WOW is planning an unusual series of broadcasts from the Nebraska State Fair, August 31 through September 6. The schedule will be worked out with the cooperation of the Extension Service of the Agricultural College of the University of Nebraska and 4-H Club officials.

George S. Round, Extension Editor, will have charge of some of the broadcasts. Already scheduled is a broadcast of the Farm Community Chorus on Sunday, August 31, from 2 to 2:30 p. m., and a series of programs from 4:45 to 5 p. m., consisting of 4-H Club news and events.

Plans are also being made for Foster May to broadcast some of his "Man on the Street" programs from the fair grounds.

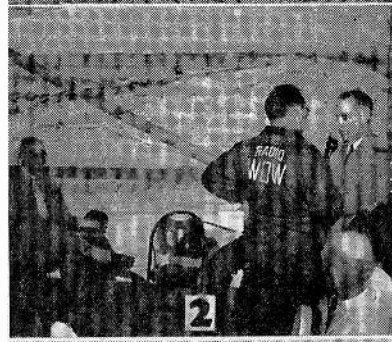
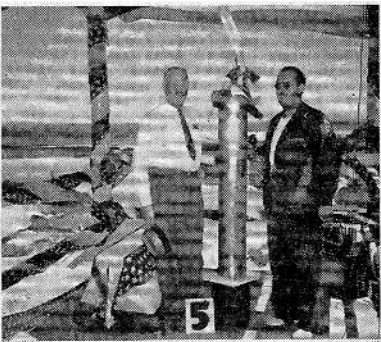
REAL GREETER

FISHING 'TACKLE'

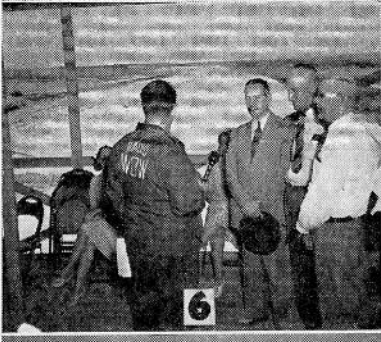

Electric Cooking School Plans Are Set

Thousands of midwestern housewives and their families will be given another opportunity to see famous radio stars in person at the 1941 Omaha Food Show.

For the fourth successive year WOW has accepted the task of providing entertainment, and this year's show is expected to equal or exceed last year's show, which was attended by more than 40,000 persons.

The dates of this year's Food Show are September 22 to 27, inclusive.

One feature already arranged is an all-electric cooking school, under the direction of Miss Martha Bohlsen, who conducts the Homemakers' Club of the Air on WOW, and Mrs. B. E. Marsh, Residential Sales Manager of the Nebraska Power Company.

Assisting Miss Bohlsen also will be Miss Alice Ward of Nebraska Power Company's Home Service Department, and others. Contests and prizes and many new innovations in cooking-school management are planned.

In general, the series of daily schools will include a complete cooking program, including valuable information on marketing, food storage, food preparation and food presentation.

As this is written, WOW's General Manager John J. Gillin, Jr., is in Chicago making arrangements for talent, of network caliber, to appear at the Omaha Food Show. The alignment of talent will be announced in the September News Tower.

Last year WOW arranged for the Alka-Seltzer "National Barn Dance," Ralph Edward's "Truth or Consequences" and the Avalon "Showboat" cast to come to Omaha for the Food Show.

Louis Kavan, Secretary of the Independent Grocers and Meat Dealers of Omaha, said that advance interest in the Food Show this year is greater than ever. Most of the 63 booth spaces at the auditorium have already been assigned to leading food manufacturers, jobbers and distributors.

General Chairman of this year's Food Show is Elmer Gross. Directors of the Food Show Committee include John Herdzina, James Pros, A. D. Short, Ben Newman, Ben Perelman, Harry Kulakofsky, Frank Bosanek, Fred Jepsen, Mark Polonsky, Sam Rosenblum and Louis Albert.

During May and June radio stations of the United States used more than 150,000 one-minute spot announcements boosting the sales of defense bonds. The U. S. Treasury Department credited radio with the success of the first two months of the drive, in which \$707,000,000 worth of bonds were sold. Thirty big-name radio stars gave their talent up to June 30.

WOODMEN CHIEFS CARRY ON

Society On Top Financially in U. S. A.

President De Emmett Bradshaw, and other officers and directors of the Woodmen of the World, which owns and operates Radio Station WOW, were unanimously re-elected to their posts in a vote of confidence given by the national convention of the Society in San Francisco, July 1.

Those who are attached to the Omaha headquarters, and who are widely known in Omaha business, civic and social circles, who were re-elected include: Colonel T. E. Patterson, Vice President; Farrar Newberry, Secretary; R. E. Miller, Treasurer; William Ruess, Chairman of Auditors, and W. C. Braden, Auditor. Reappointed were V. J. Pakes, Assistant Secretary; Rainey T. Wells, General Attorney, and Drs. A. D. Cloyd and Herbert B. Kennedy, Medical Directors.

President Bradshaw reported to the Sovereign Camp convention that the Woodmen Society has enjoyed a fine, steady increase in membership and a consistent improvement of its financial position in the insurance field.

Mr. Bradshaw reported the Society had \$130,138,401.03 in gross assets (as of December 31, 1940). During 1940 the Society's membership showed a net increase of 17,741, he reported.

Illustrative of the strong financial position of the Woodmen of the World was President Bradshaw's assertion that "For every hundred dollars liability of this Society, it has on hand admitted assets of \$121.91. That is at least \$12.50 per hundred more than any company valuing on our high standard.

"Our Society financially stands at the top of all organizations granting life insurance in America," Mr. Bradshaw said.

Woodmen officials on their return from the California meeting declared it to be one of the most successful sessions in the history of the Society.

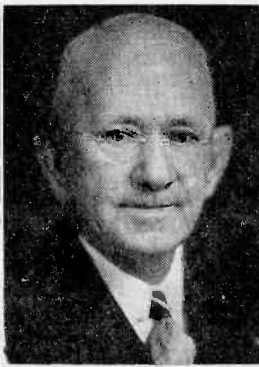

Radio Workers Highest Paid of Any Industry in the Nation

Men and women who work in broadcasting are the highest paid of any industry in the United States.

The Federal Communications Commission has just announced that in 1940 the broadcasting industry paid its 21,646 employees a weekly average wage of \$47.13. This was an increase of \$1.17 per week average over 1939.

The industry has an annual payroll of approximately \$56,000,000, with about 50 cents of every expense dollar going for wages and salaries.

Eliminating those drawing executive salaries, the average broadcast industry employee earned \$41.68 weekly.

Broadcasting Magazine, semi-official trade publication of the industry, reported that no other industry exceeds broadcasting's average pay. The magazine reported that the average wage in the nation's tool industry is \$41.73; automotive man-

ufacturing, \$40.64; insurance, \$37.34; brokerage, \$37.32; aircraft manufacturing, \$35.02; iron and steel manufacturing, \$32.71.

In a typical week, broadcasting employees (other than executives) received \$800,000 of the \$1,000,000 payroll of the industry.

During that week, executives of broadcasting (2,197 of them in 765 stations) received \$186,070, or an average of \$84.69 per week.

The average station manager received \$118.99 a week; outside salesmen, \$55.59; producers, \$41.03; staff musicians, \$48.01; research and development engineers, \$40.49; writers, \$32.43; announcers, \$34.63; promotion and merchandising directors, \$38.97.

The figures were announced by the Federal Communications Commission Accounting Department, and were based on a study of a typical broadcast week starting October 13, 1940.

In 1934, both were featured in "Laugh Clinic" at Station KMOX, St. Louis, Mo., and Elmira played Ransom's dim-witted stenog.

Thirty-three compacts open as one after every "Hour of Charm" rehearsal. Reason is Phil Spitalny's ban on any make-up retouching during practice sessions.

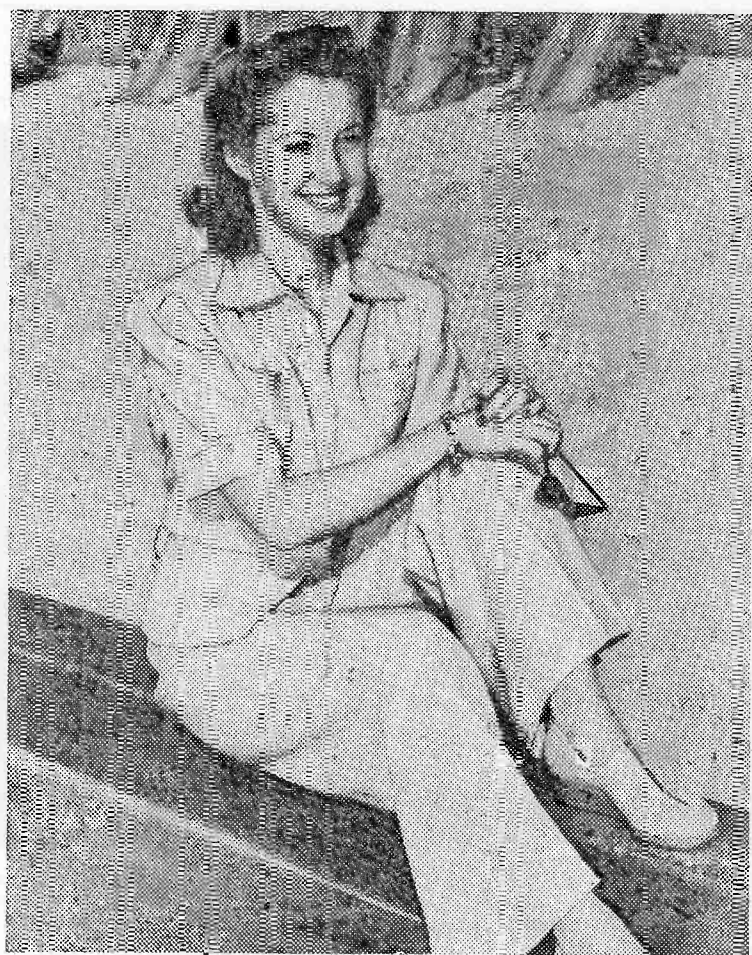

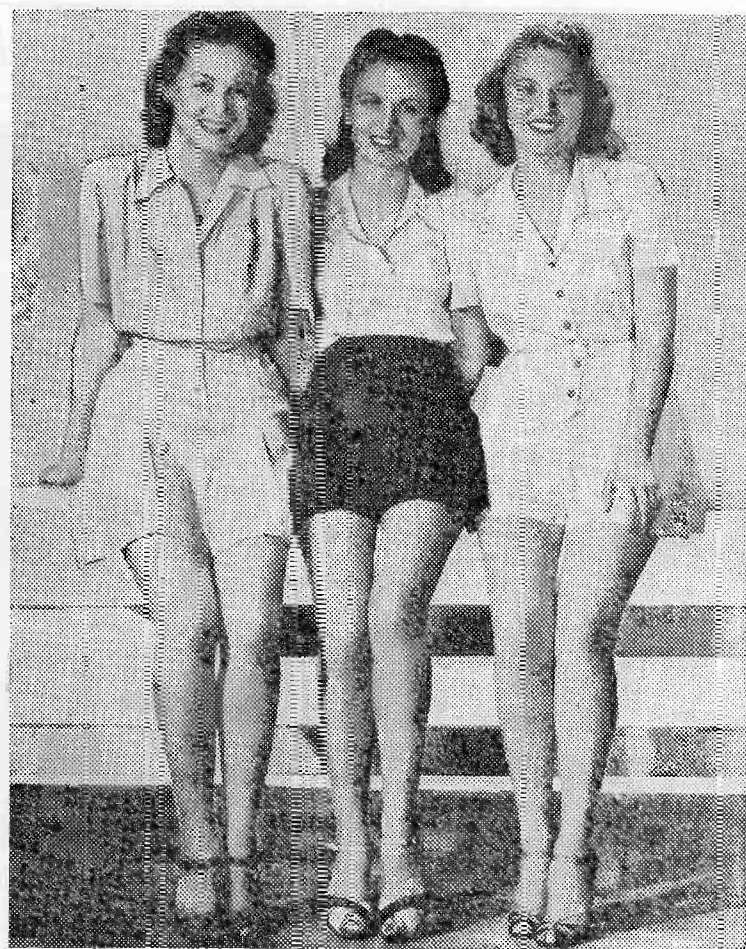

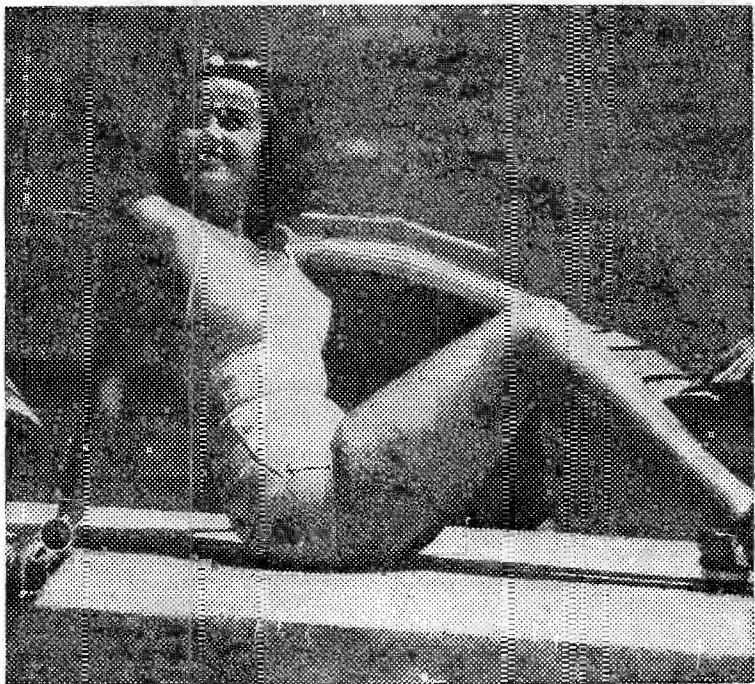

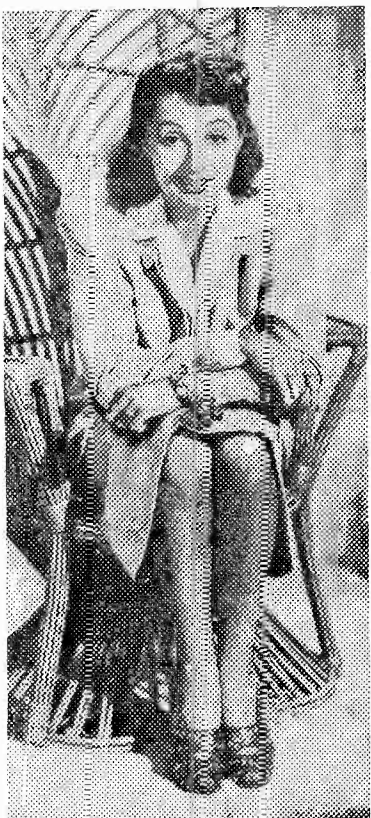

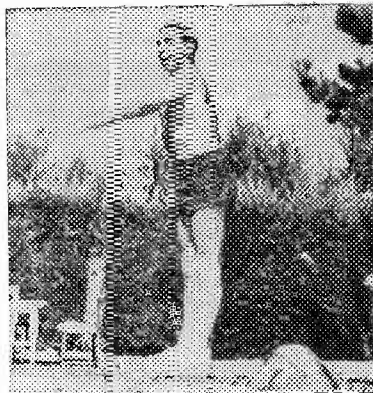

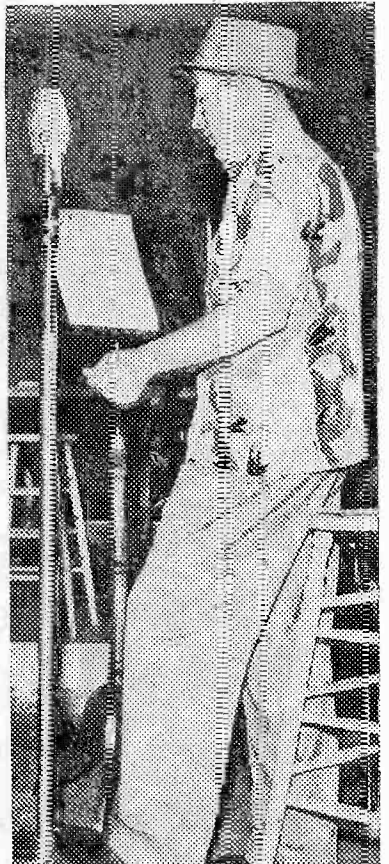

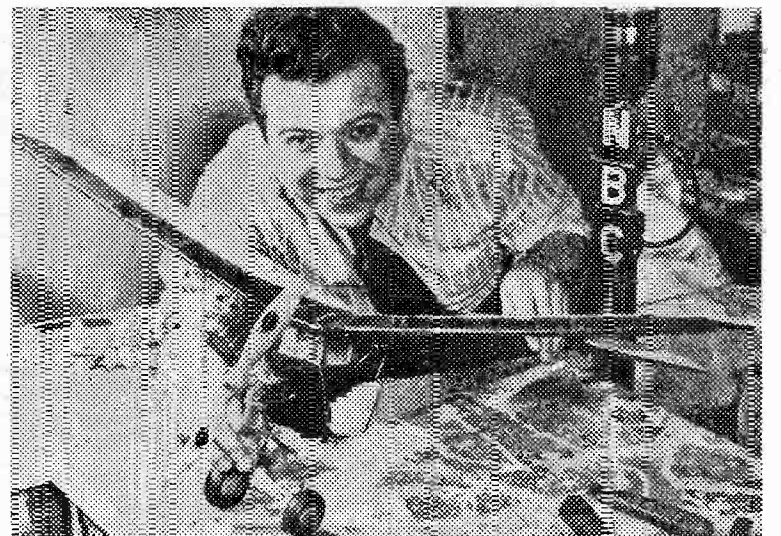

Kingsley Dam Fete From Ogallala

George E. Johnson, chief engineer and general manager of the Kingsley Dam project; George Carter, resident engineer of the Tri-County project, and K. Sewell Wingfield, director of the Power Division of the PWA, were interviewed on the "Man on the Street" broadcast.

Ceremonies were conducted from a platform overlooking the dam, which is three miles long, the equivalent of 16 stories high, and the second largest earthen dam in the world.

Mr. Wingfield's address before the official ceremonies was also broadcast by WOW.

During Foster's absence, DeMoss developed several spirited discussions—some of a serious nature, but many in a lighter vein.

DeMoss asked one group of listeners for their suggestions on "How to have fun." Answers were interesting and varied. One lady said she would like to get in her Chevrolet and go to the mountains.
