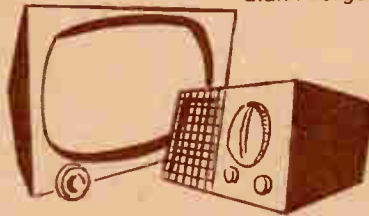

Gail ("Annie Oakley") Davis says she's looking for "the right man." And once she takes aim, she seldom misses.

THE KIDS might be slightly disappointed but the men would love it.

We're talking about meeting Gail Davis. The pretty blonde from Arkansas, as all shoot-em-up fans know, stars in the "Annie Oakley" TV series. She's the grown-up tomboy who somehow always manages to stay single (meaning matrimony) but who never fails to get her man (meaning the villain or outlaw).

Without her Oakley outfit, and in the environment of a Hollywood publicity office, "Annie" addicts would hardly recognize their idol. She says "hello" not "howdy." She sticks a pretty palm in your outstretched handshake, and not a six-shooter in your ribs. She's all "pur-tied up" with make-up, lipstick, silk stockings and all those female hoot-nannies.

Not a horse in sight, either. And she doesn't even roll her own. (Cigarettes, we mean.) She's smoking one of those fancy, ready-made cigarettes, just like the rest of the city slickers do. If junior could see "Anne" now, his wonderful world of western dreams would vanish forever.

Likes "Annie"

However, when friendly Gail starts chatting in her not-too-noticeable Southern accent, his faith in the legends of the West would soon be restored. for the "Flying A Productions," owned by Gene Autry.

There's only one thing that might possibly end Gail's career as "Annie Oakley"—and that's the right man.

You see, pardner, this here Davis woman she ain't been hitched yet. Now she's not only a straight-shooter, but a square shooter, and she just ain't a-spoofin' when she looks you straight in the eyes (with those blue, blue eyes of hers) and says:

"If I find the right guy I'll probably retire and spend the rest of my life on a farm.

"I don't know what kind of a man I'd marry. He doesn't have to be the best-looking guy in the world, but he would have to be honest and ambitious and, of course, I'd have to be in love with him.

"For the first time in quite a while I have some spare time on my hands and I'll be honest—I'm looking, starting right now!"

Bob Cummings--

REDISCOVERED!

TV has done the craziest things to Bob Cummings. Now with his new show people seem to be thinking of him as an entirely different person. And in a way he is.

BOB CUMMINGS, winner of the best actor award on TV, has been working so hard on his NBC-TV show that he hasn't even been aware of the fact that he is quite a television success. Even the business of the motion picture studios clamoring for him has made little dent since he's usually holed up in his room studying his script with assistant director Eddie Rubin's help. He's like the groundhog that comes up to see if spring is near and goes back down into his hole again. Only Bob doesn't take time even to see what time of day it is.

New Cummings

But everyone else notices that Bob is quite different now. He went to a dinner party one night at which were Art Linkletter, John Guedel,

Charlie Correll, and others. They were amazed to see the change in Bob from the way he was on "My Hero." Crew-cut, flashy shirts, everything is a contrast now.

The studios, too, decided he was like a new person. 20th Century-Fox paged him for "How to Be Very, Very Popular," with Betty Grable, and he had also wrapped up such movies as "Lucky Me" and "Dial M for Murder." The Fox picture was the first one he'd been able to accept of many offers because the studio was the only one who would give him time off to shoot his TV show.

"We sort of wedded the Fox picture and the TV show, which we shoot in one day, incidentally," Bob explained. "In a recent script we worked Betty Grable and Darryl Zanuck into the story—and I played two parts—the photographer I usually play and Robert Cummings, the actor. Bob Collins, that's me, makes cracks all the way through about Robert Cummings, that's me—and if you're confused, think how I felt playing that show!

"Anyway, TV has changed a lot of things for actors. It used to be said that an actor was as good as his last picture. Now people say, 'Well, he's as good as his last take.'"

One of the major changes in Bob is, of course, his crew cut. Bob admits that the cut was a combination of many ideas—his, his wife Mary's, and George Burns.

"I p'anned this crew cut with malice aforethought," Bob said. "And I guess I guessed right. In 'How to Be Very, Very Popular' they're even having me play a college boy. But I wanted to change my personality completely from the way I looked as 'Beanblossom.' He had sleek hair and wore conservative business suits. I now wear flashy sport shirts.

"I get my hair cut at Drucker's barber shop in Beverly Hills by Joe Olivo. Joe cuts more famous people's hair than anyone in the world. He and Mr. Drucker have been be-

sieged, though, recently by men and boys wanting the Bob Cummings hair cut. They insist that it isn't anything new—that it was the one used years ago by Prince Umberto. So they call it the Umberto cut.

"My sport shirts, all of which are pretty colorful, are made by John Vogelsang. His name has appeared on the credits at the end of each show and he has had people ordering shirts by mail. He is suddenly nationally famous. He had to hire extra girls to handle the orders.

"At first I wasn't sure what my crew cut would do to movie producers. I wondered if they'd quietly forget about me. But when I was cast in 'How to Be Very, Very Popular,' Nunnally Johnson, the producer called and said that Darryl Zanuck wanted me to leave my hair just as it was. It was as if nobody had ever known Bob Cummings before."

Not only Bob has been re-discovered as a result of the "Bob Cummings Show," but so have a few others. Leigh Snowden made her TV debut on Bob's program and the Jack Benny stint came after that. Gloria Marshall is on her way as a result of appearances with Bob, and character actress Isabel Randolph was re-discovered after being on the show and was signed by CBS.

TV Show

"We shoot our TV film in one day," Bob said, "and that's something of a record. We actually do one-third of a motion picture in about ten hours. We used to work from early morning until around eleven at night, but Eddie Rubin, who is a master of many fields, figured a way to cut the time so that we were through at six-thirty or seven at night. When he was with me on 'My Hero' he cut the shooting time a full day.

"We have some wonderful people on our show. Paul Henning, our writer-producer, is really the greatest, a very brilliant man. And Rodney Amateau, our director, is sensational. I've never worked with a director I liked more. Eddie Rubin, by the way, helps out in the directorial way too, since he has set up what amounts to a dramatic-training class. We use a lot of pretty girls with pretty figures on the show but not all such pretty girls arrive equipped with acting talent, so Eddie trains them.

"For a while people thought that I'd be dead with two series on TV. There are those, of course, who said that after 'My Hero' I was through on TV. Well, 'My Hero' is running and getting fantastic ratings—and it helps my new show. The two series work together. The kids watch 'Beanblossom' around five-thirty and tell their parents about it and Bob Cummings and this reminds the adults to watch 'The Bob Cummings Show' at ten-thirty at night.

"I think we also debunked another prevalent theory when we started the new show. Our sponsor on 'My Hero' was a cigarette company. I was told that I'd never be sponsored

by another cigarette outfit—and so the first to buy the new show was a cigarette company!

"But it's not only my new show and 'My Hero' that have changed my career picture. TV has helped me in that I have had a chance to do more varied kinds of roles. For example, one week I did the light-hearted musical, 'Best Foot Forward' and the next week I did the heavy dramatic show, 'Twelve Angry Men.' This reminded producers that I wasn't just a comedian."

If there are any other movie stars still holding out and refusing to go on television, they might give a casual look in Bob Cummings' direction. He sure looks healthy.

How Fair

Is

Ed

Murrow?

There are two fields of thought about Edward R. Murrow and both sides are equally vehement in their opinions. Some regard him as biased, others view him as a liberal and fair man. Which is the true side of this CBS personality?

JUST DON'T listen to Edward R. Murrow on radio or on TV. He's too biased."
"There's no one as fair and as inherently determined to present both sides as is Edward R. Murrow."

These are typical comments you hear about the debonair, handsome man who conducts CBS-TV's "See It Now." "Person to Person," and who also delivers pungent news comments on his weekly radio show.

First of all, before you can come to any decision about Edward R. Murrow's bias or lack of bias, you have to understand the man himself.

To judge his beliefs about news, it's a good idea to quote a statement he made when he first began his regular news reporting on CBS. Said Murrow at the time: "This program is not a place where personal opinion should be mixed up with ascertainable facts. We shall do our best to identify sources and resist the temptation to use this microphone as a privileged platform from which to advocate action. . . . It is not, I think, humanly possible for any reporter to be completely objective, for we are all to some degree prisoners

of our education, travel, reading—the sum total of our experience. And we shall try to remember that the mechanics of radio, which make it possible for an individual's voice to be heard throughout the entire land, doesn't confer great wisdom or infallibility on that individual. . . . Being human we will probably make mistakes and the only thing that can be said about that in advance is that we shall do our utmost to be the first to correct them."

This is the comment from a basically honest man, a man who wants to be fair. But let's look at the record.

Probably no single show ever produced as much controversy as Senator McCarthy's appearance on "See It Now"—a show that came about as the result of a rather scathing analysis of the Senator by Murrow. Now, there was nothing in the books that forced Murrow to permit the Senator time to answer any statements. Murrow gave McCarthy the time in the interest of presenting both sides. What other commentator has ever gone to such lengths to offer time to someone who has been criticized to answer any charges? It is also significant to note that after McCarthy made his answer the public was allowed to draw its own conclusions—which it happily did.

Certainly Murrow proved lack of bias here—as he did when he astutely presented all sides in the last presidential campaign. On one "See It Now" he'd interview a person like Senator Taft or an Eisenhower supporter—and then he'd give the same time and fair treatment to a Democratic personality.

Another strong example of Murrow's desire to get at the core of controversial matters was his much-talked-about show on the Civil Liberties Controversy in Indianapolis. This was packed with dynamite. But

is was an issue of paramount importance to the American public so Murrow brought forth the pertinent points—and in so doing laid himself wide open to criticism. He has never feared criticism!

In most things Murrow has tried to awaken the public to the dangers facing them—such dangers including Communism.

Another impressive move made by Murrow was his coverage of Senator Margaret Chase Smith's recent trip around the world, accompanied by a "See It Now" cameraman and sound technician. Anyone who had assumed that Murrow was a Democrat must have been quite confused to see how much attention he gave to the activities of a Republican Senator.

How He Rates

Perhaps the best evaluation of Murrow's ability comes from Carl Sandburg, great American writer, who has been on "See It Now" several times. There is a picture of Sandburg on Murrow's office wall and the inscription reads: "To Ed Murrow, reporter, historian, inquirer, actor, ponderer, seeker." Murrow is all of these. And yet he sums up his own attitude towards his work in this way: "I try to be a reporter. A commentator is a kind of oracle, and I am never so sure I'm right. I favor some such device as radio and television stations ringing a bell every time a newscaster is about to inject his own views. This would warn listeners that what they are about to hear is the speaker's thought on a topic."

Controversial person, this Murrow? Yes—but he is the kind of man TV and radio need because he stirs the imagination and puts challenges in front of each and everyone of us. He may make you mad or happy, but in all cases he makes you think.

"Background to Battle"

KCOP, Channel 13

Lucky Channel 13 believes it has found a TV four-leaf clover.

His name is George Rony. The show, which debuted on Friday night, is called "Background To Battle."

Some people will look upon this

new series as nothing but a glorified movietone. Others will be charmed and intrigued by both the content of the historical films and the personality of Russian-born George Rony.

Appropriately enough, the first telecast traced pictorially the history of Russia from the days of the Czars through World War I, up to the Bolshevik revolution and then World War II.

The real fascination in this documentary revolves around Rony himself. Although his heavily-accented speech is not always discernible, there is no doubt that he has a great deal of magnetism in both his voice and his personality.

He is said to be a fugitive from three dictatorships (Germany, Italy, and Russia) and was once on Hitler's "most wanted" list. (Dear ole Adolph didn't want him just to talk about producing a TV show.)

Many of the films for "Background" were smuggled out of Russia in a coffin and out of Germany via an honest-to-goodness princess.

Because of the many intimate and personal pictures he has taken of the famous men of our times, it is reported that there is now "a price" on Rony's head and his life is in constant danger. Catch the show and judge for yourself whether or not it was worth "the price." T.H.

Lifelines

ON THE HEELS OF THE FARMER JACK used car TV advertising difficulties, "Lifelines" received a telephone call from Allin Slate, a staff radio announcer who also does free-lance work in television. He was the announcer who was used on most of the Farmer Jack commercials and who, along with the dealer, was cited in a complaint for misleading advertising. Slate called to discuss the case with me and to say that the city attorney had dismissed any action against him. But in spite of this, he had recently lost a promising opportunity to do other TV commercials because he had been on the Farmer Jack show.

THIS STRUCK ME AS AN EMINENTLY unfair bit of business and prompted some checking to see how an announcer can protect himself in such a situation. It seems AFTRA (the union) has no agreement with the announcers to protect them if they become knowingly involved in fraudulent advertising, but if an announcer innocently is enmeshed in an unsavory deal and can prove to AFTRA his case, AFTRA will plead the announcer's cause.

SLATE IS NOT THE ONLY ANNOUNCER who has become involved recently. I believe another case is coming up and it is my understanding that in this instance the announcer is also blameless. The unfortunate part of it is that another firm hesitates to employ a chap because he read commercial copy and did a job for someone who was later proved unscrupulous.

APPARENTLY AN ANNOUNCER HAS to be pretty picky and choosy these days. If some announcer doesn't give a hoot and knowingly participates in fraudulent pitches, he can blame no one but himself and will have to take the consequences.

I HAD REALIZED THAT SCORES of television films had been making the rounds two, three, four or more times, but it was news to be informed by Wynn Nathan that some TV films are now locally in their fifteenth and sixteenth runs. In self-defense he thought best not to tell which ones, though I guess we can all conjecture.

NATHAN, VICE-PRESIDENT IN CHARGE of sales of the Film Syndicate Division, Music Corporation of America, heads a distributing organization composed of some sixty salesmen, twenty-two offices and "a heck of a lot of overhead." Though MCA itself produces no TV films, it necessarily carries the weight in determining which properties and personalities are likely successes. After all, Nathan's division has to sell the programs throughout the country.

SO THAT YOU'LL RECOGNIZE SOME of MCA's film properties, here's a partial rundown: "Where Were You?", "Man Behind the Badge," Guy Lombardo, "Waterfront," "City Detective," "Biff Baker," "Royal Playhouse," "Famous Playhouse," "Lone Wolf," Abbott and Costello.

EACH OF THESE FILMED SHOWS REPRESENTS an average cost of \$25,000 apiece and thirty-nine make a series. "It takes two years to get the money back," Nathan claimed. He thinks that seventy-eight films is just about the right number to make on a going series like "Waterfront." Seventy-eight breaks down into one thirty-nine-week set and one thirteen-week series. In other words, two years is the life of the first-run set.

AS TO RE-RUNS, NATHAN DEFENDS them eagerly, pointing out that there is always a portion of the looking audience which has missed seeing the original run, plus numberless more viewers who have just gotten around to installing a TV set. A good film property selling first run for \$4000 a show may go for only \$1500 on second run—it all depends on the market, number of channels, size of the city, and so on. Here in Los Angeles, Nathan hasn't a single property for sale for two years. "We've had 100 percent renewals on 'Waterfront,'" he enthused. Nathan believes tastes across the country are more or less the same. "City Detective" is popular because "it's a good show but not blood and guts. You gotta go into a person's living room in good taste," he added.

NATHAN IS BOMBARDED WITH SHOW ideas—at least ten a month. Often not a single one is useable. "First the detective-murder films were great," he explained. "Then people wanted situation comedy. We try to figure what people want and then convince the film buyer." Locally, KTTV is a heavy customer of MCA. KNXT, KCOP and others follow.

WHEN I ASKED NATHAN WHO GENERALLY sponsors the films, he said, "Beer sponsors buy about twenty per cent. The most unusual tie-up we had was Necchi sewing machine sponsoring 'The Lone Wolf.' Necchi figured that the women looked at the telefilm because they liked Louis Hayward. "Penny to a Million"

Bill Goodwin flies from the Coast to New York to emcee this latest of panel shows. But after the first airing of "Penny To A Million" viewers may wonder whether it's worth Goodwin's traveling 3000 miles to emcee such a dull panel show.

Two groups of contestants are chosen from the studio audience. The members of each group vie against one another to determine the winner, then the two winners compete for the big money question. Each question asked doubles in value with the first worth one cent.

The questions on the opening session were far too easy to hold panel-wise viewers. Bill was obviously nervous and unfamiliar with the format and kept repeating "Now, let's see where were we?"

The pay-off was the only different twist to the standard panel show. The two finalists share in the jackpot. The winner receiving seventy-five percent and the loser twenty-five percent of what's in the pot. In case of a draw they both receive half of the loot.

Quite obviously, a panel show is only as good as the personalities on the panel and the questions asked of them. Generally audiences make better audiences than they do panel members and it seems a bit unfair to subject the likable Bill Goodwin, as well as the viewers, to such a mediocre format.

A more careful screening of participants and questions that require a bit of mental gymnastics could pull "Penny To A Million" out of an inevitable rut. M.R.

"Shower of Stars" was CBS-TV's most important special series this past year, but now the network has announced that it will telecast a series of ten specials next season on Saturday nights, ninety minutes in length and most of them in tint. "Omnibus" is scheduling several programs in color and portions of others. All of these super-duper announcements won't mean much to the rank-and-file viewers unless prices are mashed down. 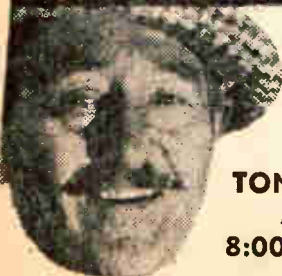

HOLLAND'S TUNNEL

DUG BY JACK HOLLAND

The tunnel has always contended that there should be a more concentrated effort on the part of the various networks to build up new talent. There has been such a program launched recently by CBS.

This brings up one point, however—can a young person really learn how to act on TV? Can he get the breaks afforded an up and comer in a motion picture studio? Jan Merlin, promising young actor, has his views on the subject. Jan is the fellow who created quite a stir at the Circle Theatre in "Woman With the Red Hair" and has appeared in such TV films as "Celebrity Playhouse" for Screen Gems (due to debut in, the fall) "Hallmark Hall of Fame," "Passport to Danger," a pilot film for the O. Henry series with Thomas Mitchell and Ernest Borgnine, the Loretta Young show, and about 500 live TV shows in the East.



"I got a start on TV all right, but it also typed me into a character," Jan commented. "I spent three years playing 'Tom Corbett, Space Cadet' and nobody would believe I could do anything else, so I gave it all up and went to Africa with my wife, Pat, on a six months' safari. It was something I'd always wanted to do. When I came back I got the breaks I had wanted.

"It's hard to get the right opportunities on TV simply because the medium hasn't the time to teach an actor how to act. It must depend on an experienced actor who can come through. It can't afford to take a chance on a sloppy performance because the mistakes are seen by too

many millions of people. An actor has very little time to study a script once he gets a part, he has small chance to develop a characterization, and he gets only token help from those who could be of assistance. All this explains why the best television actors are those from the stage. However, once you've had the break, it's blood, sweat, and tears from there on in, and I am glad it's that tough because it's a constant challenge to an actor—just as the stage is.

"Like most actors, though, I wish TV could take more time because too many things which could be brilliant turn out to be mediocre due to inadequate preparation. And certainly I wish the medium would begin building more stars. The only TV film company I know of that is honestly thinking in terms of motion picture features and TV and is conscious of the need for new talent is Gross-Krasne. But if even one company is thinking of these terms, things are looking up."

Jan proves one thing—if you get the break and can deliver you'll find plenty of acting to do, even on TV.

A couple of weeks ago I made a reference to what I considered was KTLA's unimaginative programming. As expected, there was a reaction. In the mail arrived a letter from the station's enterprising publicity director, Abe Greenberg. It said in part: "Your criticism . . . isn't fair, nor can it be justified by the record. You charged that 'The same shows still plod along, etc.' For your information the following progressive program changes have been effected by Klaus Landsberg since the first of the year:

1. The format of "Bandstand Revue" has been revamped, giving KTLA one of the fastest-paced musical shows in the nation. As a matter of fact, the Revue is now being transcribed and shown in fourteen major markets ranging

from L.A. to Miami and from Seattle to Providence, R. I.

2. Klaus Landsberg purchased the multi-million-dollar "Looney Tunes" package for Cartoon Carousel which gives KTLA the finest cartoon program on the air.
3. Within the past three months Mr. Landsberg has purchased for Channel 5 viewers—"Joe Palooka," "Pride of the Family," "Conspiracy," Larry Finley's "Strictly Informal," "Give the Kids a Break," "Public Prosecutor," "Call the Play" with Mel Allen, and has created a new show for the feminine viewers entitled "Milady." A new "name" band show, introducing a new rhythm style is currently in preparation.

"If nine major program changes in three months isn't moving forward, Jack, what is?"

Comment: Glad to pass on the information, Abe, but we'd like to add this one thing—have such changes come too late? A station such as KTTV didn't wait so long to start moving and, as a result, it has taken a good hunk of the viewers to Channel 11. And you know what habit watching can do to an audience. Remember when KTLA had practically all the viewers?

Davy Crockett—King of the Commercial Frontier!

Walt Disney's revival of the historical figure is turning into the biggest merchandising boom in history. "Davy" is also causing havoc in the law courts.

The nation has gone Davy Crockett happy. The Walt Disney televersion of the historical character has caught

everyone's fancy including the fancy of astute manufacturers. **Davy Crockett products, such as**

peace pipes, powder horns, coonskin hats, bath towels, T-shirts and frontier suits are flooding the market. From all indications the Davy Crockett boom is going to make the tremendous Hopalong Cassidy merchandising fad of five years ago seem like a small business venture.

Walt Disney enterprises includes a character merchandising division which grants permission to 100 licensed manufacturers to make various by-products of Disney's many character creations. These fortunate licensees will be riding the crest of the wave as the Davy Crockett merchandising profits come rolling in. Show us the parent who'll say "no" when junior asks him for a coonskin hat.

Law Suit

But everything isn't peaceful on the frontier horizons. Disney has filed suit against Morey Schwartz, oldtime Baltimore garment manufacturer, charging that Schwartz was illegally licensing clothing manufacturers to use the name of Davy Crockett. According to the patent office, Schwartz's Davy Crockett Enterprises is the owner of a valid clothing trademark label, "Davy Crockett, Frontiersman."

A Disney spokesman stated that they are seeking an injunction to prevent Schwartz from foisting unauthorized merchandise upon the public. They feel that the children are looking for authentic Walt Disney-Fess Parker creations, and that theirs is the recognized product.

The intricacies of patent laws and trademarks involved in this case will be aired in Baltimore's Federal Court within the next two weeks. Several other law suits revolving around poor ole Davy are also set for trial in the law courts.

Movie

Another interesting aspect of the Davy Crockett popularity is the showing of the movie "Davy Crockett, Indian Scout," starring George Montgomery and Ellen Drew a few weeks before Disney's condensed 90-minute version is scheduled to hit the movie screens nationally. The release may be purely co-incidental but certain circles are bound to say that someone is getting on the bandwagon. "Indian Scout" is advertised as a re-release and the title "Davy Crockett, Indian Scout" was registered in 1950.

Some exhibitors have teamed up the film with one reel Disney cartoons and are coupling the name Disney-rama with "Davy Crockett, Indian Scout" on the marquee. These exhibitors may think they are duping the public but if it's the Fess Parker version the public wants to see then that's the one they are going to wait for.

In conjunction with personal appearances, the Fess Parker film will be shown in movie theaters across the nation during the summer months. Then next fall—September 14—just to keep the interest in Davy Crockett at its peak the video series launches four more Davy Crockett episodes, dramatizing the legendary Crockett in lieu

Where Oh Where Will Welk Go?

When it was announced that Lawrence Welk was going coast-to-coast on ABC-TV, local station KTLA started a verbal fire that is still red hot.

The question of the week is: "Where, oh where, will Lawrence Welk go?"

As TV-Radio Life goes to press the answer is as full of double-talk as a Russian peace conference.

The Spark

As all Champagne Music fans know, Welk has been a perennial favorite on Friday nights on KTLA, Channel 5. Several weeks ago, it was announced that Welk and his boys were going to be seen nationally on ABC-TV on Saturday nights. That was the spark which started the verbal fire.

Naturally, KTLA's general manager, Klaus Landsberg, wasn't, and still isn't, too happy about the situation. Welk is KTLA's number one show, and Landsberg doesn't want to lose him.

According to Sam Lutz, Welk's manager, the Welk contract with KTLA expired on February 14. Consequently, Lutz went ahead and made a coast-to-coast deal with the ABC-TV network, with the present sponsor, Dodge autos, picking up the tab.

This week, Landsberg came back and said Welk had no right to make such a deal because KTLA, under the old contract, had "first refusal rights" and KTLA was not given that privilege. ("First refusal" simply means that the first party, KTLA, has a right to

"meet or beat" any offer made by a second party, ABC-TV.)

Want Welk

Landsberg, who must be given credit for pioneering Welk in TV, also maintains that he has "exclusive rights" on Welk's TV work in Los Angeles.

So Landsberg wants Welk.

And Welk says he wants to stay locally on Channel 5, but go coast-to-coast on ABC-TV.

On Friday morning, ABC-TV confirmed the fact that the Welk show had been signed for a national hook-up. According to ABC-TV, the show will emanate "live" from Los Angeles at 6 p.m., every Saturday beginning July 2. This "show" will not be seen locally, but will be picked up by other ABC-TV stations throughout the country.

"As an ABC-TV outlet, KABC-TV in Los Angeles will do a 'hot kine' every Saturday night at 9 p.m. of this same show," an ABC-TV spokesman announced.

When TV-Radio Life contacted Klaus Landsberg on this report, he said that it was the first time he had heard of

it, and told us to ask Mr. Lutz for further information.

Mr. Lutz said it was still undecided as to what local station the Lawrence Welk show would be on.

"We want to stay on KTLA. We have done everything in our power to stay on Channel 5. However, as it stands now, we may be on KTLA, KTTV, KCOP, or any local station. Or we may go off the air completely. I just don't know."

Mr. Lutz further maintains that KTLA does not have "first refusal" rights on Welk. "Our contract with KTLA terminated on February 14. We are now free to go where we please."

That's the way it stands now.

Future?

Will it be network or no network for Welk?

Will it be Channel 5 or Channel 7 or some other local station in Los Angeles?

Or will it be both the network and Channel 5 and Channel 7?

If someone isn't careful, maybe everyone will become disgusted and say "nuts to everything."

And if that should happen listen for a big howl from the loyal Welk fans!

Something should be worked out fairly soon, however, because Welk is still too hot a TV property to get lost in a legal squabble.

Judges of the contest will be those from the bench who also serve as judges on the program.

According to producer Stan Brady, the winners will receive complete wardrobes, initialed desk sets, plaques, government bond and weekends with their respective parents at Catalina. The young lady will also receive a fox shoulder cape.

There are rumors that "Teen-Age Trials" may be extended to the full NBC-TV network as a public service. The chain certainly should expand the viewing on this excellent offering.

Norma Jean Nilsson

Seventeen-year old Norma Jean Nilsson has been announced as winner of a Bank of America \$1,000 award. She was the only one chosen from

Hollywood High School where she has also recently been elected to the Epehbian Society. The \$1,000 award was in the Fine Arts Division.

Until the last year or two, Norma Jean has been one of Hollywood's busiest young television and radio actresses. Ever since she was four years old she has performed over the airplanes. During the last couple of years, since finishing her role on radio's "Father Knows Best," she has done radio and television work only now and then. Recently, however, she was featured on a "Lux Radio Theater," participated in making the pilot of "That Baxter Boy" and had a role on "Willy." She is also featured in the MGM picture, "The Actress."

Norma Jean has maintained a high scholastic standing and is the first girl editor ever to take charge of the Hollywood High School annual. She will appear as a piano soloist at the commencement exercises at the Hollywood Bowl. She plans to study drama in New York this summer before continuing with her college career.

Though missing her busy radio and TV life while achieving her honors in high school, Norma Jean is quite happy that things worked out as they did. "If I had had a lot to do in radio and television I'd have missed all the rest of the excitement," she happily told TV-Radio Life.

"With TV or radio you put an appealing voice or engaging personality in the living rooms. The effect of this industry in swaying public opinion may be greater than that of the press."

So stated President Eisenhower in a speech last week before some 3,000 delegates attending the National Association of Radio and Television Broadcasters in Washington D.C. With this and similar statements, the Chief Executive let it be known that he considers radio and TV as important and often even more important than the printed word and of tremendous impact in the formation of what the people of this country think.

Along with his acknowledgment of our industry's power, the President also stressed the necessity of TV and radio being kept free. By this he did not mean "free" as against pay-TV or radio, but free from government intervention. He called on the broadcasters to self-regulate and self-censor what goes out on the airplanes rather than have outside regulations interposed. Certainly this is the way TV and radio would rather have it and so far the industry has generally done a pretty good job handling its own affairs.

His words concerning TV-radio impact are especially significant in view of the upcoming conventions.

Radio Ramblings

"The Loser," NBC documentary of convicted criminals is breaking-in on radio. Series was designed ultimately for television. . . . "Gildersleeve" airs re-runs throughout the summer. . . . Johnny Green is retiring temporarily from his duties with the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences due to the pressure of his work at MGM where he is general music director.

KNX's News Bureau does a special one-hour broadcast on L.A.'s traffic problem. The program will be aired June 3, 4 and 5 at 9:00 p.m., 1:00 p.m. and 10:00 a.m. respectively. . . . Harry Babbitt adds a weekly evening stint to his morning strip. . . . Jack Parr has asked to be relieved as host of the CBS morning show because of a proposed format change.

"Strange," a new series dramatizing supernatural stories and strange human experiences is being aired on ABC. . . . Verna Felton is busy doing the role of "Mrs. Potts" with "Picnic"

roadshow in Kansas. . . . Will Rogers, Jr. emcees the special "Beverly Hills Story" broadcast on KNX June 5, at 4:00 p.m.

While Godfrey's sister Kathy starts her own show on the CBS net, the brass is planning a special program for July 13 commemorating Arthur Godfrey's tenth year as a nighttime net star. This should squelch speculation on Godfrey's status at CBS. M.R.

Travel Is Incidental

Covering special events certainly gets David Showalter, director of KNX's Public Affairs Department, around the globe. During 1954 Dave has chalked up more than 40,000 miles of travel, in the air, on the highways and even underwater in tracking down material for special broadcasts.

For "Sea Wings," depicting life aboard an aircraft carrier. Showalter traveled 5000 miles to Pensacola, Florida. On "Alaskan Report," dramatizing the military, business and economic situation in present day Alaska, he covered 6000 miles in four days. On that particular trip he organized a camp show for the military personnel at three Alaskan bases.

Showalter believes he is the first man to make his initial trip to Catalina Island under the water when he recorded the life aboard a submarine on a training cruise off Santa Catalina Island.

Of the 40,000 miles logged by the energetic Public Affairs director, 10,000 miles were in his own automobile, within the Los Angeles city limits, gathering material for his "This Is Los Angeles" series. Dave Showalter has been to a lot of unusual places in the last year, which accounts for the fact that he's come up with some unusual programs. Wonder how traveling Dave feels when his family asks him to take them on a Sunday drive?

Proven Format

"You just don't close your eyes and pick records at random to format a program," smiled Alene McKinney, KBIG's music director.

Alene is the attractive, competent woman who shoulders the responsibility of giving KBIG listeners the kind of music they like. She's a native of Lincoln, Nebraska and comes from a musical family. Alene is proficient at the marimba, piano and organ, and was a staff musician at a Topeka radio station when house orchestras provided the only kind of music aired over the airlines.

In line with KBIG's middle-of-the-road music policy Alene has devised a flexible chart system listing all the tunes the station airs. Her system avoids repetition of playing the top ten tunes to death. As a matter of fact, the system is fool proof to the point where KBIG's disc jockeys can spin pop records for thirty-five hours without repeating a current favorite.

Part of Alene's duties as music director is talking to the endless parade of song pluggers; she speaks to an average of fifty sellers of songs each week. Sometimes she has four or five people in the industry contacting her for the same label. Diplomatic public relations has become part and parcel of her job. And Alene McKinney is one gal who not only knows her music, but also has the tactful approach to her job done down pat.

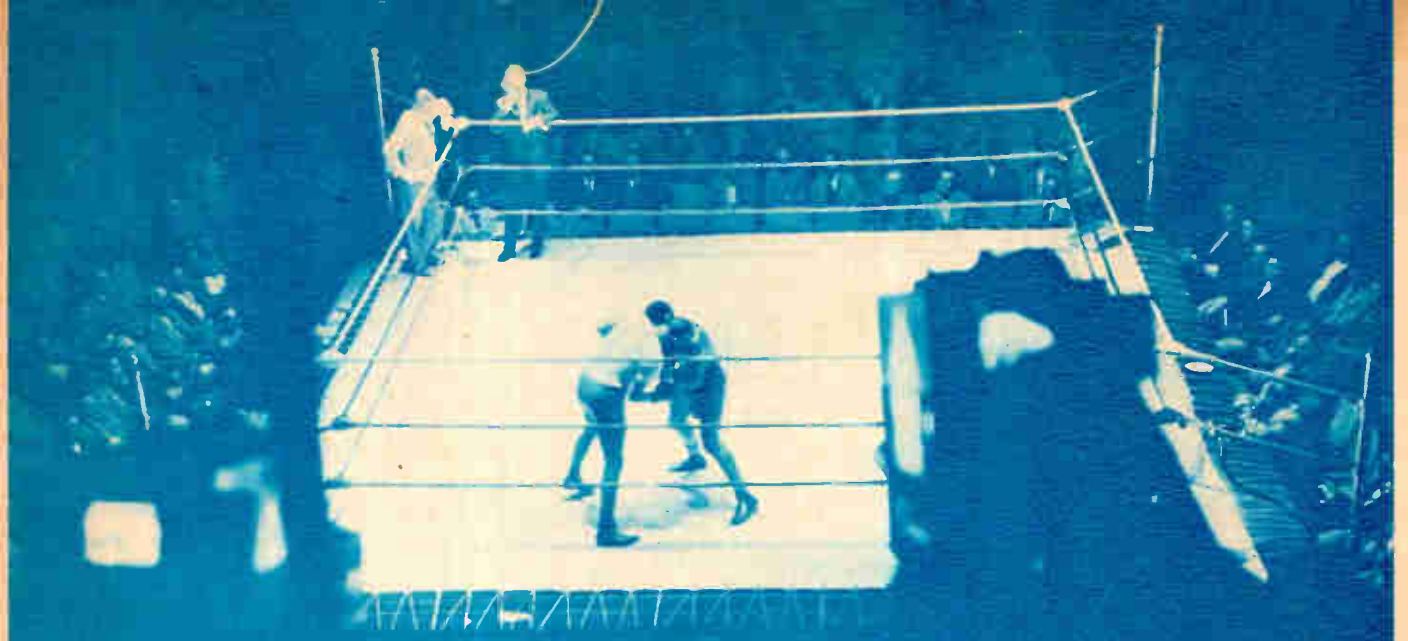

WHAT HAS TV DONE TO

Loretta?

NOT LONG ago Loretta Young had one thing to face—she had to ungear herself.

The lovely star of The Loretta Young Show had been going at a terrific clip for almost two years. She had adjusted herself to such a hectic schedule that she had almost lost track of time, space, anything not related to her work on her NBC show.

Fast Pace

"I realized I had geared myself to a pace," Loretta said recently. "I was suddenly making snap judgments and decisions. It wasn't until I finished my current series of TV films that I really learned how high-keyed

I was. For a few days I even slept until noon! After I'd been getting up at five-thirty every morning this seemed like a real vacation!

"I was set in a rigorous schedule. I'd arrive at the studio around nine Monday morning to go over the script for the next show. I'd usually be there until about seven at night. Then Tuesday was devoted to rehearsals and fittings. On Tuesday night I'd stay in my apartment at the studio to avoid the long drive home. At eight-thirty Wednesday morning I'd be on the set, shooting. I didn't leave the studio for the next three days. On Friday night I'd go home; on Saturday I'd be back again for more fittings for the next show and for such things as dancing lessons if I were playing the part of a dancer."

This was the life Loretta led for nineteen months of sustained activity. She finished her seventy films and left for Ojai for a vacation. But two days later came the blow. She became ill. She was so run down she had no reserve with which to fight her illness. Her response to treatment was much slower than the doctors had expected and her condition was a matter of concern for several days. The only good the illness did was to force Loretta to rest.

Loretta has always had a complete indifference to any health regime. She expects her body to serve her but she gives it little or no attention. She is the last person in the world to be called a hypochondriac. She loathes exercise. In fact, there is the classic story about the time Garbo asked Tom Lewis, Loretta's husband, "Where does your wife walk when she's in New York?" To which Tom replied, "Walk? My wife wouldn't walk across the room if she could get a ride."

When Loretta first began making her TV show, the set was open to all and sundry. Loretta is the "visitingest" star anywhere. She's riddled with enthusiasm for everything and everyone. She loves to see people and she's always wanting to help someone—whatever his difficulty. Anyone who could get on to the studio lot could get a visit with Loretta on her set. Finally, her shows were being brought in over-schedule, over-budget, and it was decided that the set would have to be closed to visitors so Loretta would stop visiting. When

the "No Visitors" sign went up, it also had to include, unfortunately, the press. This gave rise in some dyspeptic quarters to a report that Loretta was refusing to see the press!

Looking Back

Loretta can now look back on all that has happened to her since that fateful day when she bought a TV set at a St. Anne's charity auction. She hadn't seen TV at all before, and

by the time she had installed her set she had spent a fortune. She lived in such a remote section of the city that she even had to have an experimental antenna put up. She started watching shows and immediately fell in love with Ted Mack and his show and Kate Smith. Within a month she was talking to Tom about starting her own program. It took two years to evolve the right format, but once it was settled it was sold to the first sponsor who saw the pilot film—and in the incredibly short time of thirty-six hours.

Loretta has done a noble job on TV. In the last "Emmy" awards she was really the only person nominated for the best actress award who could be called an actress—in that she played a different role every week. When she won the award, everyone felt more than pleased. But doing a different part each week is not the easiest thing in the world—except to Loretta.

"I loved playing so many parts," Loretta commented. "But of course, I love to act. I love it most of all when the cameras roll—and the cameras roll all the time on TV so, naturally, I'm still very excited about television.

"There is another reason why I enjoy filming my show. Playing so many different characters means I have many different outfits to wear. Now I love to shop, and it's the most wonderful thing in the world to be able to go out and buy clothes with an absolutely free conscience. You see, we had no studio wardrobe to call upon so I had to furnish my own clothes."

Loretta didn't just enthusiastically embrace her job as actress on her show—she was unquenchably interested in every other department of production. And both Loretta and

Loretta is completely objective about herself as an actress. One day Helen Ferguson, Loretta's friend, happened to be on the lot when a rough cut of one of the shows was being run. The scenes were highly dramatic and Loretta was playing with full emotion. One close-up was particularly effective. It was a dramatic blockbuster with real tears rolling down Loretta's face. However, the scene lessened the impact of the balance of the show. When it was over Loretta asked Helen, "What do you think?" Helen said quietly, "I think I'd better leave now." "I know what you think," Loretta remarked quickly, "You think it's too long." The cutter, at this point, said, "Yes, it is, but I don't know where to cut." With a knowing glance at

Helen, Loretta said, "I bet she can tell you where to cut." Helen finally admitted that the close-up of the tears made the scenes that followed seem anti-climactic. Loretta quickly turned to the cutter and said, "She's right—cut it!" Not many stars would cut close-ups, especially dramatic ones of themselves. Other deletions were made in the same show, and they were all good scenes of hers.

Loretta happily contemplates a new season on TV—and another similarly rugged schedule. She isn't even worried about being seen too much. As she says, "I have faith and belief in TV. It has the warmth of bringing one into people's homes. I have been made to feel a welcome visitor."

Judging by the mail Loretta has received from ecstatic fans she's not only welcome—people would like to adopt her.

However, it's also true that "The Connecticut Yankee" is "heigh-hoing, everybody" once again with a program that's slightly different from anything the not-so-green Vallee has ever done in his long and active career.

Informality is the keynote as the fifty-three-year-old crooner lounges around his suite in the Park Sheraton Hotel in New York and entertains and chats with the various guests who accidentally-on-purpose drop by to visit him and his gorgeous brunette wife, Eleanor Norris of Berkeley, California.

As the ole "Whiffenpoof" man explained to his audience:

"If you'd care to know what we're all about, you've dropped in—and we hope you continue to drop in—on a Sunday after-dinner gathering of people who lead the way in the lively arts.

"The group will change from week to week, the rules will remain the same and extremely simple. There are no rehearsals, no scripts and no time tables, and our guests are free to speak up at any time."

In addition to his current radio activities, the almost-legendary Mr. Vallee keeps busy with TV guestings and night club dates. He has also just finished co-starring with Jane Russell and Jeanne Crain in the musical, "Gentlemen Marry Brunettes."

During the three decades Hubert Prior Vallee (honest injun, that's his real name) wooed the opposite sex with his sax and singing, he was instrumental in introducing many personalities on radio, including Joe Penner, Burns and Allen, Kate Smith, Red Skelton, Bob Hope and Fanny Brice.

Probably the strangest coincidence of all is that Rudy's newest venture on the airwaves succeeds a full-hour program of Edgar Bergen, who is preparing a TV show for the Fall. It was the same Mr. Bergen who made his first broadcast with Rudy Vallee over eighteen years ago!

Hollywood's Mighty Midget

Sidney Skolsky, the little writer with the big, hard-hitting words, has come to TV.

'Sid, we want you for a fifteen-minute TV show,' no one had ever offered me a concrete proposition."

No Trouble

In many ways, little Sid Skolsky is in an explosive business. Hollywood is one of the greatest towns in the world to make enemies and lose friends. Especially if you're a controversial columnist.

As Sid explains it, he has "never had any trouble with so-called Hollywood characters. I like the people I meet in show business; if I didn't, I wouldn't be here. I get along with all of them, and they seem to get along with me."

Sid is an unusually small man, standing only five feet three inches from the ground, and weighing a slight 137 pounds. He wears thick, dark, horn-rimmed glasses, and one of his many idiosyncracies is that he has never driven a car.

"I never drive, but I buy a Buick each year from Phil Hall for my wife. One of the nicest things about my TV show is that Hall is my sponsor and it gives me a chance to get some of my money back," he laughed.

His "Office"

Sid's Hollywood "office" is located

at the famous Schwab's drugstore on Sunset Boulevard. He takes all his phone messages at Schwab's, transacts his business there, and by and large, gets most of his ideas there while talking to his many friends.

"I know that the first thing people say about me when they see me on TV is that I am not at all like they expected. My column is written in such a manner that people expect a tall, husky, handsome man to be the author. I know they must be somewhat surprised."

So when people describe the nationwide columnist as "being a funny man" it is being used, and quite correctly so, as an expression of admiration and respect. There are few people who can match his cordiality, straight-forwardness, and without being obtrusive, his innate shrewdness.

After the interview, kiddingly, we asked Sid if we could "give him a lift." He accepted. Driving a long crowded Sunset Boulevard, Skolsky proved why he is so well-liked and a good journalist: he was "a good listener."

And where did Sid ask to be let off? Why at his "office" of course — Schwab's drugstore. Where else?

HE'S A FUNNY little guy." That description is probably used more often than any other by people when referring to one of Hollywood's topnotch columnists, Sidney Skolsky.

It doesn't mean "funny ha-ha," or "funny peculiar." Sid is the type of man whom people laugh "with," and not "at." Once you get to know him, or watch him on his KABC-TV program, you soon realize he is a sharp, shrewd and very articulate man.

Sid has been a syndicated columnist since 1922, and has operated out of Hollywood for the past twenty-two years. Because "everyone is getting into the act," it seemed strange to us that he had never been grabbed for TV before.

In explanation of this the short, dark-haired personality had a very brief but certainly adequate reply: "Nobody asked me. There had been lots of talk for several years about my own TV show, but until Hunt Stromberg came up to me and said
