, views and entertainment specialties of San Diego area teen-agers. There's a bit of music by Lynn, who appeared on radio and the stage as a singer before she entered television. There's a bit of dancing, a touch of recorded music, style shows of special interest to the teeners.

It's apparent, from the production effort and advance planning that Lynn does, that the show is close to her heart. If Channel 10's sparkling blonde has any primary interest it IS teen-agers.

Before she came to San Diego she was hostess at shows which brought talented youngsters before the microphones. The new one will do some of that, too.

The reason she likes such a format, she says, "is because you can see the teen age talent actually develop and bloom."

Lynn refuses to do the show the easy way, and just let the youngsters appear and perform their specialties. Instead, she tries to help each one to make the best possible appearance. She holds a special rehearsal a couple of days before each Teen Review where she coaches and coaxes the "stars" into doing a much better job than they thought they could.

Lynn learned a long time ago, when

she was teaching at the Ben Bard School in Los Angeles, that many amateur shows fail because no one takes the time to help the youngsters improve their acts, their grooming, their appearance, or the way they stand, sit or walk. These little things, Lynn believes, often mark the difference between the amateur and the polished performer—and even though she does not expect to make a skilled actress or actor from just one rehearsal she has found that the work at such meetings pays off for both the guest and the audience. The guest acquires a bit of know-how and feels easy before the cameras, and the audience sees a professionally polished performance.

Lynn has a long background of experience on which to draw when she gives her tips to teeners. She started her dramatic career when she was only 6, as a featured player in the Our Gang comedies. That's an experience, incidentally, which is proving somewhat embarrassing these days.

"Wherever I go," she grins, "those

early movies are being shown on TV as either 'Our Gang' or 'Little Rascals.' And it always seems that they're being shown on a different channel than I am."

### For the Sportsmen—and Women

Channel 10's sports editor Sig Smith is moderating another new program that is aimed particularly at sports-minded men and women, but is newsy enough to be interesting to everyone else.

It's called "Something Fishy," a title dreamed up by John Choynecki, art director for the Robert E. Lee Advertising Agency, and at the moment it's the only fishing show in San Diego area TV.

Arlene Solof, the queen of San Diego's Yellowtail Fishing Derby, Sportsman Jerry Krasne and Announcer Rod Sherry have parts in the production, which gives late reports from deep sea or fresh water fishing holes. There are weekly prizes for a fireside fishing derby that just about anyone can enter. Passes for Yellowtail Derby charter boats are distributed to winners of other contests. Those passes alone are strictly worthwhile; just one trip on one of those charter boats could result in winning a brand new automobile, or one of a host of other prizes offered in the Derby.

For six years now I've been watching a little girl grow into a young lady—from a pint-sized dynamo into a bouncing teenager still loaded with enthusiasm and drive. She's not employed here at Channel Eight, though she's well-known enough to be. Several afternoons a week she comes whirling into the studio with something on her mind and then watch out! It's how to get more donations for the latest MS drive—couldn't Smokey Rogers help? Who'd like to appear before her school assembly—the kids there are interested in TV. Come see the play at the JUNIOR THEATRE WING—this time she has a really rip-roaring part.



At 10 years old, she was a little hurricane nothing could stop; at 14, she's toning it down a little, overcome to some degree by the restraint of young lady-hood, which now prevents her from scaling the cat-walk to corral that reluctant cameraman into dropping those coffee nickels into the March of Dimes pot instead. Catch your breath and take a second look—where have you seen that pep and enthusiasm and sunny self-confidence before? Why . . . sure, you know who she is! Harold Keen's daughter, Lorraine, a dynamic little gal who'll make a pretty place for herself in the world some day. (You may have seen her once or twice on Harold's PEOPLE IN THE NEWS. The appearances are seldom. Harold's just brash enough himself to worry about this "like father, like daughter" business.)

"Little Keen" is one of my favorite people. . . . I thought you'd like to know about her since she's so much like her Dad. Harold is such a busy man, on TV, radio, and in print that you think of him sort of Walter Winchell-ish . . . a pencil behind his ear, a typewriter . . . and no family at all! "Little Keen" is the middle one. There's a handsome son, aged 16, a "baby girl" aged six . . . and a charming wife who's reconciled to not seeing her husband from the time he dashes from the house at 5:30 a.m. till he rolls in, ready for bed, at 10 p.m. Unlike most of us, she can keep perfect tabs on him, if she wants to. There's the radio show on KFMB at 7:15 in the morning, again at 5:15 that evening, and San Diego's most popular news show (FOR THE PAST FIVE AND A HALF YEARS!) "People in the News" on KFMB-TV each night at 7:30. One night each week Harold records a specially taped interview show "STAND BY, SAN DIEGO" for KFMB—but to make up for not being there "in poi-

son", he stretches the time to half an hour.

I sometimes suspect "Little Keen's" real reason for dropping by the studios is for an extra glimpse of her dad. The guy works a sixteen hour day! He himself digs up the news for all its local newscasts, works six hours in the public relations department at Ryan Aeronautical Company, publishes the house organ for Westgate-California Tuna Canning Company, and covers the San Diego scene as correspondent for out of town newspapers and magazines. Time left over? KFMB-TV's exciting "WHAT DO YOU THINK" takes care of part of that, and the brand new "HAROLD KEEN AND THE NEWS" (featuring the teen-ager of the week) the rest.

I can hear you say . . . "you're not telling me anything! I see them all . . . all his shows!" Did you ever wonder why you like to watch when Keen is at the helm? If your memory goes back five and a half years, you'll re-

member the first "People in the News" on Channel Eight, emanating, not so plushly, from our studios in the basement of the Hotel San Diego. You'll recall that the show hasn't changed much . . . a strange thing, in a day when everybody has to have a "new format", a "different twist". All kinds of people and news stories then as now. A famous scientist, a politician, a wrestler, an alligator trainer, a murderer suspect, an old man who crochets, a war hero and a movie star . . . Harold has always had the top names, the timeliest personalities. But shows throughout the country have tried the same thing, though they sometimes lagged a step or two behind Harold in "on the spot" coverage. Other shows failed to sustain interest over a period of time. Harold still holds the top local rating, his show is never stale.

To quote a most un-original saying "It's not what he does its the way that he does it." It's the very same qualities in Mr. Keen that right now are showing up in his teen age daughter. First he's dynamic, always ready to go. If a story breaks anywhere, Harold tags it down till he has the principles on the show, in minutes if necessary . . . he'll phone or go on foot to bring you the news you want to see. (Remember little Keen and the catwalk?) Second, he handles each story like a

newsman should. No false appeal to your sympathy or over-dramatization (Little Keen again—no "sob story"... she just holds out that Theatre Wing ticket and says, "These kids have worked hard.") 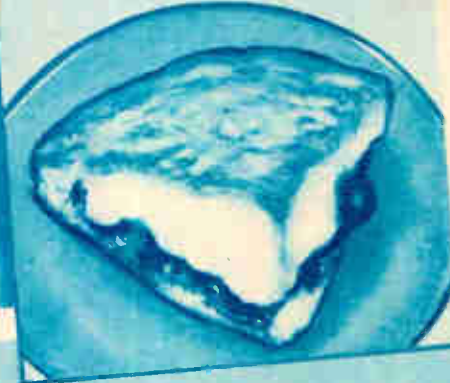
with me that the lovely lady with the twinkle toes topped us all—she is teaching us to discover God."

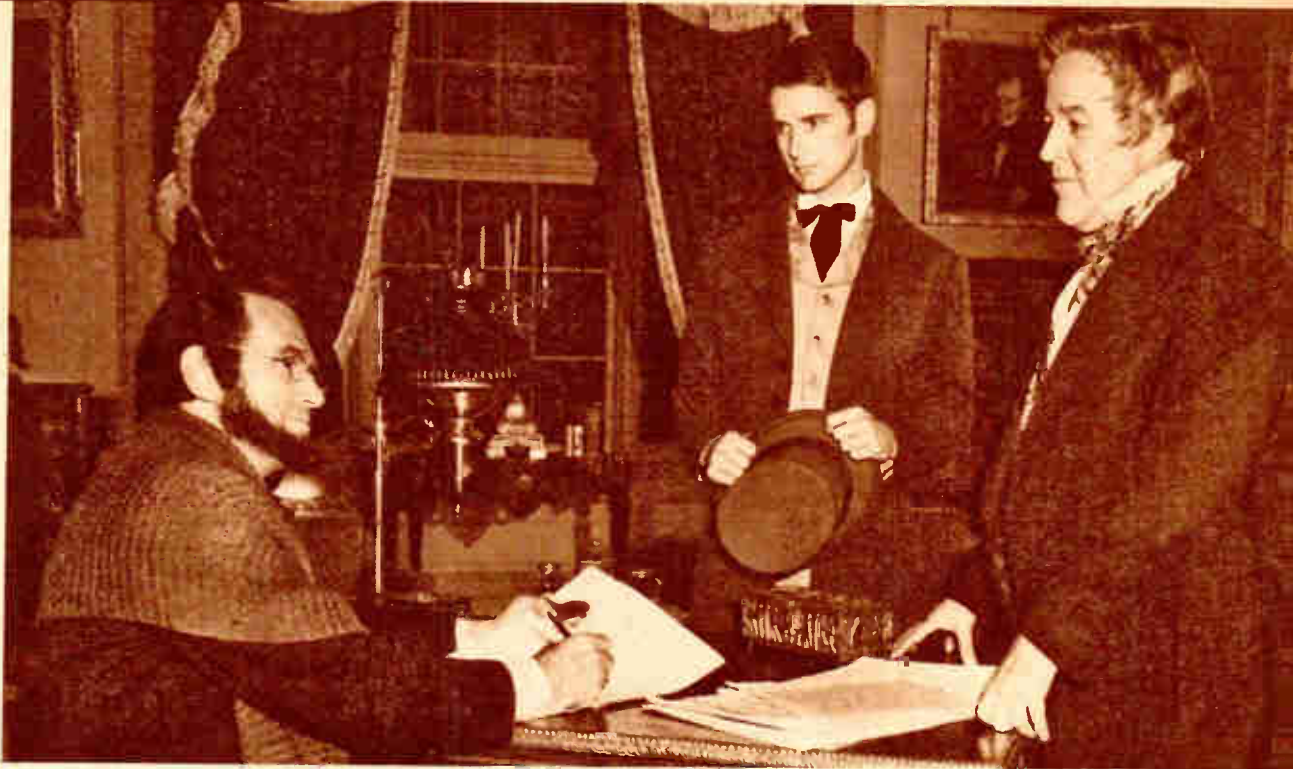

# What "You Are There" Has

ONE OF THE FIRST SHOWS to be filmed in Hollywood when the CBS-TV program moved here from New York was the re-enactment of the night P. T. Barnum first presented Jenny Lind. Leni Landry is the Swedish nightingale. This episode will be shown April 24.



WALTER CRONKITE is one of the nation's most respected and informed reporters. He has been on hand for many historical events—such as his coverage of the battle of the North Atlantic in 1942. He also landed with the troops in North Africa, flew the first Flying Fortress mission over Germany, took part in the Normandy invasion, dropped with the 101st Airborne Division into Holland, and was with the Third Army in the Battle of the Bulge. He later reported the Nuremberg trials and was the U.P. chief correspondent in Russia for two years.

Cronkite has walked right along with history—and now on "You Are There," as its narrator, he helps recreate the dramatic historical events of the years gone by.

The famous reporter was in Hollywood to narrate several films for "You Are There." The show made an important decision recently to do all future shows on film and in Hollywood instead of continuing its past policy of all-live productions emanating from New York.

#### Goes On Film

"We all agreed that 'You Are There' should go on film," Cronkite explained. "and so the obvious place to do the show was here in Holly-

wood. From a personal standpoint, I am very happy about the move. It gives me a chance to come here more often. My wife is just as happy. When she arrived at the Los Angeles airport, she took one look at the weather, announced she was quite willing to stay here for good, and said, 'You can go back and get the children.' However, we haven't been able to make such a drastic move quite that easily as yet.

"I couldn't stay here—at least not until I took care of some of my New York duties. For one thing, I do 'Sunday News Special,' and I enjoy that show and am a little reluctant even to consider giving it up.

"'You Are There' was switched from live to film for one very good reason—there was such frustration from all of us on the show each Sunday. Once each program was finished it was gone forever. There was no record left of anything we had done. Then we began to get an unbelievable number of requests from colleges and other schools for our productions to be shown in classrooms. Now we will be able to supply educational institutions with films of 'You Are There.'

"We have proved, I think, that TV can be educational and still entertain. In fact, it won't surprise me at all if 'You Are There' revises teach-

# Done for History

*For a long time this famous CBS-TV show came from New York live, but it is now another big production that has succumbed to the lure of film. Walter Cronkite, noted reporter and narrator of the series, explains why this move was made.*

ing methods in schools throughout the country.

"Naturally, there were several arguments against bringing 'You Are There' to Hollywood. One was that research was more difficult here than in New York. This is true. Back east there are countless museums—and often we have used pieces actually used by historical figures, on our shows. We are especially careful to be authentic in scenery, wardrobe and script in all productions. We solved this problem, however, by leaving two research men in New York.

"There are, of course, other changes necessitated by our move west. In New York our show was a prime one for actors. Everyone wanted to be in our production because of Sidney Lumet, our director. He is a very fine artist and actors knew it. He didn't

want to come to Hollywood since he hoped to do a Broadway play. So I was a little concerned about what this change might do to the shows. However, since I have seen the excellent work of our director here, Barney Gerard, and our producer, Jim Fonda, I am confident that 'You Are There' is in competent hands. William Dozier, our executive producer, is also one who settles only for the highest in quality."

Cronkite, in talking about actors who wanted to do "You Are There," mentioned one exception. In one show the character of "Juliet" was important—but, when Shakespeare wrote "Romeo and Juliet," the part was played by a boy. Here, too, the producers stuck to authenticity. A boy was cast and he was all enthusiastic about doing "You Are There" until he learned he was to play "Juliet." He would have none of this and started to walk out. He kept saying, "What will the kids at school say when they see me playing 'Juliet'?" He finally agreed to do the part only if he received no credit.

"We agreed to this," Cronkite laughed, "but then we had to warn all the members of the crew to make no remarks at all about the boy's playing a girl. If anyone had, he would have walked right out of the studio."

#### History Teacher

Most TV viewers regard Walter Cronkite as a walking history book—and many have suggestions for

shows which they freely offer him.

"I've almost stopped going anywhere on buses," Cronkite went on with a broad smile. "I see people start to stare at me and sooner or later one of them comes by and says, 'I know the show you ought to do. Now, I've got an Uncle Fud who was hanged once. It was quite a story. The facts are these ———.' And on and on the story goes."

It's because of these incidents that Cronkite wishes he hadn't once been referred to as the best history teacher in the country.

Of all the shows done on "You Are There," there are several that Cronkite considers as outstanding.

"One of our best was the one on Socrates as played by Barry Jones," the genial narrator continued. "Then there were the Burr-Hamilton duel and 'The Rise of Hitler.' We have repeated the latter three times—and it is quite a remarkable effort. We got the films in Germany, edited them and then added narration. The original picture ran three and a half hours so you can see it was a real job to cut. I've never seen such an effective propaganda piece as this was."

Before he returned to the stage to do more narration for the show in production—which was on Jenny Lind and P. T. Barnum—Cronkite made a very pertinent comment. "If history could have been put together the way films are, one good film editor could have prevented all of our international troubles."

# Rhythm and Blues --- Too Blue For You?

**T**HERE'S NOTHING like a good fight—and the town's deejays are kicking up quite a ruckus pro and con about rhythm and blues numbers. Hunter Hancock, Peter Potter, Alex Cooper, Dick Haynes, Gene Norman, Jim Ameche, and Johnny Grant all have very definite ideas.

Alex Cooper of KLAC approached the matter in a good amount of detail.

"While I am not anti-Rhythm and Blues, I am not playing the usual run of the Rhythm and Blues tunes on my program. By the same token, I do not play the classics inasmuch as I feel that neither of these kinds of music fit the pattern of my programming. As a result, I feature the music of such legitimate dance bands as Ray Anthony, Les Brown, Ralph Flanagan and others.

"I avoid Rhythm and Blues because of the heavy beat and the monotonous, raucous, honking saxophone sounds which, nine times out of ten, are not musical or pleasant to the ear, but purely cacophony.

"I realize that many youngsters listen to my program in addition to parents at homes, as well as the thousands of home-bound motorists and this kind of music is, I feel, more annoying than entertaining."

Dick Haynes simplifies his stand with the simple statement of "I treat rhythm and blues platters like any other platters at breakfast time—6 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. If they are in good taste, I serve 'em."

However, KLAC and KNXT's Peter Potter views the whole thing with intensity. There's nothing mild about his views.

He was especially irate about "Teach Me Tonight," terming it, however, a watered-down R. and B. Some columnists blasted the lyrics that proclaim among other things, "graduation's almost here, my love, teach me, tonight."

"Put songs like that and 'Please Don't Freeze' and 'Rock and Roll' are mild high school stuff compared with the R. and B. records put out by smaller companies," Pete said. "The kids seem to get a biological kick out of listening to these wild records. One mother wrote me she found four in her daughter's room and broke them.

"If I had the power I'd sentence those songwriters to jail. I think those tunes are as bad for kids as dope."

Hunter Hancock of KGFJ really took exception to Pete's stand—and wasted no time giving his answer.

"As a Rhythm and Blues disc jockey, I have been asked to give my opinion concerning the criticism cur-

rently being leveled against Rhythm and Blues music. It is my contention that most of this criticism is unwarranted. True, some Rhythm and Blues records have objectionable lyrics, but so do many of the top sellers in the field of popular and Western music. In fact, if some of the latter had been Rhythm and Blues records, I would have refused to play them on my programs, just as I now refuse to play any Rhythm and Blues record which I consider objectionable. It is as unfair to censure all Rhythm and Blues for the bad taste of a few record companies and disc jockeys, as it would be unfair to censor all photography because of a few pornographic pictures. I believe the criticism should have been directed at the very small minority of disc jockeys, in any field, that insist on playing such records on the air, and at the few record companies that release such records. (Incidentally, some people believe that if an objectionable record is played on one show, then it is played on all shows. In fact, several times I have been accused of playing certain records, which were played on a certain other Rhythm and Blues program, but which were never played on mine. This again points up my contention that the criticism should be specific—not general.)

"Actually, Rhythm and Blues is the music that to the average Negro is his 'pop' music. Many of the words and phrases in Rhythm and Blues are innocent in their meaning, but some non-Negroes misinterpret and misconstrue their meaning. Therefore it is entirely possible that some criticism has been unjust simply through lack of understanding. And in the event the actual words themselves, and not their meaning alone, has been misunderstood, and the critic believes other words were used, then the criticism is completely unjustified.

"I honestly believe that the Rhythm and Blues records played on my programs and most other Rhythm and Blues programs are as acceptable as the records currently being played on 'pop' and Western programs. I do regret that a very small

minority of disc jockeys has given Rhythm and Blues records a bad name because of their bad taste and lack of common sense. It is deplorable that their actions have hurt a great many innocent people. Therefore again I say, the criticism should be directed against the individual, and not against Rhythm and Blues as a whole."

KLAC's Jim Ameche accepts the furore calmly and simply believes, "Let each record stand on its own merit. A style, a type, or an artist is a factor of individual or personal preference. What the public wants, it will get."

Gene Norman, who knows his music, looks upon the matter in the following light:

"Rhythm and Blues, just like any other type or category of music, should be considered according to the merit of the individual performance. Many Rhythm and Blues records are worthwhile and worth playing because they have an exciting, infectious beat that means good listening and good dance music. Taking advantage of its enormous popularity, there are too many attempts, however, at gaining notoriety through suggestive material. But using some very simple and obvious standards, there is no reason why a deejay should not be able to discriminate in his choice of records; and no reason to penalize the public in its desire for Rhythm and Blues by not playing the more acceptable records. An occasional Rhythm and Blues record can add variety and interest to a record program if it's of high caliber."

Which leaves only Johnny Grant to be heard from. He doesn't play Rhythm and Blues but not because he feels one way or the other about them. He thinks the fuss is just so much publicity for all the deejays and doesn't mind saying so.

"Why all the fuss?" he says. "Rhythm and Blues are dying out anyway. The new trend is away from vocalists—and towards bands. Maybe someone can find something in bands to get all excited about."

So how do you feel about it?

**M**Y FAVORITE song—that is, my wife's and my favorite song—is "I'll Get By." The reason? . . . well, because it's Gloria's favorite. I suppose it sounds gushy, but it's our song. Besides its sentimental value, it has a good melody and appealing lyrics," says Orié Amodeo of Lawrence Welk's KTLA band.

"Because of its wonderful melodic impact, 'Body and Soul' is another of my favorites. The tune came out in 1937 or 1938 and I remember Coleman Hawkins' version of it. I knew his arrangement backwards and forwards.

"It's funny but I never realized there were so many reasons for calling a song your favorite, but several come to mind and for different reasons. When it comes to working with the band I guess I'd better like 'Piccolo Pete' and 'The Dickie Bird Song,' but I'm featured on the piccolo with these songs.

"I rid myself of my singing frustrations by humming 'Somewhere Over the Rainbow.' I really let go with this number when I'm driving along the highway. You see, Lawrence Welk likes to have all the boys in the band sing—except me, that is.

Lawrence insists that I throw everyone off key when I sing so he has 'requested' my silence on the bandstand."

Good-natured Orié doesn't bear any grudges against boss-man Welk. As a matter of fact, Lawrence is god-father to his little daughter Lois Ann. Orié comes from a small town in upper New York state and music has been his life since he was old enough to read those little black dots on the music staff. He plays both tenor and alto saxes and doubles on flute and piccolo.

Orié averages fifty-six working hours a week and devotes his spare time to his family. Or he declares a busman's holiday and indulges in his hobby of photography by shooting publicity pictures of the boys in the band.

Orié Amodeo is an accomplished musician who has his favorite songs, but even better than that he has his favorite subject . . . his seven-year-old daughter Lois Ann. Both he and his wife Gloria would like Lois to follow a musical career but the devoted parents are uncertain about the feasibility of such a career because of Lois's report card. The only "C" on her report card was for the subject called music.
