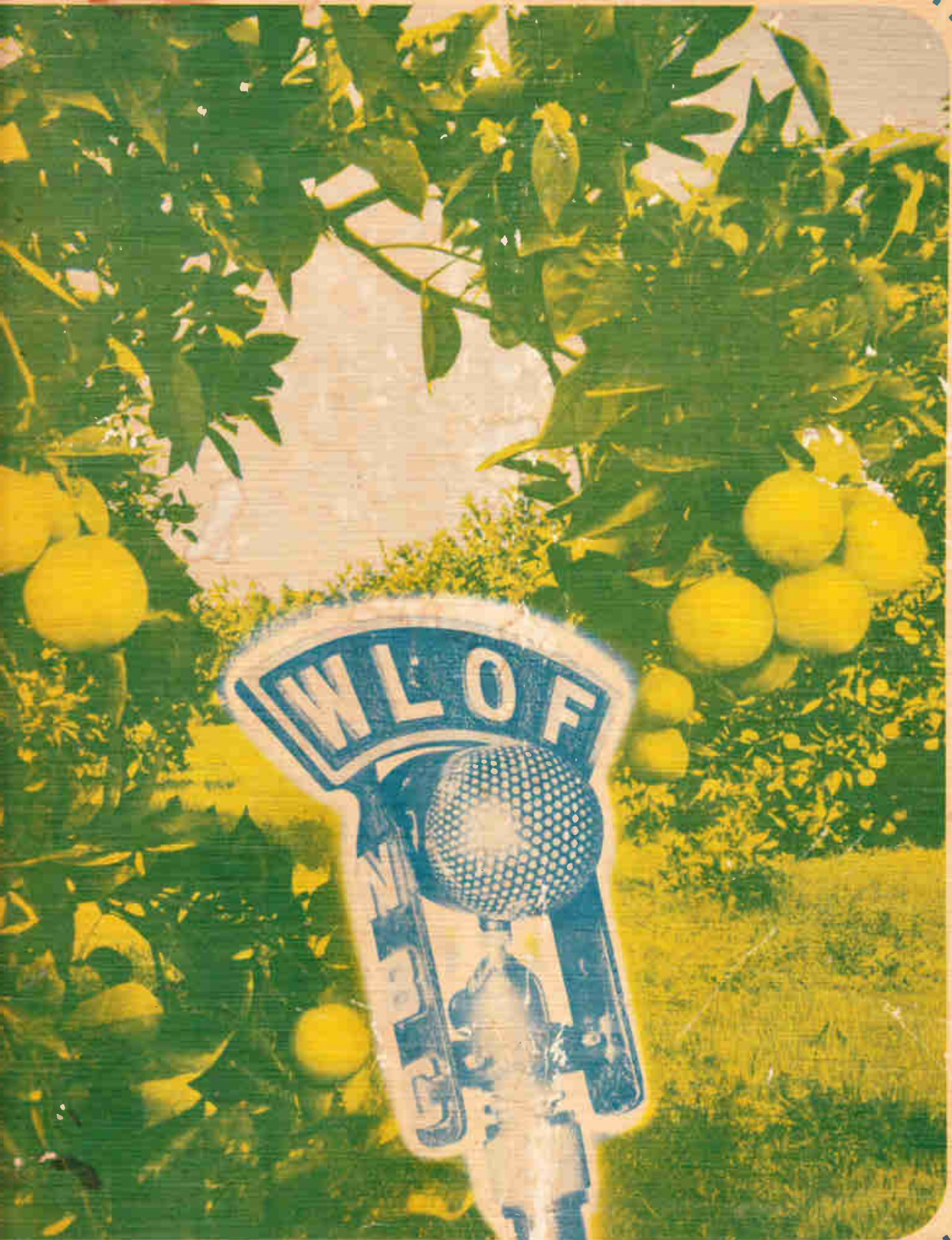

# DIRECTING WLOF POLICY

# WLOF "THE NEWS STATION"



1. The NBC SHORT-WAVE LISTENING POST, at which point news experts monitor reports from all world points, and convert them into "flashes" or direct broadcasts. WLOF listeners hear these split-second stories.



2. Unique in the ranks of foreign correspondents is HELEN HIETT, former representative for NBC in Spain, now on the NBC staff of commentators in this country.



3. Somewhere in Europe or Asia--or Africa and the East Indies--NBC-WLOF listeners will continue to hear from EDWIN HARTRICH, roving reporter.



Today, with every corner of the globe bursting with history-making activity, radio plays an increasingly important part in keeping people informed. But news is the most perishable of all commodities--if it is not used within a few minutes of its publication it ceases to be news and becomes history. Thus, WLOF has enlisted the finest, most alert of the nation's news services to help it keep listeners in the heart of Florida up to date on "news, while it is news".

Through its affiliation with the great NBC network WLOF can present short-wave reports from the foreign scenes of action and the foremost analysts and commentators to evaluate each event. The far-flung International News Service maintains correspondents in every imaginable nook and cranny of the nation and the world, and their stories, edited by expert central staffs, pour into the WLOF news room on automatic teletype printers twenty hours each day.

With these facilities giving WLOF an eye and ear at all points of world activity, it is no hollow boast that WLOF is "The News Station of Central Florida."

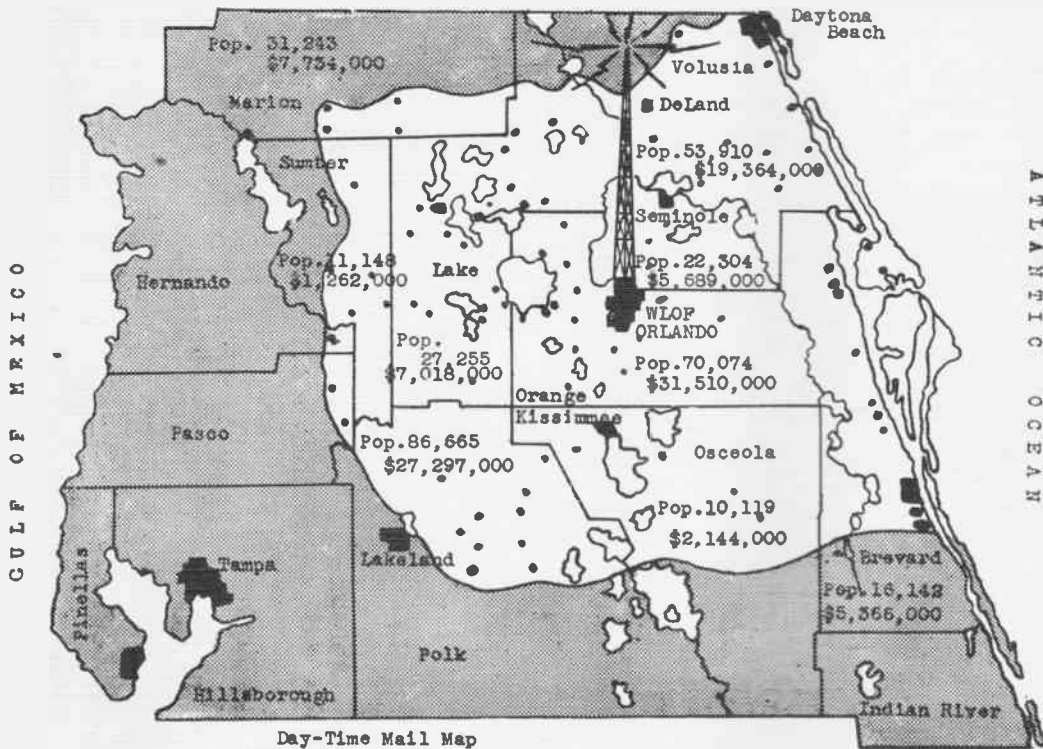

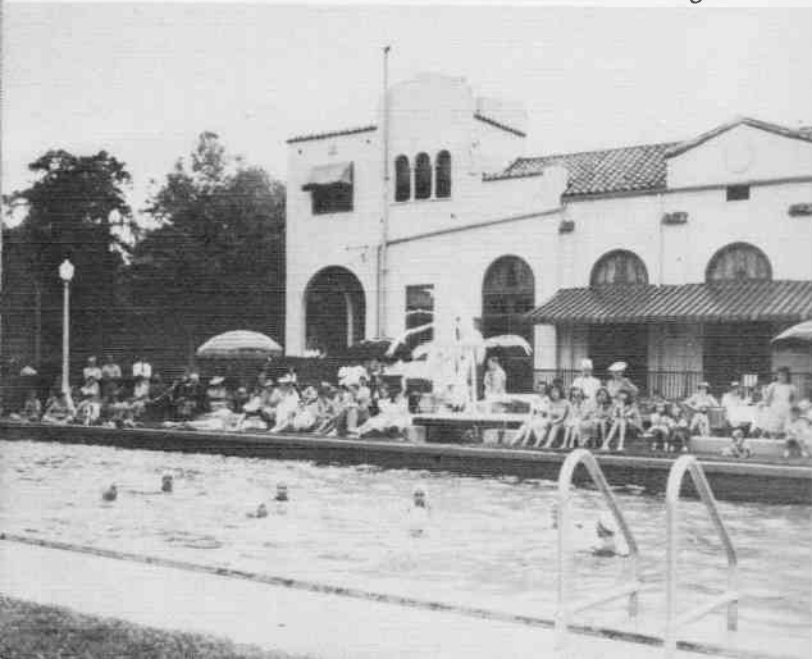


Day-Time Mail Map

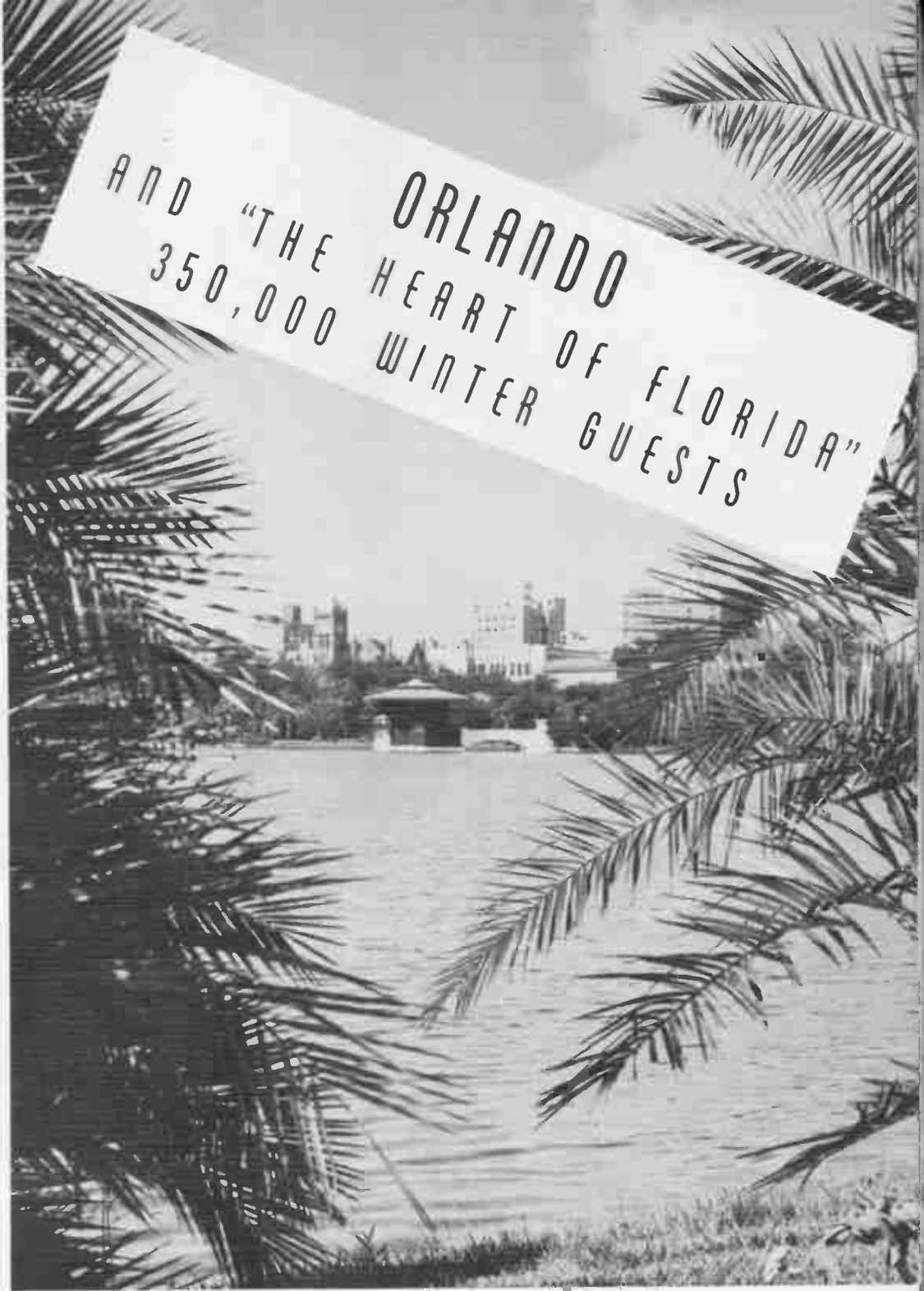



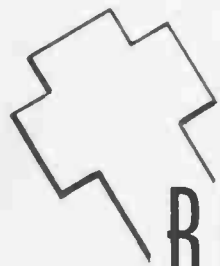

Dear Mr. Hazelwood:

You about the wonderful reception we have been receiving from our Sunday afternoon "RADIO REVIVAL" program over WLOF. The stacks of mail you have been sending at the station is not all that we receive, for a great many send their cards and letters of appreciation direct to me.

On a recent Sunday afternoon I decided to check the size of my audience by stating definitely that I would not give a booklet, or anything, to anyone writing in. I told them that I wanted to see if they had been writing for the little gifts I had promised, or had in on the air. We received the programs and wanted in 29 different towns and cities scattered over 400 persons Florida--100 miles away. A GREAT DEAL OF IT WAS MAIL AWAY. EVERYWHERE I GO IN Central Florida to conduct special meetings I find a great audience who listens to WLOF, and "The Radio Revival."

In my estimation your listening audience runs into many more thousands than even you dare think. I believe WLOF covers Central Florida like the sunshine. I have broadcast over stations with much bigger power than WLOF, but must say that yours evidences a bigger audience with which I have had experience, of course we try to produce programs that will build and hold a great audience but we are not so cosseted as to think we deserve all or the credit for the size of audience we have over WLOF. The friendliness, good will, and splendid programs of the station has built for WLOF an almost miraculous audience.

Please accept my thanks for your fine cooperation. Please feel free to call on me in the future as in the past for anything I can do to help give WLOF a bigger audience.

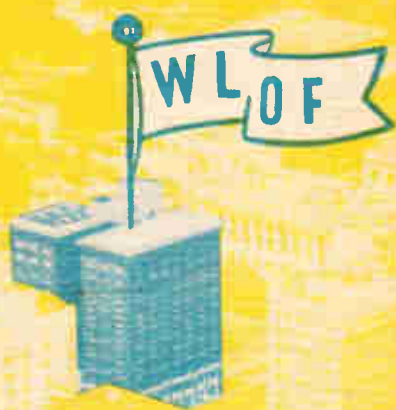
# WLOF'S AIR FOR UNCLE SAM'S FLIERS
