What Makes Bill Burrud Buzz?

He's young and he's making his mark on local television. Recently, however, he recognized an important fact that should take him even further in a frantic business.

POSSIBLY Bill Burrud's greatest asset in the frantic business of television is his recognition of an old truism.

"There's no marquee on a coffin," he says, "and no pockets in a shroud. To stay in this business you've got to learn to take a busy schedule in stride."

And a busy schedule is just what the 31-year-old producer has. Bill Burrud Productions is now committed to 200 hours of live and filmed television a year, with Wanderlust and Vagabond on KCOP and Assignment America on KTTV. In addition they are scheduled to co-produce a third show on KCOP, Night Watch, beginning next month.

This is a gigantic undertaking for an admittedly small organization which boasts but 12 employees.

"My greatest failing," Burrud continues, "has been trying to do everything myself. In fact, everybody in the company has been a combination man—doing whatever was necessary, from camera work to scripting.

"But now we are working into a self-sufficient organization with Reed Bingham heading up the business end and Milas Hinshaw supervising production. I am learning to let others handle the details so I can concentrate on the long-range view of the business.

It Works

"And it's working out beautifully," he grins. "I can even sneak out to play handball now three times a week."

Burrud has been producing television programs since 1950.

"To be honest about it," he confides blithely, "I was enough of a ham to want to be in front of the camera, and I found out the only way I could do that was to produce my own shows.

"Six years ago I was in radio, at Station KVOE in Santa Ana. Television was just beginning to blossom, and like everybody else I wanted to join in. Anybody could get a job in TV those days. Anybody but me, that is. I beat the pavement for months, until I got an idea for a travel show, sold it—and finally got in front of a camera!

"We are now equipped to produce any type of television program or film production, but it seemed to me the quickest way to get into TV was through the field embracing

documentary, travel and adventure subjects. And I still think this field has a greater potential of growth than the big-budget shows. I'm convinced we will survive even in the face of competition from the major movie studios who are now going so heavily into TV production."

Astute Appraisal

Probably more important to the survival and continued growth of Bill Burrud Productions is Burrud's own astute appraisal of the function of his shows.

"After all," he says, "we are essentially salesmen for our clients. Our job is to combine entertainment with merchandising. Too many good shows go off the air because somebody forgot to tell the announcer how to sell the product."

Burrud is quite enthusiastic about the new Night Watch show coming up on KCOP, despite the fact he won't be on camera. And it does promise to be an exciting format adapted from the radio show of the same name.

"We have already found out," Burrud comments, "in making the first show that there is as much humor as drama in police work."

Burrud comes by his portion of "ham" through experience. When he was but seven years old he played in the road show version of "Music in the Air." Between 1935 and 1938 he was under contract to Universal Pictures and made 24 movies.

"Then I reached the awkward age," he recalls, "and my family decided a public school would be good for me. That's how I came to play third string on Hollywood High's football team—the year we never won a game."

His business course at the University of Southern California was interrupted by duty with the Navy and picked up again after the war. He graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in business administration.

He lives now in the Pacific Palisades with his wife Mary who "is far removed from show business, thank heaven," and their three boys, Gary, 12; Tom, 10, and John, 3.

Of television, he observes, "There is no one road to success. But many performers make the wrong turn on the road when they get the big 'I,' the ego."

Which isn't apt to happen to Bill Burrud. He's much too busy to go shopping for an enlarged hatband.

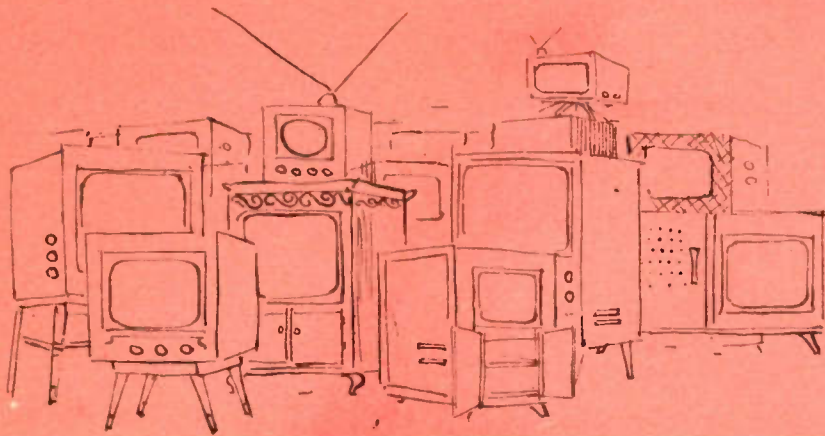


THE TWO STARS of Wanderlust, Slim Barnard and Bill Burrud, confer on new ideas for the travel-adventure show.

Should You Buy a Used TV Set?



Second-hand sets are a drug on the market—which means you may pick up a real bargain. But there are two sides to a bargain and you may get stung. Here are some things to watch for.

LIKE THE MAN says who sells them, "Every Cadillac you see on the road is a used car."

Every television set now in operation is a used one. The question is, how long will it remain in operation, especially if you buy it second hand?

To get the answer to that, TV-Radio Life went to Gene Clinard, who has been seven years in the TV business, first as a dealer and now as owner and operator of Television Industries, Inc., which serves Greater Los Angeles and San Diego.

"The main thing in any set," he says, "is the picture tube. If it is working that is about all you can ask for, because there is no way of knowing how long it will last.

"A picture tube is like a light bulb. It might burn out next week, or it might last 10 years. Neither of these is probable, but they are both possible. There's no way of knowing because there are no mechanically moving parts where attrition can be estimated.

"If you are thinking of buying a second-hand set, I suggest you look in the back to see if there is a booster on the picture tube. A booster is a transformer, an electronic gadget that looks like the base of an ordinary tube with wires connecting it to another plug. When emission gets low, a booster will improve the definition in the picture. They are usually good for about a year, but obviously if there is one hooked onto the picture tube, it is an indication that the tube itself is already weak.

Hot Weather Effects

"Another thing, but one which you can't very well check up on, is the condensers. In hot weather our service calls triple because the wax in the condensers melts down and at a certain point the condenser fails. Well, if the set you are contemplating buying has been kept near a heater or where the afternoon sun falls on it, the life of the

condensers has been shortened just that much. Of course, the increasing use of transistors is licking that problem, but transistors are found only on the newer models, not on the ones that are now for sale second hand.

"In some ways, buying a used TV is like buying a used car. You never know what you've got, or how much money you will have to spend on it, until you've had it awhile.

"But the big difference is that the public knows a little something about an automobile, and relatively nothing about what makes a TV set operate.

"If you take your car to a mechanic to have the motor overhauled, and next week the transmission falls out, you don't take it back and claim the mechanic is incompetent. On the other hand, if you have a faulty condenser in your TV, and a serviceman replaces it, then next week a capacitor gives out, all you know is your set doesn't work.

"Sometimes this is a little difficult to explain to a customer," Gene adds wryly.

Complicated

"Actually a TV set is a complicated piece of machinery. In the very cheapest, there are approximately 1200 parts, and in the most expensive somewhere around 3500 parts. Furthermore, certain tubes and components serve entirely different functions from one brand to another.

"I would say that personal circumstances should indicate whether or not to buy a used set. If you need a second TV to keep peace in the family, then a used one would be a good investment. Or, if finances are a problem, a second-hand set can be bought cheap—and who knows, it might even outlast a new one."

Further inquiry disclosed that used sets are a glut on the market. They have been traded in because the

newer models have offered progressively larger screens with technical improvements. Frequently sets in good working condition are traded off because the owner is changing decor. Admittedly there are some "dogs" in the used stock, but there are also some in excellent shape.

But nobody seems to want them, except on an exceptional deal. One large Hollywood dealer recently held a sale on second-hand TV and record players. Every one was priced at a flat \$14.95. He didn't make any profit on them, but he did get rid of the stock.

How Much?

Generally speaking, however, a used set will cost around \$35 for a 10- or 12-inch screen, ranging up to \$50 or \$60 for a 21-inch. Considering that some of these sold originally for as much as \$750, this is a whopping big depreciation.

Of course, the older the set the more apt is the picture tube to burn out. Replacements are around \$25 for a 10-inch tube, \$35 for a 17-inch, and \$50-\$55 for a 21-inch, plus installation which is usually in the \$15 range.

However, there is one advantage to buying a used TV that can never be equaled by a used-car dealer—the parts warranty.

In the case of Television Industries, they offer a parts warranty at \$15 a year, which means if you buy a used set in working order, they will replace any part which fails within a year, including the picture tube, with a specified and itemized ceiling charge on labor costs.

This takes most of the gamble out of buying used TV.

If you have youngsters in the family, the question simply is, is it worth the cost of a second set to see a Spectacular when the kids want to watch a cartoon show?

In the case of this writer, it was. You'd be surprised how tranquil life can be in a two-set family.

Your husband may not appreciate you, but here's a man who does!

Albert McCleery-- *Champion of the Ladies*

ALBERT McCLEERY, producer of Matinee Theater, believes that the hand that rocks the cradle can just as vigorously flip the television dial when the program fare offered gets too "sudsy" or is so silly that it's an insult to one's intelligence. Most of the homemakers of today have had experience in the business world before they were married, and they know the realities of life. They don't want pablum as a television diet—they want steak. Albert McCleery gives them steak, for lunch, in the form of high quality drama, comedy, mystery and musicals scripted by top writers and portrayed by well-known actors and actresses.

McCleery's determination to give homemakers mature, intelligent television at the best point in the day for them—noontime—has brought enthusiastic response from women. Their morning work done, they can bring their lunch into the living-room and relax for a good hour of solid entertainment before starting their afternoon chores. However, if she's pressed for time, the housewife can bring her ironing board or her sewing along with her, and even with divided attention can easily follow the story, for McCleery has foreseen the possibility of a "too-busy" housewife and has designed his productions for sound as well as sight. The wonderful voices of Ann Harding, Sarah Churchill, Judith Evelyn, John Conte and Sir Cedric Hardwicke; the appealing, provocative voice of Zsa Zsa Gabor, the voices of scores of other stars and supporting players have entertained the vast twelve-to-one audience of Matinee Theater since its start on NBC-TV last October.

Now that Matinee Theater has been proven a success McCleery is hailed as a genius, but it wasn't so long ago that his ideas were ridiculed and he was accused of egotism and criticized on all sides. The criticism just increased his adrenalin flow and gave him that much more determination to prove his beliefs. That's the kind of a man McCleery is—dedicated to his work, with a forceful personality that carries through to a conclusion. Yet he's not the steam roller type. He has finesse, a soft but compelling voice, and keen but kind eyes which command attention and respect from his listeners. Undoubtedly for women it's an added attraction that he's very personable, somewhat on the Fred Waring type, with prematurely greying hair.

Not the least of McCleery's talents is the ability to fire people's imaginations. They may not always agree with his thinking or method of procedure, but they can't help reacting to the sparks he throws off. He knows that one man can't change the whole pattern of television production, but if he can attract enough converts to his way of thinking and his technique, the television audience will profit by it. In explaining his ideas he has made the following observations:

McCleery's Views

"The writer is the most important factor. All basic story plots are good. It is the writer who makes a powerful show, an entertaining show, a weak show or a flop.

"I believe in the star system. People are eager to see the stars. Every time we have a big name on Matinee Theater we have more viewers and more mail response. I believe that the younger actors and actresses in television who are doing fine work should be built up to star caliber with more publicity and better recognition on the shows they perform in—not just a credit line that goes whirling by at the end of the program. For instance, John Barrymore, Jr. and Karen Sharpe. They are sure to be stars within a couple of years. Barrymore has the magnetism, the sureness—he doesn't even need support—just feed him lines and he's magnificent. And when Karen Sharpe's on stage things crackle, you can feel the vibrations.

"I think if youngsters have talent they should start studying when they are seventeen. It will take five years to learn their craft and five years to achieve their goal.

"Don't encourage 'no-talent.' If you've the slightest suspicion that they haven't got what it takes, whether they're actors, writers or producers, don't, I beg of you, encourage them. You'll do them more harm than good and you may unwittingly cause tragedy. I've seen it happen. If people have real talent they'll have dedication, and if they are dedicated they'll find a way to get what they want. It's the 'no-talent' that's always waiting for a 'break.'

"Sets are unimportant. People will use their imagination if you'll let them and not clutter up the stage. You can indicate any set with a few props.

"I have a horror of movie-type scripts with people coming in and out of doors—a lot of time is wasted with the camera focusing on people

walking down halls or across the room. And I don't believe in scenes where people are just thinking. I feel there should be action at all times, and on Matinee Theater we are doing this more and more. For one thing, it enables the audience to follow the show even if it is necessary to go on doing something in the next room.

"While some shows, such as Hamlet, are definitely better in black and white, I'm sold on color and I believe everyone will have color sets before long. Most of the companies are coming out with lower priced color sets during 1956. Incidentally, speaking of sets, one of the most interesting developments will be television screens on the wall, but don't ever expect a wall screen larger than 27". The manufacturers have found there's something frightening about seeing the head of a person more than one and a half times its natural size on your living-room wall!"

You may never see Albert McCleery on your television screen, but you'll feel his influence, especially if you're a woman at home. He's your champion and he's going to continue to give you the kind of adult entertainment he feels you deserve.

What His Illness Taught Him

When Jackson Wheeler was hospitalized he learned that the encouragement he had given others was returned to him many times over.



A LONG SIEGE in a hospital bed usually gives one an opportunity to appraise himself and the world in general, sometimes to learn something new about those two subjects.

KTTV's popular Jackson Wheeler has returned recently to his late show after a five-month absence, more than half of which he spent in just such a bed.

"I don't think you can say I learned something new," he comments soberly. "Rather, I had personal confirmation of a slogan I use frequently on my show—'There is a solution to every problem. The sun shines after every storm. The soul's highest duty is to be of good cheer.'"

"However, there was one exception to that. The sun shone during the storm for me. Nearly 9,000 letters and telegrams were delivered while I was in the hospital, and now at home we have three packing crates filled with messages from the people with whom I have been privileged to share these late night hours.

"The thing that impressed me most about these letters was that 99 per cent of them were concerned with prayer and God. Many, many of them said that everyone in the family was praying for my recovery, and I am not ashamed to say that the tears rolled onto my pillow as my wife Thelma read these letters to me.

"I am a great believer in prayer. Not passive prayer. I believe we can surmount any problem by having faith in God and carrying into action the thoughts that are in our minds.

Fragile Business

"I had always thought of television as being a fragile business, where you were quickly forgotten during an absence. But during this whole thing my faith and spirits were kept high because people didn't forget me. It was a wonderful revelation of the warm hearts of the friends with whom I have spent so many late hours."

One of Jackson's most memorable moments came during his convalescence at Las Vegas. Danny Thomas was appearing at one of the hotels and he concluded his show the night Jackson attended with these words:

"There is a young man in Los Angeles who has brought more encouragement and happiness to people than anyone I know. It's really an extraordinary thing that people in my business like him. But everybody likes him for he is so natural and real. He is with us tonight, recovering from a serious accident. I am going to sing a song for him and when I say the word 'light,' I want everyone in the audience to light a match to symbolize the faith that has brought him through this ordeal."

Jackson says he was reaching for a match himself, for he didn't realize Danny was talking about him until he spoke his name.

"It was a real surprise, and a thrilling one," Jackson recalls. "I choked up. Thelma had her handkerchief out, and I looked across the table at my elder daughter Judy and she was wiping her eyes."

Series of Disasters

The five-month absence of TV's brown-eyed, friendly emcee was caused by a succession of disasters. The first occurred while Jackson and a mechanic were working on his Cad-Allard sports car. A trigger jack was holding the vehicle up and when Jackson accidentally brushed against it, the car dropped, bouncing off his right knee.

The second came when an infection set in the knee joint, swelling it to 32 inches in circumference. It was the type of infection which ten years ago meant automatic amputation and little more than a dim hope for the recovery of the patient. Thanks to the miracle of antibiotic drugs, Jackson survived with his leg intact, although he did lose 44 pounds in weight.

The final blow came with a heart attack, which presented serious ob-

stacles to recovery from the knee injury. He learned, however, that he would have had the heart attack regardless of the accident, for he has been "driving myself into the ground" the past seven years, getting an average of three and a half to four hours sleep a night and having had only one week off during that whole time.

Same Old Stand

He plans now, of necessity, to take things easier. Many of his activities outside the studio will be curtailed, but the Jackson Wheeler Show will continue at the same old stand.

"There isn't a show in the world I would trade it for," Jackson avers. "The networks have been kind enough to offer me programs of almost every type—I've even had movie offers, but I've turned them all down. You can do just so much with money. The thing is, if you had a dozen lifetimes, you could afford to louse up one or two of them. But when you have only one, you've got to make the most of it.

"I feel like part of the family in the thousands of homes in Southern California where the lonely, the ill, the sleepless, the night workers open their electronic doors for me to visit.

"With that feeling, you can have no pretense, no contrived humor. If I have given encouragement to these friends of mine when their hours were dark, I feel then that my job is justified—and a service freely given."

Perhaps television is a fragile business—but Jackson Wheeler has proved that it can also be a heart-warming business when the viewers recognize sincerity in its truest sense.

This Week in TV

Behind the Scene

As the conventions wind up there is the usual talk of behind the scenes skullduggery and fancy footwork.

But perhaps the neatest bit of behind the scenes goings-on that few of the nation's estimated 80-million television viewers knew about, was the work of a young 35-year-old. His name is **Bob Doyle**.

As director of television pool coverage of the conventions, much of the television coverage was the work of Doyle. Seated high above the floor, it was Doyle's job to select what scenes the cameras followed—bald heads or a napping delegate. Where the cameraman aimed, panned, widened and narrowed lenses was the split second decision of Doyle.

From his bird's eye vantage point, Doyle directed by means of three telephones. And orders went something like this: "Camera 2 go to the **Missouri delegation . . . Go to Symington**, he's the tall, natty-looking gentleman behind the lady with the big hat . . . Use the next tightest lens."

And, of course, part of Doyle's job involves the ability to recognize hundreds of political figures at a glance. Fortunately, he's no newcomer to conventions, being a veteran of the '52 gatherings.

"It's a director's dream," Doyle says, "because the story—one that's been rehearsed for 100 years—is laid right out before him. It's a continuing story and his job is to present it in terms of personality, conflicts, humor and drama. Most of all, it's a story of people, and the trick is to have the camera on the right people at the right time."

And we'll say that's no mean feat at a convention—knowing who are the right people at the right time reminds us of calling shots on a roulette wheel.

"Emmy" Revisions

Al Scalpone, CBS-TV West Coast program chief, has undertaken one of the most unenviable jobs in the industry.

According to **President Johnny Mercer**, Scalpone as new chairman of the awards structure committee of the **Academy of Television Arts and Sciences** will supervise the committee's work in revising the "Emmy" awards setup next year.

Mercer also announced that **Danny Thomas** has accepted the chairmanship of the academy's membership committee which is launching a drive to set up chapters in Seattle, Portland and Chicago.

Loretta Young Begins Fourth

Fans of **Loretta Young** will welcome her return Sunday, August 26, as star of **The Loretta Young Show** over Channel 4. The series will feature Loretta with guest stars occasionally receiving top billing.

Matinee Films

NBC Matinee Theater will depart from its customary live television for films—but only when usual showing time is pre-empted by other network programming. Executive producer of Matinee, **Albert McCleery**, will head the filming project. Always an innovator, McCleery has been experimenting with filming for the past six months to determine whether or not his television "cameo technique" would be successful in the motion picture medium. Film production will begin at a Hollywood studio September 13.

Winchell Debuts

With the premiering of **The Walter Winchell Show** in October, Broadway columnist **Walter Winchell** will return to the entertainment world with a variety show.

It will be recalled that Winchell made his start in show business at the age of 12 with **George Jessel** and **Jack Wiener**, running the gamut from ushering to singing, and from this became a member of **Gus Edwards' Newsboy Sextette** with **George Price**, **Eddie Cantor** and **Lila Lee**.

Alice Lon Dances

Alice Lon, "Champagne Lady" of **Lawrence Welk's** show, will add more than a note on the Saturday, August 25 show, when she will be featured in a dance with the maestro himself.

But **ABC-TV** and **CBS-TV**, with **Walter Cronkite** as "anchor man," have shown greater ingenuity in personal coverage.

Cronkite, incidentally, was somewhat surprised when **Averill Harriman** was an unexpected guest at the **CBS-TV** location on Thursday morning. Certainly one of our ablest newsmen, on this particular occasion **Cronkite** "dropped the ball" by asking rather meaningless questions instead of pinpointing the Governor on his chances for the nomination, his opinions of the previous night's "civil rights" debate, and other pertinent material.

All in all, the convention coverage is the type of reporting that the entire TV industry can be proud of. It's an inestimable public service—and even the commercials have been very easy to take and have been in the best of taste. T.H.

Read a report the other day that seventy-five hundred feature films are now available for showing on television. In the years I've been scribbling this column, I figure I've listed eleven hundred and seventy-six films. That leaves six thousand, three hundred and twenty-four still to go... and at that rate, this column will be running for the next thirty years and five months. See? 1984 won't be so bad after all.



"The Sea Wolf." (5) Aug. 26, 7:30. 1941. This is the fifth movie version of the famous **Jack London** tale and it's certainly the best. The plot concerns the dangerous cruise of the hell ship, "Ghost," and the cruelties of its notorious captain, played with fine gusto by **Edward G. Robinson**. **Ida Lupino** is a derelict waif who falls on dark days and is saved only by the love of an ex-convict, **John Garfield**, who voluntarily signs on the "Ghost," suffers the cruelties of the captain but is around to watch ship and captain destroyed in a rousing finish. This straight adventure yarn is well fitted out by the producers and well acted by the principals.

"Marine Raiders." (9) Beginning Aug. 28, 9:00. 1944. Released at a time when war pictures saturated the market, this one makes no effort to be original and so, of course, doesn't succeed. Dr. Groody is that hardy soul who dared to do a TV show based on the adventure to be found in science. You'd think this would be rather intellectual but he has not found such to be the case. At least, his mail comes from all age groups—from three to 93.

Dr. Groody began his science TV show for an odd reason—to get youngsters away from the sets and out into the open again and to make them more curious about the universe around them.

"There were two boys who used to come to my house near San Francisco where I still live," **Dr. Groody** remarked. "They'd bring me bugs, insects, snakes, anything and everything and would ply me with questions about them. Then one day they weren't around any more. I found their families had bought TV sets and the boys were glued to the 21 inch screen. I wanted to do something to stimulate boys like this into going outside again, so I started a TV show proving how much adventure and interest there was in science. Apparently, I got across my point. One father wrote that his youngsters had watched a show I had done on the anatomy of a fish and had asked him many questions for which he had no answers. As a result, he bought a fish, took it home, and he and his boys dissected it themselves to study its anatomy. They got their information this way. This is the kind of inquisi-

were really intelligence agents sending back information in code. At least, that's what **George Sanders** does in this one. tiveness and initiative I hope to encourage by my shows. After all, I'm not an educator. I'm just an adventurer in science."

Dr. Groody commutes from his home in **Marina County** every week for his **KRCA** show. He has had a program on a **San Francisco** channel for seven years. He has no plans so far of moving to **Southern California** since he lives a most enviable life. His backyard is right near a lagoon where he can catch all kinds of fish, swim, and generally live the way all men would like to.

"I have never worried about the so-called average intelligence of the TV audience," **Dr. Groody** explained. "I don't feel I'm being too intellectual. After all, a survey was made of my audience and it was found that it was almost evenly divided between children and adults. I cover all kinds of scientific subjects and try to present them as simply and as entertainingly as possible. I don't believe there is any dull education—just dull educators."

Dr. Groody spends about 50 hours a week in research and study for his TV shows. When asked for the reason for his success on TV, he smiled, "Well, maybe it's because people can relax watching it. At least, I hope that's so."

Maria Palmer is an actress who has appeared in countless TV shows and movies. And yet she had an experience recently that could probably have come only to her.

Peter Von Zann, who is the **Edward R. Murrow** of **Germany's** TV, was in **Hollywood** making a couple of films for his program, "Pictures From the New World." He did one film on **Disney** studio and another on live vs. film TV. **Maria** was in the latter.

"We showed how live TV operates," **Maria** explained. "We used the set which had been in operation for **Climax's** 'Crime and Punishment' show and the **Columbia Players** and I did some scenes from that program. We showed in detail how a live TV play is done—from the readings, blockings, rehearsals, costume changes, to the actual production itself. Then I did an interview—in **German**—with **Mr. von Zann**. That was indeed an experience! I can speak the language well, but I was a little rusty. I found it very difficult to translate some terms from **English** into **German**. After all, how do you say 'dolly shot' in **German**? Even **Mr. von Zann** couldn't help me there.

"This program is the most popular show in **Germany** and has done much to explain **American** life to the people there. In one program, **Mr. von Zann** gave the **Germans** a remarkable picture of **American** life when he filmed the tour across **America** of a **German** family.

"There are over a million sets in **Germany** now, which is quite remarkable."

MGM Joins Forces With KTTV; What Does It Mean?

When its station identification time on Channel 11, viewers from now on will hear "KTTV—the Times-MGM station." It all happened this week as the result of one of the biggest deals ever made between a TV station and a movie studio.

Loew's-MGM purchased 25 per cent of the Times-owned station for approximately one and a half million dollars. At the same time, KTTV paid about \$4 million for a seven-year lease of 725 MGM features, all made prior to August, 1949.

Fabulous Flickers

Some of the top films which viewers will be seeing during the coming year on Channel 11 include "Goodbye, Mr. Chips," "Boys Town," "The Thin Man," "San Francisco," "Tale of Two Cities," "David Copperfield," "The Good Earth," "Thirty Seconds Over Tokyo," "Mrs. Miniver," "Mutiny on the Bounty," and all the Andy Hardy and Dr. Kildare pictures.

Although the news was the talk of the TV town when announced, in many ways it was not much of a surprise. For the past few months Richard Moore, president of KTTV, has been carrying on a fight against the major networks because he claimed they had a monopoly on the acquisition of good film programs.

KTTV, like other local stations, has had to rely more and more on film programs in order to compete with the networks. Two weeks ago at a press preview, a TV-Radio Life reporter asked Mr. Moore, "What new programs are coming on Channel 11 this fall and winter?"

"We don't have much, at present," he answered. "Enough good ones just aren't available to us."

Loaded With Celluloid

Because KTTV has been a leader in recent years in the local field, inside observers felt that Channel 11 wouldn't sit by too long and "watch all the good shows go by."

If they couldn't buy new TV material, then they would go into the backlog of the movie industry. That's exactly what happened this past week.

It's also part of a trend for all local stations in the Los Angeles area. Each of the seven has been buying up more and more feature films from the movie magnates for viewing this coming season.

KNXT, Channel 2, has 104 Warners features.

KRCA, Channel 4, and KHJ-TV, Channel 9, each has 52 from 20th Century-Fox and the RKO studios.

KTLA, Channel 5, has also purchased 52 of the Warners films.

KABC, Channel 7, and KCOP, Channel 13, have negotiated mainly for independent and foreign feature films.

MGM Network?

Behind-the-scenes, MGM has further plans to buy into at least four more TV stations around the nation. At

PERSONALLY HE AND MARY enjoyed their sojourn in Venice most of all. They spent time at The Lido, rode the canals and lived it up. Now they're

long last, the movie industry has finally realized that television is not only here to stay, but it can put the movie studios out of business unless they both join forces.

As far as the public is concerned, it will mean that instead of seeing "old, old movies," now they will just see "old movies." Sooner or later—let's say about five years—TV will have used up the movie industry's "backlog," and then at long last, we will see "originals."

Whether or not the big grab of old movies will be beneficial to the TV industry only time will tell. "Reruns" of old movies (and let's face it, that's all this amounts to) makes for lazy TV programming, especially on the local level.

If Southern California stations can continue to come up with good "live" and film programming, using the movies sparingly and at appropriate time slots, then these negotiations will have immense value to the public. If these newly-acquired, "old" films are to predominate our viewing—then the outlook will be pretty sad for all concerned.—T. H.

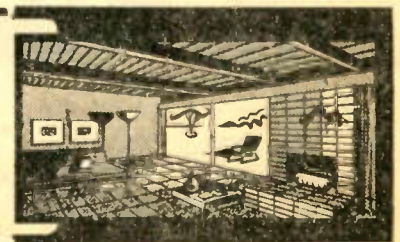

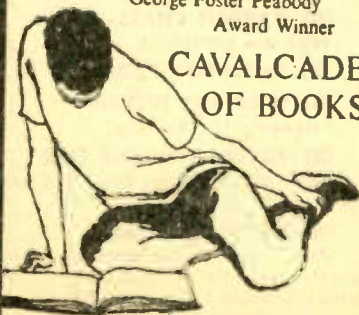

“My Twenty Years On the Banked Track”

*The story of one of
Roller Derby's pioneers.*

BILLY BOGASH is not just a veteran of roller derby. He's a pioneer.

The wiry, spectacled athlete saw the very first roller derby race back in 1935 when it was started in Chicago. Both he and his mother took up the sport.

“That was during the depression when it was tough to get a job. So we took up skating for a living. As a mother-and-son combination, we had a gimmick and that helped to promote ourselves whenever we hit a new town.”

Billy still dons the skates “when I have to. But when a fellow gets in his 40's he has to start planning on something else.”

Billy, as with his life-long friend, Elbows Anderson, is helping to manage and take care of the youngsters who are skating today.

As a sideline he runs a tavern at 3938 Sunset Blvd., called the Sandborn House.

His proudest achievement: the night he was presented with the Most Valuable Player award for

1949 at Madison Square Garden.

Billy has participated in three roller derby world's championships: in 1949, 1950, and 1951, as a player and player-coach for the New York Chiefs.

He also holds the world record of 2:38 for racing a mile around the banked track. He set the mark in 1938 in New Orleans.

Despite the roughness of roller derby, Billy has received only one injury in over 20 years of competition: a cracked rib.

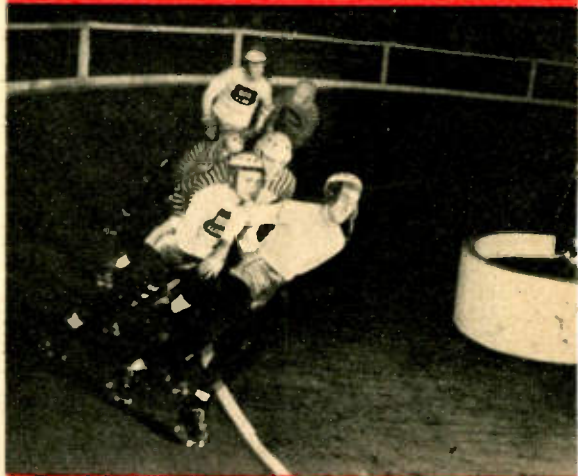
He is still convinced that someday roller derby will be recognized as a major sport in the United States.

“In 1937, people thought roller derby was through. That was the year 20 skaters were killed traveling on a bus from St. Louis to Cincinnati. Only two escaped alive.”

Today thousands participate in the sport, and many more thousands enjoy watching it each week on TV and in person at the Olympic Auditorium. Once a big sport in New York and Chicago, today the stronghold of roller derby is right here in Southern California.

The Mouseketeers Hit the

When Jimmie Dodd, Roy Williams, and the Mouseketeers went out to meet their public face to face they really had some surprises.

ALMOST everyone has known that the Mickey Mouse Club is a popular show, but until recently no one knew how fantastically successful it was.

In an attempt to find new talent for the KABC-TV show, Walt Disney launched a nation-wide campaign. Promising youngsters in most of the major cities were given a chance to show what they could do as singers, dancers, actors, etc. Then, when the finalists were chosen, Jimmie Dodd, Roy Williams, and about nine of the Mouseketeers made personal appearance tours and participated in the selection of the winners in each city.

Most of the touring and the emceeing of the final auditions fell on Jimmie Dodd's capable shoulders. In the course of a few weeks he was in New York, all through New England, Oklahoma City, Newark, New Jersey, Houston, San Francisco, Columbus, Cleveland, Grand Rapids, Washington, D.C.—well, you name the place and he was probably there.

Enthusiasm

"Everywhere we went the reception was the same," Jimmie exclaimed, "simply fantastic. I've never seen such crowds and such enthusiasm.

"Take Portland, Oregon, for example. When we got there we were met by about 3000 kids and their parents at the airport—and yet the time of our arrival was never announced. The day after we left the city, there was the biggest traffic jam in the history of the Portland airport. The rumor had spread that we were due in that day and mobs turned out. I'll never know how the story got out that we were to come back then, for we were already in another city by that time.

"When we played Bakersfield for a charity performance, we were in a theater that held 1600 people. After each show we'd have to empty the theater because there were kids lined up outside all day long.

"Roy Williams, Marvin Ash, our pianist, and I went back to Massachusetts some months back to plug the re-release of 'Song of the South.' It was a cold, snowy day and yet there were lines outside all that day waiting to get inside. The manager asked me to tell the youngsters to leave the theater after each show. I told him I hated to do this, but he pointed out that if I didn't those outside would practically freeze. So, in as nice a way as I could, I told the children what the situation was and they all politely left when the show was over so that the others could get in.

"On the tours I made for choosing the winners in each of the cities, a sort of 'spectacular' was held on the local TV station during which the finalists were auditioned. On the show I'd talk to the kids, have them do their act, and then we'd make a kind of the whole thing. The kine was flown back to the studio here where a committee chose the winners.

"Those who were auditioning and all the rest of the youngsters had plenty of questions to ask me, of course. Many asked how old Cubby or Annette or Darlene, three of our Mouseketeers, were. Some even asked me how old I was—and it was amazing to find out how young they thought I was! One boy threw me this pointed question, and I just said, 'How old do you think I am?' 'Oh, about 21,' he replied. I could only smile and give him a hearty, 'Thank you.'

"Almost all of the boys and girls told me how much

they liked the little messages we give on each Mickey Mouse Club show—the short talks I make. We call them 'Doddisms.' They are important lessons for kids and cover all kinds of subjects—with particular emphasis on the value of prayer."

Adults Are Fans Too

The big thing Jimmie discovered on his tours and on the shows he and the Mouseketeers did was that the Mickey Mouse Club has appeal for adults as well as children.

In Houston, several of the Mouseketeers appeared at a big charity show. Ninety percent of the audience were adults. Among the stars present were Dinah Shore, Clint Walker and Steve Allen, yet the biggest applause went to the Mouseketeers. In Oklahoma City, a star-studded program was given in an outdoor amphitheater. In the middle of the show a wind and dust storm came up and yet no one left. The topper of this program was Darlene Gillespie's singing of "When I Grow Up."

"On one flight I made, a stewardess told me that our TV show had inspired her to take up a career as a stewardess," Jimmie revealed. "She said she had thought of this kind of a job but it wasn't until she saw our show on 'When I Grow Up,' the one dealing with careers as pilots and stewardesses, that she made up her mind definitely.

"An American Airlines pilot also told me that he makes it a point to see our shows as often as possible and that when he can't his co-pilot tells him what was on. Then, when I was in Rochester, New York, one night I went to a club to hear George Shearing, the blind musician who has made such a name for himself with his unique style of jazz. George heard I was in the audience and played one of the songs we feature on the show. He told me later he always enjoyed the Mickey Mouse Club and heard it whenever possible."

One of the most popular features of the Mickey Mouse Club show is the alma mater song. This was written, incidentally, by Jimmie Dodd who has also written several other numbers for the program.

Although Jimmie has been married sixteen years, he has no children of his own. One little girl, on learning he wasn't a father, said to him, "Maybe that's why you like children so well."

"I've always been sorry I had no children," Jimmie said quietly, "but I can assure you I have a lot now. And they're all just great. What a fantastically wonderful life they have given me! I hope I never let them down.

"Being on tour has taught me so much about these kids—and about people, in general," Jimmy concluded. "They've made the whole show seem different to me. The youngsters are so enthusiastic, the adults so kind. Once, in a particularly rugged week where I had to be in a different city each day, I had to take an air coach plane. It was the only flight available. I was absolutely starved when I got on board so I was considerably disappointed when I learned there would be no food served. Well, in a short time, the pilot had sent me some fruit from his lunch, a young lady sitting next to me had offered me her fried chicken, and I wound up having more fun on that trip than I had ever had on any luxury flight."

There was nothing phony about Jimmie Dodd's wide-eyed enthusiasm for his show and his audience. He has found his place in life and the place looks good on him.

Phil Silvers'

Sidekick

Pfc. Doberman may 'Never Get Rich,' but he is bringing a lot of satisfaction and a steady job to Maurice Gosfield.

ACTUALLY the army life is nothing new for Pfc. Duane Doberman.

The man who created him was Tech. Sgt. Maurice Gosfield of the Eighth Armored Division, attached to headquarters at Fort Knox. Gosfield was in uniform three years, 10 months, 29 days and 8½ hours.

"It would have been only three years, 10 months, 29 days and eight hours," Gosfield recalls, "but as I was being discharged a warrant officer asked me to sign up for the reserves and it took them half an hour to revive me."

Nor is show business anything new to Gosfield. This is his 23rd year in it.

"He doesn't know it," the pudgy comedian says, "but Ralph Bellamy was inadvertently responsible for my becoming an actor. He was doing a show in Evanston, Illinois, and happened to see a high school play I was in. Afterwards, he told me I had possibilities and that was about all I needed when I was requested to leave school. It seems there was some objection raised to my continuing to set records in scholastics. I had the all-time lowest algebra average."

Didn't Need It

But as it turned out, young Gosfield didn't need algebra. He made his professional debut in the theater with the North Shore Players in 1932 and during 1934, at the Chicago World's Fair Globe Theater, played every Shakespearean comedian except Casca in "Julius Caesar."

From there he turned to New York and the Broadway stage where he did numerous parts, having perfected his natural talent for dialects and developed a feeling for offbeat roles ranging from zanies to sleuths.

It was in New York that he first

worked with Silvers on a radio show.

"That was the only show I ever quit voluntarily," he says. "Phil played a booking agent and I was a cabby, but it was so bad they wouldn't even keep it on sustaining." Gosfield laughs, remembering the show. "The first thing Phil said to me when I reported for work on You'll Never Get Rich was, 'Why, you big jerk! You drove me out of radio—now you're trying to drive me out of television!'"

Between the radio flop and the television hit, Gosfield had done something more than 2,000 radio broadcasts and over 150 major TV

performances. He played "every slob" on the Henry Morgan Show, had parts on See Hear, the first commercial TV program, and played in "The Glass Key," which was Studio One's first sponsored presentation.

Likes Doberman

He likes playing Doberman, and he likes working with Silvers. Of the patsy of the platoon, he says, "Doberman is a simple hearted soul. He's no cretin. He's no idiot. He's the kind of a character I like to do because he is a challenge. You see, building a character is like doing a painting. You take the skeleton of the thing and work it around and finally you put the mud on his shoes and you've got a solid character. With Doberman, you can do that. Some characters have no scope, nothing to build on. But Doberman has breadth and depth."

As for Silvers, Gosfield has the highest compliment in the profession: "He's an honest actor."

"We reach an easy rapport when

we're working together," he continues. "When we're building a scene he gets the feel of it, and, more important, he feels that I feel the situation the same way he does."

"You've got to be on your toes with him. He works fast and you've got to keep up. He frequently ad libs—but that's what I mean about his being honest. He cues you on it, and if you're awake you can follow the new line."

Show With Taste

"The thing is, we're not doing the usual brand of TV. This is actually theater. Nat Hiken who created the show and does the majority of the writing is a guy with taste. He hits for fidelity, getting the comedy out of the situation. He won't take a cheap laugh. If it's a question of getting a laugh or maintaining a character—the joke comes out."

Since "rejoining" the army, Gosfield has been jolted twice. On a personal appearance, the actors were in their uniforms and during a break were told that servicemen weren't served in a particular bar and a restaurant.

The remembrance of the incidents still makes him bristle.

"That stinks to high heaven," he declares. "Those kids are putting in a hard time and they deserve a heck of a lot better treatment."

"During the war, anybody in a uniform was automatically a hero. But I never fired a shot in combat, and I don't see that I was any more of a hero than these kids are today."

Gosfield was interviewed during his first trip to Hollywood—and was admittedly mightily impressed, both by the television facilities and the easy way people live in the West.

"It's the only place I know of," he observes, "where you can live in a flophouse—and have a private swimming pool."

The Modernaires Have A Party

THE MODERNAIRES can't get together anymore without having a party.

The Mods themselves are a good start toward a party, both numerically and for entertainment. Group consists of Paula Kelly, the pretty one in the middle, Allan Copeland, Hal Dickinson, John Drake and Fran Scott. (They are seen Monday through Friday on The Bob Crosby Show on CBS-KNXT.) Added to this are three wives not in show business (Hal Dickinson and Paula Kelly are married) and 10 children.

In addition to their vocal talents (they record for Coral Records), each of the group plays an instrument—not just at the bathtub level but professionally. Allan Copeland is no Liberace but plays fine piano while Hal Dickinson for many years played drums in various orchestras. John Drake is a saxophonist extraordinaire, having romped the one-nighter circuit with Dick Stabile and many others and Fran Scott takes no back seat on trombone. Nor is Paula Kelly to be overlooked. Pert and pretty Paula does mighty well with the violin.

So the Mods not only sing but can back themselves up with their own accompaniment—and mighty well at that.

If the party should begin to slow down even with all this talent, there's always dancing to turn to and the Mods do this also. They were the

first vocal group to actually put their songs to dance routines and into production. They've got a routine to fit every number, and they've got arrangements on over 1,700 songs, and all have been on the boards at dancing and ballet classes to improve their movement for television and night club appearances.

Just in case there are no outsiders around and the group should want a change of pace and face, there's always Nat Cole, Johnny Ray, Dean Martin, Humphrey Bogart, Jimmy Cagney and many others in the voice and expression of Allan Copeland and others in the voices of John Drake and Hal Dickinson. And the group as a whole can imitate almost any other vocal group around.

If they get tired of singing the same old songs, it's only a short span of work for Copeland, Dickinson or Scott to come up with something new, not just for the party but for any fan of music. Each of these three has written many hit songs, and Paula also turns out a fine lyric, though she hardly has time left for this anymore.

Every party must have something to eat, and even this is well taken care of. Miss Kelly is a fine cook and gets a big hand from Drake who does very well at the culinary arts and should as he spends most of his off hours in the kitchen eating.

Put this all together and it's easy to see that the Modernaires are a party by themselves.
