# No Pop For Them

*KFAC and KPOL continue to avoid the more "pop" kind of music playing for good reasons. Their system has paid off.*

**G**HERE IS a theory that the only way for independent radio stations to survive these days is by specialization. There's certainly much specialization of the popular kind of records on most stations. You can hear ditties like "Tweedle Dee" any time, anywhere—except on radio stations KPOL and KFAC. These two remain individual. KPOL concentrates entirely on show tunes and light concert works. KFAC, rightfully known as "the music station," goes in for the more classical kind of recordings along with the lighter concert fare.

### Howard Rhines

Howard Rhines is the program director of KFAC. It is odd to find him in this spot since he used to be a dance band pianist. Yet, he has continued to further the interests of his progressive station—and with real know-how.

"The credit for our staying away from the popular kind of music goes entirely to Calvin J. Smith, owner of our station," Howard commented recently. "In 1940 he decided that the ultimate destiny of independent stations was to specialize. We began with two separate schedules: from five to six and from eight to ten in the evening. From that point we gradually carried on with the emphasis on more classical music until 1948 when the last popular music program we had carried went off the air. That was the 'Lucky Lager Dance' show.

"We carry light concert numbers during the daytime. But the phrase 'light concert' means so many different things to many different people. To the professional it means music lighter than the strictly classical fare. Our interpretation seems to be the type of music that is done by Kostalanetz, Mantovani, Melachrino,

and the like. We also do contemporary Broadway shows—and often we've played such records only a few hours after they were released.

"In selecting the records we will play we have a rigid traffic system in that we don't play the same number on the same program more than once in two months. This is no difficulty, though, since we have so many types of music to choose from.

"We have apparently hit upon the right system because our mail response from listeners is continually steady. It's almost invariably complimentary, but we get some good critical suggestions. For one thing, the mail made us realize that the audience for chamber music was not too large so we don't program very much of that. The same is true of organ music. We have discovered that television has not bothered us either from a listening standpoint or from the amount of advertising volume."

There are no disc jockeys at KFAC—or KPOL. The announcers at KFAC are Tom Cassidy, who does the "Evening Concert," Tom Dixon who handles "Sunset Serenade," Dick Crawford who announces "Continental Varieties," and Walter Kingson, who has the chore on "Musical Milestones." Kingston, incidentally, is also associate professor of speech and drama at UCLA and works only a certain number of hours at KFAC.

"We have good announcers," Howard stated, "but they all have to have an authoritative knowledge of music. They are chosen by internal audition, and they all have a triple responsibility. They must select music, write program notes, and announce in addition to their staff duties."

### Bob Scott

KPOL has what many consider an almost impossible task—that of

avoiding repetition of numbers due to their concentration on just show tunes, music from motion pictures, and light concert numbers.

"We don't worry about repetition on our programming," said Bob Scott, program director of KPOL and the man who does the unusual program called "The Tenor Who Sings With the Records." "We believe that songs like 'Ah, Sweet Mystery of Life' are not only endearing but enduring—and there are many different types of recordings of that number. However, we don't play the same selection on the same program often.

"KPOL came on the air when there were seven TV stations in town. Unfortunately, we are not yet on a twenty-four-hour schedule but we hope to be soon if and when the FCC gives its approval. We at the station have not worried about TV, although it could affect our listening when we go on a night-time schedule in addition to our day-time program. We feel that there are two things radio can do better than TV—play music and give news.

"In all of our efforts to date we have tried to maintain a dignity in our programming. That is especially true of the type of advertising we carry. I think that Fred Custer, our station manager, has turned down as much advertising as he has accepted. For one thing, we don't carry any beer or wine ads.

"Sure it's a struggle for a station like ours to survive but we seem to be gaining steadily. We know there's a place now for our kind of music."

In addition to Bob Scott, other announcers are Jim Narz and Paul Snyder.

Certainly much credit is due both KPOL and KFAC for giving listeners something outstanding and off the beaten track.

# He Gives the Stars the Breaks

noted TV producer who has handled the reins at one time or another of such programs as "Studio One" and "Medic," who saw Ed Sullivan as a potentially expert showman. Minor wanted Ed to try TV at about the same time that Sullivan wanted to go into the medium. This was over six years ago. Minor contacted CBS and told them about this Sullivan personality.

#### Minor's Views

"I think he's a good bet for a

variety show." Minor remarked. "It's my belief that a performing emcee, a man who is known for his talent as a singer, dancer, comedian, or actor, would have a tendency to take on the burden of a big show and would exhaust himself and his audience before long. On the other hand, a person like Sullivan who is not known as a performer would try to get up a good show. He may not hit as fast for you as an established artist but he'll pay off for you in the years to come."

Certainly no truer words were ever spoken. When Ed first began "Toast of the Town" the critics massacred him. And yet, six years later, his show is consistently in the top ten and has massacred all competition.

"I thought Ed would be good as an emcee," Minor went on, "because he has a good instinct for choosing talent and a quality for discovering unknown talent. He has an endless list of 'firsts' to his credit, among them the debut of Martin and Lewis who occasionally compete with him on Sundays. Others who have appeared first on his show are Helen Hayes, Jackie Gleason, Jack Benny, Toni Arden, Wally Cox, Johnny Ray, Frankie Laine, Eddie Fisher, Audrey Hepburn, and many more. He has also instituted such innovations as biographies of famous personalities. In short, he has consistently found a good framework on which to build his shows."

And that is from a man who is one of TV's most noted producers.

#### Godfrey Cast-Offs

Ed has, of course, found another good way to attract audience interest—he has picked up performers who have been "canned" by Arthur Godfrey. Julius LaRosa was launched

into a new and better career by Ed when Godfrey said "Bye, bye, boy" in his own inimitable style and now Marion Marlowe and the Mariners are being given a hefty boost by Ed after departing from the Godfrey fold.

Sullivan, however, sees nothing unusual in taking on talent that someone else couldn't use any more.

"I have always been aware of all talent as soon as I come in contact with it," Ed remarked. "So this would apply to my feelings about the ability of people like Marion Marlowe and Julius La Rosa. They have what I consider essential to stardom—talent, personality, and a sense of timing."

As for his feelings about Godfrey, Ed was asked if he had any reaction towards the man one way or the other. Ed simply smiled and said, "No."

If you should ask Marion Marlowe or Julius La Rosa, however, how they feel about Godfrey as compared with Ed Sullivan, you'd get more than a casual one word reply.

Much of the success of "Toast of the Town" has been Ed's insistence on giving newcomers a break. He recognizes an old-age truism of showbusiness—it takes new faces to keep an audience interested. Ed is constantly on the lookout for promising performers and he gives them every opportunity to show what they can do on "Toast of the Town."

"I believe every effort is being exerted to help young talent today," Ed said sincerely. "I am not alone in looking for good new faces. All

TV producers are aware of the fact that if the medium is to progress it must introduce fresh, young talent."

#### Use of Stars

Once Ed spots a good act or a good performer for "Toast" he does not stick the routine into any old spot. He gives the act the best opportunity possible. And if he has a solid sender in his guest star line up, he doesn't limit that performer to just a few minutes. At times he has let the star go on as long as she or he feels necessary.

Of course, no accounting of the Sullivan strategy would be complete without emphasis on the number of star names he has on one show. This, coupled with his know-how about show business, has kept viewers tuning in on him week after week. But he doesn't bring on a star just for the name. It's always someone who can really give with the entertainment.

"The most gratifying thing about working with people in show business is that they realize the importance of a job to do," Ed has said on more than one occasion. "And they exert every effort in this behalf. Because of this sincerity and dedication to their work, because they do not actually have an easy life, I cannot help admiring them and consequently I enjoy working with them."

And the stars all enjoy working with Ed. Just think of the countless artists who have come back again and again for extra appearances.

But the Sullivan Strategy is something else—it is the fact that Ed has kept himself in the background. He has never tried to sell himself. He

knows the show is the important thing, so he has avoided the big pitfall most emcees fall prey to—trying to be the big attraction themselves. And what is more—Ed has been able to laugh at his own characteristics himself, right along with others who have gone on his show and imitated him.

Here is a man who has only one desire—to do a good show. He has never cheated his TV public and that is why he still is on top today.

# Private Lives Are Her Business

*Shirley Thomas is one of the most glamorous TV and radio personalities in town, but her business is proving that glamour stars are also people.*

**S**HIRLEY THOMAS, brunette dispenser of cinematic news for NBC radio and TV, is such a busy girl talking about the stars that she hasn't time for any life of her own. And the most interesting part of that is that she doesn't mind at all.

There are, however, still two Shirleys—the one who faces the mike and the one behind the mike. Both are equally provocative.

## Two Shirleys

On the professional side, Shirley has consistently been a purveyor of information of note about our top stars in television and motion pictures. She has never indulged in the gossip trend, but rather she has emphasized the characteristics in the stars that make them interesting as human beings. Her recent dignified handling of interviews before the last Academy Awards proved how unusual she is in her field. This is a lady the stars can respect and, consequently, talk to with ease.

"The nicest thing about my job has been the letters I've received from listeners telling me how much they have appreciated getting to know the stars as people," Shirley commented. "I have always been more interested in talking to these famous personalities on a human line. For example, when I interviewed Jimmy Cagney not so long ago I wanted to know what he lives by, what he believes in and how he got the Doctor of Humanities Award from Rawlins College in Florida. I prefer pointing up the positive qualities in the stars. I don't believe in dwelling on the gossip, negative side.

"Apparently my listeners like this approach. At least, so my mail indicates. After the Academy Awards telecast a Mrs. Axel Simonson in San Francisco crocheted for me a Royal Copenhagen blue basket. She said it was her Oscar to me. I was very touched, believe me.

"Before I did the Academy Awards

interviews I was so frightened I was almost numb. There is such a degree of concentration in those affairs. It's not unusual for me to get keyed up when it comes to doing important jobs. When I was preparing the Clyde Beatty show some years ago, for instance, I lost twelve pounds. I have not weighed in and out since doing my NBC program so I don't know how I'm doing."

Not many know it, but Shirley is not new to TV. In 1940 she was called the Queen of TV and was the most televised girl in America.

During the course of her many interviews, Shirley has, of course, run into taciturn stars, but she has found a way to break most of them down.

"When I ask a question and get a one-word, cryptic answer," Shirley continued, "I just throw back a one-word question in answer. Then the person has to elaborate a little."

The other life Shirley leads is centered in an apartment on Hollywood Boulevard. Here she lives alone—and happily. Her dining room is her office. You'd imagine that a bachelor girl working in her own apartment might be inclined to get things rather messed up, but not Miss Thomas.

"I like a certain orderliness about my work," she said. "My friends think I'm an utter perfectionist, but I can't stand an untidy room. My brother and sister work with me as a corporation, and the three of us have dedicated our lives to our work to an unhealthy point. We spend almost every waking hour on the show. But I love the demands my job places on

me. There's a lot of social activity connected with it, so I'm not exactly sitting at home with a parrot. In fact, I've never had it so good.

"I don't say I like living by myself—or with my career. No one likes to live alone, but that's preferable to living with the wrong person. And I speak from experience.

## THE Man

"I have tried to analyze the kind of man who could ever fit into this life of mine. I think of such things when I try to mix any social life into my career. I wouldn't be happy with the nonentity kind of man who was agreeable to everything I did. I'd prefer the big man, the one who in his thinking and in his acceptance of what I may be doing in my work is secure enough and sure enough of himself not to be offended if I might have to leave him at some opening while I interview someone.

"In all honesty, though, I'm not easy to get along with. With my life the way it is I'd have to make drastic changes in myself before I could think of marriage. I hope that I can do that when the time comes. I am too career-minded now. I'm also very self-critical. I rip what I do to shreds and just once I'd like to be able to say I had done a good job. I'd have to become much less analytical were I to get married.

"However, I see no change in my life for now so I'll just go on concentrating on the work I love."

Well, NBC has Shirley anyway. And the union is a blissful one.

# Lifelines

**NOWADAYS IN "THE TRADE,"** we hear a great deal about the "wide, wide world" and "get out of Hollywood" programming concepts. These simply mean that television's horizons have expanded and that attempts are being made to originate more and more shows from centers other than Hollywood and other tired spots.

**"PRODUCERS SHOWCASE" ON MONDAY, JUNE 27,** on NBC-TV is an example of wide, wide world programming. It will integrate pick-ups from three countries—the United States, Mexico and Canada. In this three-nation telecast there will be about 1,000 participants, forty cameras, ten bands. From Mexico will come twenty-five minutes of bull fighting and fiesta-type merrymaking with singers and dancers.

**FROM MT. HOOD WILL BE SHOWN SKIING.** The Shakespeare festival from Stratford, Ontario, will supply appropriate telecast material. In short, the entire ninety minutes gives promise of refreshingly different fare, accomplished on the hop, skip and jump.

**"THIS IS WHAT TV SHOULD BE,"** remarked NBC-TV's Hollywood program chief, Frank Cleaver, when I asked for more particulars on the network's wide world programming. "There should be no restrictions." According to Cleaver, the expanded concept was initiated two years ago when NBC prexy, Sylvester (Pat) Weaver, summoned his top idea men and said, "If you had all America and twenty remote units, what would you do?"

**AS PRELIMINARY TO THE UPCOMING** telecast there was a recent pick-up from Tijuana's hai jai arena. There was another from Las Vegas, where Liberace starred. The one on June

27 is by far the most ambitious, with inserts from New York, Chicago, Des Moines, Denver, Salt Lake City, San Francisco, San Diego, Jones Beach, Hood, New Orleans (a jazz session, of course), Canada, Mexico. A sort of seven league boots affair.

**BESIDES THESE "LIVE" NEW** horizons, NBC is scheduling film backgrounds in Bermuda, is dickering for atmosphere from Hong Kong, is mulling location in India—in short, has knocked the restrictive walls off the TV studio.

**"THERE ARE TWO TYPES OF TV PRESENTATION,"** Frank Cleaver explained. "One is confined to the studio and is usually fiction. The other shows the viewer what is happening, actually at the moment. This is something motion pictures can't do. TV can." The June 27 wide, wide world will stress this "happening now" concept. Viewers should evaluate the telecast in this significant light.

**ANOTHER INTRIGUING MOVE ON** the network's part is the August 30 telecast of "One Touch of Venus," starring Janet Blair. This production will be presented for three weeks in a Dallas theater, then when running smoothly as silk, will be transferred intact to New York from where it will be beamed on television coast to coast.

**A NEAT TIE-IN WITH STEVE ALLEN'S** soon-to-be-made movie (the Benny Goodman biopic at Universal) will be evidenced July 2 when Steve will escort viewers through the studio. During his meanderings, plug will be given five Universal pictures. A reciprocal back-scratching, which, due to universal curiosity about the insides of a movie lot, sounds interesting.

**TWO YEARS AGO, VIEWERS RAISED** a loud howl when "Mr Peepers" was eased out of his TV summer slot, but there hasn't as yet been much uproar over his current axing. "The Frontier" has been bought by Reynolds for autumn.

**LOOKS AS IF ROY ROGERS' "Thunder"** is set for a weekly half hour come fall. Howdy Doody and Pinky Lee will carry the ball against "Mickey Mouse Club," but right now when you ask any of the other networks what they'll do about their time from 4:30 to 6 p.m. on Sunday, July 17, they either shudder or shake their heads sadly. That's when ABC-TV's initial telecast comes from Disneyland Park and even though it's mid-summer, you can be sure looking will be intense.

**MENT** that "after the second time around, TV film revenue is sheer velvet," MCA's Wynn Nathan called to point out that the statement was not quite true. Re-payments to actors, producers and other workers cut the velvet. Outside New York, Chicago, and Los Angeles the price per film is not plushy. In fact, according to Nathan, there are only eight cities in the United States that are really profitable markets. In some lesser spots the films go for as little as \$50-\$100. "It takes three years to get your money back," Nathan stated. "There's no other business in which you have to wait like this."


**I ASKED NATHAN WHAT HE THOUGHT ABOUT** my idea for reruns of radio shows. "Intriguing," he replied, "but no one has ever taken the time to do it. Who has the time?"

**DICK CONTINO'S KRCA SHOW** PICKED up a sponsor right away . . . Elliott Lewis is recuperating from surgery . . . A TV musical show is on the front burner for Dick Day and Kent Taylor . . . That amusing "Studio One" of three weeks ago, written by William Altman and tabbed "Operation Home," is going to be made into a movie . . . Premiere of the new radio show, "Monitor," drew good comment, but many listeners are of the opinion that the beeping grows irritating. Of course there can even be merit in irritation—remember the old LS/MFT days?

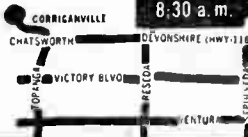

**DON DIAMOND**

When Don Diamond majored in speech at the University of Michigan little did he think that his Spanish elective was going to affect his future acting career. Don is Bill William's sidekick in the popular "Kit Carson" series, but perhaps the name "El Toro" is more familiar to you.

Although Don is possibly best known for his "El Toro" portrayal, he has a keenly perceptive ear and has about fifteen dialects at his command. He graciously sparks up an interview with bits of Scottish, British or Swedish dialects, giving his audience the feeling of eavesdropping at a United Nations confab.

But it's the knowledge of Spanish that has forged his career. During the war he did some special propaganda broadcasts aimed at South America for the co-ordinator of Inter-American Affairs. When he was stationed in Tucson, he took advantage of its proximity to Mexico and visited that country at every opportunity. "I watched Mexican and Argentinian films until I knew every plot in the book," Don explained. "But more important than that I learned how to speak the language. Later under the G.I. Bill I went to Mexico City College where I studied Mexican Folk Lore, Psychology of the Mexican People and Advance Spanish Grammar. I took these courses just after the 'Kit Carson' pilot was sold because I thought it would help me in the role of 'El Toro.'"

"I try to play the role of the Mexican sidekick without caricaturizing the Mexican people. I think it is important to tactfully portray the role of any minority. Although I supply comic relief, I try at the same time to give the role stature and credibility."

Judging from the fan mail he receives from Mexican viewers, Don is more than welcome south of the border. He has, in fact, many friends among Mexican actors, including Alfonso Bedoya and Armand Calbo, popular stars in Mexico. Because of his strong interest in our southern neighbors, he spends most of his vacations

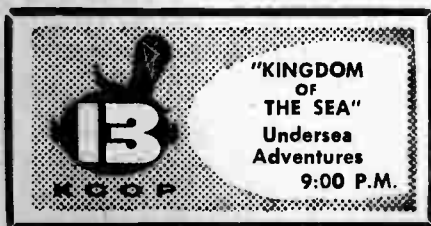

# Alice Lon's First Exclusive Interview After Vicious Attack By Masked Men

*"Champagne Lady" gives details, never revealed before, on her living nightmare of horror. Also tells how newspaper stories were wrong! Defends Welkmen who drove with her on night of beating. Answers question: "Will her career end because of this?"*

I hesitated before dialing her number. First, because as a friend, I didn't want to bother her at this time. Second, because as a reporter, I really didn't expect anything. Alice Lon was not available for an interview—for anyone!

But I knew we had to have some sort of a story in this week's issue and I had a deadline to meet.

So I dialed her number.

A voice said, "Hello."

"Is Alice home I asked?"

"This is Alice," she replied.

I identified myself. And apologized for calling directly.

"I'm glad you called," she said. "But it is a coincidence. You're the first person I've talked to. We've had the phone disconnected for several days, but they just connected it again. Mother usually answers the phone, but I just happened to be here when you called."

## Answers Everything

It was actually late Thursday afternoon. On the preceding early Sunday morning, the "Champagne Lady" of the Lawrence Welk orchestra, her husband and her mother, had been bound, gagged, and beaten by three masked men in their Van Nuys home. It was a "horrifying experience" for Alice and a story that shocked the nation.

We talked for fifteen minutes to a half hour. It may have been longer. I honestly couldn't say. Considering what was going through my mind as well as hers, it seemed like hours.

Because she sounded to be in pretty good spirits, I asked far more questions than I had intended. She answered them all, without hesitation.

"Of course, I'm still a little nervous when I think about it, but otherwise I feel fine. My stomach is still a little sore where they hit me repeatedly, and my arm is bruised. But that's all, physically.

"They hit me in the stomach when I first entered the house. And they kept hitting me there all during the night whenever I started to yell for help."

## Living Nightmare

Alice's living nightmare lasted from 3 a.m. when she returned from work, until dawn, when the three cowards (that's the nicest printable word I

can think of to describe the thugs) finally left.

"Many of the newspaper accounts of the story were wrong," Alice explained.

"Do you mean some of the lurid details they went into?" I asked.

"Yes," Alice replied. "A lot of it was exaggerated. And they made many other mistakes, too. For example, it wasn't just my eyes and mouth that they taped up. It was my whole head. They carried a lot of gauze and tape, and they kept turning and turning it around my head until I was completely covered.

"They said my mother was given sleeping pills. That also wasn't true. And Bob (Bob Waterman, her husband) didn't go to the door. The door was unlocked, and they walked right in while he was sleeping. He doesn't know exactly what time it was, except that the particular TV station he had been watching a movie on had gone off the air. There were many other things too that they misprinted," Alice explained.

"I'm not a family man, Alice," I said, "but I don't understand how the three boys could have kept sleeping all that time? When Bob fought with them, when you yelled, and when all the other things were going on, I don't see how they could avoid waking up?"

"You really don't know children," Alice laughed. "Especially my three boys. They not only sleep soundly, but there were other reasons why they didn't wake up.

"First of all the three men took off their shoes. They made no noise at all when they walked. Then they kept Bob, my mother and me in three separate rooms. And they kept walking back and forth to make sure we weren't doing anything. There were never more than two in any room. And they hit me so hard I couldn't yell," she answered.

## Defends Welkmen

The next point I didn't like to bring up, but I had heard some comments from other sources so I asked Alice: "Why did the fellows in the Welk band whom you drove with let you go home alone. Isn't that a dangerous thing, especially for a girl in your position and at that hour?"

"All of the fellows in the driving

'pool' with me live only a block away. That's actually one of the reasons I moved to this neighborhood—so that I'd have someone nearby to go to and from work. When the fellows drive me home, they always wait until I have entered the front door. Even if they had been with me that night, it wouldn't have done any good. Because I was actually in the house and the lights were out and the door was shut, when I was hit the first time in the stomach. Even if they had been there, they wouldn't have been able to tell that anything unusual was happening."

After the attack and after calling the police, Alice kept her three boys in hiding. (The three cowards who attacked her had threatened to harm them if she did call the police.) Meanwhile, she and her husband went into seclusion at a friend's home in Eagle Rock.

"One of the worst parts about the whole affair," Alice continued, "was the way in which my father in Texas first learned about it. He heard the news on Walter Winchell's program. You can imagine how frantic he was. Since then, I've been able to talk to him four or five times."

## To Continue Career

"Will this affair end your career?" I asked.

"No. Absolutely not," she replied.

"Does your husband feel that you should quit?"

"No, he doesn't. Any idea of quitting would be ridiculous. Especially, when I think about the reaction I've already received. I've read hundreds and hundreds of telegrams and letters, all of which say essentially the same thing: They say how heartbroken they were when they heard about it. They all hope this won't stop me from singing.

"I have no intentions of doing so. Not only because I want to, but because I couldn't let all these wonderful people down."

That was my story. I was through. For the rest of the time we stuck to some friendly conversation and some personal philosophy. Soon, I felt that I had taken enough of her time—especially under the circumstances.

"Needless to say, Alice, I'm glad you're feeling better."

"Thank you," she replied. "And thanks for calling. I enjoyed it so much."

"I hope it helped a little," I said.

"It did," she answered.

Two friendly "good-byes," and a further "good luck" from me, and the conversation ended.

Next, I put some paper in the typewriter, pounded some words on it—and that's exactly what you have just finished reading.

# Clete Roberts Gives First-Hand Account Of "World's Earth-Shaking Events"

*This week the KNXT newscaster is covering the Tenth Anniversary of the United Nations. It is a fitting time for Clete to review for us the six crucial moments of History at which he was an eye-witness.*

This week, KNXT's Clete Roberts will fly to San Francisco to cover the Tenth Anniversary meeting of the United Nations. At the very least, the occasion is an important milestone along the bumpy road man is traveling in his search for lasting, world peace. At best, it is a event of great historical significance.

In two decades of covering the global newsbeat, Roberts has been on hand many times as history unfolded on the very ground on which he stood.

We asked Clete "What are the modern world's most significant events which you have witnessed?" Here are Clete's eye-witness reports...

"V-I DAY"—"The place was Florence, Italy. I stood outside a battered quonset hut which housed General Mark Clark's War Room and watched the men in their dusty, black sedans pull up before me. One was General Sanger and Etterlin. His bearing was proud, his expression disdainful. But when he walked into the room and faced General Clark, his demeanor crumpled with it, Germany's forces in Italy capitulated. It didn't get a heavy play in the press, but we in Italy called it 'V-I Day.' When Etterlin returned to Field Marshal Kesselring with instructions for surrender received from Clark, his eyes were as vacant as his future . . . and another dictatorial force had been run down by the inner determination of democracy, an occasion that marked the beginning of the end of World War II that yet may prove itself to be a war that history will record as mankind's last military struggle."

"THE RETURN OF MacARTHUR" (Oct. 20, 1944) — "He stepped lightly from the landing craft, knee deep into the Leyte surf. He didn't seem to hear the shooting that still was going on around us. Once on the beach, one of his first acts was to walk down the sand strip to our small truck with its medium-wave transmitter. We handed him a telephone hand set into which he uttered that shortest of sentences that was heard around the world: 'I have returned.' I recall that it began to rain as he spoke, and I have a vivid recollection of his impeccably cleaned and pressed khaki shirt wilting under the fine drops. But he didn't seem to notice; his mind was elsewhere. The moment marked the first



subsiding of the Japanese military tidal wave that all but engulfed the Far East. General MacArthur's words were symbolic in that they were a major commitment by this country to fight democracy's battles wherever they shall occur."

THE BIKINI BLAST—"The splitting of a pea of an atom on that tiny Pacific atoll cannot be ignored in any such analysis as this. My instruction as pool correspondent for the major networks was 'to describe the blast at the instant of detonation.' I confess I was hardly equal to the task. I was ten miles from the epicenter of explosion. My clearest mental image is, as the first white-light hit our eyes, hearing naval officers around me chanting softly, 'Look at 'em... they are still there... they are floating...'. Then the big ones, the guinea-pig battleship, cruiser and the aircraft carrier 'Saratoga' started to go down... and the refrain died quietly on the lips around me. The results of the test, of course, changed the current concept of naval warfare and still more sobering, it was the biggest blast yet in an era in which man could make his own decision as to whether he shall live in inconceivable comfort or die the death of the damned. It's significant, too, that mankind, as a whole, hasn't as yet made the choice."

COLLAPSE OF THE BERLIN BLOCKADE—"It was midnight, May 12, 1949, when the first barrier on the autobahn into Berlin was raised by a Russian guard and the lifeline of food began to flow into the city on wheels and the clock-like schedule of the planes dropping into Tempelhof air-drome was broken for the first time in months. I talked with several Russian soldiers that night. They seemed happy it was over... that they would like to be friendly... that they did not quite understand what it was all about. A Russian politico, unyielding, only knew that his political machine had been whipped... that the collapse of the blockade was one of the first major signs that the U. S. S. R. recognized and accepted the new will of the West."

PEACE AT PANMUNJOM—"We had stood around, listlessly, for days, waiting for word from the tiny tents on the Korean plain. When the historic announcement came, we heard it from a Red newsman first, finally from a UN officer speaking to the correspondents assembled in front of his tent. The moment was significant because the UN had taken its first military stand against aggression and won. But we knew, too, that the Korean 'incident' proved that in the present

battle of propaganda machines, a seeming victory could be turned into defeat in the minds of millions by semantic gymnastics and that China now must be faced up to as a major world military power."

ATOMIC CANNON ARRIVE IN WEST GERMANY—"Last, I would mention the arrival of our atomic cannon (and pilotless bombers) in West Germany. The cannon were so long, each on its own truck, that there was a cab on both ends. As the giant devices made their way down the narrow German roads, the Germans looked up open-mouthed at the drivers and their assistants who looked like pilots with their headphones and lip-mikes through which they spoke to the cab in front or the rear. These convoys were proof positive to Europe that the concept of 'peace in preparedness' now was part and parcel of U. S. international policy."

# Hubby, Wife Radio Team Put Redlands Station in Black

*Roy and Ellen Winkelmann prove that under the American system of free enterprise, "it can still be done." San Bernardino Valley's KCAL clicks with listeners and advertisers.*

Everyone dreams of owning a radio station — but owning one — and making it pay are two entirely different things.

A group of very wise professional men decided to apply for a radio station in Southern California. There was a frequency open in Redlands, California, a town of some 23,000 population, with Yucaipa, Mentone and Loma Linda totaling approximately another 30,000. That would be their spot.

Then the task of searching for a manager began. After interviewing many applicants for the job, the owners chose the husband and wife team of Roy C. and Ellen Winkelmann. Roy was thoroughly experienced in radio sales, while Ellen had experience with all phases of inside radio, i.e., programming, traffic, continuity, books and air work.

## In Redlands

Two months before Radio Station KCAL was to take the air, the Winkelmanns were in Redlands. They found it a town not very receptive to a radio station. As a matter of fact, it was generally believed and discussed around town that it was just a matter of time until the station would be out of existence. Responsibility hung heavy on Roy and Ellen's shoulders.

By pitching in and helping with the painting and putting up tile for the studios and offices, they helped save the company money. And by monitoring stations in the area, they set up many principles and policies for KCAL. There would be no disc jockeys — no hill-billy music — no jazz or rhythm and blues — religion only on Sunday mornings — and above all — they decided to cover all local events. Instead of a wire service, a full-time newsman was hired to gather and write the news of San Bernardino Valley. They kept the staff to a minimum, with Ellen doing all the copy-writing, programming, traffic, books and secretarial duties. With overhead cut to the bone, they could ride out the storm.

But something had to be done to awaken the merchants who still were "unbelievers." Roy and Ellen worked day and night — planning and figuring on how to give their town a "shot in the arm." They decided to buy an ad in the local newspaper on their 100th day of broadcasting. It was a quarter-page and in the ad they listed and thanked all the sponsors of KCAL for making their first 100 days such a great success!

It worked! The list was very impressive—even sponsors that had just

ONE spot on the air were set down. Phone calls of congratulations came in —AND MOST IMPORTANT—the merchants whose names were not listed called and pledged their future support. Roy and Ellen were overjoyed.

## Merchants Participate

But a follow-up was needed. They hit on a summer type of show involving the merchants themselves, and acquainting them with radio operation. They called it "Guest Disc Jockeys" and only those merchants who had been sponsors—or were on the air at the time—were invited. The program proved what all radio people believe —THAT THERE IS A LITTLE HAM IN ALL OF US!! That did it! The station went up and up from that moment on. Today the station is fondly referred to as K-Cal, the station that you can turn on in the morning and leave on all day!

KCAL is 1000 watts—and a daylight station in operation now for a year and a half. It has earned an excellent reputation and sponsors now come to the station to buy air time. Roy is known all over the area as "Wink"—and if he is unavailable, "Mrs. Wink" will do. This husband and wife team has proved that by hard work — being sincere and using a lot of imagination —and by working together as a team—success can come to all radio stations.

A "blooper" made by one of the announcers on an early morning station-break humorously describes Radio Station KCAL. "This is radio the Redlands way. KCAL, San Bernardino Valley's most independent station." The word "powerful" was inadvertently left out.

# Notes to You

Several weeks ago, on our Saturday night KFI program (9:30-11:00) Tommy Dorsey, speaking for brother Jimmy, Buddy Rich and the rest of the Dorsey Brothers Orchestra, said he believes the generation of today is enjoying the swing music of yesterday with as much fervor as their moms and pops did . . . which is a pretty broad statement, according to many of today's exponents of modern jazz. It'll be interesting to hear the reaction of listeners when we play Capitol's limited edition long-play album, "The Kenton Era" on the same program.

The album is an eye-catcher with a caricature of Kenton in silver on a black background, but it's what is inside on the eight



twelve-inch long-play sides that counts in the long run. Against a background of his music, Stan introduces the album by summarizing the development of his orchestra over the past fifteen years, illustrated with excerpts from early recordings. Then follow previously un-released versions of 1940-1942 radio broadcasts from "Balboa Bandwagon," personal appearances, band rehearsals and early transcriptions of 1943 and 1944. The Artistry In Rhythm period is well shown from early Capitol transcriptions of 1945 and 1946. Kenton's Progressive Jazz of 1947 and 1948 includes more Capitol transcriptions and in-person appearances at New York's Commodore Hotel and the Hollywood Bowl, his concert Innovations, 1949-1951, and the Contemporary period, 1952-54, including the band's European appearances. "The Kenton Era" is appropriately closed by Kenton explaining his aims for the future and an extended version of his theme, "Artistry In Rhythm."

To many Kenton purists of today, the first half of the album has no appeal; to those who remember when Stan played with a beat, the last half is unappreciated. However, "The Kenton Era," as a whole, is an historical chronology of the most controversial Man and His Music in the annals of jazz. As such, it may very well be one of the most sought after items of the future. —A.M.

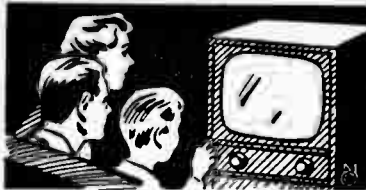

A youthful slugger grabbed a bat and sauntered to the plate. Big leaguers' actions at the dish began to emulate.

He hitched his pants, He tugged his cap, Rubbed dirt upon his hands. He gripped the bat in grimy fists, Eyed non-existent stands.

The ritual came to sudden end when he knocked dirt from a cleat. For a moment he'd forgotten He played in his bare feet.

### ANSWERING THE MALES—AND FEMALES

**Question:** Who said, "His head was full of larceny but his feet were honest?" —Betty Thurber, Los Angeles

**Answer:** "Bugs" Baer, describing Ping Bodies attempt to steal second base in 1917 when he was thrown out by several yards.

**Question:** How did the expression, "It's a rhubarb" come to be applied to arguments between umpires and players? —C. A. Clifton Jr., Los Angeles

**Answer:** Gary Schumacher is generally credited with coining the term while describing hectic moments of argument and confusion during, naturally, a Dodger game.

**Question:** How long does it take a fast ball to reach home plate from the pitcher's hand? —Ira Katz, Los Angeles

**Answer:** A good fast ball pitcher will fire the ball plateward at a speed of about 80 miles an hour. (Bob Turley and Bob Feller's fast balls have been clocked in excess of 90 miles per hour). That's approximately a speed of 120 feet a second. Since it's 60 feet, 6 inches from the pitching rubber to the back corner of home plate, the horse-hide would speed that distance in about 1/2 second. However, realize that the pitcher takes one full step toward home plate before releasing the ball and the batter hits—or misses—the pitch before the ball actually reaches the plate. Thus I would figure that from the moment the ball leaves the pitcher's hand, until it reaches the point where the batter swings at it, 2/5 of a second would elapse. The batter however, has to decide whether

to swing at the pitch in about 1/2 that time, in order to execute his swing by the time the ball reaches the proper hitting area. That gives him one fifth of a second for his decision.—Not long—eh?

**Question:** When was the spit-ball outlawed? —Earl Richards, Los Angeles.

**Answer:** In 1920. Only the 17 pitchers then using it in the major were allowed to continue the highly effective, though unsanitary, delivery. However, it was 14 years before the last of the expectorators, Burleigh Grimes, faded out of the big league picture. Urban Faber, Jack Quin, and Clarence Mitchel lasted almost that long. Faber and Quin were active until 1933, Mitchell until 1932. Incidentally, not only the spit-ball but other external application deliveries were abolished in 1920 and it was five years later that the use of a resin bag was granted.

**Question:** I heard you say on the baseball telecast on Channel 9 the other night that you caught two trout on one line one day last week.—Who are you kidding? —Army Armstrong, Los Angeles

**Answer:** Nobody. But I wouldn't believe it either if I hadn't seen it happen. I was using a cheese-egg rig (two hooks on one leader); the top hook baited with a yellow salmon egg, and the bottom triple-hook with cheese. One of the trout hit the top hook and the other was SNAGGED (in the side) with the triple hook. Two of my fishing buddies, Fred Hesse and Gordon Locke, will testify to my piscatorial feat and it is the only thing that I can brag about so far this season. But I am still hoping. Just like I'm hoping that the Angels and the Stars will still tie for first in the PCL.

When Jeff and Aldo were in Las Vegas recently, they were introduced by the emcee. Pointing to Jeff he said, "This is TV's Alice Gobel." Then Aldo was introduced—as her husband. But over the room you could hear a buzz: "Where's George?"

## Who Is Alice?

"More people take me for the real Alice Gobel," Jeff said with a light laugh. "It gets to be very confusing. But Aldo likes it. In fact, if people don't happen to know that I play Alice Gobel he tells them. This is quite unusual since he wasn't too anxious for me to go on with my career. It's just that he and I both fell in love with George Gobel about the same time, so he thinks it's great.

"It was about two years ago when we were put under the Gobel spell. He was doing guest appearances on 'Saturday Night Revue' and I was on the show too—but not working with George. At the time no one thought I was the right type to work with George—so now look what has happened. I owe Hal Kanter a great deal for believing in me enough to let me play Alice.

"There was only one time Aldo put his foot down about my show with George. We had planned to get married just about the same time that the first Gobel show was to be done. I had previously said I could be on the opener but Aldo thought differently. He didn't want the wedding plans changed and he didn't want to bring down his fifteen relatives to Hollywood so I could do the show

and get married too. That, to him, was expensive and didn't make sense. So I didn't do the Gobel show until about three weeks after its opening.

"Naturally, as much as I wanted to do the first program, I didn't want to take a chance of upsetting Aldo by arguing about it. There wasn't any point in losing a good thing—like becoming Aldo's wife."

Jeff was wearing a very unusual hat at the interview. It was a flat-top kind of thing with huge poppies sprouting all around it. Aldo had seen it, liked it, and bought it for her.

"He brought me some pearls too when he came back from location in Japan for his new picture, 'The Gentle Wolfhound,'" Jeff commented. "He's thoughtful in some ways, but on Mother's Day he didn't even say 'Happy Mother's Day' to me. My son, Mike, was equally un-sentimental. I had had to make a Mother's Day speech a few days before and when I got home he asked me if I had received any laughs. I said, 'A few.' To which Mike remarked, 'What happened? Did your hat fall off?'"

"Back to my role as Alice Gobel. I love it. But I wouldn't dare nag at Aldo the way I do at George. Even on the show, however, I try not to become unpleasant or shrewish. I like to be more teasing in my attitude. I treat Aldo much differently, of course. I may suggest that he do something. If I get no reaction, I go all the way around the barn and back, which is to say I re-suggest. If still nothing happens I drop it. Later, when he does follow the suggestion I'd made I let him think it was all his own idea. I've heard the real Alice Gobel treat George the same way, so I guess my system is not unique.

"Alice and I have shared other experiences. When Aldo and I used to go to premieres he'd be mobbed by the fans. I'd be walking up the lobby, would look around expecting to see Aldo, and I'd find him behind me with a lot of kids around him. I used to tell him he shouldn't leave me waiting like that, that he shouldn't forget I was along. I'd get very upset. Recently, I asked George how he liked the first preview he'd attended. He said, 'Okay, but that Alice. All

she does is talk about my making her wait while I sign books and things.' So you see it's the same story.

"Aldo and I often go to George and Alice's home and they visit us. We're good friends, but I can assure you Aldo is not another George Gobel. For a while he used to work with me on the script for the show, but I had to stop that. You should hear Aldo trying to sound like George! He broke me up he was so awful!

"Alice Gobel and I are little alike, although I'm inclined to be more of an extrovert than she is. Aldo and I are quite gregarious.

"The things that happen at our house. Every Monday, Wednesday, and Friday Aldo gets upset about something. I just mark it down to youth and love him for being impulsive and as moody as he is. Of course, I'm Irish and I'm just as emotional as Aldo is. I have some terrific ups and downs.

"I think I'm a pretty good wife, actually. For one thing, I love to cook—and Aldo loves to eat so we get along great. I make all my own bread. I do hate ironing though, but I have a housekeeper who doesn't like cooking and does enjoy ironing so we have no problem."

There's usually a project going on at the Ray home—the latest being the swimming pool.

"Aldo always has a new project," Jeff grinned. "Recently, he decided he needed more exercise so he ordered a 20x40 pool. This is great, except that our yard is 20½x40½, which means the dog will have to learn to swim and the housekeeper will have to go to the incinerator on water skis."

George and Aldo are a contrast in many respects—but mainly in their sense of humor. Jeff has learned to cope with both.

"Aldo's humor is more undisciplined than George's," Jeff said. "He doesn't always know he's funny—whereas George has tried his humor out enough to know what's amusing and what isn't. But the jokes Aldo pulls! He's been doing a lot of mili-





tary pictures recently and he's heard some strange tales. He comes home and forgets there are ladies present, meaning me. He's around the GIs so much he forgets the WACS at home.

"Of course, my own actions have

added to Aldo's sense of humor. I was once so naive that I thought I could stack up a lot of cough medicines and help clear up his throaty voice. What a surprise I got—and what a laugh he had! That voice is

here to stay."

Jeff laughed, fixed her hat so it would stay on, and said, "Can you think of two nicer husbands than George and Aldo? How lucky can a woman get?"

# "Science Fiction Theatre" . . . . Fact or Fiction?



↑ **TRUMAN BRADLEY INTRODUCES** each "Science Fiction" episode with a demonstration that forms the scientific basis for the fictional drama that follows. Action takes place in outer space, on the ocean's floor, in the depths of the earth—or wherever man's imagination may lead him.

**1. How much of "Science Fiction Theatre" is fiction and how much science?**

Our stories are fiction but they are all based on actual scientific experiments or new scientific theories. We use our imagination and take it for granted that certain scientific experiments will result in scientific findings. In other words, we anticipate events which will happen or can happen in the near future.

**2. Do the writers spend much time in studying available information on planetary matters, out-of-space facts? Do you?**

When I assign a story I give the writer a certain amount of scientific literature. With it, he also receives a fee for research and the help of our permanent scientific advisor.

**3. In the first episode shown, was the incident of the fountain pen based on any exact research or was it fiction?**

Life Magazine had a picture of weightlessness inside a plane—tennis balls were floating inside the cockpit. I heard about similar phenomena which gave me the idea for the story.

**4. From what sources do you gain your facts upon which you hinge your stories.**

I am an avid reader of the Scientific American and other publications which deal with scientific and medical research.

**5. Do you or your writers believe in flying saucers?**

I believe that flying saucers have a scientific explanation and they have something to do with the Jet Stream.

**6. Do you believe men from other planets have visited this planet?**

I do not.

**7. How do you combat the errors of other shows dealing with the world of the future?**

By using an intelligent and documentary-line approach.

**8. Upon what facts have you based human behavior of pilots and the like when they travel in outer space?**

I had many discussions with space medicine experts and some of the German V-2 scientists.

**9. Have you uncovered any scientific facts that you had once thought were fiction?**

Many—especially about the behavior of crystals, high frequency sound and many animal experiments which seemed incredible until seeing these things with my own eyes.

**10. Have you uncovered any fiction facts that you had once thought were scientific?**

Yes—and most of them concern flying saucer stories.

**11. Do you have governmental or military approval—or advice—on your shows? Is there any censorship?**

We have Defense Department cooperation on a number of our shows. Our censorship is self-imposed. We are trying to be constructive and will avoid causing panic or hysteria.

**12. Do you find subjects for your shows limited? Are there enough angles to outer space to provide plenty of themes for programs?**

The subjects are limitless. Science offers a great number of backgrounds to our show. We deal with outer space only here and there.

**13. Have you any unusual subjects planned for future shows?**

We are planning a few very unusual stories, like the story about

"Crystals," "The Other Side of the Moon," "The Man With the Plastic Heart," "The Cone of Silence," "The Life of the Termite," "Brain Wave Experiments," "The Secret of the Pyramids," and many others.

**14. Do you get mail from viewers questioning facts you present?**

Yes, and most of the documents are very complimentary.

**15. Is this type of program more difficult than most dramatic programs? If so, why?**

Much more. To shoot special effects and machines requires great care and a lot of preparation.

**16. What are the major problems in connection with producing a show of this kind?**

To find good writers who understand science.

**17. Since you have made motion pictures on outer space themes do you find making films for TV any different?**

No.

**18. What service do you feel can be served the public by shows like this?**

(a) We want to entertain the public. (b) We want to boost the interest of youth in science and engineering. (c) To help the public understand the world around us. I believe that anybody who will watch our show each week will end up with a much higher intelligence quotient than he had before. I think all this may be a very important contribution too, to the future of this country.

Dat did it! "Wait a minute, buster." I intoipretated, "no doity talk in my presence. Dat 'education' stuff has got to go!"

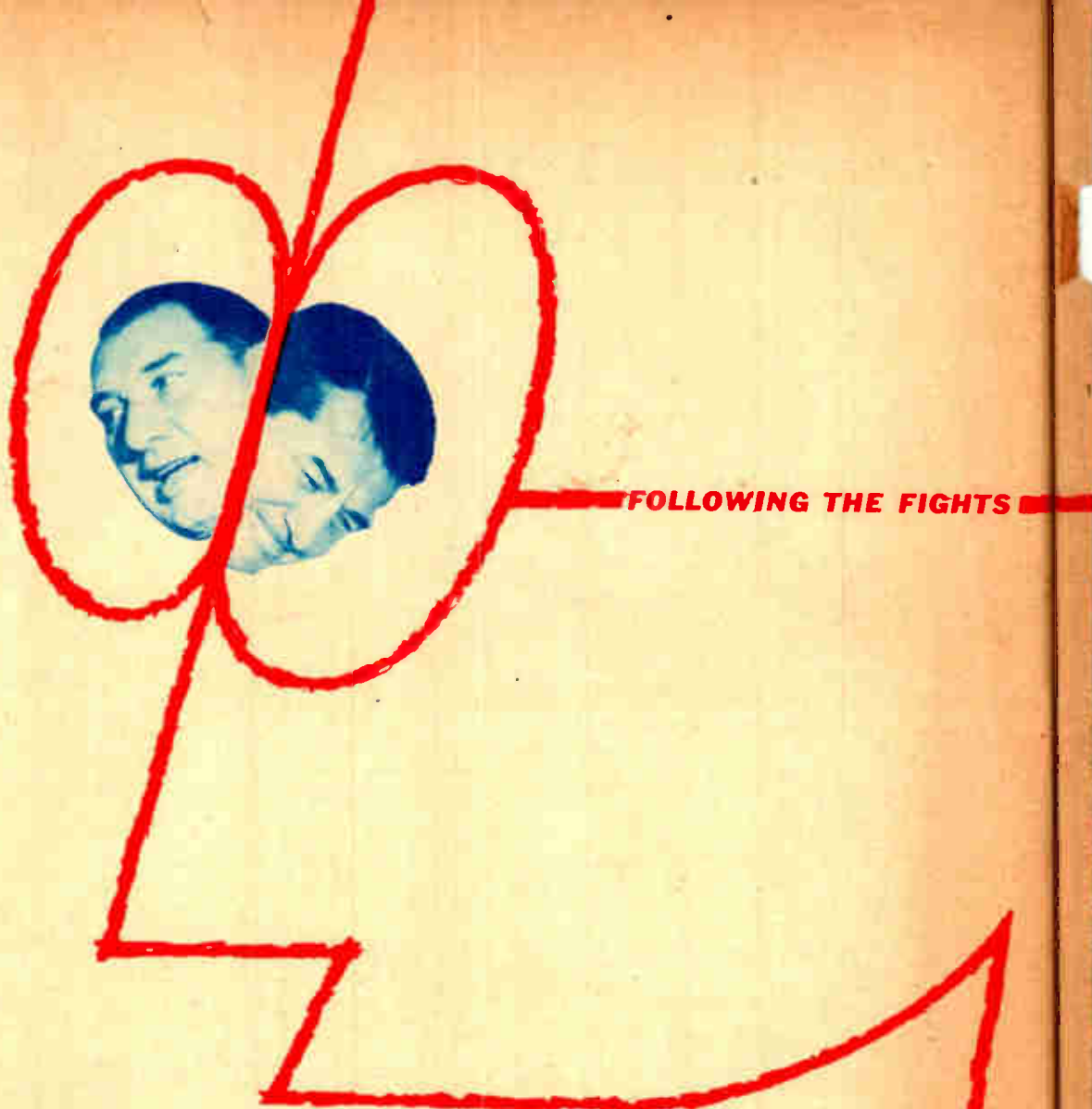
