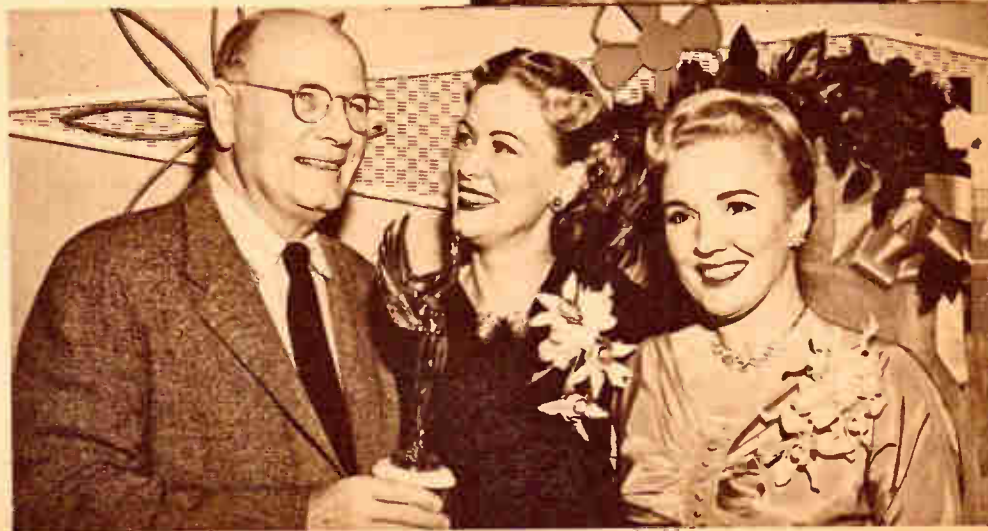

# The Many Lives of Gene Raymond

*The popular star and host of TV Reader's Digest has so many irons in the fire that he needs about three lives to do everything.*

ALONG WITH HIS MANY ACTIVITIES, GENE RAYMOND acts as the personable host for KABC-TV TV Reader's Digest show. But Gene would never be satisfied with just one job!

**G**ENE RAYMOND had just flown back from New York—again—where he had gone to film his host spots for KABC-TV's TV Reader's Digest Show. He was at work once more, but this time as an actor for a Matinee offering. He was also contemplating doing a stage play in his spare time.

Playing a host isn't a new experience for Genial Gene. He had served in a similar capacity before on Fireside Theater. But his new stint is even more demanding since, in addition to his host activities, he is a sort of general businessman for his sponsors, who happen to be Studebaker-Packard, in that he does a certain amount of promotion work for them.

Such are his three lives—host, actor, businessman. He handles all with astonishing aplomb.

## Host

"Doing these host spots and the commercials is a very fine life," Gene smiled. "We do six in two days in New York, which gives me ample time to do whatever else I'd like—and there is a lot I want to do. Certainly a job like this isn't half the strain of doing a regular show each week, although I'd relish having my own program.

"Some people think I'm rather odd to want to have my own show. They point to the pressure and the tension and the time it takes. But I have to keep busy. I'd like to do a series where I'd have a running part—where I'd be doing the same role each week. To attempt an anthology kind of thing on which I'd do a different character each week is just too much. That's where the strain comes in. But by doing the same part, an actor gets a chance to develop enough foibles in the character to allow him

more freedom in playing. He can establish the personality so clearly that he can avoid the tension that comes from having to create something new and different every week. That is a dreadful responsibility.

"I want a series and I want to act in other shows because I don't want to be just a TV host. Once you get in that rut no one thinks of you as anything else. A fellow can get lazy doing a job like this and I, at least, have to have a challenge, an incentive to try new things.

"I have had a few questions in my mind, I admit, about being a host—and especially about giving the commercials. On Fireside I acted in the plays at times, was the host, and gave the plugs. I felt this was wrong because it must be jarring to an audience to see an actor play a part, step out of it in the middle to give a commercial, and go right back into the character again. This was especially confusing to me when I played a drunk doctor in one show and then came out for a commercial. I was as jolted by this as the audience must have been.

## Pitfalls

"But just being a host and reciting the praises of your sponsor's product is fine. There are, however, certain pitfalls anyone doing such a job has to avoid. The biggest pitfall is to slacken off, to say, 'I'm making enough money so why should I do any other work?' This will never happen to me. Another pitfall is the tendency on the part of some hosts to be just too, too friendly. That interminable grin comes on the face and you keep hoping it will disappear sometime. I try to be friendly but I don't want to overdo it. Getting the happy medium so you won't annoy your viewers is not too easy a task.

"It is just as difficult to avoid

the same cliché ways of greeting your audience at the beginning and saying good night to them at the end. How often can you say, 'We're happy you're with us tonight' and 'We hope you've enjoyed the show. So—good night.' I adopted a sort of trademark for myself. I always ended with, 'Have a pleasant week.' This seemed to be right for me.

"Another thing I try to avoid as host is being so relaxed people think I'm either bored or going to sleep. You have to be relaxed, yes, but a vitalized kind of relaxation is necessary. You have to act as though you're enjoying yourself at least."

Gene works hard and constantly but not at the expense of his health. As he says, "I want to enjoy life." This he manages to do. To keep himself in shape, he plays tennis regularly here and in New York he attends the Athletic Club.

"I find it hard to relax," Gene admitted. "If I have a couple of hours off I feel a terrific urgency to do something with those two hours, as though I didn't dare waste them.

"I do manage to relax, though, by writing. I wrote the story for my wife Jeanette MacDonald's appearance on a Screen Directors' Playhouse show. And I also find relaxation by my work in the Air Force. I have a reserve commission as a Lt. Colonel and I have to spend so many days each month in service—as well as fulfilling the required 100 flying hours a year. I would automatically report for duty, without being ordered to, in case of an emergency. I think it's important to do service in the reserve. Too many people shirk it!"

Gene Raymond, then, really has four lives—the fourth, his Air Force life. He certainly is on the go, but at least he's going somewhere!

**R**EMEMBER Dinah Shore when she first came to Hollywood. She was the new discovery of Eddie Cantor's show and ready to launch her own fifteen-minute Blue Network program. Enthusiastic, ambitious, cordial, likeable, but not exactly glamorous.

She could scarcely wait to meet Bing Crosby, her idol, but when the big moment arrived, her hands trembled and her knees clacked together uncontrollably.

When she arrived for my first interview, she wore her hair long over her shoulders and with a showy pompadour. Of course this was during the war when slacks were acceptable apparel, though few girls wore them to The Derby.

It's a long way from 1942's uncertain, struggling, and passably good-looking Hollywood novice to the self-assured, successful and very glamorous star who this week again

occupies center stage as topper of NBC-TV's big Tuesday night program.

Yes, Dinah's career has climbed steadily and with the ascent have come inside changes wrought by her happy marriage and motherhood and outside changes of which the extent may be measured only by pictures such as the ones on these pages.

Along with the climb of her career have come the outward changes in Dinah, coupled with changes in her personal life which have wrought their miracles.

When I asked Dinah the other day, "As a child were you ever conscious of glamour?" she replied, "Definitely. I was constantly sending away for things that were advertised in magazines. I sent for everything—vanishing creams, wrinkle creams, lotions that would add new gleam to the hair. Since I was only ten at the time, I didn't want my mother to know about these things and when the postman would arrive with a

package for me, I would take it and immediately disappear into my room with it. In fact, I recall hurriedly trying out a new cream on my face—and suddenly my skin started burning. I became frightened until I realized that I had been applying toothpaste to my face rather than a cream.

"I knew I wasn't any beauty, so I tried to make up for it in other ways. I tried to be an interesting person. I found myself entering into all sorts of school activities and sports.

#### Evolution

"Nothing in particular made me decide to transform myself. I think every woman wants to be as attractive as she possibly can. This is a gradual process of trial and error in which a woman finally decides what is best for her. I never thought of the word 'glamour' itself.

"A woman's views on this probably coincide with the various stages or phases in her life. I remember that

Never underestimate that 'comfortable' feeling. This rule should hold true from the moment you get up in the morning until the time that you retire. Being yourself naturally means being immaculate at all times."

Does Dinah worry now about being attractive? Sure, she does! Even though she thinks George is "the easiest husband in the world to please as far as clothes are concerned, just as long as I don't spend too much money."

It is evident that Dinah Shore has come a long way from that little ten-year-old girl who sneaked creams and lotions into her room in experiments to look prettier. She has found the keys to unlock inside glamour and outside naturalness and simplicity. She has experienced happiness in her home life and genuine achievement in her career.

When she was a small child and still known by her true name, Frances Rose, her playmates used to tease her by chanting,

"Fanny sat on a tack, Fanny Rose. Did Fanny rise? Shore!"

Yes, indeed. Fanny Rose has changed. Fanny Rose has risen!

## IN THE SKY

*Kirby Grant plays pilot-rancher who is equally capable on the controls of a plane or reins of a horse.*

**KIRBY GRANT** (Sky King) and pretty **Gloria Winter** who portrays his lively teen-age niece Grant, a former musician turned actor, won the famed Gateway to Hollywood contest many years ago.

**T**ELEVISION has brought us cowboy heroes of every description. None, however, fits into the unique category of Kirby Grant, hero of KABC TV's Sky King series.

As rancher-pilot-unofficial deputy he rounds up desperadoes of the West for the delight of his small-fry viewers. In this age of aerial weather controls and airborne crop dusting a flying cowboy fits right into the trend. To be sure Grant does mount a horse on occasion but it's his airplane chases that make the greatest impression.

If Grant, a handsome rugged six-foot-two, had continued his early career as a concert violinist instead of pursuing theatrics he may never have reached television fame. He

swapped his music for makeup and entered the Gateway to Hollywood contest winning a contract at RKO Studios. Eventually he became a contract player at Universal and played singing heroes of horse operas but it was television that skyrocketed Kirby Grant's career.

Grant is believable in his role of Sky King not only because of his acting talent but also because of his early environment. "I was born and raised on a Montana ranch," he graciously commented, "where I learned to love the outdoors . . . ride a horse, hunt and fish. I was an Eagle Scout and later a Ranger at Yellowstone National Park. So you see the role of Sky King is not completely out of keeping with my background.

"Since my father was an ex-professional baseball player it was only natural that I would pursue some type of sports. I played semi-professional ball and was a member of the University of Washington track squad, running the 100-yard dash in 10 seconds flat. This training has helped me tremendously in my television series."

Grant commutes between Hollywood and Chicago, where he lives with his family. In Chicago, he drops his actor's cloak for a directorship with the Wilding Picture Corporation, one of the largest industrial-commercial film producers in the country.

Kirby Grant has a dual creative career, a happy home life and recognition from legions of viewers. He's riding high, high in the sky.

### Writer Predicts New TV Drama Concept

According to writer Robert Libott, it's not the writers but the attitude of the top echelon that marks the difference between the New York and Hollywood teledramas. New York is conditioned by the theater and the Coast is influenced by the film industry.

But regardless of the geographical location, Libott feels that the television writer is at last getting his due recognition. The Paddy Chayefskys and the Rod Serlings have set a new pattern for the successful television writer. And movie rights, in many instances, have become contractual conditions.

Personally, Libott prefers writing for live television because the writer can spend more time with the director, necessary re-writing at rehearsals and generally follow through in putting his words into action.

He predicts a decided cleavage in teledramas as we know them today. The hour-long drama will give way to a 90 minute high caliber treatment comparable to BBC's Third Program. The half-hour dramas will slip, as some of them are slipping now, into pulp category. Libott also believes there will be a leveling off between Hollywood's overemphasis of production values and New York's exaggeration of dramatic values.

Libott's TV credits include I Led Three Lives, Favorite Story, Casablanca, Times Square Playhouse. His most recent teleplay was shown on Big Story last week. Currently, Robert Libott, native Angeleno and Stanford graduate, is in New York preparing a stage play of Alan Paton's novel, Too Late the Phalarope, for early Broadway production. He's also discussing a western version of Oedipus Rex with U.S. Steel.

### Color Research

A pioneering research project designed to follow the growth, development and impact of color television in a typical medium-sized American city has been launched as a jointly financed study under the auspices of NBC and ad agency BBD&O.

Current plans call for two surveys a year with a probable sample panel of 4,000 families. Project will be a continuing one and will be known as "Colortown."

In a recent NBC statement the net reports that advertisers are spending about \$45,000,000 this year on color television.

### Point With Pride

. . . to Guthrie McClintic's video adaptation of the classic The Barretts of Wimpole Street. It was a wonderful adaptation and Miss Katharine Cornell again proved it her forte. She has given more than 1,000 performances as Elizabeth Barrett since the play's debut in 1931. NBC estimates that 28 million television viewers saw this Producers' Showcase feature.

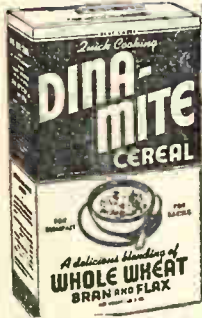

# Lifelines

BY EVELYN BIGSBY

**STARTING IN LOS ANGELES** April 16 there is scheduled a House Un-American hearing at which TV will not be permitted. This is in accord with the rule which was passed by the House after Kefauver and his committeemen attracted nation-wide attention. Newspaper reporters will not be banned, but television will have to content itself with what it can grab before the session is called to order.

**THE OTHER DAY I WAS ABLE** to probe the problem in a chat with Sam Zelman, Director of News for KNXT and CBS-TV Pacific Network. He outlined television's attempts to gain equal rights with pad-and-pencil reporters.

**THREE MONTHS AGO**, he said, when TV wanted to cover the trial of Supervisor Legg on perjury charges, restrictions so stringent were laid down that they were tantamount to a refusal. TV couldn't show the jury. TV couldn't show the judge. TV couldn't use any additional lighting. TV cameras had to remain stationary. TV cameras couldn't be too noisy.

**DESPITE ALL THESE LIMITATIONS**, KNXT decided to take advantage of the opportunity in order to establish a precedent of coverage, and therefore agreed to the terms. A TV camera moved in to cover the morning session, but when court reconvened after the noon recess, Judge Charles Fricke of the Superior Court said that the camera was too loud and disturbed the decorum of the court. TV was thwarted again.

**"BEING A NEWS MEDIUM**, TV should be entitled to news sources," Zelman claimed. Pointing out advantages of allowing TV in the courtroom, Sam continued, "TV can't misquote. It is licensed by the government and doesn't run the risk of slanting like newspapers, which are private businesses. Essence of the thing is, in a trial it's the people vs. defendant and, since all the people who want to, can't be in court, TV, which is able to bring the court to the people, should deserve consideration."

**ZELMAN THINKS THE BIGGEST** gain TV has made against this discrimination is President Eisenhower's allowing TV film cameras at his press conferences. Also, last December, TV cameras were placed in unobtrusive locations in a Waco, Texas, courtroom where a murder trial was held. Contrary to expectations, the TV cameras did not provoke undue mugging; in fact their presence improved decorum. At another trial in Oklahoma City, the presiding judge declared: "The constitution and laws, since our nation began, provide that the people's court shall at all times be open to the pub-

lic, as a necessity of due process of law. Modern means of news coverage have made possible a more adequate extension of this great right. The courts must keep in step with such means."

**IN JUNE THERE IS TO BE** a conference of California judges. The TV newsmen are hoping that their problem will be discussed and that they will be given some relief in the matter of covering courts. "There'd probably be four or five trials a year we'd like to cover with TV film," Zelman said. "Maybe one a year 'live.' Our attitude can be summarized very simply. The newspaper reporter's tools are a pencil and paper. Ours are cameras and mikes. If one news medium is permitted access to courtrooms, so should another. Otherwise, it's simply a matter of discrimination against one form of news coverage. We want in!"

# Thankfully, for "All Hands," Berle Lays No Bomb on Carrier

Milton Berle's telecast from the U.S.S. HANCOCK this past week was a great event for many people in many different ways.

## First of all the show itself:

One of the five reporters who planed from Los Angeles to San Diego to cover the assignment remarked just before air time: "I hope Berle has a good one tonight. If not, it would be awfully tempting to write a head: BERLE LAYS BOMB ON CARRIER!"

Fortunately for all concerned, both literally and figuratively, the "bomb" never came to pass. From the time "Admiral Miltie" appeared on the captain's bridge in the opening shot, until the closing when he and guest star Esther Williams were soaked with freezing water in almost-freezing weather on the Hancock's flight deck, the entire one-hour performance was one of the best efforts Berle has ever put forth on TV. And that's saying a lot, because as one of the NBC press agents pointed out, "this was Berle's 363rd live performance on TV." For endurance alone, to say nothing of the quality, that's quite a record.

In addition to some excellent comedy material (highlighted by Arnold Stang's sketch with Esther and Milton), the special NBC colorcast had plenty of variety. For the "rock 'n' roll" enthusiasts there were the singing and sexy antics of the new bobby-sox idol, Elvin Pressley. The tapping feet of the white-hatted swabbies and the gold-braided officers, and the shrieks of a group of teen-age high school girls were ample proof that Elvin is here to stay.

To round out the program, musically, Harry James and his trumpet and Buddy Rich and his drums did their usual capable job.

To round out the show, period, Esther Williams not only made a grand entrance on a swinging crane and kept the show moving with some funny lines and a fast dance routine, but she made "eyeballs pop out" (as Berle expressed it) when she strutted on stage (oops, sorry, "on deck") in a tight-fitting red bathing suit. The usual swabby whistles which followed her across the "deck," and which continued even when she just stood still, made it quite evident that "all hands" didn't care whether the telecast was in color, or black and white, just as long as it was "live."

The entire NBC-TV show, incidentally, was estimated to cost around \$160,000 (including some \$25,000 extra for the color facilities).

Although NBC-TV footed all operational expenses, the Navy came through with a 4.0 effort to make "Operation Miltie" a great success.

After the program (which ended at 6 p.m. but was seen in Southern California on a kinescope from 8 to 9), Berle and his 15-year sidekick, Arnold Stang, rehashed the show with the press.

They both "sensed" from the audience that everything had come off even better than expected, and they were hoping the same effect had taken

place on the TV screens at home. (As so often happens, what may seem great in the "studio" comes over "dead" in the home; and vice versa.)

Later, when Berle and Esther watched it on a monitor for themselves, they were not at all disappointed in what they saw. Immediately after, energetic Miltie took off "to catch Sinatra's last show at the Sands in Las Vegas."

All in all, a rugged week's work for Miltie and the entire NBC-TV staff.

Oddly enough, from 8:30 to 9 p.m. on Monday, the Navy was getting its full share of air time on TV. Channel 2 carried Navy Log; Channel 4, the Berle show from the Hancock; and Channel 9, Victory at Sea. How Berle made out rating-wise (especially against Channel 2's hour-long circus show), which started at 7:30 p.m., only the end of the month will tell.

No matter what the results, however, "all hands" can take credit for a job "well done."

She wonders how it would be with each of them and her thoughts project her into the future where in three dream sequences she and we are able to see just how life would be. Nicely directed by **Garson Kanin**, the picture



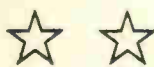
is quite entertaining, if you can manage to ignore Miss Rogers' coquetry, and offers a funny scene in which **Phil Silvers** plays an ice cream hawker who breaks up necking couples to pitch his wares. "Tom, Dick and Harry" was received with considerable approval in 1941, right after Miss Rogers won her Academy Award, and is one of the new batch of RKO pictures recently acquired by Channel 9.

"The Boys From Syracuse." (13) April 17, 8:30. 1940. This **George Abbott, Rodgers and Hart** stage musical was a smash in 1938 and seems to have lost none of its verve in being transferred to the screen. The R&H score, which includes tunes like "This Can't Be Love," and "Who Are You," is top notch, of course, and the cast boasts such comedy stalwarts as **Alan Mowbray, Martha Raye, Charles Butterworth, Eric Blore** and **Joe Penner**. The story is about **Alan Jones**, who is twins and was separated at birth. One of him becomes ruler of Syracuse in ancient Greece and captures his father, unbeknownst to him. The other Jones comes to rescue the father and there is a great deal of confusion surrounding the dual identity, as you can surmise.

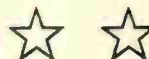

This is all about spices and missing papers and you know how exciting that can be. **William Wright** is a psychological warfare expert who is to leave for the Orient with the plans, but enemy agents object to this scheme and William is in trouble. Then nurse **Nina Foch** has a dream showing William in danger. And then has a dream showing him how to get out of it. Most convenient. The plans are saved and William departs for the Orient. **Otto Kruger** is also in the picture. How's that for information?

It's a British comedy and a pretty good one at that. There follows much confusion and dashing about which isn't straightened out until Buckingham Palace is contacted. The chief merit of this one is the cast, which includes the aforementioned, plus **Valerie Hobson** and the inimitable **A. E. Matthews**. At least, I never saw anyone imitate him.

"Bulldog Drummond's Bride." (2) April 17, 11:00. Not 'arf bad, I'd say . . . I just hope she's housebroken so there won't be any more weddings.

# HOLLAND'S TUNNEL

DUG BY JACK HOLLAND

CBS-TV has a very interesting show that is not seen here regularly. Called **Let's Take a Trip**, it is a sort of juvenile **Wide Wide World**—and, as such, it ought to be given some sort of time so we western cousins could get a look at it. It has achieved considerable prominence—where it is seen—and recently won the **Edison Foundation Award** as the best children's TV program of 1955.



**Stephen Fleischman**, producer, was here with his crew, **Sonny Fox** (who is leaving to emcee **The \$64,000 Challenge**), and **Pud Flanagan** and **Ginger MacManus**, the two children featured on the show. They were going to cover the **Kellogg Arabian Horse Ranch** at **San Dimas** and to do a show on the ferry going between **Oakland** and **San Francisco**.

"I had done nothing but film before," **Stephen Fleischman** said, "so getting used to this show, which is all live, was a problem. However, I have found it very exciting. Everything we do is ad lib, as far as any

dialogue is concerned, and we have our technical problems, too.

"There was the program we did during the last blizzard in New York. We had planned to show the construction work on a skyscraper. The night before our program, ice was all over the city—and naturally on the planks on which we planned to shoot. So at 3 a.m. the crew and I were out with blow torches melting the ice. We then put wooden planks over the tiers of steel to make it possible for us to work on them. Actual workers on the building proved to be very hardy when it came show time because they were out on the skeleton of the building working—in the middle of a snowstorm.

"This is only one of the hazards of doing a show like this, but we feel the headaches are minor in comparison to the good we hope **Let's Take a Trip** does. The youngsters are very enthusiastic about it, judging from the fantastic amount of mail we get from them. We even ask them to suggest trips we should take and we tabulate such suggestions, choosing for our show the ones that seem to be the most popular.

"Spontaneity is very important in our show—and to keep that 'alive' quality, we hardly ever bring **Pud** and **Ginger** to a rehearsal until two or

three hours before we go on the air. We want their reactions to be completely spontaneous."

**Let's Take a Trip** operates on a very small budget, and yet it has at times even scooped **Wide Wide World** on shows. It has taken children on trips through police laboratories, pharmaceutical plants, to airports, and even historical subjects have been tackled.

**Fleischman** is not all for live shows because of the success of his **Let's Take a Trip**. He likes them but he says, "The biggest compliment I've had on the programs is that it looks like it was on film."

**KCOP**, which is going all-out on its live programming, has what could be a popular number in its **Piano Playhouse**, which features **Mario Braggiotti**, four pianos and three other pianists. This is being done from the same stage where **Liberace** was launched into prominence and from the same station. The new show seems to be going on the idea that if one piano and one pianist can click, four pianos and four pianists will be even better. They may have something there, because viewers will get a chance to listen to jazz, boogie, the classics—the works. The emphasis, however, is to be more on the popular kind of music. **Braggiotti** has a nice personality, a good sense of humor, he is no **Liberace** in type, and yet he is also a good showman. It will be interesting to see what happens to this show. I personally think it will take time for it to catch on, but that it has all the elements that make up a "sleeper."

Prince Val (Val Gearhart) is currently honorary president with five children, with brother John a close second with four—and one in escrow.

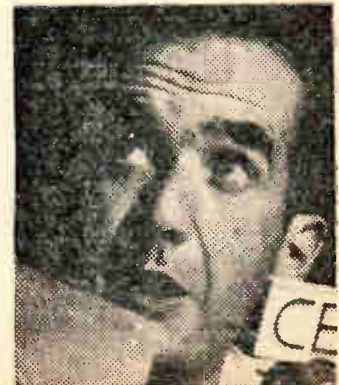
Other "members" include Happy Brooks, Cousin Charley, Quimby and Cy Smith.

In the Spring, this young man's fancy turns to glove (and bat). Is there any sound (outside the rustle of dollar bills in your pocket) more enjoyable than the contact of horsehide on willow? The crack of the bat—'pop' of a fast ball in the mitt moans and groans as dormant muscles are called into action again—all familiar sounds during the early days of baseball's annual spring training sessions.



To me spring training is one of baseball's most interesting periods. I'm fascinated by the eager look of the rookies, anxious to learn—even more anxious to show well and possibly stay with the club . . . the poise of the more seasoned players, who've been through the spring grind before and condition themselves according to a well planned schedule . . . the look of concern on the faces of the older veterans, who don't know whether they'll be able to play another season or not . . . and the ever critical eye of the manager and coach, appraising all talent with a thought toward the approaching season. Spring training is a period of hope and despair . . . hope on the part of every player that the coming season will be his best . . . despair when he finds he is a step slower, can't get that ground ball he used to 'put in his hip pocket,' doesn't swing the bat with the same confidence as last year.

As our PCL clubs begin their preparations for the 1956 season, all hopes are for the best year since World War II. Naturally, KHJ-TV is extremely interested in the progress of the Los Angeles' Angels, for Channel 9 will televise all of their home games with the exception of Friday nights. The predominantly daytime schedule this season in Wrigley Field is a drastic departure from the pattern believed essential to success in the minor leagues.

President John Holland and manager Bob Scheffing have adopted the theory of their Chicago boss, Phil Wrigley, who doesn't even have his park lighted. Baseball should be played in the daytime, they believe . . . both for the sake of fans and players. Holland and Scheffing are convinced the Angels will play a vastly better brand of baseball with only one night game at home each week. And, after all, that's what fans pay to see . . . the best baseball possible. The Friday night game will become a novelty under the new structure at Wrigley Field.

How the public will react to daytime baseball . . . and how well they will support the change remains to be seen. This much we know, Holland has received an enormous amount of

mail commenting favorably on the switch. There has been a great interest on the part of swing-shifters who feel that, now, they can see a game in the afternoon and still be on the job that night. The games have been slated for 1:30 . . . to ease as much as possible the traffic problem. KHJ-TV will, of course, hit the air 15 minutes earlier with a warm-up show.

It would be foolish at this early date to even speculate briefly on what players the Angels will field as their starting team on opening day. The Cubs will send out many before they break their Mesa camp and head back to the midwest. Some of the Cubs' returnees undoubtedly will be cast in first string positions by manager Scheffing. Let's just say that everything is being done to give Los Angeles its best baseball team in many years.

Our Channel 9 director, Don Patton, has worked out some new ideas for his coverage of the games, now that they're all being played in the daytime. You may not realize this, but there is a vast difference in the TV techniques applied to a day and night game. Patton plans to use the natural light fully to give you the best coverage of baseball seen locally since the advent of baseball on the tube. In my opinion, KHJ-TV has had the top coverage . . . so an improvement on this should make it pretty close to perfection.

With the installation of split weeks in the PCL, this season, fans should familiarize themselves with both the slate of the Angels and Stars, so that there's never any doubt over which team is home. Here at KHJ and KHJ-TV we'll be alert to keep fans posted continually on this information.

Now, if you'll pardon me, I think I'll hustle out to Wrigley Field for my daily workout—three times around the diamond—in the cart they use to drag the infield—10 minutes of vigorous exercise—(watching the Angels run around the bases)—5 minutes in the batting cage—(looking for the 4 bit piece I lost in the sportscasters-writers game last summer)—then a steaming hot shower—(to relieve writers cramp).

Yessir . . . in the spring . . . this young man's fancy turns to glove (and bat).

(And I'm younger than you think).

# How Red Came Back!

**I**T WASN'T so long ago that people were weeping at the wall over the fate of poor Red Skelton who was dying on the TV vine. But suddenly, his show started zooming back into popularity. As Red put it, "Now I'm having to crowd my way back on that bus."

To talk to Red you'd never know that he was aware of any of the moaning. He has just gone on doing a show, although he had a few views on the subject of TV and his place in the medium.

"Every performer or actor rides in a cycle, like a wheel," the jovial Red said as he put his script down and relaxed on his couch. "You go so far, you get in a rut, and then you start back up again. It's like music. A couple of years ago you couldn't give

away dance bands. Now they're all the craze.

"I feel our show has good writing and direction now. Besides, it's in color and this helps a lot. Not that too many people have color sets, but those who do seem to talk about the show and this adds prestige.

"Yet, it's difficult for me to talk about the way my shows have gone. Any time an actor gives an opinion he's looked on critically—either he's classified as conceited or the reaction is, 'Who does he think he is?'"

Red's not in the least worried about the future—or about the oft-repeated statement that a star who is on every week wears out his welcome. He just grinned at that and remarked, "A performer doesn't wear his welcome out. It's just that people say, 'Well, we can miss his show tonight and catch it next week.' This doesn't bother me. I have to do something on Mondays and Tuesdays anyway to keep off the streets," he added with a laugh. (It's on Mondays and Tuesdays that he works on his show.)

## Fun

Keeping a certain spontaneity in his work is also paramount to Red. And he has a rather unique system for not letting things get dull. At least his approach is popular with the cameramen and prop men who all beg to be assigned to his show.

"We rehearse Mondays, do a dress rehearsal, that night, and this is when we have fun," Red smiled. "My dress rehearsals are all off-beat. I play them for the crew, and each time I run through the show I do it differently. Occasionally, I say something that might shock some strangers in the audience, but I don't care. I'd never do such things on the show, of course. The crew never knows what I'm going to do next and so when I do the actual telecast and read the lines the way they're written—or approximately the way they are—the men on the cameras are so surprised they laugh. This general good humor spills over into the audience and they start laughing too. If I didn't do such a completely wacky dress rehearsal, we'd all get in an

indifferent rut and nobody would laugh on the actual show.

"I guess I rehearse differently from any other star, but so has our show introduced things we feel sure other productions will pick up in time. We only rehearse two days. That's a big factor. When we do the dress rehearsal we make a record of the show, and then we check it back later to see where the laughs came. If something gets too big a laugh and cuts out following dialogue, we usually cut it. By such processes we hope to keep our audiences."

Red grants that mistakes have been made on his shows during his years on TV. And he minces no words when he talks about the boners.

#### Mistakes

"The biggest mistake came when I was beginning my second year," he stated flatly. "At the time, stars like Eddie Cantor, Abbott and Costello, Milton Berle all agreed to pitch in for me—for free—while I was in the hospital. But those guys who had my contract wouldn't go for this. They decided to do re-runs of old shows instead. I guess they were afraid they might have to give a watch or something to a star who pinch-hit for me. That was a fatal error. In the first place, the technique that was good a year before was suddenly not good later. Too many changes had taken place. Then the kines shown were usually of a bad quality. So the audiences wouldn't accept them—and they switched to another show.

"Then the time for my shows was switched around so much no one knew when I was on—including myself. For some odd reason, those who had my contract decided they wanted to capture the kid audience since they heard youngsters liked to watch me. Well, I had never had a child audience that I knew of. But my show was placed at seven p.m. across the board so that kids everywhere could see it. Then a survey was made to determine how many of my listeners were children. The result was less than one percent.

"Switching the time around was bad because people get used to seeing shows at certain times, and you can't change their habits. Another boner was changing the name of the program to the New Red Skelton Show. What was now about it? No one ever saw the old one.

#### Ratings

"Frankly, I feel, as do so many

others, that too many shows suffer not only from such mistakes as those that hit me, but from an over-emphasis on ratings. I don't believe in ratings at all! And I said the same thing when I was in number one spot. To me, ratings are only important in that they give some business men a chance to sit down over a fast lunch and gloat. They are not a good cross-section of the listening audience. How can they be? How can you possibly claim that what a couple of thousand people watch is true of millions?

"I believe you can tell a lot more about a show by the number of products it sells and by the mail it receives. For a long time I got little or no mail from Boston or New York. I just didn't get across there. Now I am getting a lot of mail from both places. Typical letters from Boston go like this: 'We didn't use to like your show. It's not that we're snobbish, but you didn't appeal to us. But now we like it much better.'"

When Red was asked if he had changed his format, he just said, "What's a format? I've never used one that I know of. I also see no sense in changing what has been successful. Too many shows make that mistake."

Red still sticks to live TV, although he has one filmed show in the can in case anything should happen to him. He has missed a few programs because of illness and injury, so he believes in the precaution of having a stand-by show.

"Live TV is okay," Red said quietly.

"but the fast changes of costumes really get me! This, in addition to realizing what a vast audience you have watching you gives any guy the jitters. I'm not the only star who has heaved a few times from just nerves and pressure. Yet, I like live shows—even though it's more hectic. I don't worry about my program, though. Long ago I decided to mete out my worries. I said I'd give about five percent to TV since that's about all I could spare it. When I have used up most of my other worries and have some left I turn on another comic and worry about him."

Such is one man's outlook on his job. But Red is more aware of the responsibility he owes to his public than most stars. Very humbly and honestly, he said, "Each person is on this earth for a purpose. If I can make people laugh for the nineteen minutes or so I'm on the show, I'll feel I have done something. I can't force people to let me into their living room each week, so when I am allowed in it's a flattering and gratifying privilege. I hope to be worthy of it."

And with that Red went back to marking up his script prior to going into another rehearsal.

It's good to see this wonderful clown riding high again.

# Too Much VIOLENCE On TV??

JOHNNY WEISSMULLER seems to be getting the worst of it in this fight with Mickey Simpson in a KTTV Jungle Jim show.

**A**RE TELEVISION adventure stories too exciting and violent for American youth today?

"No!" emphatically says Colbert Clark, producer of Screen Gems' Tales of the Texas Rangers. "Adventure is the tradition of America. On land, on sea and in the air we have been an adventurous people. Many of the nation's most famous men have achieved their renown because of their derring-do, from George Washington to Admiral Byrd."

Clark notes that in the production of adventure films for juvenile consumption, Screen Gems, television subsidiary of Columbia Pictures Corp., is one of the most, if not the most, prolific in Hollywood with five high-rated series. The Adventures of Rin Tin Tin, Tales of the Texas Rangers, Captain Midnight, Jungle Jim and Circus Boy.

"We at Screen Gems believe," Clark says, "that adventure stories, if properly handled, are character builders, teach honesty, fair play and a moral lesson. These elements must be as much a part of every film as fast action."

He mentions procedures which are strictly adhered to by Screen Gems writers and producers: murders are never graphically portrayed, that is, the showing of actual bloodshed is restricted whether it refers to criminal acts or the capture of criminals; hand-to-hand battles are never morbid or sadistic; making fun of a physical disability is taboo; never present crime or violence as attrac-

tive; never show any specific methods used by criminals in committing a crime; never instill a fear of the hereafter; never try to frighten the viewers just for the sake of frightening them (ghosts or anything supernatural); and other taboos.

"Sure, heroes of adventure stories ride hard, have gun battles and fight it out hand to hand. In the Rin Tin Tin series Rinty does fight villains, but you'll notice that the dog never kills or maims anyone, merely renders them hors de combat. Johnny Weissmuller in the Jungle Jim series may battle a lion or other jungle beast but only in self defense and never just to kill. As a matter of fact, he is a friend of all jungle animals."

Clark readily admits that there have been some carpings from various self-appointed critics.

"They don't seem to remember the adventure yarns of their own day," says Clark. "Death and destruction were on almost every page, not only in words but by graphic illustrations. There were scenes of Indians actually using the scalping knife in such stories as 'The Last of the Mohicans.' In 'Treasure Island' Long John Silver

with his peg leg, eye patch, and hooked hand, murdered his shipmates cold bloodedly. Brutality, maimed men and blood fouled the decks in 'Twenty Years Before The Mast' and 'Moby Dick.' Do the critics of present day adventure yarns claim that those of their generation were bad for them, made criminals or frustrated neurotics of them?"

The producer affirms that violence for violence's sake, of course, should never be present. However he adds, "Wrapping our kids in cotton wool, the way some of these carpers would do by showing nothing but fairy tales, is ridiculous. Kids see villains and bullies at school. They encounter fist fights over and over again. They recognize that the very nature of the world today is a struggle of good against evil."

"Combat for right against wrong is part of the American heritage and never has been harmful for American youth to see and hear. What do we want to make of our kids — goody two-shoes? I'll string along with Teddy Roosevelt who once said, 'Adventure in the hearts of Americans is one of this nation's greatest assets.'"

# Kids Run

# His Life

*The skipper of Cartoon Carousel has caught the brass ring and as far as he's concerned he hopes the merry-go-round never stops.*

**A**LL ABOARD for Fun Island and the Cartoon Carousel!" calls Skipper Frank Herman every afternoon at four as he jauntily prepares to weigh anchor and cast off for a trip on KTLA and an hour and a half of adventure with Porky the Pig, Daffy Duck and other characters.

Frank likes the cartoons and never tires of seeing them over and over. "Every time you watch a cartoon you see things you didn't see the first time. As a performer I'm constantly amazed at the bits they throw away—enough material for several cartoons all incorporated into one."

### Sharing

As he watches the cartoons, Frank reads aloud the signs that appear from time to time. The youngsters love this, and have written to him expressing their pleasure that he is watching with them—not just waiting around for a break so he can give the commercial. "Children get a tremendous satisfaction out of knowing that an adult is sharing something with them," he commented.

Cartoon Carousel is not the only thing Skipper Frank shares with his young audience—he shares his weekends as well, for it is then he has a chance to meet in person his thousands of young fans. It is not at all uncommon for him to appear before four different groups of youngsters

on a Saturday—at market appearances, benefits, and meetings of youth organizations—groups which sometimes number 4,000 and 5,000 children. Sunday is seldom a day of rest, either, because there is usually at least one personal appearance scheduled. During the two weeks preceding last Christmas the Skipper appeared before 42 groups.

It's lucky that Frank is a magician, for it requires a good deal of dexterity to handle all of these personal appearances, especially when there are several scheduled for one day, and still put on a long enough show to keep the crowd happy.

"Every appearance is a challenge to satisfy your audience no matter what the conditions may be. Working in a theater is comparatively simple for a performer," stated the Skipper, "but the real test is welding together thousands of youngsters when your audience is outdoors. With the help of a raised platform and some deputies to assist me, however, this can be achieved."

The deputies come in very handy later, when after a performance of 20 minutes or half hour Frank is ready to distribute prizes and sign autographs. To avoid crowding and possible injury to the children, the deputies line up the youngsters and help pass out the prizes from the stand, and also keep the children moving in an orderly manner for autographs.

Personal appearances aren't a new thing for Frank. After service with the Army in Alaska, he went to Edmonton, Alberta, where he did a radio show for children six days a week. Monday through Friday the show was broadcast from the YMCA with a studio audience, and on Saturday there was such a large group of children they had to broadcast from a theater. Then for two months of the year Frank toured "the sticks" with a group of musicians and some little acts he put together.
