Introducing... The **SPEEDX INCENTIVE PLAN**

The SPEEDX Board of Directors has passed Motion 141-1, the SPEEDX Contributor Incentive Plan.

This plan is designed to increase contributions to the monthly bulletin by offering two free one-year membership renewals as prizes for active contributors in two categories.

CATEGORY 1: THE VOLUME PLAN

The "volume plan" rewards the SPEEDXer who contributes to the greatest number of individual columns in our bulletin during the remainder of the year (February through December). In the event of a tie, Bob Thunberg will conduct a drawing to determine the winner. There will be one winner in this category.

CATEGORY 2: THE FREQUENCY PLAN

The "frequency plan" rewards the SPEEDXer who contributes to the bulletin in at least ten of the remaining eleven months of this year. There will be one winner in this category, provided that there is at least one SPEEDXer who contributes to the bulletin on ten separate occasions this year. If more than one SPEEDXer is eligible, Bob Thunberg will conduct a drawing to determine the winner.

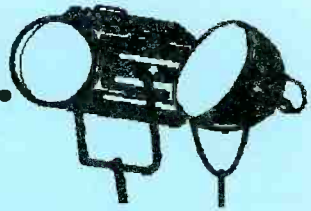
We hope that these two plans will stimulate contributions to the SPEEDX bulletin during 1990.

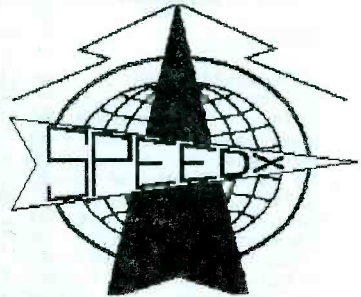
SAY 'HI' TO A REJOINING MEMBER

THE 1990 NORTH AMERICAN DX CHAMPIONSHIPS (NADXC)
SPONSORED BY NUMERO UNO AND FINE TUNING

ELIGIBILITY

The 1990 DX Championships is open to all listeners residing in North America [as defined by the country list of the North American Shortwave Association (NASWA)]. Members of the NADXC Administrative Committee and the judges are excluded from participation.

LISTENING PERIOD, FREQUENCIES, AND TIMES

The contest period will run from 1200 UTC 1 February to 1200 UTC 15 February 1990. Loggings outside this time period will not be considered. All loggings must be made between 2.000 MHz and 30 MHz. Loggings outside of this range will be eliminated by the judges.

PRIZES

Trophies will be awarded to the top three finishers. All entrants will receive a certificate of participation in the 1990 NADXC with their place of finish indicated on the certificate.

SCORING

Contestants are to log as many stations as possible from as many countries as possible. The first station logged from each country = 1 point. The second station from each country = 3 points; each additional station from that country = 5 points. For contest purposes, all clandestine stations and hobby pirate transmissions will be considered one "country." A station is a shortwave broadcaster whose transmissions are intended for reception by the general public. Each transmitter site of a broadcasting organization will count as a separate station. Different services of the same broadcast organization do not count as separate stations. Transmissions of a single broadcast organization on various frequencies may only be counted once. The use of multiple frequencies does not create as many new stations as frequencies used. For country counting and station counting purposes, the country list of the North American Shortwave Association (45 Wildflower Road, Levittown, PA 19057) will be the sole criterion. Utility stations may not be counted for this contest.

Participants are required to submit a running log to include country, station, frequency, time, date, SINPO, and the basis of station identification (i.e., spoken ID, interval signal, language, program, known//frequency checked, etc.).

Each contestant is required to total his own entry and provide a summary of the number of countries and stations claimed to support the point totals. Logs will be judged on accuracy, completeness and neatness. If the judges cannot read a log, that log will not be counted for scoring purposes. The decision of the judges is final.

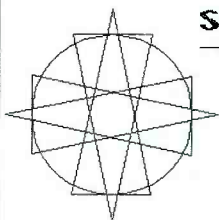

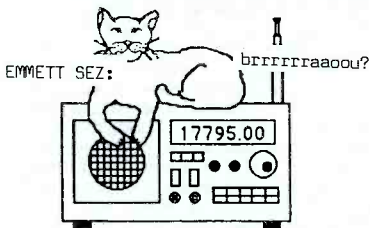

ROMANIA

This past Saturday's New York Post, of all places, carried an essay by Elie Wiesel, the Romanian-born human rights exponent and Nobel laureate, discussing the situation there. It isn't DX, but I found it to be very moving, and I'll send you a photocopy if you're interested. I've been trying to hear Bucharest lately, but it hasn't been at an audible level.

JAPAN

Here is a note from Radio Japan News, #4 - 1989, kindly forwarded by John Carson:

At the time of the Tienanmen Square incident in China, Radio Japan won high acclaim both at home and abroad for its prompt, accurate, and objective news reporting. Japanese people who were obliged to evacuate the Chinese capital on account of the turmoil were unanimous that Radio Japan provided the quickest and most reliable coverage of the incident. Many Chinese listeners also wrote to NHK to express their gratitude, saying that it was thanks to Radio Japan that they were able to find out what was going on in their own country at that time. The important role played by Radio Japan was widely reported in Japan's domestic media as well, helping the Japanese public realize afresh the importance of overseas shortwave broadcasting.

We also learn how Radio Japan compiles its news:

The original material for news bulletins comes from (1) NHK's domestic news division, (2) Japanese and foreign news agencies, and (3) material gathered independently by Radio Japan. Most stories, however, come from the NHK domestic news division.

NHK's recently completed News Center uses a fully computerized data processing system, and there is a direct link from there to Radio Japan's Production Center #1. This allows the instantaneous display of news scripts, news material gathering schedules, the order of the news items, etc., by a simple touch of the keyboard. At the same time, the latest news from the various domestic and overseas news agencies arrives in a constant flow by facsimile and ticker.

The news scripts thus received are scrutinized by Radio Japan news editors, who then prepare scripts for their own use, based on the originals.

A new system adopted by Radio Japan this year enables the newscaster in the studio to present the day's news in a much more flexible format than before, giving full consideration to the relative weight required for each item, rather than following the predetermined format. This proves especially effective in cases of emergency. We have also added a 3-minute bulletin at the end of each transmission in order to keep listeners up to date on the latest developments in the world. These new bulletins, such as Today's News and Radio Japan Furusato News, are compiled and broadcast in addition to the regular news programs. The scripts are prepared separately for each target audience.

The English News Section is staffed entirely by Japanese, with the exception of a few English-speaking rewriters who give advice on usage. Naturally, the Japanese staff must have both a fine news sense and an excellent command of English.

John, thanks for passing this along. I'd appreciate any copies of Radio Japan News that you can get.

THE UNITED STATES: VOA IN COURT

This is from the December 6 Newsday (a Long Island-based newspaper) and was forwarded by Paul Lannuier:

In a little-reported decision, a U. S. District Court judge in Des Moines recently dismissed a suit by NBC News President Michael Gartner, who charged that a federal ban on the dissemination of VOA programming in the United States violated the First Amendment. The court said that the ban applies only to the VOA's parent, the U. S. Information Agency.

In other words, while Uncle Sam may not disseminate VOA programming, or the transcripts of shows, the 40-year-old ban does not "preclude plaintiffs from disseminating" information domestically.

Of course, the Voice of America's news, discussion, and music shows can be heard only on the shortwave band, usually for two hours in the morning and two in early evening, via VOA's English-language service to the Caribbean. (That's what it says here, folks). One government official told Broadcasting magazine that American broadcasters "might start down-linking satellite-delivered VOA programs and rebroadcasting them domestically....it would be legal."

February 8, Dee again, on "how to help teenagers cope with peer pressure." February 16, Jan examines the surprising history of abortion and assesses its current status.

Passport: This is HCJB's daily magazine programme, which a lot of you have heard and enjoyed. "Passport Weekend," heard local Sunday nights (UTC Monday), moves up close on an event of the past week, or features interviews highlighting Latin American life and culture. You might also want to check it out on February 5/6, when Brent Allred presents an in-depth look at two New Zealand anniversaries (is this guy a Kiwi or what?): 200 years of European settlement, and 150 years of nationhood.

Caveat: These dates are local dates for North America. HCJB does a wonderful job in keeping up communication with its listeners and with DX reporters; but their information is more geared to the "listener" ("Oh, it's Tuesday night, time for Saludos Amigos") than to those of us who are warped into thinking that days begin at 7:00 at night in New Jersey.

AUSTRALIA - Radio Australia told me on 12/12 that the new program guide is out now and 1990 Calendars will be available around 12/18 (bmm)

Via "Peter Bunn's, 'OZ DX' is this article that appeared in the Melbourne 'Age' 7 November 1989, "Comment" by Michael Barnard - Just What is Going on at Radio Australia?

"Radio Australia, the highly regarded shortwave ambassador which, for 50 years, has been projecting Australia around the world, in later years with daily audiences in the tens of millions, is facing a crisis of identity and staff morale.

Changes to be crystallised next month, following a top-level ABC review and executive restructuring, including early retirements, will significantly constrict the target area of this once expansive world service to the Asia-Pacific region. New programming philosophies and emphases, open to varying interpretations, are being introduced.

Most of the changes are expected to be in place before the new general manager of Radio Australia, career diplomat Richard Broinowski, presently ambassador to South Korea, takes over in January. Staff critics claim the new philosophy is being "bulldozed" through. They want the agenda put on hold until the new head arrives - even though, ironically, one concern arising from the new programming philosophy is that it might be seen to be over-deferential to the sensitivities of regional nations - in other words, a tool of Foreign Affairs.

One directive put out by the head of English Language Programs (in one sense the flagship of Radio Australia, and now at the heart of the dispute) specifically cautions against "a confrontationist style of interviewing" and says producers "must avoid seeming to be voyeurs on regional life". Another ELP document. "Programs and Scheduling Philosophy", issued in September, emphasises that "we do share many of the same concerns in the areas of regional stability, economics and business, social and political development. It is around these similarities of interest, in the context of national differences, that our programming must be centered".

A clearer concern, however, is the changing priorities in the picture of Australia to be presented to the Asia-Pacific region when the "world service" effectively takes a dive in December. Even terms such as "social engineering" are being applied to the revamping of Australian content. As evidence, critics cite the dropping of popular and established Australian character packages such as "Window on Australia", "Along the Mighty Murray" and "You asked for it", a program which has drawn thousands of letters from listeners inquiring about facets of Australian life.

From December the new emphasis is to be on 'Woman of the Asia/Pacific region', 'Aborigines of Australia', the environment, education, law and so forth, the true test of which will rest on the philosophical (or ideological) agenda from which they are ultimately shown to have been drawn. Precedents from SBS Radio, in which the left has aggressively monopolised some ethnic programs, are not encouraging.

Another issue contributing to staff unease is a mooted move by Radio Australia from Burwood East to the planned new ABC centre at Southbank in the city. Many staffers at various levels resent this, wishing to remain as autonomous as possible from the home service. Unease has reached such a pitch that, according to highly placed informants, heads of departments attending a meeting last week with Radio Australia's acting general manager, Geoff Heriot, were required individually to signal their support for the management line through what has been described to me as an "oath

of allegiance".

General dissatisfaction is expected to take a new this this week with the likely submission to the Public Service Union of a long memorandum of concern from announcers and readers in the English language section. This is expected to include strong criticism of the outcome of the inquiry into Radio Australia by an ABC committee of review consisting of Messrs Stuart Revill (convenor), David Hill and Malcolm Long, whose report was published in August.

"Many staff members now feel that the review simply provided another opportunity for a group of would-be social reformers to tinker with Radio Australia's programs", one RA "dissident" told me. "A study of available submissions to the inquiry shows they offer little justification for the change of direction in ELP program philosophy."

Not only the English Language section is caught up in the struggle, however. Strikingly, another pending victim, despite the new regional emphasis, is Radio Australia's Japanese section. The review panel recommended cessation of shortwave (Japanese language) transmissions to Japan and a search for "new roles and outlets" for the service. Yet, the protesters say, none of the more than 80 submissions to the inquiry suggested closure.

A resolution on the Japanese service by RA staffers at a meeting on 24 October rejected the criteria on which the proposed closure is based and noted "if the Japanese service were to cease it would severely restrict the information about Australia available to the Japanese population."

Against this, one of the more general concerns reflected in ELP unrest is that under the new regional concentration many listeners in "outside" areas, such as the United States and Europe, will effectively get the cold shoulder. Traditionally, more than 70 percent of ELP mail came from listeners outside the newly designated target zone. Now this linkage in goodwill is at risk. In the words of one critic: "Unless we respond personally, such listeners will be lucky to get even a pro forma reply".

The new order may be gauged by a 1 November ELP staff memo on RA's 50 anniversary commemorative stamp. "The 350 (first day cover) giveaways are for listeners in the PACIFIC and ASIA regions only! Please DO NOT actually say on air that other listeners are excluded ... simply stress the two eligible regions."

In various directives the new priorities are set out thus: Southwest and Central Pacific; South East Asia, North Asia; South Asia... "any priorities below these first four are regarded as outside our resource capacity". "Our (target) audiences are, again in order of priority, decision makers and opinion leaders; interested indigenous others; expatriates... all programming philosophy and our attitude to scheduling and frequency allocation flows from the above."

Yet, despite the high priority focus on the Pacific there appears to be no plan to broadcasts in Pacific languages, as will be a feature of Radio New Zealand's new regional shortwave service, due to open in January. Radio NZ has not minced words in spelling out its own philosophy to present both sides of any issue and to make "a proud and confident statement about New Zealand".

Meanwhile, Radio Australia's bewildered professionals are being marched into workshops with such objectives in mind as "to provide role models and training in fresh ways of presenting information", "to explore alternative ways of identifying what is relevant to report on", "to develop a more sophisticated sense of 'balance' and editorial priorities", "to develop a sense of process rather than (of) event", and so on (staff memo from Head, ELP, 19/10). It all sounds most impressive, no doubt, but for public interest professionals who have spent years in the craft of communication and who have, whatever the occasional lapses, helped build Radio Australia into an impressive and enviable global ambassador, what does it all really mean? Stay tuned. They're revamping the music, too." (Ed note: What does this mean to me? Well, I possess 4 Radio Australia T-Shirts for my efforts in promoting Radio Australia in my SW columns in the late 80's. As for the 90's, if no program guide or calendar comes from Radio Australia, I'm through with the SW radio editing/publishing. Place your bets! (bmm))

"We have two sites, the "studio" in the hills above the capital, Victoria, and the "Transmitter Station" on the north east coast two miles north of Victoria. At the studio, where some English and Hindi programmes are made, we have two studio/control room suites, each using AKG microphones, Neve mixers, Revox tapes and Sony Cassette recorders, Technic turntables and Spandio and Kef loudspeakers. Our newsroom receives news primarily from FEB International's neo News Unit in Manila but also as a backup from Reuters via Fredericks Remodulators and other voice news sources via RACAL and Dymek receivers. At the TS, we have three transmitters: One "Harris", upgraded in March 1989 from 72kW to 100kW, another 100kW Harris, installed in March 1989, and one "Continental" 100kW. The aerial system is built on a coral reef one kilometer off shore from the TS, comprising of seven masts supporting eleven stacked dipole curtain arrays. These aerial arrangements can be configured to give different beam directions and widths by computer-controlled RF switches. The computer also controls RF synthesized drives and audio sorting from a tokenized transmission schedule held in memory."

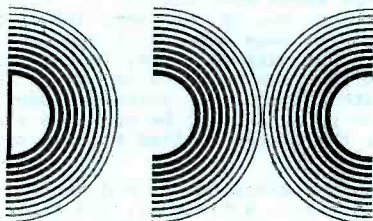

R.A.E.: A Voice of Friendship from Argentina

One of the original performances which the Official Radio Broadcasting Service must comply with consists in making national activities known abroad. This has been expressly established by current laws, and that is the task which specifically corresponds to RAE, the Overseas Service of the Argentine National Radio.

To make our national activities known abroad means carrying the voice of the Argentinians worldwide, so that people from all over the world, men and women of all ages, get to know what we are like, what we do, and how we think; what are our ideals and our ways of life; what is the landscape like; and what extent the works of our artists and scientists has reached. It also means reporting daily on the most important events which happen domestically and abroad, when the news belongs to Argentina or to our good selves the Argentinians.

RAE was created within the jurisdiction of LRA National Radio of Buenos Aires, on February 12, 1958. Its antecedents must be obtained from the Services performed in 1949, which broadcasted in six languages on short wave, and which were closed down in 1955.

Till 1980, RAE occupied the primary studios of LRA at the Central Post Office. Currently it broadcasts from its official radio headquarters, in Ayacucho 1556, Buenos Aires.

RAE is one of the forty stations of the official broadcasting service, named SOR (Servicio Oficial de Radiodifusión), with a total of 160 stations. It is the only station of the country exclusively dedicated to the attention of the international audience.

The current programming of RAE tends to offer its extensive audience a clear image of Argentina nowadays. The daily programme, which lasts for an hour (some for 45 minutes) in the different languages, and up to four hours in Spanish, include news bulletins, micro-programmes on general topics of interest, and popular Argentine music.

English, French, Italian, Portuguese, Japanese, and Arabic are the languages, besides Spanish, which are broadcasted daily with their message from RAE, starting at 10:00 till 05:00 UTC the next morning, with a break between 14:00 and 17:00 UTC. Eight languages are broadcast on four frequencies: 6060, 9690, 11710, and 15345 kHz (longitudinal wave bands of 49, 31, 25, and 19 metres respectively).

The Spanish team and a group of collaborators, specialists on various topics, prepare the material which is later translated into the remaining seven languages, for their subsequent broadcast by each corresponding language team. However, the different language teams sometimes prepare special notes of their own for their particular listeners, such as interviews with outstanding personalities in any activity, established in the country or simply on a tour. Each team has its head or "boss," and

several collaborators, selected through contests, with, it is hoped, a complete command of the language being broadcasted. Those responsible for each sector are Argentine born or naturalized citizens. Listeners' letters have evidenced in their daily task, the love they feel for their adopted country and their worry for the values, feelings, and ideals involved with nationality.

The transmitters: RAE shares with LRA1, Radio Nacional Buenos Aires, the building where studios and offices are located, and the transmitter plant at General Pacheco in Buenos Aires Province (G. C. 58.22W / 34.36S). RAE has three transmitters, two of them very old--a General Electric and a Standard Electric with some decades of use--and a Harris. The power of the transmissions do not surpass 50 kW, in the case of the old equipment; the Harris transmitter can approach 100 kW in the best of conditions, only surpassed with difficulty. Actually (September 1989), the Harris is damaged, but promptly will be again in use. The antennas are directed to Europe, the eastern United States, and to South America.

The audience: RAE listeners are of a great number and variety: Men and women of all ages and social conditions, activities, and cultural levels, with a high percentage of youth and teenagers. A great part of listeners belong to the group which we call DXers, lovers of listening to Short Waves. DXers' activity, as it is known worldwide, is growing day by day, generally in the progressive countries, but it has been expressed in non-industrial areas as well. The hobby of the Short Wave benefits the understanding and friendship between people from different countries.

RAE has favored the DXers' movement through its special remarks, very well accepted, to a certain international level, and courses from time to time, besides mailing the classic QSL cards which are totally appreciated by DXers. "Actualidad DX" is on the air as from March 1982; this programme is broadcast in all languages except Arabic; and there is an additional Spanish broadcast named "ADX-Suplement" that lasts twenty minutes, all edited by Gabriel Ivan Barrera.

All peoples of the world, and mainly Latin Americans, are the destinaries of RAE's transmissions.

From places afar or near, arrives the echo of words broadcasted. The waves of RAE are a voice in the Argentine world, an embassy of limitless friendship, and by now, with limited resources that only allow a limited intensity, very feeble if compared with other countries, but it is a safe voice for offering to those abroad the best image possible of a country with a vocation for peace and spiritual greatness.

QSL policy: RAE usually verifies all reports having arrived to the station's postal address, but due to the diverse steps that mailing takes within the station, they are delayed in receiving an answer. One thing that I have noticed while DXing both African and Latin American domestic tropical band stations is the extent to which American culture at times seems almost to dominate the air waves. 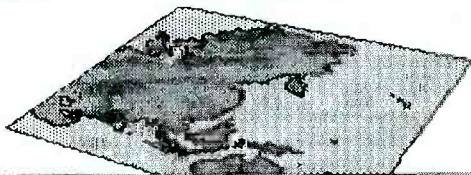

Space Shuttle Launch

Probably by the time you read this, STS-32 will be underway (if not completed). If a launch delay occurred, then the mission will be postponed until sometime in January 1990. Columbia will be using the newly refurbished launch pad 39-A at the Kennedy Space Center. Pad 39-A was last used in January 1986.

During mission STS-32, the crew will deploy the SYNCOM IV-05 communications satellite, and retrieve the Long Duration Exposure Facility (LDEF). This will be a unique mission since it requires the support for both a payload to be deployed and the return of LDEF. LDEF's processing and de-integration work at KSC will involve operations in the Orbiter Processing Facility, the Operations and Checkout (O & C) Building, and the Spacecraft Assembly and Encapsulation Facility (SAEF) number two.

Needless to say, if the shuttle has not been launched by the time this issue gets to you, don't forget to check the NASA frequencies (20198.0, for example), and the Goddard Space Flight Center Amateur Radio Club shuttle audio re-transmissions on the HF ham bands (3860.0, 7185.0, 14295.0, 21390.0 & 28650.0 kHz).
