J. E. TED CAMPEAU, Managing Director of CKLW. Ted Campeau's knowledge of the Metropolitan Detroit picture is probably more complete than any other radio man in this territory. In radio for the past twelve years, he has operated on both sides of the border and is well grounded by practical experience to discuss every phase of an advertiser's problem in this fertile fourth market.

In addition to his administrative duties as Managing Director, Mr. Campeau is the point of contact for all network matters and all questions concerning the national advertiser's job in Detroit.

He is an active member of the Operating Board of the Mutual Broadcasting System, is married, has two fine sons, and is an enthusiastic golfer. A graduate of St. Michael's and Osgoode Hall Law School, Toronto, Mr. Campeau entered the business world as a barrister. W. J. CARTER, Chief Engineer and Station Manager. Mr. Carter was the first employee of CKLW, coming here in February of 1932, and the station didn't start operating until May 31st of that year. He is a registered engineer and registered architect, and is responsible for the present layout of both studios, which occupy the entire tenth floor of the Guaranty Trust Building in Windsor, and the transmitter. Mr. Carter's spare time is spent in photographing his four year old daughter; although frequently one finds him on the golf course where he usually achieves the 80s.



JOHN GORDON, Program Director. Gordon Pfaff, by name, known in radio as John Gordon, has been Program Director at CKLW for several years. He is married and the father of two fine sons. His radio experience includes announcing and programming in Brantford, Ontario at CKPC. A few years ago, John played piano in the "pit", providing music for the silent day "thrillers". He is also the "Turf Reporter" on CKLW.



CAMPBELL RITCHIE, Traffic Manager and Chief Announcer. Beside holding these positions, "Cam's" other duties include his solos on the daily presentation of "THE QUIET SANCTUARY." Young but definitely radio minded, he capably handles all the responsibilities entailed in the Traffic Department. 





Above — The "Ambassador Bridge" which links Canada and the United States, just a few blocks from the studios of CKLW.








In Public Service











BOB HENDERSON, Studio Technician, started radio at Hamilton. Joined CKLW in 1940 . . . married, has one son Arthur five years old.






FRANK MERRIFIELD, Studio Technician and Maintenance Man for the past few years . . . married and has two boys.


