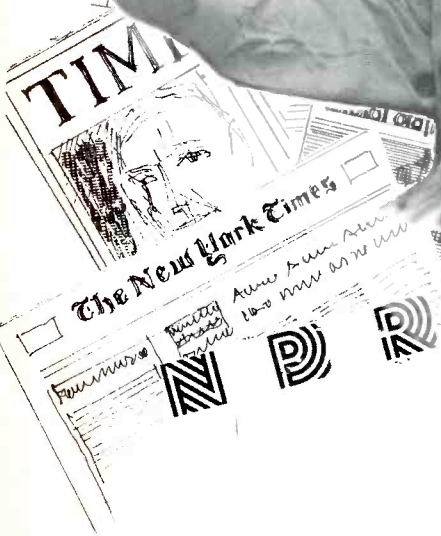
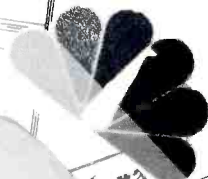

Goes National at a New Time!



***On the Media* Goes National – at a new time  
Sundays at 2pm, repeating at 10pm, on AM820**

Today the media do more than just cover the news. What—and how—the media cover has a powerful impact on our national culture. WNYC listeners who have enjoyed—and participated in—*On the Media's* discussions of how the press covers and shapes our world will hear even more views about the news media when the program goes national on October 1. The live, two-hour interview and call-in program will be broadcast to National Public Radio listeners around the country and air in New York at a new time: Sundays at 2pm.

The series is hosted by Alex Jones. A fourth-generation member of an east Tennessee newspaper family, Jones worked for his family's newspaper, *The Greeneville Sun*, before covering the press for *The New York Times*. In 1987 he won a Pulitzer Prize

for his series of articles on the fall of the Bingham newspaper dynasty in Louisville, Kentucky. He and his wife Susan E. Tiffitt later co-authored a book on the Bingham family, *The Patriarch*. The couple is currently working on a biography of the Ochs/Sulzberger family, who have owned and operated *The New York Times* for nearly 100 years.

*On the Media* attempts to demystify the news media by explaining how journalists do their jobs, what criteria are used to determine a story's newsworthiness, and who controls news outlets. Listeners join in discussions of timely issues facing the press with guests that include the nation's most prominent and provocative journalists, media executives, and critics.

Recent guests on the program include *Newsweek's* Eleanor Clift and Jonathan Alter, *Newsday's* Marvin Kitman, *Washington Post* media critic Howard Kurtz, NPR's Scott Simon, *The New York Times's* Abe Rosenthal, Tina Brown of *The New Yorker*, critic Stanley Crouch, columnist Molly Ivins, Dean Joan Konner of Columbia University's School of Journalism, and *TV Nation's* Michael Moore.

Whether the topics come straight from the week's headlines or deal with ongoing issues of a free press, *On the Media's* discussions are lively and provocative. Recent programs looked at how the media cover the Bosnian conflict, public cynicism and the press, why *New York Newsday* folded, and Rupert Murdoch's media empire. *On the Media* provides listeners with a captivating glimpse into the inner workings of news operations, while exploring the impact of decisions by editors, producers, and media executives on elections, public policy, and the shaping of public opinion and attitudes.

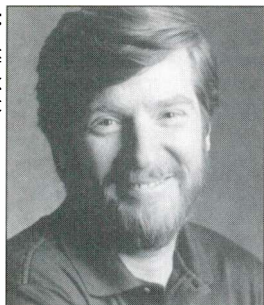
**Un-American Activities**

On October 20, 1947 the House Un-American Activities Committee began hearings that brought blacklisting to Hollywood and a period of accusation, denunciation, and persecution to those suspected of being Communist sympathizers. *Blacklisted* is the story of screenwriter Gordon Kahn—produced by his son, Tony. From 1947 until his death in 1962, Kahn was the target of surveillance by J. Edgar Hoover and the FBI. Kahn could have ended the ordeal by renouncing his leftist views and giving the investigators the names of others to be questioned. *Blacklisted* details the price Kahn and his family paid for his refusal to give in to intimidation. Alec Baldwin, Eli Wallach, and Julie Harris head a cast that also includes NPR's Susan Stamberg and Scott Simon.

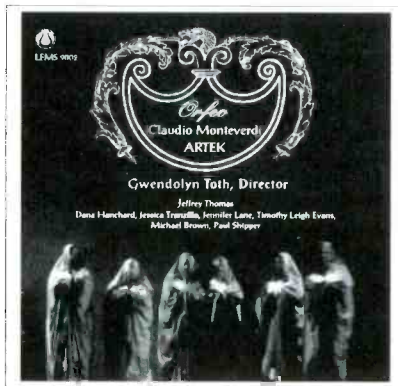
