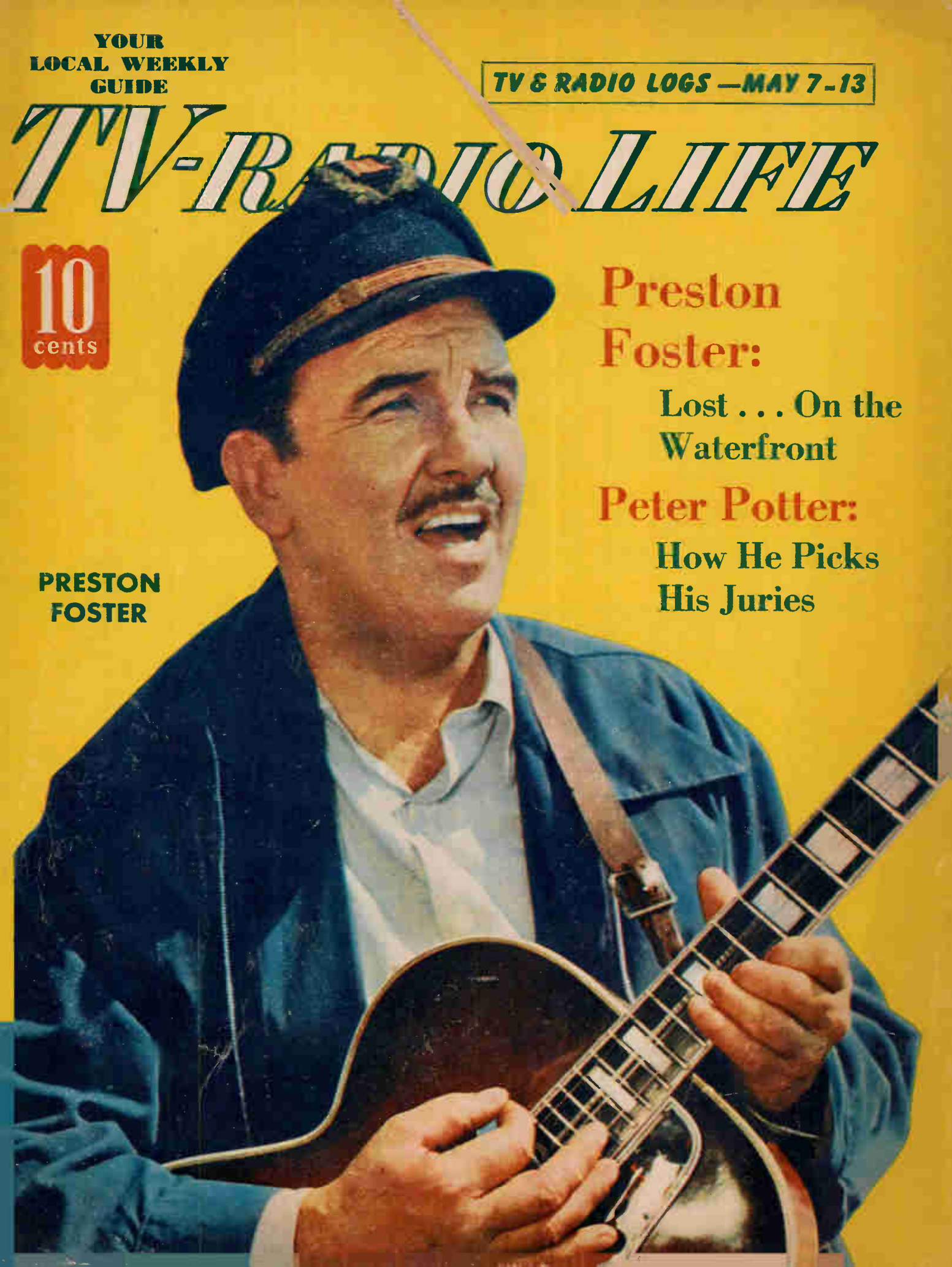

JACK LATHAM grinned broadly and said, "Me? I'm a great restler. It's my favorite pastime."

This isn't to imply that Jack is on the lazy side. With his hectic schedule he hasn't any time for just plain old idling. His two news shows on KRCA keep him hopping. So you can't blame him for liking to take things easy when he's home.

Jack looks completely at ease on TV. He seems to be breezing through his chores, but actually his nerves are all inside. The minute the red light goes off on that camera he's completely exhausted. So you can see why resting is the one hobby he most enjoys.

Back Yard Man

"Of course, I do have my chores about the house," Jack went on in his amiable, friendly manner. "I'm what you call a back yard operator. I spend most of my time fussing

with the swimming pool, trying to keep it clean and in good running order. I'm working on it more than I am swimming in it. I'm not one of those rugged individuals who dunks himself in the cool, cool waters around seven a.m. of a winter morning. I'm strictly the summer variety swimmer.

"The pool is quite a problem in other ways. My six-year-old son, Jack, and twelve-year-old Linda naturally have their select group of friends in the neighborhood and the pool is full of happy, yelling kids so much that it's hard for my wife, Margaret, and me to get room in it for any swimming. This summer I plan to adopt new strategy. I think I'll get a flag with a spear at the top. When it's all right for the children to use the pool I'll put the flag out in front. When it's down, that will mean no swimming.

"My other activities outdoors are not so extensive. I don't even go in much for gardening. I much prefer to be indoors listening to my phonograph records. I look forward to the times when I'm alone and can make my own selection of records and just sit back and enjoy a concert.

"I don't get much of a chance to read any more because my hours on TV are so haywire. I was once an avid James Cain fan, but now I have to settle for a short story or an article I can read in about thirty minutes. If I get started on a novel, it's too hard for me to put it down, and getting home as I do about 12:30 a.m. I can't start reading anything lengthy at that time.

"Once in a while you'll see me puttering about in the kitchen. Not that I'm a cook—I'm not, except for cooking soups. I could live on soup. I always prepare a batch of it when I go on a hunting trip with some friends. However, I should add here that I don't do any hunting myself. Fishing is okay, but if a big buck deer walked in front of me and sat

down on my lap I wouldn't have the courage to shoot it.

"My main interest at home, when you come right down to it, is encouraging Margaret to keep at her painting. She's also excellent when it comes to making ceramics and lamps. She has a tremendous talent."

Sentimentalist

If you were to ask Margaret what kind of a husband Jack is she'd say he was great—even with his acute case of sentimentality. He's sentimental, as he says, almost to a complete and utter fault.

"I'm especially sentimental about my home town of Spokane," Jack grinned. "Margaret came from there, too. One of the greatest thrills I had was driving back to Spokane for Christmas last year. I loved being there in the ice and snow but Margaret was not quite as impressed with the weather. I was particularly anxious to see all my boyhood pals and to see how they were getting along. It was quite a disappointment to me to find that they were far less interested in what I was doing than I was in their lives."

The other main interest in Jack's life is golf. But he's rather unhappy about the facilities for golf here in Los Angeles.

"It's amazing that in this place, with the greatest golf-playing climate in the world, there are less golf courses than there are even in Portland, Oregon," Jack said. "Consequently, it just takes too much time to find a course where you can get in a few fast rounds. But I'll take the inconvenience—I'm that crazy about the game. In fact, I think John Wald led the ideal life. He was associated with the 'Richie'd Reporter' and he used to tell me he had a regular eight-hour day—five hours on the golf course and three hours at the radio station.

"That's the kind of an eight-hour day I'd really like!"

You don't really know the delightful star of "Willy" until you visit her at her home. Here is an entirely different person, a warm-hearted, sentimental woman who lives in a world of both fantasy and reality.

JUNE HAVOC was out in the yard of her Hollywood Hills home picking flowers. Armed with flower basket, she was having a ball.

"I never had flowers before I got this place." June smiled as she snipped off some daffodils. "The only time I saw them was on opening night in the theatre. Now—just look! I have so many I give them to all my friends and to the crew of the 'Willy' set. Some of the men told me that I even have some very rare camellias. Can you imagine that! Me—having prize camellias!"

As she filled her basket with the daffodils, she smiled, "Why, in New York, these would cost seventy-nine

cents!" Then she showed me her trees—tangerines, peach, cumquats, golden limes, oranges, lemons. When she came to the peach trees she said, "See those little green fuzzy things on the limbs? Well, they're going to be edibles. We have so many interesting things on our ground that each day my husband Bill and I dash out to see what's new."

She snipped off some more flowers, saying as she did, "Now isn't that rude of me—cutting it when it's just beginning to grow." Her eyes then lit on some crawling green plant. Noticing it for the first time, she said, "Oh, look at that. Wonder what this is?" I told her it was a weed. To which June cracked, "Well, it can grow in my yard any time it

wants to." Then she added seriously, "Plants are like people—you can't tell the weeds from the flowers."

By now we were again in the backyard and June pointed to a honeysuckle bush. "Look at that horseradish plant—and oh! it smells so good."

We finally went back into the house, a lovely, cheery home with a slight modern touch to it. Inside were her little people—as she calls her three cats and her tiny Yorkshire terrier named Timothy. She referred to one cat as her "flowering Siamese."

"We're terribly under-catted and under-dogged right now," she laughed. "We usually have a lot more pets but we've lost a few." She turned to Timothy, a feisty, completely personable little dog who guards June like a watchdog, and said, "Timmy really needs a wife. His just died and he's very lonesome. I must see what I can do about that."

Loves Animals

June talks to her pets as though they were people—and they really seem to understand her. As she said,

"My friends say my pets are like enchanted people—and I think they are. As a child I was rather lonely so I poured out all of my problems and troubles to the dogs and cats I'd collect—and I believed in the answers they gave me. I really mean that.

"I think I have a way with animals. At least, I had one phenomenal experience. We were making a picture and the scene was in an alley, the end of which had been blocked off. A crowd was gathered. One woman let her dog get out of her arms and the poor thing got scared and started to run into the street. I saw a truck coming, I knew it couldn't stop, and I did the strangest thing—I just held out my arms to that dog. It jumped right into my arms. It was like a miracle, for it was almost certain that the truck would have hit it.

"Timmy joined my family about five years ago when we were in London. He's nine now and a little arthritic but he's such a wonderful friend. My cats are charming, too. Cecil—he's the black and white one that is supposed to look like a Siamese—is the most interesting cat. Look at that costume they sent him!" And she pointed to his rather odd coloring. She then remarked, "He makes it his business to raise other little people who come into the house. He's had quite a time, though, with Kel-

sey, our other Siamese who is beautiful—but not too bright. She's rather insecure. So Cecil takes care of her."

June put her flowers into a vase and after adding a final touch she laughed, "Now I'll put some cumquats around them and they'll look charming."

Her Home

June sat down in the living room and just looked around at her house. A softness crept into her voice. There was no banter, nothing facetious.

"A home isn't just a place for me to go and live," she said quietly. "You see, I never had a house before. In fact, when I was a child I can only recall being invited into a private home about three times. A home to me is a privilege, a wonderful blessing. I love everything about it—cooking, sewing, everything. I'm not very good at sewing, though. I try, but I always botch things up, so then I have to hire a dressmaker to redo what I've messed up. Yet, that doesn't stop me—I go right on trying—even though my efforts always turn out to be great expenses to the management.

"I am a good cook, though — a really good one. And I have several special recipes. My sister Gypsy and I said once, in fact, that if anything happened to our careers, heaven forbid, we'd make out fine because Norwegian domestics are hard to find these days.

"I'm a thrifty kind of cook, too. I use up everything. Nothing is wasted. I hate waste. It's a form of ignorance and ignorance saddens and frightens me."

With all of her love of home, June would never want to give up her career and just loll around in domesticity.

"I couldn't give up the work I've known all my life," June said. Then with a smile, "I love a home perhaps the way a playgirl loves champagne.

"About 'Willy,' though, I'm happy with its 'new look.' The locale is now in New York, you know, and I'm more directly involved with show people. It's a lot better—I hope.

"But I've loved working in TV and for CBS and Desilu. Not long ago my agent said he had a part for me in a picture but knew I wouldn't want it because it wouldn't come up until after I finished the current series of 'Willy' films. 'Then you'll want a vacation,' he said. I set him straight fast. 'Vacation?' I said. 'I've had a holiday for the last year.'

"Sure there's a lot of pressure in making TV films, but that's show business—and that's the way I live."

There's an old saying—to know someone is to love her. Well, that fits June Havoc to a T. It isn't just a matter of knowing her. It's a matter of wishing you had the dreamy light in your eyes so you could be a part of her enchanted world.

How Pete Picks 'Em

Peter "Juke Box Jury" Potter gives some candid opinions on how he selects the personalities on his CBS Radio and KNXT shows.

WILLIAM MANN PATRICK MOORE is a pleasure to interview. Mr. Moore — who incidentally has been known as plain Peter Potter ever since 1933 — just loves to talk.

He'd better — because as a disc jockey on KLAC and the moderator of CBS-Radio and KNXT's "Juke Box Jury," he makes his living at it.

Pete is loquacious and straightforward on any topic about which you ask him. For example: "Disc jockeys don't know music. Why should they? Their job is to sell the music to the public... I'm going to do everything in my power to wipe out the vicious practice of pressing dirty rhythm and blues records."

On this particular occasion, however, we were mainly concerned with how Pete picks his "Juke Box Jury" panel and some of the weekly problems he faces.

Over 1700 Guests

During the past five years, the smooth-talking salesman from Oklahoma has had over 1700 personalities as guests on both his radio and TV shows. (The KNXT show is seen only locally, but the CBS-Radio version goes from coast to coast.)

"Of that total number," Pete explained, "I would say that about one thousand of them know enough to be asked back. The others were just on the show for publicity purposes, such as to plug a motion picture.

"Believe me, we must have grown smart on 'Juke Box Jury.' For a long time we served as a guinea pig. I know some companies who used our program just to test a new personality. That doesn't happen any more."

In choosing celebrities for his

panel, Pete divides them into five basic categories:

1. Beauty and glamour.
2. Vocalists or recording artists.
3. Musical comedy stars.
4. Straight men and leading men.
5. Comedians and comedienne.

As a general rule, Pete doesn't include musicians or composers. "They are so opinionated about their own work and style that they can't give an honest appraisal of other people's records.

Ideal Panel

"I have had many excellent panels, but I think the best I've ever had included Phil Harris, Mickey Rooney, Debbie Reynolds and Zsa Zsa Gabor. When you analyze it, you can see why this group was so good:

"Harris is the well-rounded, versatile man; Rooney is the frustrated song writer who is completely honest because he's tried so often that now he listens carefully to find out what the successful writers have that he hasn't; Debbie is representative of the teenage group, who also sings herself, and who is a typical American girl buying records, and finally, Zsa Zsa is like the typical lady who goes into a record store wanting to buy some recordings for a birthday present but who doesn't know the difference between an RCA recording and a Spanish needle that plays records."

Facetiously, we asked Pete who he thought would be the "ideal" moderator for this "ideal" panel.

Seriously, he answered, "Steve Allen. He really knows his music and he has a great personality. I don't think a disc jockey should handle such a show."

In & Out of Focus (General Comment)

TV Tip of the Week

This week on KABC-TV's "U.S. Steel Hour," TV viewers will have a treat that we hope more programs and stations will follow. The Tuesday night show (Channel 7, 9:30 to 10:30 p.m.) will put on a repeat performance of **Ralph Bellamy** in "Fearful Decision."

This one-hour dramatic show was one of the finest and most-talked about performances of the past year.

TV-Radio Life would also like to see "Studio One" do a repeat of the award-winning drama, "Twelve Angry Men." We predict that the repeat of "Fearful Decision" (are you listening, Criswell?) will have as many if not more viewers than the first showing. Imagine, also, the audience that "Twelve Angry Men" would have!

Re-runs of mediocre shows have always been a legitimate gripe of TV fans. However, and unfortunately, we do not see enough repeats of the finer productions.

One of the big faults of TV is that once a topnotch program is seen, there is little chance of seeing it again. Of course, this is one of the big advantages that the movie industry has over television.

It has been suggested before in this magazine, and we are offering this "million dollar idea" again, free of charge: why don't the stations or networks say once a month at a late hour, or on Saturday or Sunday, re-run the "top shows of the month?" Think of the audience it would have! This policy would destroy once and for all the idea that when a TV show of merit is through, it is dead forever.

(Except, of course, the filmed properties, where we see re-runs during the summer, and months, even years later.)

In conclusion: Thank you ABC-TV and "U.S. Steel Hour" for "Fearful Decision."

What about it CBS-TV and "Studio One" for "Twelve Angry Men?"

"Dragnet" Goes Commercial

It was inevitable that a program as popular as "Dragnet" sooner or later would lend its name to various products. MCA has been licensing "Dragnet" properties to several manufacturers and before long their merchandise should be flooding the market.

Four toy manufacturers are currently producing holster gun sets; "Dragnet" squad car and police car assembly sets; water guns; plastic and metal cap guns, dart and cork target games and crime lab and various other games.

A leading clothing manufacturer has just signed a "Dragnet" franchise for

Trench coats and jackets, with other boys' apparel forthcoming.

Parents will well remember the days when "Hopalong Cassidy," "Roy Rogers," "The Lone Ranger" and other western merchandising gimmicks influenced the department stores to set aside a corral shop for the younger set. Space suits and similar gear also had eager small fry buyers, but by comparison their impact was not nearly as great as the western movement.

But it looks like the western and space cycle will have to make way for the little Sgt. Joe Fridays who'll be tracking down clues. Better watch out, Pop, or junior will be running an R and I on you.

Mental Patients on "March of Medicine"

Mental patients of St. Elizabeth's Hospital in Washington, D.C. will present in person their own story to the American public in an unparalleled telecast on NBC's "March of Medicine," May 15 at 10:00 p.m.

THERE'S AN INSISTENT HUMMING sound coming from NBC-TV—the wheels are revolving at a fast clip as summer and autumn programs are being manufactured. The other noon I had a fast conversation with Frank Cleaver, Program Director of NBC's Western Division, and though we both talked a blue streak for over an hour, it still wasn't time enough to touch on all the developments.

KNOWING THAT TV-RADIO LIFE READERS like to get behind scenes, I am condensing the highlights of Frank's remarks. First Dave Willock and Cliff Arquette are definitely going on NBC-TV this summer, an announcement which will be good news to their scads of fans. I agree with many of you—that Cliff and Dave are two of the cleverest performers to be teamed for TV. Have never been able to understand why they weren't sold commercially for keeps. Maybe this time!

"MUSICAL CHAIRS" IS GOING TO BE seen Sunday evening as a summer replacement. Johnny Mercer will be around and the basic format will be the same, but some aspects of the show will be changed. In place of George Gobel's show there will be a "new talent" type program, but they're playing it real smart by scheduling Georgie to appear on the show three or four times during the summer. That way his spot won't have to be re-heated so long come fall.

RE-RUNS ARE TO FILL THE TIME now devoted to "Medic," "It's a Great Life," "So This Is Hollywood," "This Is Your Life," and probably Loretta Young's show.

ON SATURDAY OR SUNDAY THERE will be an hour or a half hour special summer program. Details are still too sketchy for definition.

THERE WILL BE FOUR NBC-TV summer spectaculars with Jack Rayel, who has produced all Maurice Evan's telecasts, serving as executive producer. It is even possible that one of these "specs" may come from Hollywood Bowl, where a Colgate song show was so successfully picked up last year. "No color this summer," replied Cleaver to my query. "Black and white only." Also in the plan book is a one-shot of the rodeo in Houston, Texas, in June. It's possible that Alan Handley may produce-direct "Tilby" as a "spec."

AT THIS STAGE OF THE GAME it may be better not to enter into all the details of things cooking for fall—there are so many scripts and pilots floating around that it's bewildering. But mention at least should be made of the following: Paul Gilbert has a new TV show for which pilot will be shot at Roach Studios within six weeks; Senor Wences has a color series called "Johnny and the Gaucho," "The Soldier," co-starring Hal March and Tom D'Andrea, is still hot; the pilot is finished on Cy Howard's "Just Plain Folks," in which Cy himself co-stars with Zsa Zsa Gabor (they

couldn't find the "right" person for the role, so someone suggested Howard fill it and he did, happily and well, so I'm told).

"GILDERSLEEVE" IS HAVING ANOTHER go at it. This time they're sticking closer to the radio idea which is still universally popular. Orders are in for thirty-nine films for syndication AND, there are five offers for network sponsorship, so this should really hit now.

ONE OF THE SHOWS CLEAVER IS MOST excited about is "The Frontier," which is, in Cleaver's words, "an attempt to do an adult Western." A no-name cast will be used, with Tony Miner guiding. Other projected fare includes the Agnes Moorehead-Paul Kelly series, "The Amazing Miss Withers;" "Briefcase," a legal "medic" backed by the Bar Association; "My American Wife," pilot of which was shot in Paris, starring Geraldine Brooks and Claude Dauphin; an Alexander Botts series; "Impact," a suspense anthology; "Jigger," a romantic-adventure program, and get this! A script is now being written to star Roy Rogers' dog, Bullet!

THERE'S LOTS MORE FRANK CLEAVER told me, but enough for now. All I can say is I came away from our jam-packed date with a feeling that TV fare is on the upbeat. If only half or a third of these shows pan out, our screens will be brighter. And to further boost the TV picture was Cleaver's remark, "We (the TV networks) can now compete with motion picture studios in paying writers and talent!"

THE PUBLICITY PEOPLE WERE SO BUSY taking pictures of Richard Carlson and Herbert A. Philbrick at the former's party for the latter that it was next to impossible to chat with either the "reel" or real Philbrick. But I was lucky enough to grab a few minutes to meet the man who led three lives. He is a person whom I admire tremendously. The outlook against Communism in this country is good, Philbrick feels, but in the rest of the world it is dark. "In the last thirty-seven years the Communists have added 1000 square miles a day to their territory," he stated.

HERE'S A FOLLOW-UP TO THE RECENT YARN TV-Radio Life did on Clete Roberts' old 1936 Ford, commonly mistaken today for a foreign car. Last week the KNXT newsman located another Lizzie, same vintage, and though it had been practically disassembled by some teen-ager, Clete bought the parts and is having the thing put to-

*This Week in TV—Continued**Rogers Rodeo Remote*

Roy Rogers Enterprises and more than 100 NBC-TV affiliate stations are joining in a unique nationwide kids' promotion designed to focus attention on NBC's network telecast from San Antonio on June 21 of a full hour of the Roy Rogers World Championship Rodeo being staged there.

Core of the promotion is an essay contest for children of twelve or under, the subject being the meaning of the Alamo, famous historical shrine near San Antonio. 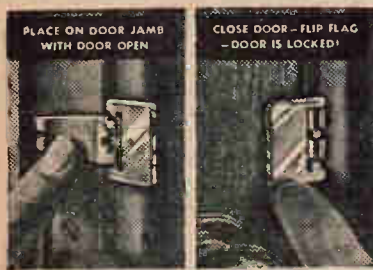

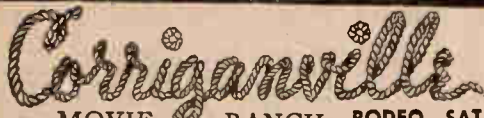

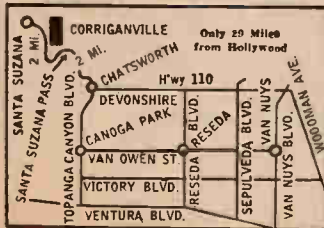

Some of the guests should be taking adrenalin shots or else they should be getting new writers because there's nothing as deadly on this show as a panel of people saying, "Well, I don't know much about music but I like Susie Schmaltz and I like her record and I think it will be a hit." Where do you go from there? Ken's remarks to Mickey Rooney were especially off-beat and amusing. However, Ken is much too excited about the progress his "Where Were You?" show is making to give anything else too much thought. He enjoys doing Pete's program and other projects are brewing for him, but his baby is his KTTV show.

Speaking of Mickey Rooney, he did a noble job at the Coconut Grove. He proved again that he has talents that somehow have not received recognition on his TV show, "Hey, Mulligan!" It's too bad this NBC offering is one of the casualties of the year because, on the whole, it was a thoroughly good show. Mickey continues to be the most underrated actor and performer around and his act at the Grove proved how very versatile he is.

Had a nice letter from Everett "Jake" Jacobs of KFVD. He has a newscast at eight a.m. and has been giving out with the news for the past two and a half years. "Jake" is the first Negro to do a world newscast in Los Angeles, and he has done a consistently good job.

Notes from Here and There: Pinky Lee is certainly in solid. He did a show in Cleveland to a full house of 17,000 kids and then had to do a second program to accommodate an overflow crowd of 6000 . . . The Hecht-Lancaster picture, "Marty," is proving that a TV property can be made into a successful movie—even without any star names. This film, based on the television play seen first on Philco Playhouse, has become a mere sensation in its New York debut. The same magic it created on TV has fortunately been retained in the movie version. Paddy Chavelsky, the author, is the fair-haired boy in the movie studios now, as is Rod Serling who wrote the successful "Patterns." His work is gathering premium prices. And Gwen Bagnl, who has written umpteen TV scripts, just finished writing a picture at Columbia . . . Now that subscription TV is the talk of the moment it's too bad that Zenith and Phonevision don't have Betty Hussey around to beat the drums for them. Betty's services to Zenith were far beyond the mere call of duty and her expert public "relation-ing" is missed.

The battle is on for sure now. From latest reports it looks as though "The Comedy Hour" as such will not be around next season and that a new Colgate series, spearheaded by Dean Martin and Jerry Lewis, will fill the slot. Plans tentatively call for a kind of variety show with a permanent emcee and with Dean and Jerry doing a minimum of five appearances. The announcement is not too surprising since Martin and Lewis were the only big guns the show had this year. Nor is the added note that a spectacular with top stars will be seen on the new set-up every fourth Sunday. This is an all-out effort to knock Ed Sullivan and "Toast of the Town" out of the high ratings spot. But isn't a variety series something of an imitation of Ed's format? It would seem that way. Ed is apparently unconcerned about the new plans—and you can be sure he will find a way to meet and perhaps top any competition. This kind of a fight is healthy and good for TV. It's just too bad, though, that two pow-

erhouses have to be on at the same time. "The Comedy Hour" had a rough time this season and it seemed that no matter what it tried it couldn't beat Ed. Now with this new arrangement all kinds of things can happen—and probably will. So good luck to both sides. As for us viewers, we're going to be handed some topnotch shows next season—we hope. There are those who still believe that the new format for the Colgate hour is a "blind" for Paramount Pictures' actual entrance into active TV in this time slot. But those in the know are being very coy at the moment about admitting anything of the kind. We shall wait and see.

In answer to our item last week about the battle of the 11 p.m. newscasters, Sam Zelman, who is KNXT's News Director, claims, "Professional rigor mortis is impairing the movement and imaginations of too many television news departments. The enterprise and initiative that newspapers have made part and parcel of the news

I think a milestone has been reached with this actor's support of a criticism damning his own picture, and I am happy to know that this astute, sensitive, intelligent (he reads my column) performer will be eager to second any future depreciating remarks I may make about his work. So, I guess I'll have to say that I think Mr. Foster did a fine job in "The Informer."



"Goodness Gracious (or some similar expletive)" I can hear him saying, "Does he have to go back that far"? As a matter of fact, I have gone back quite a bit, lately.

"Appointment in London." (5) May 8, 7:30. This is a 1953 British release,

shown here for the first time on TV, and starring Dirk Bogarde and Ian Hunter, in a tale of a British bombing squadron and its offensive against the Germans in 1943. Bogarde is a squadron leader with 89 missions and a driving ambition to make it 90. The doctor grounds him, however, and he is forced to disobey orders to get in his last sortie. He is awarded a medal, instead of disciplinary action, naturally, because of his heroism in a final air battle sequence that is the best thing about this film, which was directed by Philip Leacock, the director of the current and delightful, "The Little Kidnappers."

Instead of Another Movie here, inasmuch as the pickings of the pix are rather lean this week, I thought you'd like to hear about another letter I received. "Double Life." (9) May 13, 10:50. Here is Ronald Colman's Academy Award winning performance as a schizophrenic actor who enacts Othello, and carries his homicidal impulse over into his real life with disastrous consequences. The film deals fairly and kindly with the theatre and its people, and boasts a couple of good performances by Signe Hasso and Edmond O'Brien.

"Down Memory Lane." (13) May 13, 8:30. This tribute to Mack Sennett and his past is quite painful when it presents the present in the person of Steve Allen, as a cavorting TV disk jockey peering at old films, but it's well worth viewing when it gives us a look at some old clips of the Keystone Kops, Bing Crosby, and, especially, W. C. Fields, as a golfing dentist. Even then, however, it's a little painful to hear a great comedian like Fields make extraneous, slurring racial remarks. Mabel Normand, Franklin Pangborn and Ben Turpin can also be seen in this collection of nostalgia and I think you'll enjoy it.

"Private Affairs of Bel Ami." (9) May 10, 10:50. Ah, that Ralph . . . he's a cagy one.

Are Athletes Actors?

You can watch the answer on KTTV's "Sports Mirror," in which world-renowned athletes play dramatic and comedy roles.

As Told to BILL HOLMES

"Can you take an athlete and make an actor out of him in one day? Can a man or woman who has never appeared before a camera, immediately overcome his natural fear of the lens, his stage-fright and his total ignorance of dramatic technique?"

Those were some of the questions that had to be answered when George Wickham, Jr. and Bob Wickham of Wickham Films in Glendale first came to me with the idea of "Sports Mirror." I had to admit that the idea was novel. Certainly no other program, to our knowledge, had shown an athlete enacting in a dramatic scene what he might have been if he hadn't turned to sports for a career. And the idea of the "Sports Mirror," through which the camera eye could peek into the life that might have been, was certainly a fresh gimmick to introduce the dramatic segment of the show.

But a sponsor who invests enough money to film 26 pictures has to be sure it isn't being wasted on a gamble. So first of all, we had to prove to our potential sponsor that athletes were

actors—and that in one day (which was all the time we could expect a big-name athlete to give us) we could star him in a dramatic role, and turn in a creditable performance—not the performance of an amateur, but one that would compare professionally with other dramatic offerings on television.

Mickey Walker

This was a challenge to me, as well as to the athlete. As a director of summer stock, as a "play-doctor" readying dramas for the Broadway stage, and in my present job of directing "The Drunkard" and "The Wayward Way" for the Theatre Mart in Los Angeles, I had worked constantly with professionals. But these athletes were raw amateurs, so far as dramatics were concerned. Would they be scared? Camera shy? Temperamental? Or worst of all, would they prove to be just plain incompetent?

Fortunately, one of the greatest stars in American sports history was available—Mickey Walker, the prize-fighter. He was to become our "guinea pig." Through Paul Zimmerman, sports editor of the Los Angeles "Times," and Braven Dyer, one of the nation's outstanding columnists, we contacted Mickey and sold him on the idea. Paul and Braven agreed to appear in the pilot film with him.

The next day they all showed up at Wickham Films. Now we'd find out whether the whole idea was valid or not. If Mickey could become an actor in one day, so could other athletes. If he couldn't . . . well, that would be the end of "Sports Mirror."

We put make-up on Mickey, set up the cameras and started shooting. The interview portion of the show, with Paul and Braven conducting the third degree, went off well. Mickey was poised, answered questions easily, and supplied humorous anecdotes about his experiences in the ring.

That same afternoon, we started to shoot the dramatic portion of the show, a sketch in which he portrayed an artist in a Paris flat (which is what he might have been, had he not become one of the world's greatest fighters).

He proved to be what is termed in the industry "a natural." He was perfectly at home in front of the camera, spoke his lines with ease and assurance, and "lived" the part.

Joe DiMaggio

Another of the shows in this series that we'll long remember was filmed with the great Joe DiMaggio, who told us that if he hadn't gone into baseball as a career, he might have become a bookkeeper. We sent him a script, but he turned it down. "This is a comedy,"

he protested. "I'm a serious guy. The fellow in the script isn't me. How about writing something serious instead?"

So we junked the first script, burned the midnight oil, and by the next day had another script, which DiMaggio accepted at once. We filmed the show that same day and found that Joe, serious and level-headed as always, had memorized his lines perfectly. He listened attentively to stage and camera directions and understood them. We filmed his dramatic scene in an afternoon, with a minimum of retakes.

When it was over, I said to Joe, "You know, you've done a remarkable thing. You've never acted before. Yet you turned in a sincere and moving performance. You were natural! And best of all, you were convincing."

Joe smiled. "Well, Dan," he said. "I don't think you'll have any trouble with most of the athletes. You see, we've been 'on stage' more than you think. The 50,000 fans that jam the stands during a world series are certainly an audience. So is a stadium full of tennis fans at Wimbledon, or a crowd of football enthusiasts, shivering in the rain at a Rose Bowl game.

"Yes," continued Joe, "I think every athlete is used to an audience and a 'stage.' And as for motion picture cameras. . . ." Joe laughed. "Why, I've had the lenses of newsreel cameras staring at me for as long as I can remember, and so has every other athlete that ever got his name in the

In "Pitch" Marguerite gets a chance to add to her laurels by displaying her talents as a comedienne.

The telemusical concerns a ball team which is forced to sell its franchise because it finished in last place for four consecutive seasons and is literally broke. Opera star Piazza, who claimed as a youngster she strengthened her pipes by rooting for the team, saves them from financial disaster by becoming the boss lady of the team. Tony Martin as "Ted Warren," ace slugging outfielder, provides the romantic interest in the late Milton Lazarus's book.

The boy-meets-girl telemusical-comedy showcases "Take Me Out To The Ball Game" and other pop tunes with a few operatic selections, Chrysler Corporation, makers of Plymouth, Dodge, DeSoto, Chrysler and Imperial cars, is the sponsor.

Marguerite was excited about her "Shower of Stars" debut and commented on the precedent she set by having her costumes fitted for the telecast in the lounge of the International Airport during her twenty minute stopover between planes when she was enroute from Las Vegas to New York several weeks ago.

Background

Marguerite, a tall, slender beauty, was born in New Orleans—the New Orleans of jazz kings Louis Armstrong, Kid Ory, Jelly Roll Morton and King Oliver. And while nature gifted her with a powerhouse soprano voice that has thrilled Metropolitan Opera fans, her heritage is that cosmopolitan fusion of Creole melodies, hymns, marches, work songs and blues that the world knows as "Dixieland" music.

Although her mother wanted her to be a pediatrician, Marguerite decided on a singing career at an early age. "To pay for her vocal lessons, she became a church soloist," her mother says. "She sang at five different churches each Sunday—Roman Catholic, Methodist, Episcopalian, Baptist and Presbyterian. She would rush from one church to the other in a taxi. Sunday, for her, was really quite a day!"

Marguerite entered a series of contests and her magnificent voice carried her through the many competitions. Her success led to jobs in radio and television and eventually the Metropolitan Opera. Her Met debut was right at the top as the lead in "Die Fledermaus." Many other operatic roles followed, but Marguerite rebelled and quit the Met when they

demanding that she serve the opera only and reject her other offers.

It was through the medium of television that Marguerite Piazza received national acclaim. Her appearances on the former "Show of Shows" skyrocketed her success.

Family

Not only is the vivacious lady a singing success, but she also combines the roles of wife and motherhood with her career. Marguerite has three children, Gregory, eight, Jimmy, four, and Shirley, one. Her husband is William J. Condon, business executive. The family lives in a rambling home in Memphis, Tennessee.

Marguerite claims she is happy in any medium as long as she's singing whether it's be-bop or Bizet. Of her many successful performances she recalls one with tearful nostalgia. When she sang Friml's "Only a Rose" in Houston, representatives of the rose industry interrupted the performance to carry 2000 roses on stage as a surprise tribute to the singer.

Marguerite wanted to turn and flee, but her trouper instinct wouldn't let her. Instead, she embraced an armful of the flowers, with tears streaming down her cheeks, thanked her admirers. But the tears weren't real. And her admirers still don't know the truth—she's allergic to roses!

Local station says scene from episode of "Death Valley Days" is "objectionable."

KNXT yanked a "Death Valley Days" episode last week when the stations film editors deemed several scenes objectionable for the small fry.

KNXT's Bob Marcus explained that because "Death Valley" is televised at 7:00 p.m. they had to consider the children predominating the viewing. Had "Death Valley" been on at a later time there would have been no question whatsoever about showing the film. The dialogue, role and story treatment were all acceptable, however the film was yanked because too much anatomy was visible in several scenes.

The actress who was so amply endowed played the role of a waitress and was really a sympathetic character but her tight fitting, low cleavage gowns were deemed taboo for the kids, especially on the close-up shots. There was one frame in the film where her bosom was the sole subject in sight.

KNXT is to be complimented for their careful scrutiny of films. Realizing that they are in a very vulnerable position they are wise to take every precaution to avoid criticism. They

have also blue-pencilled several of the "Our Gang Comedies" from "Space Funnies" because of improper handling of racial issues and scaring the kids.

Discrimination by television stations is an important public relations factor. They reason it is far better to censor certain shows than be forced into the situation by strong, public disapproval.

sports pages. Cameras don't bother us a bit."

And it turned out just as Joe DiMaggio had said. Athletes had just enough of the old "ham" in them to make their performances realistic. The same coordination, quick reflexes and ability to relax that had made them top golfers or swimmers, now helped them to be graceful and convincing in front of a camera. Exercise and sunshine had made them healthy and dynamic. The camera picked up these characteristics. Best of all, every one of these athletes was a good sport and a "regular fellow." The sensitive, intimate eye of the camera recorded and transmitted these qualities as "sincerity," that most elusive element of a great performance.

Speaking as a director, I can say that working with these athletes was a pleasurable and rewarding experience. Jack Dempsey, for instance, essayed his role of a coal miner with the enthusiasm of a professional. Wearing a miner's helmet and overalls, he smeared his face with soot, for realistic effect, and made his role of a mine cave-in hero so vivid that it has brought tears to the eyes of many who have seen his performance on film.

Pete De Paolo, the racing driver, and Jimmy McLarnin, the boxer, turned out to be capable comedians. Henry Armstrong, another fighter, gave a moving, human portrayal as a wise and kindly Negro doctor. Florence Chadwick, channel swimmer, and Alice Marble, tennis ace, handled highly dramatic roles with ease and effectiveness.

Incidentally, one of our guest stars provided the show with its first local sponsor. Johnny Lindell, former star pitcher with the New York "Yankees," was so enthusiastic about his appearance on "Sports Mirror" that he asked us to make another film, explaining the work of the 7-UP Youth Foundation, of which he is the director.

We agreed, and the film was made, explaining how the Foundation furnishes uniforms, caps, equipment and instructors to "Little League" and park recreation teams. By the time it was finished, we had won another friend, Johnny's boss, Jim Smith, general manager of the 7-UP Bottling Company of Los Angeles, who became "Sports Mirror's" sponsor in the Los Angeles area.

Looking back on the months of labor necessary to put our show on film, I am more than grateful to all those athletes who made our work easy and pleasant by their cheerful cooperation. They took the challenge in stride, fought it to a finish, and emerged victorious, proving that athletes ARE actors. When you, the audience, see them on "Sports Mirror" each Saturday afternoon at 4:45 on KTTV (Channel 11), I think you'll be as thrilled as I was to see what they were able to do.

Ear, Eye Inspire the Pen

Re: Subscription TV.

Speaking for myself only, I would say that TV costs us enough as it is, without having to pay extra for the better programs. New price on our set (we bought a used one) was \$580 plus tax, aerial and installation—something over \$600.

My husband and I are in the lower middle income group, with static pay-check. It does not vary and is no more than we need each month to live ordinarily well. Any outside expenditures would be a serious drain on our resources. We do try to live on a budget, and that includes reserves for taxes, insurance, radio upkeep. We do not expect to ever see our way clear to buying a color set. Neither would we see where we could spare the money for "subscription" TV. I think that if we are going to pay for our shows, we'll go to a movie where we can really see a good show. I am quite sure we won't be found poking money through a slot to see anything on TV.

You may say that it is pay for the shows, or no TV at all. So what? We got along fairly well before we bought our set. We'd probably get more reading done and even go to see friends occasionally. TV has almost made home visiting a thing of the past, which is pitiable.

For the moneyed class, pay TV may be what is wanted. But for the lower income groups, I suspect it will be a flop.

This is just my opinion as arrived at from my viewpoint, and not necessarily shared by any of my neighbors or friends.

TV-Radio Life had a complete story on "Subscription TV" in last week's issue. The FCC will give a decision on the subject in June. As always, "Ear, Eye Inspire" is open to pro and con comments on the subject.

In connection with the article on "Subscription TV" in your recent issue, I can see a couple of objections that I have not seen in print:

1. It is not always possible to know in advance whether or not a program will be one the viewer would care to see. How often does one turn on a program with a promising title only to turn it off in disappointment! If one has paid his money he is stuck—unless there should be some sort of device whereby the coin would be returned if the program were turned off after, say, the first ten minutes or so.

2. Nothing is said about what happens to the "admission fee" if the set goes bad in the middle of a paid program.

Of course, it is true that people who do not wish to have subscription TV need not acquire a set equipped for it. But, unless the idea meets with wide acceptance, I don't think the project could result in anything but financial loss to its backers.

You have received numerous letters protesting the shouting, loud-mouthed commercial announcers. Also, the blaring "music" heard during the showing of motion picture features. "Nightwatch" Off

CBS radio's outstanding "Nightwatch" series went the way of all shows this week which are without sponsors. The award-winning realistic police show was cancelled.

CBS has been flooded with phone calls. TV-Radio Life has received several letters all asking the same question: why was it cancelled? Will it return?

It was cancelled because no sponsor would pick up the tab. For some reason, companies and agencies did not think this type of super-realism was the proper outlet for selling a product. According to Sterling Tracy of the "Nightwatch" staff there is a good possibility the show will soon return to the airwaves. When and if it does, TV-Radio Life will be the first to notify its readers. If it doesn't return, we think someone, somewhere has missed out on "a good buy."

"High Flying"

The press has been getting up in the air lately . . . over pleasant matters not upsetting ones. KNX and the American Airlines celebrated the second anniversary of "Music 'Til Dawn" by taking the press for an afternoon birthday flight over California. (Plans to tour the Grand Canyon from the air had to be disbanded the last minute because of high winds.)

While Mel acted as official host of the birthday trip Dave Showalter, KNX-CPN director of Public Affairs, was busily taping interviews with the various personages for an upcoming "Cross Section" broadcast.

AA's Bill Hipple, KNX's Gordon Mason and other staffers who were responsible for this delightful trip are to be commended. This must be the cycle for air-promotion-press trips, last week the press went aloft for the "Climax" telecast of "Flight 951." Who knows probably the next gimmick will be asking the press to submerge in a submarine.

Voice of America

The U.S. Information Agency recorded the National Symphony Orchestra last week when Theodore Vayanniss, Director of the National Symphony of Athens, Greece, conducted a benefit performance for Queen Fredericka's Fund for Orphans of Greece. The broadcast will be beamed through Voice of America facilities.



Fred's Corner

Judging from the comments we've heard, Hollywood fans are giving hearty endorsement to the youth movement of the Hollywood Stars. And judging from the showing thus far, the Stars youth movement gives indication of real future dividends. If you've seen some of the action on KHJ-TV, Channel 9, or have been at the park, you'll agree with these sentiments.



The eighteen year old second baseman, Bill Mazeroski, is a young fellow from Tiltenville, Ohio, where he was an all state basketball star as well as a diamond discovery. Bill's fielding shows real class, despite the fact that he has but one previous year in organized ball. But even there, the fact that Bill could come out of high school and hold his own in a Class A League (Eastern) shows what he can do. Bobby Del Greco's hard-hitting has been a real surprise to Hollywood fans. Bobby, who is now twenty-two and an expectant father (the Del Greco's already have one youngster), is a ballplayer who had the "can't miss" label when he was first signed.

In recent years, the scouts and observers who followed him gave him another tag, "Can't miss—if he learns to hit." There was nothing to indicate that he had learned to hit, until the 1955 season began, and Del Greco burst out with a batting streak that made the whole league aware of him. The fact that Del Greco was doing this stick work while playing a strange position (third base) is more to his credit.

He has a great arm, is fast, covers the outfield superbly, and now is adding the other two requisites of a great ballplayer—hitting, and hitting with power. The twenty-year old first baseman from Moultrie, Georgia, R. C. Stevens, a big six-foot, four-inch, two-hundred pounder, is learning rapidly. His fielding leaves little to be desired, and his hitting is coming around to the point where the fans who hailed him as a power hitter may be proven correct. Along with 21-year-old Roberto Sanchez at short, 23-year-old Lee Walls from rightfield, and 23-year-old Jim Mangan behind the plate, these men form the real youth of the Stars "new look." There is also 20-year-old "Cholly" Naranjo, the hard luck pitcher of the league so far. The Havana boy looks like the best of the new pitchers, and has displayed a great coolness under fire and a poise that even older hurlers sometimes never attain.

We've spoken of youth, and the indications that President Bob Cobb of the Stars has his club pointing in the right direction, but there are cynics

who're wondering if the youth movement hasn't gone too far. We've heard grizzled baseball veterans who complain "You can insert two or three kids, yes, but not a whole new team like the Stars are doing." Well, manager Bobby Bragan has done a remarkable job at the helm, far better at this stage than most skeptics thought possible, and it's Mr. Bragan and the kids who may take the bows.

As to the "whole new team" angle, much of the burden will doubtless be taken over by the more experienced players on the Hollywood roster. The great Carlos Bernier, the proven Jack Lohrke, veteran pitchers Red Munger, George O'Donnell and Lino Dinoso will be the old hands who provide the right amount of seasoning to keep the Stars in the thick of it. And while we're extending credits, let's give a hand to coach Gordie Maltzberger, manager Bragan's right hand man. A fine pitcher himself, "Maltzie" is doing a fine job with the young hurlers, as well as coaching at first or third.

One sidelight on play so far that occurs to me is this: every year there's talk of the baseball having a lot of "rabbit." The ball is said to be "livelier" the moment clubs break out with a rash of home runs. Certain pitchers who haven't hit one in ten years, suddenly belt one out of the park. Hatten and Lown of the Angels were examples this spring.

The talk always reminds me of the story told of Johnny Mize some years back. Mize, never eloquent and always a quiet one, was being interviewed by a reporter one spring on the subject of the "rabbit" ball. "Why are there so many home runs this year, Johnny. It's got to be the baseball," said the reporter. Mize was silent. Then finally the reporter said, "Well, look at Eddie Miller, who's never been a home run hitter. Why he's got eleven, right up there with Kiner and you. Why do you think he's suddenly getting those homers?" Mize reflected a moment and then replied, "He's hitting the long ball."

Speaking of the "long ball," that's one thing the Hollywood Stars can use, in the opinion of the baseball experts, so here's hoping you see a few more drift over the wall at Gilmore Field this week as the Stars play the San Francisco Seals. KHJ-TV, Channel 9 will have all the action for you, and we'll be at the mike for all the Stars home games. And may the better team (Hollywood) win!

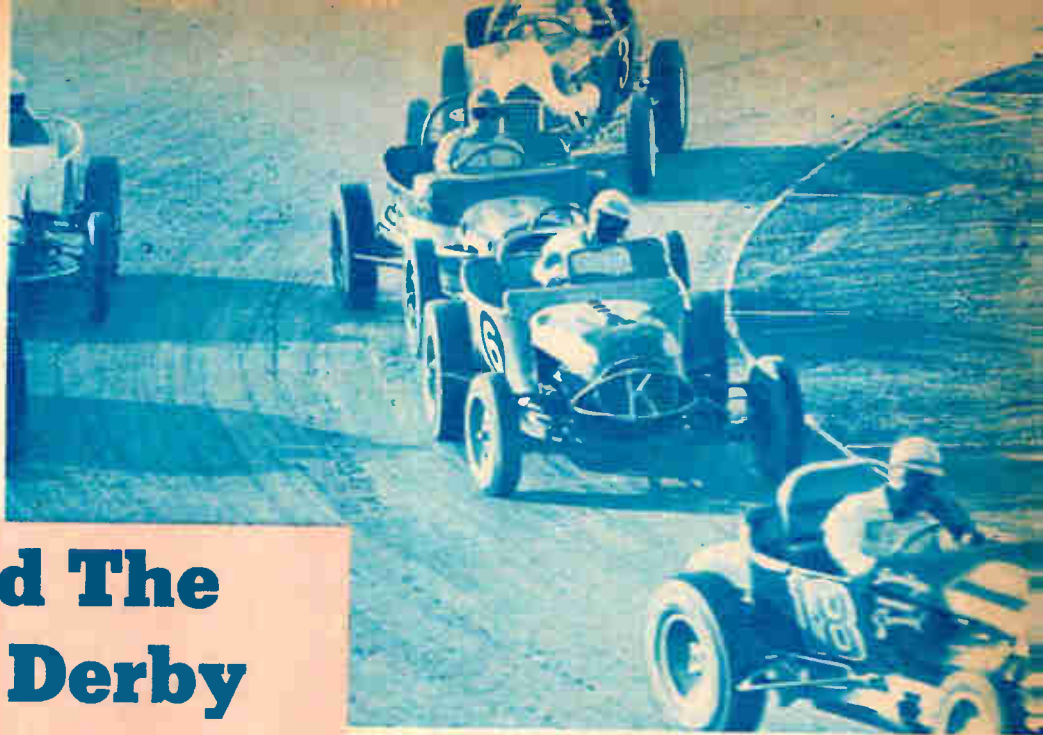

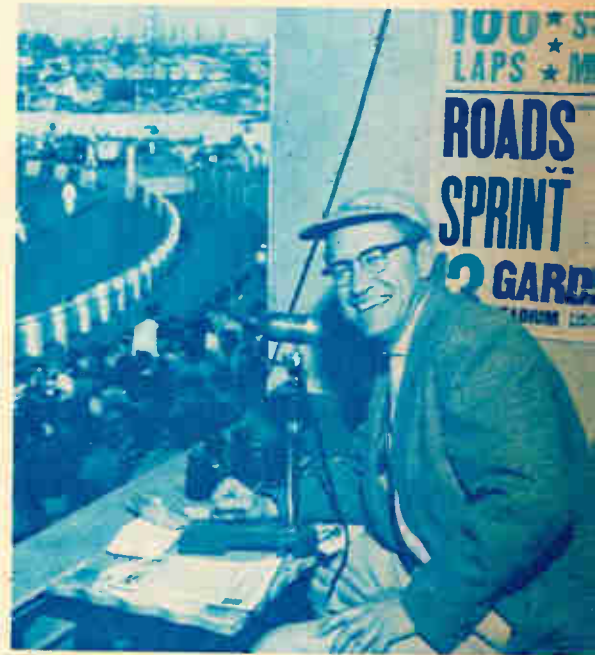

How Preston Foster Stopped Being Himself

There's an actor missing in town these days and his name is Preston Foster. At last reports, a certain "Cap'n John" had kidnapped him.

THE MANY, MANY FANS of KTTV's "Waterfront" are well familiar with Preston as "Cap'n John" and the "Cheryl Ann."

ONE NIGHT Preston Foster and his wife, Sheila, were coming out of a restaurant. A little boy came up to him and said, "Cap'n John, is that your wife?" pointing to Sheila. Pres said she was. "She doesn't look like your wife on TV," the boy persisted. Pres laughed and said, "But that's Lois Moran—she's only my wife on 'Waterfront.' This is the real Mrs. Foster," and he introduced Sheila. The youngster was still confused. "You're sure that this lady is your wife?" There was a pause and the youngster finally said bluntly, "Well, then how come you kiss that lady on TV?"

This is a typical incident. Preston Foster faces them all the time. He has lost his identity, but this doesn't bother him. He thinks "Cap'n John" is a pretty good Joe.

Cap'n John vs. Preston

"We're always running into situations where kids think of me only as 'Cap'n John,'" Pres remarked. "Once Sheila and I were leaving on the Super Chief to go to Detroit. As the redcap was loading our luggage a little boy leaned out from a car on the other tracks and said, almost indignantly, 'Why, "Cap'n John," you're supposed to be on the "Cheryl Ann!"'"

"But it's not only the youngsters who think of me like this. I was in Columbus recently and spent a good deal of time with a very important man who happened to be one of my sponsors. As far as I can remember he never called me anything but

'Cap'n John' all during my time with him.

"It's the same at Hal Roach Studios where we film the Roland Reed production of 'Waterfront' for KTTV. Once I called one of the departments on the lot for something I wanted. I said, 'This is Preston Foster.' Apparently I wasn't distinct because the voice at the other end said, 'Who?' I repeated 'Preston Foster.' Still no response. Finally, I said, 'You know, "Cap'n John."' This registered—and I got what I wanted. When I hung up I turned to Sheila and said, 'Is it getting to be like that here too?'"

His role in "Waterfront" even has affected Sheila. People call her "Mrs. Cap'n John." A director of a telethon called from New York after seeing what Pres and Sheila did for seventeen hours on a Milwaukee telethon. When he got them on the phone he said, "I'd like to have 'Cap'n John' and 'Mrs. Cap'n John' on this telethon here."

When Pres and Sheila did the Milwaukee benefit ninety-nine out of a hundred pledges mailed in or phoned in were addressed just to "Cap'n John."

So how does Pres feel about losing his identity so completely? As he cracked to a friend once, "Why should I care? I'm only making a lousy fortune."

He Is the Role

However, Pres is used to not being known as Preston Foster. He even forgets who he is when he's working. No matter what picture he

is doing he somehow submerges himself into the role. When he did the movie, "Valley of Decision," he played an Irishman, which is not an exactly new kind of part for Pres. All during production he was going around at home talking in an Irish dialect. When he did "Thunderhoof" he played a desert-rat-type of guy. He even wore the clothes he had on in the picture around the house at night.

Things may really get confused later since there is talk of a new series for Pres, in which he will play another type of personality. So he may be called something else then. Once more it will be a case of Pres not falling into a part but the part's absorbing him. This is a man who can fit into any character with ease. He once finished playing the role of a public enemy number one in a picture one day and started the next day in another playing a priest.

It's almost getting so that when people refer to him as Preston Foster he asks, "Who? Who's he?"

"Public Defender" is not just another "investigating" show. It is a reminder to all that in the Public Defender you have someone who may help you get out of serious difficulty.

REED HADLEY has certainly been TV's favorite public servant. As the conscientious, fighter-for-justice on "Racket Squad" he got himself quite a few fans. Now he is again serving the public in his KNXT series, "Public Defender."

"This particular show I feel has great importance," Reed said recently. "Not only because all of the cases dramatized are based on the files of the Public Defender's office in Los Angeles and offices in other parts of the country, but because it is a constant reminder to people that in the Public Defender they have an officer who is ready to serve them in times of trouble and who, by his relentless investigation, may even save lives. And whose services cost them nothing."

"Last year, in Los Angeles, the office had 22,000 cases—and as news about the Public Defender gets out the number of cases goes up. And there is about a murder a week to be investigated.

No Recognition

"The Public Defender has had a hard battle being recognized. Few funds are appropriated for his office, his staff is not large enough to handle all the cases, and his men work hours and hours overtime. Yet, this is an office in which a man can feel pride. Here is direct service to those in need. For instance, at least 150 cases that were facing death penalties for crimes allegedly com-

mitted had their sentences reduced to life imprisonment or were acquitted altogether as a result of the work done by the office. The Public Defender here takes his work so seriously he even turned down a Federal judgeship because he thought he could give more service in his present capacity."

Reed, on the show, plays the counterpart of Lt. Ed Bliss of the Public Defender's office. The Lieutenant admits that the show is of great importance.

"You can't count in dollars and cents the good 'Public Defender' does," Lt. Bliss remarked. "It reminds the public that there is another side to any case—the accused's side. Too many people automatically assume that the accused is guilty. To remember there are two sides is especially important for prospective jurors. We apparently make an impression because one district attorney in Florida, for example, excused everyone on a jury who had seen 'Public Defender' on TV.

"Yet, in spite of all the service this office does there are only seventy-two public defenders in the United States and only ten investigators, four of which are here.

"Our office not only investigates all kinds of cases that come to us but we even continue investigation after a trial is officially over if we feel there is still a reasonable doubt of a man's guilt. One man is now in San Quentin, still maintaining he is in-

nocent of a crime for which he was convicted, and we believe in him enough to continue investigating the case."

Reed Hadley

Reed Hadley, of course, isn't hurting the cause of the Public Defender with his personable appearance on the show. In fact, some people refuse to believe he isn't the real defender. One woman went down to the office one day and said she wanted to see "Bart Matthews," the name of the character Hadley plays on the show. She was told that "Bart" was not a real person—but an actor playing the character. She said, "Don't kid me—I saw him when I came down the hall." Oddly enough, Reed had been down that day to talk to some of the investigators and the woman had seen him.

"Switching from 'Racket Squad' to 'Public Defender,' though, was a dirty trick to play on the public in a way," Reed laughed. "They can't just refer to me any more as 'Capt. Braddock' of 'Racket Squad.' Now I'm a Public Defender. But, strangely enough, out of this confusion has emerged a character named Reed Hadley.

"This has been a fortunate change. In the movies I had done almost every kind of role, and I took some parts I didn't like. Then came the day when I happened to play a few villains. The producers got the idea I was just a villain—period. And that's all I got for a while. However, then I wasn't even given those parts because everyone thought that since I had played so many heavies it would be too obvious that I was the heel of the piece in any picture in which I appeared.

"I really feel strongly, though, about 'Public Defender.' I hope we can bring its importance forcibly to the people. Did you know the men who do all the investigating get only \$50 a year for an expense account and that most of them pay money out of their own pocket to continue investigations to help others?

"This is what I consider ideal TV—to instruct and to entertain at the same time. Not many shows do that."

THE Unsung Heroes OF TV

Many TV stars would look awful without their help. Who are these people? What do they do?

a man's suggestion while she won't listen to another woman's opinion of how she should look. A man is also better able to tell another man what he should do to improve his TV appearance."

One of the primary functions of a make-up man—for which he receives no remuneration—is that of a "psychologist."

"Many people have come to me after a show and thanked me very much for the things that I might have said to them before the program which helped them to overcome any stage fright or jitters," Don says.

Mamma Says "No"

Don and his assistant, Duane Fulcher, handle all of the KHJ-TV personalities, including the guests.

"Children are reluctant at first to be made up. However, if they do it once, they want to come back again," Don explains.

For make-up purposes, each individual presents a different problem. (The only exception to this rule would be identical twins.)

On the Mutual-Don Lee shows, for example, special attention is given to Jack ("Queen for a Day") Bailey's hair line to have it "brought forward." Contrary to a recent criticism of Jack's appearance, very little work is needed to improve the looks of his eyes or eyebrows.

Because of his clear-cut features, Gene Norman offers the least amount of work to make-up men at Channel 9.

The only star at KHJ-TV who does not use any make-up at all is Mamma Weiss. She prefers to look "housewifely" for her daily cooking show.

Otis, who has been a make-up man for eighteen years, also points out that although motion picture personalities formerly wanted to have

their own make-up personnel take care of them, they are now accepting the work of the TV specialists.

That was the night Don applied all his craftsmanship and "psychology" to make up the entire Los Angeles Rams football team!

BEING A MAKE-UP MAN for TV, such as KHJ-TV's Don Otis, is a difficult job that requires patience and know-how. It has moments of pleasure too—such as attending to lovely model Maxine Reeves.

WERE THE UNSUNG heroes of television." That's the way Don ("don't confuse me with the disc jockey")

Otis explains his occupation as the head of the department of make-up at Channel 9.

Maybe that's being a little dramatic, but by and large it's a valid statement—especially when you consider the importance of TV make-up and the various problems attached to the job.

The basic principle of make-up is very simple: to make all the people on a show look the same. That doesn't mean making all the ugly men handsome, or vice-versa, but it refers mainly to the color patterns of the face.

The whole concept of make-up has changed considerably since TV first started. Back in the pioneer days (all of ten years ago) dark tones were emphasized, such as black lips. With the tremendous improvements in the lighting conditions, however, lighter, more natural tones now prevail.

Contrary to general belief, (and coinciding with the well-known cliché) the field of make-up is pretty much a "man's world."

SELECTING a single song as one of my favorites, after practically a lifetime in the music world, is a monumental task. (I started fingering the ivories when I was three.)

After much deliberation I think I have the song that really means the most to me. There are so many songs that I admire for their sheer melodic beauty that this hasn't been an easy chore. But there's one song above all, "I Get Along Without You Very Well," that I consider my favorite. Hoagy Carmichael wrote the melody around an anonymous poem many years ago.

Aside from the song's plaintive melody, the lyrics tell a story that happens, at least once in a lifetime, to most of us. We meet someone whom we feel is the most important person in the world to us,

only to learn that circumstances can change a situation and this person no longer is part of our life. "I Get Along Without You Very Well" tells the story and tells it well.

Association

This may be the title of my favorite song, but music is one thing I could never get along without. I've been with Lawrence Welk for twenty-one years and needless to say it has been an extremely pleasant association.

My older brother played banjo and guitar with Lawrence while I was still in school and I was more or less keeping up the family tradition when I joined the Welk band. It was in the early thirties during the height of the depression. I was fortunate enough at the time to be working with a co-op band, earning, for those meager years, the handsome salary of \$75 a week plus room

and board. When Welk asked me to join the band in 1934 at the prevailing scale, forty dollars less than I was earning, I hesitated only a second because of my complete confidence in Welk's ability. It was not misplaced, and twenty-one years later I can happily look back upon the most important decision of my career.

I've long since lost count of the songs in my repertoire. There are so many. Yet I refuse to go out on a limb and put down a set of rules as a yardstick for evaluating the potential popularity of a song. Popular songs go in cycles or trends. People, places or things in the news can make a song popular. The presentation of a tune by a certain artist can put a song across. Then again catchy lyrics or a simple melody might do the trick. But there are no hard and fast rules and it would take someone with a sharper crystal ball than mine to formulate such a yardstick.

Pleasure

I am forever grateful to my older sister who bribed me into practicing the piano when I was a youngster. She would threaten me with washing the dishes if I didn't practice. Obviously, I found it far more enjoyable to beat out rhythm on the eighty-eights than dunking dishes in soapy suds. But then, what boy wouldn't prefer "Tiger Rag" to dishpan hands?
